

OCEAN FLIGHT STILL HELD UP BY ELEMENTS

German fliers probably to leave Ireland for America sometime Thursday.

Baldonnel Airdrome, Dublin, Ireland, March 28.—(AP)—Refusing to risk a start until weather conditions are favorable, the crew of the German monoplane Bremen today scanned weather charts carefully in preparation for their projected flight across the Atlantic.

"The Bremen will not fly before dawn tomorrow at the earliest," said Baron von Huenfeld, intrepid leader of the hazardous expedition.

Baldonnel airdrome was bathed in sunshine with only a few white clouds in the sky this afternoon, but weather reports from London and the United States were unfavorable.

Final word of the hop-off rests with Captain Hermann Koehl who has a reputation of being the most careful pilot in Germany and he says he will not risk a start until conditions are favorable.

The Baron, Captain Koehl, mechanic Arthur Spindler and two Junkers mechanics spent the morning overhauling the Bremen when they weren't avoiding visitors. Behind a huge barred wire fence surrounding the airdrome they are enjoying privacy such as Colonel Lindbergh would love.

Baron von Huenfeld declares that he is superstitious about talking of the flight before he makes it, and says that he believes it may have been the cause of failure of his previous attempt last year when the Bremen had to turn back when it encountered gales off the Irish coast. A new Irish war may break out, he says.

The Baron's demands of Irish officials to tell them about his plans, and protests have been made to the Free State government officials, to President Cosgrave and to the minister of defense regarding the attitude of secrecy maintained by the German fliers.

TWO HOP OFF ON ENDURANCE FLIGHT TODAY

Haldeman and Stinson took off at Jacksonville, Fla., this morning at 7 o'clock.

Jacksonville, Fla., March 28.—(AP)—Captain George Haldeman and Eddie Stinson, internationally known pilots, took off from the beach runway here at 7:36 o'clock eastern standard time, this morning in an effort to better the world endurance flight record.

The take-off was without incident following some little delay in getting the machine fueled and warmed up for the hop. They expect to cruise up and down the Florida east coast unless bad weather forces them further north or south.

The record which Haldeman, noted for his trans-Atlantic attempt with aviatrix Ruth Elder, and Stinson, also a manufacturer of the plane, set in 1926, was held by two German aviators with a sustained flight of 52 hours and 23 minutes.

In order to achieve a recognized new mark, it will be essential for the two pilots to remain aloft at least one hour longer than the previous record.

The big plane soared gracefully into the air after a run down the beach of one mile. It gained altitude of a hundred feet in a half mile of flying. It was the intention of the fliers, they said, to fly low during the first few hours, going higher as the load lessened.

A small group of spectators watched the flight.

Stinson and Haldeman looked fresh and rested when they appeared on the beach shortly before seven o'clock.

MANY HOMES UNDER GUARD AT CHICAGO

Reward of \$65,000 offered for persons who bombed homes Monday night.

Chicago, March 28.—(AP)—The homes of 40 Chicagoans were under guard today and a \$65,000 reward was on the heads of persons who bombed the homes of U. S. Senator Norcross and Circuit Judge John A. Swanson Monday night. The reward said to be the largest ever offered in a Chicago criminal case was offered for arrest and conviction of the bombers.

State's attorney Robert E. Crowe, who is Judge Swanson's opponent for the Republican nomination as state's attorney at the April 18th primaries, started the reward jacket with the largest single offer—\$10,000. Police Commissioner Hughes posted \$5,000 from his contingent fund, and Mayor Thompson followed with a personal offer of \$5,000.

The nine others who said they would pay \$5,000 are either officers, holders or leaders of the Thompson-Crowe group of the Republican party which has a complete state, county and city ticket in the field against the Deeney group.

City, county, state and possibly national inquiry into the double bombings have been strongly hinted but thus far the police and state's attorney's office have been the only active agents seeking the bombers. The result of one police investigation was summarized last night by Commissioner Hughes' terse, "No developments."

The Deeney-Swanson bombings, like the four previous "political bombings" since January 26, have left the authorities virtually without clues. The motor cars used by the bombers were seen in both instances by persons passing by, but their stories have proved of but little value to investigators.

Since October 11, last, there have been 62 bombings in Chicago. No convictions have resulted, and few arrests. Various causes have been assigned including politics, labor troubles and personal motives.

The 62nd bomb was exploded last night in front of the Beer Pump & Supply Store of Emil Seller on South Halsted street. He attributed it to his refusal to permit a political faction which he did not name, to place posters in his windows. The damage was slight.

