

LEAGUE URGES EARLY ACTION ON DOPE EVIL

Report of Canadian on Narcotic Evil Unanimously Adopted by Council.

Geneva, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Strong action against the narcotics evil is called for in a report submitted to the council of the League of Nations today by Senator Raoul Dandurand, Canadian representative on the council. The report was unanimously adopted.

Repeating charges made by the League's opium commission that the illicit drug traffic continues on an enormous scale and is backed by huge financial resources, Senator Dandurand urged the nations belonging to the council to hasten ratification of the Geneva opium convention. Little progress can be achieved in combating the traffic until the convention enters into force, he said.

The Canadian delegate also urged the governments to study the possibility of more adequate control of narcotic factories. He told the council that Canadian ratification of the Geneva convention will be submitted to parliament.

Geneva, Dec. 6.—(AP)—An international conference to check counterfeiting will be convened within the next year by virtue of a resolution adopted today by the council of the League of Nations. The draft of a proposed treaty to organize the world for battle against spurious currency has already been elaborated by experts. These include W. H. Moran, chief of the secret service division of the United States treasury.

Geneva, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Mexico, Ecuador and Russia, non-participating nations in the recent conference on import and export prohibitions and restrictions, will be given an opportunity to adhere to the treaty adopted at the conference.

The council of the League of Nations adopted a resolution today that the treaty, which is intended to remove some of the barriers to international trade, be sent to these countries for their signature if they so desire.

Report Progress Of Immorality In American Centers

Geneva, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Most of the old time leaders of the White Slave traffic in America have become bootleggers since the passage of the Mann Act and the closing of houses of ill fame in American cities says the report of a committee to the Council of the League of Nations.

The report, compiled by the League's "white slave" committee of experts, was made public over the protest of Artistic Bland, French foreign minister. He argued against what he termed the publication of confidential information which would not be controlled.

The report indicates that American officials are making a determined stand against the international traffic in women and children and have been successful.

Condition in Panama, outside the Canal Zone, are found to be especially bad when the American fleet visits there. Agents are said to bring in many additional women, most of whom are described as actresses.

New Orleans, Tampa and various southern Florida cities are described as centers from which Mexican "girls" have been recruited.

Very young girls are being smuggled into American west coast cities by Chinese secret societies, chiefly into San Francisco, the report declares.

A woman proprietor of a resort in Havana is quoted as saying that she had no difficulties in recruiting girls because they are often stranded when American opera companies and variety shows visit Havana and beg to be taken in.

La Grange, Tex., Dec. 6.—(AP)—Advising with a smile to the plan of defense counsel to plead insanity Mrs. Rebecca Brady Rodgers, University graduate, stenographer and waitress, today had more reading material to divert her attention during selection of a jury for her trial here on a charge of bank robbery.

The young woman who married Otis Rogers, of defense counsel, when he was graduated from Texas University Law School two years ago, read newspapers throughout an exhaustive examination of jurors at the opening of the trial yesterday. She showed little interest when the prosecutor questioned prospective jurors as to their views on the death penalty and their opinion on the status of women as responsible citizens.

JUROR AGAIN DRAWN INTO OIL HEARING

Counsel Continues Demand for Dismissal Of Sensational Contempt Charges.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Motions by Harry F. Sinclair, W. J. Burns and their four associates to dismiss charges of criminal contempt growing out of the trial of the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case, were denied by Justice Siding in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia today.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Edward J. Kidwell, known as the talkative juror in the Fall-Sinclair oil trial, again was brought into the Sinclair contempt proceedings today when C. E. Brandenburg, counsel for Sheldon Clark asserted the real reason for the oil trial was the approaching of Kidwell by two persons. No action against these persons had been taken by the District Attorney, he said.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Fighting back at the government's attempt to have Harry F. Sinclair and William J. Burns and their associates adjudged in criminal contempt, a galaxy of counsel continued their demand in District of Columbia Supreme Court today for dismissal of the charges, growing out of the oil case jury surveillance.

Having denied all but one of the charges preferred by District Attorney Peyton Gordon, alleging intent to bribe, shadow and otherwise hamper the Fall-Sinclair jury, attorneys for the six defendants supplemented the defense contention of yesterday before Justice Frederick L. Siddons that the charges did not constitute a crime.

