

TWO SENATORS DENIED SEATS 70TH CONGRESS

Smith and Vane Temporarily Denied Seats at Opening of Congress Today.

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—A new session of congress, born with every promise of a career of discord and political insurgency opened today with a curtain raiser in which William S. Vare of Pennsylvania and Frank L. Smith of Illinois were denied, at least temporarily, the Senate seats to which they aspire.

When they presented themselves to take the oath of office the two would-be senators were stopped by a resolution presented by Senator Norris of Nebraska, declaring them unfit to sit in the Senate because of the scandal surrounding their primary campaigns. It was agreed to postpone further action until tomorrow.

When Smith's name was reached in the alphabetical roll-call of the new Senate. The Senator-elect stood at the end of the center aisle facing the Vice-President while the resolution was read. Then, at the request of Senator Curtis of Kansas, the Republican leader, Smith stood aside until the other Senators-elect could be sworn in.

The same procedure was followed in the case of Vare.

Smith and Vare were both named in the same resolution. The unnamed Senator-elect was also named in the resolution.

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The week ended saw Wall Street's "broadest" bull movement in all history. A "wave of wild public buying" is Wall Street's description of it. A bigger, wilder wave is expected for 1928. According to wise Wall Street newspapers, the launching of Ford's new car has helped the boom.

Don't gamble in stocks or anything else. And above all, don't sell short. This country's prosperity has not really begun.

Deitrich suggests a "price war in automobiles." The huge sale of new Ford cars on the opening day, it is suggested, will cause price slashing by competing companies.

Intelligent companies will compete as hitherto by trying to make better cars at the right price, not beginning a war ruinous to the industry.

The sale of 5,000,000 new Fords would increase, not diminish, sales of other automobiles. One well-to-do family in three formerly has one automobile. Now prosperous families, and every family will soon have one automobile, at least outside of big cities.

Millions of additional automobiles will be sold in cities, where the companies provide convenient garage space, at reasonable prices.

Lord Rothermere, owner of London newspapers, whose financial genius carried through the big enterprises of his brother, the late Lord Northcliffe, is in America and says: "The greatest task before the world is to prevent the outbreak of another war."

That's true, and the greatest task before the United States is to keep prepared with submarines, flying machines, tanks and fast cruisers, so that if another war does break out we can make it stay on the other side of the ocean and not bother us. That will seem cold-blooded to Europeans, sincerely convinced that the chief duty and delight of Uncle Sam should be to mix in Europe's wars.

Governor Smith defines his attitude toward prohibition, expressing the attitude of all sensible men in few words. He is for enforcement of law. He also upholds the citizens' right to oppose by proper means, any law or part of the constitution that he believes should be changed.

Support the law, while it is the law, work within legal bounds to change it if you don't like the law. Such is the proper American plan.

BRIAND ASKS FOR SUPPORT OF RUSSIANS

French Minister Wants Nation to Stay in Disarmament Conference.

Geneva, Dec. 5.—(AP)—It was not found possible to reach any basis of agreement says official communiqué issued by the British delegation at the conclusion of an interview this afternoon between Sir Austen Chamberlain and Maxim Litvinoff arranged to discuss Soviet-British relations.

Geneva, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Aristide Briand, French Foreign Minister, stood out today as the chief negotiator for peace through a united continental Europe.

The Russian delegation to the disarmament commission, is understood to have given him assurances of co-operation wherever possible. M. Briand asked Maxim Litvinoff and Anatole Lunacharsky, Soviet representatives, to stay actively in the European concert and facilitate them on their participation in the disarmament discussions. He also broached Joseph Paul-Boncour's plan for a continental security pact, with Russia included, in the belief that this would improve the chances of success of the disarmament conference.

The meeting of the preparatory committee on disarmament ended Saturday. Russians attended that meeting but gave notice they would leave Geneva and not remain for meetings of the League council, beginning today. Russia is not a member of the League.

The Polish-Lithuanian dispute is the most important problem facing the council.

Premier Valdemaras of Lithuania said Lithuania would ask the assistance of the League on the claims that Lithuanians in the Vilna area are being oppressed by the Poles and that Poland is secretly engaged in a conspiracy to overthrow the Lithuanian government. He also said Poland's right to Vilna would be put before the League.

A report that Poland would insist on an unconditional recognition of Vilna or resign from the League was categorically denied.

Brush Fires Raging Today in California

Flames Destroy 150 Mountain Homes, With Damage Estimated \$10,000,000.

Los Angeles, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Brush fires which have been raging in four sections of Southern California since Saturday, continued to burn out of control in several places today after having consumed about 150 mountain homes and inflicting damages estimated at from \$500,000 to more than \$10,000,000 in the face of efforts of more than 3,000 men to stop them.

Driving winds, which often veered and turned into near gales, mocked the tired army of fighters along an extended front and in one case the flames threatened to enter the city limits of Glendale, near here.

More than a score of men received minor injuries. Most of them were overcome by the heat and smoke.

The most sensational of the fires centered in the Verdugo Hills, extending from the northern limits of the city of Burbank to the north and west of Glendale and to Tujunga Canyon. The loss in this blaze has been estimated as high as \$1,000,000.

Late last night the fire in the Verdugo Hills section had covered between 7,000 and 10,000 acres.

BAD WEATHER REPORTED IN ALL SECTIONS

Carolinas Today Emerging From Blanket of Snow and Sleet of Yesterday.

Charlotte, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The Carolinas today were emerging from a blanket of sleet and snow that covered virtually every section, but with some sections facing the menace of rising streams as a result of the melting snow and a 24-hour rain that preceded it.

The weather bureau at Raleigh forecast flood stage for the Tar river at Rocky Mount late today. Meanwhile, the Neuse river was three feet above flood stage at Smithfield and another foot rise was predicted by tomorrow.

The Roanoke at Weldon today stood at 34 feet, four feet above the flood stage, with two or three feet more expected. The weather bureau, however, said little damage would result from the rises.

Along Albemarle sound country the storm which raged for three days was reported abating. Some damage to telephone and power wires and a few minor fires caused by cross wires were reported. Two ships were reported ashore off the coast. Today the sun was struggling to break through the clouds.

In South Carolina weather conditions were growing better and the sun was shining after almost general rains. Greenwood reported four and three fourths inches of rain since December 1 with high winds but no damage Saturday night. Anderson reported high winds blew down signs and billboards and telephone lines were put out of commission.

