LEAGUE ENDS SESSIONS AT GENEVA TODAY

Russia Meets Defeat in Selection of Date For Next Disarmament Meeting.

Geneva, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The preparatory disarmament conference, which opened November 30, adjourned today after Soviet Russia had suffered a defeat in selection of the date for the next meeting.

Russia wanted the commission to meet again on January 10 but the commission put the date off until March 15.

Russia, however, will not bolt the disarmament discussions despite the fact that the date of the next meeting was not fixed in accordance with the Russian desire.

"Certainly we shall return to Geneva for the next disarmament meeting on March 15," Maxim Litvinoff, the Russian delegate, said in response to a question about the Soviet attitude. "We have said we shall always attend meetings which promise to bring about disarmament. We are for disarmament, first, last and forever."

President Louder, opening today's session, announced that several delegates had called his attention to what they described as "exaggerated" figures concerning the size of various armies and armaments contained in the Russian statistical paper submitted to back up the Soviet proposal for complete disarmament and to prove that armaments are vastly larger than before the war.

President Louder also remarked that some of the delegates thought that some of the phrases appearing in the Russian document "were not in accord with league customs." This was an allusion to certain critical assertions made in the Soviet document. The president, however, pleaded against any discussion of these matters at present, saying that nothing could be gained thereby.

Maxim Litvinoff, the Soviet delegate, then took the offensive for a quick disarmament discussion by submitting a resolution whereby disarmament should not be made to hinge on the results of the security negotiations and requesting that the next meeting of the disarmament should not be made to hinge on the results of the security negotiations and requesting that the next meeting of the disarmament commission be convened for January 10, 1928.

"We Russians are convinced that the date of the next session of the disarmament commission should not depend on what may not be done by the special committee which is studying security," Litvinoff said. "We do not regard the work of his latter committee as indispensable to the success of disarmament. Moreover, the program drawn up for the attention of the security committee consists largely in an extension to remodeling the covenant of the league of nations."

Then alluding to the United States as well as Russia, Litvinoff remarked:

"How some of us here represented are not members of the league."

The Russian resolution began by emphasizing the complications of the problems and the inevitable length of time involved in discussion of them. It then declared that solution of the problem of disarmament gives in and by itself the most effective guarantees of security and security justifies neither discussion nor solution of the problems submitted to the security committee.

The resolution concluded that the preparatory commission proceed to an immediate elaboration of the disarmament program and call its next meeting on January 10, 1927, being convinced that disarmament proper can in no way depend on the outcome of the security deliberations.

Foreign Minister Benes of Czechoslovakia opposed the Russian resolution on the ground that the league security negotiations should be conducted simultaneously with the work of the disarmament commission.

Germany again sided with Russia, count von Bernstorff saying that he was more or less of the same opinion as Litvinoff but that he was more or less of the same opinion as Litvinoff but that he thought the date Jan. 10 was too close.

Recess was taken to permit the Germans to prepare an amendment.

Count von Bernstorff's amendment proved to be virtually a repetition of the text of the Russian resolution with the exception provided that the next meeting be convened at the earliest convenient date. The German amendment, however, contained a new assertion that disarmament should be based on the present state of security.

AGED CITIZEN PASSES AWAY

John H. Boyd, Sr., Died Early This Morning Following Severe Illness.

John H. Boyd, Sr., died this morning at his home on Dickinson Avenue at 3:40 o'clock following severe illness of ten days, although he had been in declining health for several years.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home Sunday afternoon at three o'clock by his pastor, Rev. R. J. Bamber, of the Christian Church, assisted by Rev. H. Frederick Jones, pastor of Memorial Baptist church.

Mr. Boyd was 71 years of age, having been born about three miles from Greenville, May 15, 1856.

He was married twice, the first time in October, 1877, to Miss Anne Hoover, of Washington. Four children survive this union: Mrs. J. T. Strickland Wilson; C. O. H. Boyd, of New Bern; E. H. and J. H. Boyd, Jr., of Greenville.

