SHELDON CLARK ARRESTED FOLLOWING HIS REFUSAL TO TESTIFY IN OIL CASE

Wealthy Chicago Sportsman and Oil Man Held in Connection With Fall-Sinclair Issue.

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Sheldon Clark, wealthy Chicago oil man and sportsman, was placed under technical arrest today after his refusal to testify in the grand jury investigation of the Fall-Sinclair jury surveillance scandal.

Clark was taken directly from the grand jury to the office of United States commissioner Turnage where a complaint, similar to the one previously lodged against Harry P. Sinclair and another of his confidential agents, Henry Mason Day, was made by Neil Burkshaw, assistant district attorney in charge of the inquiry.

Clark, who is vice president and general manager of the Sinclair refining company, was released on \$25,000 bond the same as that required of Day. His hearing will await the action of the grand jury which is expected to conclude its investigation next week.

Clark was charged specifically with a violation of the criminal code against efforts to influence the verdict of a jury. He demanded an immediate hearing, to which Burkshaw objected.

Like Day, Clark declined to answer questions before the grand jury on the advice of counsel. Specifically the grand jurors inquired whether he made contact between the Burns detectives, trailing the oil jurors and Sinclair.

Clark was first called in the investigation yesterday but declined to testify then on the ground of a fear of self-incrimination and was recalled today so that a record might be had of the proceedings for any further use which the government might be able to make of it.

Clark was here during a part of the time before the mistrial was ordered in the Sinclair-Fall case and is accused of having received reports from the Burns operatives. When the trial was abruptly halted he returned to Chicago.

For several days his departure government agents kept close watch upon his quarters at the Willard Hotel and also upon his mail box there. In disclosing this, district attorney Gordon said surveillance was relaxed for an hour or so and the mail in Clark's box was called for during that time.

Bad Check Law Constitutional In N. Carolina

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Supreme court declared the 1927 bad check law to be constitutional in the outstanding opinion of the latest batch of decisions to cross the court's desk.

The law makes it a misdemeanor to give a check on a bank when not sufficient funds are on deposit to pay the check.

Justice Adams, writing, says bills of exchange represent so much money. Chief Justice Stacy, concurring, compares the bad check practice as the same as passing counterfeit coin. Justice Connor, concurring, says the legislature had authority to pass the act. Justice Broaden, dissenting, says one over-drawing to the extent of five cents on a \$1,000 check is a candidate for the chain gang under the act. Justice Clark, also dissenting, says the constitution declares "there shall be no imprisonment for debt in this state except in case of fraud."

Justice Clarkson, in a Forsyth county "Blind Tiger" case says the state prohibition law is a "blessing to the human family."

Millicent Rogers Reported Sick

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Today's New York American said that Millicent Rogers Ramos had been stricken ill on the hotel suite of her father, Colonel Henry H. Rogers on the eve of her honeymoon trip to Buenos Aires.

Although a house watchman stood guard over the entrance to the Rogers' suite, the American says it was learned that she was under a physician's care. Reports were that she had suffered a nervous breakdown.

Mr. and Mrs. Ramos were married Monday in the parish house of the Roman Catholic Church of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary at Southampton, Long Island.

THWART PLOT OF PRISONERS

Plan of Long Termers to Shoot Way to Freedom in New York Nipped in Bud.

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The plot of a group of long term prisoners, members of the Richard Riese Whittemore gang of jewel thieves to shoot their way to freedom has been thwarted by officials of Dann-mora State prison, at Clinton, officials said here today.

Authorities asserted the scheme was halted through a tip from a prisoner, later reported stabbed by Leon Kraemer, supposed head of the group planning the prison-break and who is serving a forty-year sentence. Kraemer was a pal of Whittemore, who was executed Feb. 2, 1926, in Baltimore for murder.

Six pistols, two hundred rounds of ammunition, six bottles of liquor and several road maps of the Adirondack region in which the prison is situated, have been discovered in the receiving room of the prison. Extra guards have been stationed at the prison and numerous transfers of prisoners have been effected.

ASKS AID FOR SUFFERERS IN FLOOD SECTION

Governor Weeks, of Vermont, Tells President Situation Today is Critical.

Boston, Nov. 10.—(AP)—President Coolidge, and the Red Cross today had before them an urgent appeal on behalf of flood-stricken Vermont from John E. Weeks, Governor of the State.