MRS. GREGORY IN MESSAGE TO STATE D. A. R.

President Delivers Annual Message to Conference in Raleigh Today.

Raleigh, March 28.—(AP)—Pleading for support of national defense and a never-ceasing fight to maintain the citizens military training corps and reserve officers training camps, Mrs. Edwin C. Gregory of Salisbury, State Regent, today delivered her annual message to the 27th annual state conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

In her final address after three years' service as State Regent, Mrs. Gregory, whose successor will be elected tomorrow, the third and concluding day of the conference, called upon the state society's 2,600 members to "combat pacifist defeatists and radical individuals and groups." A nation-wide campaign of radicalism is being conducted, well organized and well financed to disarm the nation by reducing its military defenses, she said.

Various chapters followed the lead of the General Joseph Winston Chapter of Winston-Salem in endorsing Mrs. Gregory for the office of President-General of the national society of the D. A. R., held by Mrs. Alfred J. Brosseau of Greenwich, Conn.

In her three year regency nothing gave her more pleasure, Mrs. Gregory said, than the co-operation and harmony existing among members.

Mrs. Brosseau, in a message to the North Carolina conference, said to assume the obligations of the voter is your paramount duty at this time and that the concern "is not for what policies and what candidates you vote than that you shall vote and that your vote represent conviction."

Reports of credentials, rules, program, music committees, election of a nominating committee and chapter reports brought the conference to tonight's speechmaking with the interim filled in with a reception this evening at the home of Mrs. Josephus Daniels, visit to the historical Joel Lane home here, with a dance for pages at the Woman's Club late tonight.

The worthiness of national defense work of the Red Cross, law and citizenship, and the newspaper and the public, were topics selected for four speakers tonight. Last night Senator Reed of Missouri, on "Americanism," was the sole speaker.

LEVEE BREAK IS IMMINENT

Citizens of Nicolaus, Cal., fighting to keep stream from breaking banks.

Sacramento, Cal., Mar. 28.—(AP)—The 200 residents of Nicolaus, 25 miles north of here, today were fighting to keep the swollen waters from the Feather river from breaking through a levee protecting the town.

Reports last night that the levee had broken, isolating the town and sending a flood down the wide valley toward Sacramento caused some alarm over the countryside before it was determined that the water had not raced out of bounds.

Reinforcements were being applied to the levee in the hope that the threatened overflow could be stemmed.

Elsewhere in California most of the swollen streams which have harassed scores of communities since Sunday were returning to normal levels.

Signs Bill Extending Radio Commission

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—President Coolidge today signed the bill extending for another year the life of the Radio Commission and providing for the allocation of wave lengths among broadcasting stations in various parts of the country in proportion to the population.

Presidential Campaign Gets Into Full Swing

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—In contrast with many past presidential years, the 1928 campaign for national convention delegates from the standpoint of candidates has the earmarks of a stay at home affair.

Of all the presidential possibilities, only two—Reed of Missouri and Willis of Ohio—have taken the stump. Watson of Indiana is awaiting an opportunity to get back home to look after his political fences, but there is no sign from the others that they will take to the road to press their candidacies before the June conventions.

Like campaigners of former days, Senator Reed has set out to carry his fight for the Democratic nomination into at least half of the states of the Union. Already he has covered more than 6,000 miles on a trip to the Pacific coast, and he now is on a swing through ten more southern and mid-western states.

Since he found out that Secretary Hoover would oppose him in the Ohio presidential primaries, Senator Willis has been spending his week ends making speeches in his home state. This week he is putting his speaking campaign on a three-day week basis with talks in Toledo, Delaware, his home town, and Lima, and before the April 24 voting he probably will spend even more of his time in Ohio.

Senator Watson, in Indiana, also has Hoover as an opponent in the primaries. He delivered one address in Indianapolis immediately after the Commerce Secretary filed as a candidate, but since then has been held here by Congressional duties. Watson plans to spend several months campaigning, probably starting off about April 7 with a speech in Winchester, his home.

Hoover has announced that he will make no pre-convention speeches, and while some thought has been given to the advisability of having him go into Ohio and Indiana, because of the recognized importance of those states to his candidacy and the fight he faces there, nothing has developed to indicate he will change his mind.

Of other avowed presidential candidates, Governor Smith of New York, who figures in every calculation of what may happen at Houston, is attending to his business in Albany; Walsh of Montana, who is nomination, and Curtis of Kansas, Republican, are looking after their Senatorial duties here; Lowden, one of the Republican possibilities, is on his Illinois farm.

