PROTEST CONFIRMATION OF HAYES AS FEDERAL JUDGE IN NEW CAROLINA DISTRICT

Plumtree Business Man Presents Senate Judiciary Committee With Charges of Corruption and Extortion.

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Charges of corruption and extortion while a practicing attorney and wrongful use of his office as solicitor of the seventeenth judicial district of North Carolina were filed with a Senate Judiciary subcommittee today against John V. Hayes, of Greensboro, N. C.

Hayes is serving under a recess appointment as federal judge of the recently created middle district of North Carolina.

A protest against confirmation of the appointment carrying the two charges was filed by D. T. Vance, a Plumtree, N. C., business man.

Senator Overman, Democrat, of North Carolina, is serving as chairman of the subcommittee with Robinson, Republican, Indiana, Senator Goff, Republican, of West Virginia, the other member, was prevented from attending the hearing because of illness.

Hayes served as solicitor of the 17th district from 1914 to 1926. At the same time it was charged he was a law partner of John R. Jones, practicing under the firm name of Hayes and Jones. Because of corruption and extortion in the settlement of criminal cases in the district, the law firm, Vance alleged, became known in that section as the Hayes-Jones combine.

Mrs. L. A. Hauser, of North Wilkesboro, was the first witness for the protestants against confirmation of Judge Hayes' appointment as judge of the new middle district of North Carolina.

She testified that in 1921 before the death of her husband who was a practicing dentist in Greensboro, charges were made by a man named Becker that Dr. Hauser had been guilty of misconduct.

Hauser employed the law firm of Hayes and Jones to settle the case in an effort to protect his name. Mrs. Hauser testified that the charges were blackmail. At that time Hayes was solicitor of the 17th district, whose duties, it was brought out, were to prosecute the case.

It was recommended by the firm, Mrs. Hauser testified, that a cash settlement should be made. A cancelled check was offered as evidence made payable to Hayes & Jones, for the sum of \$1,000. The handwriting on the body of the check, it is alleged, is Hayes' and Hauser's handwriting appears only as the signature.

Mrs. Hauser testified that, although they might have been able to borrow the necessary amount asked as a compromise in the case she and her husband sold their home in order to raise the \$1,000.

J. A. Resseau, a North Wilkesboro attorney, testified that he defended a man charged with assault and battery and settled the case with the firm of Hayes and Jones for \$400, while Hayes was serving as solicitor. Several similar cases also were brought out in which Resseau appeared as an attorney and which were alleged to have gone the same compromise route.

On cross-examination, Resseau testified that in his opinion no criminal action should have been filed in these cases mentioned at the hearing, and that so far as he knew, Hayes never employed his office as solicitor to extort money or to compromise suits.

He also stated that Hayes' actions in the courts were beyond reproach and he was regarded as one of the most vigorous prosecutors in North Carolina.

It was brought out that although there were reports that Hayes was lax in the prosecution of liquor cases, in Resseau's opinion he was vigorous in the trial of such cases. As a federal judge, Resseau said Hayes has been extremely hard on those convicted of prohibition charges. He said that he spoke from experience of his own court.

HICKMAN INDICTED ON SECOND MURDER CHARGE

Los Angeles, Jan. 5.—(AP)—William Edward Hickman, confessed kidnaper and killer of Marian Parker, was indicted for a second murder today when the county grand jury ordered him to trial for the slaying of C. Ivy Thoms, Rosehill druggist, during an attempted holdup a year ago.

REBEL LEADER STILL REFUSES TO STOP FIGHT

Nicaraguan Establishes Republic In Territory Occupied By Troops

Managua, Nicaragua, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A republic has been founded in the Nueva Segovia district by General Augusto Sandino, rebel leader, with whom United States marines are engaged.

Money has been coined in the name of the republican government and prohibition of intoxicants established with severe penalties. Death is the penalty for a man convicted of selling liquor. A convicted woman's property is burned.

The rebel leader changed the name of San Fernando to Sandino when he established the republic. Sandino was a leader in the Liberal army commanded by General Jose Maria Moncada, leader of the opposition to the conservative Diaz government. In compliance with an agreement negotiated by Henry J. Stimson, President Coolidge's personal envoy, the Liberal forces laid down their arms last July with the assurance that next August a fair national election would be held.

Sandino gathered a number of those dissatisfied with the settlement about him. He seized and operated American mines and levied taxes in the district.

