



# NUMBER SEEK MOUND BERTH OF SENATORS

Tampa, Fla., March 5.—(AP)—Although the baseball ghost of Walter Johnson stalks through the training camp of the Washington club, there are 16 pitchers on hand, all willing to be "another Johnson."

By common consent of the powers that be on the club, where Johnson is more of an institution than a pitcher, no one will be elected to fill the place Barney left permanently vacant when he went away to manage Newark.

As the work proceeds at the first Washington training camp in 20 years in which the great Johnson has had no active part the club is preparing to pin its hopes on pitching despite the absence of the big fellow with the terrific "hard" one.

Ten of the double octet of pitchers will start the season and Manager Harris and President Griffith hope to work out a combination in which supple, young arms will get support from heads wise in baseball. Only two of the pitchers have passed their 30th birthday and one is just that old.

Sam Jones is 35, Milton Gaston has joined 31 and Tom Zachary is 30. The board of strategy suffered its first blow when Irying Hadley sensational young pitcher of last season, was sent to the hospital. He will emerge in a few weeks without his appendix but the season will be well advanced before he can pitch. Horace Liebbee, almost as young and even more sensational than Hadley is in perfect health and will be able to start.

Fred Marberry, veteran of the staff at 24, in point of consecutive service, although Tom Zachary went away and came back, is confident that he will be graduated from a relief role to a starting status. Garland Braxton will continue to dash in from the bull pen in times of stress. Ed Wells, late of Detroit, and Birmingham, may stage a comeback and Van Alstyne, boasting a great curve ball, has a chance to return from his exile to Birmingham, of last season. Clarence Griffin, a little southpaw, will not be discriminated against on account of his size. President Griffith likes the little pitcher and a good one. There is no chance of a shortage of left hand pitching talent. In addition to Braxton, Zachary, Wells and Griffin, Bob Burke has been brought over from last year and Lloyd Brown is up from Memphis.

Manager Bucky Harris thinks one way to make the rotation a fighting club is to start a fight at the outset so in addition to the battle for pitching places, he has declared first base, shortstop and centerfield wide open to competition.

With George Sisler and Joe Judge, aged but still active firstbase performers, available, there seems to be a conviction that a trade may yet cause a distribution of the oversupply. Neither seems ready to sit on the bench. Sisler is apparently slated to start the season.

Bobby Reeves has the inside track at shortstop. If the former Georgia Tech star had turned to boxing instead of baseball he would have made a reputation as one able to "take it." When he is knocked down he gets up. The other two collegians, Grant Gillis and Jack Hayes, both former wearers of the Crimson of Alabama, will be reserved for infielders.

A battle for center field may continue right through the season between Sam West and Foster Gansel, with Burns, a third Alabama contribution, in reserve. West has shown more speed than Gansel out of Washington's "Babe" who comes from a baseball family, is a terrific hitter. Two southeastern league recruits, Kloza and Simons, have impressive batting averages and if they fail to stick will be promoted to the minors.

Muddy Ruel and Ben Tate will no doubt do most of the catching with the third place going to Pete Cooper, from Birmingham, or Hugh McMullen, with Louisville last year but formerly a major leaguer.

## SPORTS SLANTS

New York, March 5.—(AP)—vs. Brawn. That's the main prospect in this year's American league race.

The Athletics have baseball brains plus lined up for the tussle with the brawn of Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, and the rest of the Yankee members.

So far the elemental forces of the Yankees have proved a little too strong for baseball's best minds. Babe Ruth's big bat has outwitted many a master mind, including that of John McGraw.

The Athletics combine more diamond experience, under one tent this season than probably any club in history, not excepting the foxy old Orioles, the Cubs of Frank Chance's day or the Mackmen

themselves of the 1910-14 era.

The two chief strategists alone aggregate 128 years. Connie Mack, oldest of Major league pilot, is sixty six, and his first lieutenant, Kid Gleason is still a kid at 62.

Then there is Jack Quinn, the veteran pitcher, 42 and the oldest player in either league, ready for his 25th year of baseball. Jack has spent 15 of those seasons under the big tent.

The big three of the last century of American league all-around stardom—Eddie Collins, Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker—add their wisdom and ability to the Philadelphia cast. Eddie is out of the competitive picture. He is being groomed as Mack's successor. But Ty and Tris have many a bingle left in their bats.

All are forty or over. This will be Cobb's 24th season, Speaker's 22nd and Collins' 21st in the big show. Jimmy Dykes, Eddie Rommel and Cy Perkins, other members of Mack's machine all have been in the majors ten years or more.

