

TO ANNOUNCE NAME OF BALL TEAM TUESDAY

The name of the Greenville baseball club of the recently organized Eastern Carolina League will be announced probably tomorrow, members of the club stated today.

The contest to provide a name for the club, in which every sport lover of the city was given an opportunity of participating, came to an end today at noon hour. While the contest committee had a great volume of names to consider it was thought likely this work would be completed by tomorrow. The person supplying the name will be awarded a season ticket.

Plans for participation of the local club in the new circuit are rapidly taking form, Guy Smith, president, stated today. With completion of erection of a new grandstand and bleachers at the fair grounds, everything will be in readiness for spring training. Considerable attention will also be given the playing field with the idea of making it one of the finest diamonds in the league.

The first contingent of players probably will arrive here during the latter part of March. After that time the most intense activity as players begin lumbering up for one of the greatest baseball seasons in the history of eastern North Carolina.

Advices from other five cities of the circuit indicate that organization plans are proceeding rapidly and that they, too, will be in position to offer stubborn opposition for pennant honors.

Uzcudun Knocks Out His Chilean Heavyweight Rival

Mexico City, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Paulino Uzcudun, basque world-champion, today holds the heavyweight championship of Latin America, attained by the knockout route.

A relentless attack near the end of the third round, by Uzcudun, felled his Chilean rival, Quintin Romero Rojas, in their scheduled round encounter yesterday, the Chilean being counted out.

The basque had such a slight advantage in the first two rounds that the knockout came with a suddenness which surprised the spectators. Just before the volley of blows which decided the match, Romero put up his hands to guard his face. The body was left unprotected. Paulino, rounded the Chilean below the head with a shower of rights and lefts. Romero crumpled and sank, writhing to the canvas.

Approximately 40,000 persons cheered the victor for several minutes after Romero shook him by the hand.

Jennings Putting Up Losing Fight With Grim Reaper

Seranton, Pa., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Hugh Jennings, whose achievements on the baseball diamond for many years made him known the country over, was putting up a game but losing fight today against death.

The man who led the Detroit American League team to three pennants in a row and later became assistant to John J. McGraw in directing the New York Giants is suffering from meningitis and his condition is so grave that physicians said there is but scant chance of his recovery.

Jennings was stricken several days ago, but it was not until last night that there was a serious turn and four physicians confirmed an earlier diagnosis of meningitis. The famous diamond character lapsed into unconsciousness last night, but revived this morning for a short time and inquired for old time friends.

Since his health began to fail two weeks ago, Jennings has taken no part in baseball. He spent some months in a sanatorium at Asheville, N. C., and when his condition improved he came back to Seranton to live.

McGUE TO TAKE ON LEO LOMSKI FRIDAY

New York, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Mike McGue, veteran stalwart of the ring, starts his climb on "comeback road" against Leo Lomski, rugged Aberdeen, Washington, boxer in a ten round headline bout at Madison Square Garden Friday night.

McGue is campaigning once more to regain the light heavyweight sceptre, brandished by Tommy Loughran, of Philadelphia. Several months ago McGue broke out with a statement that he had put away the leather gloves for keeps after a career of more than a dozen years but the lure of the roped arena has been too great.

Speaker To Play With Philadelphia

Philadelphia, Pa., (AP)—Connie Mack's Athletics may not win the American league pennant this year, but if they miss it won't be through lack of grizzled heads and baseball brains.

The oldest board of strategy in baseball will guide the Athletics in the coming American league pennant fight. Connie Mack (lower left), who is 65 and the oldest manager in big league baseball, will have as his chief aid "Kid" Gleason (upper left), 62, and Captain Eddie Collins (right), still an active second baseman at 40.

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On the playing field some of the time and on the coaching lines the rest, the Athletics will have Captain Eddie Collins, who at 40 is one of the oldest active performers in the majors.

These three will do most of the actual directing when the team is in action, but they have a couple of able lieutenants in Ira Thomas, 46-year-old professor of advanced pitching, and Earl Mack, Connie's son and the youngest of the five at 37, who has charge of the rookies.