Major G. D. Hatfield, United States marine corps, sent Sandino an ultimatum demanding that he lay down his arms. Sandino refused to comply or to even discuss the matter. General Moncada, as the leader of the official opposition, repudiated Sandino.

Sandino has maintained that the peace settlement was forced upon the Liberals by the United States. He seems to be a radical enthusiast with persuasive powers and one time styled himself "the wild best of the mountains."

Denounces Intervention Of America In Nicaragua

Philadelphia, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Dr. T. S. Vaca, former confidential agent in the United States of Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, Nicaraguan liberal, today asserted that the uprising in Nicaragua is the direct outcome of the "imposition of the Diaz regime" upon the people of that country last May.

Denouncing American intervention in Nicaraguan affairs, Dr. Vaca said he was reliably informed that the forces of General Augusto C. Sandino, rebel leader, were well equipped and that they would fight to the last man against "unwarranted exploitation and conquest by a foreign invader."

Dr. Vaca asserted that these forces number several times those that fought at Quilich last Sunday and that Sandino held the support of the inhabitants of the northern and eastern district where he is operating.

The present Nicaraguan situation, said Dr. Vaca, "is the direct outcome of the imposition of the Diaz regime last May upon the people of Nicaragua, exhausted and led after a year of civil strife that resulted from a plot by New York financiers, first wilfully allowed to hatch and then fanned and enlarged by the active help of the state department in war material and marines, as well as finances to the bankers' man, Diaz."

"There can be no peace and happiness among human beings without justice except by the butts of guns and that is the kind of peace that Nicaragua enjoys now."

"When Colonel Henry L. Stimson, disregarding the most fundamental principles of equity, declared that the honor and prestige of the United States government required the upholding of Diaz in the presidency of Nicaragua and declared the United States forces were ready to disarm the victorious armies of the constitutional government of Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, he definitely committed the United States to an unprecedented and indefensible act of tyranny against another nation, and tyranny will always bring violence and the shedding of human blood."

Colonel Stimson did more than that. Waving in his hand the threat of forcible disarmament, he hastened to reach a secret understanding with the most prominent commander of the Sacasa forces.

The so-called Tipitapa agreement was nothing but a conversation, never put on paper and without witnesses, between Stimson and Moncada.

"Three of the military chiefs operating against Diaz refused to obey the command to disarm; one of them was killed a few days later in his own residence, together with his woman companion, by a marine sergeant, the other two, Sandino and Salgado, have been operating in the northern part of Nicaragua."

Alcoholism Kills 770 In New York During Past Year

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Chronic alcoholism caused the death of 770 persons in New York city last year and the rate was the highest in 13 years, Health Commissioner Harris said today.

A gradual rise in the alcoholic death rate, he said, started in 1924 when the deaths totalled 512. In 1925 the total was 682, and in 1926, 759, from 1918 to 1920, deaths from alcoholism decreased, the total in 1920 being 93.

Statistics in the health department have figured that in 1927 13 persons per 100,000 died of alcoholism. Commissioner Harris said the deaths mostly were due to long-continued or chronic drinking.

ARREST SIX LEADERS OF REVOLUTION

Officials Discover Plot For Another Revolutionary Out- In Mexico.

Mexico City, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A revolutionary plot in the states of Queretaro and Guanajuato, for which arms were said to have been smuggled from the United States, has been discovered. Six alleged ringleaders were arrested and cited to the attorney-general for trial.

The attempt at revolution in Queretaro and Guanajuato in combination with rebel groups operating in the state of Jalisco.

Juan Dolgado Luna, one of those arrested, charged, according to the government, that the conspiracy was directed by Alfredo Robles Domínguez, at present in exile in the United States.

The arrests were made by Jose Masorero, head of the Mexican secret service, and a group of operatives who went to Queretaro there they captured Andres Guerrero Navarro, Gregorio Leon Torres, Jose Areguin Rodriguez, tranquillo Basquez Rodriguez and Luna, all of whom pleaded guilty.

At Ciudad Juarez, on the United States border Ricardo Rangel was captured. He was engaged in smuggling arms and ammunition furnished by parties unknown to the government in the United States.

FLOOD WATER DOES DAMAGE

Swollen Rivers And Creeks In Idaho Wash Away Houses And Flood Roads

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Rivers and creeks swollen by melting snows and blocked in places by ice jams menaced northern Idaho communities today with serious damage feared, and snow from the mountains formed threats at several eastern Washington points.