All have said they will not campaign, and as for others—"favorite sons" and receptive candidates—none is facing a pre-convention fight requiring speechmaking.

There is an unmistakable effort by all hands to hold down expenditures, campaign fund disclosures of recent years admittedly being the factor. Senator Reed, who had much to do with uncovering the Illinois Pennsylvania Senatorial campaign scandals, has cautioned his lieutenants to keep within bounds, and as a result emphasis is being laid on campaign contributions of one dollar each.

Lowden's managers have announced that the former Illinois Governor won't spend a cent in his effort to get the Republican nomination. In 1920 it was disclosed that he had expended considerable money in St. Louis prior to the Chicago convention and this generally is credited with having put an effective damper on his campaign that year.

THREE DIE IN PLANE CRASH

Americans Killed When Plane Crashes in Streets of Toluca, Mexico Yesterday.

Mexico City, March 28.—(AP)—A sudden gust of wind caused a plane carrying three Americans from Nogales, Ariz., to Mexico City, to crash in the street of Toluca, yesterday, killing the occupants. The victims were:

Sterling Rohlf, wealthy New Mexican cattleman.

William E. King, authority on mining law, of Douglas, Ariz.

Wallace Springer, cattleman of Cimarron, N. M.

Word of the tragedy was sent here by Riva Palacios, governor of Toluca, to Alexander W. Weddell, American consul general.

The governor said the airplane, piloted by Rohlf, was about 1,000 feet above the city when a strong gust of wind caught it. The pilot attempted to make a landing. The machine went into a nose dive and crashed in a side street near the center of the city.

Rohlf and Springer were killed instantly. King, his body badly broken, lived less than an hour after he had been taken to a hospital.

Rohlf was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rohlf, of Buffalo, N. Y. Mrs. Rohlf is Anna Katherine Green, writer of mystery stories. Sterling Rohlf was manager of the Bartlett ranch in northern New Mexico.

King, who had offices in both Douglas and Mexico City, was a close friend of President Calles and General Obregon. He was counsel for many mining companies in Mexico, including the Cusi Mexicana and the Cia La Ventura.

WOMAN WANTS TO LIVE AFTER TWO SUICIDE TRAILS

Greensboro, March 28.—(AP)—Determined to live after two attempts at suicide, Mrs. Mildred Woods, pretty young Lumberton matron who swallowed two poison tablets and then jumped out of a hotel window last night, was asking for her rouge and powder puff today.

Beside her bed at the hospital was her husband whose absence she had given as the cause of her attempt to take her life.

"No, I don't want to die now since I've found my husband," she said today, and then she asked the nurse to bring her powder puff. "I know I look just terrible," she said.

THREE PLANES IN ENDURANCE FLIGHT TODAY

Third Plane Poised at Curtis Field, Long Island, Ready to Take the Air.

Two attempts to shatter the German-held endurance record for airplane flight were under way today, with a third American plane poised for a similar effort.

Gene Shank, 22-year-old St. Paul aviator, had the jump on the other contestants by his start at 7:15 last night, but a plugged gas jet forced him down today. Shank, who held the former world record of 515 for looping the loop, had failed in three recent attempts to bring the endurance title back to the United States.

In the former circle of Florida, Captain George Haldeman, of Atlantic flying fame, and Eddie Stinson, builder of the plane, took off from the Jacksonville beach runway this morning, twelve hours later than Shank.

At Curtis field, Long Island, Charles A. Levine has had his plane prepared for days with the announced intention of joining those who seek to prolong their lazy circling of the airports to the point of triumph.

To win the title, the fliers must exceed by one hour the present time of 52 hours, 23 minutes. That mark was set by the motor, in another plane, which now powers the monoplane Bremen, waiting at Baldonnel airdrome, Island, for weather favorable for a trans-Atlantic flight.

General Hinds to Retire.

MEXICO SIGNS FOREIGN OIL REGULATIONS

All American Oil Titles Before May 1, 1917, Not Limited to 50 Years.

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—Diplomatic relations between the United States and Mexico, in the opinion of Washington officials, today were on a firmer foundation than they have been for the last ten years as a result of the signing by President Calles of new regulations governing the activity of foreign oil companies in the southern republic.

The regulations, promulgated after several months of conferences between Mexican government officials and Dwight W. Morrow, ambassador of the United States, are regarded as removing the fundamental objections raised by this country in the long diplomatic exchanges by holding that all American oil titles acquired before May 1, 1917, when the new constitution nationalized Mexican mineral lands were valued in perpetuity and not limited to 50 years.

