U. S. GUNBOATS LAND GUNS AT CANTON, CHINA

Armed Launches Sent Into Tungshan to Bring American Ci- zens to Safety.

Shanghai, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The United States gunboat Sacramento has landed field guns at Canton to protect foreigners.

The guns were taken to the United States consulate in the Shamen concession district.

The American forces have also aided in evacuating foreigners from the Chinese sections of the city which is controlled by communists who ousted the latest Canton dictator, General Chang Kai-shek.

Armed launches from the United States gunboat Paishan were sent to Hungshan, a suburb of Canton, to bring Americans there to safety. Other vessels belonging to the Standard Oil Company were also despatched to aid in the work.

Fifteen Americans and two British subjects were brought from the Chinese City to Shamen island by armored launches, dispatches direct from Canton stated today. The launches belonged to the Standard Oil Company and were manned by armed guards.

A general concentration of Canton government troops has taken place in Honan, adjacent to Canton, they were believed to be preparing to renew their attack on the communist element in Canton City.

The foreign forces at Canton were striving to prevent an "incident." The concentration of foreigners in Shamen where the foreign concessions have grown up, was in line with this policy.

Dispatches from Hongkong stated that some foreigners were proceeding to Canton and some already arrived there.

A third United States gunboat, the Asheville, arrived at Canton from Hongkong.

Advices from Hongkong stated that at the time the Asheville was ordered to Canton yesterday she was off Poochow attempting to save the burning Chinese steamer Hsin Ting-Hsin when the latter's fire pumps failed, the vessel was beached with no loss of life. The Asheville then proceeded to Canton.

There were signs today that the communists, successful in Canton were trying to bring about a general strike.

Shanghai itself appears calm, however, although several groups of workers have gone on strike. These included tramway workers, dock laborers and employees of the British-American Tobacco Company. An attempt was made to bring out the bus operators in the international settlement and tramway workers in the French concession. Communist agitators were also busy among the lower grade workers in the post office.

Communist outbreaks were reported from various ports along the Yangtze river, including Wuchang and Changsha. The Chinese authorities are suppressing these vigorously.

London, Dec. 13.—(AP)—A soviet government has been established in Canton by the communists who seized the city, press dispatches stated today.

One of the most prominent communists is the leading of the seamen's union, who is bitterly hostile to Hong Kong. A Reuters dispatch said. The former chief secretary of Michael Bordin, Russian adviser to the former Canton nationalist government, has been appointed commissar for war.

The trouble appeared to have been confined to the native city, but there is no doubt that the communists dominate it.

The foreign establishments in the Shamen area were not affected. Nowhere have foreigners been molested as far as it could be learned.

Many well-to-do Chinese fled to Hong Kong fearing for their safety. The extent of the damage due to the disturbances could not be ascertained. It was apparent, however, that the city at the present time would be a dangerous place for independent foreign investigations.

Hankow, Dec. 13.—(AP)—A serious mutiny is reported to have broken out in Laohow in northern Hupeh, about 200 miles northwest of Hankow.

The troops there were reported to be looting and burning the city which is on the Han river.

Hong Kong, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Between 30 and 40 missionaries, mostly Americans and Germans, arrived here today aboard the British steamer Paishan from Canton. The missionaries originally had fled from up country posts to Canton.

The vessel was packed with many hundreds of Chinese refugees.

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A Chicago resort, described as a "vice hotel," is thoroughly bombed, despite a protecting iron door. Police suspect that "Mike De Pike" Heiler, recently in the penitentiary was bombed for trying to "muscle in on the vice racket in Chicago." "Mike De Pike's" desire was natural for that "racket" which includes bootlegging, gambling and vice, takes in all told \$75,000,000 a year.

TO DESTROY BIG BRIDGE

\$250,000 Structure Over Pee Dee River To Be Wrecked With Army Artillery.

Raleigh, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The roar of army artillery and the explosion of bombs dropped from army airplanes will be heard in North Carolina Monday, when forces from Fort Bragg, Langley and Maxwell air fields begin a concerted attack upon a certain section of Stanley and Montgomery counties.

The target will be a \$250,000 steel and concrete bridge, pride of the North Carolina highway commission which is to be destroyed in the interest of science. The bridge spans the Pee Dee river between the two counties on the state highway No. 74.

An air armada of 18 planes will come from the two flying fields to hurl high explosive bombs, while the 5th and 17th field artillery from Fort Bragg, perched on a hill several miles away will throw shells at the bridge.

The big show is to last six days according to attack orders issued from Fort Bragg. Frank Page, chairman of the highway commission will turn the bridge over to the U. S. Army Saturday. The state has completed its test on the strength of the bridge.

The country side for five miles in each direction from the bridge will be cleared of inhabitants when "war" is declared.

Spectators will not be allowed within that distance. Movie camera men, galore, and newspaper men, are expected to be in full view of the bridge.

Roads will be closed during the firing but, the orders say, they will not be closed for more than one hour at the time. When they are opened, army motorcycles will accompany travelers through the danger zone.