In the district around Lewiston, Idaho, the Clearwater river strained at its bonds, inundated some highways, washed away several residences, and forced residents to flee before it. A family of six was marooned in tree tops menaced by one river jam for several hours.

There were three big ice jams and several minor jams. When the ice was blasted out in one of these 12 miles above Lewiston, a highway was flooded sending people scurrying for shelter.

Below Arrow Junction a jam was reported fifteen to twenty feet high, with the water rapidly backing up behind the ice.

Late last night a big fifty foot jam at Myrtle went out, releasing a sixteen foot wall of water and ice. The force of the this flood was broken by another jam a mile and a half above Arrow, said to be 25 feet high.

THREE BODIES RECOVERED ON SUBMARINE S-4

Divers Succeeded In Reaching Victims Of Navy Disaster Late Yesterday

Boston, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Three bodies of victims of the sinking of the submarine S-4 today were at the Chelsea naval hospital, near the Charleston navy yard, scene of an investigation of the disaster.

Recovered yesterday in the depths off Provincetown, the bodies were brought to the hospital and a guard of marines was detailed to honor them. The three men were identified by finger print experts of the bureau of navigation as Lieutenant Commander R. E. Jones, Lieutenant Joseph McGinley and Chief Machinist Mate Aaron Albert Jones.

Jones, the commander of the vessel, lived at Haleshorpe, Md., but his parents reside at Hennessey, Okla.

McGinley's home was in Norristown, Pa., and Hodges lived at Riverside, Calif.

The navy department has sent official death notices to the next of kin of each.

The bodies came from Provincetown aboard the Destroyer Maury after Joseph L. Eiben, the first diver to enter the submarine, had found them, fully clothed, in the oil diked water that flooded the engine compartment.

One of the two unidentified men was clothed in the uniform of a machinist's mate while the other apparently was a petty officer.

The cold water had left all three in a good state of preservation. The men appeared to have been drowned rather than suffocated.

Divers at that they would be hopeful today that they would be able to make an early resumption of operations. They were forced to quit yesterday when weather conditions were unfavorable.

Three divers who were sent below after the bodies were found planned to complete exploration of the engine room but had to return to the surface without making further progress.

Society Woman Makes Non-Stop Flight To Miami

Miami, Fla., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Miss Ruth Nichols, Rye, N. Y., society girl, who today held the honor of having made the first non-stop flight from New York to Miami, now plans to go into the flying business.

She said so, following a hundred mile an hour trip which began on the waters off Rockaway Beach at 8:06 a. m. yesterday and ended at 8:08 p. m. here last night.

Accompanying Miss Nichols was a Fairchild piston monoplane with Harry Rogers, president of an air line here, and an experienced pilot, and Major M. K. Lee, retired business man of Rye, Washington and Baltimore, and an amateur pilot.

"They were making the trip and I wanted to come along," said Miss Nichols, modestly. She was at the controls for five hours, and for two other short intervals.

Miss Nichols said she was "deeply interested in the development of commercial aviation" and admitted she planned an aviation venture in which she would participate as an executive. But she declined to reveal her plans in detail.

She is the only woman holder of an international seaplane pilot's license and has been flying for five years. This was her second trip by air from New York to Miami. She once flew here with an aunt as a passenger, but the aunt was made in short hops. Flying, she said, is the only real way to go any appreciable distance.

Three Burned To Death At Ossining During Morning

Ossining, N. Y., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Three persons were believed to have been burned to death in a fire which destroyed the historic Old Westrock hotel on the Albany Post road early today.

Those believed to have lost their lives are:

Sheriff McKenna and — wife of Bridgeport, Conn., and a waiter known only as "Albert."

The fire, which Charles Fleisch, proprietor of the hotel, believes was of incendiary origin, had gained such headway before the arrival of firemen that their rescue attempts were greatly hampered.

They could see the water and a woman they believed was Mrs. McKenna but were unable to reach them.

Mr. Fleisch based his theory of incendiary on the fact that it was the fourth time that the 100-year-old hotel had been afire within the past few months.

GENE TUNNEY FIGHTS AGAIN DURING JUNE

Chicago, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The Chicago Herald and Examiner in a copyrighted news story today said that definite plans are being formulated for Gene Tunney to defend his heavyweight title here some time in June.