The heavyweight eliminations will

be right back where they started if Jack Sharkey does the expected and outpoints Johnny Risko, the Cleveland Rubber man, next Monday night in Madison Square Garden.

This would leave Sharkey and Tom Heeny as the survivors of the semi-finals, the same pair of punch-tossers whose colorless draw a few weeks ago forced Tex Rickard to make a new deal.

The net results, it seems will be represented in gate receipts but not in contenders for Gene Tunney's crown.

France's Davis Cup Tennis defence in the light of current events doesn't look so formidable as it did a few months ago.

Jean Borotra, the bounding bague, has been beaten in two out of three matches by the 19 year old Australian, Jack Crawford, Henry

## BIG MARATHON IS UNDERWAY

Punkte, Cal., March 5.—(AP)—The \$48,500 prize marathon from Los Angeles to New York today was underway with 199 runners and walkers having put behind them the initial lap of 16 miles.

A nondescript group, ranging from youths of 16 years, to veterans of 63, started from Los Angeles in the afternoon as a parade of 275 contestants. Seventy-six fell by the wayside as they threaded through the Sunday automobile traffic on the asphalt highway.

The first day's honors went to a

slimly Finn, forty years old, Willie Holehmainen of New York. Running easily, and finishing strong, he took and maintained the lead, his time for the 16 miles was one hour, 38 minutes.

Gunnar Neilson, also a finish runner of New York city followed his countryman into the first control station here but a few seconds later. Sam Richman of New York city, was third in four minutes more, and Nicholas Quomawahu, Hopi Indian from Arizona, came in two minutes behind Richman for fourth place.

The four leaders had stepped out in front at the end of four miles, and kept closely grouped the rest of the way.

A staff of physicians was at the control station to attend the blisters and other medical wants as the racers flopped onto their tents. The physicians, the promoters of the marathon and newspaper-

men led the transcontinental parade in huge buses.

C. C. Pyle is the leading promoter of the marathon.

First prize winner will receive \$25,000 but the race promises \$23,500 for other finishers. Second place draws \$10,000 third \$5,000, fourth \$2,500; and the next six finishers were promised consolation prizes of \$1,000 each.

Madrid, March 5.—(AP)—With the Tangier problem virtually settled, the newspapers were speculating today in regard to the probable return of Spain to the League of Nations.

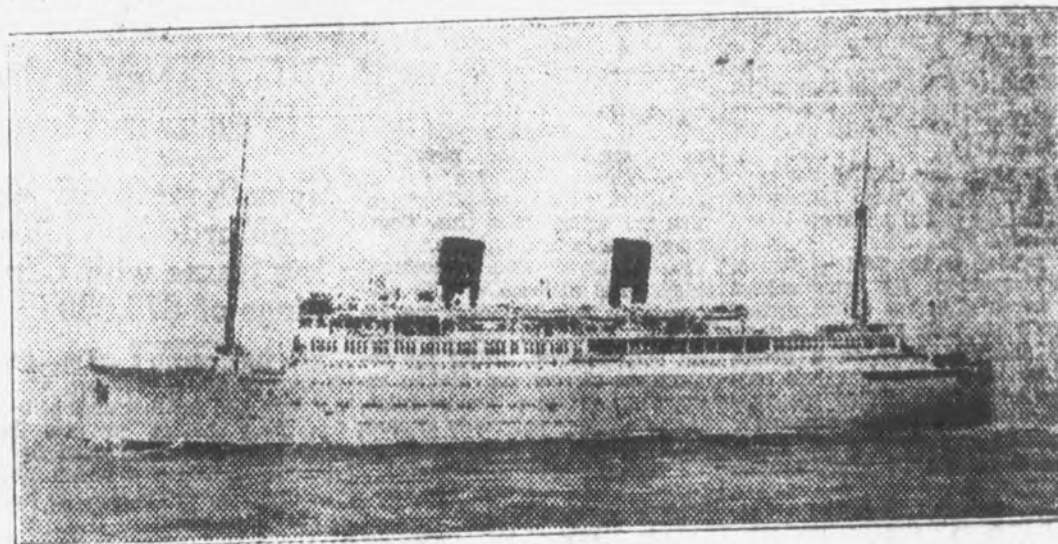
The procedure, it is believed, will be for the league to invite Spain to come back.

