CITY ALL SET FOR HOLIDAY SEASON TODAY

Business And Residential Sections Literally Blazing With Bright Lights.

With business and residential districts gaily lighted with multi-colored lights, indications today were that the holiday season would be one of the greatest in the history of the city. The business district presents a dazzling appearance with strings of lights swinging across streets and display windows literally blazing the message of good cheer and happiness.

The campaign to get the residential sections decorated with electrically lighted Christmas trees has been a great success, and last night brilliantly lighted trees sent out their rays of peace and good will to hundreds of pedestrians passing through these sections. Many of the trees had been placed in front yards, while others were on porches and in windows.

The plan to light up the city for the holidays had its inception in the versatile minds of members of the Merchants Association and the Woman's club. They at first planned to have trees placed on the streets of the business district. Finding this too expensive, the Merchants Association swung a string of colored lights across Evans street at Five Points and a few days later similar strings appeared on other blocks.

Aside from the usual cantatas and special services at city churches, the festive season will be marked by a Community Christmas tree to be given at Forbes & Morton's warehouse Christmas afternoon beginning at five-thirty o'clock. An elaborate program has been arranged for this affair, including an address by Hon. P. C. Harding.

The general program will be preceded by musical numbers by the school of the local high school, the school of Christmas carols by students of the city schools and an elaborate pyrotechnic display given by the Merchants association. A large platform and Christmas tree will be erected in the warehouse, and the public will be asked to place their offerings for the poor upon this.

These gifts will be turned over to the Pitt County Department of Public Welfare, and the Salvation Army for distribution among the needy families coming under their supervision. Members of the committee having this program in charge today urged the public to give as liberally as possible and help carry cheer and good will into the cheerless homes of the county's indigent population.

With only one more day in which to shop, business men today prepared to handle the largest volume of business of the holiday season, although it was stated that trade has been unusually brisk all the week. Virtually all stores have been brilliantly decorated and last night presented a most enchanting appearance to the hundreds thronging the business district.

Swift Island Bridge Shot All To Pieces

Albemarle, Dec. 23.—Thousands of pounds of TNT hurled from speeding airplanes a mile and more above the earth today reduced the Swift Island bridge over the Pee Dee river to a twisted mass of concrete and steel as army aviators loosed their heaviest salvos in war department tests being conducted here.

The 1,000 foot modern concrete highway structure, rendered useless by a power development and turned over by the state for the government war time tests, was struck squarely in the center by eight high explosive projectiles today, four of which were scored by Lieut. William K. Andrews, of Roanoke, Va.

Two bridge spans, 50 feet long, and their supporting pillars, were blown up and another span rendered impassable. Seventy bombs gained on and around the bridge transformed the peaceful countryside into a veritable no man's land as the projectiles blasted huge craters into the river banks and sent showers of mud and water hundreds of feet into the air.

The planes, flying in war formations of three ships, swooped out of the east at altitudes varying from 6,000 to 8,000 feet, circled the structure to align their sights and then streaked for their base at Ft. Bragg after releasing their bombs to avoid imaginary anti-aircraft fire.

Assistant Secretary of War Davidson and his subordinates from Langley field, Norfolk and Pope field, Fort Bragg agreed that the destruction of the \$192,000 structure today afforded an invaluable lesson to aviation officials.



ABANDON ALL HOPE OF LIFE ON SUBMARINE

Navy, However, Will Not Stop Trying To Raise Boat Until Forced To Do So.

Provincetown, Mass., Dec. 23.—(AP)—With all hope gone that life exists aboard the sunken submarine S-4, the rescue fleet continued its efforts today to raise the ill-fated craft from its grave 100 feet below the surface of the sea before unfavorable weather forces suspension of the salvage operations.

The navy will not discontinue its attempts to raise the submersible "until forced to do so," Admiral Frank H. Brumby, in command of the rescue fleet, declared.

"It must be remembered," Admiral Brumby said, "that off Block Island in December, 1925, it was necessary because of weather conditions to cease operations on the S-4 on December 6. These operations were resumed in the spring of 1926 when weather conditions permitted them. We hope to have the diving work about the submarine more advanced than it is now, but in diving operations you are doomed to many disappointments."

Captain Ernest P. King, directing the salvage operations, said that divers still were working late this afternoon, drilling a tunnel through the mud under the bow of the S-4 so that cables might be looped around the sunken craft.

