**ONE CAROLINA
GRIDIRON CLUB
STAYS IN RACE**

Raleigh, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The din of cheers of 1927 college football were sounding throughout North Carolina today as four of the big five conference teams folded up their gridiron togs and kicked the pigskin goodby, until another season.

Only the champion of North Carolina State kept their paraphernalia out of the moth balls. The Wolfpack returned home from a victorious siege against the South Carolina Gamecocks to await the coming of the Michigan Argosies on December 3 for an inter-sectional contest.

Collins' Tar Heels of Chapel Hill shared the greatest glory probably due to their sensational and close win over Nial's Virginia Cavaliers, 14-13, the extra point from Capt. Morehead's toe proving the margin of the win after a never-to-be-forgotten visitor caused many gray hairs among home team supporters.

Chapel Hill celebrated its greatest Thanksgiving in history when the \$300,000 Kenan memorial stadium was dedicated with Governor's of both commonwealths leading Dixie's largest throng, 28,000 strong to the bowl.

Duke University brought its Blue Devil aggression home after a sweeping defeat to Davidson's Wildcats, 48-0, in the latter's back yard. Sam Buie, Winston-Salem lad, rose to great heights in the game, which marked what was considered a successful season for Duke but a poor one for Davidson. Carolina and Duke are, 1927 runners up, tied for second place honors.

Wake Forest, after many upsets and apparent misfits, closed its season at the expense of Mercer University in a game at Nashville, an overwhelming victory for the Georgia Baptists.

The star league of football, like the winter pastime of baseball, was ready to open. Newspapers, coaches and individuals began picking mythical elevens with much agreement over qualities of outstanding players forecast.

Jack McDowell, State College's offering for all-southern honors, was attracting attention. On December 17 he is to report for training for the star Dixie team which plays on the Pacific coast during the holidays.

**TWO GEORGIA
GRID TEAMS
IN LIMELIGHT**

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 23.—(AP)—Although 15 of the 22 members of the Southern Conference finished their football season yesterday the gridiron sport today remained the principal subject before the sporting fandom of Dixie. The reason—Georgia Tech and Georgia will battle it out here December 3 in what most observers believe will settle the conference title chase and probably solve the national contending problem as well.

With six conference wins to their credit and a victory over Yale among others on the outside the Athens Bull Dogs have a grasp on both the national title and the Southern Conference crown.

On the other hand, Georgia Tech has ambitions of much more narrow scope, having bowed to Notre Dame with five victories and a tie in the conference and only a victory needed over Georgia to claim the Southern title, the Golden Tornado is looking ahead.

Tennessee, too, has a clear slate in the South, the Volunteers standing with five conference wins, no losses and one tie. North Carolina State with four wins and Vanderbilt with four, although handicapped by two ties, also boast impressive records.

Yesterday's battles found the opinion of the so-called experts right in most quarters. Although the "wise acres" of the gridiron were thrown for a loss at Oxford, Miss. Baton Rouge, La., and Chapel Hill, N. C.

On green swards of those cities Mississippi A & M lost to Old Miss 20 to 12; Tulane beat Louisiana State at Baton Rouge 13 to 6, and North Carolina emerged the victor at Chapel Hill over Virginia 14 to 13. But otherwise the critics were

right. Alabama, as predicted could not halt Georgia's big red team and Birmingham fans saw the Bull Dogs stamp the Crimson Tide 29 to 6 for the first time in six years. Georgia Tech overwhelmed Auburn at Atlanta 18 to 0.

Vanderbilt proved too much for the tigers from Sewanee, beating the Felles 26 to 6.

Tennessee prevailed, as usual, of late over Kentucky 20 to 0. Virginia Military Institute won from Virginia Poly at Roanoke 12 to 9.

Furman of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, had a 28 to 6 margin over Clemson. Florida rushed Washington and Lee's Generals all over the field at Jacksonville for a 20 to 7 verdict.

John Hopkins, an outsider, dashed Maryland aside at Baltimore, 14 to 13.

North Carolina State had Jack McDowell as a margin over South Carolina at Columbia and the final tabulation was 34 to 0.