This combination saw service last year and is showing no signs of weakening. The average age of the five is 50 years. The two Macks and Thomas were catchers in their playing days, while Gleason and Collins got their experience in the infield.

Outlining the duties of his board of strategy, Mack said Collins when not playing will control traffic at third base, while Gleason will be similar duty at first base. This year Mack is going to keep idle pitchers and reservists off the coaching lines and put the corners in charge of two old heads at the game who think quickly and quite often accurately.

Thomas, an old time member of the Athletics, retained his job of presiding over the pitching staff, while the younger Mack will shepherd the first flock of battery men to the Florida training grounds about February 20.

The venerable head of this array of talent and experience will be starting much over again, as the fall tides expect to get at some golfing in Florida before the advance guard of the Athletics reaches the southland.

Penn. College Building Burns

Villanova, Pa., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Sweep by flames which for a time threatened the destruction of the entire institution, College Hall, the main building of the Villanova College group, was a mass of ruins today.

Classes were suspended pending the completion of arrangements for other quarters.

Hampered by lack of water and struggling in the deep snow that covered the campus, 24 fire companies battled for six hours last night.

Father Daniel Driscoll, procurator, estimated the loss at \$2,200,000, not including the personal belongings of 300 students whose rooms were on the second and third floors of the college hall.

The cause of the fire was traced to a gas leak in the basement of the building, which was caused by a faulty gas valve.

DOCTOR TELLS DEMPSEY NOT FIGHT AGAIN

Miami Beach, Fla., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Denying Chicago permits, that Jack Dempsey and announced his retirement from the ring on account of eye trouble, Tex Rickard, New York boxing promoter, today told the Associated Press "It's an old story."

"There's nothing to it," he declared.

"There is nothing new today in the heavyweight situation," Rickard said. "There probably will be a story of some interest Wednesday."

The promoter declared he did not have to name Gene Tunney's first 1923 title bout opponent Wednesday, Feb. 1, as had been reported. Nor does he have to name the date or place of the fight then.

"All I have to do by Feb. 1," he said, "is post forfeit money. I can wait until forty days before the fight to name the challenger and the place where the fight will be held."

The story about Dempsey's eyes was circulated in New York several weeks ago, Rickard said. He denied that he had received any information whatever that would lead him to believe Dempsey would be unable to fight Tunney.

He had nothing to say on the point of whether the former champion would be willing to go into such a bout.

Chicago, Jan. 30.—(AP)—The Herald and Examiner in a copyrighted article today said that Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight champion, has been forbidden by his physician ever to enter the ring again. The newspaper said the information was contained in a message received from Miami Beach, Florida, Dempsey having notified Tex Rickard, the promoter, who is there, of his decision.

The Dempsey telegram informed Rickard that Dempsey's eyes had gone back on him and that doctor's orders prohibited further fighting, the account added.

The Herald and Examiner said it had been unable to corroborate the facts from Dempsey, efforts to locate him in California proving unavailing.

SPORTS SLANTS

New York, Jan. 30.—(AP)—There isn't much opportunity for public scrutiny of the 1928 baseball hold-out list but indications are that it includes at least three of the best known pitching aces of the major leagues.

Dizzy Vance, of Brooklyn, Charley Root, of the Chicago Cubs, and Walter Hoyt of the Yankees.

Root, who had a good deal to do with the mid-season flash of the Cubs, is known to have returned in his new contract unsigned but what demands, if any, have been made by Vance and Hoyt is open only to conjecture. Club owners have a habit of regarding these affairs as of private concern, except when some such figure as Babe Ruth forces the discussion and foists into the open.

Vance has been one of the highest paid flingers in the National league for years, drawing down around \$15,000 annually although probably near the end of a brilliant career. Dizzy is considered so valuable by the Robins that the rejected an opportunity to trade the pitcher for Rogers Hornsby at the time the Giants were peddling their second sacker around the circuit.

Vance showed a winning and losing record of only 16 and 15 last season but he was third in the earned run allowance rating, permitting the enemy to tally at the plate as the rate of only 2.70 per nine innings game.