The survey to ascertain the possible amount of tonnage available for boat transportation to this city will be begun this week and again we urge every business man of this section who is called upon to fill out the questionnaire without hesitancy. Indications now are that there will be no difficulty in getting the government to agree to make our river navigable if we can show that water transportation is needed and will be a benefit. If we believe we need water transportation, and we have seen no one around here who believes otherwise, it is up to us to give the government facts and figures to substantiate our claims. Let's not pass up this great opportunity to do something that in the future will mean so much to Greenville and the surrounding territory. The government is willing to do its part if we will do ours, and it is now our move.

#### AMONG OUR NEEDS

With the approach of spring days, soon to be followed by summer, again it comes to mind that we have no place where the children of our city can enjoy the great out-of-doors during the spring and summer season, with any degree of safety. No public playground, to speak of, no swimming pool and no parks for children, places our city in the ranks of those sadly lacking along the line of looking to the proper physical development of our future citizens. Why not a movement to provide these things for our city? We believe that in the end they would prove a good investment rather than an expense.

#### CITY PLAN FOR FARMERS

Nearly all the thoughtful men who are discussing the agricultural situation and how to improve it deplore the existence and increase of the tenant system. What North Carolina needs is more farm-owning men who live on their farms. It is easy to make that perfectly clear statement of a situation that is to be desired. It is difficult to bring it about. The owners of land cannot be expected to sell their land to those who have no money to buy or to finance themselves in growing crops. This sometimes is done when parties know each other well and are neighbors. But it cannot be expected to do much in the direction of decreasing tenancy. Discussing this problem

of problems, set about with many difficulties, the Rocky Mount Telegram makes a suggestion worthy of consideration and adoption. It points out that in the towns and cities many men have become home owners thru the good offices of the Building and Loan Association, and says that "similar associations are needed to enable the working farmer to purchase his own farm. There are not a few land owners who say they are "land poor." Why should not such men and bankers and public-spirited citizens carry out this suggestion?"

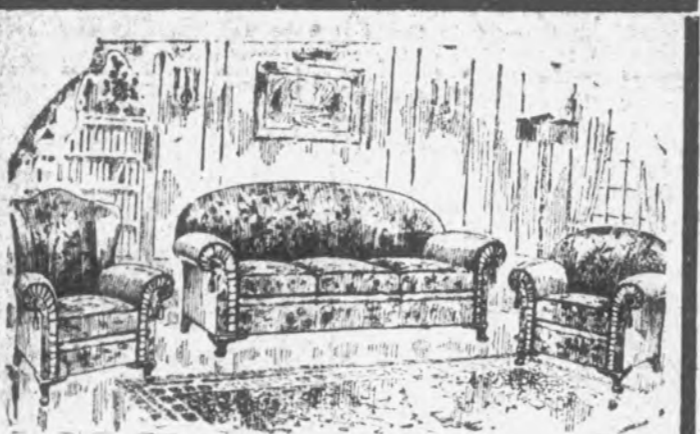

#### SARWAT PASHA HAS RESIGNED

Premier of Egypt Gives up Post in Midst of Complicated Political Situation

London, March 5.—(AP)—Sarwat Pasha has resigned as Premier of Egypt, having failed to induce his colleagues to adopt a conciliatory attitude toward Great Britain and the resulting political situation in Egypt today was regarded as complicated.

The Premier resigned after handing Lord Lloyd, British high commissioner for Egypt, a note rejecting the proposed Anglo-Egyptian treaty. It was announced that he quit office for "reasons of health."

the high commissioner to an ambassador and to recognize Egypt as competent to join the League of Nations.

London, March 5.—(AP)—The British foreign office today received a note from the Egyptian government rejecting a proposed Anglo-Egyptian treaty which has been in negotiations for some time.

One of the main stumbling blocks was the refusal of Egypt to recognize Great Britain's right to maintain troops in that country.

The next step will be the publication by the British government of the correspondence between the two governments in an effort to show how far Britain went to meet Egypt's desires.

Leonardo helped support some of them.

Important is the statement that Dr. Irving S. Cutter and associates of Northwestern University, found a way to stimulate activity of the

gall bladder, by identifying a new "hormone" produced by the lining of the intestine and called "cholecystokinin," a word meaning "that which moves the gall bladder." The mysterious hormones, produced by different collections of cells regulate physical activities. This "cholecystokinin" hormone produced by the gastric juice and by meat and fat eaten as food causes the gall bladder to empty itself, preventing the formation of gall stones, so large as to make operations necessary.

Vegetarians, by the way, should be interested. Eating no meat or fat they may not be able to produce "cholecystokinin."

