Fall Continues Critically Ill

Washington, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The condition of former Secretary Albert B. Fall, ill here of congestion of the lungs, continued serious today. He was very weak and unable to talk.

The sixty-six-year old former cabinet member slept but intermittently during the night. His throat troubled him considerably. His wife and two daughters remained at his bedside today in the hotel where he has lived since he came here for trial with Harry F. Sinclair on the conspiracy charge which grew out of the leasing of oil from Teapot Dome.

Loss of strength resulting from a congestion of the lungs together with bronchial trouble, rendered Fall unable this morning to speak to the members of his family at the bedside.

Fall is sixty six years old, he has been in ill health for several years and during his attendance at the conspiracy trial he many times showed the debilitating effects of his long battle with his physical ailments. After a mistrial interrupted the proceedings he made plans to return to his home in New Mexico for rest in preparation for the new trial in January. But his doctor, J. J. Kilroy put him to bed instead.

Dr. J. J. Kilroy said the patient's temperature was slightly lower this morning, but that the condition of his nerves had made it impossible for him to take nourishment.

The physician paid tribute to the nursing abilities of Mrs. C. C. Chase, Fall's daughter, who is taking care of him, and who had nursed him through a similar illness.

"Mr. Fall weathered a storm some what like this before," Dr. Kilroy said, "so I think he may come out all right."

Many kinds of big business are in America from railroads to oil, and from meat to coal. The biggest of all, according to investigators of crime in Washington, is the "fence" business. The receivers of stolen goods.

Big business deals with thieves reselling things they steal, putting crime on a business basis, amounts to three thousand million dollars a year. And more than half is profit. Every "fence" is an accessory to the burglars, etc., and should go to jail for life, but that would be interfering with big business. We don't do that.

FOUR SENT TO ROADS IN PITT COURT FRIDAY

Three Ayden Negroes
Draw Six Months on
Charge of Aiding in
Murder.

Found guilty of aiding and abetting in the murder of an Ayden negro some time during the summer, Isaac Cox, John Henry Wilson and Robert Churchill, negroes, were each sentenced to six months on the roads by Judge C. C. Lyon yesterday's session of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court. The case was begun Friday, the jury returning a decision yesterday.

Judge Stanley, colored, appearing on a charge of larceny, was given twelve months on the county roads. Lee Miller paid a fine of \$50 and cost and was ordered not to drive an automobile for a period of six months on a charge of driving while drunk.

Major Adams was fined \$100 and cost and ordered not to drive an automobile within a period of twelve months for driving while drunk.

C. F. Kersy, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, had sentence suspended for a period of two years on payment of cost, with provisions that he pay Marie Baker the sum of \$50.

A. W. Hodnett, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, was fined \$300 and cost.

Willis Johnson, colored, charged with larceny, had judgment suspended for two years on good behavior.

GRAND JURY REPORTS IN PITT COUNTY

Recommendations
Only of a Minor Na-
ture Contained in
Report to Judge
Lyon.

Only recommendations of a minor nature were contained in the report of the grand jury presented yesterday to Judge C. C. Lyon, of Elizabethtown, presiding over the one-week term of Pitt county criminal superior court, which has been in progress in this city since Monday morning.

Improvement in sanitary conditions of the county home was the only recommendation of any importance. The county convict camp was found in splendid condition and prisoners were well cared for.

The detailed report as presented to Judge Lyon, follows:

To the Honorable C. C. Lyon, Judge Presiding:

The Grand Jury do submit the following report:

That all bills and presentments coming before us have been acted on, and due returns thereon made to the Court.

1st. In the discharge of our duties. We recommend that the ceiling of all offices on the bottom floor of Court House should be repaired, as being recommended by the Grand Jury of August Term 1927. The expenses of same should be allowed and taken from 1928 Budget to pay said expenses.

2nd. We as having visited and examined the various offices as follows: Clerk's office, Register of Deeds, Sheriff's, Treasurer's, Auditor's, County Jail, County Health Office, and Board of Education, and find them in good condition, offices well kept, and neat records of same.

3. We have examined the record of the Clerk's office and find that all of the Justices of the Peace in the County have filed and made their report in accordance with the law, with the exception of two or three magistrates; that they do not have any J. P. Record Books and no report to make, and with this exception find said report to be true and accurate.

4th. We visited the County Home and found things in fair condition, but we recommend that there should be some improvement in respect to the sanitary condition, and the inmates therein speak very highly in respect of the County Home.

