ARREST THREE
SUSPECTS FOR
KILLING GIRL

Horribly Mutilated
Body of Marian Parker
Returned at Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Dec. 19.—(AP)—A frenzied woman and a man, were arrested today in a mysterious house overlooking the spot where a kidnaper Saturday exchanged the mutilated body of little Marian Parker for \$1,500 in currency presented by her father. The man was later released.

Almost simultaneously came the announcement that a third suspect had been arrested in another part of the city. He answered, in a general way, the description of "George Fox," who took the 12-year-old girl from her school Thursday.

He was booked under the name of George Harnaman, and gave his age as 24.

A woman who said she was Lillian Paddy, 23, was then arrested together with another man who gave the name of William Long. They were found at a mysterious house which the police believe may have been the site of the killing of the girl and the dismembering of her body.

Upon a wall was a crudely drawn picture of Judas Iscariot, whose name figured in some of the ransom letters being sent Parker.

In a nearby garage was a sign: "Abandon all hope, ye who enter here."

In that garage the officers were told, there was an automobile last Saturday night. It was empty at the time of the raid.

Barnham was captured while telephoning Los Angeles radio station in an attempt to obtain the broadcasting of a message from "George Fox," the name signed to the ransom letters sent Parker in possession were found several newspapers and a list of telephone numbers of radio stations.

The police believe Barnham would prove to be a "crank."

After questioning Long for some time, police released him. The woman booked on a charge of suspicion of murder, Barnham was detained on a charge of grand larceny pending further investigation.

The house was raided after police had been told that a woman had been running up and down the street shouting:

"I didn't kill her. I didn't kill her. They did it."

The police said the woman was intoxicated.

Long was hazy in his answers to the police questions, the officers said. He could not remember to whom he paid rent for the house, whose windows overlooked the spot where Perry M. Parker Saturday night paid over \$1,500 to the kidnaper who returned his daughter's mutilated body.

When pressed for the name of his landlady Long answered:

"Mrs. Parker."

Within the house, the raiding officers found heel prints sharply etched in what appeared to be blood stains, bloodstained towels and towels which had been freshly washed in an attempt to remove similar stains; a piece of men's clothing which still bore a large stain although freshly washed.

Several razor blades were found which police believe may have been used in the atrocious crime.

Says Punishment
Will Stop Crime

Asheville, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Certainty of punishment is the best preventive of crime and "criminals must be taught they cannot evade punishment by technicalities," Judge Roy L. Deal told the Buncombe county grand jury today in his final charge of the year.

Newspapers can be of material aid in checking crime if they will print conservatively news of crime and its punishment Judge Deal said.

"Gentlemen," the Judge said, "certainty of punishment is the best cure for crime waves. If you gentlemen will do your duty and if the courts do their duty in seeking out crime and punishing it so that criminals will learn they must suffer if they break the law, crime will be checked."

Former State Senator Dead.

Jefferson, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Funeral services for H. M. Wellborn, about 70, former state senator, who died in West Jefferson Saturday, will probably be held at Wilkesboro. It was announced by relatives today.

Mr. Wellborn, an attorney, retired some years ago from practice of his profession.

He was a descendant of Hugh Thompson, for whom he was named, and a college mate of Charles B. Aycock. In 1902, he defeated Tam C. Bowie for the Senate from Ashe, Watauga, and Allegheny counties.

PROBE TRUTH
OF TESTIMONY
BY DETECTIVE

Government Attempts
To Show That Burns
Reports Were All
Fabricated.

Washington, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Efforts to prove that reports of the Burns detectives who shadowed the Fall-Sinclair oil jury, were in a large part fabricated, were continued by the government today in the criminal contempt charges against Harry F. Sinclair, William J. Burns and their associates.

Henry Mason Day hired the detectives to shadow the jury and each day they made reports showing they had kept the jurors under a complete scrutiny. These reports were "edited" and transmitted to Day who acted for Sinclair.

The government contends that a large part of the reports were written without the sleuths having actually followed the members of the panel. Barton Stewart, one of the detectives on the stand last Friday, was questioned again today by District Attorney Peyton Gordon.

