ALL GREENVILLE TURNS OUT TO PAY GREATEST TRIBUTE TO HEROES OF WORLD WAR

Congressman Bulwinkle Delivered Principal Address of Most Complete Armistice Day Observance Since Ending of War.

A naval building program of sufficient scope to provide ample protection of American life and property was advocated here yesterday by Hon. A. L. Bulwinkle, of Washington, representing the 11th North Carolina district in the United States Congress in delivering the principal address of Armistice Day exercises in this new auditorium of the Eastern Carolina Teachers' College.

"Our navy should be equal, if not superior, to any other navy in the world," he declared. "It is our first line of defense and the most direct way of preserving rights and liberties of the American people. I do not mean for us to take the offensive, but that we adequately protect ourselves to meet demands of the future."

The address was the crowning feature of the greatest Armistice Day celebration ever staged in Greenville. Virtually all forms of industry were silenced throughout the day as men and women paid tribute to those who sacrificed their lives in behalf of a greater civilization.

The day's program consisted of a parade, participated in by city policemen, members of Battery E, 13th field artillery, North Carolina National Guard, Boy Scouts, veterans of three wars, exercises at the college, dinner, the showing of a moving picture at White's Theatre, and 1927 football game at the football field. The local military unit and State College reserves, the visitors winning by the score of 6 to 0.

Forming at the Atlantic Coast Line passenger station, the parade moved down Dickerson Avenue to Five Points and from Five Points up Evans street to the courthouse where hundreds had gathered to hear "taps" sounded and the firing of a 21-gun salute in honor of American dead.

A large gun from the lumbering artillery trucks was wheeled over to the vacant lot in front of the courthouse and its barrel turned skyward. Twenty-one times it belched flames and smoke, each report being accompanied by the explosion of a bomb high up in the heavens. Miniature parachutes with American flags attached unfolded in the explosion of the first three bombs.

From the courthouse the parade moved to the college where an inspirational program was rendered in the new auditorium. The exercises opened with invocation by Rev. R. J. Bamba, pastor of the Eighth Street Church of Christ. This was followed by the song "America" led by the college girls. The "Glorious Hymn" was presented by the physical education department of the college.

Mrs. J. H. Waldrop, known among North Carolina Legionnaires as the "Star Spangled Banner," sang the notes of patriotic air floated through building, the singer was greeted by a deafening din of applause. She responded to the encore by singing "The Long, Long Trail."

Professor H. E. Austin delivered the address of welcome in behalf of the college, and Mayor J. C. Lanier introduced Mr. Bulwinkle. He paid tribute to the splendid record of the Congressman who served as major with American Expeditionary forces in France.

The American Legion quartet, composed of Bill Lee, D. M. Sellers, Ed Williams and Mr. Storey, rendered several selections and were encircled so heartily that J. B. Kittrell, master of ceremonies, had difficulty in reconciling the audience to permit a continuance of the program. The exercises were closed with the singing of "Old North State," and announcements regarding the remaining activities of the day.

Legionnaires, members of the military unit and their guests assembled in the basement of the building and enjoyed a barbecue dinner with plenty of cornbread and red lemonade. After this gastronomic feast, many went to White's Theatre and saw "Resurrection," an American picture, given under auspices of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion for raising funds of disabled service men. Three Killed In Ship Explosion

New York, Nov. 12.—(AP)—With three of her crew dead and a fourth severely burned the tanker *Beta*, down by the head and leaking badly, today after a boiler explosion had torn a gaping hole in her plates and set her adrift 33 miles off the Jersey coast.

Under convoy of the coast guard cutter *McCall* the *Beta* managed to reach port under her own power.

The bodies of three members of the crew were found in the blackened hold when the fire had been extinguished.

N. C. RAISES RECORD CROP BRIGHT LEAF

Crop Reporting Service Says Production For State Will Be 437,488,000 Pounds.

Raleigh, Nov. 12.—(AP)—If North Carolina 437,488,000 pounds of tobacco estimated by the government for this year, this will be the record year in the state's history of tobacco grown, a glance at figures on file in the crop reporting service office of Frank Parker, agricultural statistician, today showed.

The nearest approach was in 1920 with 433,750,000 pounds, averaging 25 cents a pound. That price was so unsatisfactory that the following year's crop was reduced 42 per cent.

