STATE RESTS CASE AGAINST GEORGE REMUS

Alienists Declare Wife Murderer Was Sane When he Committed the Crime.

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 26.—(AP)—The state rested its case against George Remus on trial for his life for slaying his wife, at 11:22 A. M. today.

With an hour and ten minutes of today's court session left the first witness was called for the defense. He was Leo A. Burke, a Cincinnati attorney who represented Remus at various times during the last several months.

Immediately upon Charles P. Taylor's 2nd declaring the state had completed its direct case, Charles H. Elston, co-counsel with Remus, who acts as his own chief counsel, leaped up with the motion usual in such cases, one for a direct verdict of not guilty.

It was denied by Judge Chester E. Elson.

Elston next moved to have much of the state's evidence stricken. He asserted that the state had failed to prove that Remus acted as an agent of a four-sided conspiracy when he shot his wife. The state maintained that it had proven at least part of that conspiracy charge.

Judge Shook reserved decision upon that point.

Elston moved that the three alienists who just previously had reported officially Remus was sane when he shot Mrs. Remus October 6, last, and was sane now be removed from the judicial dais. They took seats there, just back of the Judge, a few days ago.

Cincinnati, Nov. 26.—(AP)—George Remus was sane when he killed his wife October 6, last, and is sane now as he is on trial for murder, the three alienists appointed by Judge Chester E. Shook, found in a report officially filed today.

The report was provisional, the psychiatrists testified and was based upon interrogation of Remus and observation of him in the court room since the trial started November 14. It might be changed later they said.

This report was not read to the jury. Judge Shook asserted that he accepted it at this time for his own guidance. Had it found Remus insane, Remus would not have been permitted to continue as his own counsel, the court asserted.

The report in full follows: "The undersigned, appointed by this court to determine whether or not defendant, George Remus, is and was at the time of the killing of his wife, to wit, on October 6, 1927, sane or insane:

"Basing our conclusions upon conversations with and examinations of the said George Remus, including our observations of him in the court room during the progress of his trial thus far, we are of the opinion that the said George Remus is now sane and was on October 6, 1927 sane."

"This present opinion, however, is provisional and subject to modification depending upon further developments in the trial."

Dies of Injuries Received in Wreck

Hickory, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Samuel Mitchell, 17, of Taylorsville, died in a Hickory hospital yesterday from injuries received in an automobile accident near Valdese on Thanksgiving night.

Young Mitchell, who with two or three companions was engaged in repairing a puncture by the roadside, was struck and fatally injured by an automobile said to have been driven by S. B. Colburn, of Hillsboro Forest. It was thought that the driver of the automobile was blinded by the lights of a truck which the young men were repairing, and careened directly across the road into the machine of the young man, crushing Mitchell who was standing in front of the car.

A warrant charging Colburn with manslaughter was issued yesterday at Morganton and a \$2,500 bond arranged. It was learned today from the office of the Burke county sheriff.

HEAVY FOG HANGS OVER LONDON TODAY

TODAY PREPARE FOR OIL HEARING AT CAPITAL

Government Summons Many Witnesses in Contempt Case Against Sinclair.

Washington, Nov. 26.—(AP)—District Attorney Gordon expects to subpoena every person who testified before the grand jury in the oil jury tampering case to appear as witnesses for the government at the hearing of the contempt proceedings against Harry F. Sinclair, W. J. Burns and their four associates.

The move to call as government witnesses those who appeared before the grand jury indicated that the government would disclose during the contempt proceedings for the first time evidence it had secured of improper shadowing of the trial jurors. It also indicated that the prosecution would attempt to show through the Burns operatives that the intensive surveillance of the jury was in contempt of court.

While the subpoenas are being served the district attorney's office will lay its plans for presentation of the case before Justice Suddens in which it will seek to show that the events leading up to a declaration of mistrial in the oil case were brought about by improper surveillance of the jury.

