ORDERS PROBE INTO EFFORTS TO FIX JURY

Will Investigate to Determine if There Was Criminal Contempt in Oil Case.

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—An investigation to determine whether there has been a criminal contempt of the District of Columbia Supreme Court in connection with the Fall-Sinclair trial jury subversion scandal was ordered today by Justice Frederick L. Siddons.

District attorney Gordon, John E. Lashley, a former district attorney and James E. Easby-Smith, a prominent member of the District of Columbia bar, were named by the justice to conduct the inquiry and if cause is found to proceed "as expeditiously as possible" to prepare, file, present and prosecute in this court against such persons or persons charged of criminal contempt of court, to the end that the authority and power of the court be vindicated, sustained and enforced.

Justice Siddons, who was the trial judge in the Fall-Sinclair case, based his action upon statements contained in the four affidavits filed with him and which resulted in the declaration of a mistrial in the celebrated Teapot Dome case.

These affidavits told of activities of detectives in the employ of the Bureau agency in shadowing jurors and of remarks attributed to Juror Edward J. Kidwell to the effect that he expected material gain for himself from their case.

Justice Siddons order follows: "By reason of the statements contained in four certain affidavits made respectively by Neil Burkinshaw, Walter M. Shea, Donald Key King and J. Ray Akers, submitted to the court on November 1, 1927, by counsel for the prosecution in the pending criminal case of the United States vs. Harry F. Sinclair and Albert B. Fall, numbered 43,324 on the criminal docket of this court and filed in said cause on said day it appears that there is reasonable cause for inquiring whether a criminal contempt of this court has been committed, and if so for taking appropriate proceedings in respect thereto, and therefore it is by the court on this 15th day of November, 1927,

"Ordered: That Messrs Peyton Gordon, John E. Lashley, and James E. Easby Smith, members of the bar of this court, be and they are hereby designated, appointed, authorized, empowered and directed to forthwith proceed to inquire whether there is reasonable cause to believe that a criminal contempt of this court has been committed, and if so by what person or persons, and if upon inquiry so made such cause is found to exist, to proceed as expeditiously as possible to prepare, file, present and prosecute in this court against such person or persons charged of criminal contempt of court, to the end that the authority and power of the court be vindicated, sustained and enforced.

"And for this purpose they shall invoke and use all appropriate means available to them."

King is the newspaper reporter who accused Kidwell of making the remarks about the case, while Akers a street car conductor, is the man who told King the juror was talking indiscreetly about the case. Burkinshaw is the assistant district attorney who has been active in the investigation of the tampering charges. With Shea, another assistant district attorney, he made the charge against the Burns men.

The grand jury investigation was resumed in mid-afternoon with Char. G. Ruddy as the first witness. Ruddy has charge of the Burns operatives who shadowed the trial jury and is accused by William J. McMullin one of the men of his force with having caused false reports to be made as to activities of jurors with a view to obtaining a mistrial if the defense desired to move in that direction.

The "mystery man" who came in from Philadelphia yesterday with McMullin was not at the courthouse and those in charge of the inquiry declined to say when he would be called.

The "mystery man" was reported to have had some information as to the genesis of the jury shadowing but government attorneys said that after close questioning over night they had concluded that his information was not nearly as valuable as both he and McMullin thought it to be and that they were undecided whether he even would be sent before the grand jury.

Randolph County Clerk Is Killed In Auto Wreck

Rockingham, N. C., Nov. 15.—(AP)—William A. Lovett, 39, of Asheboro, clerk of the Randolph county superior court, was killed yesterday when an automobile in which he was riding with B. F. Brittain, Asheboro attorney, skidded and overturned on a curve leading to the Morrison bridge, over the Pee Dee river, five miles from here.

Mr. Lovett was internal revenue collector during the Wilson administration and retained the position for two years under the Harding administration.

Surviving are the mother, Mrs. Coleman Lovett, three brothers and three sisters. The funeral will be conducted at Asheboro.

Jury Selection In Remus Trial Continues Today

Cincinnati, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Back again in the legal traces he kicked over for a fling at cornering the American supply of illicit liquor, George Remus faced another five-day siege in court today helping determine upon the twelve women and men who shall decide whether he forfeited his life last October 6 when he shot and killed Imogene Holmes Remus, his estranged second wife.