Bright sunshine flooded the country around Union today and damage caused by high winds and a heavy rain Saturday night was being repaired. Spartanburg reported nearly six inches of rain in two days accompanied yesterday by high winds that blew down trees, signs and fences. Snow fell at Spartanburg yesterday.

Two inches of snow that greeted Charlotte yesterday today had almost disappeared but up in the mountains the snow, reported 10 inches deep at Blowing Rock still lay on the ground.

Bright sunshine was reported from Greenville, North Carolina after two days of unusually severe weather.

Asheville reported 3.75 inches of rain in four days but the sun was shining today. After a chilling rain yesterday today was baking under a warm sun.

Saltburg reported clear crisp weather after two days of rain, sleet and snow.

A bright sun was rapidly melting the covering of snow at Greensboro. Sleet and snow fell intermittently there all day Sunday.

One Killed and Two Injured In Auto Collision

Statesville, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Paul Walden and Mack Austin who were injured yesterday in an automobile accident in which Roy Austin was killed, today were believed to be recovering, said attaches of the hospital to which they were taken.

SEVEN LIVES CLAIMED BY BAD WEATHER

Four sailors of the Greek Steamer Paraguy were washed overboard and drowned after the vessel had gone ashore in the storm near Kitty Hawk. Other members of the crew were rescued by the coast guard.

W. J. Scott, an insurance agent, fell into a creek near Durham and was frozen to death.

Michael Currie, a Robeson county negro, was found frozen to death Sunday morning.

A man believed to be J. L. Davis was drowned in the swollen waters of the French Broad river near Asheville when he attempted to wade the stream to escape officers who were chasing him on suspicion that he had violated the prohibition laws.

In addition to the seven lives claimed by the weather there were three other violent deaths over the week end.

James Leak, Durham negro, died in an elevator accident.

John R. Hill, Beaufort farmer, shot himself through the heart, with a shotgun.

Roy Austin, white, was killed near Statesville in an automobile accident.

Fall Action Sustained.

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The action of Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, sustaining the title of the Standard Oil Company, of California, to a portion of the Elk Hills reserve in Southern California, under a grant from the State of California, was upheld today by the District of Columbia Court of Appeals.

BEGIN SEARCH OF LOOT HELD BY GANGSTERS

Kidnapped Man Tells Police of \$2,700,000 Taken From Banks of Nation.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Loot valued at \$2,700,000 stolen during the last year by a highly organized "crime trust" today was the object of an intensive search by police of this and other mid-west cities.

The kidnapping and subsequent release of Morris Roisnor, of St. Paul, Minn., led to revelations of the activities of the "crime trust." Roisnor was kidnapped by gangsters last Thursday and held until Saturday for \$75,000 ransom.

Roisnor had been tortured but was released, it was said, when his captors learned the police were on their trail. Several reputed members of the gang were arrested after he told his story. A score of others are being sought.

The kidnapped man, and Charles Grosscurth of Chicago, his associate, were known to the gangsters as men who had handled more than two million dollars worth of bonds and negotiable securities stolen from banks in all sections of the country. Stolen property valued at \$700,000 was also disposed of to them, according to Michael Grady, deputy chief detective.

Abe Ginsberg, Minneapolis, who acted as the go-between in negotiations between Roisnor and the kidnapers, was held for further questioning.

TELLS STORY OF KILLING

Mrs. Margaret Lillien-dahl Goes on Stand in May's Landing Court.

Court Room, May's Landing, N. J., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Sobbing and wringing her hands in a paroxysm of emotion, Mrs. Margaret Lillien-dahl told on the stand today her story of how her husband was killed by two negroes.

She flatly denied that the shooting was done by Willis Beach, her friend and co-defendant.

Counsel for Mrs. Lillien-dahl said today that her own story on the stand would virtually complete her defense in the trial in which she and Willis Beach, her attractive neighbor, are accused of killing her husband.

The prospects are that the two defendants will know their fate long before the week is ended. It was considered possible that the case might go to the jury tonight.

Prices Stronger On Tobacco Market

There was about 500,000 pounds of tobacco on the Greenville market today and sales were complete by the noon hour, according to an announcement made this morning by K. W. Coon, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade. This brings the season's total to 56,250,000 pounds.

Prices showed considerably greater strength, it was stated, and this condition is expected to continue the remainder of the season.

SINCLAIR ASKS THAT HIS CASE BE DISMISSED

Contempt Hearing Rescued This Morning to Allow Study of Documents.

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Haled before the District of Columbia Supreme Court today on charges of contempt, Harry F. Sinclair, William J. Burns and their associates insisted they were with-within the law in having the jury in the Fall-Sinclair oil case placed under surveillance.

Henry Mason Day, an official in one of Sinclair's oil companies, said he hired the Burns men to shadow the jury at Sinclair's request, explaining that the oil man believed an improper effort would be made to have that jury return a verdict against Sinclair. The oil man asked that the case be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction.

The defense contended it had made no actual contacts with jurors, but had stood on its legal rights in endeavoring to protect the interests of the men on trial for conspiracy as a result of the leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve by Albert B. Fall to Sinclair.

Almost as soon as the hearings had opened with a denial of guilt by the defense a recess had to be ordered to allow the district attorney's office to study the defendants' answer and to consider a course of legal procedure.

Sinclair, Burns, Sheldon Clark, Henry Mason Day, W. Sherman Burns, and Charles L. Veitch were the men cited to show cause why they should not be held in contempt as a result of the shadowing by the Burns men.

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Henry Mason Day, in answering contempt charges against him, today in the District of Columbia Supreme Court, said he had employed detectives to shadow the Fall-Sinclair oil jury at the instance of Harry F. Sinclair, who had reason to believe attempts would be made to tamper with the jury for the purpose of producing an unjust verdict.

Day contended he had a right to so employ detectives to "observe as far as they lawfully could, what persons, if any, came in contact with the jury."

Day never suggested that the jurors should be spoken to, nor was such action contemplated, Burns said.

Charles L. Veitch, a Burns manager, also denied allegations concerning him, saying that he practically "no connection with the participation in any of the matters or things alleged in the petition" charging contempt against Sinclair, the detectives and their associates.

Cape Fear River Project Reported

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Plans for expenditure of \$1,085,750 during the next fiscal year on carrying out the 12 foot channel project adopted by Congress for the Cape Fear river, North Carolina, waterway, are included in the annual report of army engineers made public today. Most of the money \$637,500 will go into dredging operations between Beaufort and Myrtle with the amount of material to be removed estimated at 4,250,000 cubic yards at a cost of fifteen cents per yard. Another \$337,900 will go for the Myrtle Sound-Cape Fear river section dredging with 1,680,000 cubic yards to be removed at a cost of 23 cents a yard and \$10,000 will be aside for design and preliminary work on the projected tidalock in this section.

