

The Federal Reserve board announced that gross earnings for the year amounted to \$43,020,000 while in 1926 they were \$47,600,000. Evpenses totalled \$27,540,000 for 1927 and \$27,350,000 for 1926.

Net earnings of the banks in 1927 were \$13,050,000 as compared with \$16,610,000 for 1926.