Joseph Eiben, one of the divers who went down late today, replaced the air hose which had been disconnected with the torpedo compartment and the air indicator on the mine sweeper Falcon, flagship of the rescue fleet, after it had shown the tube was in danger of collapse, although officers of the rescue party had given up hope that the six men in the torpedo compartment were living. Pumping of air into the room was continued today.

The latest tests of the air returned to the Falcon through the hose showed that it contained less than one-half of one per cent of carbon dioxide.

In a formal statement today, Admiral Brumby said that every suggestion made in connection with the rescue work had been given careful consideration and expressed his thanks to those who had offered advice.

"The Navy personnel on duty at the wreck of the S-4 desires to thank all those who have offered advice or suggestions in regard to the rescue work," he said, "for their interest in this work. All may rest assured that every bit of advice and every suggestion has been carefully considered and any ideas that could be used have been gladly accepted."

"All those at the wreck have used and are using every effort and all of the available facilities for accomplishing their tasks. Much of this work was done under conditions that are very different from anything seen in work on shore, where the weather has little or no effect. Some of the work at the wreck is necessarily tedious and sometimes dangerous, but the work has progressed without interruption when it was possible for it to do so."

FIRE DOES DAMAGE AT MITCHEL FIELD

Mitchell Field, N. Y., Dec. 23.—(AP)—Fire destroyed one warehouse and the central heating plant, and threatened to burn the entire cantonment here today. Dense smoke from burning oil in the boiler house increased the difficulty of fighting the blaze, civilian fire departments from Hempstead, Westbury and Mineola were called out.

SMOOT ASKS ANOTHER CUT

Chairman Of Finance Committee Demands Reduction Under \$250,000,000.

Washington, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Aparing down of the \$250,000,000 tax reduction bill passed by the House to well under \$250,000,000 was demanded today by chairman Smoot of the Senate Finance Committee which will work over the measure after the holidays.

Under the pressure from the White House that the original limitation of \$225,000,000 set by the administration be adhered to, Senate Republican leaders are admittedly puzzled as to how it is to be accomplished and some delay in action on the bill seems probable.

Restoration to the measure of some of the corporation levy which was cut from 13 1/2 to 11 1/2 per cent by the House and also a restoration of part of the automobile sales tax of 3 per cent which was wiped out by the House, are seen by Chairman Smoot as two possible means of trimming down the total reduction to somewhere near the administration limit.

However, Senator Smoot has no definite program and he says the Senate is in a mood to repeal the inheritance tax which would add \$7,000,000 the next year. The House after a fight, refused to eliminate the tax.

Strong hints have been dropped that the administration is willing to wait until March 15 when first tax payments of 1928 are due to prove its contentions on the prospective surplus for this year. While he says there is some favor toward the Senate taking up the alien property bill already passed by the House, before considering the revenue measure, Senator Smoot denied today that the tax bill would be shelved until after March 15.

He did say, however, that he preferred to see how far Congress would go in making appropriations before acting finally on the tax bill and if this program is followed it would be several months before the revenue measure could be put into law.

"There is one thing certain," the Senator said, "if Congress is going to authorize all the appropriations for special work such as flood control, farm relief, Boulder Canyon Dam, the Columbia river reclamation project and others, it cannot have much, if any, tax reduction."

The chairman does not plan to have a meeting of the committee before January 7 and not until then, he said, will a decision be reached on the program for the tax bill.

Mrs. Grayson Takes Off

New York, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The French Cable Company's station at Cape Cod, Mass., reported that Mrs. Francis Wilson Grayson's amphibian plane "Dawn" flew over that point about 7:25 o'clock tonight.

George Remus demonstrated adaptation to environment by making \$1,000,000 at bootlegging, he murdered his wife, shooting her down despite pitiful appeals for mercy.

Remus told a Cincinnati jury, of men and women, that frantic jealousy of a Mr. Dodge made him insane at the shooting moment.

The jury on the first ballot acquitted him and when Remus after acquittal was safely in his cell, and appropriately in tears members of the jury rushed to shake his hand and congratulate him.

He may have to go to the insane asylum for a little while to prove his good faith.

Crime is a puzzling phenomenon. Hickman is a 19-year old kidnaper and murderer, for whom all California was hunting, was a model boy in his Sunday school class, vice president of his high school class. The graduation annual said of him "excellent scholastic standing, unequalled record in curriculum activities and a high standard of ideals."

Hickman is thought to have kidnapped and murdered a young girl, possibly for revenge, the father had opposed his employment in a bank.

Mr. Remus also killed partly for revenge, his wife had deceived him with another man.