The one charge, admitted by counsel for Henry Mason Day, one of Sinclair's close associates—was that Day had employed the Burns detectives to shadow the jury at Sinclair's request, because he feared jury tampering might develop.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—New arguments were presented to Justice Frederick L. Siddons in the District of Columbia Supreme Court today to show that Harry F. Sinclair, William J. Burns and their associates had committed no act of contempt in having the jury in the Fall-Sinclair case shadowed.

Charles A. Douglas, Burns' attorney, contended among other things that an act to constitute contempt must be completed, and he asserted that Burns and his son, W. Sherman, and their Baltimore manager, Charles L. Weiss, had done nothing improper in placing the Fall-Sinclair jury under surveillance. He said the detectives had only exercised their constitutional rights in accepting employment and that no member of the jury had been actually approached.

No matter what act was contemplated, it was not in contempt, unless it was brought to the consciousness of the court, Douglas argued. For this reason, nothing charged by the government would be held to be in contempt of court as the court was not aware of the actions sighted.

Six Injured When Train Leaves Track

Atlanta, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Six men were seriously injured, one probably fatally, when the locomotive and twelve cars of an Atlanta, Birmingham and Coast freight train left the tracks near here shortly after midnight today, starting a blaze from derailed gasoline tank cars that, for a time, threatened to destroy the entire train.

T. Byers, engineer, was seriously scalded and not expected to live while others badly burned by the flames that burst out after the accident were.

R. V. Woodham, conductor; R. L. Jones, Scott White, fireman; R. T. Scott and a negro fireman whose name was not learned. All those injured were members of the train crew.

Hill's Name Not Sent to Senate

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The name of W. S. Hill, a member of the Shipping Board, who had expressed the belief that administration favor had left him, was missing from the list of nominations sent to the Senate today by President Coolidge.

Another name conspicuously absent from the nominations was that of William J. Tilson, of Georgia, brother of the House Republican leader, whose appointment as a federal judge in Georgia precipitated a long fight by Democratic Senators from that state.

PRES. COOLIDGE ADVOCATES NATIONAL DEFENSE PROGRAM IN HIS MESSAGE TO CONGRESS

Calls Upon People of The Country to Continue Stern Self Denial in National Expenditures.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Calling upon the people to continue a "stern self-denial" in national expenditures, President Coolidge laid before Congress today a moderate program of expansion of the nation's defenses and natural resources.

In a message which touched upon virtually all of the legislative issues which have aroused interest and speculation, the President presented views differing only in minor details from those he has previously outlined on the major problems of farm relief, taxation, flood control, foreign relations and the state of the army and navy.

Informing Congress that he had not changed in his opposition of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill with its equalization fee, he recommended instead a federal farm loan board with a revolving fund to build up cooperative marketing and aid in the disposition of crop surpluses. On tax revision he stood by the Treasury program.

The Navy, he said, should be expanded by the addition of cruisers, submarines, airplanes and carriers as well as the development of the merchant marine as a second line of defense.

He recommended that flood control be confined this year to the lower Mississippi River, with provision for adequate dikes, emergency spillways and aids to navigation cautioned that this problem should be met by viewing it as a separate, national question without attempts to link it with other proposals for river control and expansion; and suggested that the people enjoying the benefits of land reclaimed by government-built dikes share a partial, although perhaps lighter, burden of its expense.

Construction of a dam at Boulder Canyon in the Colorado River was favored by the President, who cautioned, however, that every other possibility should be exhausted before the federal government becomes engaged in the power business. Muscle Shoals, he said, now was mostly concerned with power, but in its disposition, he said, preference should be given to proposals to use all or part of it for nitrate production and fertilizer manufacturing.

Contending that the country had attained a prosperity never exceeded and therefore was in a position to enjoy some of the benefits which result from economy, Mr. Coolidge presented the spectre, nevertheless, of a large national debt and warned that until the revenues now directed towards its reduction could be diverted to internal improvements and national development, the people must continue to sacrifice, and the government must continue to economize.

"The Secretary of the Treasury," the President said, "has recommended a measure which would give us a much better balanced system of taxation and without oppression produce sufficient revenue. It has my complete support."