5th. We also visited the Convict Camp and found the prisoners well cared for, and spoke highly of Mr. Fancher, the Supt., of the road force, also stock and supplies were in good condition.

We recommend that a steel cabinet be purchased and placed in the Sheriff's Office for the purpose of taking care of the receipts Books, sufficient size to take care of same.

We wish to thank the Court and the various officers for the information and courtesy given us while in the discharge of our duties.

The program was based upon the Thanksgiving idea and everybody wore an imitation eagle's feather on his scalp made by the Industrial Arts department of the college, including chiefs, squaws and others. Prof. H. E. Austin, as toastmaster, was entirely equal to the occasion, making an interesting talk on Indian folkways and attitudes.

The music for the occasion was furnished by the college, under the direction of Miss Lois Gorrill. One of the most enjoyable parts of the program was the singing of Mrs. Herbert Waldrop. She gave "From the Land of the Sky Blue Water" and "Indian Love Call."

The ridiculous part of the entertainment was rendered by Ralph Deal and Miss Emma Hooper. ITALIAN FLIER MAKES 300 MILES AN HOUR

Rome, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Major Mario De Bernardi, Italian flying ace, attained a new speed of more than 300 miles an hour in his hydro-airplane test of the Venice-Lido course yesterday, smashing all existing records for speed in the test, the Royal Aero Club of Italy stated today.

BALLOONIST IS KILLED TODAY

Captain Hawthorn Gray Loses Life When Bag Falls in Tree Near Sparta, Tenn.

Sparta, Tenn., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Captain Hawthorne C. Gray, who set out from Scott Field, Belleville, Ill., yesterday seeking a world record for free balloons, lost his life in the attempt. His body in the wrecked balloon was recovered near here today.

Identity of the aeronaut was established by papers in his pockets. The balloon bore the number S-80241.

Gray's body was found in the basket of his balloon which landed in a tree-top here. The airman apparently had been dead since sometime yesterday.

The balloon, drifting aimlessly, was seen about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon by a farmer who attempted to seize one of the ropes but missed it. Following it over the mountains, he came upon the balloon lodged in a tree and the basket in another tree about 10 feet distant not suspecting any one was in the bag he made no report of the incident until today.

Cause of the death was undetermined but belief was expressed that Gray either had died of heart trouble or of gas, as he was wearing a gas mask when the body was found.

Scott Field Nov. 5.—(AP)—Captain Hawthorne C. Gray, reached an altitude of 40,000 feet at 3:15 P. M. yesterday, he wrote in his log found with his body near Sparta, Tenn.

This altitude, if authenticated, would establish a new World's record.

This was the last entry made by Captain Gray. His instruments may show an even greater height, when opened at Washington, where they will be sent immediately.

Captain Gray, 40,000 feet up, again went higher into the air than any other living man, but Scott Field officials said it was doubtful whether the record would be allowed officially. His ascent to 42,470 feet last May 4 was disallowed as a world's record because he was forced to descend by parachute.

PRICES STILL REMAIN FIRM

Tobacco Market Yesterday Averaged \$28.77 on 974,166 Pounds of Tobacco.

The Greenville tobacco market yesterday sold 974,166 pounds of tobacco for \$280,342.24, an average of \$28.77 per hundred pounds, according to official figures made public today by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade.

For the week the market sold 4,826,374 pounds for a total sum of \$1,390,510.22 at an average of \$28.81 per hundred pounds.

Season's sales at suspension of sales yesterday total 42,356,382 pounds for \$9,656,062.02 at an average of \$22.79.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Tobacco farmers of the State continue to garner a harvest of gold from a crop which in spite of being unusually heavy, still is bringing excellent returns in the dozens of warehouses where sales continue.

Reports from seven markets indicate an average of around 29 cents a pound during the past week, with sales over 150,000,000 pounds.

Wilson, world's largest market, bids to break the seasonal record of 776,000,000 pounds sold in 1925, reporting sales to date of more than 50,000,000. It is expected 80,000,000 pounds will be unloaded before the season ends. Prices this week have run up to \$30.78 a hundred, with a season's average at \$21.61.

A record was set in Henderson when one day's sales brought an average of \$31.55 a hundred. The season's average has been around \$21, with more than 7,000,000 pounds sold.

Tarboro noted an advance in prices with 5,000,000 pounds sold to date.

