

LOCAL BALL CLUB BEGINS WORK OUT

With twelve members of the Greenville baseball club already reported, preliminary practice got under way at the ball park at the fair grounds yesterday and will be continued until Monday, when actual training is scheduled to begin. All members are expected to be in camp ready for action by that date, and practice will be conducted both morning and afternoon so that the team will be in good working condition by the date of the first exhibition game, April 9th.

Seven pitchers, two catchers, three infielders and one outfielder constitute the number who have already reported for service. They appeared on the streets in uniform for the first time yesterday, and numbers of sport lovers followed them to the ball park to see the first day's workout.

The pitchers already here are: Charles Wilson, Griffin of Suffolk; Pittman, of Gates; G. Morton, New Bern; and Tuten, Ellis and Joliff, of Greenville. The catchers are Curry of Greenville, and Bowden, of Massachusetts. Douglas West, of Greenville, and White, of Oakland, Calif., are the infielders. Hansen, of Oakland, Calif., is the outfielder.

Curry, West and Ellis, local boys, made an exceptionally fine showing in the first workout. West succeeded in batting a ball over the fence today.

The diamond has been worked over completely, and is in fine condition at this time, members of the local team were quoted as saying this morning. It is expected this condition will gradually improve as the season progresses and that the lot will be one of the best in the league.

The baths and club houses for the players will be ready for use tomorrow. Work is progressing nicely on the bleachers and seating accommodations will be sufficient to care for the largest crowds of the season.

PADDOCK SURE OF CRACKING MORE RECORDS

New York, March 30.—(AP)—The fastest feet that ever spurned a cinder track are just as fleet as ever after fifteen seasons of record-smashing. That is the story of Charley Paddock, the blonde meteor of California, and he intends to prove his points by cracking more speed marks and winding up his Olympic career with at least one triumph at Amsterdam this summer.

The yellow-haired son of the far west, fired the opening gun of his come-back campaign at Houston last Saturday, but his pleasure while here will be to sprint wherever and whenever possible, against any available opposition.

Competition of a razor edge type is necessary to stand off the sprinting youngsters now barring Paddock's path to his third straight Olympic gold medal. To gain this, Paddock has conspired with the only other dash veteran ever to represent Uncle Sam twice against Jackson V. Scholz. They ran to race each other into the finest shape of their colorful careers.

Limping about the Columbia University dressing room two "tender" Achilles Tendons, the chunky, dynamic speed king tossed one arm about Scholz's slender shoulders. They had just finished almost an hour of dummy sprints for the benefit of a battery of cameramen.

"We want to go back" Charley announced. "For just one more crack at those foreigners. In our two trips abroad we've only won a single Olympic championship apiece."

Paddock is mighty proud of the fact, however, that he has scored more points for the United States in Olympic games than any other athlete now in competition. And strangely enough, the veteran Scholz, with the hair thinning slightly on the top of his head, stands second.

Charley has scored 24 1-2 points.

Paddock believes that the German sprinting quartet of Houben, Kornig, Schille and Miller, will be the team America must beat in the 1928 dashes. Kornig, especially, he says, is a star who can turn in record-quelling time for the 100 metres.

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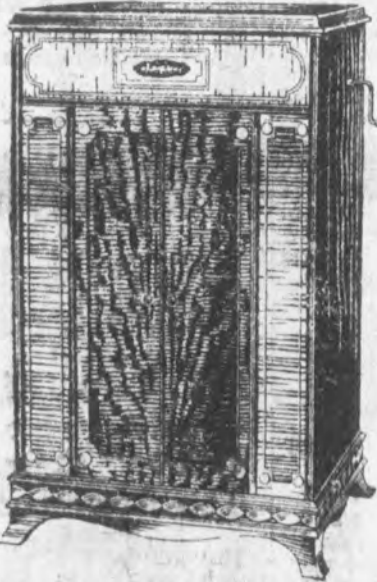

year will inevitably mean
lower prices. For some
years past similar warnings
the farmers have been
heeding from various
sources and it is to be hoped
that the growers will realize
that the advice is timely and
to their advantage. As
shown by figures presented
by Mr. Ficklen, there is al-
ready a surplus of bright
tobacco and the quan-
tity of this type being pro-
duced is increasing more
rapidly than the demand for
it. In the face of these
figures it would be well for
tobacco farmers to stop
and consider carefully be-
fore they put their time and
money into proposed in-
creased acreage this season.
Less tobacco given more at-
tention will result in better
grades and higher prices,
while increased production
in mean only that the
farmers will get a lower
price.