J. Ray Akers, who alleged in an affidavit that Edward J. Kidwell, Jr., a juror in the oil trial he talked too freely was summoned to the District Attorney's office. Kidwell was also on hand.

The government tried to bring out that Stewart saw Frank J. O'Reilly, another detective, at the court house October 24, but Stewart's memory failed. The prosecution had previously tried to show O'Reilly had talked to juror Kidwell at the court house. Stewart said he was sent back to Philadelphia October 24.

WILL SEE SON
TAKE OFF FOR
CEN. AMERICA

Mrs. Lindbergh to
Visit Famous Son in
Mexico City Christmas.

Detroit, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Mrs. Evangeline L. Lindbergh, probably the first woman ambassador, of good will, took the air at 10:15 a. m. eastern standard time, today on the first lap of the flight which will carry her to Mexico City and a Christmas holiday with her son, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, America's hero of aviation.

F. M. Walker, representative of the Ford Motor Company, in charge of the trip, stated that the party would probably arrive at Indianapolis at 1 p. m. eastern time. A landing will probably be made at the Speedway field, he said. St. Louis will be reached at 4 p. m. eastern time, if the plane holds to the schedule, Walker said.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Mrs. Evangeline Lodge Lindbergh, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. William B. Stout, arrived at the Ford airport at 9:10 a. m. today and immediately made preparations for starting the first lap of their flight to Mexico City. They planned to take off promptly at 10 a. m.

Senior Luis Lejos, representative of the Ford Motor Company in Mexico was also ready to leave with the party.

Harry Brooks, pilot of the Ford tri-motored all-metal plane which will carry Mrs. Lindbergh and party announced that with the continuance of clear weather the route to St. Louis, the first leg of the journey, would lead through Indianapolis, Ind., with a probable stop in that city for lunch.

Mexico City, Dec. 19.—(AP)—When Charles A. Lindbergh hops off for Central America the loving eyes of his mother for the first time, will watch her famous son start one of his famous long distance flights.

When Lindbergh hopped off for Paris, his mother bade him goodbye several days before, not wishing that her presence at the beginning of that great adventure should disturb him. When he started from Washington for Mexico, Mrs. Lindbergh was teaching school in Detroit.

Now she has decided to come to Mexico City by plane for Christmas, starting from Detroit today, and ere that holiday closes the Lone Eagle will have set forth on another session of good-will as she watches.

Despite more than 60 protests from individuals and organizations in America, Lindbergh saw two bulletins. At the first of these one of Mexico's most popular heroes came out of his retirement to pay a bull fighter's tribute to the hero from the north. At the other, six bulls were killed, two of them being dedicated to Lindbergh.

Lindbergh went to a ranch where the National Association of Charros (or horsemen) staged a rodeo in his honor. First there were exhibitions by famous horsemen and then Will Rogers stepped into the ring and displayed a number of his roping tricks.

Unexpectedly, Rodolfo Ganoa, considered the greatest bull fighter that ever stepped into the sand-strewn arena in Mexico, appeared. Frank applause rose from the crowd. Ganoa advanced to Lindbergh's box and bowed.

He had bowed two years ago never to enter the ring again. Ganoa said. Money had been unable to lure him back. But now he was willing to match his skill against the dangerous rush of a maddened bull in tribute, he said, to the greatest American hero.

A bull was turned into the ring. Ganoa waved his crimson cloak and the bull charged. Defiantly the bull fighter stepped from the path of the bull, just escaping its horns. Turning and twisting out of its path, he played the animal while those in stands cheered what they