Airplanes will drop sand loaded, 600 and 1100 pound bombs from an altitude of 8,000 feet to begin with and after the effects of these tests are studied, will drop 300 pound, 600 pound and 1100 pound bombs loaded with TNT, from various heights.

The artillery will bombard with 165 M. M. shells.

Final tests will come when bombs are placed at various spots on the bridge and are exploded, one by one while experts note the damage, until the huge bridge is destroyed completely.

Bombing of the bridge offers the first opportunity for the ordnance department of the army to test the functioning of larger type post-war demolition bombs against a land target typical of a class of unprotected targets for use against which such bombs are intended.

BEGIN TRIAL OF FLOGGERS AT RALEIGH

Road Camp Supervisor First of Fifteen Men to go on Trial in Wake Today.

Raleigh, Dec. 13.—(AP)—G. E. Belshe, county road camp supervisor, was placed on trial in superior court here today on charges growing out of the flogging one year ago today of A. E. Jones, one armed rural merchant and his negro helper Sam Green. The merchant and the negro were flogged by a band of masked men.

Belshe is the second of fifteen men indicted, after Jones had reported the floggings, to be placed on trial. Leland Rogers was acquitted ten months ago.

The case of the remaining thirteen men are docketed for the present term of court at which Judge N. A. Sinclair is presiding but it is expected to be several days before they will be reached.

The defense prepared to offer alibies in behalf of Belshe as well as the other defendants in line with the course pursued in the trial of Rogers, whose alibi defense was accepted by the jury in the first flogging trial. Several of the defendants under indictment at this time presented alibi evidence in the Rogers trial and were on hand to repeat the evidence in the Belshe case.

Indictments against the defendants, Belshe, Dr. J. R. Hester, deputy sheriff Clyde Weathers, John Hamrick, Wiley O'Neal, Jr., Paul Hester, Whit Ramsey, Paul Robertson, Lathara Stell, Bennie Weathers, Eddie Robertson, Leroy Hester, Charles Hester, Jr., and John Hester, were returned by the grand jury shortly after the floggings.

Jones reported the flogging personally when he visited the court hours the day after his treatment and told sheriff Turner of the affair. He said one of the floggers accused him of breaking up the Cross Roads Baptist church, of giving Green money to buy whiskey and of being intimate with a woman.

Herrin, Ill., Dec. 13.—(AP)—A year of peace in Herrin, one of the storm centers of the southern Illinois coal fields, was broken here last night when an automobile filled with gunmen left behind two wounded police officers.

Elmer McCormick, brother of Mayor Marshall McCormick, was in a critical condition today from gunshot wounds in his neck and breast and John Stamm, day chief of police, was nursing wounds in the shoulder from the rifles of the gunmen who drove twice around the city hall, firing a volley upon each circuit.

N. C. Tobacco Averaged \$26.28 During November

Raleigh, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Prices for tobacco in North Carolina in November averaged \$26.28 a hundred pounds compared with \$27.66 for the same month last year, the sales report of the crop reporting service, federal department of agriculture, today showed.

Mebane led last month with a \$32.54 average, followed by Roxboro, \$29.09; Fuquay Springs, \$28.41; Durham, \$28.26; Oxford, \$28.25; Robertsonville, \$27.71; Washington, \$27.40; Wilson, \$27.36; Tarboro, \$27.22; and Greenville, \$27.17.

While the price average was one dollar below that of November last year, Tar Heel farmers last month received \$31,698,800 as compared with \$28,766,400 in November, 1926, or a \$2,932,400 jump for total producers' sales last month amounted to 126,977,862 pounds compared with 104,932,285 a year ago.

Winston-Salem led the sales with 19,975,812 pounds sold, followed by Wilson, 16,791,262; Greenville, 15,042,466; Rocky Mount, 8,954,873; Kinston, 7,967,948; Durham, 7,322,958; Henderson, 6,505,662; Oxford, 5,936,690; Farmville, 3,762,309; and Roxboro, 2,459,667.

The charges as announced by Mr. Moon confirmed generally to announcements made by representative H. Tom Knight, chairman of the house investigating committee.

SIX CHARGES HELD AGAINST GOV. JOHNSON

Oklahoma Legis- lature Indicts Chief Ex- ecutive in Secret Ses- sion Held today.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Dec. 13.—(AP)—A indictment containing six charges against Gov. Henry S. Johnston was approved by the state house of representatives at a secret session here today, representative Charles Moch announced as he emerged from the meeting.

Mr. Moon said that after each charge had been approved the house voted to consolidate the allegations and present the indictment to the senate which has declared itself qualified to sit as a court of impeachment.

He announced that a charge of "corruption in office" also was voted against chief justice Fred Bronson of the state supreme court.

Three charges also were voted against Harry B. Cordell, president of the state board of agriculture, representative Robert C. Graham of Oklahoma City announced.

Mr. Graham said two of the charges concerned alleged illegal expenditure of state funds and the third irregularities in banking department payrolls. The first two charges carried 46 to 8, he said, and the third allegation 41 to 8.

