MORGAN MAY SUCCEED GARY

New York Banker Expected to be Named Chairman of Steel Corporation.

New York, Dec. 27.—(AP)—J. P. Morgan was elected chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation today.

New York, Dec. 27.—(AP)—J. P. Morgan, banker, was widely heralded in Wall Street today as the successor to the late Elbert H. Gary as chairman of the board of directors of the United States steel corporation. While no official announcement will be made until after the meeting of the board this afternoon, the absence of any denial, official or unofficial, from the Morgan firm, was construed by Wall street as an indication that Mr. Morgan had decided to accept the responsibilities.

Myron C. Taylor, who has been one of the First National Bank representatives on the steel corporation's board of directors, probably will be named as chairman of the finance committee, a post also held by Mr. Gary. Two vacancies on the board of directors also will probably be filled this afternoon.

Wall street has heard rumors for some time that the directors of the steel corporation were having difficulty in agreeing on a successor to Mr. Gary. Various names have been mentioned since Mr. Gary died, but it was expected, until a few days ago, that the choice would be among Mr. Farrell, Mr. Taylor or Nathan L. Miller, former governor of New York, and now the general counsel for the corporation.

Many events in recent years have been awaited with such widespread interest as the meeting of steel directors at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The meeting of the board will be preceded by the regular weekly meeting of the finance committee, of which Mr. Gary also was chairman. Wall Street believes that if Mr. Morgan assumes the chairmanship of the board of directors that Myron C. Taylor will be elected to the chairmanship of the finance committee.

James A. Farrell, president of the corporation, undoubtedly will be continued in that capacity, as he is generally recognized as one of the best operating steel men in the world.

Common stock of the United States Steel Corporation disclosed a strong undertone on the New York stock exchange today, sharing the early leadership of the market with General Motors.

AMUNDSEN GETS SILVER FROM JAPANESE ROYALTY

Oslo, Norway, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Roald Amundsen was rewarded principally with glory when he conquered the Arctic and Antarctic, but for piloting Prince Chin Ri and Princess Masako of Japan over Oslo he got a chest of silver. The gift, a souvenir of the royal couple's visit, was ornamented with the imperial Japanese coat of arms in gold.

The royal tourists, who are studying the nations of Europe and visiting the heads of states, were very much interested in hearing from Amundsen's own lips the tales of his various exploits. They went out to the historical museum of the University of Oslo to see the model of the "Fram," the vessel on which he sailed for the South Pole.

FORTY LIVES BELIEVED LOST WHEN TURKISH STEAMER GOES DOWN

Constantinople, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Forty lives are feared to have been lost in the sinking of the Turkish steamer Suedi at the entrance of the Gulf of Mudania yesterday, after a collision with the steamship Marmara. The vessel sank within a few minutes. It carried 120 passengers.

Among those missing are two teachers from the American School in Broussa, Anatolia, Borah Ward of England and Mlle. Hiller of Switzerland.

PREDICT BIG INCREASE OF POPULATIONS

Census Bureau Experts Calculate General Increase for 255 Cities of Nation.

Washington, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Unless a lot of second guessing is in order for census bureau experts most American cities have increased population to boost of.

Assuming that the rate of growth since 1920 was the same as that for the decade 1910-1920, these experts have calculated increases as of last July 1, for 255 cities of 30,000 or more and have arrived at some interesting results.

They found chiefly, that New York by next summer should have more than 6,000,000, maintaining its rank as first city, nearly twice as large as Chicago, and that another city—Cleveland—probably will enter the million class by 1930.

The figures, which did not include estimates for 23 cities, showed that New York gained 56,800 from July 1, 1926, to the same date this year, making its total 5,970,300. Chicago remained second with 3,102,800, a gain just 2,000 less than that of New York, and Philadelphia stayed in third place with a gain of 27,900, for a total of 2,035,000. Detroit at present at the bottom of the million list, gained 44,500 its total being 1,334,500.