Mayor Pays Tribute To Gridiron Warriors

TWO HELD FOR MURDER TODAY IN LOUISIANA

Mother of Four, with Paramour, Arrested On Charge of Killing Husband.

Haynesville, La., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Effie Jowers, 43 year-old mother of four, whose industry in varnishing the floors of her bedroom on the Sabbath aroused the suspicions of the county sheriff today, with her paramour, J. E. Swift, 45-years old soft drink salesman, was an inmate of the parish jail at Arcadia awaiting action of a grand jury that will be convened December 12 to investigate charges that the two murdered her husband while he slept on the night of last October 31.

Mrs. Jowers admitted yesterday District Attorney W. L. Goff said, that she held a light white Swift, using a sledge hammer, mashed in the forehead of J. E. Jowers, her 55-year old storekeeper, and ex-Methodist minister husband, so that they might continue their illicit love affair without molestation.

Sheriff John Coleman passed the Jowers residence the Sunday following the murder and decided to call and offer his sympathy to Mrs. Jowers over the disappearance of her husband. He said he found her floors although the stain did not cover darker spots. Two days later while Mrs. Jowers was in Camden, Ark., arranging for a rooming house she was to take, Sheriff Coleman entered the residence and obtained shavings from the floor which under chemical tests revealed bloodstains. Blood clots also were taken from cracks in the floor. Mrs. Jowers and Swift, whose names coincide with the names of the Jowers who were connected, were arrested and questioned, the confessions resulting officers said.

After killing Jowers, Swift is said to have taken the body in his automobile to a point 25 miles from here where it was weighted with one hundred pounds of scrap iron and dropped into a creek.

Officers were taken to the scene by Swift's 16-year-old son Paul, who said he was forced under threat of a flogging to aid his father in disposing of the body. The boy is under technical arrest at home as a material witness.

Paul said his mother and father separated six months ago as a result of gossip over the latter's relations with Mrs. Jowers.

District Attorney Goff said he had rejected an offer by Mrs. Jowers and Swift to plead guilty to murder without capital punishment and announced that he will demand the death penalty when they are brought to trial.

Plan to Select Convention City Sometime Today

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Harris spent several days on speculation bearing on the next presidential campaign, the republican national committee settled down seriously today to reach a decision on a convention city.

Paving the way for hearing delegations tomorrow from cities seeking the convention, Chairman Butler called an executive meeting today to clear up routine party matters.

While the main business of the committee session concerns selection of a convention city, there is every indication that the members will talk over a general political situation before they leave Washington. There was still a great deal of speculation regarding the Black Hills statement of President Coolidge, but the feeling had seemed to settle over a great bulk of the committee-men that no amplification of the President's statement could be looked for very soon.

Trains Collide Near Shepard

Charlotte, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Southern railway passenger train No. 14, northbound, and freight train No. 50, south bound, collided head on near Shepherds, a few miles above Mooresville yesterday, but without serious result.

J. S. Bertman, division superintendent, of Winston-Salem, investigated and reported that both trains were traveling at low speed when the engineers sighted one another and that the freight was brought to a stop before the collision. A. L. Harman, district claim agent here, said the only damage consisted of broken pilots on the engine and that no one was injured.

Court Fails to Open

Brevard, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Transylvania Superior court failed to open here today although no notices had been given and witnesses and persons facing trial were on hand. Judge Walter E. Moore of Sylva, due to conduct court, was held over in Henderson county.

FOUR TEAMS BOW TO NONE THIS SEASON

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Eleven football teams of the south turned in impressive records during the 1927 season, four of that number playing all games without a defeat. Tennessee of the southern conference and Centenary, Mississippi college, and Stenson of the southern intercollegiate association were the teams bowing to none.

The other seven lost one game each. Georgia bowing to Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt losing to Texas, North Carolina State dropping before Furman, Georgia Tech losing to Notre Dame, Furman taking a defeat at the hands of Georgia, Vanderbilt trouncing Chattanooga, and Georgetown of Kentucky bowing to Wabash of Indiana. Three of these seven were S. I. A. A. champions and other conference teams.

This record is the best ever turned in within the ranks of either the conference or the association, indicating that the brand of football in Dixie is better than at any time in history.

Of these teams, Georgia defeated Yale to bring intercollegiate glory to the south. Centenary won from Texas Christians, Southern Methodist, Rice and Baylor of the southwestern conference, North Carolina State turned back Michigan Aggie, and Georgetown beat DePaul of Indiana.

Other southern teams, not faring so well, gained intercollegiate prestige. Among these victories Duke's win over Boston College, Virginia Poly's victory over Colgate and Loyola's decision over Loyola of Chicago, were outstanding.

The southern season is scheduled for more intercollegiate contests than ever before. Duke, Alabama, Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Maryland, North Carolina and Washington and Lee, among others already announced such games.

New York.—(AP)—Who's the champion? It depends on what title you're in nowdays before that question may be settled in no fewer than four of the main boxing divisions.

At no previous time in ring history has there been so much dispute over the championship of titles. State and national boxing organizations have made or deposed professional ring rulers through a variety of processes. Local pride and ring politics have contributed their share to the middle.

The cause of this title fever is traced from the fact that Fidel LaBarba, the Cuban title flyweight champion, decided to give up his world's title and go to college. That Charley (Phil) Rosenberg lost the bantam crown on the scales and drew official disfavor upon himself that Johnny Dundee and then Kid Kaplan relinquished the featherweight title for inability to make the class weight, and that Jack Delaney, the erstwhile Rapier of the North, voluntarily retired from the featherweight throne.

In a subsequent scramble at least a half dozen 12-pounders have set up claims for LaBarba's vacated championship. In LaBarba's own state, California, title recognition has been given to Johnny McCoy of El Paso, Texas, after an "elimination tournament." Willie Davis is the Pennsylvania flyweight king. Frankie Genaro, one-time American champion, is out with revived title hopes. Newsboy Brown of Sioux City and Corporal Izzy Schwartz are formidable contenders.

The battle to establish featherweight title claims became so hot that it broke up the friendship and working agreement between the New York and Pennsylvania boxing commissions. Pennsylvania placed the crown on the throne of Benny Bass and insisted that New York recognize him but Gotham refused to do so without Benny first being tested against Tony Canzone.

