

SUDDEN DEATH OF SEN. WILLIS SHOCKS NATION

Congress Thrown into Unusual Situation by Sudden Death of Ohio Leader.

Washington, March 31.—(AP)—The sudden and shocking news of the death of Senator Frank B. Willis, of Ohio, as he was about to make a presidential campaign speech last night at Delaware, Ohio, threw the second shroud of mourning over Congress within eight days and embroiled the Republicans in a tight political tangle unheard of in years.

The senate had barely recovered from the death of Senator Woodbridge N. Ferris of Michigan, who died here of pneumonia March 23, when it received the report of the collapse and sudden passing of the senior Ohio senator and candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.

Senator Willis' death not only brings to a close the spectacular drive against Secretary Hoover he was making in Ohio for delegates to Republican convention and forces his supporters into a difficult situation, but it also means a considerable shifting about of the Ohio senatorial campaign since undoubtedly a Democrat will be named as a successor to Willis.

As far as the senate line-up is concerned here, apparently there will be no change as Governor Green, of Michigan, who is a Republican, is expected to name a man of his own party to succeed Ferris, who was a Democrat, and Governor Donahy, who is a Democrat, undoubtedly will appoint a Democrat to succeed Willis.

Willis, who entered the Senate in 1921 by appointment to succeed Warren G. Harding, was considered one of the foremost candidates for the Republican presidential nomination and was in midst of an active campaign, speech-making, and organizing for delegates to the Kansas convention when his untimely death came last night in his home town of Delaware.

Whether Willis' name can be taken off the primary lists, entry for which closed more than a month ago, was a question and answer to which was awaited with interest here today. It is now up to the late senator's supporters, observers declare, to decide whether they will discontinue the fight against Hoover and let him have the Ohio delegation by default, or carry on the drive under the Willis banner in an effort to swing the delegation to some other candidate opposed to the cabinet officer.

Assuming that the latter course is adopted, it was predicted that attempts would be directed toward lining up delegates either for Senator Curtis, Senator Watson or Frank O. Lowden, all of whom have been considered lined up with Willis in opposition to Hoover.

There was some speculation here that Secretary Hoover might withdraw from the Ohio fight because of the peculiar situation brought about. Mr. Hoover made no such intimation, however, in a statement last night in New York when he expressed his sorrow over his predecessor's sudden death.

Willis' death brought many expressions of sorrow from his friends and colleagues in Washington. Among those who issued formal statements were Senator Fess, the veteran Theodore Burton of Ohio, who started the Hoover boom there, Senator Watson of Indiana, Vice Gov. David D. Davis, speaker Longworth, Senator Curtis of Kansas, Senator Walsh of Montana, and Walter P. Brown, assistant secretary of commerce and one of Hoover's Ohio campaign managers.

Willis was chairman of the senate territories and insular affairs committee and one of the prominent dry leaders in the senate.

SUPPER CLUB MEETING GETS GREAT CROWD

Splendid Program Marked Department of Agriculture Banquet Last Night.

Something like a hundred farmers and their wives attended the quarterly supper of the Pitt County Department of Agriculture given at the Rotary Club last night. The program was probably one of the most elaborate in months, including a delightful musical program and interesting talks dealing with problems vitally affecting Eastern North Carolina growers at this time.

J. E. Winslow, president of the Department of Agriculture of the county, presided in the capacity of toastmaster, and extended a cordial welcome to the visitors, many of whom are big business men as well as agriculturalists of note. J. Frank Harrington was in charge of the reception committee.

The program opened with three songs sung by Misses Agnes and Carolyn Fullilove, members of the faculty of city schools. They were accompanied at the piano by Miss Veazey, of the music department of public schools. The concluding feature of the musical program came later in the evening in the nature of several numbers by a quartet composed of Bill Lee, Manly Sellers, Ed Williams and E. P. Storey.

Probably the outstanding talk of the evening was made by W. W. Slay, swine specialist of the North Carolina extension department. He told of what North Carolina farmers are doing in the way of raising hogs, and urged Pitt planters to give more attention to this important matter. There is money in the venture, he declared, and no farmer can go wrong by engaging in this industry, even on a small scale.