The President reiterated his belief in a high protective tariff, declaring that any reduction of the levies would work a hardship on industry and agriculture alike.

Although but one paragraph of his message was devoted to prohibition, the President emphasized the need for both the people and public officials to "observe the sanctions of this constitutional provision and its resulting laws."

Recalling that Congress and the States "with one or two notable exceptions" have passed adequate laws for enforcement of the eighteenth amendment, Mr. Coolidge declared that "the federal authorities proposed to discharge their ob-

PUBLISHES ALLEGED DEATH BED LETTER OF KING FERDINAND

Paris, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Le Journal published what is alleged to be King Ferdinand's death bed letter asking the late Premier Ion Bratianu of Rumania to arrange for former Crown Prince Carol to ascend the throne which he renounced.

The paper's correspondent said that he obtained at Bucharest a copy of the photograph of the letter, which Mihail Manoilescu was supposed to have shown the judge prior to his acquittal on charges of plotting Carol's return. He asserted that Julia Maniu, leader of the national peasants party in Rumania, believed that the letter is genuine while others have doubts about authenticity.

SCORES PLANS OF AL SMITH

Saloon League Superintendent Says Defeat Awaits Governor of N. Y.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Any man "like Al Smith, Nicholas Murray Butler or Nicholas Longworth who attempts to ride into the presidency with wet records and dry declarations will be disgracefully defeated," Dr. P. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, declared today before the League convention.

He also predicted disappointment for "any party that tries to get in power on a nullification program."

The "nullification" program which McBride asserted the "wets" are supporting, he defined as an effort to "detour around the constitution and the eighteenth amendment on the highway of liquor control by the light wine and beer route."

The keynote sounded almost unanimously by speakers today was that prohibition enforcement should be made the major issue in the 1928 presidential campaign.

The women's vote was pictured as an important and possibly deciding factor in the enforcement struggle by Mrs. Henry W. Peabody, chairman of the Women's National Committee for law-enforcement.

"Women will not support any party which offers them evasion or compromise to their demands on the enforcement problems," Mrs. Peabody asserted.

Senator Severely Criticizes Message Of Mr. Coolidge

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—President Coolidge's reference in his annual message to prosperity, flood relief and farm relief were criticized today in a statement by Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Senate leader.

He said Mr. Coolidge's prosperity claim was "flimsy," his reference to farm relief nebulous and his discussion of flood relief a disappointment.

Senator Robinson complained that the President asked the flood districts to meet part of the expense of construction of levees.

"There is a real danger," the Senator said, "that half way measures will be adopted now as they have been in the past. If the flood problem in the Mississippi valley is national rather than local, the government should pay the costs of such works as may be required. Of course, where the public works constructed may be utilized in part for other purposes as may be the case with reservoirs, a different rule may be applied."

"The reference to measures for farm relief are so general in their character that they do not form a basis for substantial legislation."

REMUS ROARS AT HIS TRIAL IN CINCINNATI

Combined Efforts of Three Men Required to Calm Former Bootlegger.

Cincinnati, Dec. 6.—(AP)—George Remus startled the court room and aroused the ire of Judge Chester R. Shook, presiding at his murder trial today by an outburst that required the combined efforts of three men and his daughter Romola to subside. Remus roaring voice was heard above the turmoil of rushing feet toward the man who bellowed, "my life's at stake, my life's at stake and I know my legal rights."

Judge Shook had threatened Remus with contempt of court proceedings to which Remus replied in astonishing terms:

"Your honor I have tried criminal cases throughout this country and I know how to couch and phrase objections correctly."

Remus had been overruled in an objection and instructed not to give evidence in an objection.

"Don't arraign the court!" thundered Judge Shook, with unexpected severity and he was about to proceed when Remus cut in:

"Sit down and keep quiet. Don't make me warn you again or I'll cite you for contempt of court," Judge Shook cried in a voice that brought Sheriff William A. Anderson and another deputy running to crowd around Remus.

Remus own bailiffs assigned to guard against any outbreak crowded about him urging him to sit down. Judge Shook ruffled through books angrily as though about to act against the belligerent Remus. Sheriff Anderson who was repeating the Judges orders that he sit down, Remus cried:

"Is the courts privilege but my life's at stake and I know my legal rights?"