A Detroit husband, rich, had no children, blamed his wife. She adopted a newborn baby, made him think it was his. Happiness for seventeen months. Then husband found he was not happy, anyhow. And now he learns that he was deceived, and demands redress. He'll get it.

The wife is satisfied. She says the baby has given her ten times more happiness than all her husband's money. But there's a complication, the baby born in Canada came here without immigration formalities, and may be sent back. A special board of inquiry will examine the baby, question the adopting mother tomorrow and decide about deporting that baby. Uncle Sam and his labor market must be protected. But it seems a little hard on the baby.

Last Sunday Russia's "red army" celebrated its tenth anniversary. Crowds thronged the streets, the thermometer 18 degrees below zero. Foreign observers remarked the perfect discipline and training of the soldiers.

When the Russian-Japanese war started, and later when the last czar and then K. ensky were selling their bonds, this writer warned Wall Street's child bankers against buying. Grand Dukes often spent at Monte Carlo gambling tables money that should have fed Russian soldiers and provided them with weapons.

A different Russian army will go to war next time. That should be remembered by those seeking to get this and other countries into a quarrel with Russia.

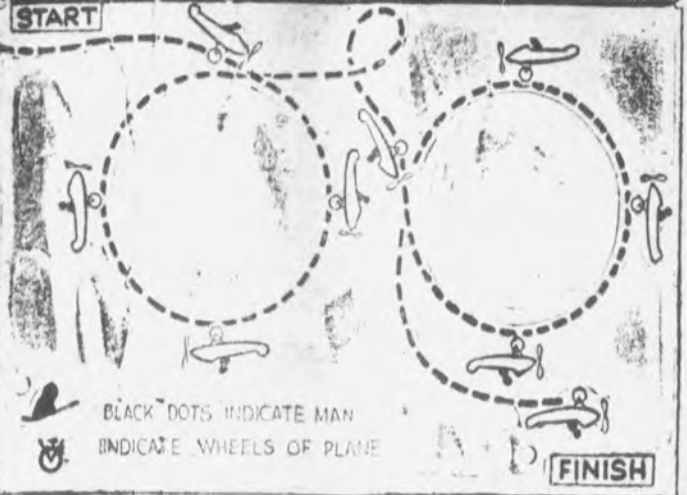

### Williams, Navy Flier, Ends Loop Head-Down, Evens Score With Army



Ordinary inside loops in an airplane are easy to make, and above loops have been negotiated, but Lieut. Alford J. Williams (above), navy aviator and erstwhile speed flier, has accomplished a new maneuver, an outside loop finished upside down. The sketch shows how he did it.

Washington. (AP)—Lieut. Alford J. Williams, navy aviator and speed record holder has gained revenge for his branch of the service over its friendly enemy, the army.

Back in 1925 Lieut. James H. Doolittle of the army, added positions to his land plane, entered the Schneider international sea-plane race and flew away with first place in the record time of 232 miles an hour. Then on May 25, 1927, he performed the unprecedented feat of turning an "outside" loop and chalked up another mark for the army.

The honors are even now, Lieut. Williams has not only duplicated Doolittle's feat but created a stunt new to aerial acrobatics—an outside loop from an upside down position. In addition to shattering an army record, he used an army type land plane.

At a height of 3,000 feet, the navy pilot's plane described a horizontal figure eight, 600 feet high, the first loop made on the Doolittle

pattern, and the second starting after a half roll, made while flying upside down.

In a normal loop the aviator puts the nose of the machine over slightly to obtain maximum speed the, pulling back on the control stick, rises slowly at first and then more rapidly as the top of the loop is made. Just after the top is reached, he shuts off his motor and lets the machine fall through the last half of the loop which looks like the letter "E" in script.

The "outside" loop begins and is completed with the airman's head on the outside instead of on the inside as in the conventional loop. The new maneuver begins and ends with the pilot flying upside down.

In a normal loop the pilot feels he is glued to his seat. In the "outside" a force seems to pull him

out of the cockpit.

"Everything seemed to rush to my head," Lieut. Williams said, "and for a moment I was blinded."

The crises of both loops were reached when they were half thru, he added, and there was a strong temptation to believe they had been completed. He admitted his flying senses deceived him, and he concluded he was through with the circle when in reality he had gone but half way around.

Fliers estimate that the centrifugal force exerts a pressure of 8 to 1, making it necessary for the seat of the plane to be able to support a weight of 1,200 pounds. The difficulty experienced by the pilot in maintaining his own position with reference to the controls, with the blood rushing to his head, was

well-known to the pilots at the naval air station at Anacostia, who witnessed Williams' flight amid gasps of amazement.