Hoyt, whose pay checks last year also was probably around \$15,000, has a sensational record to use as an argument for more money. The Flatbush underaker won 22 and lost only seven games, besides finishing second in the earned run rating with a mark of 2.64.

Root, participated in around 50 games, showed signs of the strain toward the end of 1927 but finished with a record of 25 victories and 15 defeats. His "winkle ball" was one of the most deceptive deliveries exhibited by any of the National league moundmen.

OTTO PELTZER PROMISES AMERICA PLINY OF THRILLS

Chicago, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Dr. Otto Peltzer, German half mile champion, plans to give America track stars plenty of competition during his present tour of this country if the foreign relations committee of the Amateur Athletic Union permits.

After a busy day in Chicago yesterday he wired the A. A. U. officials for permission to appear in three meets and expressed a desire to compete in National championship if amateur officials in Germany and this country will sanction it. The three meets and the specified distance are: The Millrose games February 2 at 800 meters; Illinois Athletic Club meet February 10 at 1,000 meters and the New York K. of C. meet February 29 at 100 meters.

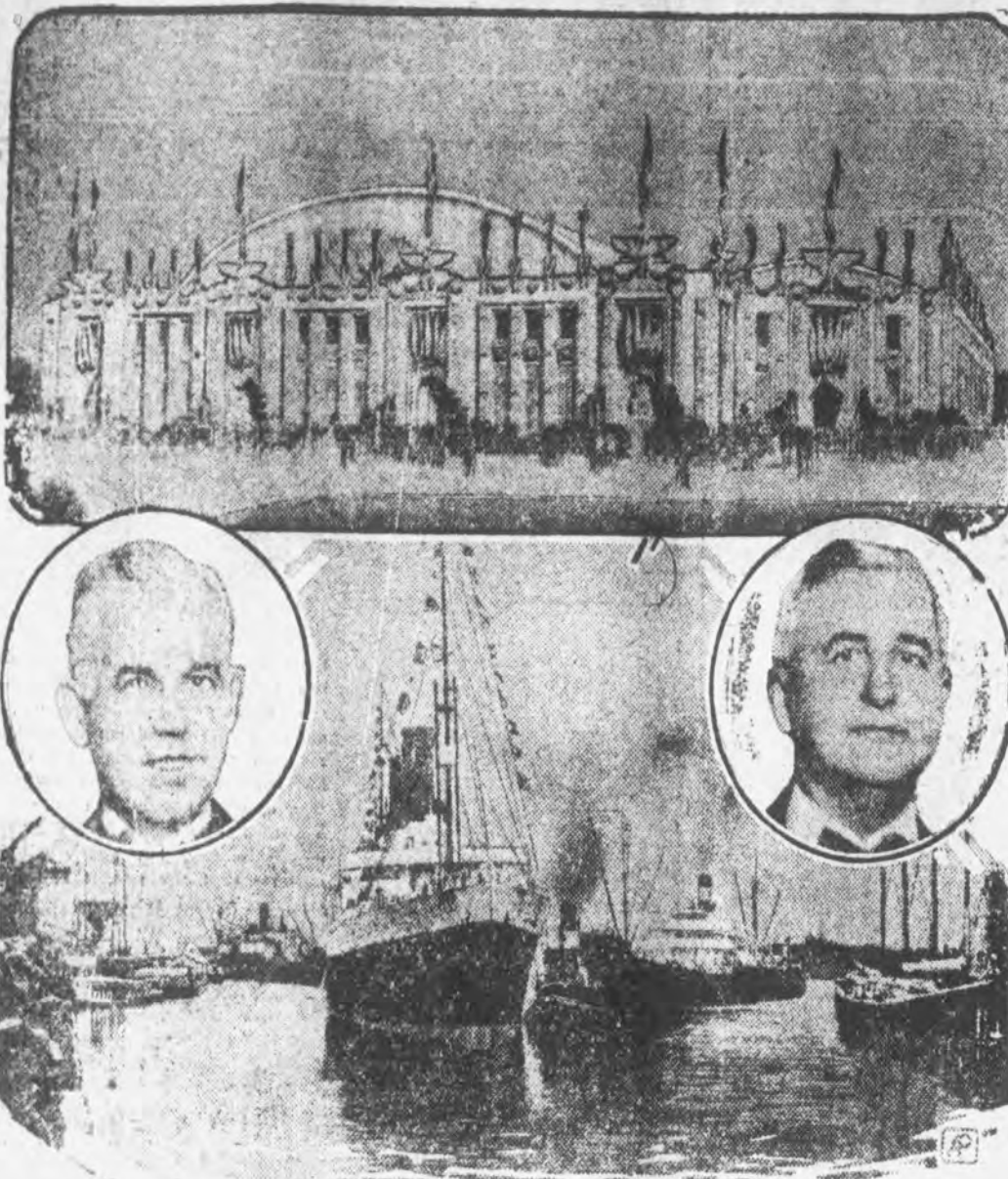

Houston Rears Auditorium For Democrats



Houston, Tex., deeming nothing too good for the democrats who will hold their annual convention there in June, is building a \$200,000 auditorium for the gathering. Below is the turning basin of the Houston port, to which some convention delegates may come by boats on which they will live during the gathering.

Houston, Tex.—(AP)—Rome was not built in a day but an auditorium to hold 25,000 visitors to the 1928 democratic national convention is to be completed by the city of Houston in 90 days.

Plans for the big temporary structure, which will cost Houston \$200,000, have been prepared for Mayor Oscar F. Holecombe, Jesse Jones, Houston publisher, and the committee on arrangements by the architect, Kenneth Franzheim of New York.

Bids will be opened soon and all contracts for construction, it is expected will be let before February 10.

The steel framework of the big hall will grow up on site of what is to be Houston's civic center and which now echoes with the activity of workmen clearing away old buildings.

The auditorium will be of stadium type, with sloping floors and elevated boxes guaranteeing a clear view of proceedings for all the spectators. Special attention will be given to the acoustics of the main hall, and amplifiers will be introduced to assure distinct hearing.

A branch post office, four dining rooms, and special offices for officials of the party and the national committee will be built into the structure.