There are different degrees of revenge, and of murder. Twelve jurors, unanimously acquitted Remus. Not one juror in 100,000,000 would vote to acquit Hickman.

The Reverend Cadman remarks that "this planet may exist for nearly a million billion years longer." An anxious Christian asks: "Do you believe that the soul sleeps in the grave with the body a million billion years awaiting for the judgment? If I really believed it, I think I should try to have a pretty good time while still in the flesh."

Special church services are being arranged by the various denominations. The President will attend church Sunday, probably at Keith's Theatre, used by the Congregational church which he and Mrs. Coolidge attend, for largely attended services while their own edifice is under repair.

At Washington Cathedral where Woodrow Wilson is buried, there will be a program of Christmas carols Sunday afternoon sung in English, German, Russian and Early American. They will be broadcast.

Although the demands of her own family will be sufficient to keep Mrs. Coolidge busy, she has set aside a few hours tomorrow for charity. In the morning she will aid in the distribution of the Christmas gifts to the poor by the United Central Union Mission at Keith's theatre, and in the afternoon will go to the Salvation Army Temple to present baskets of food to destitute families.

Today she supervised the hanging of wreaths in the White House walkways, which, since Mrs. Coolidge endorses the move to preserve holly, are made up of laurel leaves, spruce twigs and pine cones.

Christmas day itself will be spent quietly at the White House but there will be a festive note by the unwrapping of hundreds of presents which have come in from all parts of the country.

JOYOUS SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS GRIPS CAPITAL

Most of Washington's Official Family Today Hurrying Towards Their Homes.

Washington, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The joyous spirit of Christmas descended over the national capital tonight pointing the way for the observance of the holidays in the homes throughout the country.

Most of the members of Washington's official life were hurrying to their family firesides but a good share remained here to spend the holidays and to welcome a new year.

Like a symbol for the festivities which will prevail throughout the nation, a stately spruce tree has been decorated just north of the Treasury. With hundreds of colored bulbs it is ready to be lighted by President Coolidge tomorrow evening, thus setting in motion the season's activities, which as usual will revolve around the White House.

Under the gleaming boughs of the tree the President and Mrs. Coolidge and their son, John, will join in a community Christmas Eve observance, and later will welcome the Interstate Commerce Commission Glee Club to the White House for the singing of Christmas carols. The public has been invited to participate.

As Christmas day neared, activity increased today at the White House. Five trees were carried in to be decorated and under Mrs. Coolidge's personal supervision with electric lights and festive tinsel. Three of them will be placed in the blue room and underneath one Mrs. Coolidge will arrange a reproduction of the nativity in Jerusalem. Another tree will be erected in the hall way and the fifth will decorate the private apartment of the President on the second floor.

Of the members of the President's Cabinet, Santa Claus has awaited at the home of Secretary Davis of the Labor Department, where his five children promoted that happy atmosphere which only youngsters can give to Christmas. Secretaries Kellogg, Jardine, Hoover, Davis, of the War Department, and Attorney General Clegg, will spend Christmas in the national capital.

Secretary Mellon goes to Pittsburgh to open his home there for the holiday. Secretary and Mrs. Work will go to Baltimore and Secretary and Mrs. Wilbur to Wayne, Pa., to spend the holidays with relatives. Postmaster General and Mrs. New are returning to Indianapolis.

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BANDITS ROB TEXAS BANK

Use Two Terrified Little Girls As A Screen Against Bullets Of Pursuers.

El Paso, Tex., Dec. 23.—(AP)—Leaving in an abandoned automobile two terrified little girls whom they had kidnapped and used as a screen against bullets of pursuers, four of the five bandits, who held out and robbed the First National Bank here this afternoon fled on foot to underbrush several miles out of town and were reported surrounded by a posse.

One of the men, left behind by his companions, was shot at least four times but was still alive late today. It was at first reported he was slain.

At a local hospital, George Carmichael, policeman, was reported dying; G. E. Bedford, chief of police, was lying with three bullet wounds in his body and Alex Spear, cashier of the bank, was suffering a gunshot wound in the jaw. The result of a gun battle outside the bank as the bandits fled amid a fusillade of bullets. Two of the four fleeing bandits also were believed wounded.

Part of the loot, amounting to \$10,000, was found in the automobile which the third wounded bandit was driving.

Laverne Comer, 12, and Emma May Robinson, 10, the two children taken by the fleeing robbers, said the balance of the loot was in the abandoned automobile.