Commenting on the new regulations, the State Department, in a brief statement, declared it felt, as did Ambassador Morrow, that "such questions, if any, as may hereafter arise can be settled through the due operation of the Mexican administrative department and the Mexican courts."

President Calles' action, the statement added, "completes the process beginning with the decision made by the judicial branch of the Mexican government on December 17, 1927, and followed by the enactment of the new petroleum law by the legislative branch on December 26, last."

In the lengthy exchanges of notes on the subject, the United States contended the new constitutional provisions regarding American oil rights prior to 1917 were confiscatory and protested vigorously time and again against their being carried out. Relations between the two countries admittedly were near the breaking point on several occasions and heated debates in Congress coincided with the diplomatic correspondence.

SENATE PASSES FLOOD MEASURE

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—After an hour of consideration the Senate today passed the \$325,000,000 measure for control of the Mississippi River.

The speed of the action fairly took the breath of the Senate which has been working on the gigantic proposal for weeks in committee.

The hour's discussion had brought two minor amendments.

Suddenly Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, proposed a vote. The small membership on the floor seemed startled but the suggestion took.

Sensors McKellar, Tennessee, and Ransdell, Louisiana, Democrats rushed forward with amendments. Hurried conferences were held with chairman Jones of the commerce committee, who had held the floor during most of the brief debate.

Senator Robinson joined in the partying in the center of the floor. Assent was given to both amendments and within two minutes the clerk was calling the roll on final passage of the bill.

Senator Robinson laid aside a long prepared address he had expected to make.

THREE CASES DISPOSED OF

Civil Court gets Away To Good Start on Second Week of two Week's Term.

After disposing of two cases Monday and Tuesday, the civil term of Pitt county Superior court, for trial of civil cases, which convened here last week with Judge Henry A. Crody, of Clinton, presiding, today struck a snag in the damage suit of H. R. Lewis and others against Norfolk and Southern railway, and indications at the noon hour were that the issue would consume the rest of the day.

The plaintiff is suing the railroad for the sum of \$1,500 for damages to timber lands on his property said to have been caused by the railroad.

Oettinger Brothers, of Wilson, obtained judgment for the sum of \$277.35 against Elizabeth Burnette. The suit involved an account.

L. A. Randolph and Company received judgment for \$300 against Mack Jenkins, as payment of a note which had been in dispute for some time.

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S. T. WHITE ELECTED TO PRESIDENCY OF THE COUNTRY CLUB

Managua, Nicaragua, March 28.—(AP)—The resignation of his entire cabinet were in the hands of President Diaz today so that he might have a free hand in selecting men who would unanimously support his policy for American supervision of the presidential elections.

Diaz asked for the resignations which will probably be accepted as effective April 1. Some of the cabinet had been mildly opposing the President's course in providing for the supervision. They were understood to be acting under the influence of Emiliano Chamorro, who is generally credited with having blocked the passage of the McCoy bill providing for the supervision.

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ENDURANCE FLYER FORCED DOWN AT ST. PAUL, MINN.

St. Paul, Minn., March 28.—(AP)—Gene Shank, St. Paul aviator, ended his third unsuccessful attempt to establish a new world's endurance flight record here at 7:34 a. m. today when a plugged gas jet forced him down after 12 hours and 10 minutes in the air. He took off at 7:14 o'clock last night.

TO DEPORT HUNGARIAN NEWSPAPER PUBLISHER

Havana, Cuba, March 28.—(AP)—Imre Savage Sulyok, publisher of a Hungarian language newspaper in Havana, will be deported immediately. He was arrested last month on charges of attempts to blackmail delegates to the Pan-American Congress.

"Big Bill" Haywood Ill.

Moscow, March 28.—(AP)—William D. Haywood, more generally known in American labor circles as "Big Bill," is critically ill in the Kremlin hospital suffering from diabetes. Physicians consider his case grave.

THREE FOUND DEAD IN BED AT NEWARK

Newark, N. J., March 28.—(AP)—Frank S. Warren, 45, his wife, Edith J., and their 13-year old son, Jackson, 8, were found dead in their beds today when firemen entered the Warren home after extinguishing a fire which burned out a portion of the interior of the house. The boy had a bullet wound near the heart.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Warren were so badly burned that authorities said they could not determine the cause of death until an autopsy was performed.

Warren was an insurance and real estate broker.

He was one of the founders and vice president of the American landscape school here.

Sisler - Judge Dispute Still Up In The Air

Tampa, Fla., March 28.—(AP)—With the major league season opening just two weeks away the Sisler-Judge dispute over Washington's first base job still is up in the air. George continues to start every exhibition game and is hitting as of old. Joe has come through in two successive pinches, including yesterday's game which the Senators lost to the St. Louis Nationals 6 to 5.