Plainly impressed by the magnitude of the catastrophe which overwhelmed many parts of his commonwealth, the Governor declared the situation was so critical that immediate aid was absolutely imperative.

Cold weather which seems to have set in in earnest gave added force to his appeal, as relief workers struggled over snow covered roads to bring food and medicine to the isolated communities of the far north.

Contributions will be received by the Red Cross or by the Governor by whom they will be turned over to the organization which, in cooperation with the army and local town and city governments, has undertaken the chief work of relief.

From Washington came word that the national treasury of the society had appropriated \$75,000 to be used in Vermont and that voluntary contributions of another \$27,000 had been received.

The money will go to meet immediate needs including rebuilding and repairing of homes, furnishing of houses, rendering of medical aid and rehabilitation of small businesses where the livelihood of individuals was involved. Farms as well as village homes will be assisted.

Estimates of actual loss to the flood swept area, including parts of New Hampshire, western Massachusetts and Connecticut as well as Vermont, are still necessarily so vague as to be worthless but that it will reach far into the millions is generally conceded.

Farmers of Vermont were described by Thomas Bradley, director of the extension bureau of the Vermont Agricultural College, as "too crushed to carry on." He estimated 150,000 cows alone had been lost besides great quantities of other stock and in some cases every building on the farm.

Governor Spaulding of New Hampshire put the damage to state highways and bridges at \$2,700,000 with no attempt to estimate the loss to railroads and private property owners.

The situation in Connecticut was clearing although the main highway from Middletown to Hartford was still impassable. The river has receded half a dozen feet and is still going down.

Loses Limbs Still Happy

Durham, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Sammy Dority, eight-year-old son of a Hillsboro mill employee, today appeared as happy as a body could be with an arm and a leg cut off as a result of being run over by a train two weeks ago.

"I'm going to save all my money and buy a rolling chair," he said as he shook a savings bank holding \$16. He had not been told that a gift of a local Bible class was to be presented to him.

NOBEL PRIZE GOES TO ITALIAN WOMAN

Stockholm, Sweden, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Swedish Academy today awarded the 1926 Nobel prize for literature to the Italian author, Signora Grazia Deledda, the second woman to win this prize.

The 1927 award was postponed until next year.

MARTIAL LAW IN BUCHAREST

Soldiers Protect Court House as Carol Sympathizer Goes on Trial For Conspiracy

Bucharest, Nov. 10.—(AP)—With the courthouse and the streets for blocks around under complete martial law and with armed sentries challenging all seeking admission, M. Manolescu, former under secretary of finance went on trial today for his part in the alleged conspiracy to restore Prince Carol to the Rumanian throne.

In a small whitewashed room, no larger than an American schoolroom, 110 of Rumania's most brilliant lawyers and jurists opened their defense of the former official who is specifically charged with endangering the security of the State by attempting to place Carol upon the throne now occupied by his six-year-old son, King Michael.

The court martial which is trying Manolescu, was composed of one colonel as president, two majors and two captains as co-judges, while the public prosecutor was Colonel Garapanca, long practiced in Communist military trials, whose stenographer voice showed that he was accustomed to giving commands but whose nervous, almost deferential attitude, betrayed his consciousness of the strength of the formidable array of legal luminaries opposing him.

The only decorations of the glaring white walls of the courtroom were faded lithographs of little King Michael, Queen Marie and the late King Ferdinand. On a table in front of the president was a wooden cross and a silver ikon for the administration of oaths.

"No such settlement has been made," said Irving L. Ernst, Miss Hempel's lawyer. "None could have been made without my knowledge. Negotiations have been made for a settlement, but they have not been completed."

Miss Hempel is now in Europe.

LOCAL MARKET WILL OBSERVE ARMISTICE DAY

Tobacco Sales to be Suspended Until Monday Following Clearing of Floors Today.

Greenville tobacco market yesterday sold 489,792 pounds of tobacco for \$136,812.83 at an average of \$27.93, according to official figures made public this morning by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade.

There was about a million pounds of leaf on the market this morning, bringing total sales for the season to about 47,000,000 pounds.

Following completion of sales today activities on the local market will be suspended for observance of Armistice Day tomorrow. The market will resume sales Monday morning.

OTHER CASES HEARD HERE

Number of Road Sentences Dealed Out in Second Days' Session County Court.

W. S. FOUR DIAMOND SMUGGLERS IN TOILS OF LAW

Band of International Smugglers Arrested By Federal Officers In New York.