Miss Helen N. Estabrook, specialist in house furnishings, spoke on the subject of "House Versus Home," giving a splendid exposition of the requisites of the home and its difference from the cold, bare walls of a house. The talk was highly inspirational and proved something of a challenge to the farm woman in improvement of her environment.

Miss Ethel Pitt, home demonstration agent of Pitt county, gave a brief but vivid outline of home conditions, stressing the need of this activity in development of American farm life.

John T. Thorne, of Farmville, stressed the need of using better seed. He told the farmers this matter should be given more consideration if they are to progress in the future as in the past.

E. F. Arnold, director of farm department of Pitt county, gave a comprehensive survey of farm extension work in the county, showing that each branch had experienced good growth in the past several months.

Mrs. R. R. Cotten, of Bruce, spoke of how women on the farm are contributing to the life of the towns and cities.

Cyclone Wrecks Several Buildings on Cobb Farm

A wind storm of cyclonic intensity visited the R. J. Cobb farm, about five miles northwest of this city yesterday about 11 o'clock, destroying two or three tobacco barns, a pack house and several smaller outbuildings. The roof to the kitchen and dining room of the main dwelling was lifted by the wind and carried a considerable distance.

This information was given out this morning by Mr. Cobb who happened to be at the farm when the cyclone passed over. He said the wind apparently swooped down upon a small area and vanished almost as suddenly as it came.

The cyclone was accompanied by a heavy black cloud and terrific rain storm. The cloud was unusually high and to this fact is attributed the wind not covering a great scope.

Mr. Cobb said no reports of damage to adjoining farms had been received and it was believed that the wind either spent its fury in the heavens or carried destruction to some other part of the country.

Although high winds have been reported from virtually all sections of the county the last two or three days, this is the first time a storm of such severity has been recorded. The wind reached considerable velocity in about seven o'clock, but no damage of any consequence had been reported today.

James Withdraws From Politics

Frank James, member of the local law firm of Blount & James, who recently announced his candidacy for solicitorship of Pitt county court, today issued a statement formally withdrawing from the race. The reason for Mr. James taking this step is set forth in the following statement issued this morning: "I wish to use this means of stating that financial and business matters compel me to withdraw my candidacy for the office of County Solicitor. It will be impossible at this particular time for me to continue active in public affairs and at the same time maintain and give proper attention to the law practice upon which I am now absolutely dependent."

Orders New Trial of Railroad Case

Judge Henry A. Grady, who presided over the civil term of Pitt County Superior Court in Greenville this week, yesterday ordered a new trial in the case of Lewis vs. Norfolk & Southern railway.

Lewis was awarded \$800 damage against the railroad company by a civil court jury Thursday afternoon, but Judge Grady held that this amount was excessive in ordering the new trial. The plaintiff sued for \$1,500 as damages to timberlands, alleged to have been caused by fires originating from sparks of locomotives owned by the railroad company.

HENRY FORD AND WIFE LEAVE FOR EUROPE TODAY

New York, March 31.—(AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford left for Europe today aboard the liner Majestic.

It is the automobile manufacturer's first trip abroad since his famous voyage to Norway on the "peace ship" in 1915, which was designed to "get the boys out of the trenches by Christmas." Mrs. Ford is crossing for the first time.

Raleigh Man Shot

Doungtown, Pa., March 31.—(AP)—Delmor Poole, 23, Raleigh, N. C., was shot and seriously wounded by a policeman on the Lincoln highway near here when it is alleged he attempted to escape paying a gasoline bill. Poole is in a hospital at Winchester and his companion, Allen Austin, 29, Norfolk, Va., is under arrest.

TUNNEY AND HEENEY TO FIGHT IN NEW YORK

New York, March 31.—(AP)—The world's championship match between Gene Tunney and Tom Heenev, announced in Miami Beach today by Tex Rickard, probably will take place in one of two New York major league ball parks around July 4th.

Matching of Heenev with the champion automatically shelves Johnny Risko, the Cleveland baker boy, who had fought his way up to the elimination finals with the New Zealander.

