No Signals or Response to Taps of Divers Heard From Ill-Fated Vessel.

Provincetown, Mass., Dec. 22.-(AP)-Read Admiral Frank H. Brumby, in charge of salvage operations at the sunken submarine S-4 admitted today that there was no longer hope that life existed on board the submarine. I have not the slightest doubt

that there is no life on board the 6-1," Admiral Brumby said. The admiral said he was unable announce when rescue operawould be suspended.