The warehouse sales show that about 55 per cent auctioned to Nov. 1, as compared with 51 per cent a year ago. The September prices averaged about 18 cents a pound as compared with 25 cents 12 months before, the Associated Press was informed.

"Whether it was the general complaints by farmers or some other cause, the October sales will show an appreciable improvement over the September sales prices," Mr. Parker said in interview.

The tobacco acreage was increased about 13 per cent in North Carolina this year and the prospective production appears to be the crop reports 15 per cent greater. The yield is estimated at 692 pounds per acre as compared with 669 last year.

"The growing and harvesting weather conditions were more favorable than usual. This resulted in good color and fair body or quality. The 245 warehouses operating in North Carolina think that tobacco farmers were getting a raw deal, whatever the cause."

Meanwhile, this week's reports from over the state, whose crop this year threatens to double the production of Kentucky, the long recognized premier tobacco state, pushed down a notch by Tar Heel production, showed record sales and prices on the many markets.

A heavy week's business at Winston-Salem brought the season's sales to \$7,153,318 at \$21.54 per hundred pounds average price, and this week's average of \$25.02.

Durham this week set a new mark and the average at the opening of the week was \$31.14, a record figure. Henderson even bettered that price with \$31.58 average for the opening of the week. The break there was the largest in local history as well as the actual sale.

Greenville's sales were estimated to bring the season's total to 47 million pounds with an average price of \$27.03 a hundred at the close of the week. Other markets brought equally impressive sales and price figures.

SAYS HOPE OF FARM BILL IS FUTILE TODAY

Senator McNairy However, Believes Some Relief Measure Will be Worked Out

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Senator McNairy, Republican, Oregon, came from a White House conference today with the statement that he realized that final approval of the McNairy-Haugen farm relief bill in its present form was hopeless, but still expressing confidence that a relief measure would be worked out and enacted into law.

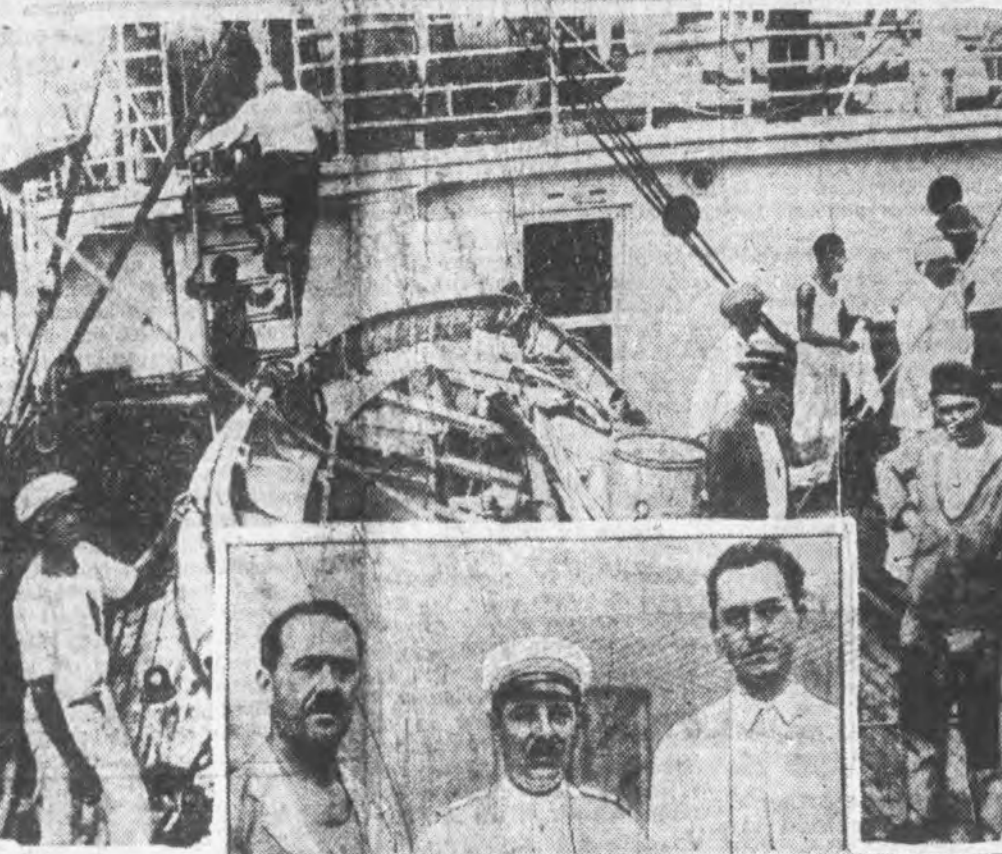
It was indicated, however, that an agreement on a bill was still far away. While the Senator, who is chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, declined to discuss his conference with Mr. Coolidge, it was understood that he took up in an informal way a report on farm relief which is to be made soon by a committee of the United States Chamber of Commerce headed by former Secretary Nagel of the Commerce department. This is the report to which the President has referred frequently as likely to throw much light on the agricultural problem and one which may be examined with great care.