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A pair of big shoes on a little man laid down the trail which federal investigators today said led to the discovery of a band of international diamond smugglers, whose operations were estimated to run to millions of dollars.

Four alleged members of the band were held in total bail of \$210,000 and a man and a woman were released in custody of a customs agent after Florent Lamor, of Antwerp, Belgium, slightly built second electrician on the Red Star liner Lapland, aroused the suspicion of authorities as he came lurching down the gangplank of the vessel when it docked here yesterday, in a pair of oversized shoes encasing small feet and authorities say \$100,000 in diamonds.

Concealed in the heels and toes of the shoes, federal officers reported they found the gems. Lamor was arrested and questioned and four men and a woman were taken into custody. They were described as Abraham Frank, New York, New York diamond merchant, held in \$25,000 bail; Charles Goldberg, whose bail was set at \$25,000; Louis Scholz and Mrs. Rieka Lammell, who were released in custody of a customs agent. Lamor was held in bond of \$100,000.

At the arraignment, assistant United States attorney John M. Blake mentioned \$1,000,000 as the figure involved in the conspiracy, but he added that before the case was closed he believed the amount would be increased several fold.

The recent political upheaval in Indianapolis: "The laxity and fraud" with reference to the enforcement of the prohibition law "where the Volstead act as regarded as an alien imposition," and the New York city milk scandals all were mentioned by the speaker.

"The oil leases have at last been shown in their true colors," he declared, adding that "some portraits which have been done in oil by the United States courts will long hang in the hall of shame."

Sermons on Trial Today at Bayboro

Bayboro, N. C., Nov. 10.—(AP)—State's witnesses today testified in Pamlico County Superior Court that Luther and Lee Semons, aided and abetted by Virgil Semons, fired shots that resulted in the death of W. T. Lewis, Federal Prohibition officer.

Lewis and other officers, posing as rum runners, negotiated with the defendants, it was alleged for liquor near here last summer. When Lewis made known his identity he was shot down. Virgil Semons was wounded in the gun play that followed.

Lewis formerly of Moore county died later in a Kinston hospital. Ed Luther and Lee Semons were charged with first degree murder, and Virgil Semons with second degree murder.

Big Whiskey Haul At Hendersonville

Hendersonville, N. C., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Thanksgiving day will be a dry one for some one who had been counting on a supply of liquors such as has seldom been seen in this section since the day the Volstead Act became effective, as a result of a capture made last night by Henderson County officers headed by Sheriff J. C. Hill.

A man who refused to give his name, sixty-seven gallons of the finest grades of liquor and a brand new automobile bearing a Georgia license were captured. Papers found on the man when searched indicated that his name was Samuel S. Fen of 168 Federal Street, Pittsburgh, Pa., and Miami, Fla. The car were found because plates from South Carolina, Indiana, Florida and Pennsylvania. The man is held without bond.

Sheriff Hill said today that he believed the liquor conservatively valued at \$2,500, had come from a rum ship off the Florida coast and was intended for Northern consumption. He expressed the belief that the man was one of a big rum running outfit.

LINDBERGH CALLED INTO ARMY SERVICE

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—An Army order calling Col. Charles A. Lindbergh to active duty at Selfridge Field, Mich., was published today by the War Department and shows that he is to remain on active service with the first pursuit group until December 31, when he goes back to his inactive reserve status.

The order was effective Wednesday.

SAYS CRIME STILL HOLDS SWAY IN U. S.

Dr. Gulick Tells Governmental Research Bureau of Prevailing Crime Wave.

GREENVILLE TO FULLY OBSERVE ARMISTICE DAY

Schools, Tobacco Market and Stores to Close All Day in City Tomorrow.

Armistice Day will be completely observed in Greenville tomorrow. The observance will be marked by the closing of public schools, the tobacco market and business houses, and the road and din of industry will be hushed as men and women pay tribute to those who gave their lives in behalf of civilization.

The program for the occasion was completed by members of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion yesterday. It provides for a mammoth parade shortly after ten o'clock in which Legionnaires, veterans of the Spanish American and Civil wars, boy scouts, local police department, and members of Battery E, 113 Field Artillery will take part.

The principal address will be delivered by Congressman A. L. Bulwinkle of Gastonia. This will take place in the new auditorium at the Teachers College, preceded by a splendid program. The speaker will be introduced by Mayor J. O. Lanier.