Provisions is to be made for the host of news writers by the construction of special press stands, private offices and rooms for telephone wires. Photographers and movie camera men will not be overlooked, accommodations being planned for half a hundred of them.

Suitable exterior decoration figures in the plans. Trees and shrubs are to be planted about the three entrances. Floodlights will illuminate the front of the building every night during the convention.

Foreign News Review

(By The Associated Press)

World economic problems have received an impetus by the Pan-American conference meeting at Havana, which, while having many important questions under consideration, has always in front of it the economic resultant of whatever conventions may be adopted or whatever action may be taken.

High tariffs, introduced in the committee discussions of the conference by the Argentine delegate, Honorable Pueyrredon proved somewhat of a stumbling block last week, and Argentina put herself or record as being unable to sign any convention bearing on the reorganization of the Pan-American union which did not take a material reduction of tariffs into account.

The former British chancellor of the exchequer, Reginald McKenna, in a speech before the Midland bank at London, placed the dollar ahead of any other unit of currency in the way of purchasing power. He predicted that the United States would be able to continue her credit policies without regard to gold movements and to maintain control over the world's level of prices.

At the Havana conference the dominating subjects were commercial aviation, tariffs, reorganization of the Pan-American union and regulation of frontier patrols. The United States went on record as opposing to the projected commercial aviation convention as at present drafted and also to the codification of private international law where this would conflict with the laws of the 48 states in the union. Nor will the United States recognize the right of asylum as a principle of international law, or the right of pursuit across international borders.

The delegates are agreed that the various republics may name as their representative either their ambassador or minister at Washington, or some other individual to represent them on the governing board of the Pan-American union, which if the general desire of the assembled delegates prevails, will be kept a non-political body.

Another great continent has taken America's good will courier Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh to its heart—South America. Cartagena and Bogota, in the republic of Colombia, gave him warm welcome, and the Venezuelans, long watching for him prepared to greet him royally. Lindbergh spent last week in the forests of Panama and on the waters nearby, hunting and resting. His name was not heavy, but he appeared a very much refreshed birdman and when he resumed his journey to South America.