Bud Taylor is recognized by the National Boxing Association as bantamweight champion but New York has never put its stamp of approval on him. Otherwise there isn't much, if any doubt that he Terro Hagtue scrapper is entitled to the top place.

New York and Pennsylvania agree that the light heavyweight title belongs to Tommy Loughran as a result of his defeat of Mike McTigue but the National Boxing Association considers Jimmy Slattery the ruler of the 175-pounders. The N. B. A. conducted a two-man "elimination" and awarded recognition to Slattery for defeating Maxey Rothenbloom. McTigue, before meeting Loughran had been the beneficiary of Delaney's crown, through decision of the New York boxing powers.

New Boxing Arena Opens in N. York

New York, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The new Manhattan Casino, another boxing arena, will throw open its doors for the first time Thursday night with an all-star card featuring George Courtney, Oklahoma ex-heavy middleweight, against Jack Dev. of Pittsburgh, in a six-round bout.

Due to the six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden, this week, there will be no boxing at the Rickard plant.

Roberto Robert, the Italian slugger who knocked out Romero Rojas last week, will oppose King Solomon, Panama heavyweight, in a ten-round bout at the new Broadway Arena in Brooklyn tonight.

On Wednesday, Bob Touchstone the Florida battler, trades wallops with Tiny Jim Herman in a main ten-round clash at the Pioneer. On the same card Ted Sandwina, of Sioux City, Iowa, will meet Gus Bonny, of Brooklyn, in another bout at the same distance.

Closing the week's boxing slate on Saturday, Bruce Flowers, negro sencer, will oppose globe trotting Eddie Elkins, in a stellar ten-round at the Olympia.

Ask Jones To Continue As Yale Coach

New York, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Speculation on the possibility of Ted Jones continuing as head coach of Yale football gripped the interest of alumni today in view of demands from coast to coast that he be retained.

At an alumni dinner in Montclair, N. J., Saturday night Jones was bombarded with an avalanche of telegrams and speeches imploring him to take back his resignation.

The resignation stands as it is, he said, but added that his feelings were such that he would willingly coach the eleven without thought of recompense. He also remarked he had never said, "I do not choose to coach."

Centenary Hopes To Make Record Again Next Year

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Losing only one regular of the team that won all ten of its games this season, Centenary College of Shreveport, La., hopes to make an even bigger splash in the gridiron paddie next fall. Negotiations are underway already according to the team's coach, Homer Norton, for intercollegiate games in 1928 with Nebraska at Lincoln and with Fordham at New York.

With an enrollment of little more than 600, Centenary is especially proud of its gridiron showing. Norton asserts, because the team has been made up chiefly of talent from Shreveport and other Louisiana schools.

Centenary is a member of the southern intercollegiate A. A. SPORTS SLANTS

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 5.—(AP)—It will be some time before the All-American debate of 1927 comes down. In fact, it just seems to be gathering headway, roaring on as the reflections crop out in one sector after another.

There is the case of Shiver and Nash, the Georgia ends, for instance. Through the Bull Dog's unbeaten march, nine victories in a row these two wing-men stood out head and shoulders above any rivals in the south, attracting national attention as well. Close to a bar in general ability, Shiver found big favor in some All-American calculations and Nash in others.

Then along comes the third of Georgia's downfall in the mud battle with Georgia Tech, where neither Shiver nor Nash showed to particularly good advantage. The tendency at once among the assembled experts was to turn skeptical and regard the pair as somewhat overrated. In spite of the fact that through ninety per cent of the season they have played superlative.

At a matter of fact, measuring up to the standard 900 per cent of the time is about the best that any All-American candidate can expect to do, to judge from the record of previous selections. Herb Jesteadt, Minnesota's great captain and full back, has been checked on several occasions this year but few experts suggested any more qualified candidate for his post, Red Grange. In his last season for Illinois, was dropped in his tracks by several teams but he flashed sufficient class against Pennsylvania Iowa and Iowa State to remove much doubt of his All-American caliber.

Not a little of the All-American argument this year centered about the army's two star tackles, captain-elect Sprague and Perry. Whether willing or not "Biff" Jones, the West Point coach, was drawn into the debate while here to settle the Georgia-Georgia Tech game.

"It's difficult for me to choose between them because they are of different types," Jones declared. "Perry is perhaps steadier and more consistent, but Sprague is more brilliant. Perry played throughout the entire season missing little of any game, whereas Sprague was hurt and kept out of action for some time. But Sprague played a spectacular game against Notre Dame and the Navy, our two main objectives. He was the man who had much to do with stopping the Navy in that great goal-line stand in the first half."

"I would prefer to have both on my team, but if I had to choose between the two, I probably would prefer Sprague."

Captain Jones disclosed, incidentally, that injuries sustained while playing Lacrosse last spring nearly kept "Highbrow Harry" Wilson out of football this fall, his last season and one he finished in a blaze of glory by scoring two touchdowns against the Navy.

He did spend much of the time on the sidelines and it took treatment by several specialists to put the Army captain back in condition for the final spurge of his seven varsity career.

thinking how they can make more money for Standard Oil." They made it, with Rockefeller's direction, and now he spend it usefully fighting disease and ignorance to get ahead remember that thinking comes first, the rest is secondary.

Learned professors in the University of Southern California, say that slang, within is good. It makes student select their expressions instead of using them automatically to call your friend a "dim bulb" is better than saying to your brother "thou fool" and it means the same. Use of slang "makes a dent in the brain" and causes thought, says one professor. It also takes the place of thought, but that is too long an argument.

Language that is now "high-brow"

was once slang. The first man to call his friend "sincere" which means in Latin "without wax," or "pure honey," used "dim bulb" language. Slang says that a man with an easy job, "has it soft." The ancient that invented "sinecure," meaning "without care," talked about the same language.

But young people should remember that today's raw slang will not be good English while they live. Youth is the time for acquiring a good vocabulary. A "fine line of chin goods" will not take its place, in real life. Words, well chosen, are the tools with which the brain expresses thought and the salesman sells goods. The gifted slang user of college days may find himself homoalalus, when he needs real education in real life.

That is comforting, but it would be more comforting if prosperity could be spread a little thicker on the lives of say 100,000,000 Americans. About that number worry more or less all the time, many actually lack work, or work part time only.

High finance, for its own sake, should worry a little about that big crowd, and before rejecting this suggestion it might remember with what unanimity, high finance, big

bankers, especially, denounced and tried to escape that federal reserve system, now their financial rock of ages.