He is also survived by his second wife, who was formerly Miss Sallie Evans of Greenville. No children survive this union.

Four Prisoners Receive Parole

Raleigh, Dec. 3.—(AP)—On parole, four prisoners last night left the state penitentiary to begin life anew in gainful occupations. Two were serving terms for murder, one for highway robbery and another for "shooting dynamite."

The men were: C. T. Barbee, convicted in Orange county in September, 1919, for murder and sentenced to 15 years; Oscar Martin, sentenced to Mecklenburg county in February, 1926, to serve ten years for highway robbery; Dock Hendrix, Caldwell county, serving from 5 to 10 years, since August, 1920, for murder; and Hugh Collins, serving two years, from July 1926, for "shooting dynamite."

WILLIS BEACH TESTIFIES IN MURDER CASE

Denies That he had Part in the Murder of Dr. Lillenedahl in New Jersey.

Courtroom, Mays Landing, N. J., Dec. 3.—(AP)—For two hours and 20 minutes today Willis Beach defended himself against a charge of murder at the Lillenedahl murder trial, and at recess for lunch he was still on the witness stand.

He categorically denied that he had any part in the killing of Dr. A. William Lillenedahl, whose widow is his co-defendant, that he had ever confessed the killing to a circus cowboy in Baltimore, and that he had ever had a love affair with his co-defendant, which might have furnished a motive for the crime.

Beach was a placid witness, even seeming to enjoy the prominence of his position in the box. Once he permitted himself a pun and joked about the efficiency of the police who sought him for ten days when he was in hiding after the crime.

He testified that during that time he was living in an attic of a friend's house in Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Lillenedahl was an interested spectator of her co-defendant's testimony and nodded and smiled when he testified that the "Peggy Anderson" letters which passed between them were not secret love letters but solicitous queries on Beach's part as to her husband's health and formal replies on her part.

Speculation Runs Wild in Ranks of G. O. P. Members

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Rapid additions to the ranks of the Republican national committee, which is assembling here to select a convention city for next year, brought political speculation more prominently to the front today although the committee members already have let their fancy carry them far from the purpose which called them to Washington.

Coming to the conclusion that an elaboration by President Coolidge on his "do not choose" statement of the Black Hills is not an early prospect, some of the committee men have begun to discuss other men available for the nomination.

Underneath the speculations, however, seems to be a tendency to deal with candidates cautiously, and only a few of the committee men so far are willing to permit their names to be brought into the discussions.

The names of Hoover, Dawes, Lowden and Hughes are most frequently heard and here and there, as in the case of Curtis of Kansas, a favorite son is being advocated. While vice-president Dawes is mentioned by one as an out-and-out first choice, virtually all of the committee-men who mention candidates favor him in the event their own particular candidate cannot win.

ASSURES VOTE ON FARM BILL

Curtis Declares Other Matters of Independents to Get Action Also.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Assurances were given today by Senator Curtis of Kansas, the Republican leader, that there would be votes at the coming session of the three measures western independent Republican senators desire acted upon.

The subjects are farm relief bill, the bill dealing with the issuance of injunctions by federal courts and a resolution for an investigation into American activities in Central and South America.

"While I cannot speak for the Republican activity," Senator Curtis told the independents, "I can assure you that personally, without committing myself on the matters covered by your letter, I feel that you are entitled to a final vote during the first session of the seventy-ninth Congress on these questions. As leader of the Republican majority, I will gladly make every effort to secure consideration and final vote on them when they are reported from the committees to which they are referred."

COOLIDGE TO VISIT CUBANS BEGINS FLIGHT TO NICARAGUA

President to Address Pan-American Congress at Havana Next Month.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—President Coolidge is to carry the greetings and good wishes of the United States to her neighbor nations next month, journeying to Havana to address the sixty pan-American Congress.

Under present plans, he will be accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, Secretary Kellogg and possibly Secretary Wilson, and will go by special train to Key West, where a war ship will be waiting to convey the party to the Cuban capital.