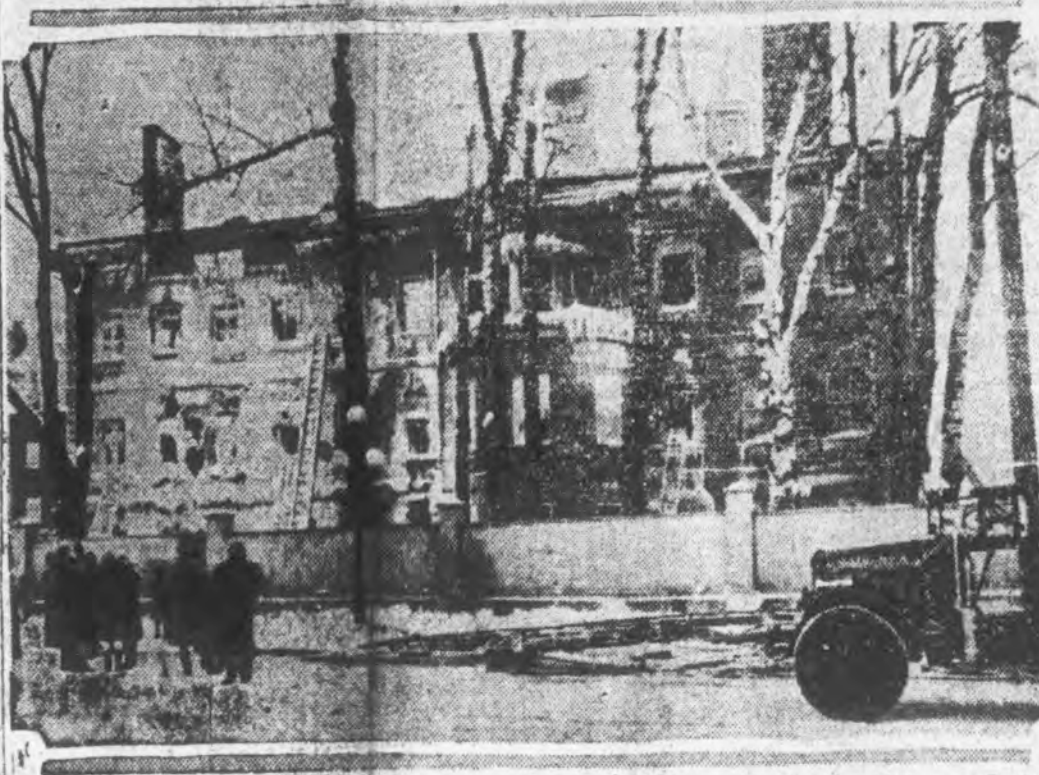

San Francisco, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The airplane, Spirit of California, attempting to break the world record for sustained flight by an airplane, reported by radio at 2:30 a. m. today that all was well aboard the ship. The plane took off here at 8:23 a. m. yesterday.

Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and Lieut. George R. Pond, who are alternating in piloting the plane, hope to remain aloft longer than 52 hours 22 minutes and 31 seconds, the record established by German aviators last summer.

BEGIN TRIAL
OF DIRECTORS
WILKES BANK

Added Panel of Fifty
Jurors Summoned
For Session of Court
Tuesday.

North Wilkesboro, Dec. 19.—(AP)—A special venire of 50 men was on hand in Wilkes superior court today for the opening of the trial of W. H. Foster, A. G. Henderson and W. B. Somers, directors of the defunct Bank of Wilkes, on charges growing out of the failure of the institution. An additional panel of 50 men has been summoned for tomorrow.

The three directors are accused of obtaining money under false pretenses and of having made a false statement of the condition of the bank last January.

Clem Wrenn, president of the bank, last week pleaded guilty and nolo contendere when arraigned on a wide range of charges growing out of the failure. He has not been sentenced.

Hundreds of persons from over Wilkes and adjoining counties today braved the icy-cold mountain winds and filled the large courtroom in Wilkesboro beyond capacity in order to hear evidence in the trial of directors of the Bank of Wilkes, that is expected to be of widely interesting nature. W. H. Foster, A. G. Henderson and W. B. Somers, directors of the bank, which closed its doors last May, are charged with false pretense and making false statement of the condition of the bank as of January this year.

Defense counsel moved this morning to quash the bills of indictment and gave out several reasons for the same. These motions were denied by Judge M. V. Barnhill and court was halted to give the state time to file with the defense a bill of particulars.

A special venire of 100 Wilkes county men has been summoned, fifty coming into court this morning and the other fifty to appear tomorrow. Most of today is expected to be consumed with drawing the jury.

Cotton Spinning
Industry Shows
Greater Activity

Washington, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The cotton spinning industry showed slightly greater activity in November than in October this year and was somewhat better than November last year, the census bureau's report today indicating operations at 107.2 per cent capacity as compared with 105.3 in October.