"I am simply giving Sisler a thorough tryout," Manager Harris explained yesterday. "Of course I've seen him in action against us, but only in a comparatively few games with long intervals in between. I want to see how he fits in our combination. I know what Judge can do that that's why he has not been much used."

President Griffith has corrected the impression that Judge was signed this year with the understanding he would not be traded. "If I should receive an offer for Judge which I believe would be to the interests of the club I would probably accept it," he said.

FOOTBALL GRIDIRON TO GO UNDER MICROSCOPE

Urbana, Ills., March 28.—(AP)—The football gridiron is to be put under the scientific microscope. The college of agriculture of the University of Illinois is seeking to solve for the athletic association the problem of maintaining a satisfactory turf for football fields.

The experiments are to be conducted on ninety miniature gridirons, arranged like a checkerboard into one regulation field. Nine different grasses or turf plants are to be sown in strips running crosswise of the gridirons. These strips are then to be crossed at right angles with ten different amounts and combinations of fertilizers running the length of the fields. Thus there will be ninety different grass and soil treatments for study.

American And Englishman On Mexico's Davis Cup Team

Mexico City.—(AP)—Bob Kinsey, long a prominent figure in American tennis, will occupy the unique position of playing against his own countrymen when the United States Davis Cup team meets Mexico here, April 6, 7 and 8.

Kinsey, although born in St. Louis Mo., is the ranking star of the Mexican team. One of his team mates probably will be a 50-year-old Englishman, Claud M. Butlin, J., who has played in veterans' tournaments in the United States. By the luck of the draw this team is the first that the American players headed by Big Bill Tilden must meet in the first stage of their long campaign to win back the cup from France.

Kinsey now makes his home in this country. He has married a Mexican girl and is in business here. Last year his right to play for Mexico was challenged by the Japanese on the ground he was a United States citizen, but the protest was disallowed when it was found he satisfied Davis Cup residence requirements.

Before moving to Mexico, Kinsey was a leading figure in tennis in the United States, making quite a record in doubles with his younger brother, Howard, now a professional, and ranking sixth in singles there in 1922.

The Mexican team has almost no hope of stopping the strong United States team, although hopeful of avoiding a shutout. Kinsey, while slight in built and not possessed of a great amount of stamina may come through with a win if pitted against one of the younger American players. He is one of the finest strategists in the game and his chop stroke placements have given the best of them plenty of trouble.

Washington thus far has shown an inclination amounting to determination to keep two first sackers. This arrangement will not please Judge and it may not arouse any enthusiasm from President Clark Griffith when he adds up his payroll and finds first base protection costing him \$25,000, more or less, probably more.

MARSH STILL
TESTIFIES AT
COTTON PROBEDescription of Limit-
ing Purchasing Pow-
er Injected into In-
quiry Today.

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—A
plea that dealings by any one firm
or interest in cotton futures of any
one month be limited to "substanti-
ally less than 300,000 bales," was
injected into the senate committee
investigation today by Ar-
thur R. Marsh, New York cotton
broker, in reply to statements by
counsel for William L. Clayton,
Houston, Texas, cotton trader, that
his client's maximum interest in the
December, 1925, future operations
was "less than one-fifth" of the 1-
500,000 bales Marsh had alleged.

Marsh's statement was in form of
a letter to the committee he was
permitted to read, breaking into his
cross examination by David H. Mil-
ler, Clayton's lawyer. It said that
even the 300,000 bale transactions
had been sufficient to produce a
"severe" December corner.

Marsh added, however, that he
was not ready to accept the 300,000
figure as a true picture of the full
scope of Clayton's operations and
called on the committee to learn in
detail market transactions of many
other firms which he said were
dominated by the Houston cotton
house.

"We have here a new bundle of
allegations founded on gossip," Mil-
ler said. "I submit that they will
be denied under oath."

Marsh said in his letter that
"throughout the cotton world," the
December operation "is universally
regarded as an operation planned
and directed by Anderson Clayton
and Company."

When Miller got back to cross-
examination of Marsh he took up
the check that Clayton had played
the Liverpool and New York mar-
kets against each other as an ele-
ment of the market manipulation
he alleged the Houston firm en-
gaged to bring about the general
price collapse of 1927. The lawyer
read comparative quotations of the
two markets from September, 1926,
to March, 1928. These figures, he
said, showed that the British mar-
ket was continuously on such a basis
that under Marsh's theory, hedging
operations should have been con-

ducted in the New York exchange.
Marsh said the Liverpool market
was slowly recovering during that
period from the 1926 depression.
Miller asserted again that the Liv-
erpool 1926 depression was due to the
British general strike and not to
Clayton's operations.