Due, however, to the fact that Congress will be in session and other considerations making his presence in Washington advisable, his stay at Havana is to be comparatively brief. It is expected that he will arrive the day before his speech is scheduled to be made and leave shortly after it has been delivered. The Congress will open January 10.

Although it had been known for some time that the President looked with favor on the project of making the trip, announcement that he had come to a definite decision was made only late yesterday. Mr. Coolidge has received numerous invitations to stop off at points in the south, but it is anticipated that his desire to be away from the capital no longer than is necessary will prevent his accepting. It is probable that his special train will make no stops other than those made necessary by railroad operation. It has been suggested, however, that the journey to and from Key West be made by different routes, so that he may see as much of the south as possible, a section of the country that he has had no opportunity of visiting since entering the White House.

Major Brainard was at the controls when the hop-off was made. His preliminary figures had allowed ten hours for the jump to Managua, which was to be made southward to Havana, east to the tip of Yucatan, down the Yucatan coast and across into Nicaragua.

Miami, Fla., Dec. 3.—(AP)—The United States marine airplane which started from Miami this morning on a non-stop flight to Managua, Nicaragua, had not been sighted over Havana at 11:30 a. m. The Miami Daily News was informed from the Cuban capital by long-distance telephone. An official announcement from the Cuban war department was quoted. Before he hopped off at 6:22 a. m. Major E. H. Brainard, pilot of the plane, said he would "be over Havana in two hours."

Similar reports of "no information" were received in a check of Florida East Coast Railway offices as far south as Key West.

Commander B. Jordan of the Fort Lauderdale Coast Guard base said none of his boats in south Florida waters had reported sight of the ship. The patrol boats are in constant communication with headquarters base by radio.

Miami, Florida, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Major E. H. Brainard and his crew of two on a non-stop flight to Nicaragua may be fighting a considerable headwind, the weather bureau here announced shortly before noon. A general south wind of 16 to 18 miles per hour at ground level over part of the course was indicated, it was said. It was pointed out that the wind might be much stronger in the high altitudes.

STILL SEARCH FOR CHILDREN AT ASHEVILLE

Defectives Unable to Locate Woman Who Kidnapped Her Children Yesterday.

Asheville, Dec. 3.—(AP)—While detectives pushed a vigorous search through four states for Mrs. G. Wallace Bryant, and her two little daughters, Marjorie, 6, and Frances, 4, whom she is alleged to have kidnapped Wednesday, the estranged husband and father lay in a hospital here in a state of nervous collapse and suffering from a malady which has kept him confined for nine months.

Bryant, a nephew of Henry Ford, dreads the publicity which is attending the case because of his uncle but eagerly awaits reports of officers who are endeavoring to return his children to him.

Mrs. Bryant became estranged from her husband shortly before he filed a suit for \$100,000 against Henry Westall, Asheville Clubman and golfer charging alienation of Mrs. Bryant's affections. The Buncombe juvenile court took the children from her and placed them in the care of Mrs. J. G. Floyd.

It was while the children were returning to Mrs. Floyd's from their daily visit to their father in a sanatorium here that Mrs. Bryant is alleged to have kidnapped them. Sending the negro nurse attending the children back into the hospital with a note to Mr. Bryant, the mother is said to have entered a taxicab with the children but they were not returned to Mrs. Floyd's home and are believed to have been taken by their mother either to Florida, Philadelphia or Detroit.

Bryant rose from his sick bed to swear out a warrant for Mrs. Bryant's arrest on a charge of kidnapping and then returned to the hospital to lay helpless while the search was being made.

LIGHT SALES OF TOBACCO DURING WEEK

Local Market Sold 2,094,532 Pounds of Bright Leaf at Average of \$24.54.

The Greenville tobacco market this week sold 2,094,532 pounds of tobacco for \$514,129.06 at an average of \$24.54 per hundred pounds, according to official figures compiled this morning by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the local Tobacco Board of Trade.