COOLIDGE NOT WITH BUTLER

President Not in Favor of Designating Kansas City as Con- vention City.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—President Coolidge does not stand with his friend, William Butler, chairman of the republican national committee, in endorsing Kansas City or any other particular city for next year's republican national convention.

STORM CLOUDS GATHER OVER CAPITOL HILL

Senate Republicans Throw Down Gauntlet to Western Independents.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—New storm clouds gathered over Capitol Hill today as the new congress, in the second day of its session assembled to hear the reading of President Coolidge's annual message disclosed a chief executive standing pat on those controversial subjects which had been the source of his greatest opposition in senate and house but the senate itself uncovered a new element of uncertainty and political controversy in its own ranks.

Just before the annual message was received at the capitol by messenger, to be read to each house separately by its clerk, senate republicans all but threw down the gauntlet to the group of five western independents who are demanding certain legislative assurance on farm relief and other subjects before they support the republican slate of senate officers. The conference, after some plain talk about telling the Independents to go as far as they liked, finally did authorize a continuation of negotiations.

This development, added to the Smith-Vare row, gave promise of plenty of trouble before the senate actually gets down to legislative business.

The house, however, was in a more serene and industrious mood. A few minutes before arrival of the presidential message in which the President stood four square behind Secretary Mellon's tax reduction program, the ways and means committee formally submitted its tax bill for early house consideration.

Nearly all of the secretary's recommendations were scrapped by the committee in preparing a bill that would accomplish a reduction of \$230,000,000 or \$11,000,000 more than the President and treasury capitolized.

The fight over that issue probably will begin in the open before the end of the week for the leaders plan to clear away the legislative underbrush as quickly as possible and give tax legislation and right of way for farm relief also is certain to again be a storm center, for the President re-affirmed in his message that he could not accept the equalization fee of the McNary-Haugen bill, which a majority of both senate and house approved last session, only to encounter a presidential veto.

Mr. Coolidge proposed instead of the McNary-Haugen plan a financing arrangement by which a farm board would use a revolving fund to promote cooperative associations.

On such subjects as Boulder Canyon and foreign relations both of which bitterly controverted last session, the President stood by his guns. He recommended a program of flood relief without going into details.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The long delayed battle over the twin "shush fund" senatorial contests from Pennsylvania and Illinois finally came to its zero hour today on the senate floor.

Firing the opening gun, Senator Norris of Nebraska, a leader of the republican independents, asked the senate to bar Frank L. Smith and William S. Vare, as senators because the elections in which they were chosen had been waged "on the theory that a senatorial toga was on the auction block."

Senator Norris has resolutions pending which would withhold the oath of office from Smith and Vare, and would condemn their campaign expenditures in the same language used in its expressing its disapproval of excessive campaign funds in the Newberry case from Michigan.

Parents Engineer School Strike at NewPort, Oregon

Newport, Ore., Dec. 6.—(AP)—A second school strike engineered by the parents of about 40 of Newport's 50 or more high school students, was in progress today as the result of a controversy over the principal, Mrs. Daisy Hallett.

The strike, which is the second in the last few weeks, got under way yesterday when the parents gathered at the school and directed their children to collect their books and go home. The complaint was that the board of education had violated the will of the majority in appointing a woman instead of a man to have charge of the school. About a dozen students remained in their classes.

One of the complaints against Mrs. Hallett in the previous strike was that she wore long dresses and used old fashioned methods in running the school.

He told the Men's Club of the LaFayette Reformed church last night that the attention of spectators at a football game is centered on the ball, and for that reason the great brutality of the game is not noticed whereas the attention of spectators at a boxing match is centered on the blows.

Harnett Man Freezes to Death

Dunn, N. C., Dec. 6.—(AP)—Added to the list of dead as a result of storms in North Carolina the past week end was the name of Marshall Lee, 25, Harnett county farmer whose body was found frozen in an automobile here.

Physicians said Lee died from freezing. It was apparent that his car had stalled and he was trying to fix it when he was overcome by the cold.

Legislature To Probe Governor's Office in Okla.