The farmer who, realizing
the situation as it really is,
goes ahead and raises more
tobacco this year, is indeed
killing the goose that lays
the golden egg, for a bump-
er crop can mean but one
thing—lower prices—and if
this happens the growers
will have but themselves to
blame for their folly.

IT IS NOT HEALTHY

It is easy money if you
mess right. The Winston-
Salem Journal says people
in that city made five mil-
lion dollars in profits from
the heavy trading in Gen-
eral Motors' stock. The
Journal will not be inform-
ed when speculators lose.

Therefore, the young men
will be tempted to go after
easy money and neglect
real business.

Experience shows that in
the long run most men who
bet on the price of stocks
and products, will lose money.
Most of the business
failures can be traced to
such speculative dealing. It
is not a healthy business.—
News & Observer.

COTTON MAN DENIES TRAP ON EXCHANGE

Clayton Tells Senate Committee His Firm Had Nothing to do With Shady Dealings.

Washington, March 30.—(AP)—Charges that his firm had set cotton market traps for its competitors were denied today before the senate cotton market investigating committee by William L. Clayton, Texas cotton dealer, who said "the artificial and fictitious character" of future contracts on the New York cotton exchange was responsible for the plight in which dealers some times found themselves.

"If the buyer or seller of futures contracts would give the same careful consideration in his trades that a 'spot' merchant gives to buying and selling spot cotton, there would be little cause for complaint," he added.

"Nobody ever speaks of 'setting traps' in the trading on the New Orleans and Chicago exchanges."

The accusation that Clayton's firm, Anderson, Clayton and Company of Houston, Texas, had laid such traps was among those made by Arthur R. Marsh, New York exchange member in alleging that the Texas firm had repeatedly cornered the cotton futures market in New York and wrecked cotton prices in 1927.

"When we buy or sell a thousand bales of spot cotton," Clayton told the committee today in resuming his sworn denial of all of Marsh's charges, "the terms of the trade are agreed upon and the contract is signed; it is carried out by both parties as a matter of course; there is no charge of bad faith or of the setting of traps; but according to Mr. Marsh's theory if the trade is made across the futures ring the man who sold too cheap or bought too dear has been tricked or trapped."

"If there is any cause for complaint, trapping or tricking, it is because of the artificial and fictitious character of the New York contract, and the failure of the average trader to take this into account."

The Texas dealer put in records of his transactions to refute also Marsh's charge that the firm had sold cotton on call below its competitors and then "jacked up" prices on the delivery month for these sales, resulting in the price paid by the buyer of the call contracts being higher than otherwise would have been the case. He said the tables he presented showed that the New York and Boston "spot offices" of the firm actually obtained 76 per cent of their cotton from competitors whose prices ranged below those of the Texas firm.

Noted Tenor Will Sing at College Here This Evening

Mr. Frederick Gunster, the noted American tenor, who will give a concert at East Carolina Teachers College, in the campus building, this evening at 8:15 o'clock, arriving in Greenville yesterday, coming directly from New York. He will go from here to Richmond and then to Baltimore.

He has been rehearsing his program with Miss Bertolet, who will

play his accompaniments this evening. He expressed himself as being pleased with her playing.

He visited the college this morning and was interested in getting a rear view of the college audience this morning before getting the face-to-face view this evening. He was interested in the fact that while the bob predominates, there are many signs of efforts to have the hair appear long.

Mr. Gunster is an all-American singer, a real musician who believes in using the English language as the medium for reaching

and English speaking public. All of the songs on his program have melody. Only two of them are not in English, and these are in the language in which they were written. He has groups of classic songs but he sings them in English. He says there is no reason why Grieg should not be sung in the native tongue of the singer. "A Swan" was written in Norwegian, and few singers sing in that tongue, and he considers it an absurdity to sing it in America, any translation except in English.