Shortly after noon a man in a Santa Claus garb, entered the bank and spoke to Spear in a mumbling tone of voice. When Spear asked him to repeat the question, the man suddenly pulled a revolver. Following closely behind were four other men, all with revolvers. They lined up officials of the bank and customers.

While the men scooped up all the money in sight, a woman customer, unnoticed by the robbers, fled from a side door and notified the police. Seeing officers coming, the bandits grabbed two of the bankers by the arm and led them from the bank. Just outside the door they released the men and seized the two children. Placing the children between them and the officers, they backed slowly toward two waiting automobiles, four in one car with the children while the fifth, with part of the money, entered the other, a second later the lone robber fell to the floor of the carshot four times. The others fled, firing volley after volley into the crowd.

DAVIS TO PRESIDE OVER JACKSON DAY DINNER

Washington, Dec. 23.—(AP)—John W. Davis, democratic standard bearer in 1924, will preside over the Jackson day dinner here January 12, the first national get-together of democratic leaders since 1920.

As toastmaster at this revival of the party's pre-convention rallies, Mr. Davis, will call on all of those whose names have been put forward for the nomination at the '28 convention.

All other leaders of the party have been invited to gather at the banquet table to hear the call to arms of the presidential campaign and the views of the party's potential nominees.

S. C. Governor Gets Gift.
Columbia, Dec. 23.—(AP)—A set of gold studs and cuff links with platinum tips and inlaid with mother-of-pearl was the Christmas gift to Governor John G. Richards of the state constabulary and detective force, it was announced today. W. J. Stricklin, the governor's secretary, was given a cigarette lighter, and watch chain with pen knife attached.

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LINDY TO HOP OFF FOR S. A. WEDNESDAY

Entertainment Of The American Ace To Come To End In Mexico Tuesday.

Mexico City, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Col. Lindbergh's entertainment as Mexico's guest will officially end Monday afternoon with the first, last and only purely American function he has known here—a reception at the American embassy to permit members of the American colony to meet the flier and his mother.

All Tuesday Lindbergh will be left absolutely free to prepare his plane, the Spirit of St. Louis, for his Central American flight and to study of maps. He will hop off for Guatemala Wednesday morning.

Wednesday morning Lindbergh will hop on his way to Guatemala City, which he expects to reach in nine hours or less. From there he will fly to capitals of the following countries in the order named: British Honduras, Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica and Panama. The pan American-Havana flight, he added, might not be a non-stop affair, as he sees no reason for it. If he makes a stop on this flight he had not yet picked his landing place.

Mrs. Lindbergh will probably fly back to the United States in the tri-motored Ford plane in which she winged her way from Detroit to Mexico City, but there is still a possibility she may return by railroad.

Added to his other dignities, Colonel Lindbergh today was made an honorary member of the Mexico City rotary. A delegation of leaders of that organization called at the embassy and formally expressed in behalf of Mexican Rotarians throughout the republic admiration for the flier's achievements, not only in making material history, but in urging about increased friendliness between the United States and Mexico.

A delegation of post office employees also called at the embassy and presented him with an album containing a complete collection of all issues of Mexican stamps.

Since the arrival of Mrs. Lindbergh, mother and her son have been enjoying the little personal chats. Keeping very quiet and avoiding as much as possible the hurry and bustle of public entertainments.

FORMER CHICAGO WOMAN FRED BY FRENCH COURT

Paris, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The American born Countess de Janus, who was Miss Alice Silverthorne of Chicago was set free on a suspended sentence and a four-dollar fine in the Paris courts today for shooting her English lover, Raymond Vincent de Trafford of titled family last March at the Gare du Nord.

In passing judgment of 6 months in jail, and then suspending the sentence, Judge Fradet told the countess that he was moved by pity and circumstances under which the shooting occurred—de Trafford's abandonment of her after promising to marry her, she having in the meantime got a divorce from Count de Janus.

The judge was more harsh with de Trafford, who came to testify, although he was not summoned. "He failed in his duty, and did this from selfish interest," the judge remarked. "If he failed to keep his word, it was not because of religious or philosophical scruples, but because he feared his allowance would be cut off."

CHILD KILLER ATTEMPTS TO SHIFT BLAME

Edward Hickman Still Protests He Did Not Kill Little Los Angeles Girl.

Pendleton, Ore., Dec. 23.—(AP)—His nerve only slightly shaken after 24 hours confinement in the city jail here, William Edward Hickman today continued to shift the blame for the killing of Marian Parker, Los Angeles school girl, on an Andrew Cramer, named as an accomplice in the kidnapping of the child.