ASK STAY OF EXECUTION IN REMUS AFFAIR

Lima, O., March 31.—(AP)—Declared sane yesterday by the court of appeals, George Remus, former bootlegger and slayer of his wife today still seemingly had a fight facing him before he is released from the State Hospital for the insane here.

The appellate court by a two to one decision held him mentally competent and granted him a writ of habeas corpus to liberate him from the hospital where he has been since January 6 after he was acquitted of the murder of his wife on grounds of insanity.

Barriers to his immediate release, however, were immediately erected when E. M. Botkin, Allen county prosecutor, set to work on a motion to the state supreme court asking a stay of execution. He planned today to seek a new trial and if that fails announced he would take the motion at once into the supreme court.

Efforts to obtain Remus speedy release on the basis of the court's decision failed yesterday when Botkin refused to sign the journal entry presented by attorneys for the once popular bootleg chief. Botkin has two days under the rules of the court, to sign the entry. These two days, however, do not become effective until after a motion for a new trial is made and it appeared therefore that Remus probably would spend at least several days more in the hospital.

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SEVERAL DEAD AS RESULT OF EARTH SHOCKS

Constantinople, March 31.—(AP)—Thirty-eight persons were reported dead and fifty-five injured in a series of seven sharp earthquakes which shook Smyrna beginning at 2:30 o'clock this morning.

The city, famed since antiquity for its many disasters, saw the crash of houses rebuilt since the terrible fire of several years ago and the Tureli-Green war.

All of the neighboring village of Toubail was destroyed and in the village of Ekdikeudi ten dead and forty injured were reported.

The Turkish Red Crescent Society is rushing help to the stricken district.

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JUDGE BOND PASSES AWAY AT DURHAM

Supreme Court Jurist of Edenton Found Dead in Hotel Room Early Today.

Durham, March 31.—(AP)—Judge William Marion Bond of Edenton, died in his hotel room this morning from heart trouble without warning, after a week's holding of court.

He was appointed by former Gov. Locke Craig from the First Judicial District as superior court judge July 1, 1913, and had been elected and re-elected since that time. He was 65 years old.

A son, at Denver, Colo., William M. Bond, Jr., University of North Carolina graduate, is vice-president of the International Trust Company.

Judge Bond last night left a call for 7:30 o'clock. While he did not answer this or the knocking of a porter, manager E. B. Hugg of the Marlborough, entered the room and found the body.

The body was lying in a position to indicate that Judge Bond was walking from the bath to his bed, the feet at the bath room door.

Marks on the head caused examining physicians to conclude that the head had struck a dresser in the room when the judge fell. Examination at the request of Coroner W. S. Sneed, said death was due to acute heart trouble.

Friends of Judge Bond said he had been in poor health for some time, although he kept about his duties as superior court judge. During the past three days he had complained of not feeling well.

Lynn Bond, another son, arrived here this morning from Tarboro to take charge of the body and arrange for the funeral services which were to be announced later. It was assumed the body would be taken to Edenton for interment.

Mrs. Bond died about two years ago. Surviving are three children, William M. Bond, Jr., of Denver, Colo.; Lynn Bond, Tarboro; and Mrs. Julia Bond Dixon, daughter, of Edenton. Another son was killed overseas during the late great war, a loss which the father was said to have mourned continually.

Funeral services for Judge Bond will be held at Edenton Sunday afternoon at two o'clock.

HAYS MAY BE CALLED BACK IN OIL ISSUE

Fourth Appearance of Former Chairman of Republican Committee in Prospect.

Washington, March 31.—(AP)—A fourth appearance before the Senate-Tarap Dome committee of Will H. Hays, former chairman of the Republican National Committee, is in prospect as a result of charges that he attempted to halt the oil inquiry four years ago.

The committee first will decide whether to call former Senator Alva B. Adams, of Colorado, and Douglas H. McArthur, former secretary to the late Senator Edwin F. Ladd, of North Dakota, who made made the charges yesterday concerning Hays, who now is in Europe on a business mission for the moving picture industry.

They said that the North Dakota Senator had told them that Hays, in 1924, when Ladd was chairman of the "Teapot Dome" committee, and Adams was a Democratic member, visited Washington and tried to induce Ladd to join other Republicans on the committee in an effort to stop the investigation for political reasons.