A. J. Cernak, president of the Cook county board and a personal friend of the champion, Edward J. Kelly, president of the South Park board, controlling Soldier Field, where the fight would be held, and Michael J. Igoe, a member of the South Park board, have been working out arrangements for the fight for more than a month, the Herald and Examiner said.

Tunney was understood to have tentatively agreed to meet the best opponent available under Cernak's direction. The two conferred last month here.

The newspaper explained that the proposed bout would be held in conjunction with the Democratic National Convention, should it be held here. George E. Brennan, National Committeeman, will go to Washington, according to Cernak, prepared to offer the bout as an inducement to the convention makers.

Regardless of the convention, however, the fight, if closed, would be held at Soldier Field in June.

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Gene Tunney not only expects to enjoy more title bouts but to have bigger and better crowds—and "gates" for them.

At the dinner and first convention of sports champions, given by the "600" millionaires of the Madison Square Garden Club, the heavyweight champion predicted that the time was soon coming when the big bouts would "draw twice as much as they do now—in crowds," he added quickly as his listeners broke into applause.

"It is a great thing to be able to represent boxing in this assemblage of champions of many sports," Tunney declared as he waved an arm toward Bobby Jones, king of golf, Johnny Weissmuller, swimming title holder, Babe Ruth, Bill Cook, hockey star, "Big Bill" Tilden, Charlie Winter and Freddie Spencer.

"Twenty years ago no one would have thought of inviting a boxer to such a gathering," the champion commented. "But this, to me, is proof of how the game has grown. To me it also is proof that there must be something fine to boxing."

Tunney compared old boxing styles with the new, saying fans nowadays preferred a snappy ten round bout rather than the old time matches which dragged along forty rounds or more.

"There's more punch, an speed and skill now," he said.

Tunney and the other celebrities were introduced to the assemblage by Mayor James J. Walker. The function was held by the Garden club for the purpose of demonstrating its interest in all fields of athletic activities. Scores of bankers, business men, figures prominent in political and governmental life joined in giving the champions a "hand."

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Connie Mack, veteran leader of the Athletics, is one manager who has resolved the New York Yankees won't make a runaway of another American League pennant race next season.

Mack, beginning the 28th year of his reign as manager of the Athletics, sees a tighter American league race for 1928.

The Athletics' spring training camp, which will be held at the Hauser, first base, and second base, Jack, and Sammy Hall, third base, average age is 28 and they have played together long enough to come a machine.

Al Simmons is a great young con-

terfielder and hitter. Miller will be in left but right field is a tossup between Beve Lebourveau, bought from Toledo, and Walter French, former army star.

Accuses Dempsey Being Unethical

Chicago, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A tirade against Jack Dempsey for "unethical" boxing methods was made last night by Paul Prehn, chairman of the Illinois Boxing Commission, under whose regulations Dempsey fought unsuccessfully last September to win back the heavyweight title he lost to Gene Tunney.

Dempsey, said Prehn, addressing the Illinois Society of Engineers, "does not know the true meaning of sportsmanship." He has been known through boxing circles for years, he said, as "one of the trickiest fighters."