The report showed that for the entire season the market had disposed of a total of 55,957,880 pounds for a total sum of \$13,336,023.81 at an average of \$23.83 per hundred pounds.

Tobaccoists today were confident that the market would sell sixty million pounds of bright leaf during the present season. Sales were lighter this week than any single week since the opening of the market, but the price situation was favorable and farmers expressed themselves as highly pleased.

The market will close for the Christmas holidays Friday December 16th, according to a decision this morning.

No Poison Found in the Viscera of Henderson Youth

Hendersonville, Dec. 3.—(AP)—No poison was found in the viscera of Edd Lydia, Henderson youth, who was found dead in a room at his home near here three weeks ago, according to a report by State Chemist W. M. Allen, who made an examination, and Sheriff John C. Hill today reiterated an earlier statement that he believed the young man died of natural causes.

The viscera of young Lydia was sent to the state chemist for analysis along with that of Lydia Case, whose body was discovered in a barn on the Souther place near Hendersonville the morning before the young man's death. Coroner Albert Beck received a report on the examination of the young woman's viscera last week but withheld announcement.

GEORGETOWN VISITED BY DISASTROUS FIRE

Georgetown, S. C., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Damage estimated at approximately \$250,000 was done here today by fire which destroyed a large part of the plant of the Brooklyn Co-operative Company.

Property destroyed included \$27,000 worth of barrel staves, material, brick and steel kilns and valuable special machinery. The origin of the fire has not been determined. The loss is said to be covered by insurance.

FAVOR MORE CRUISERS IN NAVY FLEET

Administration to Recommend Increase of Cruisers at Next Congress.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The administration, it is announced, at the White House, will recommend that the coming Congress authorize further additions to the Navy's fleet of cruisers.

A number of the present vessels of that class are considered as having passed their period of usefulness and it is believed that these should be replaced.

The construction of eight cruisers of the first class already has been authorized by Congress, to be added to the ten now in commission. Even with this addition, it is pointed out at the navy department, the United States will be short of the cruiser tonnage to which it is entitled under the 5-5-3 ratio, and the general board of the navy has recommended to the budget program calling for six cruisers a year. While there have been no indications of what specific recommendations the administration will make, it is understood President Coolidge favors this plan.

Besides the ten first class cruisers, all of which are capable of a speed of 35 knots an hour, the navy at present has twenty vessels of this class whose speed is placed below 25 knots.

Five of these have been in service since the Spanish war, including the Olympia which carried the flag of Admiral Dewey at Manila, and the Rochester, Admiral Sampson's flagship at Santiago.

The Navy general board also has recommended a construction program for destroyers and submarines.

DOTY LEAVES ORAN TODAY

Mississippi Man Placed Aboard Freighter by Military Authorities Today.

Oran, Algeria, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Bennett J. Doty, of Biloxi, Miss., who has just been released from serving the remainder of his enlistment in the French foreign legion, was embarked by the military authorities aboard the freighter Taina which left for Marseilles at 8 o'clock this morning.

The original plan was that Doty take a regular passenger steamer leaving Oran at five o'clock tonight, but the authorities, stressing the fact that he will be under military control until he leaves Cherbourg Wednesday for the United States, ordered him aboard the freighter.

He left with hardly a look at Oran.

With vision of a night in a hotel bed among white clean sheets after thirty months spent either in the legion as a soldier or in French military prisons, Doty was quickly disillusioned on his arrival here. French legion officials called on him a few minutes after his arrival from Sid Bel Abbes where he was released from further service. They politely but firmly informed him that he must spend the night in the military barracks at Oran.

"This is the toughest break I have had in the past five years," he told them. "I never felt so acutely depressed either in the Syrian desert fighting the Druses or in the Damascus Citadel awaiting the firing squad, but on well!" he declared.

It was in Syria that he deserted while fighting the Druses. After being threatened with execution he was finally sent to a French military prison. There he served part of his eight year sentence, was pardoned shortly after the visit of the American Legion to Paris, and returned to Algeria to complete his enlistment with the Foreign Legion. He was finally ordered released from that by the French foreign office.