Seven destroyers, wrecked at Point Honda, on the Pacific, might break up, and drifting fragments endanger navigation so the government decides to destroy them with dynamite. Why not use them to prove the power of T. N. 1 bombs, dropped from airplanes.

The seven destroyers, melting away under airplane fire, might teach the country something about the comparative value of airships and floating ships in war. 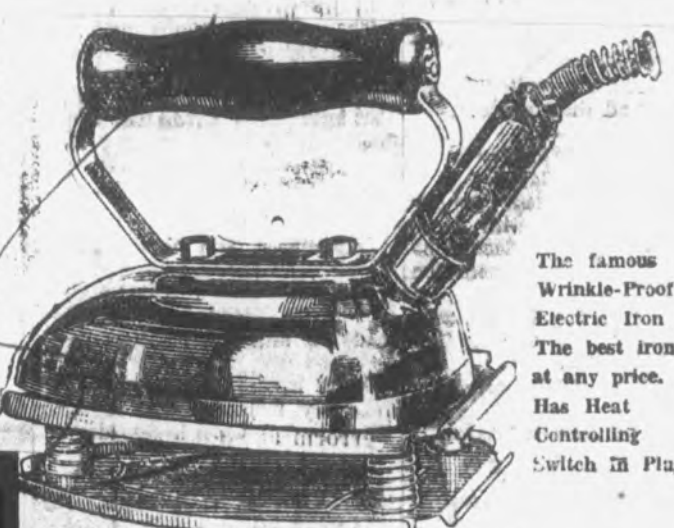

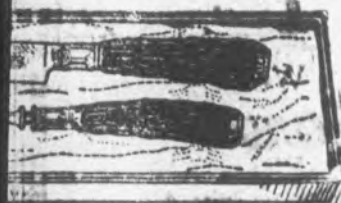

This has nothing to do with reading, writing or general education, which means simply that many a person otherwise well educated knows little or nothing about tuberculosis and how it spreads and how it is caused. The same applies to other diseases conditions which many contribute directly or indirectly to the development of tuberculosis. In order to distribute information about these conditions, printed matter is available at the clinics telling what modern medicine can do in the promotion of general health.

The first interest in the new Congress is whether or not it will really be one of accomplishment on behalf of the American people as a whole, or will it just be another round of hot air with nothing beneficial resulting.

DOUBLE PENALTY FOR
"GUN-TOTIN CRIMINALS"

There is a lot of talk about how to reduce the crime wave and one of the first suggestions is to prohibit the ownership of firearms.

This would remove protection which the private citizen has against burglary, robbery and assault, but it would not prevent the criminal from securing firearms. His business is unlawful and it would not bother him at all to go a step further and procure arms contrary to the law, smuggled in from other sources.

The fact that the private citizen could not lawfully buy arms would make the work of the thug just that much easier.

The logical way to reduce crime is to assure speedy punishment, also to provide that the use of a gun or any other form of concealed weapon in committing a crime should demand an increased sentence, with no possibility of probation or suspended sentence.

The average American citizen enjoys target practice and he enjoys hunting. It is healthy sport and recreation. Why should he be prohibited the use of a gun on the theory that this will prevent the use of guns by criminals? Why not make the penalty doubly severe on the criminal using a gun, instead of penalizing a law-abiding citizen who uses a gun for legitimate purposes? To prohibit the manufacture and sale of small arms in order to prevent crime, would be equivalent to prohibiting the manufacture and sale of automobiles to prevent reckless drivers from inflicting injury on the public.

Sells Out for 23 Millions

R. H. WRIGHT, President East Carolina Teachers College.

When Horatio Alger wrote those popular tales of penniless youths attaining untold wealth by grit, persistence and sagacity, little did he realize they would parallel in real life the astounding career of Sylvester Zeffarino, Poll of New Haven, Conn.

Recently the wires thrummed to the news that Poll had disposed of his vast theatrical holdings throughout New England for a sum said to be in the immediate neighborhood of twenty-three million dollars.

What the wires didn't say, however, was that Poll came to America as an immigrant in 1881, deserting his native town of Lucania, Italy, for the land of opportunity. He started in as a modeler in clay and wax. Then the show man's urge swept over him, and he opened an exhibit somewhat along the lines of the famed Eden Musee in Chicago. Soon after, he expanded with branches in Toronto, Rochester and Staten Island, N. Y.

From there, he started straight out theatrical work, revamping old church is Troy N. Y. into playhouse. Then came his emigration to New Haven, his institution of a musical hall in that city, and the real foundation for his success.

Followed quickly his building of theatres in every large city of New England, and his invasion of Washington, Baltimore, Scranton and Wilkes-Barre. And soon he had a vaudeville circuit of his own.

FRANCE RENEWS DEBATE
OVER VOLTAIRE'S GRAVE

Rouilly-Sur-Seine, France.
AP—Discovery in the cellar of the Chateau de Scellieres of a skeleton partially buried in quicklime has reopened a 135-year old controversy as to whether the bones of Voltaire really lie in the Pantheon in Paris.
The skeleton, said to resemble strongly the form of the philosopher, has revived the old story that Voltaire's nephew, Abe Mignot, caused his body to be buried under the Abbey of Scellieres, then occupying the site of the chateau. He did this, the story goes, because his uncle had been denied burial in sacred soil. According to this theory the body lying in the Pantheon is that of an old gardener.

Although the Voltaire remains in the Pantheon were carefully examined 30 years ago, and found to be genuine, doubters are demanding a new exhumation to settle finally the century-old question. This is now possible, they maintain, because the skills of Scellieres and of the Pantheon can be directly compared.