The 19-year old youth's protestations, however, were made before he had been confronted with the announcement from Los Angeles that Andrew Oliver Cramer had been located there in the Lincoln Heights jail where he has been a prisoner since last August, thus eliminating him from the case.

Hickman readily admitted he abducted the 12-year old girl, conducted negotiations for ransom and collected \$1,500 in delivering the child's torso to her father, Perry M. Parker, bank official but resolutely denied he was the slayer.

"I know that I am not guilty of murder and I am perfectly calm," Hickman declared in his cell. "Nothing further that might lead to the identification of me as the slayer, Cramer, Parker's reputed companion, June Dunning, came from the lips of Hickman."

"I don't suppose the public will believe it, but there was another fellow in on this. His name was—," he stammered, paused then continued "Andrew Cramer."

"I just met him coming up from San Diego," Cramer, said Hickman, had deep set eyes and heavy eyebrows. He had a peculiar habit of walking with a slight limp every third or fourth step, as were a blue shirt with attached collar, same color and were a black four-in-hand tie.

Hickman expressed the opinion that after delivering the torso of the girl to Hickman at his apartment about six o'clock Saturday night, Cramer fled south. He reiterated a belief expressed yesterday that Cramer had taken towels from Hickman's rooms and placed them with the body in order to throw suspicion on Hickman.

Hickman volunteered the information that he had planned to return Marian alive and uninjured to her parents on Sunday if Parker, the girl's father had not "come through" with the ransom. The slaying of the girl by Cramer was entirely unexpected by Hickman, he said.

"The only reason he had to kill her and dismember the body was in order to get her into a suitcase which he could carry without arousing suspicion," he said.

Asked to explain why he used the expression, "I am doing a solo" in some of his letters to Parker if he was acting as a confederate, Hickman indicated he did not have a definite idea of the meaning of the word. He said he had overheard the word when he was in jail.

"There was no need of me using that word. I just thought it was clever like the word 'fox' and 'fate'. These names he signed to ransom letters."

"I know Parker doesn't feel as terrible about this as I do," Hickman muttered.

"Marian sure was a nice little girl," he kept repeating. "She didn't even cry when I told her I was kidnapping her." She said she didn't think her father had the money but she hoped he would get it. She was a pretty little thing."

Told that his mother had collapsed and that his father had disowned him when informed of his confession, the self styled "fox" stolidly repeated, "I know that I am not guilty of murder and I am perfectly calm. I didn't kill her. It was Cramer."

"I sent a message to my mother by that minister who was in here," he said.

Hickman sat in his cell with fantastic shadows of the swinging jail lights throwing sinister dark bars across his face today as he talked to reporters.

The story was much the same as that told yesterday but his manner of talking on this gray day after his capture was vastly different.

He didn't toss his head or wavy black hair and laugh as he did yesterday, but sat on the edge of his cot rubbing his hands nervously, testing the joint of each finger separately.

He invited questions, but there was only time for one question, the where the story started, clearly at first, then rushing as though he were eager to review the facts and get them out of the way.

He appears to have the story of the kidnapping "down pat." However he has not yet undergone a real police grilling. When Chief of Police Gardner broke up the interviews and reporters moved down the stairs, Hickman was still in his cell. (Continued On Page Six)