Senator McNairy, however, tersely expressed the opinion that when the report is made public it will be more revolutionary than the very McNairy-Haugen bill was credited by its opponents with being. He said that there still were plans to reinforce the McNairy-Haugen bill.

Regarding the debenture-railroad scheme of the National Grange which the White House yesterday said might be expected with benefit, Senator McNairy declared it was clearly a subsidy and did not begin to provide the assistance to cooperatives in marketing crops that the McNairy-Haugen bill did.

Three Miners Killed
Tokio, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Three miners are known to have been killed, twenty seven are missing and 45 were injured, many seriously, in an explosion in the big Mitsubishi Coal Mine, say dispatches to the vocational newspapers from Bibai, Hokaido (Yezo). Three bodies were recovered. The damage to property was heavy. The explosion was followed by fire.

CHIEF FLEES FROM HANKOW

General Tang Zen-Chi, Commander of Nationalists on Jap Steamer.

Hankow, China, Nov. 12.—(AP)—General Tang Zen-Chi, commander of the Hankow Nationalist troops, took flight from Hankow this morning. It was reported that he was aboard a Japanese steamer bound for Japan.

Panic reigns in the city. Many persons have been injured in disorder but no deaths have been reported.

The building of the Chinese Tobacco Company in the heart of the city has been looted.

Before departing Tang Zen-Chi's bodyguard looted a large quantity of silver because they had not been paid for some time. During the looting of shops the whole population rapidly achieving success in their connexions were barricaded.

General Ho Shein, who yesterday declared his independence of Thansien-Chi, started taking over command of the Wuhan garrison. The military garrison yesterday requested Tang Zen-Chi to resign as commander in chief.

Japanese Marines have landed in Hankow.

Shanghai, China, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The Nanking Nationalists are drive toward Hankow. It was stated in dispatches received in foreign circles here today which broke down the veil of secrecy and conflicting reports that had enmeshed the situation during the past fortnight.

The Nationalists were declared to be steadily approaching the Wukang district, which embraces Hankow, Wuchang and Yangyang.

Since the danger of looting exists, the Japanese and French are taking steps to defend their concessions and it is possible that the British will land forces and Russian concessions do not expect to be able to preserve order during the turnover which would result in the Nanking Nationalists ousting the Hankow Nationalists and fear developments.

Negro Lynched For Attacking Young Woman

Columbia, Tenn., Nov. 12.—A citadel of justice, the scene of his probable trial before the lynching spot for Henry Choate 18 year old negro a few hours after his alleged criminal attack yesterday on a white girl here.

Several hours after officers had taken the negro in custody at a farm house where a blood-stained pistol was found, a band of 350 men, many armed, successfully stormed the jail, battered the door with sledge hammers and captured Choate.

At the Court house, where large crowds had gathered, Choate, was said to have confessed beating the girl over the head with a pistol. The Rev. J. R. Parsons, one among a group of prominent citizens who endeavored to allow the law to take its course, declared he heard the confession.

TO DESTROY RIVER BRIDGE WITH BOMBS

Bridge Over Pee Dee River to be Submerged as Result of Dam Construction.

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The full fury of war will be turned loose at an early date against modern concrete bridge across the Pee Dee River between Albemarle and Mount Gilead, N. C., placed bombs, acid bombs and high explosive shells will be used to destroy the structure, completed in 1922 and at a cost of approximately a quarter of a million dollars.