Legionnaires and those taking part in the parade will be served dinner at the college immediately following the exercises at the auditorium. The crowning feature of the day will be the showing of "Resurrection" at White's Theatre during the afternoon and evening. The picture will run continuously, and everybody will be given an opportunity of seeing what is generally conceded to be one of the best motion pictures of the day. It will be shown under the auspices of the American Legion and proceeds will go to disabled veterans.

Of the attempt will be the football game at the fair grounds between members of the local military unit and State College Reserve. These are two of the staunchest teams in this part of the state, and the contest is looked forward to with more than usual interest by sports lovers here and elsewhere.

Directors of the Merchants' association in regular session night before last, recommended that its members observe full closing hours Armistice Day, and also called on other business houses of the city to do likewise.

Members of the American Legion today expressed themselves as being more than satisfied at the new organizations of the city had cooperated with them in the observance of Armistice Day. It is the first time since the ending of the war that the occasion has been so completely observed. It was stated, and it is hoped everybody in Greenville and Pitt county will be able to take part in the exercises.

J. B. Kittrell, commander of the Pitt county post of the American Legion, said today that he had received a message from Congressman Bulwinkle, stating that he would be in Greenville tomorrow morning in ample time to fill the program at the college. He failed, however, to mention what subject he would speak upon, but it is generally believed he will deal exclusively with the splendid record of achievements of American armies in Europe and the part which they have played in rehabilitation since the ending of the war.

"These Legionnaires," Mr. Kittrell stated, "are doing a wonderful work today, providing for those who returned home sick and broken from the mighty conflict across the ocean. They are 'buddies' today as they were in the trenches, and members of the Legion feel it their duty to help them in every way possible."

W. T. Lipscomb, Sr., Buried Yesterday

A large crowd of sorrowing friends attended the last sad rites over the body of the pioneer tobaccoist, and a great floral tribute expressed in mute way the high esteem in which he was held.

Members of the Tobacco Board of Trade and others who had been associated with him, during his 33 years of activity on the local tobacco market, acted as honorary pallbearers.

Mr. Lipscomb was a native of Halifax County, Virginia. He came to Greenville over 33 years ago, and since that time had been connected with the tobacco market.

GENE TUNNEY IS PEEVED AT TEX RICKARD

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Gene Tunney is "mightily peeved" at Tex Rickard and is certain to establish a rumpus when he gets back to town.

That and no more would Billy Gibson, manager of the heavy-weight champion, say today in the absence of his warrior, now spending a few days roughing it at Racquette Lake, Old Forge, N. Y.

The aroused mental state of the champion has been caused, Gibson explained, by tales reaching Tunney's ears that Rickard is the "under cover" manager of Jack Dempsey, whom Tunney whipped for the title at Philadelphia last year, and trounced again in defending the crown in Chicago this fall.

Jack Kearns, in his suit for \$333,333.33 against the former champion will allege that the promoter of the last two title battles has handled Dempsey's affairs for almost two years, he has announced. Other sources maintain that Leo P. Flynn who managed Dempsey during the latter's comeback attempt did so under the direction of Rickard.

"Gene will fight at least twice in 1928," Gibson said, "but not necessarily for Rickard both times. There has been no break between Tunney and the promoter. But I do know that the champion is mightily peeved at the stories going around concerning Rickard's connection with Dempsey. Jack's order for stock in Madison Square Garden hasn't helped matters any either."

Chicago, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Promoter James C. Mullin is planning to confer with Gene Tunney, heavy-weight champion, regarding Tunney's possible appearance in Chicago in defense of his title next summer. He will leave for the eastern metropolis tomorrow.

The Chicago promoter said Tunney was not under contract to Tex Rickard and that he was a free agent, following a long distance telephone conversation with Billy Gibson, Tunney's manager. He obtained the champion's promise to fight here during a conference after the Tunney-Dempsey fight last fall, he said.

Rickard in New York has denied reports of a break between Tunney and himself, declaring he holds a contract giving him an option on the champion's services as heavy-weight champion until October 1, 1928.

Suspend Champion And His Manager

New York — (AP)—Looking every inch a fighter and ready to tackle "any and everyone" to prove his worth to title consideration, Tony Ascencio, featherweight titleholder of France, is seeking world champions to conquer.

The 24-year-old youth, of French and Spanish parentage, arrived in New York from Paris boasting a proud record of triumph in Europe and South America and the reputation of being the greatest featherweight in the world.

