

STRONG TEAMS OF LAST YEAR AGAIN WIN OUT

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 29.—(AP)—With state title chasers over of waning in those sections that indulge in that manner of calculating the strength of their teams, a review of the season shows the strong teams in many spots to be the same that dominated a year ago.

Along the Atlantic seaboard, Virginia, North Carolina State and Furman stood out. The Cavaliers established Charlottesville supremacy in the Old Dominion, beating Virginia Military Institute, Virginia Poly and Washington and Lee.

The Wolf pack of Raleigh led the "big five" of North Carolina, beating Wake Forest, Davidson, Duke and the University of North Carolina.

Furman had its own way in South Carolina, pouncing Clemson, the University of South Carolina and others.

In Georgia the teams do not all play each other but the University of Georgia and Georgia Tech stand out with Saturday's game between the two to decide the edge.

Stetson and the University of Florida leading the peninsula state in strength shown. Both won victories over strong teams, the Alligators however, meeting more highly touted opponents.

Centenary of Louisiana has the best record of any team in that state, the gentlemen winning ten games and losing none.

Mississippi College and Ole Miss turned in the best records in Mississippi. The Clinton team won eight games in the S. I. A. A. while Ole Miss, although losing to Tulane and Tennessee, among others, also offset this by beating Mississippi A. & M., Louisiana State and Sewanee.

The University of Alabama, although not up to past form, had the most impressive showing of any team in that state. Howard had the next best record with the Auburn and Loyola and a win over Birmingham Southern.

Tennessee and Vanderbilt each had a fine record in Tennessee and the two battled to a 7-7 draw when they met late in the year. Chattanooga was also strong.

The University of Kentucky and Georgetown College stood above others in the blue grass state, although the Wildcats of Lexington was below form of other years.

WOLFPACK HAS LEAD OF ALL STATE TEAMS

Raleigh, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Defeated only by Furman, State College's state championship Wolfpack stood out today in the statistical record of big five teams as the only North Carolina eleven with a percentage above 500 in the matter of games won and lost. Its mark is 889.

The pack this season has won eight of its nine games and has one more to go, meeting Michigan state here Saturday.

Davidson, by virtue of its victories over out of state eleven, finished with an even 500. Duke followed with 444; Carolina 400; and Wake Forest 350.

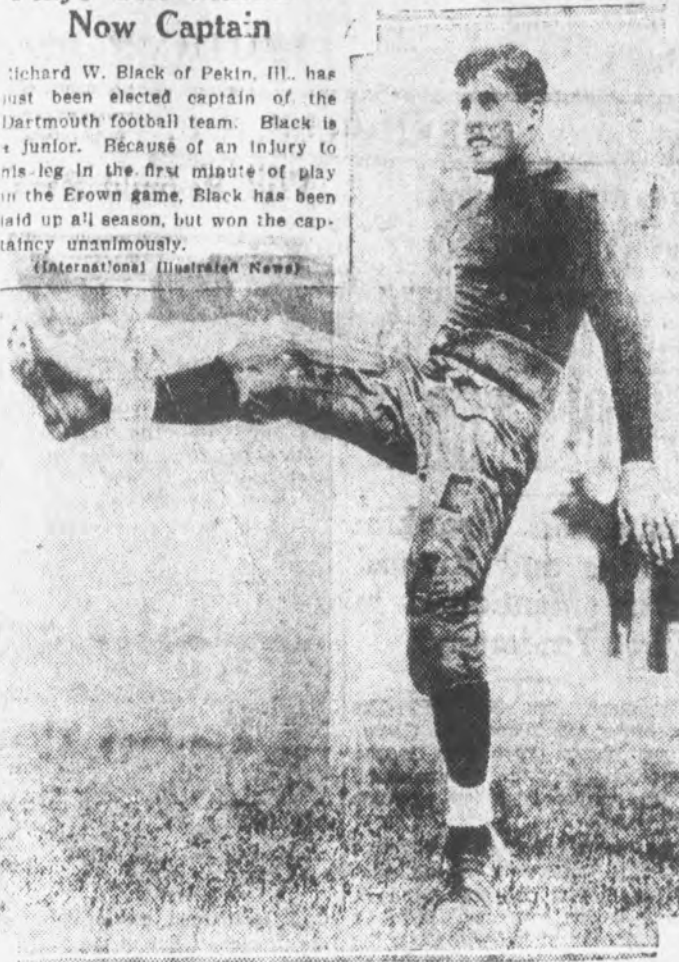
Duke's offensive reached the highest mark in number of points scored. Led by the plunging John Jankowski, fullback who alone scored 109 points, the Blue Devils counted 115 points against nine opponents who registered 117. State follows with 197 points against 69 for the week's opponents. Carolina, Davidson and Wake Forest follow in the order named.

