That Hickman had admitted that he alone was responsible for the dissection of the body was officially announced last night by District Attorney Asa Keyes of Los Angeles. Keyes and other officers had been grilling Hickman since early yesterday-come hours after leaving Pendleton, Ore., where he was captured. The youth confessed to the kidnaping immediately after his capture but had steadfastly refused to admit that he was the murdered of his little captive.