Two women and four men culled from 15 veniremen were the jury met of the first day. It also brought Remus's active appearance in his own behalf upon two occasions, the prosecution's firm assurance no less than electrocution was its demand and a formal reiteration by the defense that temporary insanity was Remus's plea upon which he hoped to evade the electric chair.

WOMAN BLAST VICTIM LEAVES FIVE CHILDREN

Pittsburg, a Nov. 15.—(AP)—Five grief stricken children today lingered about a casket in a north side home looking upon the body of their mother, Marie Congeller, the only woman victim of yesterday's terrific explosion.

The mother was killed while working over a washtub in the basement of her home, just a block from the ill-fated gas tank. A large piece of flying glass served an artery in her leg.

L. P. WAYNE WAS KILLED EARLY LAST EVENING

Local Man Received Crushed Skull When Caught Beneath Falling Shed.

L. P. Wayne, 53, was instantly killed last night about eight o'clock when he was caught beneath a falling tool shed just to the rear of the new Standard Oil Filling Station, at the corner of Dickinson avenue and Greene street.

Wayne and another workman were in the act of tearing down the shed, when it gave way and he was caught beneath it. Physicians summoned to the scene immediately following the accident, found the body lifeless. Examination of the body disclosed that his skull was crushed by the falling timbers and death apparently had been instantaneous.

Funeral services were conducted at the Wayne home, on Dickinson avenue at two o'clock this afternoon after which the remains were carried to Riverside church, in Craven county, for burial. The services at the home were conducted by Rev. W. S. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church, owing to the absence of the deceased's pastor, Rev. I. B. Jones, who is ill. Services at the grave were in charge of one of the local Masonic lodges of which Mr. Wayne was a member.

Mr. Wayne was a native of Craven county, but had been making his home here for a number of years. He was a member of the Methodist church and the Masonic Order. Beside his widow, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Dan Borden, Misses Esther and Grace Wayne, and two sons, Clyde and "G. B." Wayne.

Fountain Man Takes Own Life

J. H. Powell, of the Fountain section of the County committed suicide last night with a shot gun. Powell secreted himself in a room of his home and placed the barrel of the gun under his chin fired same with the result that his head was almost blown from his body.

No cause was given for the act except the fact that on Friday of last week he with another man was caught in the manufacture of whiskey. Bond was furnished and the dead man was to be given a hearing before Judge Darden here today.

Black Jack Man Commits Suicide

Seaf Jones, of Black Jack, committed suicide some time during Sunday night or early Monday morning, according to a coroner's inquest held yesterday following the finding of the dead body in the bedroom of the Jones home. No reason for the rash act was learned.

According to information, Jones' wife visited at the home of a nearby friend while Jones went out and he was to call her upon his return home later in the evening. He did not call for her and she spent the night at the home of the friend, and it was when she returned home early Monday morning to prepare breakfast, that she found the body of her husband lying across the bed with a shot gun clamped in his arms.

Funeral services were conducted from the home yesterday afternoon followed by interment in the family burying ground in Craven county. The deceased is survived by his widow and a four-year-old son.

THREE INDICTED CONNECTION WITH POST-OFFICE ROBBERIES

Asheville, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Logan Cloud, former Postmaster at Columbus; E. G. Garner and L. D. Ledford and Willie J. Buckner, today were indicted by the United States District Court, Grand Jury here on charges involving Post-Offices in Western North Carolina.

Cloud is charged with embezzling postal funds prior to his removal from office last May after an inspector reported an alleged shortage of several hundred dollars. He is free on bond.

Buckner and Garner of breaking into Bryson City Post Office and Garner and Ledford are accused of robbing Post Office at Lake Junaluska, Saluda, Woodfin and other small offices.

Boney Takes Oath
Raleigh, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Dan C. Boney today was sworn in to his surance Commissioner. Mr. Boney succeeds Stacey W. Wade, resigned, who today assumed new duties as vice-president of the Home Mortgage Company of Durham.

Mr. Boney has been connected with the Department of Insurance for several years as Chief Deputy Commissioner.

OVER HUNDRED LOSE LIVES IN SHIP DISASTER

Ship Sinks in Three Minutes When Hit by Terrific Storm Sunday.

Bombay, India, Nov. 15.—(AP)—One hundred and eighteen lives are estimated to have been lost in the sinking of the 296-ton steamer Tukaram, plying between Bombay and Coastal Ports.

The steamer Janyani, owned by the Bombay Cooperative navigation company, owners of the Tukaram, is three days overdue.