Jankowski was seconded by Bob Warren, Wolfpack fullback, who scored eight touchdowns for 48 points. Dick Grey, Davidson, got 18 while Bill Adams of Duke and Frank Goodwin, State, tied for third place with six touchdowns each.

British Fighter Scores Knockout Over Nebraskan

New York, Nov. 29.—(AP)—The invasions of two foreign heavyweights, both seeking to battle onto a match with champion Gene Tunney, ended at opposite turns in the fistful road today.

Coming back after a crushing one-round knockout at the hands of Knute Hansen, Minnesota Dane, Phil Scott, British heavyweight champion, knocked out Monte Munn, giant Nebraskan eight seconds before the close of their ten-round bout last night. Scott lashed the big westerner with solid right hand smashes to the head from the start but could not floor him until the match was nearly over.

Then one clean drive to the chin toppled Munn to the canvas. He struggled to his feet a fraction of a second after the count was completed. In only the seventh round did Munn's aggressiveness give him an edge on fighting. Scott weighed 195; Munn 219.

Pistie fortune was not so kind to Jack Humeback in the Belgian champion's American debut against Arthur Dekuh, Italian heavyweight. The husky invader smashed Dekuh frequently with heavy left hooks to the head but lost the decision in ten rounds when Dekuh nailed him consistently with solid right smashes. Both were in trouble on several occasions but each rallied without suffering a knockdown. Humeback scaled 202 1-2 pounds; Dekuh 206 1-2.

MANY CHANGES IN THE WORLD OF BASEBALL

New York, Nov. 29.—(AP)—With the football season all but over except for occasional interseasonal clashes, baseball popped back into the limelight today with a series of swift changes in personnel and management.

As one of the foremost young stars of the National League—Kiki Cuyler—passed from the Pittsburgh Club in the National League to the Chicago Cubs in exchange for Earl (Spark Plug) Adams, second baseman, and Floyd Scott, outfielder, two venerable stars of the Yankee team past drifted out of the American League for the time being.

And, as the Yankees announced, the unconditional release of pitchers Bob Shawkey, right handed veteran, and Dutch Reuther, southpaw, the Philadelphia Athletics hoisted Eddie Collins to a position as general assistant to Connie Mack, veteran pilot.

The Cleveland Indians selected Billy Evans, umpire for many years in the American league, as the new general manager of the club to take over the duties relinquished by E. S. Barnard, recently named president of the American League.

Manager John McGraw of the New York Giants, announced that his club would train this spring at Augusta, Ga., instead of Sarasota, Fla., where the Giants have taken on their early season polishing for the past four seasons. McGraw said a one year agreement would test the Georgia climate thoroughly and decide his preference in the future between the two states.

Change Date of Meeting of County Historical Club

FALKLAND, Nov. 27.—It has been thought wise to change the plan for the organization of a permanent Pitt County Historical Association. According to the plans laid by those who met in the early fall and set up a temporary organization, a mass meeting of interested citizens was to be called in late November for the purpose of electing officers and adopting a constitution for a permanent county association.

Upon further consideration, it has been thought best to delay such organization until after the meeting of the State Historical Association in Raleigh December 1 and 2, so that the temporary officers and committees appointed to work out a constitution for the county association might have benefit of help and information from the state meeting. The county historian expects to be present at the state meeting, one helpful feature of which will be a conference of county historians for the purpose of discussion of county history and probable organization. It is sincerely hoped that other Pitt county citizens interested in history will go up to Raleigh for the conference, the program for which contains addresses by eminent historians and leaders of historical research. The dates for this state conference are Thursday and Friday, December the first and second.

Grand Chancellor, J. Fred Brower, Jr., recognizing the merit of this man while living and the great loss in his death, appointed a committee to recommend some suitable memorial to be erected in his memory. That committee recommended the erection at the Pythian home at Clayton, N. C., a much needed new building to be known as the "Meares Memorial." What greater deed can North Carolina Pythians do than this erect a memorial to one so well beloved and at the same time build a home for those little ones who came fortune less left homeless and penniless in this world.

"We expect to sell in the neighborhood of sixty million pounds this year. We were able to do this through the co-operation of the tobaccoist, the business man and the farmer. Next year will see even a greater record—at least that's what we are looking forward to at this time."

"The sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals is now in progress, stated members of the Women's club today.

"We hope to be able to sell our entire allotment within the next few days. This can be easily accomplished by the co-operation of business men, who have always bought liberally."

Bondsmen Pay Out Embezzler At Gastonia

Gastonia, N. C., Nov. 29.—(AP)—J. H. White, former tax collector of Dallas township, today is free as a result of an unexpected turn in his case at a special term of the Gaston superior court here late yesterday in which an agreement was reached whereby relatives would pay the bondsmen \$11,500. He was accused of embezzling something like \$26,000 of county tax funds. The bondsmen had released the county.

When the special term of court opened yesterday White's attorneys announced they would seek a change of venue. Attorneys and officials conferred most of the morning and when court convened in the afternoon White entered a plea of nolo contendere to the embezzling charge and pleaded guilty to forcible trespass.