The bridge will be submerged as a result of the construction of a dam across the river near Norwood by the Carolina Power and Light Company. It would be an obstruction in navigation if it remained in co-operation with the State Highway Commission would test the third span to the breaking point by imposing tanks of water upon it until it collapsed.

The military tests have been devised to furnish actual information on several points. Angerous corps, bombs and other explosives will be placed to test the explosives formulae as the demolition of reinforced concrete and also to determine the best place for placing charges to destroy bridges of this type. Field tests will be employed, as a test of the best procedure in bombardment of concrete bridges and aircraft will drop bombs built for training in accuracy and to observe the effect.

About two tons of high explosives will be used against one bridge in the engineering experiments while artillery fire will range in size from 10 to 240 millimetres. An air corps formation of nine bombing planes from Langley Field, with Fort Belvoir, Mo., as a base for its operations, will use bombs up to 1,100 pounds in weight for each plane.

"The bombing of the bridge will also simulate wartime missions on one air corps as air torques when during hostilities are often called upon to bomb railways and highway bridges at such distances from their base, the announcement said.

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Greensboro Man Named Member of Trade Commission

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Garland S. Ferguson, Jr., of Greensboro, N. C., was appointed a member of the Federal Trade Commission by President Coolidge.

In naming Mr. Ferguson, the President followed out the recommendation of C. Bascom Sless, his former private secretary and other business leaders, to name a man from the south to this commission in view of the increasing importance of industry in the southern states.

Ferguson succeeds John F. Nugent, whose term recently expired.

BRITISH FLIER TODAY AWAITS GOOD WEATHER

Date of Golden Gate-New Zealand Flight To Be Set When Weather Improves.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Captain Frederick A. Giles, British aviator, today awaited favorable weather reports before setting the date for his postponed 12,000 mile Golden Gate-New Zealand flight. Plans for taking off early today were cancelled when weather bureau officials informed Giles that attempt would be "suicidal" in view of storm conditions over the Pacific.

The decision to await favorable weather conditions came after a day of indecision, in which Giles was quoted as saying that he intended to trust to luck and start regardless of what the weather prediction might be. He persisted in that determination until after an interview with Major E. H. Bowie, weather forecaster, in which he was informed that low clouds, rain and high winds might be expected 900 miles offshore.

Giles believes his Hess Bluebird biplane will fly to Honolulu in 28 hours. From Honolulu he intends to head for the Samoan Islands, and go thence to the Fiji group, to Australia, and on to New Zealand.

Giles, a British reserve aviator, who was a member of the Royal Air Corps, expects to fly alone by dead reckoning, without radio or life raft.

FOUR KILLED IN GUN FIGHT ALABAMA CITY

Armistice Day Observance has Tragic Ending in Affray on Main Street of Opp.

Opp, Ala., Nov. 12.—(AP)—An Armistice Day observance in this small southern Alabama town left in its wake four dead from participation in a spectacular gun battle and two witnesses suffering from bullet wounds.

A fusillade of shots along the main street early last night claimed policemen Ed Nix, 36, and Lee Clark, 45, but not before they had brought down Cleve Dauphin, 40 and O. C. Dauphin, 18, his son.

Earlier in the night, the two officers had attempted to stop a car driven by young Dauphin, who was said to have been making a disturbance. Firing at his automobile failed to stop him, and the youth returned soon afterward with his father to post themselves at a corner drug store.

Reports of the trouble had attracted a large crowd, which dispersed rapidly as the firing started with the approach of the policemen. No words were said to have been passed by any of the participants and they advanced slowly in the open through the hail of lead reloading their weapons until they fell. When the firing ceased only Nix was found alive, and he died at a hospital a few minutes later.

Miss Effie Davis, an Andalusian school supervisor and Grady Paul, 17, both received wounds from stray bullets. Miss Davis was carrying a sister's baby, which was unharmed.

Opp police declared both Dauphins bore records as liquor law violators.

Three Burned to Death
Batavia, O., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Jesse Darlington, 25, his mother and baby son were burned to death, and his wife was burned probably fatally when their farm home near here, was destroyed by fire today.

PINCHOT IS WITNESS IN OIL HEARING

Former Governor of Pennsylvania Called Before Grand Jury in Conspiracy Case.