Active spindles numbered 8,680,217,297 or an average of 238 hours per spindle in place, compared with 8,704,511,019 or an average of 238 in October this year and 8,480,410,447 or an average of 227 in November last year.

The average number of spindles operated during November was 39,132,987 or at 107.2 per cent capacity on a single shift basis, compared with 38,501,055 or at 105.2 per cent capacity in October this year and 37,877,576 or at 101.2 per cent capacity in November last year.

Spinning spindles in place November 30 numbered 36,536,512 of which 32,269,476 were operated at some time during the month, compared with 36,548,808 and 32,497,504 in October this year and 37,426,048 and 32,536,770 in November last year.

Scores Hearst for Slush
Fund Charges Preferred
Against Four Senators

Washington, Dec. 19.—(AP)—An open letter to William Randolph Hearst condemning him for publication of the documents purporting to show creation of a \$1,215,000 Mexican fund for four United States Senators was made public today by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, one of the Senators named in the documents.

Senator Norris and the three other Senators mentioned—Borah, Idaho, Hellen, Alabama, and La Follette, Wisconsin—have been cleared of any suspicion of having received the money or having been approached in regard to it by members of the special Senate committee investigating the charge and also by Mr. Hearst, who gave the documents to the committee.

From his sick bed, Senator Norris asks Mr. Hearst why he did not publish in his paper along with the documents concerning the slush fund that he had no evidence that any of the Senators received the money. The Hearst stories did not use the names of the Senators, being made public when the documents were given to the Senate committee by Mr. Hearst.

Senator Norris said in the open letter that a fair analysis of the articles published by Hearst and of his testimony before the committee "leads to the inevitable conclusion that you are not only unfair and dishonest but that you are entirely without honor."

The special committee investigating the authenticity of the documents had adjourned hearings until December 27, seeking additional papers, perhaps from the Mexican government itself, as a check on the documents.

Questioning the motive of Mr. Hearst the Nebraska wrote: "For the sake of your financial investments you were not only guilty willing to ruin the reputation of honest innocent men, but you were willing to plunge our country into war with a friendly neighbor and thus increase the army of widows and orphans and wounded and crippled soldiers."

Senator Norris asked Hearst if he didn't know "what was common knowledge among all newspapermen of the United States that many alleged officials documents from Mexico were being offered for sale to all kinds of organizations and to all kinds of publications?"

At one point in his letter of more than 3,500 words, the Senator declared the record of Mr. Hearst's participation in the episode was, in his opinion sufficient to bring into

FURIOUS GALE FORCES FLEET

Raleigh, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Seventeen violent deaths were recorded for the state last week, eight of them automobile fatalities, tying the previous week's record. The total deaths were two higher than the previous week. Two were burned to death and two froze to death the last week.

Rescue Work, How-
ever, to be Continued
With Renewed Zeal
Late This Afternoon

Boston, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Pumping of air into the sunken submarine S-4 has stopped and rescue work at the scene was at a standstill today. Rear Admiral Frank Brumby reported upon arrival at the Charleston Navy Yard on board the mine sweeper Falcon.

Six men trapped in the crippled Submarine S-4, on the ocean's floor off Provincetown, Mass., were still alive today but a wintry gale prevented almost every chance of saving them. The latest message from the submarine, which was rammed and sunk late Saturday afternoon with forty men, was tapped out by Lieutenant Graham Newell Fitch, one of the four officials aboard, early today.

A 45 mile wind and a rolling sea combined to make continued operations of divers impossible and though salvage crews and ships were converging on the scene of the disaster from several points, nothing could be done to help the imprisoned sailors until the storm abated. Lieutenant Fitch asked that an attempt be made to send supplies through the torpedo tube. He asked for both food and oxygen, indicating that the men were faced with the two fold fate of starvation and suffocation.

Two Bank Employees.

St. Louis, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Two bank employees were shot by bank robbers who escaped with \$6,000 at the Hodiarnot bank in the suburbs here this morning.

Provincetown, Mass., Dec. 19.—(AP)—The furious gale which swept Cape Cod today forced the Navy rescue fleet assembled on the scene of the S-4 disaster, to suspend all activities until 4 p. m. the coast guardmen at the Race Point station radioed Admiral Frank Brumby aboard the given ship Falcon that the wind might die down at that time.