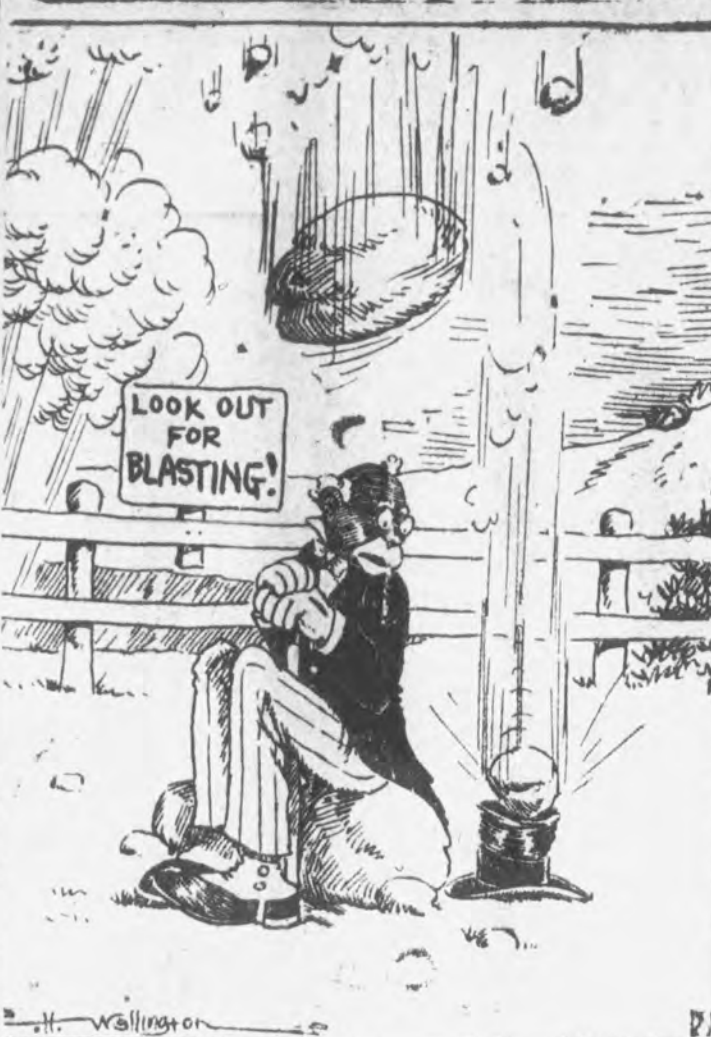

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KELLOGG PLAN AGAINST WARS CREATES STIR

French And English Papers Give American Abolition Plan Great Prominence

Paris, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The Kellogg plan for abolishing war is making a great stir here as it has at last brought pacifism to the forefront in the public mind.

This morning's papers give the proposal great prominence and widely comment on it, their main objection being that the scheme seems to run counter to the League of Nations.

The foreign editor of Le Journal says indirectly the American plan leads to the torpedoing of the Geneva league.

"Since the powers subscribing to the Kellogg declaration could not keep the obligation involved in article 16 of the league pact."

Article 16 of the league covenant says that the military and economic procedure in the adjusted in case a member of the league resorts to an unauthorized war.

London, Jan. 5.—(AP)—After the evening papers had devoted most of their attention to a discussion of American policy in Nicaragua, the morning papers today took up the Kellogg proposal to abolish war.

The opinions expressed, although some are condemnatory, cannot be described as altogether enthusiastic.

The Daily Mail was an exception. Under the caption "a message of hope," it describes the Kellogg note as having the advantage of bringing forward a definite and concrete plan which makes it a culminating point of a great campaign against war.

The Daily Chronicle gives the American proposal a favorable welcome. It urges the British government to give it all possible support and says that the American scheme will add nothing to the bonds already existing between the members of the League of Nations.

The Daily News while expressing pleasure at the United States "talking so straight forwardly in the language of peace," thinks "the invention comes rather unfortunately at the moment when America is waging a not very creditable war in Nicaragua." The paper says it is unable to fathom exactly what is implied by the proposal which "may have tremendous significance or none at all."

The Daily Express declares that America's intention to be noble and the proposal is based on a genuine desire for peace but advises the maintaining of an open mind on it.

The Daily Telegraph says "Kellogg has certainly outdone Briand in boldness of conception, whether he equalled him in appreciation of what is practicable is another question. . . . In what respect the multilateral treaty imagined by Kellogg can be regarded as an improvement on pledges adopted by the league of nations is not at all clear."

The Morning Post, which is always avowedly skeptical of peace plans, asserts it is unable to hope for much as a result of the proposal. The paper continues: "We all have our little reservations, our little doubts and our little doubts, which disturb the symmetry and completeness of these universal schemes for making war impossible."

But when he wanted to present a report to the public he admitted he didn't know how.

Instead of reaching the correspondents through the Press Club or bureau, he began calling each newspaper and correspondent personally. He called a number before he found one who volunteered to pass the word that the former justice had come home.

Mr. Paul Claudel, the French Academy prize winner, instead of taking writing up, he managed to take a few lines of verse every day before starting his diplomatic duties.

The daily output, he explains, isn't very bulky, but at the end of the year he usually finds he has enough to make up a volume.

M. Claudel is perhaps better known in his own country as a poet

instead of a diplomat. His verse is steeped with mysticism and it has gained him more than passing comment in the French reviews.

While on the subject of writers—although the similarity ends there—it might be well to record that Eleanor Glyn of "Three Weeks" and "It" fame, is planning to take up residence in the Capital. She announced the purchase of a home in Georgetown, one of Washington's oldest residential sections.