SMITH TELLS WOMEN ABOUT PUBLIC LAWS

Gov. of New York Declares He Stands For Law Enforcement in this Country.

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Governor Smith sees no reason why any citizen or group of citizens should be condemned for expressing opposition to the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead Act, but he is for enforcement of laws and he regards the Volstead Act as part of New York State law notwithstanding repeal of the State enforcement act.

Breaking the silence which was characterized by his attitude on matters of national importance since he has been prominently mentioned for the democratic nomination for President, the governor last night told the New York State League of Women Voters that he had not deviated in the slightest from his earlier opposition to the federal prohibition statutes.

In maintaining that position, he declared, he was now showing a lack of respect for the law, but was merely exercising the right of American citizens "to oppose any laws and any part of the constitution with which they are not in harmony."

Referring to the "times he had taken the oath" to uphold the state constitution he said: "There are parts of it that I hate. I have promised to sustain it and I will sustain it."

Saying that he always endeavored to uphold the laws of the nation, even though in disagreement with them, the governor told of his having called in 1923 a law enforcement conference of police officers to impress upon them President Coolidge's desire that their obligations be emphasized. Although the governors of the majority of the states vigorously defended law enforcement while at a conference with the President in Washington, Governor Smith said, he found later that he was only one of two state executives who had called such a conference.

The certainty with which the governor sized upon the opportunity to refer to prohibition was generally viewed in political circles here as a definite bid for the support of the women of New York State if he should be nominated by the democratic national convention next year. In his address he referred to his candidacy.

"All my recent introductions to large audiences have contained a nomination to the presidency," he said when introduced. "I never declined but it was offered so often that I go myself to thinking that it was unanimous."

Delegates to the convention frequently applauded. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, noted feminine leader, in speech praised the governor as being "honest and fair and square."

Richmond Girl Wins in Radio Audition Test

Atlanta, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Miss Mary Bowe Sims, 23, of Richmond, Va., won first honors here in a radio audition competition from a large field of contestants representing 10 southern states, it was announced by auditors for the Atwater-Kent Foundation, under whose auspices the auditions were held.

Ben F. Deloache, Jr., 23, of Asheville, N. C., won first place among the male contestants.

Miss Sims and Deloache will go to New York to compete in the final auditions Dec. 11, when \$17,000 in prizes will be awarded the winners. The entire country will be represented at the New York gathering.

Frank Harrington Elected President Of Local Kiwanians

J. F. Harrington, clerk of Pitt County Superior Court, was elected president of the Greenville Kiwanis club in annual election of officers conducted by that organization last night. He succeeds W. H. Woodard, whose term of office expires two weeks from last night.

TWO GEORGIA TEAMS READY FOR CONFLICT

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 3.—(AP)—On a muddy, rain-spattered field where advance expectations as well as rival attacks seemed likely to be upset, the University of Georgia's unbeaten eleven and Georgia Tech rivals since 1893, stood ready today to battle for the football supremacy of the south.

The hopes of Georgia for National championship recognition also were at stake in the twenty third renewal of this ancient gridiron feud which, in spite of dismal weather and playing conditions has aroused Atlanta to a fever pitch of enthusiasm and attracted as great a crowd as southern football history has ever known—between 35,000 and 40,000 were expected to fill Grant field, Tech's battle ground, to see the Dixie classic.

The steady rain of the past twenty four hours and consequent conversion of the field into a morass, were the "breaks" might easily turn the tide of battle one way or the other, resulting in a narrowing of odds but Georgia remained a decided favorite nevertheless. The brilliant record of the Georgians all season, their sweep through nine straight games to victory and their collection of all star talent featuring Captain Chick Shiver and Tom Nash at the ends, offered convincing evidence in favor of the Bull Dogs.