The Tukaram, carrying 82 passengers and a crew of 54 sank within three minutes during a sudden storm Saturday when seven miles off the coast of India. The boat carried no wireless and when no news of her was received yesterday the owners sent another steamer. This vessel returned today with sixteen survivors who had managed to reach Janjira, about 50 miles south of here, where two more of the survivors are in a hospital suffering from injuries received in the disaster.

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Officials Await Chemists Report In Poison Case

Hendersonville, N. C., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Henderson county officers today were awaiting reports from state chemists at Raleigh on whether the viscera of Lydia Case, 20, and Ezell Lydia, 19, two Henderson county young people who died under mysterious circumstances contained poison.

The body of the young woman was found Saturday in a barn on the southern place near here and the youth was found dead in a room at his home on the Bat cave highway. Poisoning was suspected in both cases, and the viscera went to Raleigh for examination.

Ben Southern, 20, Tom Southern, 25 and George Drake 20, are being held in the county jail pending investigation into the death of the girl. Ben Southern was arrested in Greenville, S. C. Saturday and the other two surrendered Sunday.

Members of the Lida family declared that young Lydia had been threatened by alleged bootleggers, and officers are investigating this story as a source of a possible clue.

Tobacco Market Averages \$28.49 Here Yesterday

Sales on the local tobacco market passed the forty seven million pounds mark yesterday with indications that the market before the end of the week will break last year's record of over forty nine million pounds for the season.

Sales yesterday, according to official figures furnished by K. W. Cobb, were 1,171,570 pounds for \$322,378.65, an average of \$28.49 per hundred pounds. Total sales for the season including yesterday stand at 47,644,584 pounds.

ARRESTED IN MURDER CASE

Highland, N. J., Man Arrested For The Slaying of His Brother in Law.

Highlands, N. J. Nov. 15.—(AP)—A warrant charging murder was issued today by recorder William Meade for the arrest of Alex Schreiber in the slaying of his brother-in-law Herbert O. Meisterknecht, inventor and reputed former officer in the German and American navies. Detectives and state troopers left with the warrant for Newark, where the man sought was reported to have lived and worked recently.

Investigation of the slaying was started when shots were heard over the telephone by P. O. Olde, a lawyer, who was talking to the inventor from Elizabeth, fifteen miles away. Olde, talking about a new gasoline gauge, heard five shots. "The receiver crashed against a wall. Then came a thud."

Olde telephoned the police and Dr. J. H. Rowland, mayor of Highland, found Meisterknecht's body slumped by the telephone. There were three bullets in the back and one in the skull.

Irving Parker, a lobsterman, said a man who walked from the workshop yesterday after the shooting had handed him a card bearing the name Alex Schreiber and a Cleveland address, and said "I have just shot my brother-in-law." The man then drove off in an automobile with another man, Parker said.

Discuss Defense Of Panama Canal

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The United States Chamber of Commerce went on record today before the House Flood control committee as advocating that the Federal government assume the responsibility and bear the entire cost of the flood control of the Mississippi Valley.

Jacob M. Dickinson, of Chicago, former secretary of war and Robert R. Ellis of Memphis, vice-president of the Chamber, told the committee the organization was committed to this policy.

Both spokesmen who are members of the chamber's flood control committee, also urged that the Mississippi problem be kept "separate and distinct" from any other legislation or undertaking.

Continuing their drive against the illicit manufacture of corn whiskey, officers from the sheriff's office yesterday afternoon captured a small still in Chicod township. The plant which was of the steam outfit type, was not in operation and no one in attendance when the officers arrived. Four barrels of beer were poured out and the still demolished.

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Captain Frederick A. Giles has postponed the start of his proposed 12,000 mile flight to New Zealand, scheduled for today.

A rain soaked runway at Mills field where Giles plane was prepared for the flight, caused postponement. He plans to attempt a take off tomorrow.

ROTARY CLUBS IN JOINT MEET

Ayden and Greenville Clubs Enjoy Fine Meeting With Pierce Community Club.

Last night will be a memorable one for members of the Greenville and Ayden Rotary Clubs and residents of the Pierce school section about three miles from Ayden, it being the occasion of a joint meeting of the two Rotary clubs and a number of the residents of the Pierce section at the Pierce Community building.