The negro spiritual, Mr. Gunster

says, is the only real American folksong. He has made a long and careful study of negro spirituals, directly from the negroes themselves. While he is a northern man he is, in a way, a southerner, as he married an Alabama girl and has spent a great deal of time in the south.

Mr. Gunster has sung with other famous stars. He sang, for some time with Geraldine Farrar. He has, however, for some time, been giving his own concerts, alone, going on concert tours to every part of the country.

He devotes his life to the mis-

Ten onions, sold by the crate, require but 68 man-days and 14 horse-days per acre.

STOCK MARKET.

New York, March 30.—(AP)—The stock market gave another impressive demonstration of strength today as buying operations were resumed in recent speculative favorites and a brisk demand developed for the copper, public utility, rubber steel and railroad shares. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume, with the ticker again falling far behind the market. Total sales in the first three hours ran close to 2,500,000 shares with indications that the 4,000,000 share mark would again be crossed before the end of the day.

Little attention was paid to the increase of about \$46,000,000 in bidders' loans and the advance in the call money rates to 5 per cent. Coincident with the heavy calling of loans in preparation for month's end requirements.

Radio was again the individual feature, soaring 11 1/2 points to a new high record at 182 on buying influenced by reports of an over extended short interest.

General Motors was again taken in and bid up 5 points to 190 by early afternoon. General Electric jumped 6 1/2 points to 157 1/2, the highest price since the splitting up of the old stock several years ago. The closing was strong. Total sales again exceeded 4,000,000 shares.

Airplanes Defeat Ice.
Riga. (AP)—Finnish and Estonian air service companies have agreed to provide airplane transportation between Tallin, Estonia, and Helsinki, Finland, when ice prevents ships from crossing the Baltic. The service will accommodate 30 passengers daily.