Cleveland, now leading the half-million class with 972,500, must add 27,500 before the next census in 1930 to enter the million group. St. Louis is next with 339,200, then Baltimore, 319,000; Boston 293,100; Pittsburgh 265,500; Los Angeles, not estimated (576,673 in 1930); San Francisco 256,000; Buffalo 250,000; Washington 240,000; and Milwaukee 236,400.

Relative position in the 400,000 class remained the same, with Newark leading, Toledo joined the 300,000 group, led by Kansas City, and Columbus took first place from Denver in the 200,000 class. A number of changes were recorded in the 100,000 list, and five cities added themselves to it—Miami, Jacksonville, Long Beach, Calif., Fort Wayne and Knoxville.

HICKMAN CONFESSES SLAYING LITTLE MARIAN PARKER AND THEN DISMEMBERING BODY

(Continued from page one)

He restored to her family. That night he took his little captive to a motion picture theater in Los Angeles and then to his apartment. They sat under a tree for half an hour and she then followed him to his room as he had instructed her to do. Given the choice of sleeping on the bed or a couch, she chose the latter. They awoke at 7 o'clock that morning and Hickman penned the first letter to her father, instructing him to obtain \$1,500 in \$20 bills and await further instructions. Marian also wrote a note which was inclosed.

Hickman tied Marian to a chair and went out and mailed the letter. He returned and prepared breakfast but the girl did not eat. Hickman then engaged her in conversation and told her she might write another letter to her father. She was in tears, but stopped crying when allowed to write the second note.

The abductor then left the apartment a second time and returned with newspapers, telling the story of the kidnapping. Together they read the papers.

That afternoon Hickman took

the girl for a ride of 70 miles, but returned about dark, bringing more newspapers filled with stories of the case. The confession then told how he had telephoned Parker and arranged for a rendezvous but how he had failed to keep it because the police had been allowed to take a hand. Back in the apartment Marian sobbed because she could not return home that night. Again she slept on the couch and awakened the next morning—the day of her death—at 7:30 a. m.

Again Hickman held her to write a note to her father. This time she was allowed to use her own words except that she was instructed to make it appear she was being treated badly. Hickman then promised to allow her to return if her father did not pay the money. He wrote another note—chiding the father for allowing the police to interfere and threatened death to Marian.

Once more Marian was bound and a blindfold was added. As he left the apartment she pleaded with him to let her go.

The confession here declares Hickman then got the idea of killing Marian. He had told the girl "too much" about himself—that he formerly was employed at the bank and that her father knew him. He realized if she returned alive she would tell this and he would be a marked man.

He took a dish towel and twisted it around her neck, holding it tightly for two minutes before she became unconscious. With his pocket knife he dismembered the body. The arms and legs he wrapped in paper. He then combed the girl's hair, powdered her face and threaded wire through the eyelids in an effort to keep the eyes open.

After finishing the gruesome work he wrote the final letter to Parker giving him his "last chance" to have his daughter returned alive. That done, he went to a theatre.

When the hour for the rendezvous with Parker enared, he placed the torso in a suitcase and drove to the meeting place. Ascertaining there were no police near, he tied Parker, took the \$1,500 at the point of a gun and then dropped the body a few feet ahead of the father's automobile.

Immediately he drove to a cafe and passed the first of the \$20 bills for a dinner. He returned home and slept. The next morning the police swarmed into his apartment, having traced a piece of towel which had been put with the body.

He gladly watched them search the apartment for possible clues, and inquired if he could help them. Then he casually strolled out and went to a theatre. Afterwards he went to Hollywood Boulevard and took a big green automobile from its owner at pistol point.

With the green automobile he headed for San Francisco. He remained at a hotel there until the morning his name appeared as the man wanted. Then he headed for the north, where the trail of \$20 gold certificates finally led to his capture.

Hickman declared an uncontrollable desire to kill had surged with him since childhood. On the day of the killing, Marian became fretful, he said, and he concluded that the time had come to put her to death.