Ascencio knocked out Rene Potier in five rounds to win the championship of France. He claims the European title through victory over Runtz, the Spaniard, who defeated Andre Routis and Edouard Mascart, before tackling Ascencio in his home town of Madrid.

Despite his youth, Ascencio has battled in all the fight centers of Europe and boasts a record of never having been knocked off his feet.

Critics who have seen Ascencio in action declare him a rugged "punching fool," fairly clever, and possessed of a powerful right hand.

Princeton Urges That Caldwell be Allowed to Play

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Princeton's request that Bruce Caldwell, ineligible Yale football star, be permitted to play against Princeton Saturday, was granted at Yale today but indications were that the ban would stand.

The passing, kicking, running, line bucking defensive ace of the Eli forces was declared ineligible Wednesday because he had played in two football games as a freshman at Brown before transferring to New Haven. Under rules laid down when Harvard was a member of the "Big Three" those two contests automatically barred him from varsity football at Yale.

John Grier Hibben, president of Princeton, wired James R. Angell, Yale president, urging that Caldwell be permitted to play. The Princeton Athletic committee wired the Yale committee to the same effect. "Princeton's action is very courteous, very gracious," John M. Catell, director of athletics, said in announcing that Yale's athletic heads would meet today to consider the suggestion.

"It's a nice question to decide," he observed. "It's a case in which the spirit of the rule has not been violated either by Caldwell or Yale. There will be differences of opinion on what course to take."

After being ruled ineligible Caldwell went home to Ashton, R. I. Coach Tad Jones of Yale, said he had telephoned Caldwell to return and carry on with his studies regardless of athletic matters. Caldwell understood he had been ordered back to the football squad.

There were some suggestions that such an order might be a protective measure in case the unexpected happened and Caldwell should be permitted to play.

OUT of KEELER'S GOLF BAG!

Spinning The Loop With Bob and Jock



By O. B. KEELER

Since Bobby Jones won the British open golf championship at St. Andrews with a score of 285— which, incidentally, is the lowest score ever recorded in a national open championship in Great Britain or in the United States—there has been a deal written about his final spin around the famous Loop on the classic old course. There was that sudden burst of golf in the last round, when he got the old Loop by the tail and twisted it, when he fired four 3's in a row against the ultimate scoreboard and cinched the championship he wished above all things to gain, on that particular course.

Bobby went around the loop in that round in 16 strokes for the five holes. He did the same in his first round, with the five holes in 2-3-3-4. But he did not quite go it in even 3's.

And look what Jock Hutchison did, back in 1921—playing with Bobby as his partner, by the way— in the British open of that year. The Loop at St. Andrews includes five holes from No. 8 through to No. 12. No. 8 and No. 11 are the only par 3 holes on the entire course, and since the other three holes are from 303 to 318 yards in length, the Loop offers the only



really feasible opportunity of picking up strokes. The stretch on the other side is severe in the extreme. I regard the last six holes as the toughest finishing six I have seen.

The yardage and par of the Loop holes are: No. 8, 142, 3; No. 9, 303, 4; No. 10, 312, 4; No. 11, 148, 3; No. 12, 318, 4.

Par thus is 3-4-4-3-4-18. The inspired Hutch, very hot that morning peeled off the following score: 1-2-3-3-4-13. Five below par for the Loop. Eventually, that burst won him the championship.

After his ace on No. 8, his shot at No. 9 rolled over the edge of the cup, almost dropping for another ace, and dead for a 2. The Hutch had some trouble in the second and third rounds, and had to shoot a magnificent 70, three below par, in the last round to tie with Roger Wethered, the tall amateur, whom he defeated in the subsequent play-off for the title.

It was most fitting that Hutchison should win a major championship—his only one, to date—on the St. Andrews course, since it was there he was brought up and learned his game.

SPORTS SLANTS

By ALAN J. GOULD

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The quiet and sensational removal of Bruce Caldwell, Yale's flashy halfback, from the gridiron picture today is a revision of all-American football prospects for 1927.

Until ineligibility put the Eli star out of the running, he seemed almost a certainty for any all-American quartet of ballcarriers selected. The fact has already put forward a number of candidates but Caldwell, on his all-around performance, seemed to most experts to lead the list and merit the distinction of a place in the mythical dollar cast.

It had seemed to some critics that an entirely capable and representative all-American backfield, headed by Caldwell, might also include North Drury of Southern California, Bill Spears of Vanderbilt, and Herb Josting of Minnesota, based on what has taken place in the game.