The wind was blowing from the northwest at a 45-mile rate, the coast guard said. The sea was rough and the temperature was low. Every unit in the rescue fleet was blanketed with ice from the spray.

Reports which came ashore from the Falcon stated that the sea was so rough that it was impossible to lower a diver's platform over the side. Early this morning two Navy dories were sent out to the Falcon from other rescue ships. The high sea smashed them against the side of the Falcon and their occupants were pulled onto the deck of the Falcon, with great difficulty.

The hardy fishermen of this port refused to move their vessels from the dock to carry newspapermen to the scene of the disaster. They said their small boats could not live through the gale. Several other craft which attempted to go out turned back before reaching the outer harbor.

Provincetown, Mass., Dec. 19.—(AP)—The Atlantic coast resources of the United States Navy concentrated here today in herculean efforts to wrest from death six of the 40 enlisted men aboard the submarine S-4 who presumably were alive.

For the 34 others on the ill-fated craft Saturday when the coast guard destroyer Paulding sent it hurtling to the bottom, there was hope that some might survive, but that hope was dim.

It was a fight against time today in which every minute was precious and the odds were admittedly against the slowly suffocating survivors in an almost impossible ratio.

In the ears of every officer and man of the rescue fleet, from Rear Admiral Frank H. Brumby, down to the rawest recruit, rang the desperate cry of the unfortunate men laboriously pounded out by hammer in the metallic dots and dashes of the Morse code to a diver alongside on the sandy bottom.

The messages follow:
Diver—Is gas bad?
Submarine—No; but the air. How long will it be now?
Diver—How many are there?
Submarine—There are six. Will you be long now?
Diver—We are doing everything possible.

The message that told the fleet that men still lived on the S-4 came from the torpedo room. From the other compartments there was no encouraging word.

A great hole ripped through the heavy steel plates starboard at midnight and just forward of the ship's four inch gun left little doubt of the fate of officers and men on duty there when the speeding prow of the Paulding drove its way into the submarine's side.

On the surface, the frantically yet orderly efforts at rescue went forward with zeal. There nine layers which stood by continuously since

SPORTS SLANTS

New York, Dec. 19.—(AP)—If their present breach is not healed and the service football classic of 1928 is written off the books, the army and the navy may find it anything but an easy task to locate new as well as suitable opponents for the vacant climax date in their schedules.

There probably would be no lack of invitations. As drawing cards the two academies eleven have few rivals. But most of the major colleges in the east, especially, have filled out their 1928 playing slates. With few exceptions they also have fixed engagements on or about the time that the army and navy are accustomed to get together. The service classic had been put down for November 24 next year, the Saturday after Thanksgiving day, with Philadelphia as its prospective site.

Princeton and Dartmouth, both of which close their seasons earlier than other colleges, would furnish ideal opposition for cadets or the midshipmen. They might consider some foe of the academics.

Army, Princeton and Dartmouth: Navy battles for instance, might create sufficient interest to offset the most of the regret over passing of the colorful service struggle.

Yale and Harvard finish their campaigns November 17 but both are booked to play West Point next season any way. Such other colleges as Cornell, Pennsylvania, Syracuse, Columbia, Colgate, Brown, Pittsburgh and Penn State have Thanksgiving Day fixtures on their schedules which would prevent consideration as emergency opponents.

Either the army or Navy might seize the opportunity to make a new intercollegiate alliance, possibly in the middle west, where the big ten winds up its campaign the week before the prospective open date of the two academies.

It may be taken for granted that something will be done by both West Point and Annapolis to prevent the possibility of ending their seasons with Carleton College and Loyola, the two teams now occupying the last definite date on the Cadet and Middle schedules.

Cardinal College Equally Divided

Rome, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The College of Cardinals was equally divided today between Italian and non-Italian today when Pope Pius at a secret consistory appointed five new non-Italian Cardinals. There are now 33 Italians and 33 non-Italians.