Whether Madame Glyn's migration to the capital is indication of a book about Washington has not been announced. It doesn't necessarily follow as has been proven by Sinclair Lewis, who at various times has dug himself into an apartment here to write. In fact "Main Street" took form in Washington and it's a far cry from the capital to Sauk Center, Minn.

That more novels have not been written with Washington as the background is surprising. Washington is as well known to the reading public as New York, Chicago or San Francisco; it is the center of American political life; and nowhere else do more dramatic and spectacular events take place.

The Federal Reserve board announced that gross earnings for the year amounted to \$43,020,000 while in 1926 they were \$47,600,000. Expenses totaled \$27,540,000 for 1927 and \$27,350,000 for 1926.

Net earnings of the banks in 1927 were \$13,050,000 as compared with \$16,610,000 for 1926.

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Old familiar legislative faces could be seen in the activities of Congress today—the teapot dome scandal raised its head for a brief period; Nicaragua got into the records again; the submarine situation received its meed of attention; a red headed rear admiral continued to make faces at the navy; Vane and Wilson had another round, there were cries of "lobby" and a spirited contest developed over the fitness of a North Carolina federal judge to hold his office.

Even with all of these issues, and more, awaiting decision, the senate found it had only a house bill really before it and decided to adjourn after today's session until Monday, and allow the house to plod along as it sees fit.

While the senate faced was not doing much in the way of legislation, its committees were busy. One of them heard charges from a group of North Carolinians that Federal Judge Johnson J. Hayes, of that state, was unfit for the office; another endorsed Senator McNary's \$40,000,000 measure for acquiring forest lands; another subpoenaed all the ballots in the Pennsylvania election contest while still another received from the senate for consideration the move by Senator Norris, of Nebraska, to reopen the teapot dome investigation.

On the floor Senator Wheeler of

Montana asked for the Nicaragua investigation he has been threatening and Senator Capper, of Kansas, suggested a freight reduction on grain products to help solve the problems of the farmer. Senator Oddie, of Nevada, charged that a Pacific coast shipping lobby was busy with the shipping board.

The house went about its business of considering the appropriation bill for the departments of justice, labor, commerce and state, while its flood committee heard further suggestions for relieving the Mississippi river blight. In a nearby committee room Rear Admiral MaGruder made further intimations that naval efficiency might be improved, notwithstanding that he lost his job at the Philadelphia navy yard because he and the navy department could not agree.

The admiral thought the New London submarine base should be kept where it is, but nevertheless the house rules committee, is still another part of the building, decided that on Saturday it would decide whether the whole submarine question, including the loss of the S-4, should be given special attention as requested by President Coolidge.

Usedun to Meet Black Menace

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Paulino Usedun, the "batting basque," is going to do his own heavyweight elimination.

Following Jack Delaney's example, Paulino has broken from the ranks of the flock of heavyweight Tex Rickard has been juggling around in his effort to find a "logical contender" for Gene Tunney's crown.

Announcing Paulino's decision, Al Mayer, who heads the basque's board of strategy, said Paulino would meet George Godfrey, the latest so-called "Black Menace" in a bout at Los Angeles next month. While contracts have not been signed the terms have been agreed upon, Mayer said, and there remains now only to fix a definite date. The promoters have settled upon February 14. Mayer said, but he prefers February 21.

BANDIT KILLED IN GUN BATTLE

Two Other Hold-Up Men Arrested At Chicago During Last Night

Chicago, Jan. 5.—(AP)—It was a bad night for bandits. One was shot dead, another was captured and a third surrendered under pistol James Doody, who hadn't forgotten what he learned as a policeman, walked into a holdup at the Frank Nelson radio store and opened fire with a revolver when the robber whipped his own weapon around. Doody's single shot was fatal to the bandit, who was identified as Stanley Hodana, 19.

At the Silver Moon Athletic Club Robert Ahlgren, 28, and John Rowan, 29, who said they were making their maiden venture with masks and pistols, found a bullet reception awaiting them from Patrolman Jeremiah Mahoney. Ahlgren surrendered under Mahoney's

fire, and Rowan was taken later. They said they were without work and had families to support.

DOCTOR INDICTED FOR KILLING WOMAN

Los Angeles, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Dr. William C. McMillan was indicted today by the county grand jury for the murder of Mrs. Amelia Appleby, widow of a wealthy Chicago inventor. The woman's body was found in a sack near here recently.