The former Postmaster General, who appeared before the oil committee in 1924 and twice this year, according to the story related by Adams and McArthur, the latter now secretary to Chairman Nye, also a North Dakotan, went to the White House and called for Ladd to meet him there. They met and Hays took Ladd for a ride around the city to a taxicab while he presented his argument against further prosecution of the inquiry then being carried on by Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana.

Hays' reasons, Ladd was quoted as having said, were that the investigation had grown to be one for political purposes only, with the Democrats using it to sling mud on the Republicans in connection with the naval oil reserve leases.

Enraged by Hays' arguments, the North Dakota Independent, who later was barred from regular Republican party councils, the story goes, refused point blank to enter into such agreement and made it clear that he proposed to carry out his duty regardless of the result to any political party.

This bit of information has taken committee members somewhat by surprise and has dwarfed for the time being their interest in other details and clues which they are running down behind closed doors in an endeavor to determine whether to proceed with public hearings or to wait additional reports from its field investigators.

Coast Guards Seek Mystery Rum Vessel

Swainsboro, N. C., March 31.—(AP)—A three-masted schooner, "from nowhere and bound for Nassau" was sought today by coast guardmen and federal prohibition officials in connection with a drive to break up an alleged liquor ring operating off the North Carolina coast. The craft was said to carry two auxiliary gas engines to give her speed in a pinch.

The seizure Thursday of 462 cases of whiskey and 18 barrels of rum on the beach near Bear Inlet brought the federal dry agents to the direct aid of coast guardmen in their operation against the rum runners. District Commander O. A. Littlefield of the coast guard and Captain W. W. Kinmer of the coast guard cutter "Panicle" with a number of the federal officers arrived yesterday to take charge of the situation. Plans were made to turn the liquor over to the custom house officials at Wilmington today.

Meanwhile an investigation was under way to determine a possible connection between the three masted schooner, reported to have hovered about 20 miles off shore several days before the seizure, and the cargo of liquor, number of lanterns and other small coast craft were under scrutiny also, the officers said.

Interest in the investigation centered on the mysterious schooner. A sea bass fisherman reported that an inquiry a few days ago as to the home port and destination of the vessel brought from the mast the reply:

"I'm from nowhere and bound for Nassau."

MINORS SHOW MAJORS SOME GREAT STUFF

New York, March 31.—(AP)—Minor league baseball players are finding the trail leading homeward strewn with difficulties.

As the games, which do not mean anything but loss of dignity, went ahead yesterday, Washington, Cleveland and the St. Louis Browns lost to minor league clubs.

The Philadelphia Athletics, New York Giants and Detroit maintained the prestige of the majors by beating back the opposition from the lower classification.

Four National leagues club engaged in battles which might have been dropped out of the regular season weeks ahead.

Brooklyn made it three in a row from Boston by winning a well pitched game 3 to 2, while the Chicago Cubs were trouncing the Pittsburgh Pirates 5 to 2.

Eddie Brant, the Braves' Wilbur Southworth from the Pacific coast, looked good in defeat while Big Doug McWeeny of the Robins, was even better.

The Cubs supported Pat Malone clever pitching with sharp hitting. Freddy MacGuire, who is expected to make Chicago fans forget that "Sparky" Adams played second base for the Bruins last year, led the attack.

The Browns were cheered in their 3 to 2 defeat by the Kansas City Blues at the pitching of George Blasholder, Tulsa's contribution to the St. Louis pitching staff. He showed good form and left the game in time to escape the beating.

The Washington defeat by Birmingham made Ed Wells, former Detroit pitcher, a goat when he was cast for the part of a hero. He won 13 games and lost only one for Birmingham last year. The score was 7 to 6.

The New Orleans Pelicans have not learned to pronounce the name of Joe Shaute, but they solved his delivery to win from Cleveland 16 to 13.

The Giants came from behind to score 17 runs in a single inning and stop the Chattanooga Lookouts 18 to 3 until the loaded hour when some of the players went to bat three times the Giants had made no part of 17 runs.