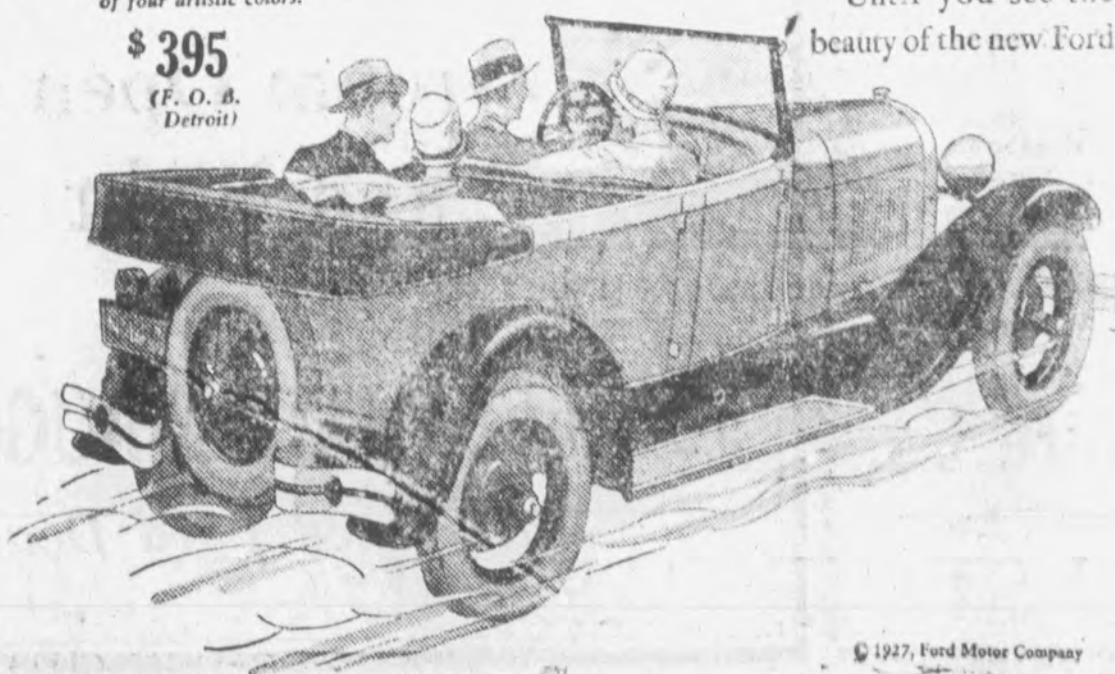

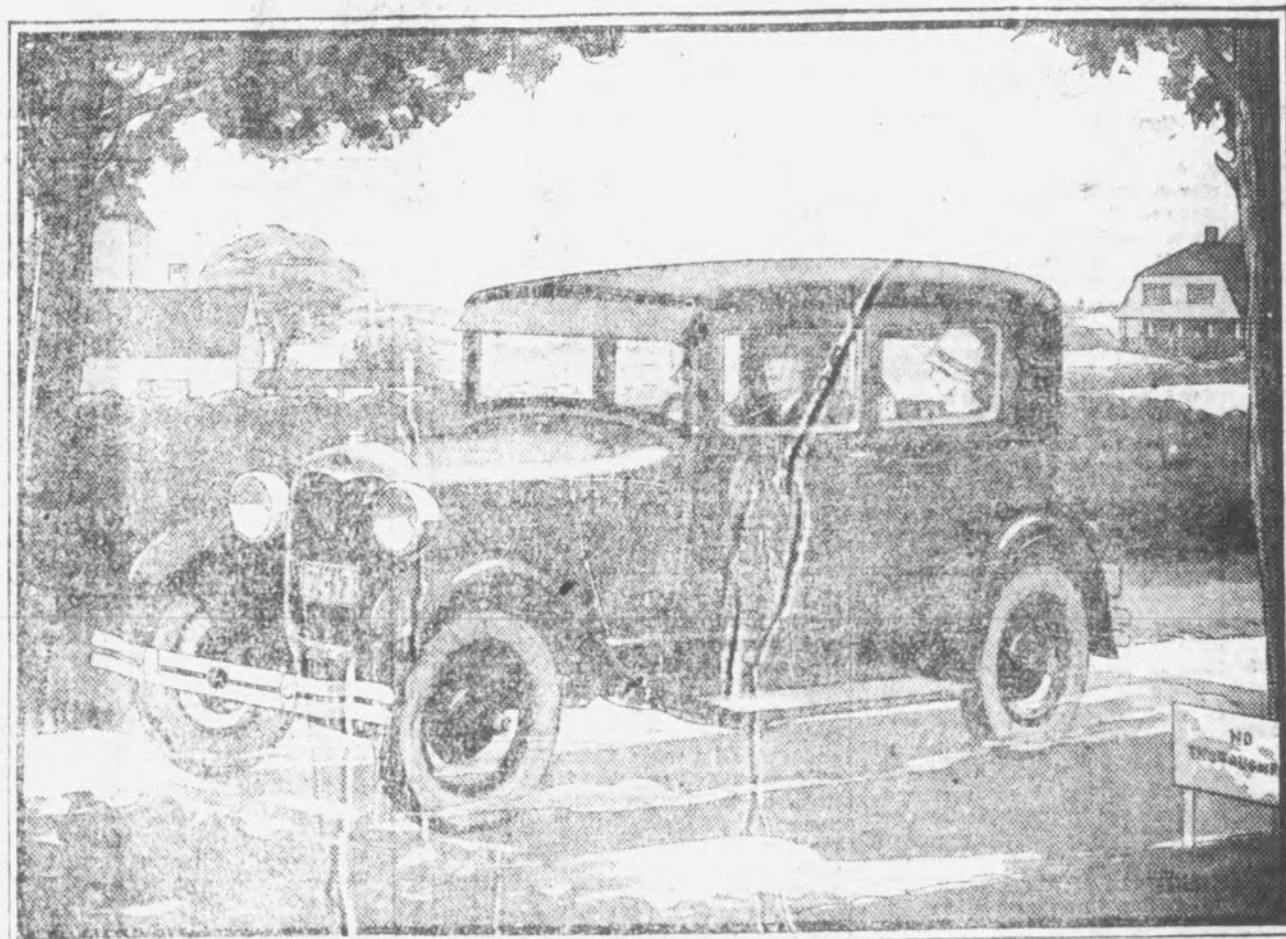

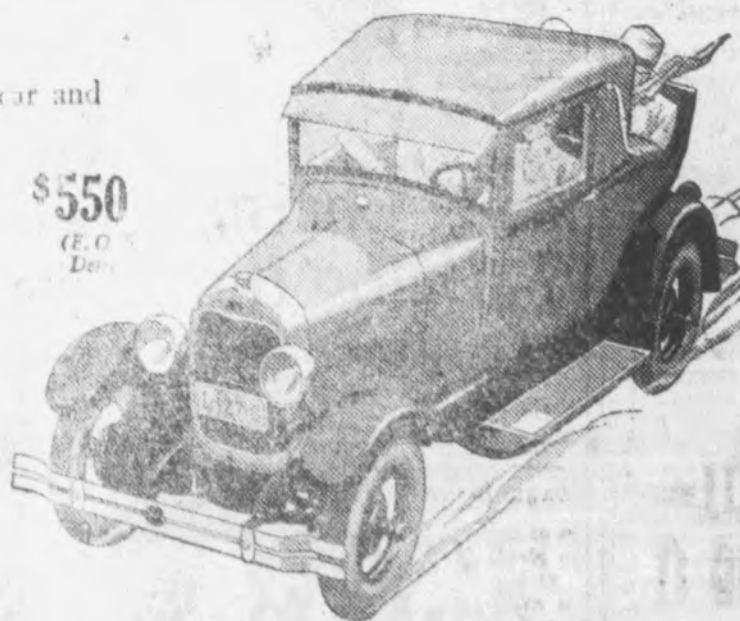

ONE KILLED IN GUN FIGHT

Attempt to Hold up 200 Guests in Chicago Ends in Sensational Battle.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—(AP)—An attempt to hold up 200 guests at the Parody Cafe, 1201 North State St., at 2:45 a. m. today turned into a sensational gunfight with the dance floor as the battleground. The casualties were:

One man shot dead.
Five men and two women wounded.

There were six robbers. Two, carrying pistols, entered the main entrance during an intermission in the dance program and ordered all hands up. Behind them came two others, carrying sub-machine guns, frequently employed in gangster raids.

Behind these came a man in a black mask, carrying an automatic shotgun. This robber, the leader, stopped in the middle of the dance floor, whirling about with the weapon so as to command the four sides of tables at which sat guests.

John Fried, a policeman attached to the city prosecutor's office who was a guest, opened fire on the man. The robber pivoted around to meet the attack, fired one shot and his weapon jammed.

Fried emptied his revolver and the bandit chief dropped with four bullets in his body. Later at a hospital it was said he probably would not recover.

When the robbers first appeared Harry Smith, a waiter, attempted to slip out a rear exit. He was shot dead by a lookout, the sixth member of the robber band.

Fried's action in opening fire threw the place into confusion. Several police officers, off duty but present as guests, began firing.

The single shot the bandit leader let go in Fried's direction struck June Griffith, 26, an entertainer, in the left side. She may die.

Miss Fannie Luman, 28, a guest, was shot in the hand as she held it high above her head.

Police Sergeant Cohan, seated with Mrs. Cohan at a table, began firing. He was shot in the left side.

Charles Silverman, another guest, got a bullet in the left hip, and William F. Malone, seated at one of the tables, was shot in the body, though not seriously.

The bandit, except the leader, had crossed the dance floor, seeking the table at which sat the proprietor, Dave Palinsky, from whom they hoped to get the receipts of the week-end business. The outbreak of firing, however, turned defense, and they shot their way toward the exits and escaped.

Calles Assumes Roll of Fighter

Aboard Presidential Train, Monterey, Mexico, Dec. 5.—(AP)—President Calles has assumed the role of a bull-fighter as one of his latest methods of entertaining Dwight W. Morrow, American ambassador, and other guests during their tour of northern Mexico. While provoking bulls into charges, Calles twice escaped injury when he fell.

At a ranch near Aguascalientes, the president and his guests, including the American ambassador, and Will Rogers, Saturday sat watching a bull fight in a private ring. Calles leaped into the bull-ring with the frolicsome spirit of a schoolboy. As the ambassador gazed apprehensively, Calles seized a bull-fighter's cloak and performed a number of dangerous "passes" or waves of the crimson cloak before a charging bull.

Each time the president skillfully avoided the horns of the charging animal, and drew applause. Twice during the performance he slipped and fell in front of charging animals.

After Calles had performed with the crimson cloak he took a lasso and gave an exhibition of roping several young bulls. Then panting, he climbed back into the grandstand, his neat black business suit covered with dust.