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Gifford Pinchot, former Governor of Pennsylvania, became a grand juror witness today in the investigation of charges of jury tampering in the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy trial.

The former Governor was taken into the grand jury room after a quarter hour's conference with District Attorney Gordon and his assistant, Neil Burkshaw, who is directing the government investigation in activities of the Barn detectives shadowing the trial jurors.

Gordon wore a broad smile as he came out of the conference with Mr. Pinchot.

Recently the government attorneys have been hinting at a sensational disclosure to be made as the grand jury inquiry draws to a close.

Whether Mr. Pinchot is to be the source of this disclosure, or to have any connection with it, the prosecutor's office refused to say.

It was evident, however, that the District Attorney and his assistants regarded Pinchot's information as of the highest importance.

Pinchot was before the grand jury exactly twelve minutes. Gordon and Burkshaw flanked him as he passed down the hall returning to the District Attorney's office.

Newspaper correspondents were warned away by the prosecuting officers. Mr. Pinchot now makes his home in Washington, and is waging a fight before Congress for conservation of water power facilities. He maintains a considerable staff of assistants in this work.

One Dead And Three Injured At Charlotte

Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 12.—(AP)—One man is dead and nine others are in hospitals here suffering from injuries received during the last eighteen hours in this section. Two automobile accidents, involving four cars, were responsible.

The highway accident toll was increased today by the injury of four women when an automobile in which they were riding collided with another car. The women, Mrs. J. B. Blackman, Mrs. Robert W. Brown, Miss Fannie Cobb and Mrs. Josie E. Devine, were enroute to Rock Hill, S. C., to attend a funeral.

Fred Mayhew of Davidson was last night near Davidson in a collision between two cars. Willie Walley of Iredell County; Lewis Sherrill and Preston Sloan, a negro, were injured in this accident. Mayhew and Sloan were in one car and the Sherrills and Willie Walley in the other.

Bishop Mouzon To Fill Pulpit At Conference

Raleigh, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Nearing the time set for adjournment today Monday noon, the North Carolina Methodist Conference passed the second day of its five days annual meeting today.

Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, Charlotte, presiding after a temporary illness, arranged to preach in Edenton Street Methodist Church tomorrow with visiting ministers at the convention occupying other pulpits in Raleigh. Bishop Mouzon's sermon will be broadcast by station WPTF.

Greenville Highs Win Group One Championship

DEFEAT WASHINGTON HIGHS IN STUBBORNLY CONTESTED EXHIBITION ARMISTICE DAY

The championship of group one undisputedly rests at Greenville high school today as a result of one of the most thrilling games ever played by that school. The strong Washington high aggregation was conquered yesterday by an 18 to 13 count. Opening the game by receiving and then uncovering a wonderful open attack, the local lads pushed across two touchdowns in the first seven minutes of play. End runs by Bostic and Respass put the ball on Washington's ten yard line, but it went over on downs, however. As Washington punted out, Respass received the kick and scored the first touchdown on a brilliant forty-yard run along the sidelines. The try for extra point failed, however. Washington again chose to kick, giving Greenville the offensive. End runs took the ball to Washington's thirty yard line and here a long pass from Respass to Bostic accounted for the second touchdown. The try for extra point was unsuccessful again.

This time Washington elected to receive. Respass kicked to the thirty yard line and the opponents brought the ball ten yards before being downed. Line plunges and fakes off tackle played netted Washington four successive first downs. As the quarter ended the Greenville line held but the ball was on Greenville's one yard line. As the second quarter began Latham was successful in carrying the ball over on a line play for the opponents' first score. Youmans drop-kicked for the extra point. The score was now 12 to 7.

Greenville elected to receive and following the kick off, returned the ball to the forty yard line, but were forced to kick on the forty-five yard line. Bostic kicked to the opponents' twenty yard line. Washington was also forced to kick. Greenville taking possession of the ball on the forty yard line, again. Rickenbacker Returns To Track For Business Instead Of Sport

Indianapolis — (AP)—Eddie Rickenbacker is going back to his first love — the automobile race track. But he has chosen the commercial side of the business instead of piloting a speeding car, where he first began his climb to fame.

Rickenbacker and a group of Detroit capitalists have purchased a controlling interest in the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, and the former race driver and American World War ace has been made president of the organization.