Following the consolidation of the Pierce school some time ago with the Ayden school, the residents of the section purchased the abandoned Pierce school house and have converted it into a community building for the surrounding district. The meeting held there last night was featured by a bountiful turkey feast followed by a round of after dinner speeches interspersed with song and general good fellowship.

Rev. W. H. Brunson, president of the Ayden Rotary Club, acted as toastmaster and following an address of welcome, he called upon various ones present for impromptu talks. One of the first talks was that made by E. F. Arnold, county farm demonstration agent who commended his remarks by introducing Blaney Summerell, of the Pierce section, who was recently chosen as the Master Farmer of eastern North Carolina. Quite fittingly Mrs. Summerell was presented with her husband and he declared that she was the power behind the throne and deserved the credit for the honors recently bestowed upon him. Among those who made talks were Miss Bertha Lee Ferguson, county home demonstration agent, R. H. Wright, F. C. Harding, J. B. Pierce, Raymond Turnage, Levy Pierce and others. All of the speakers expressed gratification at the progress that was being made by the Pierce community and all carried a feeling of true good fellowship. Several selections furnished by the quartette composed of Messrs. Williams, Storey, Lee and Sellers, were greatly enjoyed.

Eight Arrested In Liquor Raids

As a result of a wholesale whiskey raid conducted by officers from the sheriff's office, assisted by special officers Bryant and Johnson, of Fountain township, eight men of that section have been required to furnish bond for violation of the prohibition laws, various quantities of whiskey having been found at filling stations and other places operated by them. They are Ernest Webb, Stephen Everett, Herman Lonnie Owens, Tom Haywood, W. E. Gardner, W. H. Nichols and Fred Lewis.

It appears that the home of Haywood was the base of operations as the officers found eighteen gallons of whiskey there. When these cases were called in county court today each of the defendants asked for jury trial and they were transferred to Superior court.

MANY EXPELLED AS RESULT OF HAZING

Baton Rouge, La., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Clipping of 300 freshmen's hair at Louisiana State University has already exacted a toll of three varsity football players and five other students and a probe into violation of the school anti-hazing pledge proceeds, with indications from President T. W. Atkinson that still more students may be asked to leave.

The right men dismissed yesterday for "participation in hair clipping" were expelled on "definite" information furnished by other students. The outlawed students declared formal protest that they were "given no opportunity to answer the charges."

Number of Dead Now Stands at 23 With Over 50 More Reported Missing.

Pittsburg, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The death toll, as a result of yesterday's disastrous gas tank blast on the lower north side here mounted today as rescuers dug their way into the ruins of homes, factories, warehouses and industrial plants. While a few crews labored throughout the night seeking to clear away some of the debris, the real work of recovering bodies did not begin until daylight.

Digging into the ruins of one structure, the rescuers brought out the bodies of two unidentified men, making the known dead 23.

One fatal accident occurred in the district during the morning. Frank Kueperle, engaged in moving some twisted steel, was killed instantly when some reinforcing steel fell upon him. Anthony Cayne and John Wise, also working on the ruins, were injured when struck by steel beams.

Fire department officials believed that at least seven additional bodies would be found, six in the wrecked building of the Pittsburg Clay Pot Plant, and one inside the mass of twisted ruins that had been the mammoth death dealing gas reservoir.

Firemen, policemen and volunteer workers engaged in the task of clearing the wreckage from the disaster area of one square mile, said it would be at least a week before they had explored all the ruins. Of more than 450 injured persons treated at hospitals about 150 remained in the institutions today. Some in a critical condition. Many suffered broken arms and legs, while others had serious head injuries.

During the night the rescuers used dynamite in an effort to dislodge some of the ruins. At daylight they abandoned the explosives, and slow work of lifting the wreckage, piece by piece was resumed. The rescuers were menaced by tottering walls and hanging timbers and steel beams.

Insurance experts, after inspection refused to give any definite estimate of the loss, saying it would mount into the millions. A survey showed that some 30 large commercial houses and 200 homes were hit hard. The entire loss was not confined to the immediate region of the explosion, for hundreds of windows throughout Pittsburg and suburbs were shattered.

One case of looting was reported during the night. Joseph Jurinski and Frank Linshu, both residents of the wrecked region were arrested charged with entering some of the deserted homes. Taken before police magistrate E. M. Hough today, he told them "the offense with which you two are charged merits a penalty more severe than a \$50. fine which the law empowers me to impose for a first offense therefore I hold you for court."