On being told that the performance looked dangerous, he said: "Oh, it wasn't very dangerous—but I'm accustomed to danger."

The crowd demanded that Rogers enter the ring, but he declined, saying that he had neglected to take out a bull-fighter's license and that Calles had already outclassed him.

STOCK MARKET.

Selling was for both accounts and influenced, in part, by commission houses' advice suggesting a lightening of long accounts in some of the recently strong industrials and specialties. Trading showed a marked falling off in volume.

The opening of Congress revived fears of adverse legislation in some quarters, although it was generally agreed that business would benefit from the lower tax schedule likely to be adopted. The day's business news was largely favorable to the stock market, including another advance in the price of export copper and reports of increasing inquiries for railroad equipment.

Weakness of the oil was based on the belief that the continued over-production of crude would have an adverse effect on the leading producing companies. Atlantic refining broke 6 points by early afternoon, and the pan-American

issues sank to new low levels for the year.

The closing was irregular. Total sales approximated 2,300,000 shares.

FLIERS LAND IN HONDURAS

Major Brainard, on Non-Stop Trip to Nicaragua, Forced Down by Winds

Managua, Nicaragua, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Making a "duty flight" from Miami, Fla., to Managua, Major E. H. Brainard, chief of the United States corps aviation forces, has completed the 1,035 mile trip in two jumps extending over a two day period.

With 785 miles covered, he and the United States and Honduras, Nicaraguans were somewhat disoriented when they landed at Tela, Honduras, Saturday, accomplishing the first non-stop flight between the two countries. The big Fokker plane had not continued on to Managua without stopping.

Major Brainard said he had been held up by heavy winds and as night was approaching he did not want to take chances. He therefore thought it wise to land at Tela.

Rivers Rising In This Section

Raleigh, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Eastern North Carolina rivers, which had been very low lately, were going out of their banks today with moderate rises. The U. S. Weather Bureau reported.

The rises followed rains of the last few days, totaling two or three inches yesterday, the last day of rain. Today it had stopped with clear and fair weather, and moderate temperature all over this section. An average of 34 degrees was noted at 8 a. m., following the lowest temperature of 32 degrees Sunday.

The weather bureau forecasted flood stage for the Tar river at Rocky Mount for late today. The Tar is a more slowly rising river than the Neuse and Roanoke rivers.

The Neuse river was three feet out of its banks at Smithfield with another foot rise due by tomorrow. The Roanoke at Weldon passed its first flood stage by four feet, with two or three feet additional forecast for tomorrow. The river rises are moderate ones, the bureau chief reported.

Four Women Die In Hotel Fire

St. Louis, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Four women were known to have been killed and seven persons dangerously injured in a fire early today which destroyed the rear section of the Buckingham Hotel annex with a loss estimated at \$170,000. Police feared other bodies were in the ruins.