Oklahoma City, Dec. 6.—(AP)—For the second time within four years Oklahoma legislators were assembled today for the announced purpose of investigating the governor's office with a view to possible impeachment proceedings.

The present movement, however, differed from that started in 1923 which resulted in the impeachment of Gov. J. C. Walton. While Governor Walton at first declined to call the session he later permitted convocation after the National Guard had been called out to deny legislators admittance to the capitol. Governor Henry S. Johnston, likewise has declined to call the session, but members of the lower house will seek to override his decision with a self-convened session.

Two Team Football System to Become Reality Next Year

Chicago, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The two team football system, long talked of both in the Western Conference and in other sections, is to become a reality in the big Ten next fall.

Michigan taking the initiative, Iowa also has announced definite plans for a second team.

Fielding H. Yost, director of athletics, and Dr. Clarence Cook Little, President of Michigan, have announced that games for the second Michigan team are being sought among other Conference and non-Conference schools.

As most Conference teams have completed their 1928 schedules and none have yet indicated any intention to follow the Michigan system, the two teams will be rated as first and second for the 1928 season, the Michigan authorities said, but eventually they are to be developed into two squads of equal power.

Fail to Settle Wage Dispute In Colorado Strike

Denver, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Failure of a mediation board to reach an agreement here in a wage dispute between the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers and more than 50 western railroads today brought a demand for union officials for further consideration.

The board of six members last night reported it was unable to agree on the principal question, relative to increased pay for firemen, helpers, hostlers and outside helpers, and declined to make any award on other demands. These workers sought an increase of one dollar a day.

Samuel A. Bone and Albert Phillips, appointed by the Brotherhood, agreed on an increase for road firemen of 45 cents a day and 40 cents for other employees. R. V. Fletcher and John Higgins, representatives of the carriers, were unwilling to give the firemen an increase, but favored a boost of seven and a half per cent to other employees involved.

Chief Justice H. P. Burke of the Colorado Supreme Court, chairman of the board, and Paul A. Sinsheimer, both named by the national board of mediation, suggested 30 cents more a day for road passenger firemen and 35 cents for other employees. Mr. Sinsheimer later said he favored a slightly larger increase than announced jointly by Chairman Burke and himself.

