Night Caused Heavy Damage in Washington Businesss District Washington, Jan. 17.- (AP) -

Fire-blackened ruins at four points, two of them in the business section, today marked the trails of suspected pyromaniaes who kept firemen on the run all night and gave the ouv its greatest scare in years.

The unprecedented series of fires began shortly before midnight and continued until 3:30. o'clock this morning, the four major conflagrations being interspersed with smaller ones and many false alarms. The first two fires, one of five and the other of three alarms, found the capital's fire fighting force unable to cope with the situation and calls for assistance were sent to nearby Virginia and Maryland points. Ten companies responded also from Baltimore, making the 40-mile run in time to combat the last two of the blazes.

So far as officials knew, this morning, there were no casualties during the night, although a score of firemen were overcome by smoke. Estimates of damage ran into hundreds of thousands of dollars.



Jr., assistant engineer of the water resources division, are investigating the river around Weldon in company with an expert of the U.S. Fisheries Bureau to determine the practicability of resuming operations at the hatchery.