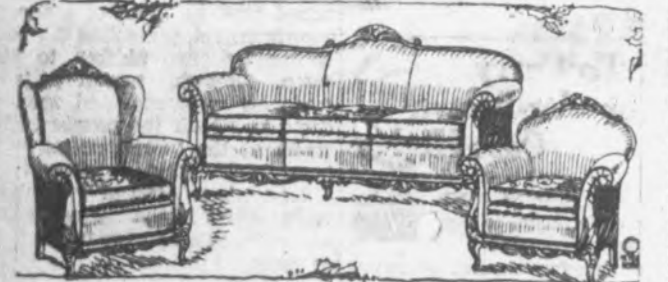

Name Building At The College

Several of the friends and founders of East Carolina Teachers College have recently been honored by several of the buildings on the campus being named in their honor. The Board of Trustees vested in President Wright sometime ago the authority to designate the names of these buildings. The following are the names selected:

The west dormitory will be known as Wilson Hall, named in honor of C. W. Wilson, who was connected with the college from its founding down to his death in 1922. Mr. Wilson was one of the best loved teachers the college has ever had.

The east dormitory will be known as Jarvis Hall, in honor of Governor Jarvis, whose warm interest and untiring efforts in helping to found and build up the college was one of the hobbies of his latter years. It is more than fitting that one of the buildings on the campus should be named in honor of Governor Jarvis. Both the west and east

dormitories which will be known from now on as Wilson Hall and Jarvis Hall, are undergoing remodeling and will be made modern in every particular for the coming school year.

The next building going east, known heretofore as "A" dormitory, has been named Fleming Hall in honor of Hon. J. L. Fleming, the member of the General Assembly from this county in 1907, who introduced the bill for the founding of the college and helped to fight it through the Legislature. Mr. Fleming holds a warm place in the hearts of the friends of the college.

The three-story dormitory known in the past as "B" dormitory, will be known from now on as Cotten Hall in honor of Mrs. Sallie Southall Cotten. Mrs. Cotten has been one of the outstanding women of the state for many years. Her interest and influence in education and other public questions have been far reaching. It is fitting that the college should have a building on its campus named in honor of Mrs. Cotten.

Then comes the library, now the Joyner building named in honor of J. Y. Joyner, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, for many years a member of the Board of

Trustees and one of the staunch friends of the college.

The faculty house, which the farthest building east, until the new practice school building is completed, will be known as Ragsdale Hall, in honor of Mr. W. H. Ragsdale, one of the leading spirits in the founding of the college. At that time, 1907, Mr. Ragsdale was County Superintendent of Schools of Pitt county. Later he became an instructor in the college and remained as instructor until his death in 1914.

The Health Department of the Womens club will begin the sale of Christmas seals next Monday, according to announcement made this morning by Mrs. W. B. Allsbrook, chairman.

"Greenville's quota is 50,000 seals this year" Mrs. Allsbrook said. These will net the sum of \$500. Two-thirds of this amount remains for use in Greenville and Pitt county while the one-third goes to the State for Tuberculosis work.

"Seal sales last year amounted to \$303.31 and \$228.99 remained at home for local use. The sum of \$76.32 went to the State.

"Members of the Woman's club hope the public will buy liberally this year, and assist them in disposing of their allotment of seals by the Christmas holidays. Money spent in this way goes to a worth while cause, and everyone should purchase liberally."

"Thanksgiving Day passed off quietly in Greenville," Mayor J. C. Lanier said this morning.

"A true spirit of thanksgiving prevailed throughout the city, and citizens and the elements alike combined to make the day long to be remembered."

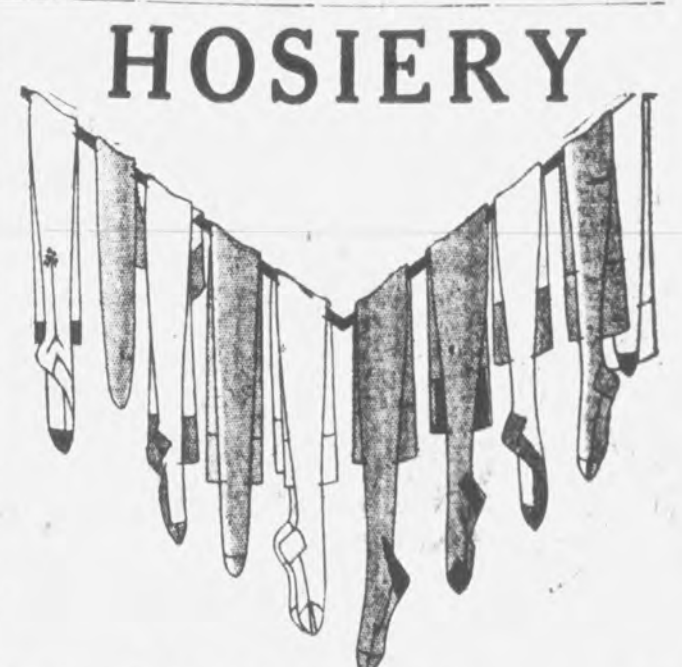