The new Cardinals are: Mgr. Raymond K. M. Rouleau, archbishop of Quebec; Mgr. Pedro Segura Y. Saenz, archbishop of Burgos; Mgr. Henri Charles Joseph Binet, archbishop of Besancon; Mgr. Alex. Henri Lepicier, titular archbishop of Tarsus and the Rev. Justinian Sacerdoti of the Benedictine order. The papal allocation dealt only with the death of four Cardinals which occurred since the last consistory and the resignation of Cardinal Billot.

Cochet Suffers First Defeat

Igou, France, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Henri Cochet has suffered his first tennis defeat since he returned with the triumphant Davis cup team from the United States last September.

The latest French marvel, 17-year old Georges Sionis, defeated him 6-2, 8-10, 6-4. This was Cochet's first tournament in his home town since 1926. He now resides in Paris.

"Too many receptions and too rich home-coming food," Cochet said without apologizing for his defeat.

shortly after the crash, formed a triangle about the spot.
The Mallard and the Lark steamed the Falcon, aboard which Admiral Brumby and his staff directed the operations of the divers.

Two submarine tenders, the Wandank and the Business, were prepared to help while a short distance away four destroyers restlessly awaited orders.

Farther off the naval tugs Sagamore and Iuka, raced under forced draft against a handicap of heavy seas and adverse winds to bring six pontoons from the Brooklyn, N. Y., Navy Yard.

The pontoons were similar to those used to raise the S-51 which went down off Block Island two years ago with a loss of 33 lives. Naval officers pinned their hopes of effecting a rescue on these, should attempts now in progress fail to lift the wreck with compressed air fall.

Lt. Monsen expressed the belief today that under the most favorable conditions the men could last only until Wednesday morning before being overcome by carbon dioxide gas.

The men already had been entombed in their sunken craft about 45 hours at noon today, and Monsen does not believe that it will be possible to raise the vessel by Wednesday.

Admiral Charles F. Hughes, chief of naval operations, also has indicated that it would be several days before rescuers could raise the craft from her position 100 feet under the water's surface.

reference. A policy that he, himself, was anxious to carry out. We may discover as to the kind of man Mr. Calles is, but even his enemies have never charged him with being either an ignoramus or idiot.

"What is your motive, Mr. Hearst? You have testified before the committee that you have very valuable properties in Mexico. It is almost common knowledge that you were in favor of the overthrow of the present government. You evidently believe that if a revolution could be started it would mean financial benefit for your investments in Mexico, or the sale of making a few paltry dollars you are willing to blacken the character of honest journalists in your own profession. You were willing to cast suspicion upon the loyalty and the integrity of members of the United States Senate. You were willing to charge that the president of a friendly republic is a traitor to his country. You were willing and apparently anxious to do something that would cause our government to intervene in Mexico.

"In other words for the sake of your financial investments you were not only willing to ruin the reputation of honest and innocent men, but you were willing to plunge our

country into war with a friendly neighbor and thus increase the army of widows and orphans and wounded and crippled soldiers."

Gastonia, N. C., Dec. 19.—(AP)—An exploding flywheel from a saw mill severed the left leg of Henry Messner, 58, as he was engaged in sawing wood at a house in a mill village here. Mr. Messner is in a local hospital for treatment and is expected to recover.

A heavy fragment of the wheel clipped off the leg and hurled it 100 feet to the top of a coal pile. Another fragment weighing 23 pounds was thrown 300 yards against a water tank and a third piece went through the kitchen of a house 100 yards away.

Atlanta, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Winter held the southland in its grip today as temperatures ranging from ten degrees at Louisville to up in the forties along the South Atlantic coast were reported to C. P. Von Hermann, government forecaster here.

The wave was extending westward to Galveston where freezing weather was reported.

Chicago had six degrees above today, while St. Louis registered 12.

The coldest spot in the country was Huron, S. D., with 14 degrees below zero.

KING OF HOUSE OF DAVID DEAD

Followers of Benjamin Purnell Believe He Will "Rise Again" Soon.

Benton Harbor, Mich., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Benjamin Purnell—"King" of the House of David—is dead. Benjamin died at 11:30 o'clock last Friday morning and early today, more than sixty hours after his death, his body still lay in the bed where he had died.

Belief that Benjamin will rise—as Christ arose over 1900 years ago—had kept the colony officials from summoning an undertaker or making any announcement of his death. Rumors of Purnell's demise began to spread through the city early this morning and Dr. C. N. Sowers, colony physician, was sought for verification. At first he had any announcement must come from the colony.