Social Life At Washington To Begin Next Week

Washington, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Washington's official social season will be formally launched next week when President and Mrs. Coolidge on Thursday evening give the first of their state functions—the dinner to the cabinet.

Retaining much of the original form that has been in effect since the days when George Washington entertained the President's house in New York city, the state entertainments at the White House are more ostentatious but beautifully planned. Each first lady of the land, however, lends some special individuality to the occasions.

Invitations to many senators and their wives and other high ranking personages in Washington's official life for the reception and concert were issued a week or ten days ago.

NO DISORDER IN UKRAINE

Moscow, Russia, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The soviet foreign office today denied reports of disorder in the town of Kamensk-Podotsk, Ukraine.

The Bucharest newspaper dimenata yesterday said the chaos and anarchy reigned in the Ukraine with hundreds of civilians and soldiers killed in the street fighting in Kamensk-Podotsk garrisons at Odessa, Tiraspol, Nochlye and other cities passed into the hands of "revolutionists, who everywhere are gaining ground in southern Russia," the dispatch to Eimenats said.

No confirmation of the report was to be had in international European news centers.

Three Deaths At Baden Accidental

Baden, Nov. 26.—(AP)—That Ciro Ritchie's zeal for chemical search and experiment with electrical devices resulted in the accidental death of himself, his 23-year old daughter, Ruth, and his 14-year old son, Buren, from the deadly fumes of hydrocyanic acid was the verdict generally accepted here today in explanation of the triple tragedy that occurred at the Ritchie home Thanksgiving night. The bodies were discovered by Mrs. Ritchie as she returned from a theatre. She herself was overcome by the gas which filled the house and her life was probably saved by a neighbor who dragged her to safety.

The verdict of accidental death was reached last night by the coroner's jury summoned by Governor R. M. Lefler had heard a report by a chemist that an improvised electrical battery cell in which Mr. Ritchie was carrying on experiments in re-silvering table ware contained a solution of sulphuric acid and hydro-cyanide.

Dies Suddenly Of Heart Attack

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Captain Salties Van Roskerck commander of the Norfolk division United States Coast Guard, died suddenly from a heart attack as he was preparing to leave his stateroom on a Washington steamer to come ashore at Norfolk today. Apparently in the best of health, the commandant was returning from Washington where he had been for a week's leave.

WAKE FOREST PAYS TRIBUTE TO DEAD PROFESSOR

Raleigh, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Wake Forest college officials and students today standing with heads bowed in reverence as the body of Dr. William A. Johnson was taken from a train at the station here, paid tribute to their fellow faculty member and teacher.

Dr. Johnson, former football star and professor in the school of medicine at Wake Forest, was killed in an automobile accident near Rutherfordton while returning from the Wake Forest-Mercer game at Asheville Thursday.

PEACE SEEN IN EUROPE

London, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Numerous rivalries and suspicions today threatened international peace in Europe.

The Albanian situation, the Italian-Albanian "defensive" treaty and the quarrel between Lithuania and Poland have come to the fore one week before the meeting in Geneva to a disarmament conference held in the hope of furthering peace and good will.

Anxieties in Rumania have been reawakened by the sudden withdrawal of Ionel Bratianu's strong hand. The possibility of former Crown Prince Carol returning to claim the throne has added to the difficulties of an already complicated situation.

The loss of the Premier who dominated the country for more than a quarter of a century, it is feared, may have an adverse effect on Rumania's foreign relations. Hungary is displeased at the treatment of Hungarians in Transylvania, transfer of Hungary to Rumania in 1920 by the Treaty of Trianon. Russia desires to recover Bessarabia, lost to Rumania as a result of the Bolshevik revolution. Bulgaria is nursing her anger over the loss of territory to Rumania because of the world war.

In another direction international jealousies have been strengthened by the recently signed friendship treaty between Italy and Albania. In some quarters the treaty is regarded as a threat of trouble in the Balkans.