Georgia, the experts agreed, figured to win with a team on edge to end a great season successfully. Tech, the under dog, nevertheless, had backers, hopeful that their team would get the jump or the breaks or stop Georgia's versatile attack with an admittedly strong forward line. In a battle slowed up by a muddy field, line strength loomed as a likely deciding factor and here the Yellow Jackets conceded little. If anything, to the Bull Dogs except on the wings.

Georgia not only has the more impressive record but it also has a much greater scoring point to judge from statistics which show that the Bull Dogs have rolled up 248 points in nine games while Tech has piled only 113. Neither has been defeated in the south and Tech's only reverse was at the hands of Notre Dame on the day when Knute Rockne's hoosiers were at the top of their stride.

Georgia also had an advance in the all-round condition of its squad back to full strength with Bobby Hooks, star half back ready to aid McCrary, Johnson, Estes and Dudley after being out with a broken hand since the Florida game. Tech reserves have suffered several casualties while "Stumpy" Thomason line bucking half back, has not been in the best of shape.

Like Yale, the team it conquered early in the season Georgia has an additional incentive to win for the sake of its coach, George (Kid) Woodruff, who announced at the opening of the season that he would retire this year to devote his time to business. The similar spur of "Tad" Jones' impending departure had something to do with Yale's victorious finishing drive.