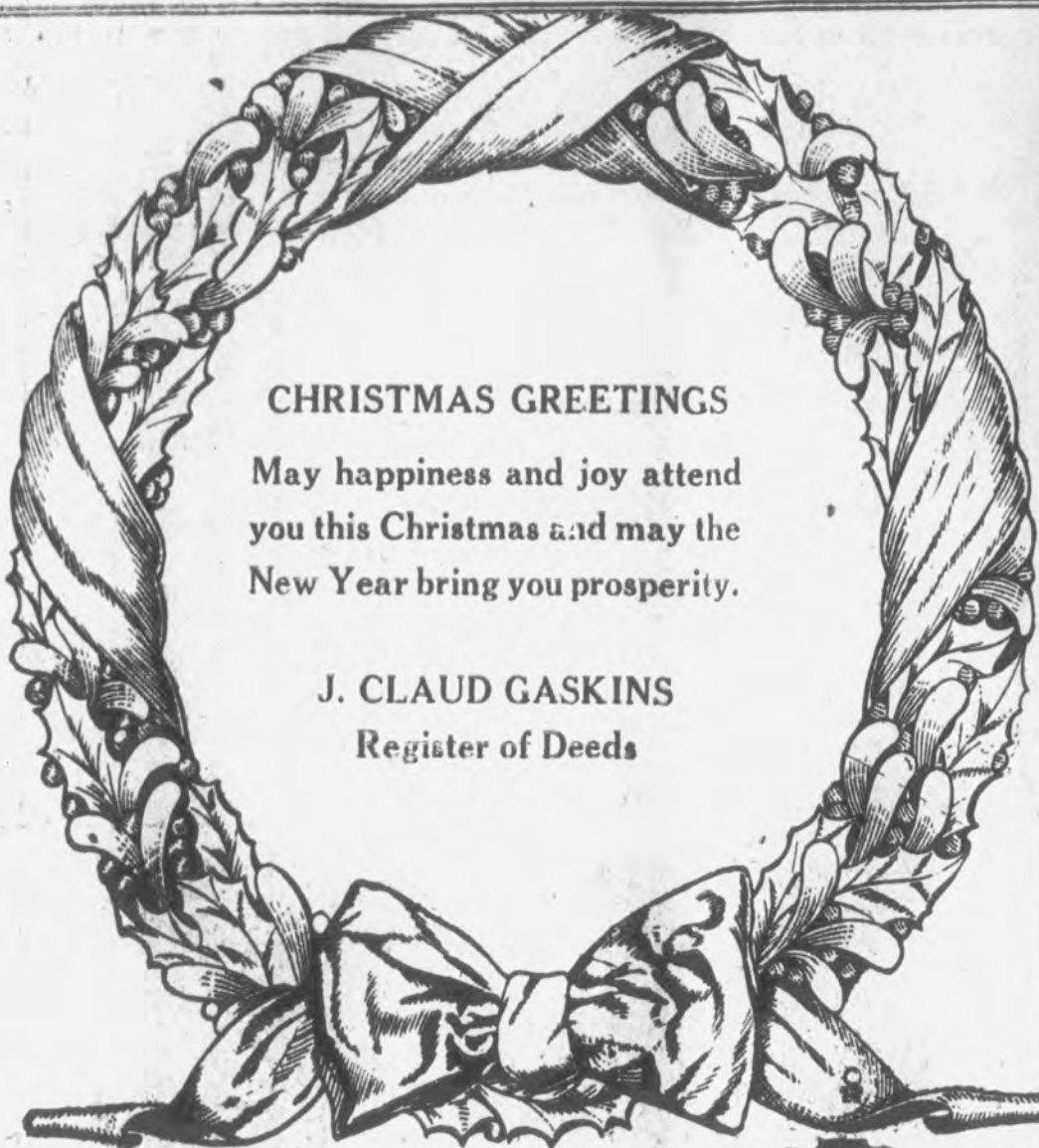
"While doing your Christmas giving do not forget the Salvation Army," urged members of local civic organizations today.