Winston-Salem has marketed more than 19,000,000 pounds, selling 17,846,820 during October for an average of \$19.88, says the official report. Last week's average was around \$26 a hundred and sales during October 1926, four million pounds less, averaged \$24.87.

Seasonal sales at Greenville total over 40,000,000 pounds with an average for last week's sales coming up around \$30 a hundred. Prices on a few baskets of the fine leaf went up as high as \$90 a hundred, reports said.

Rocky Mount prices went up to \$29 a hundred during the week, some tobacco bringing as high as \$1 a pound. Season's sales total 22,000,000 pounds. Roxboro prices have averaged about \$28.50 a hundred with the market more active than in several years. Wendell seasonal offerings have been nearly 4,000,000 pounds at \$27 a hundred and Sanford prices have been around \$29 a hundred during the week.

DEATH TOLL FROM FLOODS IN NEW ENGLAND STATES STILL INCREASING TODAY

Summary Of Flood Conditions

(By the Associated Press)

Vermont—Collapse of reservoir at Montpelier reported to have caused loss of life estimated at from 137 to 212 persons. Unconfirmed reports said that Lieut.-Governor Jackson had perished at Barre. Windsor placed in charge of troops with a thousand persons homeless and dead lines established to prevent looting. Burlington isolated by rising waters. Rutland restored to communication after being isolated for 24 hours.

Massachusetts—Western area suffered severely. Village of Peabody almost swept away when mountain reservoir burst. Montreal-Boston train service suspended. Boston threatened with milk famine.

New Hampshire—Northern towns cut off. North Walpole reported under 17 feet of water. One hundred washouts and landslides were reported in the White Mountains.

Connecticut—Rivers at record heights and property damage placed at \$1,000,000.

Rhode Island—Many mill dams burst and 5,000 persons out of work.

Maine—Communications were partially disrupted and railroad service was crippled by gale and washouts.

New York State—Hudson valley menaced. River at Albany ten feet above normal.

Quebec—Property damage of several millions of dollars reported from eastern townships where crops were destroyed and timber swept away. Rail service paralyzed. Governor-General and Lady Willington had narrow escape when bridge at Kinsey was washed away 90 minutes after their departure. Montreal train had passed over.

PITT MEDICAL MEN ARRANGE PUBLIC MEET

State Officials to Present Program at Meeting of Society November 10th

Members of the North Carolina Medical Society and the State Board of Health will be in charge of the program of the next session of the Pitt County Medical Society to be held at the courthouse in this city Thursday, November 10th, according to information made public this morning by Dr. E. T. Dickinson, president of the Pitt County Society.

The officials to be present are: Dr. J. T. Burrus, president of the North Carolina Medical Society; Dr. L. B. McBrayer, secretary of the State Society, and Dr. C. O. Laughlinhouse, secretary of the State Board of Health. The meeting at the courthouse will be public and everybody is invited to attend.

Dr. Dickinson stated that the Parent-Teachers Associations of the entire county are urged to attend this meeting as honorary guests.

Members of the local society will assemble at the Presbyterian church promptly at 6:30 Thursday evening. The program will be turned over to the visiting officials who will present several matters of a scientific nature. The program at the courthouse will begin at eight o'clock.

Dr. Yarborough To Be Buried at Cary

Raleigh, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Funeral services of Dr. J. A. Yarborough, Mayor of Wake Forest, who died yesterday at a local hospital as the result of injuries received when his auto crashed through a bridge and onto railroad tracks, will be held Sunday afternoon at Cary.

Dr. Yarborough, 38, was a native North Carolinian. He was a graduate of the University of North Carolina in 1911 and later graduated at the Atlanta Dental College. He was a 32nd degree Mason, and a member of Wake Forest Lodge which have charge of his funeral.

He is survived by his widow and two children.

Raging Rivers Spread Death and Destruction in Northern And Western Parts Of Country.

(By The Associated Press)

Raging rivers continued to spread death and destruction through the valleys of northern and western New England today, paralyzing communication and shrouding the extent of the disaster in uncertainty. While more than 30 lives were known to have been lost, unconfirmed, in definite reports from the isolated area indicated that the death toll might mount above 200.

The mystery's darkest center hovered over Montpelier, Vermont, from which trickled vague reports of loss of life varying from 157 to 212 persons. The bursting of a reservoir was said to have sent more than 10 feet of water swirling through the city.