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KY. GOVERNOR RELEASES 67 FROM PRISON

Retiring Executive Kept Busy Signing Pardons Until Early Hour Today.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 13.—(AP)—The passing out of office today of William J. Fields as governor of Kentucky was marked by issuance of 67 pardons, commutations and restoration of citizenship that kept him signing his name until the early hours of the morning.

W. Turner Harrod of Louisville, whose sentence to die in the electric chair had recently been affirmed by the state court of appeals, was the only man the retiring governor saved from death, but the other acts of clemency ranged throughout almost the entire list of offenders, including four men who were serving life sentences for murder.

Others who received clemency were serving time for embezzlement, forgery, shooting, child desertion, barn burning, grand larceny, house breaking, liquor law violators and other offenses.

In extending clemency governor Fields gave briefly his reasons in each case, explaining that he had made exhaustive study of the pleas in granting Harrod a full and complete pardon the Governor said he was convinced that Harrod was mentally deranged at the time of the shooting. Harrod was convicted of killing Rose Nolan and the state had contended that Harrod, becoming angry had tried to kill the woman's husband and entire family. The Governor also said he was not sure who fired the first shot.

In all the retiring Governor had granted 129 pardons since Nov. 1, but they were a few at a time until he started in late yesterday announcing them, and worked all night attaching his signature. In the closing days of his term, he added 21 names to the list of Kentucky Colonels, Honorary members of his staff.

Inauguration of Flem D. Sampson as governor at noon today marks the induction into office of a republican governor, in place of a democrat. Governor Fields did not seek re-election and Judge Sampson, a member of the state court of appeals, defeated J. C. W. Beckham democrat. All other state officials and the legislature, however, are democrats. Mr. Beckham made a fight against race track gambling, while Judge Sampson held that it was not the issue.

BIG SHOWING OF CHRISTMAS GOODS HERE

They plan to give the thousands of people represented in this trade territory an opportunity of purchasing the most desirable and seasonable merchandise at prices which will compare favorably with any other section of the country.

Stressing the part which members of the association are playing to make this the greatest Christmas in history of the city, the association is today carrying a page advertisement in the columns of this paper, informing the public of what may be expected in the way of splendid offerings.

The movement on foot to make this city the leading shopping center of Eastern Carolina is rapidly gaining momentum through efforts of the association members to compete with larger cities. The city today draws hundreds of people from other trade territories and it is expected this number will be greatly increased during the holiday season.

Over 400,000 Pounds Tobacco Here Today

The Greenville tobacco market yesterday sold 398,742 pounds of bright leaf tobacco for a total sum of \$90,692.36, at an average price of \$22.47, according to official figures made public this afternoon by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade.

Total season sales, including yesterday's sale, had reached \$8,962,426 pounds.

It was estimated that there was about 400,000 pounds on floors today and that sales would be completed shortly after the noon hour.

TAX BILL HAS HARD SLEDDING IN THE HOUSE

Democrats Jubilant Over Increased Re- ductions For Small Corporations.

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Facing perhaps even rougher going than it has encountered thus far, the next tax bill again today courted friend and foe in the house.

With the democrats jubilant over one victory, having effected an increased reduction for small corporations with net taxable incomes of \$15,000 or under, they moved into another battleground offered by the exiles of nuisance taxes.

Of these levies, all repudiated by the war, one in particular, the tax on automobile sales, held the center of attention with the democrats gaining the support of some republicans in demanding its outright repeal.

The fight over this levy broke out during the tax hearings by the ways and means committee and shifted to the house itself when that body proposed a reduction from 3 to 1 1/2 per cent instead of repeal.

Aside from the controversy over this levy, the tax on club dues provided additional ground for dispute, as did the committee's recommendation that the exemption on admission tickets be increased from 75 cents to \$1, rather than the \$3 figure that many persons sought.

The democrats in winning a victory yesterday caught republicans off guard and there remained considerable uncertainty whether the former will be able to hold the ground already won when a final vote on the bill is taken either late tomorrow or Thursday. At that time Chairman Green of the ways and means committee is expected to demand a record vote and with republicans holding a comfortable majority, there appears little likelihood that the democrats can maintain their position.

The democratic amendment affecting corporations was offered by Representative Garner, senior minority member on the committee, and proposed in place of the 11 1/2 per cent tax rate on corporation incomes, a rate schedule as follows: Five per cent on net taxable incomes of \$7,000 or less; 7 per cent on incomes between \$7,000 and not over \$12,000; and 9 per cent on incomes between \$12,000 and not over \$15,000. It was estimated by Representative Chidholm of Illinois, a republican on the committee, that the proposed rates would increase by \$28,000,000 the \$32,750,000 provided for in the bill.

Tells Sheriffs To Enforce Law On FireWorks

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 13.—(AP)—Soured by the death of a baby girl from swallowing a piece of fireworks, Governor Richards has called upon sheriffs of South Carolina to enforce rigidly the state's anti-fireworks statutes. In a letter published today the chief executive reminded the officers that all poisonous fireworks are prohibited and all others over one-half inch in diameter, while cap pistols are also outlawed.