That started an argument with
Senator Caraway, of Arkansas,
whether local conditions, such as
the British strike could cause a 200
point depression of the world cot-
ton market.

"Whatever affects the cotton
trade will be reflected in every mar-
ket," under normal conditions," Sen-
ator Smith, South Carolina, com-
mittee chairman, said. "If we find
that Liverpool was 200 points out of
line with New York, then something
was wrong and the committee pro-
poses to find out what it was."

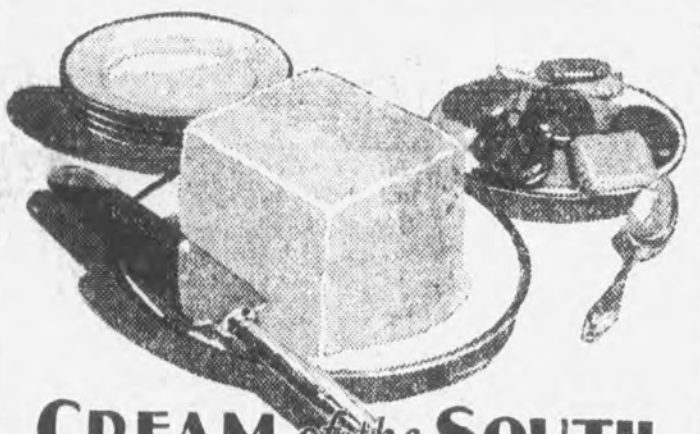

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 28.—(AP)—With the technical position of the market obviously improved by yesterday's swift and sweeping reaction the stock market resumed its upward movement today in a much more orderly fashion. Making up of the call money rate to five per cent following a renewal rate of 4 3/4 caused a flurry of selling that carried several leaders down two to seven points but the general list pushed forward with early gains running from two to nearly eleven points.

Total sales had crossed the 2,000,000 share mark before 1 p.m., and the ticker was 24 minutes behind the market at that time.

Stiffer money rates coinciding with the calling of about \$20,000,000 in bank loans reflected the heavy demand for funds in connection with quarterly settlements. The weekly steel trade reviews reported that heavy steel output was being maintained but that the trend of prices was no longer upward.

Rails assumed increasing prominence in the upswing, Texas and Pacific soaring 10 1-4 points to a new high at 134 3-4 and New York Central crossed 180 for the first time in its history. St. Paul common and preferred, Rock Island, Reading and Northern Pacific also reached new high ground.

Radio broke 7 1-4 points to 161 1-2 around midday but an hour later was quoted at \$171 bid.

The close was strong. Total sales approximated 4,300,000 shares.

HOUSE PASSES ON NAVAL BILL

Appropriations Measure Provides \$350,000,000 for all Branches of Service.

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—Carrying funds for two super-dreadnoughts and for continuation of work on eight 10,000 ton cruisers and two fleet submarines, the 1928-29 naval appropriation bill was passed over to the Senate today stamped with House approval.

The measure, as passed without a record vote by the House late yesterday, provided \$350,000,000 for the naval establishment, or more than \$20,000,000 above the funds available for this fiscal year. Among other things, it calls for maintenance of the navy at its present strength.

Described by Rear Admiral Moffet, chief of the naval bureau of aeronautics, as "the most important step taken by this country to take its rightful place in the merchant marine of the air." The bill provides \$2,000,000 to start construction of the two dirigibles. The total cost must not exceed eight million dollars.

A long debate over the method of letting contracts for the big airships preceded passage of the measure. At the same time, Secretary Wilbur announced that new bids would be asked for the craft, a step interpreted at the capitol as necessary to receive formally a bid from the Goodyear Company, of Akron, Ohio, and another from the Brown Boveri Company, of Camden, N. J. The Goodyear concern sometime ago presented a bid to build one of the ships on a cost-plus basis. This was refused by the navy and the company now is said to be willing to bid on both craft at a cost of \$8,000,000. A hangar also would be constructed under the proposed contract.

The ships would be equipped to carry five airplanes each, with machinery for launching and landing the planes while the dirigibles are in flight.

Seven Daughters Are Belk Heirs

Monroe, March 28.—(AP)—The seven daughters of Dr. J. M. Belk, who died at his home here last week, are made heirs to Dr. Belk's estate by his will filed for probate at the office of the Union county clerk, W. H. Belk, of Charlotte.

