



Famous British General Stricken With Heart Trouble After Midnight Today.

Jan 30.-(AP)-Earl Douglas Haig, who as commander in chief of the British armies in France and Belgium contributed in a large share to the allies succress in 1918 died here shortly fator reidnight today. He was 66 years

The British general, whose name is linked with Marshal Foch of Prance and General Pershing of the United States in the victory over the Germans, died unexpectedly of heart disease.

Since the war, Earl Haig has devoted much of his time to organizing relief for disabled soldiers and

The marshall was reserved almost to the point of coldness, but those who were really acquainted with him during the war said that beneath his icy exterior there beat a warm heart which bled daily as the great soldier was compelled to send his men against the instruments of

As son as the war ended he started a campaign to raise funds for the men who had given their all. He originated poppy day, an annual event when millions of cloth flowers made entirely by former service men and representing the crimson popples that bloom in are sold throughout Great Britain for the benefit of the disabled soldiers.

Earl Haif was also unceasing in his personal attentions to soldiers in hospitals and other institutions. His last public utterance Satur-