Barbara Gleason, 20 months old, of Springfield, died in a local hospital a few days ago from the effects of phosphorus poisoning attributed to the "son of a gun."

DEMAND RESIGNATIONS OF JARDINE AND TENNY

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Resignations of Secretary Jardine and Lloyd S. Tenny, of the Bureau of Economics in the Department of Agriculture, were demanded in the Senate today by Senator Hefflin, Democrat, of Alabama, because of the break in cotton prices recently following issuance of a Department price estimate.

LINDY BEGINS LONG TRIP TO MEXICO CITY

Flying Ace Hopped Off at Bolling Field Shortly After Noon Hour Today.

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh started his 2,000 mile non-stop flight to Mexico City today taking the air at Bolling field at 12:22 p. m.

As he started over the Potomac Lindbergh seemed to be having difficulty in gaining altitude. As the Spirit of St. Louis disappeared in the murky atmosphere the flyer seemed to be getting better results and quickly disappeared to the southward.

Lindbergh laid his plans quietly for the hop-off just as he did when he was preparing for the transatlantic flight which brought a thrill to the world. Having no idea of failure he scorned a parachute as he did on the solitary trip to France.

An escort was provided by the army, the navy and the commerce departments to follow the famous flyer as far as Richmond, Va., and when it was in line Lindbergh gave the word and they were off to the southward.

The Spirit of St. Louis failed in two efforts to get into the air before succeeding in the third attempt.

It was a murky sky through which the pilots guided their planes and the ground beneath them was sodden from long and steady rains. Lindbergh was forced to taxi the entire length of the field before he could take off. The wheels of his plane barely missed the tops of trees at the southern end of the field.

Major Jarvey S. Burwell, commander of Bolling field with whom Lindbergh had spent the night, said that the daring take-off was one of the most masterful pieces of flying technique he had ever seen. Before reaching his goal at Mexico City Lindbergh probably will encounter more bad weather than all in all he decided that wind conditions were made to order for him and this guided him in his determination to start.

Lindbergh in fact did not finally decide to jump until 11:15 this morning. When he found the navy hydrographers agreed with the weather bureau in their predictions he announced that he would go at once.

Few were aware that the famous flyer would dare to go up under the weather conditions prevailing. The watersoaked field was in bad shape and it was necessary to wade in order to reach the celebrated Spirit of St. Louis which was drawn up with its escort ready to take the air.

Lindbergh had taken the precaution to keep his secret all to himself to prevent crowds from swarming over the field. With a non-stop flight contemplated it was necessary to take a big supply of gasoline and oil.

To supply him with nourishment during the long flight through the southeastern states across land to Texas and thence into Mexico Lindbergh carried a week's supply of concentrated food and two canteens of water.

The flight to Mexico City is probably as far as the government is concerned but it was explained at the White House that President Coolidge is watching it with all the interest that he assumes every American citizen holds.

The President feels that the projection of aviation channels between this country and those of Latin and South America will be augmented by the flight and he hopes that it will be helpful in still further promoting the cause of aviation.

The fact that the Mexican government has invited Lindbergh to fly to Mexico City will result, Mr. Coolidge believes, in an encouragement by that and other governments to the south in a new interest in commercial lines.

Lindbergh left two messages. One was addressed to Major Burwell. It said: "Many thanks for your cooperation. It has been 100 per cent."

The other was addressed to Lieut. H. A. Dinger of the army. It said: "I certainly appreciate your assistance in my flight. Please give my thanks to all the men of the army who have given the Spirit of St. Louis."

Lindbergh also left word with Major Burwell to wire President Coolidge of his taking off.

Immediately after the take-off the convoy of army and navy and commerce planes took the air and headed after the Spirit of St. Louis but by that time Lindbergh had been lost in the distance.

"Lindy" ship carried about 200 gallons of gasoline compared to

DALLAS DRAFT PACT STARTS MUCH STRIFE

New York, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Strife between minor and major leagues as the result of the Dallas draft pact threatened to become intense today as magnates of the minor circuits took steps to put their case before Commissioner Landis.

Big league owners indicated they would be antagonistic to the Dallas draft resolution which nullified the modified draft agreement made by the international league, American Association, Pacific Coast and Three Eye and Western Leagues.

It was pointed out that big league clubs paid fancy prices for star players developed in the minors under the modified draft arrangement. The full draft would permit the majors to take their pick from all material but the modified allows the minors to demand big prices for their players.

Herbert J. Weisman, president of the Eastern League, and W. G. Bramham, president of the South Atlantic, Virginia and Piedmont Leagues, arranged to meet Commissioner Landis today.

Final disposition of the matter will probably come before the joint meeting of the National and American leagues tomorrow, provided Commissioner Landis has not cleared up the situation meantime.

Gene Tunney To Feature Chicago Charity Banquet

Chicago, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Gene Tunney will get another "long count" tonight, not in a squared ring bathed in sunlike brilliancy with 160,000 persons stretching back to the smoke-fogged horizon, but in a great ballroom at a charity banquet.