But it would be difficult to picture such other aces as Gilman of Michigan, Flanagan of Notre Dame, or Pittsburgh, Witter of Princeton, McGarry of Cornell, or Masters of Dartmouth.

There could be no difficulty of filling Caldwell's post from this array.

McGarry and Witter may be overlooked by the experts because they are only sophomores and therefore considered not quite ripe for that would be about the only ground on which they could be left out of consideration. Both have starred consistently in all their big games so far.

The case of Caldwell recalls the equally tragic episode of Jim Thorpe, the great Carlisle Indian athlete, who was stripped of his Olympic honors and medals in 1912 after discovery that he played a few seasons of semi-pro baseball for an insignificant money return. Not that there has been any suggestion of pro connection by Caldwell but that the downfall of both same from seemingly trivial causes.

The transfer rule of Yale, Harvard and Princeton which bars an athlete from any sport at these colleges if he has played so much as three games in that sport for any other college is one of the major obstacles in the amateur code. The chief aim is to prevent the possibility of one bidding for the services of an athletic star in another college and to provide an inducement for him to transfer from a small to a larger field of athletic endeavor.

Among outstanding college elevens, neither beaten nor tied, only one, the University of Georgia, is anything like a favorite to keep its state crown this Saturday. The Georgia Bulldogs should have little trouble in going on winning stride. Duke, North Carolina College, but for Princeton and Tennessee there is the toughest proposition of the year.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT WOMAN'S CLUB

The aim of this department of the Woman's Club is to aid in every way possible in the physical welfare, particularly among the children in Greenville and Pitt county and to teach and preach sanitation especially in the rural homes. As an evidence of the carrying forward of this aim a tubercular clinic is now being held in the city schools which is free to all, although not compulsory. The object of this clinic is to determine what percentage of school children are sound and well and free from all tendencies toward tuberculosis. It has been found that if a child is underweight it is wise to take steps at once to build up its physical condition. The correct weight as regards height and age can be found in any good health book studied by the child in school. When a child is 20 per cent underweight it is almost invariably an indication that tuberculosis in some form is gaining headway in that child's system. This disease is more often found in children in covering the bones or joints rather than in the lungs. If discovered in its initial stage, it can be cured, but if allowed to run its course the only help to be attained in the last stages is alleviation of suffering. Special emphasis should be placed on health examination for the following reasons:

1st. Because, though not sick, you may not be enjoying that fullness of health and vigor of which you are capable.

2nd. Because some diseases in their early stages give you no warning of their existence.

3rd. Because a disease discovered early is more likely to be cured quickly.

4th. Because it has been found that health examinations taken regularly will help you to live longer and better.

The annual Christmas sale of tuberculosis seeds will begin immediately after Thanksgiving and it is urged that every person in Pitt county feel a personal responsibility in regard to the success of the drive.

Last year about three hundred dollars was cleared and used in this county wherever it was needed. This year the needs are so many that the aim has been raised to five hundred dollars, in order that greater aid may be given to the needy cases. One use for this money is financing the clinic now in progress.

When you as an individual, are asked to sell as well as buy seeds, if your time is already taken, spare a few minutes each day for this purpose and you will be amazed at the sum you will have to turn over to the treasurer of the campaign at the end of the drive.

"Resurrection" Not A Bible Story

Widely read as Leo Tolstoy's classic novel, "Resurrection," has been in the past thirty years, Edwin Carewe, director and co-producer with Inspiration Pictures of the picture which will be seen at White's Theatre tomorrow, discovered innumerable film fans in rural districts and even in bigger cities of America who believed any film or novel entitled "Resurrection" must be a tale of the Christ. Carewe wrote more than three thousand letters in reply to filmgoers who queried him while he was directing Rod La Roque and Dolores del Rio in the film, made in California. To each he explained that the picture is not a religious story, not a biblical tale—and that Leo Tolstoy's flesh-and-blood drama makes splendid reading in any language.

He told his unlighted correspondents that the title "Resurrection" referred to the spiritual and moral rebirth of the souls of Prince Dmitri and Katusha Maslova, deadened in sin. The American director declared that he had faithfully preserved the spirit and letter of Tolstoy's great novel and that the ending of the picture is the logical ending of the novel, with the moral to be found in the story itself.