A wireless message from the stricken area to the Associated Press picked up at Binghamton, N. Y., reported the loss of ten lives and among them was said to be Lieutenant Governor Jackson. A similar message, picked up at Hudson, Mass., however, mentioned persistent but unverified reports of high loss of life at Montpelier, but made no mention of any loss of life at Barre.

The damage to property, according to early estimates, mounted into staggering sums, while in addition thousands of persons were temporarily deprived of livelihood with the paralysis of industry.

While the Green Mountain region of Vermont and the Berkshire region of Massachusetts were the most seriously affected the flood waters poured over into other New England States, N. Y., and the province of Quebec, tearing buildings and ripping bridges from their foundations.

The American Red Cross, already providing 60,000 meals a day to the Mississippi flood sufferers, was mobilizing relief work for the new victims in the East. Six workers were rushed to the flood areas, and all local chapters were authorized to expend their funds to meet any emergency.

Relief work was severely handicapped by crippled railway service, while Boston and other cities of the New England coast, cut off from the inland dairy section, were in imminent danger of a milk famine.

While intermittent wire communication was being established to many points long cut off, ominous silence still hovered over Montpelier, Barre and St. Johnsbury, Vt. Many miles of both railway and highway in the Green and White mountains and Berkshire regions were inundated, completely swept away, or buried under landslides.

As the crest of the flood waters accumulated from more than two days of the heavy rainfall which rushed over New England swept down the Connecticut river, the waters were rising steadily in the wide valley through Massachusetts and Connecticut, but were reported to be receding farther north.

(Portland, Maine, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Officials of the Maine Automobile Association while in telephone communication with Concord, N. H., regarding road conditions, today were informed that a report was current there that the dam at Franklin, N. H., had gone out.

Hudson, Mass., Nov. 5.—(AP)—A radio message from Barre, Vermont, picked up at 2 a. m. today by Lieutenant G. Donald Mervise of this town, operating amateur station 1-FL, said that there were reports of heavy loss of life from the flood in Montpelier, but that they had not yet been confirmed. The brief message said nothing of loss of life in Barre and gave no further details.

The bade farewell to Paris when they boarded the boat train for Cherbourg where they will sail on the steamship Aquitania to New York.

From the hundreds of French and Americans who cheered them as they left, came the cry, "adieu, adieu."

The flyers' compartment was filled with flowers, Ruth's eyes were misty as she cried first, "goodbye," and then "au revoir."

V. M. I. BEATS N. C. ELEVEN

Lexington, Va., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Virginia Military Institute defeated a fighting Tar Heel eleven from North Carolina today by recovering a blocked punt behind the goal line in the first period and holding the margin. The final score was 7 to 0.

North Carolina fought desperately to even the score for three quarters and outplayed the Cadets in every department of the game, lacking only the final punch when within a few yards of the goal. Ward several times ripped off long runs to place the Carolina eleven in scoring position only to see the threat ended with futile passes or the loss of the ball on downs.

V. M. I.'s stubborn defense near the goal line and ability to keep up passes accounted in large measure for the victory. Pass after pass thrown by Ward in the final quarter were knocked down by Cadet backs and one intercepted by Harner, who replaced Nabors, gave the Cadets an opportunity to score. Harner's replacement from the 30-yard line, however, was wide.

The cadets started the game with a rush, working the ball down the field from the opening whistle only to lose it on down on the two yard line. Ward's punt was blocked by O'Berry and Rugh fell on it behind the goal posts. Harner was then sent in for V. M. I. and kicked goal from placement.

Dundee And Manager Arrested

Los Angeles, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Joe Dundee, welterweight boxing champion, and his manager, Max Wexman, today were at liberty on \$1,000 bond each, following their arrest on charges growing out of the financial collapse of the Dundee-Ace Hudkins title fight here Thursday night.

After an unheralded departure from Los Angeles the boxer and his manager were taken by police from an eastbound train last night at Pasadena, on charges of false advertising, based on Dundee's failure to appear in the ring against Hudkins.

The bond was declared "no contest" when the champion minus his official \$60,000 guarantee, refused to enter the ring. Dundee and Wexman were released when they posted bonds of \$1,000 each.

Dick Donald, promoter, also named in a warrant charging false advertising, promised to surrender to the police today.

The State Athletic Commission has dumped the entire fistie tangle into the lap of Seth W. P. Strelinger, the local member. The other two commission members departed, leaving the case and the 18,000 ticketholders still demanding the \$72,000 they paid.