More than 500 laborers, employed by the Philadelphia Company, parent concern of the Equitable Gas Company, owners of the tank, were sent to assist in removing debris and searching for additional bodies.

Relief agencies including the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, Boy Scouts and others, were functioning at full blast today, caring for the homeless and supplying food and clothing to those left destitute. City council assured the Red Cross that Pittsburg would provide temporary funds necessary for the relief work. City council had already appropriated \$100,000 for this purpose.

Pittsburg, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The fate that dealt death or injury to hundreds in yesterday's gas explosion in the north side district evened up matters to some extent. Three of the sixteen workmen scheduled to make repairs on the tank that subsequently let go, failed to report to work. Their 13 companions ball are believed to have been killed.

Then there was an employee of the Pittsburg Clay Pot Company one of the heavy sufferers in the blast who was 15 minutes late for work and missed the explosion by 13 minutes. An undetermined number of his fellow workers were killed or injured.

There's one north side resident who has particularly good reason for believing he is fortunate to be alive. He was repairing his automobile in the shadow of the giant tank. Finding he could not complete the repairs in time for an engagement he left at 1:30. Thirteen minutes later his car was blown to bits.

GEORGIA HAS BIG LEAD IN GRID SCORE

Atlanta, Nov. 15.—(AP)—University of Georgia stands head and shoulders above the Southern Conference football field in statistical strength, on the basis of scoring within the conference. The Athens Bulldogs now have amassed 156 points in five conference games to three for their opponents.

Tennessee continues to run second in scoring the Vols having counted 128 points. Georgia Tech has the second best defensive record, only six points having been counted against the Tornado.

PLAYING THE GAME Equality Of Opportunity In Football By Fielding H. Yost



Ann Arbor Mich.—(AP)—Many factors enter into the question of the development of equality of opportunity for competitive athletic teams—such equality of opportunity being one of the necessities for a thorough going whole hearted rivalry in the football relations between two schools. The same factors, of course, extend to other sports.

Listed categorically these factors include, among others:

- Size of school and number of students available for competitive athletic teams.
- Number and training of personnel in charge of physical education generally and competitive teams in particular.
- Size, character and equipment of the plant used by competitive athletic teams.
- Amount of time the student body has available for athletic or recreational activities, especially those out for intercollegiate teams.
- Requirement for scholastic eligibility and the ease or impossibility of removing class room deficiencies.
- Number of games in which the player participates.
- Time permitted away from class rooms on trips.
- Size of the competing schools is not as pertinent as the number of students available as candidates for competitive teams. Columbia, for instance, and Chicago, are large schools. Both have graduate departments of large enrollment while Columbia has many part time students. In each the number of teams is not representative of total yearly enrollment.
- The amount of time the student has to devote to recreation is a part of the same question. Because of the required practice work in field and laboratories stu-

dents have less and less time to devote to recreation. This is especially true where the interest of the student body lie in the sciences and engineering.

At Michigan, medical and dental students are denied participation in foot ball practice because of laboratory periods. The few students in the medical department who have been members of Michigan football teams completed this laboratory work during the preceding summer session.

With the exception of a very few schools, the day has passed when the coaches had candidates for teams all afternoon while at some schools the football practice must be concentrated in a few hours a week. In the Western Conference actual practice is confined to an hour and a half a day. It is safe to say that most of the middle western teams entered that initial game this year with less than 25 hours fall practice.

Equal scholastic eligibility rules are necessary for whole hearted rivalry. This point has been settled throughout the middle west by the formation of an all-covering series of conferences with almost uniform rules.

Some slight difference exists in these conferences, however, concerning removal of scholastic deficiencies. In some schools a "flunk" means retaking work in the class room while in others it is possible to satisfy the faculty by passage of special examinations. Even this difference causes some students to feel they are discriminated against when they are barred from competition while their "cousins" in another school regains his competitive rights by examinations.

Deep down in the very heart of equal competition is this personal factor between the men of the opposing teams and the greatest rivalry and the most spirited competition develops when the competing individuals feel that none of the opposition has unfair advantage in training eligibility or preparation.

—With every player in good physical shape, the Duke Blue Devil squad engaged itself in regular practice today in getting ready for the Carolina invasion.

Indications were that the same lineup which faced State last week would start against the Tar Heels, with Jankowski the main cog in the backfield.