Three nurses, two of whom jumped from windows on the fourth floor, were in a critical condition. They were Miss Myrtle Morris, 39; Miss Alice Gresham, 34; and Miss Bertha Lee, 21.

There were 118 guests in the two sections of the annex when the fire was discovered shortly before 3 a. m. Many ran to the street in night clothing. Others had to be rescued from their rooms by firemen who used gas masks because of dense smoke.

One woman sleeping in the hotel was killed. Pupils of the Central High School in Des Moines were led to safety.

Marshall, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Efforts to identify the youth drowned late Sunday in the French Broad river near here, in an effort to elude pursuing Madison county officers had proved unsuccessful today. A search of the river below where the boy jumped from his automobile was being made.

No trace had been found of the boy's companion who escaped into the mountains.

The French Broad was swollen by recent rains and snows and the pursuing officers, T. L. Henderson, town policeman, and Jailer Erwin Standan, were powerless to aid the boy.

The machine bore license tax 149.30 and was a 1925 model coupe and in it were found sixteen gallons of whiskey, a suit of clothes bearing the name J. L. Davis and a bunch of keys bearing the name J. B. Hildebrand.

Coast Guard Saves Crew of Two Ships

Norfolk, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Forty-eight sailors owed their lives today to life savers who brought new glory to the coast guard yesterday night while southeast of Cape Henry, fighting the gale that eventually dashed both ships on the ground off Hatteras.

They were the crews of the Norwegian steamer Cibao and the Greek vessel Paragay. The latter lost four of her personnel Saturday night while southeast of Cape Henry, fighting the gale that eventually dashed both ships on the ground off Hatteras. The four were working the pumps in an effort to keep the Paragay afloat when a wave washed them overboard.

While a half dozen ships, summoned by the Paragay's distress calls, searched for her north of Kitty Hawk, N. C., she went ashore just before daylight yesterday. Her remaining crew of 24 climbed into the rigging and watched while guardsmen from Kitty Hawk station launched a boat through the mountainous waves whipped up by the gale.

Several attempts failed, before the boat crew reached the Paragay, then half filled with water, and took off her sailors.

The storm that drove the Cibao around almost frustrated the rescue of her crew. The ingenuity of the life savers, however, won out over the waves that threatened to dash the coast guard boats to pieces against the Cibao's sides every time they approached her.

On shouted instructions from the guardsmen, the Cibao's 24 men tied ropes around their bodies and threw the loose ends into the water. When the ropes were picked up by the guard boats, the steamer's men leaped into the water, to be towed the three miles to shore. All were landed safely although several were unconscious when pulled out of the surf.

Asheville, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Peggy Bryant, estranged wife of G. Wallace Bryant, who is being sought on a charge of kidnapping her two young daughters, Marjorie, 6; and Frances, 4; is believed to be in Miami, Fla., officers announced here today.

Miami police talked with Bryant who is a patient in a local sanatorium, early this morning, and are seeking the woman. An arrest is momentarily expected, officers said. A woman answering the description of Mrs. Bryant, with two small girls left a Florida East Coast train at West Palm Beach yesterday for a walk on the station platform. They failed to get back on the train in time and were left. Miami police said they had learned that the woman and children had been given a "lift" into Miami by a Mr. and Mrs. John Miller.

SUPREME COURT FAILS TO PASS ON VALIDITY OF STOCK SALES LAW

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The Supreme Court refused today to pass upon the validity of the North Carolina laws governing stock sales, dismissing to appeal of the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, which sought to raise the question. The court held the case had not been fully litigated in the North Carolina Supreme Court.

The Maryland company asserted that the North Carolina Insurance Commissioner had been given unlawful arbitrary discretion in fixing the conditions of the bond of those engaged in selling stocks and bonds. It complained specifically because it had been held liable on bonds of \$1,000 each it had given to assure compliance with the law on the part of Edward G. Matthews and two others engaged in selling stocks and bonds.

Thrilled Scot Found.

Glasgow, Scotland, (AP)—The model for all thrifty Scots has been found here in the person of a beggar who was wearing five overcoats and three pairs of trousers, in the pockets of which were hundreds of half-smoked cigarettes, as many used and useful matches, keys, purses, knives, pipes and rings, three hard breakfast rolls and copper coins, weighing 13 1-2 pounds.

Shrine Veteran Retires

Minneapolis, (AP)—Capt. A. M. Sauey, credited with founding the first uniformed Shrine patrol in North America, has retired at 80 as active head of the Zuhrah Temple patrol of Minneapolis. He has been identified with Masonry since 1869 and in 1892 organized the Zuhrah patrol, the first Masonic body of its kind.

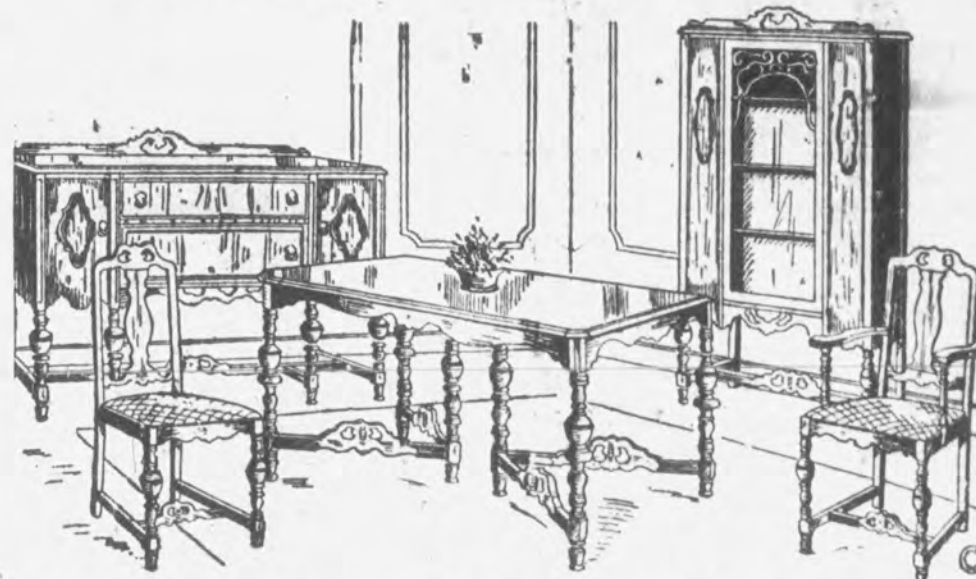