It was agreed that S. Morris Wilson, a son-in-law of White, would pay the nineteen bondsmen \$10,000 and that the bondsmen would get the rent from White's farm this year. This is one-half the sum the bondsmen must pay the county under civil judgments rendered some time ago in the case.

Sounds Call To Mexican People

Mexico City, Nov. 28.—(AP)—A warning to his followers to be on the alert and not to permit reaction to hinder the development of the aspirations of the Mexican people has been sounded by General Ivarro Obregon, sole remaining Mexican presidential candidate.

Speaking at Toluca, state of Mexico, he declared:

"When an ant bites us we do not after that particular ant, but we put a tubful of boiling water on the ant hill."

Notice should be taken that the revolutionary leaders at present are directing their campaign against the government from abroad, he said. They, therefore, cannot be reached, he continued, and punishment should fall upon reactionaries in Mexico. This, he explained, was the purpose for which the league for the defense of the revolution was created.

The reactionary faction will create revolution forever, he declared, the struggle lasting until the end of the world. Efforts to exterminate reaction must therefore be unceasing, he said.

Charles Manville Claimed By Death

Pleasantville, N. Y., Nov. 28.—(AP)—After an eventful life of 83 years the career of Charles B. Manville, founder of the Johns-Manville Corporation and alleged corporations, ended, succumbing to a stroke, apoplexy suffered a week ago, the industrial adventurer who built up a huge fortune from asbestos and its by-products, died at his home here late Saturday night.

Mr. Manville left his native home, Watertown, N. Y., as a young man and headed west. He became interested in mining and his prospecting journeys carried him to California, the Black Hills of South Dakota and to Mexico. He later turned to mining and engaged in the manufacture of clothing in Milwaukee. It was then that he became interested in the production of an effective insulating material, particularly something to cover heat insulating pipes.

He first evolved a product of wool, clay and sand in 1858 he established the business which has grown into world wide prominence.

After Mr. Manville began using a mixture of 15 per cent asbestos and 85 per cent magnesia, now almost universally used for heat insulating purposes. In 1900 he moved his headquarters to New York and purchased the H. N. Johns Company, a concern engaged in much the same business.

In recent years the Johns-Manville corporation has undertaken the manufacture of a wide variety of products and the company now has assets in excess of \$32,000,000.

BOUGHT HE WAS SHOT BUT IT WAS ALL MISTAKE

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 28.—(AP)—took six policemen and a mirror convince Henry Haines, a local filling station manager, that he wasn't shot in the neck by a bandit he held him up today.

The bandit held him up, Haines said, and ordered him to open the lid. "I told him I didn't know the combination. Then I heard a shot."

"I'm shot, I'm shot?" Haines yelled, hearing the robber away and ringing neighbors and police. He was carefully carried into an adjoining house where newspapers are spread on the couch to catch blood.

But, police noticed, there wasn't any blood, and examination showed no trace of a wound.

"I can't understand it," Haines said later, still visibly excited. "I'm just sure I felt a shot in my neck."

Mrs. Isbell is 40 years old, the mother of two girls. The Isbells were married in 1910, separating two years ago. The suit for divorce which asks \$500 a month alimony, is on file in a Chicago court.

Elizabeth City, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Little improvement was reported today in the condition of Mrs. W. S. Overman, under treatment in a Norfolk hospital for Tetanus. Physicians believe she will recover, relatives said.

BENNET DOTY WILL BE RELEASED AT ORAN

Paris, Nov. 29.—(AP)—The release of Bennett J. Doty, of Biloxi, Miss., from the French Foreign Legion will take place at Oran, Algeria.

The release has been hanging fire a week. The Ministry of War's instructions to Doty's colonel were to muster him out of the service at Oran and deliver him to Albert H. Elford, the American consular agent there.

Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, state commissioner of public welfare, reviewed work of the state board of charities and public welfare and reports were made from the counties in the district: Caswell, Durham, Franklin, Halifax, Harnett, Johnston, Moore, Nash, Orange, Person, Wake and Warren.

Police Storm House at Boston

Boston, Nov. 29.—(AP)—A gun battle between six policemen who besieged a south end house and its four inhabitants for hours ended at daybreak today when riot squads stormed the building and dragged out two negroes and two women one of whom was white. Scores of shots were fired. Tear bombs were used. The men set up a barricade when police attempted to quell a disturbance resulting from an all night party. Several thousand persons were attracted to the scene by the sound of firing as police and the men exchanged shots.

It is there that the police say William Skidmore and Jack Zola gather to transact their affairs.

Standand, Perry, and Snow were convicted at the last term of Federal court here on charges of conspiring to violate the national prohibition act. The men were arrested after the discovery by Federal officers of a \$10,000 cache of whiskey near Standand's home in Calabash.