Raleigh, Nov. 15.—(AP)—State's champion Wolfpack, seeking a Conference perfect record, today prepared to meet South Carolina at Columbia on Thanksgiving day. A win over the Gamecocks would give the locals a clean Conference slate.

The entire squad was pronounced by coaches in the best of shape. All injured players have recovered from battle scars except Chink Outen, halfback, whose slowly healing leg bone break is keeping him from practice.

Only in part does the public know what evidence has been laid before the Grand Jury in Washington, but the charges of jury-tampering in the Sinclair-Fall case assumes an uglier look the further the investigation is carried. No attempt is made to deny that detectives were set to spy on the jury. Burns admits it. From Sinclair himself has come no disclaimer, in the circumstances, injured innocence would hardly be a convincing role.

And nowhere is now, audible any echo of the chorus of disparagement so persistently repeated in many quarters of the efforts of the Senate committee headed by Senator Walsh of Montana to bring to light all the facts in connection with the oil-reserve leases. Nowhere are the leases any longer defended. Since the ringing denunciation by the United States Supreme Court of "fraud," "collusion" and "conspiracy" both in the Sinclair and Doheny deals with Fall, silence has become the part of prudence. In the present situation there is nothing to tempt those who once volunteered their services to renew their efforts to disparage the work of the Walsh committee.

We are not yet at the end of the proceedings in this business of jury-spying. The investigation must go on until the bottom has been reached. — New York World.

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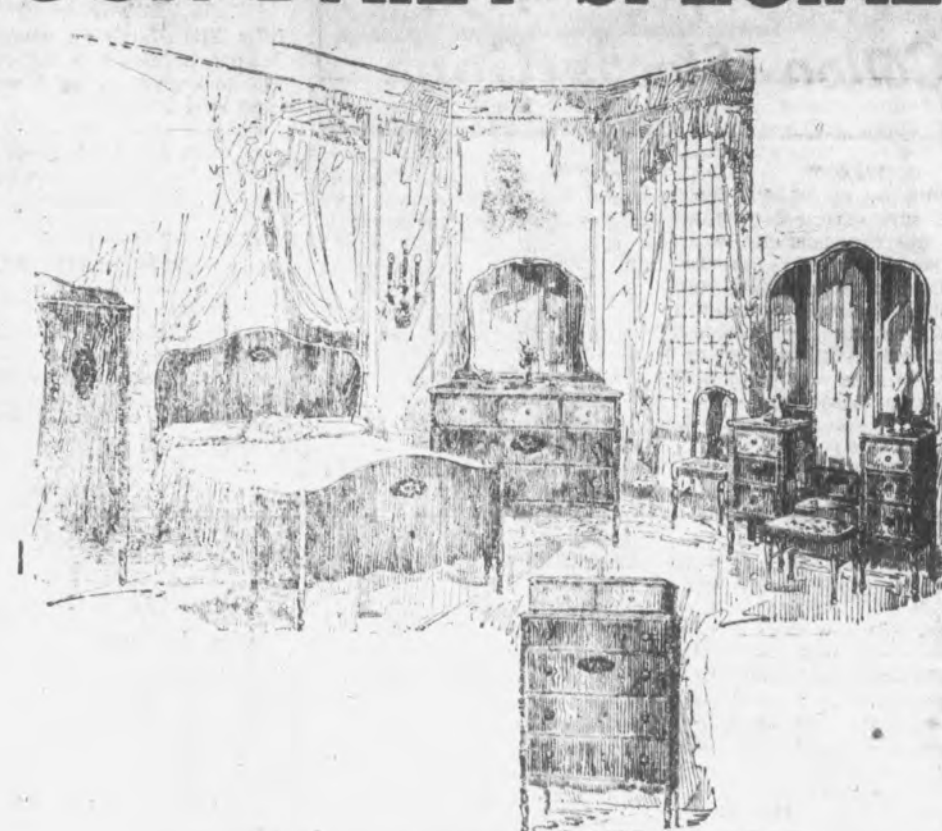

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Favorable trade news from some of the steel industries provided the groundwork for another advance in prices in today's stock market. Continued ease of money rates in the face of an unusually heavy mid-month turnover of funds, due to the retirement of the Second Liberty bonds, was another favorable factor.