GOV. SMITH TO
COL. ROOSEVELT

In his reply to Col. Roosevelt Gov. Smith hammers home certain points, both as to the facts and the law, on which Col. Roosevelt has been sadly muddled. The Governor of the State has no power to investigate the affairs of counties except where charges of neglect of duty against county officers are presented to him. In Montgomery County it was not a milk scandal that was investigated but charges of larceny in the distribution of funds paid as indemnities to owners of slaughtered tubercular cattle. In Montgomery County, on charges, three officials were investigated, and again in Saratoga County, on charges, three county officers were investigated. In Albany County, on the other hand, no charges against any official; a complaint was made, was referred by Gov. Smith to the local District Attorney and action was taken.

If Col. Roosevelt will look into the law and the facts in each case it may help to cure him of some measure of ignorance if not the habit of reckless misrepresentation.—N. Y. World.

PAYING OIL STRUCK
IN MOSELLE REGION

Mets, Lorraine (AP)—Oil in apparently paying quantities has been struck in the Moselle Department, rich in deposits of coal, salt and various minerals. Borings have been made so far over an area of five square miles near Landroff, Datschville at the southern edge of the Lorraine coal field. They give indications of a wide and deep layer of petroleum which it is proposed to exploit industrially at once.

JOY RIDE PROVIDES

WORK FOR FACE FIXERS

Paris (AP)—Peacetime joy-riding is furnishing almost as many patients for surgical face fixers as the World War did, according to doctors at the Val-de-Grace Hospital, who are trying to make motor-scarless.

A constant stream of automobile accidents victims with shattered or disfigured faces is attended by Dr. Morriston and his assistants, expert face surgeons, who after the war thought there would be little further need for their talents. In many cases problems presented by motor accidents are more complicated than war wounds, but experience resulting from the tremendous increase in crashes during the past few years has made it possible to fix nearly any kind of marred face.

AIRPLANES MAY SCATTER

HYDE PARK SPOONERS

London (AP)—Hyde Park in ten years or so may become an aerodrome, says Viscount Castlerosse in the "Sunday Express."

"We may be driven to it," says the viscount, pointing to the fact that other cities, Berlin in particular, which is within a few minutes of the city's center, have better air conveniences than London. Tempelhof, Berlin's aerodrome, was originally intended as the Kaiser's great parade ground and is ten minutes from Unter den Linden, while Croyden, London's air port, is 20 miles out.

"Hyde Park as an aerodrome would make the park much more interesting," he contends, "and prove a pleasant variant to the affectionate couples who apparently so constantly offend the policemen, but would particularly add to the popularity of London, especially the tourist traffic."

The air port of Paris too is but an hour or so by fast automobile from the hotel district.

TROOPS MUTINY

Shanghai, China, Nov. 5 (AP)—A strong body of Nationalist troops was today reported to have mutinied at Tanchow, 80 miles north of here. The loyal Nationalists were said to have the situation well in hand.

Rev. E. L. Ballard Honored in Tenn.

Knoxville, Tenn., Oct. 31.—Rev. E. L. Ballard, formerly pastor of the Free Will Baptist church of Greenville, and now pastor of East Nashville, Tenn., was today selected as first vice-president of The Advance Guard, an organization of several thousand young people having members in all the southern states. Headquarters of the organization is to be moved from Knoxville to Nashville soon, and Mr. Ballard will have general direction of the extension department, and will also be an associate editor of the monthly organ of the society. The organization is a semi-religious movement growing out of the Dixie Club movement started several years ago by Mrs. Katherine A. Grimes, the southern writer and lecturer. The Advance Guard is for young people who have a sense of definite religious, educational, or social service, and has as its head Charles R. Anderson, a young newspaper correspondent of Knoxville.

BRITISH FIRE DAMAGES ARE \$60,000,000 A YEAR

London, (INS)—Damage by fire in Britain amounts approximately to \$60,000,000 every year, according to the President of the Insurance Institute.

Five percent and marine premiums of twenty-five leading insurance companies during the past year were amounted to \$5,000,000,000, according to the Institute.

Aggregate net profit for the past five years amounted to only 4.2 percent, revealing that the insurance business in Britain is conducted on the narrowest of margins.