The Athletics prepared for the series to decide the championship of Philadelphia, in which the first gun is ready for firing today, by staging a white elephant parade at Greensboro. The Piedmont leagues were buried under a count of 22 to 6.

Six home runs, four in one inning, helped the winners, Eddie Collins and Tris Speaker struck blows for the Old Guard. Jimmy Fox represented the juveniles with two and Dykes and Hauser completed the sextet.

The Phillies, leatherbound at home impatiently waited their opponent's coming.

Fort Worth was easy for Detroit with the final accounting 9 to 3 in a game which Little Jackie Tavener, the hardest hitter in the game for his inches, hit a home run.

The groggy Yankees got a break in the schedule and were idle, while rain kept the Cardinals in doors at Jacksonville.

U. S. Davis Cup Team Handicapped By Shift To Altitude of Mexico

Mexico City, (AP)—One of the biggest obstacles to the success of the United States Davis Cup tennis team in its matches with the Mexican team here April 6, 7 and 8 is expected to be the lofty altitude.

Mexico City is located on a plain 7,350 feet above the sea and is about a mile and a third higher than Augusta, Ga., where the American players under William T. Tilden have been training.

The sudden change to this extreme altitude often causes the newcomer extreme discomfort and is especially marked in the case of athletes. Bleeding from the nose sometimes occurs when persons new arrived engage in strenuous exercise. It is also recorded that a diplomat from a foreign country once gave up his post here because he could not stand the elevation.

Just how great will be the effects of the rarefied air upon the Americans is problematical, but it is considered certain to have some influence upon their play. None of the visiting players has had a chance previously to become accustomed to the conditions under which they must play and they have only a short time before the first match, April 6.

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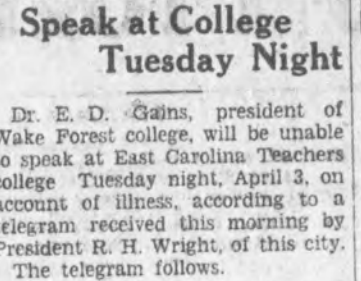

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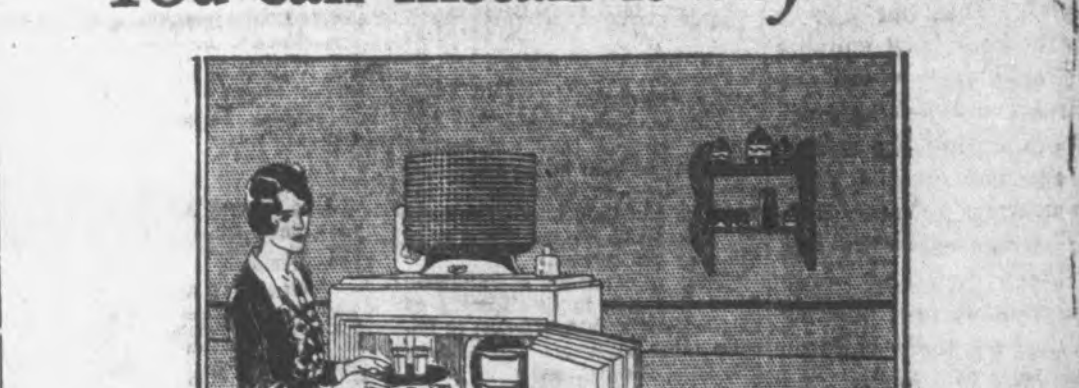

Houses with Liverpool and Continental connections were moderate buyers, however, and prices tended up on week-end covering, active months showing net advances of 4 to 7 points at the end of the first hour.

Private cables said hedging and Bombay selling had been absorbed by covering and trade calling in Liverpool and that there was fair demand for both cotton yarns and cloths.

Master Farmer Gets on Board Cotton Growers

R. L. Shuford, one of the State's Master Farmers and Jersey breeder of national fame, is now a full-fledged member of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative Association according to information received from C. C. Hilton, field representative of the Cotton Growers Association.

Mr. Shuford, who is known in his home county as "Bob" Shuford, was elected by the Board of Directors at its last regular meeting to fill the unexpired term of M. S. Roush of Crouse, N. C., who resigned on account of the condition of his health.