Profit-taking in some of the lead industries gave the morning market an irregular appearance, but offerings were well absorbed. U. S. Steel common converted an early loss of 1 3/8 points into a gain of 1 point before the end of the third hour, and General Motors climbed a point above yesterday's close. Wall Street showed only a passing interest in the publication of alleged photographs of the new Ford car, but reports that William C. Durant was undertaking a merger of several independent companies including Hupp, Chandler, Jordan, Moon and Peerless, while lacking official confirmation, nevertheless stimulated speculative activity in those issues. One block of 30,000 shares of Hupp changed hands at 25.

The closing was a net advance, sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.

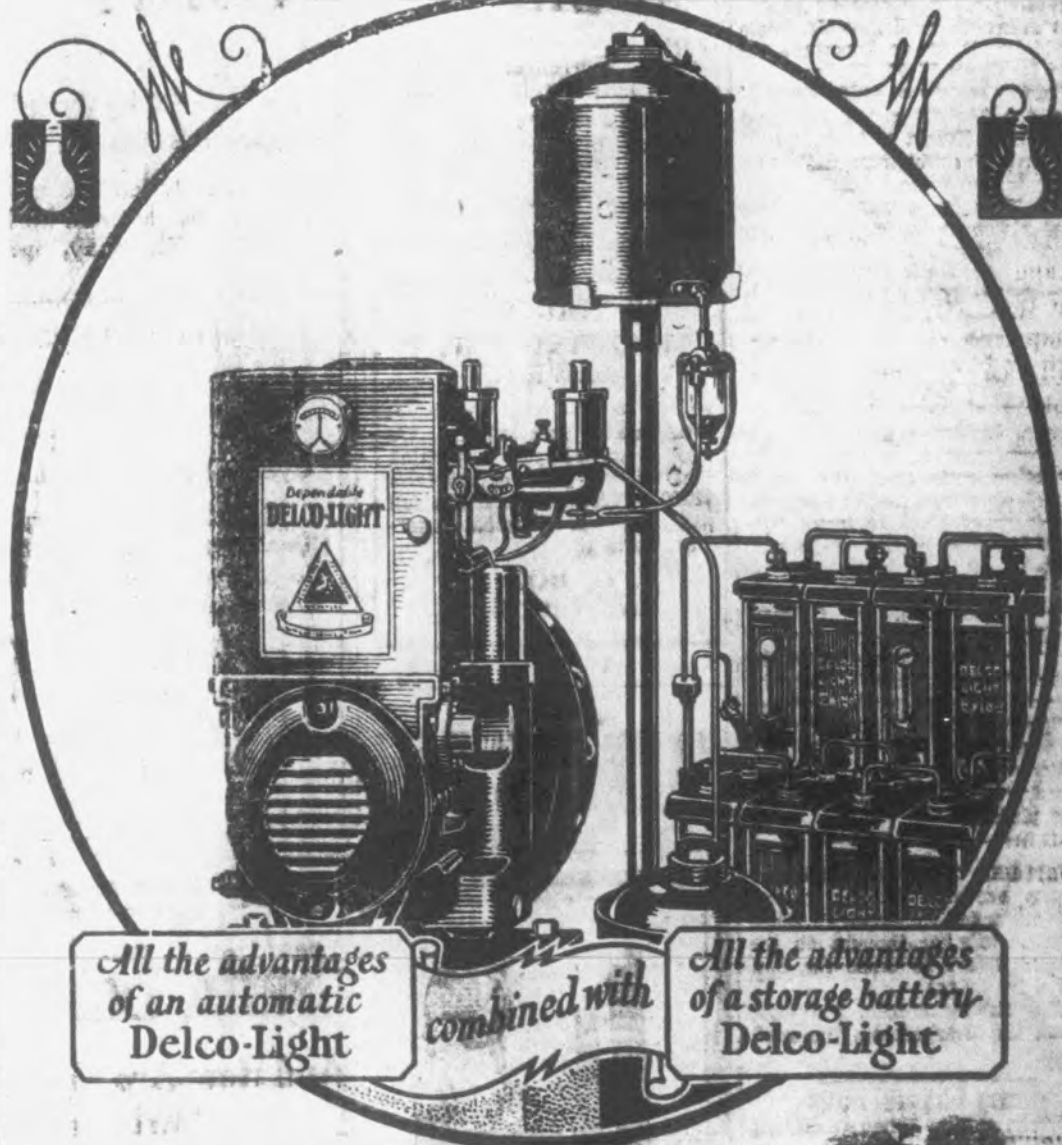