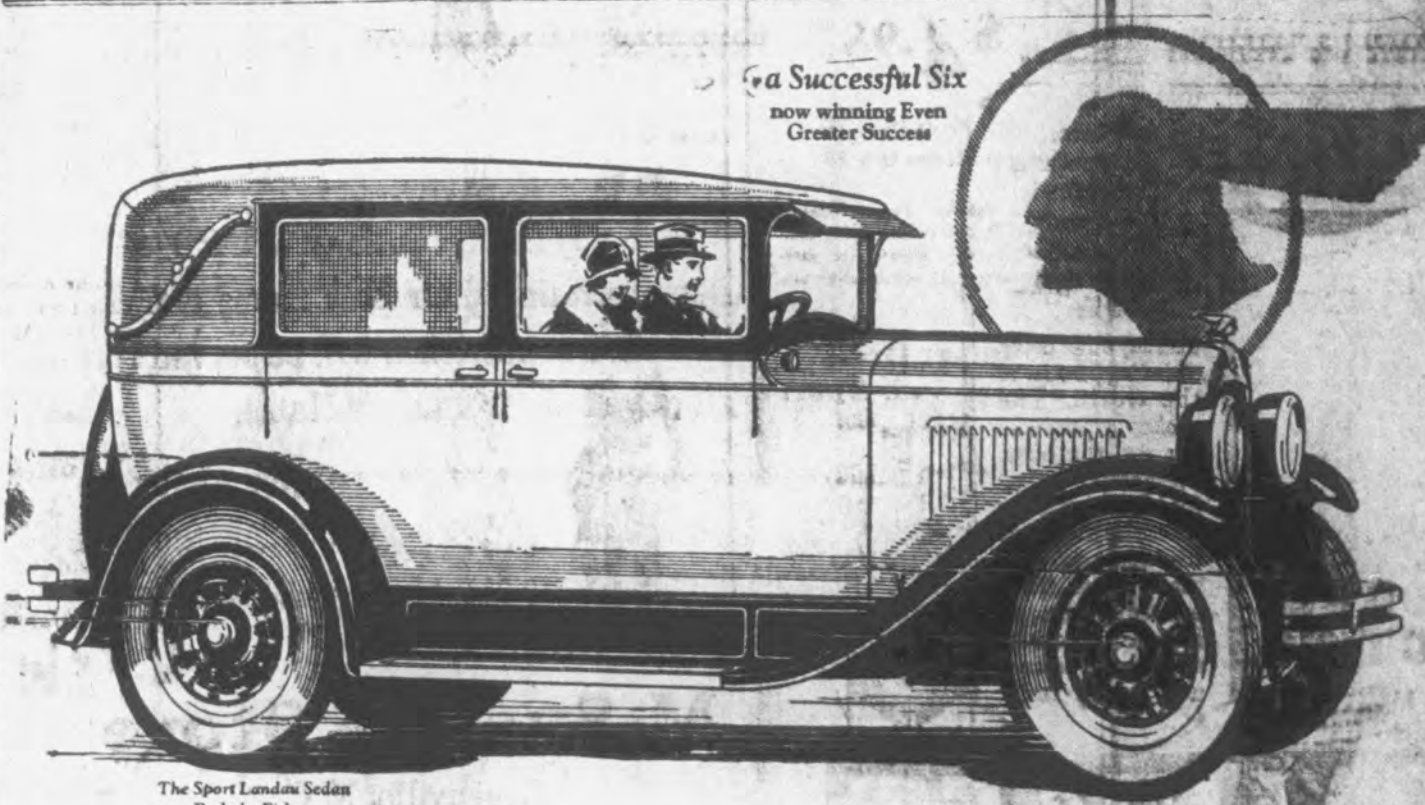

Yesterday's news from Rome represents Mussolini as replying to the Pope's recent criticism of Fascist education of Italian youth with a threat to legislate in restraint of Catholic education and training of boys, particularly the Catholic boy scouts.

There is possibility of trouble there.

Lord Rothermere says Mussolini is earth's greatest man, "the greatest figure of our age" and "the Fascist regime is unshakable." Mussolini says, "I need peace," and he means it. But unless he has peace with the Vatican which controls millions of consciences in Italy, he cannot be sure of peace or that his "regime is unshakable."

Great Britain has 1,066,000 out of a job. Our Secretary of Labor, who makes things as cheerful as possible, says we have more than 1,500,000 idle.

Senator Wagner, speaking for the Democratic party, says that there are more than 4,000,000 idle.

Unemployment, whatever the correct figure, disgraces this country. Hundreds of millions are piling up in the treasury, hundreds of millions worth of work ought to be done. There is no excuse for the idleness.

Democrats, on the other hand, do not help themselves or hurt Republican prospects when they exaggerate unemployment and the threat of hard times.

Too much of that talk will cause the Democratic party to be associated in the public mind with disaster. Cassandre and Jeremiah, even when they told the truth, were not popular. Nobody would have voted to elect them president and vice-president.

There is such a thing as taking your eighteenth amendment too

seriously. Treasury officials threaten to make both 1928 conventions dry.

It is all very well to keep gin from colored labor in the south, and beer from white labor in the north. But when you talk of keeping beer and whiskey from politicians solemnly selecting a president to enforce constitution and law, the thing ceases to be a joke.

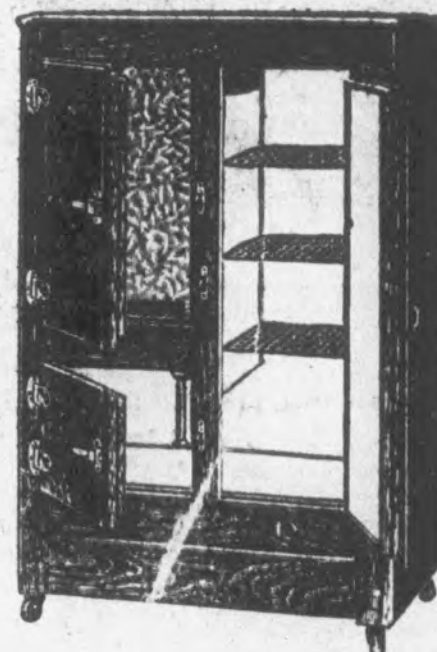