The "long count" was a concept of Robert M. Switzer, toastmaster. To give atmosphere to the program he will have at his elbow a ring-side going which will be sounded to indicate the termination of three minute "rounds" allowed each orator. The toastmaster, however, will give Tunney a "long count" on his address.

Tunney is speaking at much less per head than he fought. Banquet tickets have sold for \$10 a plate, whereas ringside seats for the Tunney-Dempsey fight brought \$40 each. About \$20,000 will be realized for charity through tonight's affair.

"This victory means everything to me," said Loughran as he left the Madison Square Garden ring last night, "for it clears up the light heavyweight situation."

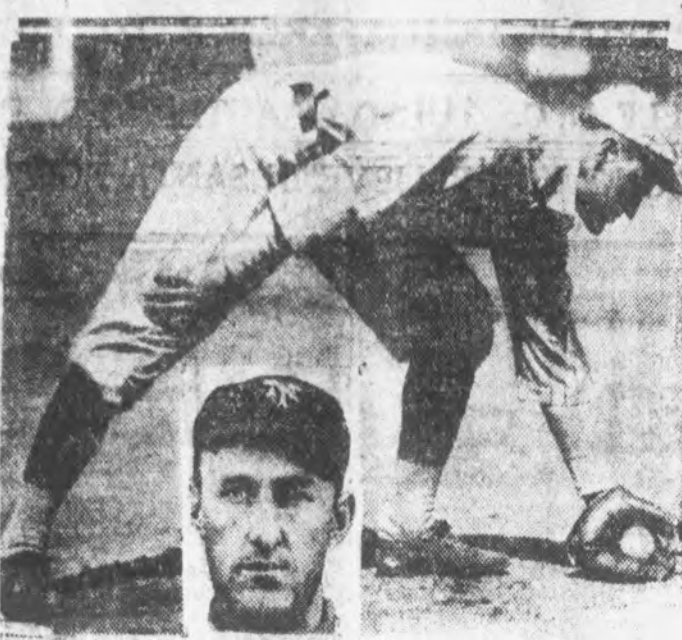

Arctic Explorer Delights Large Audience Here

Stefansson, the world famous Arctic explorer, who last night talked a packed college auditorium was considered one of the best features which has come to the college this year.

In a rich and humorous style he criticized the text books, especially geographies, for giving us the wrong impressions of the friendly northland. It was the result of a lack of understanding of the land of the Eskimos, but the explorer stated that the geographies have gradually been getting warmer due to the recent explorations which have torn down the age old idea that perpetual snow reigns in the far northland.

When he first came upon the Eskimos they were standing in the river with the temperature 25 degrees F. and they were wearing bandana handkerchiefs to keep the perspiration out of their eyes.

"There are only enough Eskimos to know how to build ice houses to make them for movie directors who make educational films," he said humorously and truthfully. Hundreds of wild flowers grow inside the Arctic Circle and wolverine and fish are there in unlimited quantities. He himself lived four years on seal meat and fish to tell his story.

Try To Explode
Bomb at Shrine
Of The Virgin

Norfolk City, Dec. 12.—(AP)—An attempt to explode a bomb disguised as a holy candle was made at the shrine of the Virgin of Guadalupe as many worshippers made their devotions on the annual national holiday devoted to her memory.

The dangerous nature of the candle was discovered before it was lighted. Police today were endeavoring to find a motive for the attempt.

More than 100,000 persons, mostly Indians, congregated during the day at the shrine of the virgin, who

according to tradition, appeared almost four centuries ago.

The streets leading to the shrine were heavily guarded by police, but there were no priests for the second time in history they were unable to conduct their office at the shrine because of the religious restrictions.

Throughout the day a constant stream of pilgrims marched thru the church and past the shrine. They carried lighted candles, kneeling and praying and joining in chants.

Through this worshipping crowd an unidentified man approached the altar. He carried what seemed to be a large unlighted candle. He handed this to a worshipper saying, "Burn this for the virgin."

The worshipper noticed the unusual weight of the candle, turned it over to the police. It was a wax covered bomb.

As the worshippers assembled in the church representatives of some eight or ten different Indian tribes in the fields nearby danced weird pagan dances inherited from their ancestors before the days of Cortez.

REMUS BLAMES DODGE FOR ALL HIS TROUBLES

Bootleg King Threatens to Mandamus Judge Shook in Violent Outbreak.

Cincinnati, Dec. 13.—(AP)—John S. Berger, reputed Los Angeles Cal. exposition promoter, today filed suit for \$500,000 damages against Charles P. Taft, 2nd, Hamilton county prosecutor, for allegations in an indictment charging Berger perjured himself as a witness for George Remus, on trial for murder.

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 13.—Pent-up hatred against Franklin L. Dodge, Jr., harsh criticism of Prosecutor Charles P. Taft 2nd and a threat to mandamus Judge Chester H. Shook before the State Supreme Court were voiced in a vitriolic twenty-minute address by George Remus, the former "King of Bootleggers" on trial for his life for homicide.

Remus summoned forbidden language to voice his hatred of Dodge, the former department of justice agent to whom he attributes the blame for all his trouble.