The chief cause of immediate concern is above all the quarrel between Poland and Lithuania. In the view of many English commentators this has been aggravated by the Soviet's warping note to Poland, implying that Russia will be found on the side of Lithuania in the event of hostilities.

The Polish annexation of Vilna, the old Lithuanian capital in 1920 while the Polish-Lithuanian frontier was as yet undefined has been making ever since. This notwithstanding the council of the Ambassador's confirmation of Poland's possession in 1923. Quarrels arising from this have increased in tension from time to time and the two nations have been in a state of virtual war, although a bloodless one, since diplomatic relations have never been restored between them.

Folsom Prison Quiet Today

Folsom Prison, Cal., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Folsom prison, scene of a Thanksgiving day uprising among 1,200 convicts which did not end until it had cost the lives of eleven men and resulted in the wounding of 31 others, remained quiet today, awaiting the inquiry of the state board of prison directors, which was called together to investigate the revolt.

The board, which laid plans for examining prison guards and others, issued a statement denying that Folsom convicts had become restless because the board had failed to keep up with its parole calendar and was behind in fixing sentences.

The six convicts who confessed that with the aid of one pistol, an ax, and a few knives, they led off the 1,200 imprisoned men to the uprising, which defied 600 national guardsmen, and more than 200 civil officers for nearly twenty-four hours, remained in solitary confinement.

Ward Smith has announced that the six would be charged with conspiracy to commit murder as the result of the killing of one of the two guards who were among the dead as a result of the break. The charge carries a sentence of death in California.

Funeral Services to Be Held in Goldsboro Tomorrow Afternoon

Word received this morning announced the death of Mr. R. L. Crow, early today at Southern Pines. Funeral services will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at Goldsboro, his former home.

Mr. Crow came to this city from Goldsboro in 1917 and entered the shoe business. Before he was forced to retire because of bad health about three years ago, he was very active in local business circles and was held in high esteem. He was a member of the Methodist Church, a charter member of the Greenville Rotary Club and a member of fraternal organizations.

He is survived by his wife and a son, Robert Crow, Jr., of this city.

COL. FORBES OUT OF JAIL

Leavenworth, Kansas, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Announcing his most important mission in life would be to "correct the erroneous impression the public has been given of president Harding", Colonel Charles R. Forbes today returned to civilian life after completing service on a two year term in the federal penitentiary here.

The 49-year-old former director of the United States veteran's bureau, who was convicted in Chicago in 1925 of defrauding the government in awarding contracts for veterans' hospitals, was released at midnight.

Clad in a neat business suit, his hat concealing his grey hair, he emerged from the prison gate with a firm step in marked contrast to his entry. Rigorous application to his profession of civil engineer in surveying penitentiary property and even in welding a hammer and saw in construction work, apparently has restored him to the health he enjoyed in a long army career.

He paused only long enough to issue a statement on his plans for the future before entering an automobile with a newspaperman of St. Louis. They left immediately for that city.

His statement, dealing largely with recommendations for handling prisoners in various types of penal institutions, concluded with the announcement he "had startling facts to reveal" relative to his connection with the Harding administration.

AGED RALEIGH GROCER ROBBED AND BEATEN BY UNKNOWN PARTIES

Raleigh, Nov. 26.—(AP)—His recovery uncertain, Joseph S. Wiggs, aged Raleigh grocer, was in a hospital here today with his head battered by a pick as a result of an attack and robbery by unknown parties at his store late yesterday.

Following an all night search by police of Raleigh and nearby cities, several suspects were held for inquiry, including one who gave his name as H. C. Gibson, of Lexington. He was arrested aboard a freight train in Durham and was alleged to have fitted the description of the man sought.

Full details of the attack were gradually brought to light. "A white man," murdered the aged Wiggs when asked who hit him. Then he lapsed into unconsciousness while physicians said his recovery was very uncertain.

Believed to have turned his back on a customer to get a soft drink from an ice box, Wiggs later was found in his store, his head gashed and blood on the floor. The store cash drawer was empty.