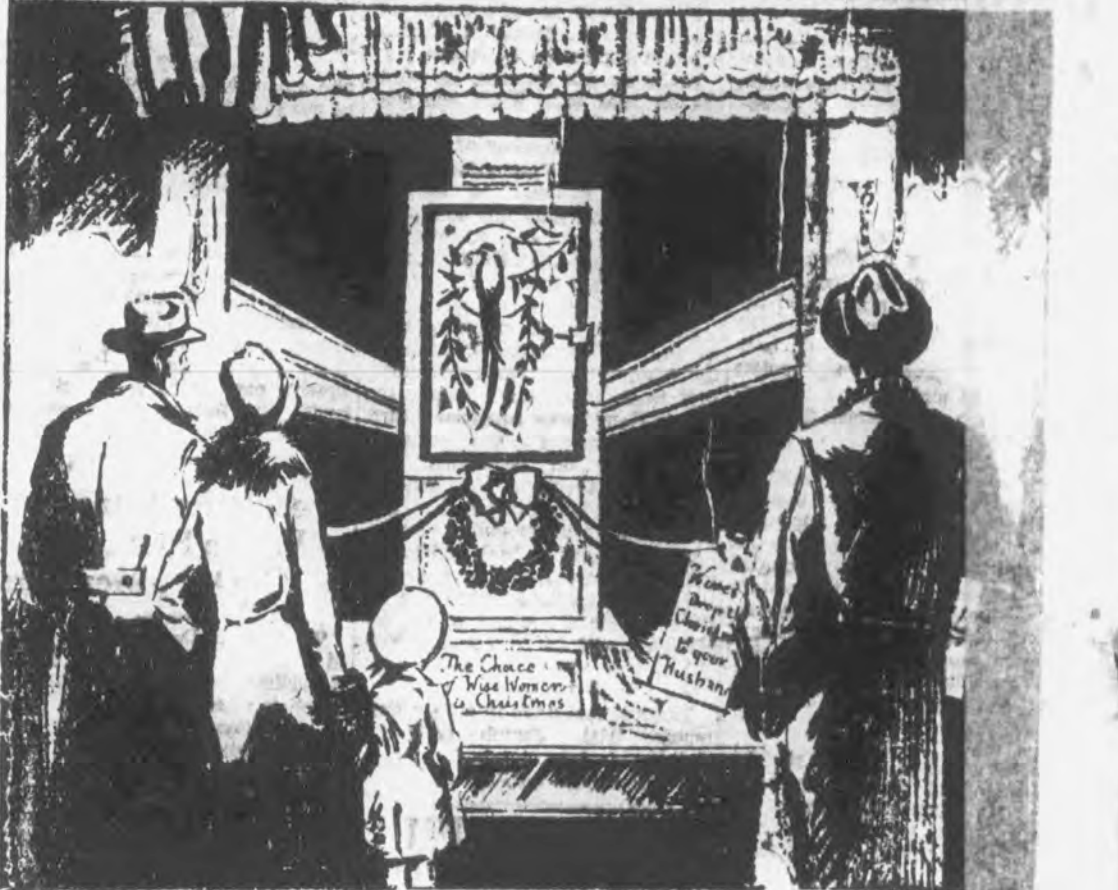

Story Behind The New Ford

Detroit, Dec. 3.—Six months ago
Henry Ford announced the coming
production of a new Ford car, su-
perior in design and performance
to any now available in the low-
priced, light car field. Yesterday
the new car was shown for the first
time outside the Ford organization
to a group of newspaper men and
correspondents, of the Dearborn
laboratories of the Ford Motor
Company.

What the correspondents saw was
an automobile, as new as the fore-
casts had represented it to be.
They saw bodies with beauty of
line and color, and with every ac-
cessory that has come to be asso-
ciated with cars of a much high-
er price class. They saw perfor-
mance that would compare favorably
with almost any automobile of the
day—speed, pick-up, flexibility, and
power. What they did see, how-
ever, was the six months of prepa-
ration back of that car, which in
magnitude and accomplishment is
unique in world industry.

When Mr. Ford announced to
the public that he was to introduce
a new car he had not only conceiv-
ed this car, but it was already well
on the way to materialization. In
the years that the Model T had
been produced many inventions
which did not fit into the scheme
of the Model T. Many of these things were retain-
ed against the day when new ideas
of automotive efficiency would give
the way for a new car. The formal
announcement last May was
principally significant because it
marked the end of production of
the Model T as a complete unit.

Creation of production of the
Model T did, however, turn the
full force of the vast organization
of the Ford company to the prob-
lem of creating and producing a
new car, with the exception of
that part of the facilities necessary
for the production of Model T re-
placement parts. This meant op-
portunity for the reconstruction of
not one plant, but many. Thirty-
three assembly plants in the United
States, the Ford Motor Company
of Canada and twelve plants in
foreign countries had to be con-
sidered. A greater problem still,
the fountain-head of its parts to
feed the branch plants had to be
rebuilt almost from the ground—
the great Ford industries at High-
land Park, at Fordson, and along
the River Rouge.

Impressive figures almost with-
out end could be quoted to illus-
trate the magnitude of this task.
There have been estimates that the
job cost as high as \$250,000,000 to
accomplish. This figure is too high
—how much so, Ford officials will
not say. But it was a staggering

total of millions, unquestionably.

Strange as it may seem, however,
Henry Ford did not figure in
terms of millions. He was building
a new car—a car which would be
as much of an improvement of its
days, as the Model T was back in
1908. Engineers took certain basic
principles and built around them
a new car. When it was completed
it was very close to the car that
Mr. Ford had visualized. It was
then that Mr. Ford gave voice to
a statement that has been fre-
quently quoted since: "I will re-
present the public."

Even his engineers did not sense
the full significance of this simple
statement at the time. The plants
were being re-tooled. Re-tooling an
automobile plant designed to pro-
duce thousands of automobiles a
day is no simple matter. Giant
machines weighing many tons and
costing thousands of dollars had to
be destroyed and replaced. Countless
thousands of smaller tools and pre-
cision equipment had to be man-
ufactured. Orders were placed with
the machinery manufacturer for
many of these machines. Others
were built in the Ford plants. But
Mr. Ford was "representing the
public." A small change meant the
reconstruction of great machines
which required four months to
build. But if this change meant
a slightly greater gasoline mileage,

These are some of the reasons,
in the opinion of members of the
Ford organization, why cost figures
of the transition from the Model T
to the Model A mean little. In
the final analysis, they say, most
of this expense will be absorbed
in greater production and in high-
er plant efficiency. The maximum
production in the days of the
Model T was 8,400 per day. The
reconstructed Ford industries will
have a capacity even greater than
that. This will not be reached for
some time, but the capacity is
there, to be approached as market
demands indicate.