Turning to young Taft, he called him and his assistants "these novices," and accused them of resorting to "subterranean" advantages in their efforts to convict him.

Remus threatened to proceed with contempt charges against Taft.

First Judge Shook agreed with Taft that Remus had no status as a lawyer in Ohio and could not be heard in the case of state versus Vernon R. Chumbley, federal convict recently indicted for perjury in connection with the Remus case.

Then he announced that he would permit Remus to make the record in the case involving Chumbley, who was up for arraignment.

Chumbley, secretary for Remus, was brought here from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, on a writ of habeas corpus to testify for Remus. His indictment grew out of alleged false statements made in a petition for use in the Remus divorce case which was to have been called the morning of last October 6 when Remus shot and killed his wife.

As he denounced Dodge and inveighed against Taft, Remus' face was violently red, the color extending to the top of his baldhead. His face was contorted and his eyes nearly closed as he tensed his muscles, whirled his arms high and glared at Taft.

Judge Mann Dead

Petersburg, Va., Dec. 13.—(AP)—Judge William Hodges Mann, 64, Confederate veteran, former Governor and one of Virginia's most distinguished men, succumbed to a heart attack in his law office here late yesterday. He was active in legal affairs until his death.

The body lay in the Mann home here today. Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon.

RUMANIANS APOLOGIZE

Express Regret to U. S. For Assault on Wilfred Keller by Rumanian Students.

Bucharest, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The Rumanian government has apologized and expressed its regret over the recent assault of Wilfred N. Keller, an American-born citizen, at Oradea Mare.

Nicholas Titulescu, Rumanian Foreign Minister, replied verbally to the note of protest from William S. Culbertson, American Minister. At the same time Titulescu asserted that Keller had provoked the attack by Rumanian students himself, Culbertson said.

Titulescu begged the American Minister not to press the case too strongly at such a critical juncture of the international political situation when Titulescu himself was crippled by illness.

Culbertson said he thought the case was well in hand and was satisfied that the government was doing everything it could to reach a satisfactory adjustment. Failure of the authorities at Oradea Mare to allow Keller to appeal for help to the American government thru Bucharest, one of the most serious points in the American Minister's complaint, apparently was ignored by Titulescu.

Titulescu, however, did not attempt to minimize the seriousness of Keller's injuries, lack of justification for the attack, or failure of the military and police to rescue him.

Keller, who comes from Linden Hall, Pa., owned stock in a printing plant at Oradea Mare, an investigator for the Rumanian government reported to the foreign office. This concern published a news sheet, which printed attacks on the students and the government. The students, resenting these attacks, raised the plank.

Keller, a witness of the attack, told the correspondent, walking through a public square, was followed by a group of students who seized him, declaring that he must go to the police station.

The party passed a Rumanian officer, who knew Keller was an American citizen. This officer, the witness continued, ignored Keller's pleas for aid. Three military guards made no attempt to save Keller despite his appeals.

Telling Keller it was a short-cut to the police station, the students turned into a side street. There at least 25 of them armed with canes, beat and stoned him. He received a deep wound in the side of his face and bruises all over his body.

He escaped from that group, ran to the main street and encountered other students. They knocked him unconscious. He regained consciousness and found that he was lying in a pool of blood.

Attacks were also made during the anti-semitic rioting on two British, one French and many Hungarian nationals. Reparations demands are regarded as possible from these governments. The opposition parties have already attacked the government for the disorders.

Richmond Club Manager Faces Murder Charge

Richmond, Va., Dec. 13.—(AP)—With more than 35 witnesses summoned, John W. Falson, secretary-manager of the Hermitage country club of Richmond, came into court today to defend himself on a charge of first degree murder made by the state in connection with the fatal shooting of Mrs. Elsie Holt Styles in an apartment here on the night of Nov. 16.

Falson has maintained that the woman shot herself. Falson said, according to police, that he was one of a number of guests at the woman's apartment on the night of the tragedy and remained after the other guests had departed.

Probability that selection of a jury would require the entire day did not prevent a crowd from assembling at the court room in the early morning. No special venire had been summoned and the jury term in attendance at the regular term of Hustings court was to be exhausted before additional veniremen were called.

Reports, allegedly from official sources, that a diary of the slain woman to be introduced in the trial would involve a number of prominent persons who might be summoned as witnesses, stimulated

interest in the case, the state has made a lengthy investigation and will attempt to prove, police say, that Falson killed Mrs. Styles and that jealousy was the motive. Falson is married and has several children.

Assisting commonwealth's attorney Dave Satterfield in the prosecution were J. J. Hatch of Goldsboro, N. C., and H. D. Cooley, of Nashville, N. C., attorneys employed by the parents of the dead woman, Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Holt, of Princeton, N. C.

\$50,000 Worth Of Silk Stolen

Langhorne, Pa., Dec. 13.—(AP)—Raw silk valued at \$50,000 was stolen today when a Reading Company freight train was held up near Nesheim Falls, near here, by a band of fifteen men.