Rickenbacker's latest bid for a successful business career follows the crash of the motor car company that bore his name, one of the most spectacular financial failures in the history of Detroit's motor industry.

When the American war ace returned to civilian life, he was determined to build and sell a model of automobile which he had developed. The Rickenbacker Motor Company was financed in part by B. F. Everett and Walter E. Planners, formerly associated in the manufacture of the old "E. M. F." car. Production was started in the Detroit factory with the company capitalized at \$7,500,000.

For two years the company enjoyed prosperity of a sort, but financial difficulties arose in the third year, and in 1926 the concern

went into the hands of a receiver. As a youth in Columbus, Ohio, Rickenbacker's passion was automobile racing. He would often steal out to the old Columbus driving park and hang his legs over the fence to watch the cars speed by. He won many victories on tracks over the country, but never was successful on the brick oval at Indianapolis. His first trip around the Indianapolis speedway was in 1912, but he completed only 44 of the required 200 laps when motor trouble forced him to the pits. His best showing was in 1914, when he came in tenth, averaging a speed of 70.84 miles per hour.

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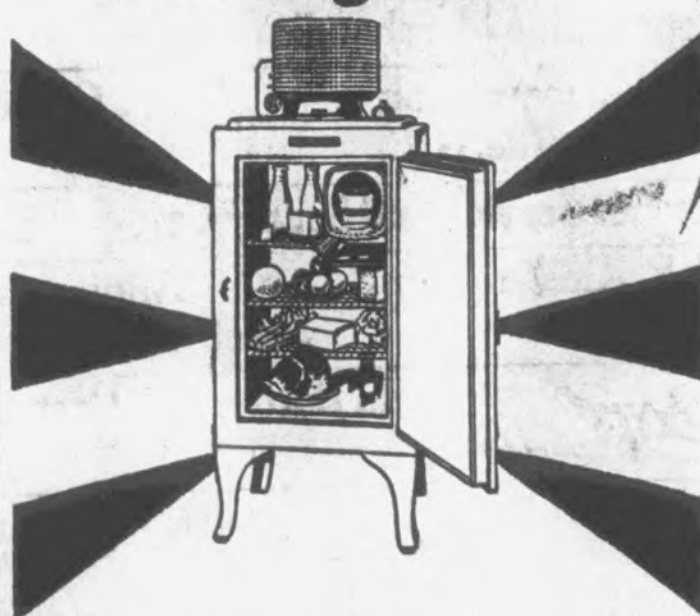

The Greenville High victory over Washington yesterday places the locals well up in the series for the state championship. Greenville this year has one of the state's outstanding high school football teams and it should have the heartiest support of all our citizens. The boys are trying hard to gain highest honors for Greenville and to know that the citizens of Greenville are behind them and with them in their efforts will mean much to them in the remaining contests of the series.

In his Armistice Day address yesterday, Congressman Bulwinkle pointed out the heavy losses incurred in the great world war because of America's state of unpreparedness. Market Report

Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON
New York, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The cotton market opened steady today at unchanged prices to an advance of 7 points on overnight buying orders brought in by the farmer. The market was quiet in the afternoon, but demand was not active and prices soon eased under selling, combined with Southern and local selling.

After selling up to 19.24 at the start, January declined to 19.74, the general market showing net losses of 14 to 16 points at the end of the first hour.

Private cables reported Bombay buying and covering in the Liverpool market, owing to an improved technical position and the predictions of a cold wave in the cotton belt prices easing later under hedging liquidation.

The amount of cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at the end of the week was estimated at 168,000 bales, against 250,000 last year.

Futures closed steady, but to seven higher; spot steady; middling 30.30.

GRAIN
Chicago, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Buying rush in wheat today found offerings scarce and brought about sharply higher prices. Estimates of a new Argentine crop were current putting the total 10,000,000 bushels under the last year's harvest.

Meanwhile the Canadian Government crop report was constructed as bullish indicating a loss since September of 13,000,000 bushels for the three prairie provinces.

Wheat closed firm 2 cents to 2 1/2 cents net higher, corn 2 1/4 to 2 3/8 off, oats 1-4 -3-8 to 1-4 down and provisions unchanged to 50 cents up.