Dr. Belk's estate in the Carolinas, was named executor with full authority to pass upon any question that might arise concerning provisions of the will.

Interest in the Belk stores outside of Monroe was left in control of W. H. Belk for ten years. He will operate the stores as they formerly operated for that time. Then the stock of Dr. Belk will be equally divided among his seven daughters, as will all cotton mill, bank, and other corporation stock.

Dr. Belk's interests at Monroe were left to his four unmarried daughters. The Belk home was bequeathed to Miss Mable Belk to remain the home of the other unmarried daughters, Miss Daisy Belk, Miss Henry Belk, and Miss Johnnie Belk. It is to be kept open to the other daughters, said Dr. Belk in his will, "to the good judgment of my daughter, Mabel Belk."

The other daughters are: Mrs. Nollie Belk-Stevens, of Winston-Salem; Mrs. Hattie May Belk Daughtridge, of Rocky Mount; Mrs. Sadie Belk-Hudson, of Greensboro.

Approve Morin Bill.
Washington, March 28.—(AP)—By a vote of 17 to 4 the House military committee today approved the new Morin bill to create a federal corporation to operate the government's Muscle Shoals properties in Alabama.

New Treaty Expected.
Brussels, March 28.—(AP)—Information received in Brussels indicates that the Belgian government expects to receive from the United States government the text of a draft treaty of conciliation and arbitration between the United States and Belgium.