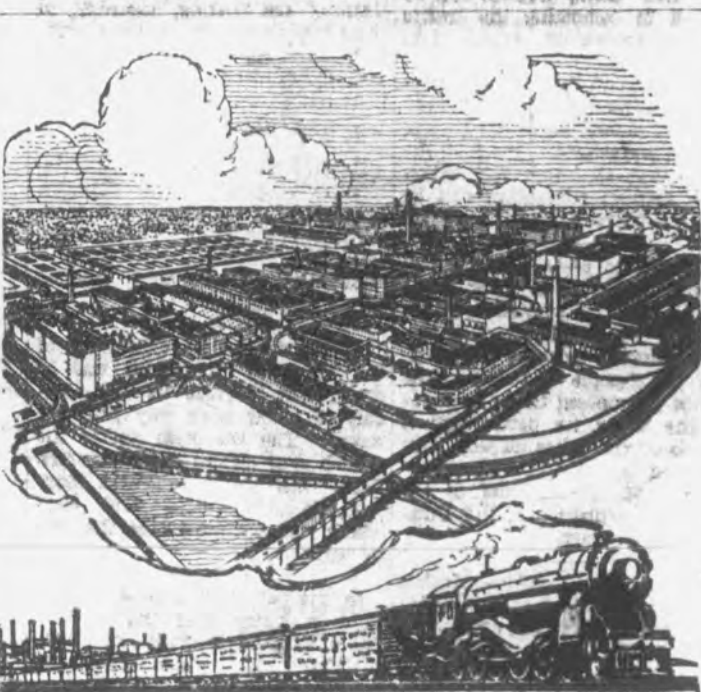

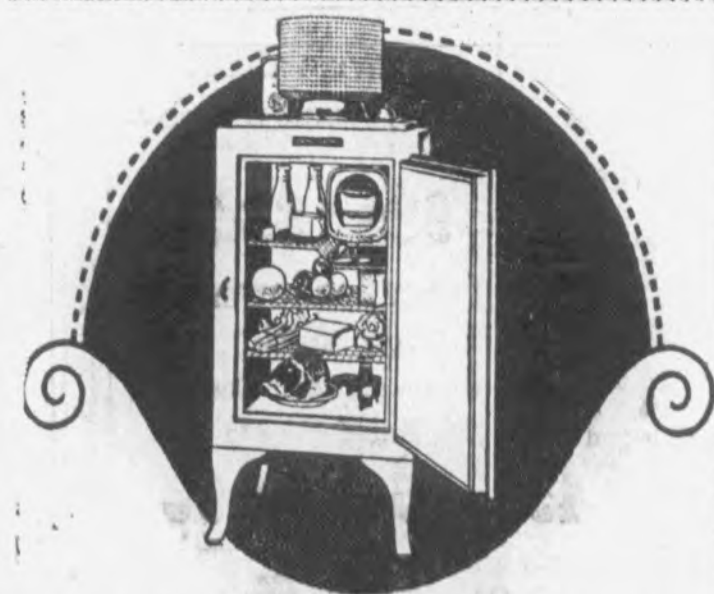

BLINDFOLDED

"Effective control of the criminal courts," says Louis N. Robinson, Secretary of the Sub-Committee on Parole, etc., in a report presented to the National Crime Commission, "must rest on judicial criminal statistics which for this purpose are today practically nonexistent, with the exception perhaps, of Massachusetts." Almost as lagging are the States in establishing means of identification of criminals other than first offenders. Only thirteen States have identification bureaus; of these only two are ten years old, and three were established only in the present year. In such lamentable conditions the hardened criminal must often escape his just deserts for new crimes committed, simply for lack of information concerning him.

Signing the report of the sub-committee as Chairman, ex-Gov. Lowden of Illinois, strongly argues for a proper system of criminal accountability. Criminal statistics must be more fully compiled and studied and means of identification of criminals, uniform among co-operating States, must be provided if society is to win in its duel with modern crime.—N. Y. World.

"North Carolina farmers are well acquainted with damage caused by the tobacco flea-beetle, or flea bug as he is generally termed through the country," said C. H. Brannon, entomologist of the state Extension department, in a letter mailed out to tobacco growers of this district.

"The damage to tobacco by the flea-beetle is enormous, amounting to many thousands of dollars each year. Therefore, the tobacco grower should study carefully the best methods of control.

The tobacco flea is about one-fifteenth of an inch in length and usually escapes notice until present in very destructive numbers.

Tobacco growers should make every effort to control the flea beetle in the tobacco beds, if it is done, later injury in the field will be lighter. We cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of control in the plant bed. Later in the field they are too difficult to control.

"Be sure to use tuberculosis Christ mas seals on packages mailed out during the holiday season," members of the Woman's club urged today.

"The farmers were quoted a price of 14c per chick of either Rhode Island Reds, Barred Rock or White Wyandottes. This is a very attractive price and gives the farmers a chance to make some ready cash through the winter months. These chicks can be made to weigh 2 lbs. in eight weeks and will bring around 30c per pound or around a \$1.00 each. Any farmer in Pitt county can by devoting his time to baby chicks for eight weeks make enough money to pay his grocery bill for the entire summer.

"The office will be glad to assist farmers who have not had experience in growing out chicks. It all depends on getting them started off right. It is a specialized business and requires the minutest attention in carrying out details.

"Car shipments will start around March the first and will continue at intervals until May 15th.

"Farmers who desire to pay all expenses as they go and leave their tobacco and other cash crops free of usual fall debts will do well to consider this project and the one to follow in hog raising."

farming. If acreage becomes over-extended, the Government can not assume responsibility for it. The Government can, however, assist cooperative associations and other organizations in orderly marketing and handling a surplus clearly due to weather and seasonal conditions, in order to save the producer from preventable loss.

"While it is probably impossible to secure this result at a single step, and much will have to be worked out by trial and rejection, a beginning could be made by setting up a Federal board of commission of able and experienced men in marketing, granting equal advantages under this board to the various agricultural commodities and sections of the country, giving encouragement to the cooperative movement in agriculture, and providing a revolving loan fund at a moderate rate of interest for the necessary financing. Such legislation would lay the foundation for a permanent solution of the surplus problem."

