

Bucharest, Rumania, Nov 25-(AP)-A special dispatch to the with despositions bearing upon that newspaper Dimeata today says that chaos and anarchy are beginning in the Ukraine with hundreds killcd in street fighting.

The dispatch says that hundreds of civilians and soldiers were killed slaving. in fierce fighting in the town of Kamenetz-Podolsk.

The firing of cannon could be head all along the Dniester River the dispatch said, while a meeting a Kishineff of the Rumanian-Rus sian mixed commission was cancell ed because of the disturbances.

Dimeata's dispatch says that the garrison at Odessa, Tirsa-Pol, Moghiley and other cities have passed thing about witnesses for Remus into the hands of the "revolutionground in southern Russia".

Daily struggles between revolution ists and troops who remained loval to the government were reparted in the dispatch.

At KamenetzPodolsk, the authorities were stated to be barricaded in all public institutions. The revolutionists held power for two days but upon the arrival of Soviet reinforcements, the government reconqured the town. The streets were said to be strewn with hundreds of dead and wounded.