Denies Charges About Printing In This State

Asheville, N. C., Nov. 10.—Charging the newspapers of the State with hiding, either deliberately or innocently, the fact about the North Carolina State printing controversy, Governor McLean last night emphatically denied that State officials wished to award the printing contracts to foreign firms.

"That's just what we don't want to do," the Governor declared in an interview with the Asheville Citizen. "It's the State's business and we consider that the printers of the State are entitled to compete for the work. But the State cannot afford to let the old contract stand and cause the State to lose, as it has been losing for years, thousands of dollars annually."

The people of the State are not aware of all the facts in the case, the Governor said, because some of the papers have not wanted the truth to be known. Other papers have "gone to sleep at the switch," the Governor charged because their editors did not consider the controversy worthy of full explanation.

Competitive bids on the State's printing will be advertised for again just as soon as the Department of Labor and Printing can prepare new specifications, he said.

Meanwhile, Capitol observers were predicting that the controversy would come to a head when the State Printing Commission meets at Raleigh upon the Governor's return. Raleigh publishers are understood to be preparing prices and quotations for the board's information.

Law Shows Teeth At Rutherfordton

Rutherfordton, N. C., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Lawbreakers are feeling the teeth of the law in Rutherfordton Superior Court now in session with Judge Walter Moore of Sylva, presiding.

Herbert Alley of near Cokes, S. C., tried for killing Howard Hamrick last spring near Rutherfordton by running him down with an automobile pleaded guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to from 10 to 15 years in State prison.

Farris Lewis tried for the alleged theft of a milch cow was sentenced to from 2 to 4 years; Herman Coffey charged with a statutory offense was given 3 to 5 years; Morris Duncan and Willie Tessenner charged with stealing an automobile were given five to ten years and Fred Mask charged with forgery was given 3 to 5 years.

RAISE WEDDING AGE ASK BRITISH WOMEN

London.—(AP)—British women's organizations are conducting a vigorous campaign to get the marriage ages of English increased.

It is now legal for weddings between girls 12 years old and boys 14 years old to be solemnized. The women's organizations want these ages raised to 16 years for both sexes.

There has been an increase in marriages of girls only 15 years old. At this age there were 19 marriages in 1924, 24 in 1925 and 34 in 1926.

No marriages of girls under 14 years old have taken place in England in the last three years, while there have been only four marriages of girls under 15 years of age.

ANIMALS CAMERA SHY

Asheville, N. C.—Movie cameras have obtained valuable film records of the life of wild deer, elk, buffalo and other animals in Pisgah national forest, but it took them a week to get within "shooting" distance. Blinds and bait finally caused the animals to congregate where the cameraman could film them.