Hickman was said to have told Keyes that he would be willing to plead guilty to murder and kidnapping and would accept imposition of the death penalty without delay. He seemingly had adopted an attitude of indifference after unburdening himself under the withering fire of questioning by Keyes, chief of detectives Herman Cline and others.

"One of the quietest Christmas evenings," stated members of the Greenville police department this morning in response to a query as to how the holidays passed off among the criminal element.

"We made only a few arrests Christmas Eve night and less Christmas night," Chief Lester Jones stated. Most of these were for minor violations of the law. Serious offenses were strangely conspicuous for their paucity, and this is something unusual for holidays.

"We got by with less evidence of whiskey than any year since I have been on the force. Some parts of the country report flagrant violations of prohibition laws and many arrests for drunkenness. Greenville and Pitt county were fortunate in this way, and our citizens are to be congratulated."

"Not a single town in Eastern North Carolina was decorated as appropriately and as extensively for Christmas as was Greenville," enthusiastically asserted a local man who spent the holidays in other parts of the state.

"I had an opportunity of visiting several of the larger towns while away, and while many of them had decorations of a most commendable nature, they failed to compare with Greenville.

"The Merchants Association and the Woman's club are to be congratulated for their activities in behalf of decorations for the street and homes. It is to be hoped they receive even greater co-operation and encouragement next year."

"We soon will be starting a new year," Rev. H. Frederick Jones, pastor of Memorial Baptist church said this morning, "and numbers of our people will make inventories of their worldly possessions.

"While these inventories are being made we should not be forgetful of our spiritual possessions. It is very important that we keep check on the temporal things of life, but it is even more important for us to keep tab on the progress and development of the human soul.

"In getting yourself all set for the New Year do not forget that debt you owe yourself and your creator."

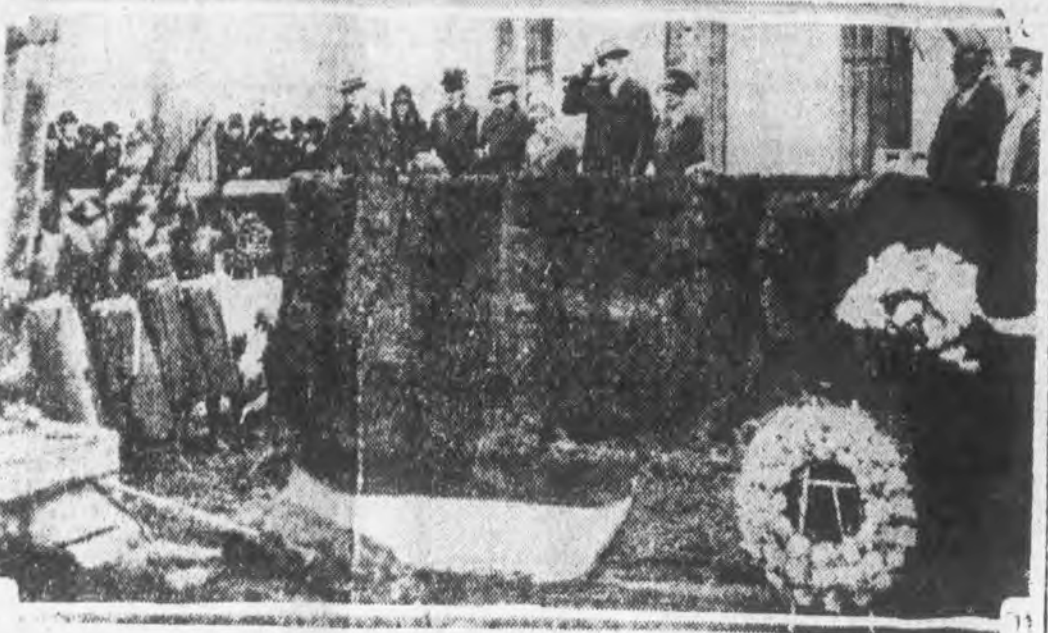