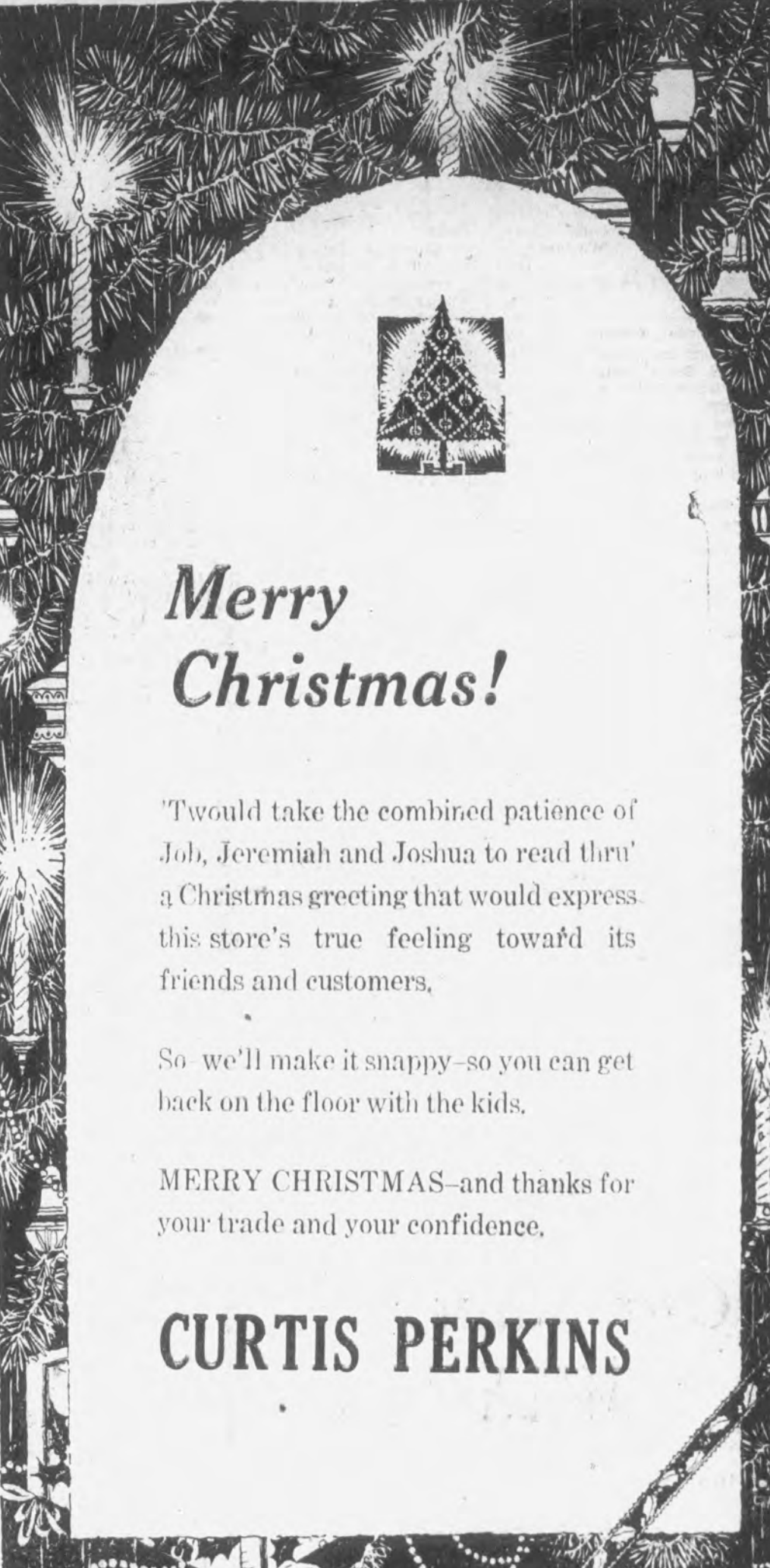

the jail corridor the voice of Hickman still could be heard continuing the tale to his jail mates.

A slight laugh escaped Hickman's lips as the dispatch from Los Angeles was read to him.

"That is strange," he said. "It can't be."

Then he added: "Perhaps the man took the name of Cramer just to get me in bad."

Speaking in a straightforward manner the young prisoner said that the man he described as Cramer had been in trouble before. "He said he had been in a kidnapping in Denver and knew how to do it. I fell in with his plan because I wanted the money."

When reminded that he had mentioned June Dunning in his confession here yesterday, Hickman said:

"Well if you can find her perhaps she can explain who this other man Cramer is."

Special attention was directed to Cramer's quoted statement of "I know Hickman, I don't know why he picks on me. Of course it is impossible for me to have been in a kidnapping."

Referring to this, Hickman said:

"Yes, I know Cramer."

Asked where he was before the August when Cramer was sentenced to jail Hickman declared he was in Kansas City and later went to Chicago.

Hickman then rambled on telling about his movements, how he rented a room at the Paradise Arms Apartments in Chicago. On Washington boulevard and paid \$11 a week for the room.