In addition to being a cotton farmer, he is an outstanding dairyman. Mr. Shuford qualified as one of the State's twenty-four Master Farmers who were awarded medals and certificates of merit in December by the North Carolina State College of Agriculture and the Progressive Farmer. Mr. Shuford is the owner of Oakwood Dairy Farm in the South, and also of Red Lady, known as Queen of the South, with a record of 19,608 pounds of milk and 1,028 pounds of butter fat. Red Lady attracted more attention at the National Dairy Show at Memphis, Tennessee last year than any other individual animal.

In partnership with his family Mr. Shuford operates a five hundred acre farm devoted to the growing of crops, raising of pure-bred Jersey cattle and the production of dairy products.

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 31.—(AP)—Stock prices started forward at a terrific pace in today's market but stumbled under the weight of the enormous volume of realizing sales. There was little in the day's news to influence the price movement. More than a score of issues were marked up to new high levels for the year in the first outbreak of buying.

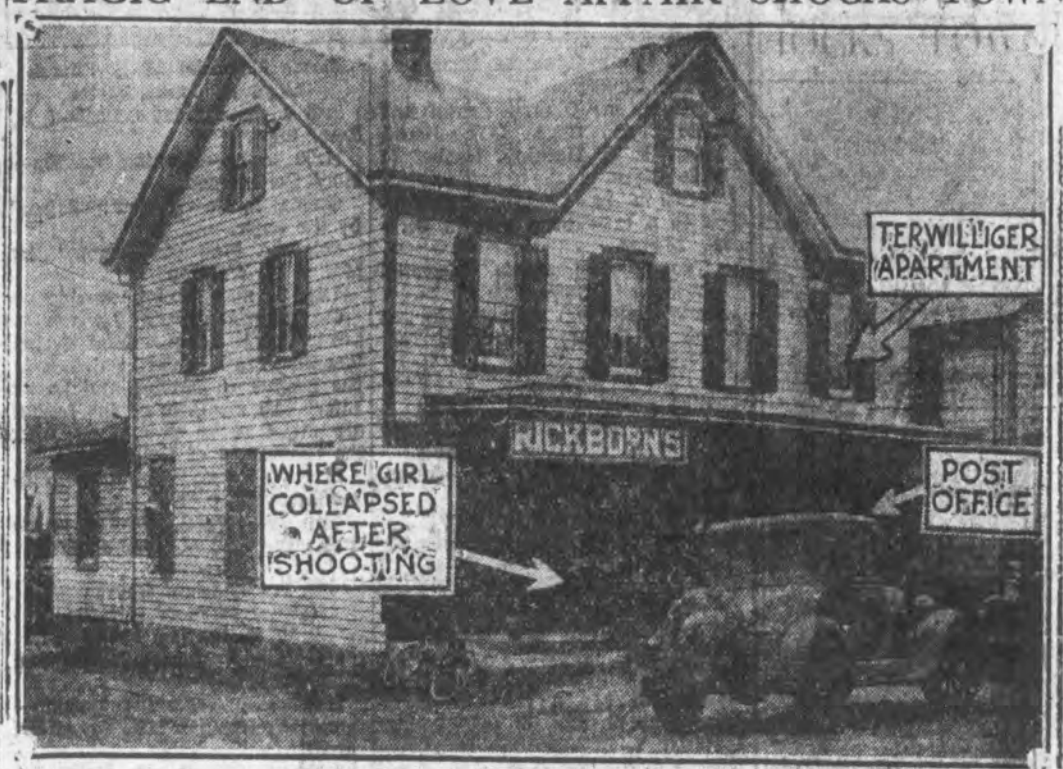

SEN. WILLIS PASSED AWAY LAST EVENING

Presidential Candidate Collapsed Suddenly in Ohio Last Night on Speaking Tour.

Delaware, Ohio, March 31.—(AP)—United States Senator Frank B. Willis, Ohio's favorite son candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, was eliminated from the contest by death last night, while attending an old-fashioned house-coming demonstration.