Any attempt to revise laws affecting the federal revenues, Mr. Coolidge declared, should be approached with a desire to sustain the national budget.

Significant admonition was given Congress that the duty for making a tax bill was peculiarly its own and that it should guard against special interests, too often selfish always uninformed of the national needs as a whole, with hired agents using their proposed measures as engines of propaganda.

Being a nation which relies upon its ability to maintain peace by fair dealing and good will rather than by force, the President advocated the maintenance of a moderate army and navy. He added, however, the need for considerable naval expansion had been demonstrated some time ago and that in vindicting its navy, the United States would not be moved by false

ure of the Geneva armament conference. He said the United States is "ready and willing to continue the preparatory investigations on the general subject of limitation of armaments which have been started under the auspices of the League of Nations."

"Everyone knew," Mr. Coolidge said, "that had a three power agreement been reached it would have left us with the necessity of continuing our building program. The failure to agree should not cause us to build either more or less than we otherwise should."

"Any future treaty of limitation will call on us for more ships. We should enter on no competition. We should refrain from no needful program."

"The President declared that stabilization of Great Lakes remained to be considered so that they may be opened to the sea, Congress having already authorized the Mississippi system. This stabilization would provide a gulf to the Atlantic waterway, endorsed by Mr. Coolidge in his Philadelphia speech before the Union League, and his message declared that the boards

of engineers had decided the St. Lawrence River the more expeditious and cheaper route."

While he favored proposals for promoting peace throughout the world, Mr. Coolidge declared that the United States should continue to promote peace by example and "fortify it by such international covenants against war as we are permitted under our Constitution to make."

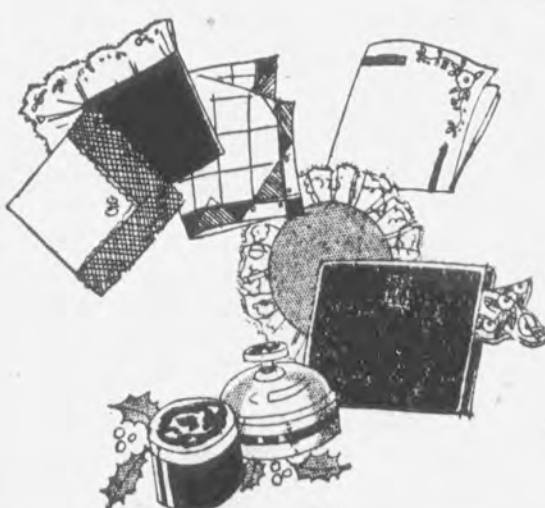

Court Room, May's Landing, N. J., Dec. 6.—(AP)—If there was blood on his clothing after he was killed, it came from a nose bleed her little son had and from mosquitoes she slapped as they were stinging her, and no wound on her husband's wounds, Mrs. Margaret Lillendahl testified in her own defense today.

Cross-examination today dealt with a meeting between Mrs. Lillendahl and Beach on the morning of the killing. To police she said she saw him driving past her house. Yesterday on the stand she said she drove past him between Vireland and South Vineland.

She said she could not recall having made the earlier answer and insisted her yesterday's testimony was correct.

"Well," Prosecutor Hingle asked "can you tell me now how many times you saw Beach on that day?" "I only remember that one time when I drove past him."

"Then you did not see him going by your house?" "I don't recall."

The next witness was the widow brother-in-law, Henry Lillendahl, New York lawyer. He said that the relations between his brother and

Mrs. Lillendahl were very affectionate. After calling one other witness the defense rested.
Prosecutor Hingle then told the court that Harry Sanderson, a state witness, wished to correct a mistake he had made in his original testimony.
He had testified he could not identify Beach as the man he saw.
Today he said it was Beach he saw.
When he changed his mind at that time he did not say. He had a nervous breakdown after the previous testimony.

Harmony Holds Sway Today At League Sessions

Dallas, Texas, Dec. 6.—(AP)—After three days of maneuvering featured by spirited arguments in the Western League camp, harmony prevailed today among officials of various minor circuits as they joined representatives of the majors for the initial session of the convention of the National Association of professional baseball clubs.