COLD COAL TRIKE AIDS OKLAHOMA OIL

Tulsa, Okla., Nov. 4.—(INS)—The strike in the coalfields of Colorado has opened a new outlet for Oklahoma petroleum products. Smelter mills and other industrial plants at Pueblo and other adjacent places are substituting fuel oil for coal, according to officials of oil companies in Oklahoma.

A natural gas pipeline is being constructed from the Panhandle to Colorado, but it will be late in 1922 before this project is completed.

It is indicated the Colorado committee, including the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, about which much of the strike centers, may continue to consume a great deal of petroleum from Oklahoma, and in the event a favorable settlement cannot be reached, may turn exclusively to it.

ON OUTSKIRTS OF LONDON

The building of a new town, to be known as "St. Heller's" at a cost of \$5,000,000, on the outskirts of London, will be started in the New Year.

Fifty thousand new houses are wanted for Londoners, and this scheme, for which the London County Council are responsible, will provide 9,000 houses with accommodations for about 50,000 people.

The new town will cover 845 acres and will include parks and open spaces, shopping centers, and twelve schools.

The London County Council has 200,000 persons desirous of obtaining homes on its lists.

tales. A message from Newport, Vermont, at 3:25 a. m., told of the drowning of two men and the probable drowning of two others.

The Newport message signed by "Savage, Telegrapher," was as follows:

"After 40 hours continuous rain Newport is isolated from the rest of the State. Telephone and telegraph connections are at a standstill. Bridges, roads and railroads in this vicinity in all directions washed out.

"Two men whose names have not been learned while taking milk to Newport from North Troy were drowned. They were crossing a bridge when it gave way, washing them into the river. Two children also were on the wagon at the time they were saved after clinging to bushes for three hours.

"Cecil Bailey and Charles Lester started for Coventry last night in a small car. Nothing has been heard from either them or the car and it is believed they perished in the swollen water which is six feet over the main highway on the road to Coventry."

Burlington, Vermont, Nov. 5.—

(AP)—Efforts to employ an airplane here this morning to reach Barre and Montpelier where many persons were reported to have perished in the flood proved fruitless.

The only plane available in this section being in Milton, which was completely shut off from the outside world. Highways as well as railroads and wire service to this town were completely crippled.

Colonel H. Nelson Jackson, and J. Holmes Jackson, brothers of Lieut. Gov. S. Holmister Jackson worked frantically to get further news from Barre, where the lieutenant governor was reported to have lost his life in the flood but without result.

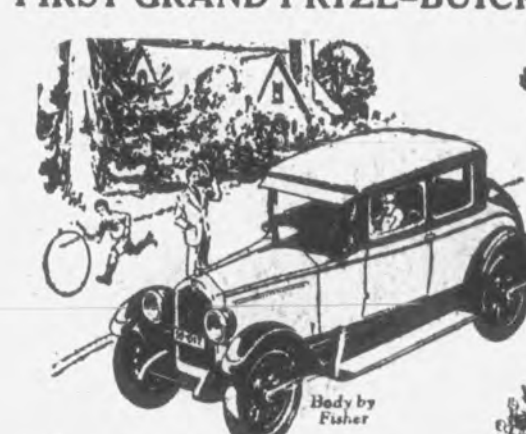

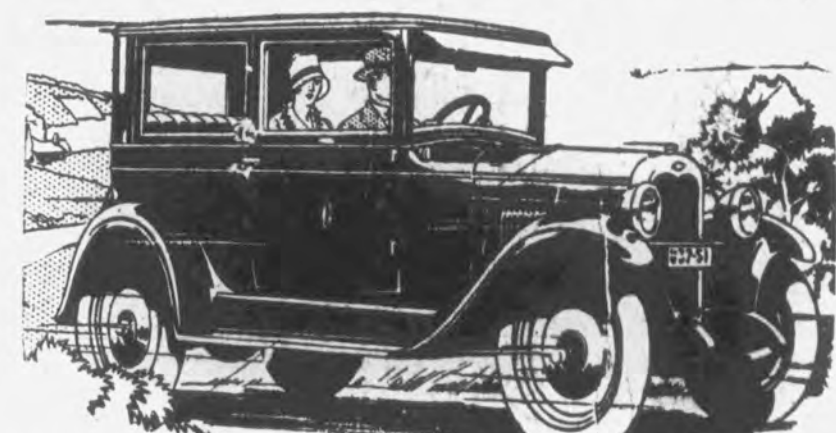