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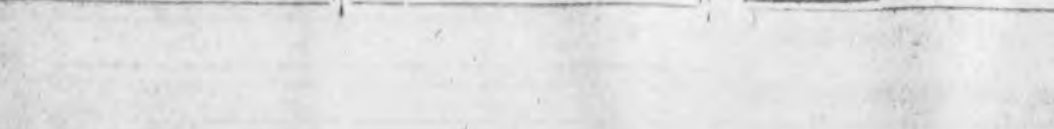
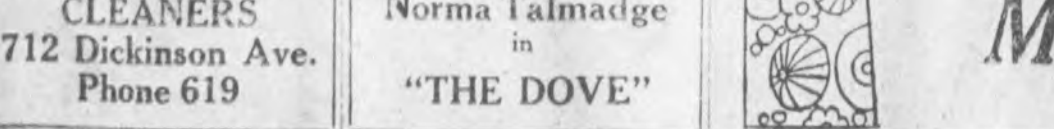
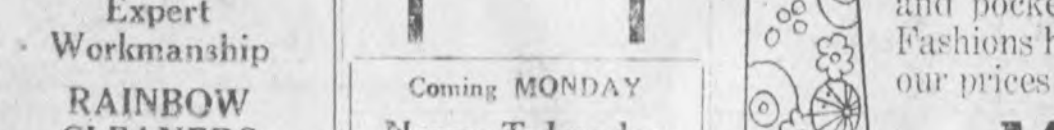
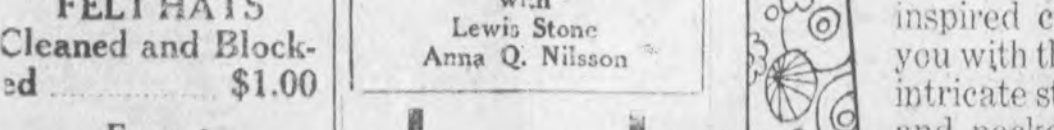
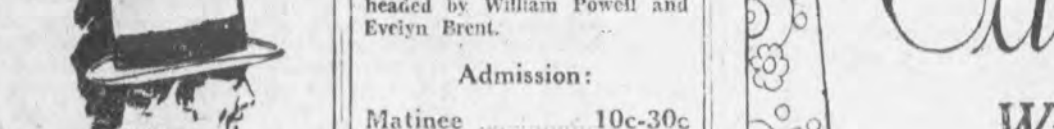
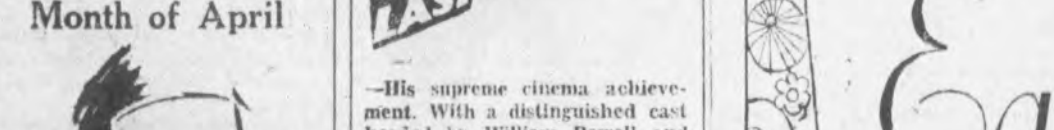
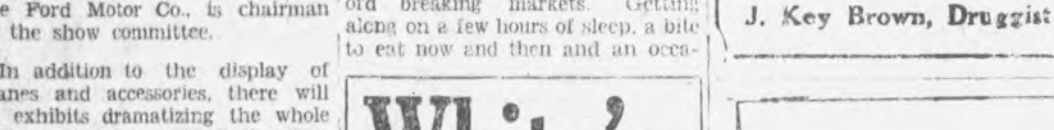
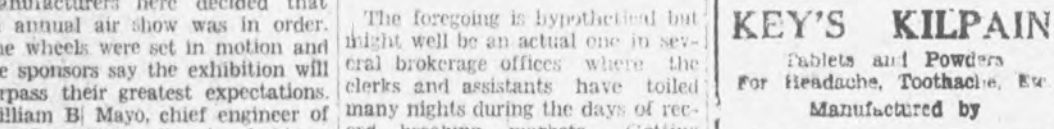
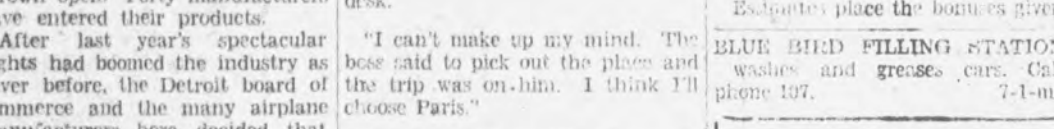
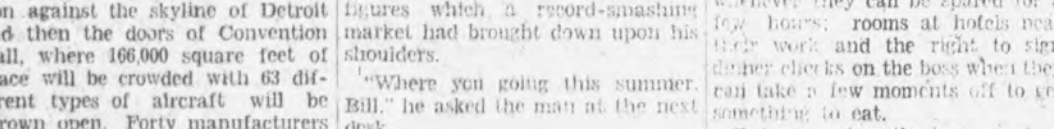
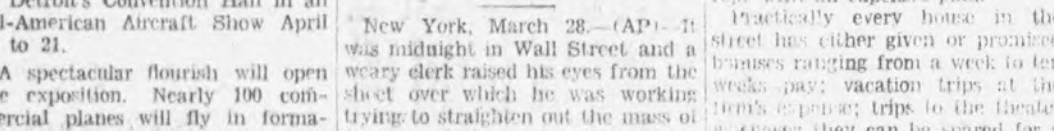
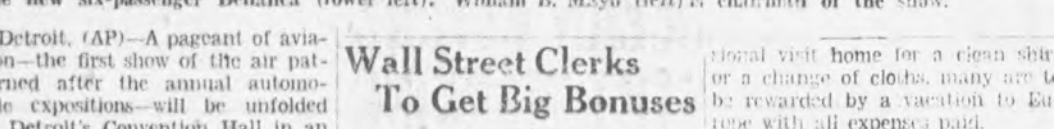
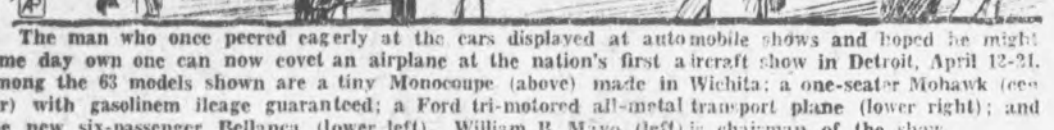
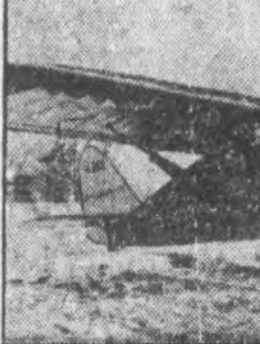
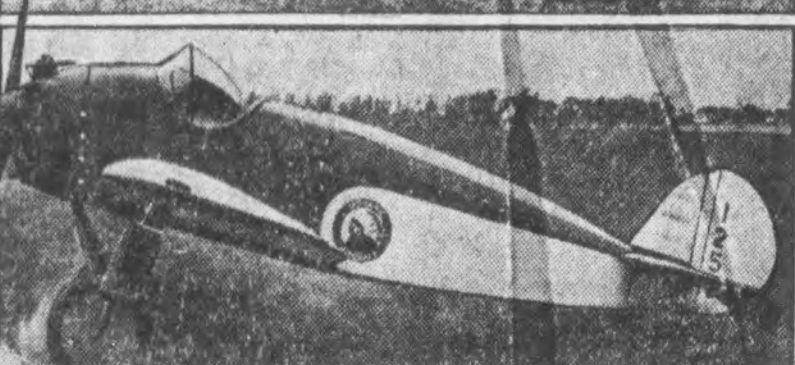