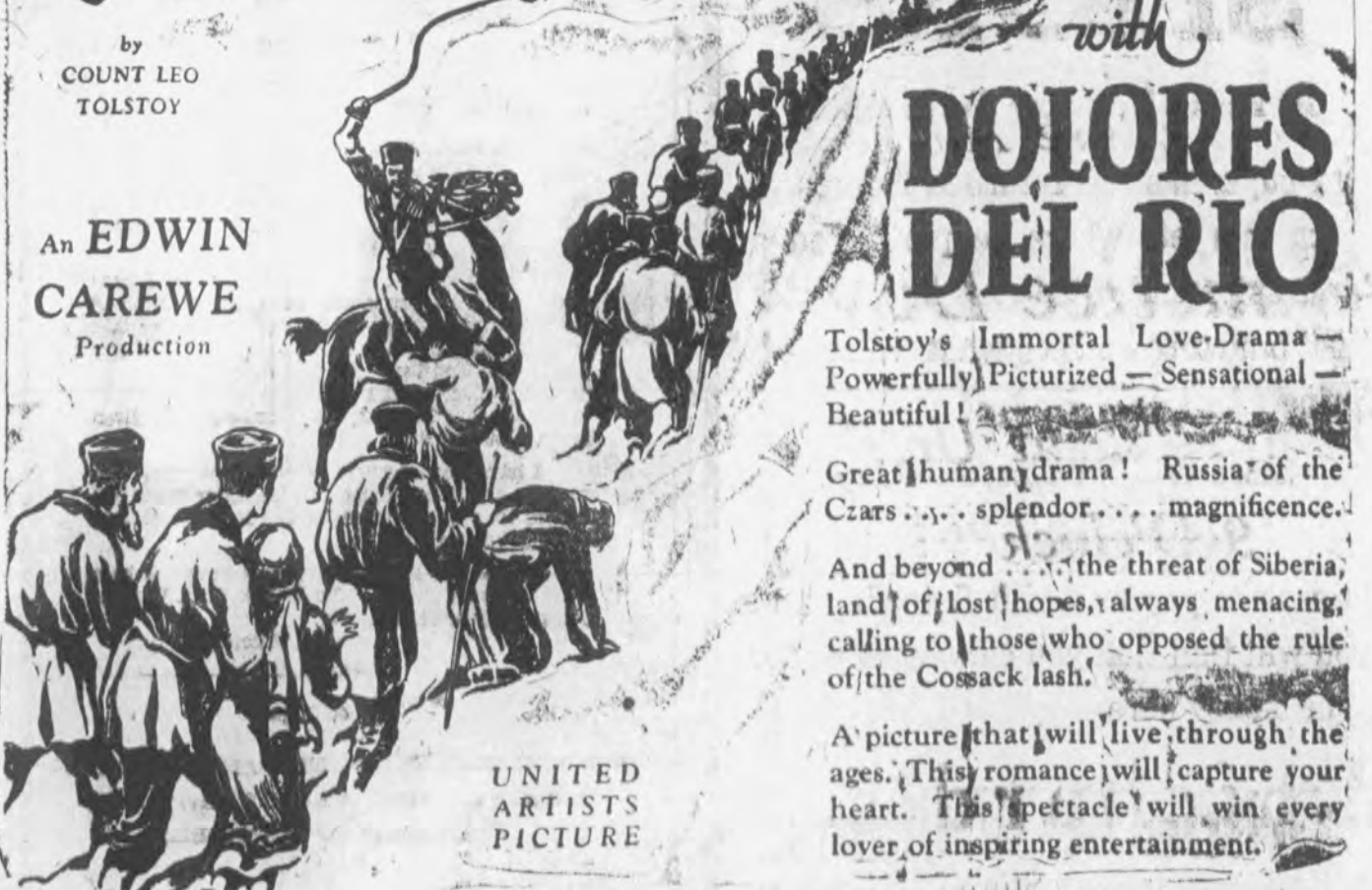

Cotton—Stocks—Grain

COTTON
New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A renewal of selling which developed after publication of yesterday's government crop report was reflected in further declines in the cotton market today.

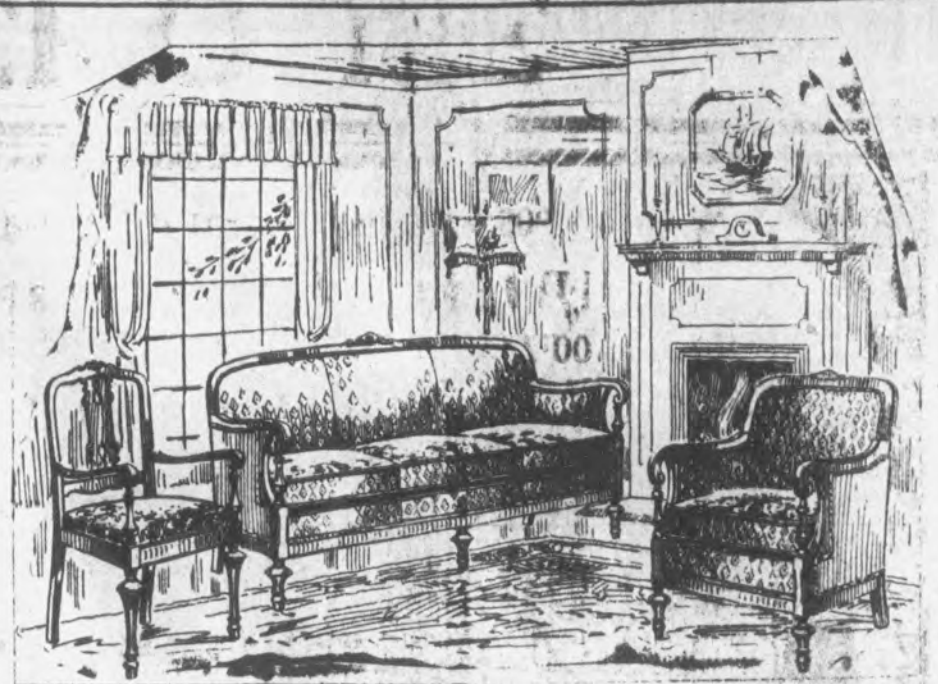