The American Association was the first to solve the pre-season problems. In dealing with the question of Major League ownership of minor clubs the Association placed a clause in its revised constitution providing that board of directors must approve all franchise sales. QUEEN COLLEGE NEARER GOAL IN RAISING FUND

Charlotte, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Queen college of this city, was today some \$70,000 nearer the goal in its movement to raise a \$300,000 endowment fund following the action yesterday of the Kings Mountain Presbytery meeting at Gastonia, voting to deed the buildings and grounds of the Westminster school in Ruthford to the college. Upon receiving news of the gift, Dr. W. H. Fraser, president of Queens, said that proceeds from the sale of the property would be applied to the endowment.

Westminster school, located Dysartville-Morgantown road was operated by the Presbyterian denomination until decision several years ago was reached to discontinue it. The property was valued at between \$65,000 and \$75,000.

EIGHT PERSONS PERISH IN FIRE

Victims Trapped in Boarding House Today at Williamson W. Va.

Williamson, W. V., Dec. 6.—Eight persons met death in a fire which destroyed a boarding house here today.

Six of the victims were residents of the Dingess section of Mingo county, who had come to Williamson to testify in the murder trial of Elijah Wellman and his three sons. The fire originated in a hallway between two sections of the rooming house about six a. m. and spread so rapidly that the eight were trapped when flames cut off the stairway at the front of the building.

All the bodies were found in a bathroom on the upper floor to which the victims had fled from the advancing flames. It was apparent that some of them had sought to wrap their heads in water soaked blankets.

Those burned to death were: Mrs. Will Hampton, her three children, Goldie, Wade and a six weeks old baby; Pearl Johnson Browning and Deputy Sheriff John L. Marcum, all witnesses at the murder trial and Bob Ireson and his son, Albert, who conducted a cafe on the second floor of the building and lived above it.

The origin of the fire was uncertain but foremen believed that it started in a trash pile in the hallway. Deputy Marcus was believed to have lost his life because of the time it took him to attach an artificial leg after the danger became known. A companion occupying the same room with Mrs. Hampton escaped and it was uncertain whether trying to save the children or an effort to get on more clothing delayed the woman until escape for all four members of the family was cut off.

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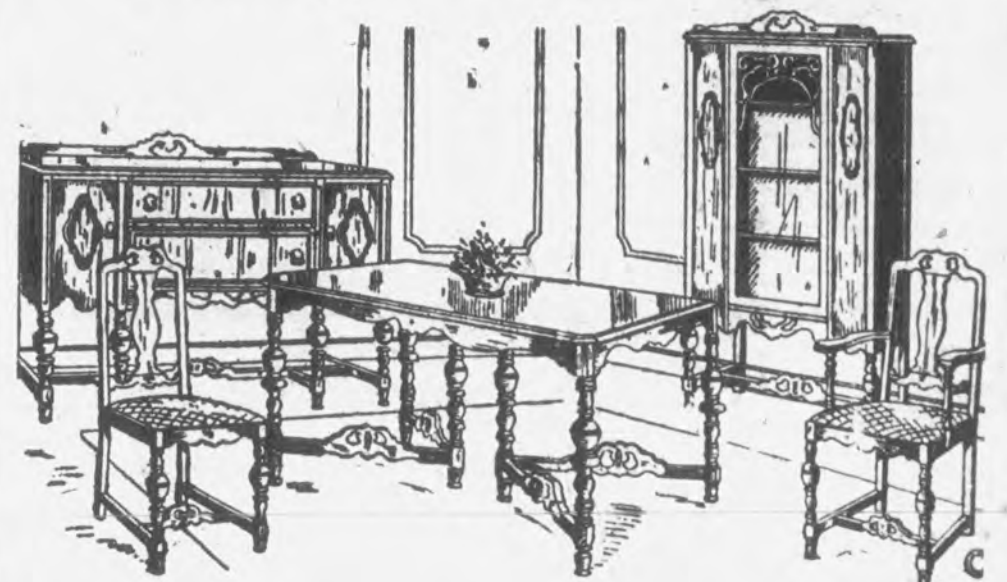