The French aviators, Costes and Lebrun, are on their way north after a marvelous series of flights, starting from Paris to South and Central American cities.

United States marines in Nicaragua have driven the forces of Sandoval out of El Chipote. They are occupying these almost inaccessible heights and laying plans to clear the province of Nueva Segovia of the disturbing elements.

Canada will send ministers plenipotentiary to Paris and Tokyo and the Japanese government has announced that its representative will soon go to Ottawa.

In Mexico the Federal government raided numerous schools and convents and arrested several students and teachers alleged to be engaged in propaganda and violating the religious laws by religious teaching and the use of religious emblems which have been forbidden.

In London the Prince of Wales has endorsed the "peace in industry" movement, expressing the great satisfaction that employers and employees are beginning to realize that their interests lie in large production and thriving trade.

Endorse Curtis for Presidency.
Topeka, Kan., Jan. 30. (AP)—United States Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas was endorsed for the Republican presidential nomination here today by the Republican State Central Committee which unanimously adopted a resolution supporting him.

FLOOD PLAN TO COMBINE NEW FEATURE

Administration's Plan For Mississippi to be Broadened Considerably.

Washington, Jan. 30. (AP)—An indication that the engineering recommendation of the administration's Mississippi river flood plan will be a basis for congressional legislation, but probably will be broadened to a marked degree was given today by Chairman Reid of the house flood control committee. The committee is understood to be considering a flood control plan which will combine the administration's and the Mississippi river commission's recommendations and would set a total cost for the work of nearly \$600,000,000.

Mr. Reid disclosed such an intention during questioning of Major General Edwin Jadwin, chief of army engineers and author of the administration plan at today's hearing of the committee. The committee is completing a twelve weeks' study of the flood problem. "The engineering items in the Jadwin plan form a basis upon which the committee can work in drafting a bill," Chairman Reid said. "The committee will have to decide what additional works are necessary after its consideration of the plan."

There is "no possible chance" of the Mississippi river ever changing a course into the Atchafalaya river as a result of the proposed floodway, General Jadwin told the committee. The Atchafalaya floodway will carry off one million five hundred thousand feet of water, he said. The river acts as a stabilizer of the flow of the Mississippi, and the Atchafalaya, he explained, distributes water into both streams to their capacity.

If it is deemed necessary, the general said, the "slits" at the mouth of Old River will be removed, at present, he added, this step has not been considered essential.

GENERAL HAIG
DIES SUDDENLY

Famous British General Stricken With Heart Trouble After Midnight Today.

London, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Earl Douglas Haig, who as commander in chief of the British armies in France and Belgium contributed in a large share to the allies' success in 1918 died here shortly after midnight today. He was 66 years old.

The British general, whose name is linked with Marshal Foch, of France and General Pershing, of the United States in the victory over the Germans, died unexpectedly of heart disease.

Since the war, Earl Haig has devoted much of his time to organizing relief for disabled soldiers and their families.

The marshal was reserved almost to the point of coldness, but those who were really acquainted with him during the war said that beneath his icy exterior there beat a warm heart which bled daily as the great soldier was compelled to send his men against the instruments of death.

As soon as the war ended he started a campaign to raise funds for the men who had given their all. He originated poppy day, an annual event when millions of cloth flowers made entirely by former service men and representing the crimson poppies that bloom in Flanders are sold throughout Great Britain for the benefit of the disabled soldiers.

Earl Haig was also unceasing in his personal attentions to soldiers in hospitals and other institutions.

His last public utterance Saturday showed him in the light of a staunch defender of his country. He told a troop of Boy Scouts assembled for an enrollment ceremony at Richmond:

"Stand up for England when people speak disrespectfully of us, try and realize what citizenship and public spirit really means."

The marshal's death occurred in the house of his brother in law, W. S. Jameson, in Prince's Gate where he had been staying recently. He was on the point of retiring when he collapsed while sitting on the edge of the bed, he did not lose consciousness immediately but the end came shortly afterward.

Earl Haig had been ailing slightly of late, but was able to fulfill a number of public engagements.