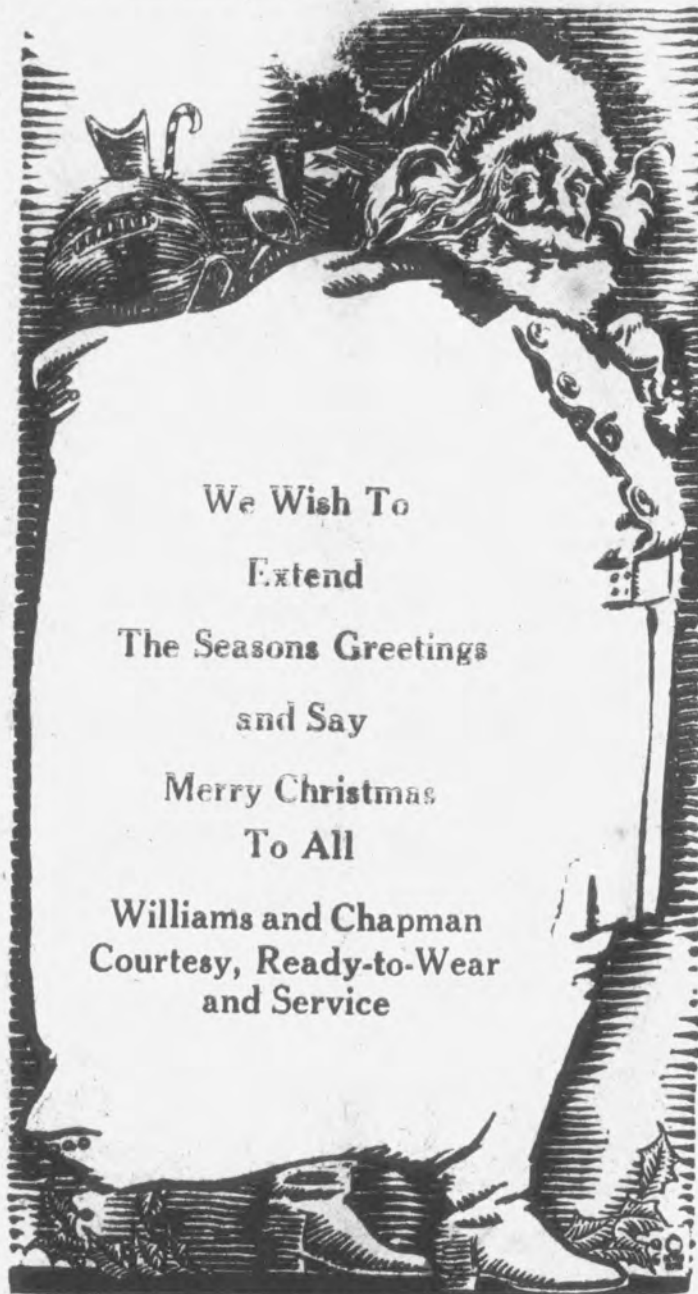

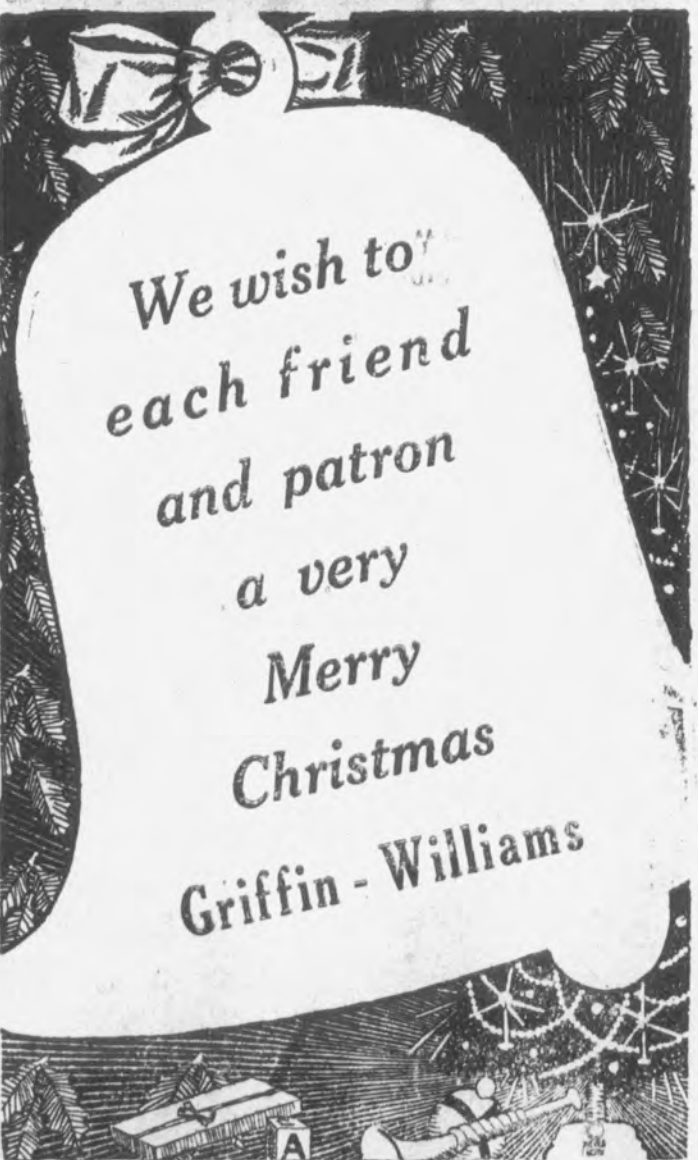