He was stricken a few minutes before he was to deliver a campaign address to his fellow townsmen at Ohio Wesleyan University, and just as the Columbus Republican Club was singing "A Soldier's Farewell."

While the glee club was singing the Senator left the stage, telling friends he "wanted to get a breath of fresh air." His death, which five physicians said was caused by cerebral hemorrhage, occurred within five minutes. He was 56 years old.

Mrs. Willis, called from the stage where she had been sitting with her husband, reached his side a few minutes before he died.

The audience first was informed the Senator had been taken ill and would be unable to speak. They sensed something more distressing had happened and as they hurried to learn the truth, many of his old friends, both men and women, cried. Some women became almost hysterical.

National guard troops formed an antechamber in the parade and demonstration, took charge and dispersed the crowd, which became excited but remained orderly.

With the Senator when the end came were Mrs. Willis; his brother, Duell W. Willis; his father-in-law, John Dustin, of Galena; three brothers-in-law, his private secretary and a few personal friends.

Miss Helen Willis, the only child, was notified at Ada, Ohio, where she is a professor at Ohio Northern University.

National guard troops formed an escort of honor as the Senator's body was removed. Major L. C. Riddle announced he would maintain a guard over the body until the funeral.

News of the Senator's death spread rapidly over the city. His pictures displayed in the homes and business places, were draped in mourning.

While funeral arrangements have not yet been made, burial probably will be at Galena, his birthplace, 11 miles southeast of this city. Telegrams, expressing sorrow and sympathy, continued to pour in today to Mrs. Willis and relatives of the distinguished Senator. Political opponents were unanimous in their praise of the Senator's character, ability and sincerity. All declared they had the deepest regard for Senator Willis in every respect.

Nashville, Tenn., March 31.—(AP)—Governor Henry Horton today issued a proclamation in accord with the action of the meeting at Jackson, Miss., February 20-21 in behalf of a ten per cent cotton acreage reduction, calling on bankers, farmers, farm bureau heads and other interested parties in Tennessee cotton counties to unite in calling county meetings to agree upon the proposed reduction for the present year.

CHICAGO AIR BEACON TO BE READY IN JULY

Chicago, (AP)—An aerial beacon 520 feet above street level and visible for 100 miles on a clear night will be operating in Chicago in July. Walter Greengbaum, Chicago banker and donor of the light, says work of installing the beacon on the top of a loop skyscraper has started. It will consist of 24 units of Neon tubes, rising 45-feet above the top of the building. The tower of light will be so arranged as to give the same effect when approached from any direction.

Greengbaum studied aerial beacons in Europe before deciding upon the Chicago light. He says several other cities are planning similar beacons but are waiting to see how the one here works.

REDUCE COAL RATES.

Washington, March 31.—(AP)—Rates on bituminous coal suitable for household fuel from Pennsylvania producing territory to principal New England points were ordered reduced by 15 cents a ton today by the interstate commerce commission.

Charlotte, March 30.—(AP)—Harry Morrow, Atlanta cotton mill operator, has been indicted by the Mecklenburg county grand jury on the charge of kidnapping his married daughter, it became known here today. The indictment became public when officials prepared to have Morrow taken into custody at Atlanta.

The daughter, Miss Ella Morrow, eloped with C. Cline Underwood, local shoe salesman, several months ago. A short time after the marriage, it is alleged, the father came here, took his daughter for an automobile ride and did not return. Underwood recently went to Atlanta and instituted habeas corpus proceedings charging that Morrow was holding his daughter a virtual prisoner. She did not return to Charlotte with him, however.

CANNES IS STARTLED BY CAROL'S SWEATERS

Cannes, France, (AP)—Former Prince Carol of Roumania, who spent several weeks of the winter season here, attracted attention by the flashy design of his sports clothes.

While wearing a heavy mourning band on his sleeve for his father, the late King Ferdinand-Prince Carol specialized in highly-colored sweaters and pull-overs. Looking on in the baccarat room one day the Prince wore so bright a pull-over, seeming to include a sample of every known color and shade in a forked lightning pattern, that on-lookers neglected the proceedings at the "no-limit" table to observe it.

Carol relished watching the play, but never took part himself. "I am too poor," he said.