One of the suspects held was found wearing shoes with spots of blood on them.

MANUFACTURERS CENSUS TO BE TAKEN THIS YEAR

Raleigh, Nov. 26.—(AP)—North Carolina's federal census of manufacturers will be taken by the state department of conservation and development as the agent of the United States department of commerce this year, it was announced here last night by Wade H. Phillips, director.

The census is made every two years.

GOV. SPEAKS AT OPENING OF HIGHWAY

South Hill, Va., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Opening of the last hard surfaced link of federal highway No. 1 call have no other effect than further cementing the friendly relations that have always existed between Virginia and North Carolina. Gov. Angus W. McLean of North Carolina, declared today at the ceremonies celebrating the occasion.

"During the past three centuries, Virginia and North Carolina have stood together," he said. "Few states in the union have had a firmer basis for abiding friendship and mutual understanding.

"In settlement and in colonization you Virginians took the lead, as you have in many other respects. But, if you did take the lead, we evened that score by attracting many of your hardy and pioneer citizens to settle in and build up North Carolina and Virginia have reached their present high positions by following parallel lines.

"The opening of this more than 200 miles of highway, forming a link in the great transcontinental route from Canada to Southern Florida, is an important event in highway construction. I look upon it as being even more significant in many respects than the opening of the cross-continent railroads 50 years ago. It will mean more in the interchange of ideas and communication between our people. The route starts at Port Kent, Maine, near the Canadian line, extending a distance of 2,393 miles by the tip of a reache Miami, Florida. In addition to traversing these two states, it passes through all of the original thirteen states, marked still closer the life that has bound them together since the period of their struggle for independence.

"Today one person in five of an average of about each family in the United States, owns an automobile. The total amount invested in railroad equipment and facilities in North Carolina is about \$250,000,000, as against about \$500,000,000 invested in facilities and equipment for automobile transportation.

"The completion of this link in the great north to south highway is not an end within itself, but an important means to still greater development and progress in education, industry, commerce and agriculture.

BRITISH BUSINESS MEN WANT PEACE

London, Nov. 26.—(AP)—A move for British industrial peace has been made by an influential group of employers headed by Sir Alfred Mond, it was stated on good authority today.

"This group has sent the general council of the trade union congress a letter which was considered so important that full consideration was deferred until the next meeting of the powerful labor body.

It is stated that there is good reason to believe that the trade union leaders regard the employers' invitation most favorably and will respond quickly. There is every prospect that a conference will be arranged within a week or two.

ARMY-NAVY CLASH TODAY

New York, Nov. 26—(AP)—Two fighting arms of Uncle Sam—the Army and the Navy—pitched camp today to settle on a field of battle barred with thick chalk lines the time honored question of service foot ball supremacy.

For the battle of the Polo grounds the most colorful gridiron spectacle of the year, the boys moulded into the ways of war at West Point were represented by a great eleven defeated only by mighty Yale.

The gray coats of the Navy, prouder of their inexperience, lost huge chunks of hide to Michigan and Notre Dame but success today would be a successful season.

Other navy elevens, equally great as this one, have faced greater army teams in the course of their 23 years warfare and have risen to glorious heights.

Army has met defeat but 19 times while winning 14 games in the series. Three have been ties, including the blistering conflict of last fall, when two mighty lines and two great line backs matched point for point in a 21-21 deadlock before 120,000 fortunate fans in Chicago.

From that eleven army has saved most of her hidden weapons while the middies, stricken by rapid fire, were forced to rebuild from little tried material an aggregation that has developed slowly on the shores of Chesapeake Bay.

Among the 75,000 people fortunate enough to be entitled to enter the national league ball park were members of the cabinet, Admirals of the navy and generals of the army rubbing elbows with the cadet and middie corps and losing dignity for two hours at least in the glamour of the nation's fall spectacle. There were 700,000 applicants for their seats.
