Each time other bull fighters diverted the animal from Calles by waving their crimson cloaks and inducing the bull to charge in another direction.

After Calles had performed with the crimson cloak he took a lasso and gave an exhibition of roping several young bulls. Then panting, he climbed back into the grandstand, his neat black business suit covered with dust.

On being told that the performance looked dangerous, he said: "Oh, it wasn't very dangerous but I'm accustomed to danger."