In an exchange of shots with the train crew, which did not prevent the bandits from carrying out the robbery, one of the band is believed to have been wounded. He was seen to be carried into an automobile and made his escape with the others.

The silk was loaded on the train at Jersey City and was consigned to a Chester firm. Several of the

thieves, are believed to have concealed themselves in the train before it left Jersey City and applied the air brakes at the appointed place, by covering the air lines.

George Dancy, the conductor, got out of the caboose when the train stopped suddenly in a deserted spot and was met with a fusillade of shots from the robbers.

He returned the fire and was joined by other members of the crew. The robbers, however, forced the seals of three of the cars and placed the silk on the ground where other members of the band, who had been hiding in a thicket, are believed to have transferred it to automobiles.

Several of the trainmen stopped the New York to St. Louis express, which came upon the scene shortly after the robbers made their getaway and the combined crews searched the surrounding woods. All they found were the tire marks of six automobiles.

State police were summoned.

Dies As Result of Burns

Kelford, N. C., Dec. 13.—(AP)—Suffering burns when his clothing caught fire, Colon Burdett, Lewis-ton, was dead today. A friend extinguished Burdett's burning clothing in a desperate effort to prevent fatal burns.

BRIDGES TO INVESTIGATE CASE OF DOOMED NEGRO

Raleigh, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Although no notice of appeal has been filed in the case of Larry Newsome, negro, convicted at Goldsboro Sunday of murder and sentenced to die in state prison; electric chair here next month, Pardon Commissioner Edwin Bridges indicated today that he would investigate the case and report his findings to Governor McLean.

If Newsome pays the penalty on the date set by Judge Henry Grady, it was pointed out by officials, he will be one of few men to go to the chair in North Carolina with out the benefit of a review of his case by the supreme court.

HERBERT HOOVER INVITED TO SPEAK AT RALEIGH

Raleigh, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover has been invited to address the Raleigh Chamber of Commerce banquet here next month.

Gilbert Stephenson, chairman of the committee arranging the annual affair, requested Senator Overman at Washington to extend to Mr. Hoover "a warm welcome to Raleigh and North Carolina."

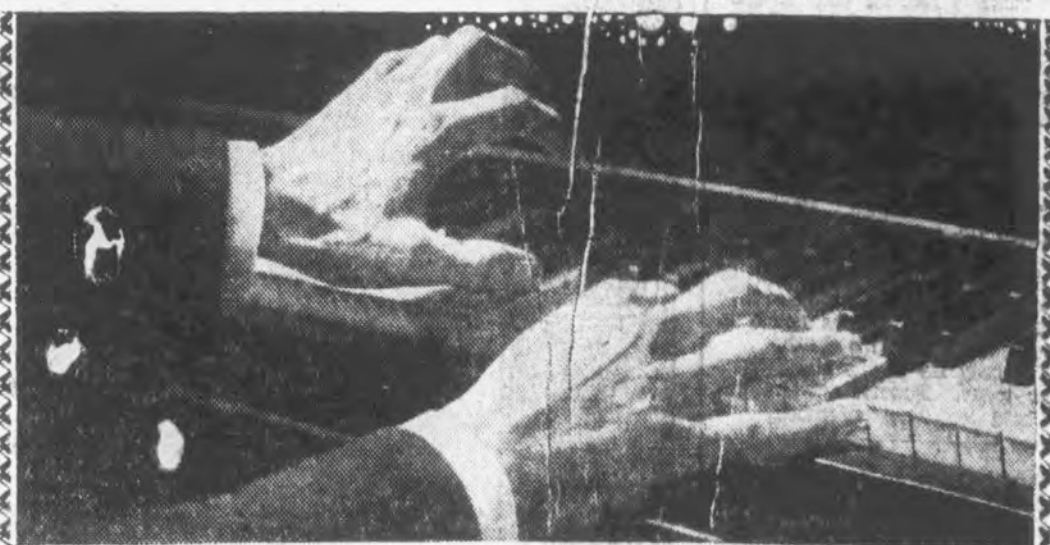

FIVE CONFEDERATE FLAGS PRESENTED SOUTH CAR.

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 12. (AP)—Five Confederate flags, captured from South Carolina troops in 1865, were received by Governor Richman today from the state of Maine where the banners have been kept 64 years as war trophies. They were turned over to A. S. Sallie, secretary of the state Historical Commission, who was requested by the Governor to see that they are placed in the Confederate relic room in the state house.
The flags were formally returned to South Carolina by Governor Brewster of Maine at the Governors' conference in Michigan last summer. Governor Richards received them and expressed the appreciation of his state at their return.
Tags on the flags, which are tattered, relate that they were captured by the Ninth Maine Volunteers at Morris Island, July 11, 1865, from the Twenty-first South Carolina Volunteers. Their return was authorized by the Maine Legislature.