Told that Purnell's death already was known outside the colony, Dr. Sowers issued this statement: "Benjamin died at 11:30 last Friday morning, December 16. I did not make any public announcement of his death, out of deference to the religious convictions of the colony. They believe Benjamin will undergo a resurrection as Christ did and they are holding the body for three days.

Early this morning only a comparatively few of the colony who reside at the headquarters grounds on Britain avenue knew that Benjamin had died. Many of those who heard that death had come to the 66-year old "seventh messenger," refused to believe it.

Those who accepted Dr. Sowers' word that Benjamin lived no more were confident that he would arise as Christ arose, on the third day. This is the third day of Benjamin's demise.

Under the state law regarding the handling of the dead Benjamin must be moved within 72 hours.

Death came just as Purnell was making the greatest fight of his career for the existence of the colony. He founded a quarter century ago. Only a few weeks ago the colony had been ordered into receivership and Purnell, together with his "queen," Mary Purnell, were ordered to leave the colony. An appeal to the state supreme court stayed execution of the receivership and banishment order.

In his court appearances during the hearing of the receivership action brought by the state Purnell was carried in on a stretcher. It

the later proceedings as the receivership order was being perfected, physicians' certificates were presented by W. J. Barnard, associate counsel with the colony attorney, to show that Purnell's death was of only a short time. The colony attorney, H. T. Alexander, denied this later, asserting Benjamin could not die. To this Barnard declared he "didn't believe a word of it."

Dewhurst today expressed confidence that Benjamin will live again. While accepting Benjamin's death, Dewhurst will insist that the body be held as long as the colony as the law will permit.

Hill "Wayward Son" Faces Illinois
Court On Matricide Charge

Streater, Ill. (AP)—The life story of a son charged with killing his mother after she had threatened to disinherit him will be unfolded in the La Salle county circuit court when Harry Hill, 22, goes on trial Dec. 27 on a charge of murder. The trial will be held at Ottawa, nearby county seat.

The body of Mrs. Eliza Hill, mother of the boy and the divorced wife of Dr. H. C. Hill of Streater, was found on Aug. 22 in a crude grave in the cellar of the pleasant home which she and her son occupied here.

Forgery charges had been made against young Hill, and the state contends that he killed his mother when in dismay at his action she threatened to cut him off in her will. The testament, subsequently

found, left all of a \$45,000 estate to the son, to be held in trust for him until he is 25.

Hill has steadfastly denied any knowledge of the crime, and he will go to trial with the support of his father, who says he will spend all he has to clear his son's name.

When officials sought Hill for questioning after the cellar grave had been uncovered he had vanished. A series of dramatic incidents set in motion by the finding of the body, was climaxed when the youth was arrested in Seattle.

His father raced across the country with funds and attorneys to give him aid. On the return journey an unsuccessful effort was made to take Hill from the custody of the La Salle county sheriff by a writ of habeas corpus, but officials removed the youth from a train at

the Wisconsin line and rushed him to Ottawa by automobile.

Hill said he read of the finding of the body and, becoming frightened when he saw he was suspected, decided to flee. He was taken at night to the cellar grave and was questioned amid flickering lights in the stone-mined mausoleum vault, but his story could not be shaken.

The La Salle county grand jury indicted Hill for murder on Oct. 15 and at the same time returned five other counts against him charging forgery.

New York, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Active bidding for a wide assortment of pool specialties, more than a score of which were elevated to record high levels, more than offset the development of a few weak spots in today's stock market. Publication of another series of optimistic 1928 business forecasts, coupled with a continuation of easy money rates, stimulated bullish enthusiasm.

Coppers were again in the forefront of the advance. Greene Cananea, in which there have been rumors of a "technical feature," was the individual feature, gaining 10 points to a new record high for all time at 140 1-2, or 110 points above the year's low. Anaconda, White and Miami coppers also advanced to their highest prices in years.
Active bidding for the oil field Sinclair and Sunco to new peak prices for the year.
Hudson led the advance in the motor group.
The closing was firm. Total sales approximated 2,800,000 shares.