A flood of tributes quickly followed publication of the news that Earl Haig was dead. One of the earliest was from David Lloyd George, England's war premier, who speaking of the time when unity of command in the war was decided upon and the British army was placed under Marshal Foch said:

"Whatever might be his personal views, he carried out honorably every particular of understanding arrived at. He behaved not merely like a great patriot but, like a great gentleman."

It was not known definitely today where Haig would be buried.

A few of England's greatest soldiers and sailors lie in Westminster, but the general opinion in authoritative circles points to the probability that Earl Haig will rest in St. Paul's in accordance with the traditions of the last hundred years. Wellington and Lord Roberts are among those buried at St. Paul's.

BURGLARS MAKE HAUL
AT FOUR OAKS BANK

The burglars broke into the bank early this morning, but for some reason or other were scared away after they had cut through the vault door, which was still hot when employees discovered an oxygen tank and tools at 7:30 this morning when they came to work.

The burglars took \$950 in cash but none of the contents of the safe. The cash, taken from the bank drawers, was \$57 in silver dollars, \$207 in half dollars, \$170 in quarters, \$231 in dimes, \$288 in nickels.

The Bankers Association offered \$50 cash for arrest and conviction of each of the robbers. Details of the crime were underwritten by the police except for a report that a large automobile had whizzed by with a roar early this morning.

Little Falls Depicts Lindbergh's
Boyhood In High School Annual

Little Falls, Minn. (AP)—Just a decade ago a tall, grave youth stood with others of the graduating class of the Little Falls high school to receive his diploma.

From early boyhood, dating back to 1902, he had lived in this city. Through the days of freckled youth and boyish adventure the town had seen him grow into an angular lad of marked refinement.

But of all that class of 1918, he has attained the greatest honor, and so this year the high school's annual publication will be dedicated to "the flyer of Little Falls"—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

Dust-coated albums have come down from attics in an eager search for long forgotten photographs to help picture the days of Lindbergh's boyhood here.

Quiet and reserved, he had few "buddies" in those days, but the search has produced several rare souvenirs of his life here. Into the annual will go a baby picture, taken when he could barely stand with the support of a chair, and another showing him with his favorite dog "Dingie," taken back in 1910.

Among other pictures to be scattered through a 16-page section, devoted exclusively to him, will be one taken, with his mother last August on the old home farm near here at the time of his triumphal visit to Little Falls.

The medal given Col. Lindbergh by citizens of Little Falls at that time also will be pictured—its diamond setting marking this city on the American continent and the "Spirit of St. Louis" in flight across the Atlantic.

Besides the usual local distribution of the high school publication, plans are under way for publication of the section devoted to Lindbergh in great numbers in the expectation that there will be wide demand for it.

We are getting along nicely in Havana, our deliberations and arrangements with the Latin powers south of us going smoothly.

Our men in this conference have an advantage that our statesmen didn't have at the famous Washington conference, when we agreed to scrap new and unfinished battleships.

When our statesmen deal with British statesmen, especially when they look into the cold blue eyes of Lord Balfour, they suffer from a shivery "inferiority complex," which puts them at a disadvantage. They are free from that complex when they deal with their Latin friends.

A learned party, discussing "scientific conquests of 1927," says the atom really isn't what we think it is. It's a "group of whirling waves, consisting of nobody knows what."

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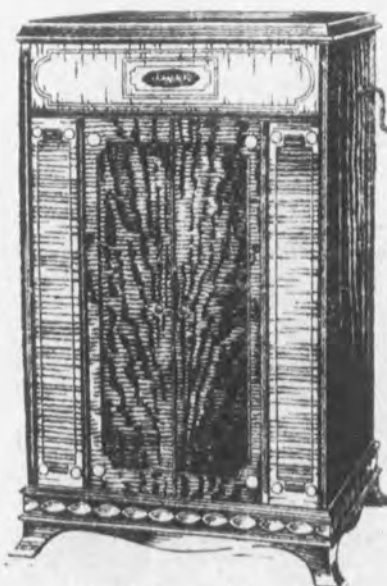