NOMINATES KANSAS CITY MAN FOR POST ON SHIPPING BOARD

Washington, Dec. 12. (AP)—Albert Denton, of Kansas City, was nominated by President Coolidge today to be a member of the United States Shipping Board in place of W. S. Hill, of South Dakota.
It has not been announced in what respect Mr. Hill has failed to satisfy the President as a member of the Board but it is known that the South Dakotan's attitude on the sale of government owned ships to private interests has been disappointing to administration leaders.
When Mr. Hill was appointed last June it was the understanding that he would support Mr. Coolidge's policy of disposing of the ships with the best possible incentive to private buyers but since that time he has become identified with a group of the Shipping Board which desired to impose stronger guarantees on those who would buy the vessels.

LINDY BEGINS LONG TRIP TO MEXICO CITY

(Continued from page one)

more than 400 dollars carried when she left New York for Paris. The ship reached Paris with a surplus of about 50 gallons, and aviation experts predict that the ship will reach Mexico City with about 100 gallons remaining.

In talking with friends just before he started Lindbergh said he did not mean to give great consideration to the fuel question in a "show" flight. He was hop to Mexico.

The flier expects to take a direct air line route to Galveston, Texas, thence south along the coast line of the Gulf of Mexico until dawn shows him his location. He said that no effort would be made to turn inland until after daylight and that his course across Mexico would be guided by such conditions as he found were most favorable.

The last man to speak to Lindbergh before he left, was F. Trueblood, assistant secretary of the Bee Division, assistant secretary of war, who drove up just as final preparations for the start were being completed. He rushed to the window of the plane, from which Lindbergh had removed the pane and they exchanged greetings.

Lindbergh's route was not definitely determined, the flier declaring it depended on weather conditions.

Officials here, however, believed a desirable course would make Fredericksburg, Va., 46 miles from here the first city where the plane could be seen, thence it would be southwestward with Roanoke, Va., as the next point, 147 miles away where he should pass about 2 p. m. This route follows with the railway guiding to Bristol, Va., 129 miles further on.

Cutting across Tennessee, from Bristol, he could pass over Knoxville, about 106 miles away, thence over Chattanooga, a distance of 104 miles further by airline. Heading southwestward from Chattanooga the approximate course would be across the northwestern corner of Georgia and the northern portion of Alabama and thence into Mississippi probably passing over Columbus, which is 296 miles beyond Chattanooga. From that point Jackson, Miss., is 134 miles further on. By the time Lindbergh reached that point he would be about 1,194 miles from Washington.

gives \$500,000 to a prohibition fund. There are various opinions on the way to achieve temperance. Thomas Jefferson, who wrote the Declaration of Independence, would have given the \$500,000 to establish breweries and plant vineyards for production of light wine and beer. He believed that would conquer whiskey, which, he said, killed half the population in this day and ruined their families. It was not as bad as bootleg whiskey and, killed slowly, it surely.

Documents from the archives of the Mexican government show that \$1,200,000 were set aside for three members of the United States Senate, whose names, of course, are not published, although they appear in the Mexican documents. An investigation will doubtless show how much of these appropriations went to riddlemen, how much was kept by those that ordered the payments, and perhaps ordered conspicuous to hide their own stealing.

Lindbergh's next long flight will be from Washington, D. C., to Mexico City, on the invitation of President Calles of Mexico. He will fly in the same machine that took him across the Atlantic. The engine in the "Spirit of St. Louis," which has carried Lindbergh over thousands of miles in the United States since his return from abroad, has not been overhauled since he started for Paris, although carefully inspected after each flight.

The United States government ought to enlist the services of Lindbergh to instruct American fliers and enlighten those responsible for our air defense. If another war ever comes it will seem very extraordinary to future historians, writing of American cities bombed and razed, that the richest cities in the world should have gone along

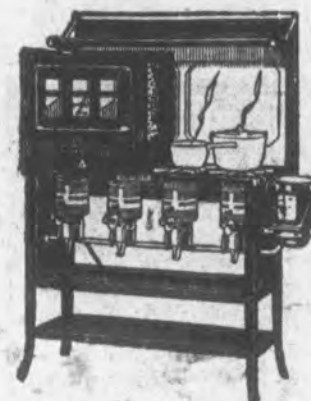

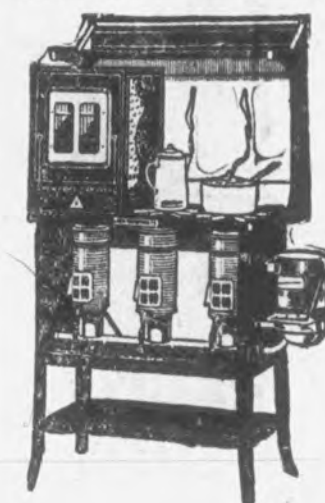

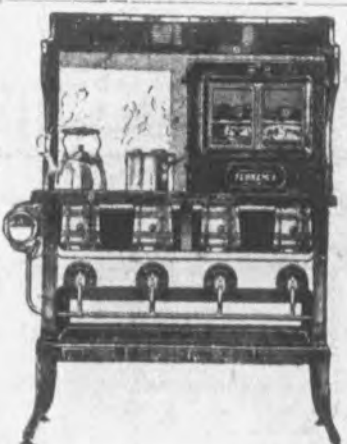