Mr. Ford has stated that the coal
and iron mines, the glass plant and
other "feeder" industries of the
Ford Motor Company exact no
profit—that the only source of profit
is the Ford car. But those "feed-
er" industries have been enlarged
and strengthened during the peri-
od of transition.

The assembly line at the Fordson
plant today is creeping slowly, as

compared with the normal produc-
tion, but each day sees increasing
speed. Back of that assembly line
in the units where parts are made
which feed the assembly, a more
impressive idea of what has taken
place in the Ford industries may
be had.

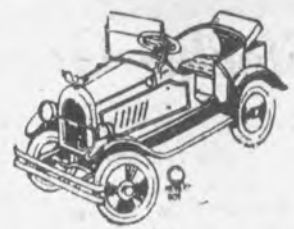
Working limits which would do
credit to some of the finest auto-
mobiles of today are being imposed
in many departments. Variations
of more than one ten-thousandths
of an inch are not permitted in
many parts. The speed that char-
acterized production of the Model
T is being attained, but it is speed
with almost uncanny accuracy.
Henry Ford is demonstrating that
his mass-production methods can
be applied to the manufacture of
any type of car, without sacrificing
the mechanical accuracy which is
essential to maximum performance
of the finished automobile.

He is demonstrating something
else, at which engineers are mar-
veling—he is utilizing methods which
had been pronounced impractical.
Electric welding of essential parts,
such as the rear-end assembly, is
being employed, with a consequent
strengthening of the car, and elimi-
nation of sources of noise and trou-
ble. Spun steel forgings are being
used in a way that is new to the
automotive industry. New features
of four-cylinder motor design have
resulted in greater power and flexi-
bility than had been anticipated.
And so the story goes—a story of
new methods, revolutionary prin-
ciples of manufacture, of design.

This is some of the background
of the new Ford car which is to be
unveiled by those who dig into
the story of the happenings of the
last six months. It is a story which
will be many more months in un-
folding, as the American and for-
eign assembly plants swing into
line for the production of complete
cars.

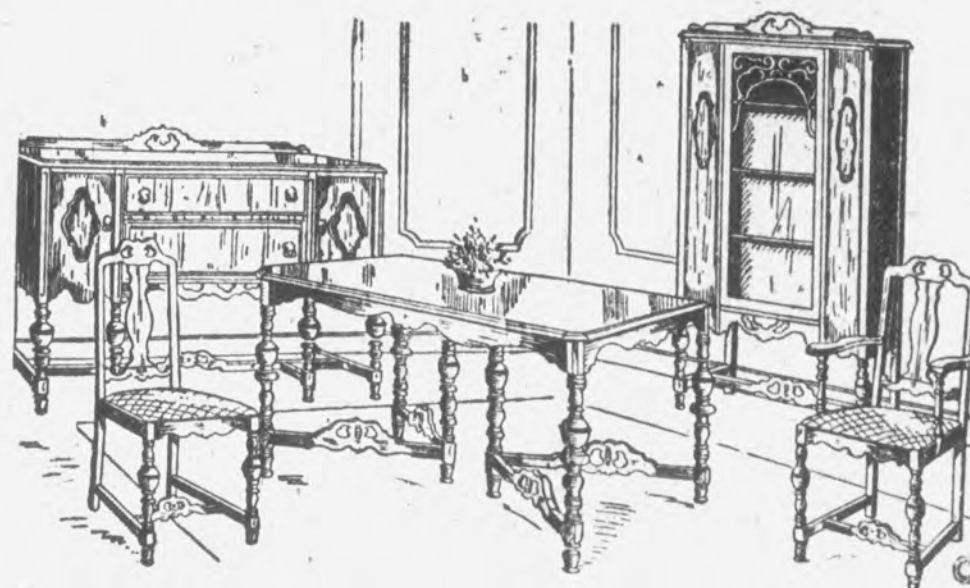
