TAX MUST BE
PAIRED DOWNReduction Measure
Voted By The House
Still Too Large, Sec-
retary Declares

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—The \$200,000,000 tax reduction voted by the House must be paired down to \$201,000,000 and perhaps \$182,000,000, Secretary Mellon told the Senate finance committee today in reporting on the outlook for the treasury for the next year.

This is even less than the treasury secretary proposed to the House last fall and is necessary, he explained, because of increased government expenditures rather than due to any drop in revenues which are expected to equal last year's on the basis of first returns. The first administration proposal was for a \$225,000,000 cut.

The committee began work today on the House bill passed before Christmas, after waiting for the March 15th tax returns.

Secretary Mellon proposed this programme:

Downward revision of surtax rates applying on incomes between \$14,000 and \$75,000—loss in revenue \$50,000,000.

Reduction of corporation tax from 13 1/2 to 12 per cent—loss \$123,000,000.

Repeal of federal estate tax—loss first year, \$7,000,000.

Exemption of income derived from American bankers' acceptances held by foreign central banks of issue—loss negligible.

He also accepted the following House provisions:

Increase from \$2,000 to \$3,000 the exemptions allowed corporations with incomes not in excess of \$25,000—loss \$12,000,000.

Increase from 75 cents to \$1 exemptions on admission tax—\$8,000,000.

Repeal of tax on cereal beverages—loss \$185,000.

Reduction in tax on wines—loss \$300,000.

This program would result in a total cut of \$201,115, but a more gloomy picture was painted on the condition that expenditures will be necessary next fiscal year because of flood control—legislation which already has passed the Senate by unanimous vote. If a \$30,000,000 appropriation for this is necessary next year, Mr. Mellon said the total tax would have to be limited to \$182,000,000.

Under these circumstances he would restrict the provisions of the bill to reductions of the corporation tax and the rates on surtaxes applying on intermediate incomes; repeal of the estate tax and cereal beverage levy and reduction of the wine tax.

Instead of a decrease in income tax receipts, Mr. Mellon, on the basis of first quarter returns this year, estimated that in both this year and the next these collections would be \$5,000,000 more than originally estimated.

But an increase of \$85,000,000 on prospective expenditures for next year is where the trouble comes, the secretary explained.

He estimated the surplus for this fiscal year, ending June 30, at \$400,000,000 and for next year \$212,000,000 as compared with estimates of \$454,000,000 and \$274,000,000 respectively, made last October. On the basis of the latter estimates the tax cut of \$225,000,000 was recommended to the House last fall.

While estimates on receipts for next year were revised to calculate decreases of \$15,000,000 in customs collections and \$10,545,000 in miscellaneous internal revenue, these were offset by prospective increases in income tax and back tax receipts.

Last year ended with a surplus of more than \$600,000,000 and the \$200 in the estimate surplus for this year is accounted for largely by one item, the appropriation of \$50,000,000 required by the recently enacted bill authorizing settlements of American and German war claims.

Edward W. P. Smithfield, is serving his 14th successive term from this district.

Mr. Mack came to Raleigh from Pennsylvania in 1910 and until recently was field supervisor for the cotton growers association.

Probability of another candidate seeking Congressman Poy's seat appeared when it was learned that Thos. L. Creekmore, Raleigh attorney, who was in the General Assembly the past two sessions, said he was considering announcing himself.

YOUTH SAVES
CANTON FROM
BLOODY WAR

Two Hundred and
Thirty Persons Ex-
ecuted Following Ar-
rest of Communists.

Canton, China, April 3.—(AP)—A fourteen-year-old street urchin today was credited with having saved Canton from further bloodshed through a communist uprising. He informed police that the Reds were intending to precipitate an uprising similar to that of last December.

Under the leadership of the youth, the police were shown 18 Red strongholds. Raising these, the officers arrested 463 communists.

Two hundred and thirty persons, including eight women, were executed. The victims died gladly, saying that ten more Reds would rise up where one was shot down.

The youth said he had learned of the communist plans from over-hearing various groups of them talking in the streets. The Reds openly predicted the downfall of the government and threatened to use the torch to precipitate trouble.

Mellon Sees No
Material Change
In Business Now

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—Secretary Mellon foresees no material change in business conditions during the balance of the calendar year from those which have prevailed during the last two years.

His views were enclosed in a prepared statement on tax reduction submitted today to the Senate finance committee in which he predicted little difference in income tax receipts for next year.

"It would take a mighty wise man," Mr. Mellon said, "to prophesy the course of business during the next months."

There is nothing to indicate that business conditions will differ materially during the balance of the calendar year from those which have prevailed during the last 24 months.

DELEGATES TO
CONVENTIONS
CHOSEN TODAY

Six States Selecting
Delegates to Nation-
al Political Conven-
tions.

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—The first of the April crop of delegates to the national political conventions in June were being picked today. Republicans making selections in three states and Democrats in a like number. From the delegates choosing standpoint it promised to be the bonny day thus far of a pre-convention campaign that has been a bit slow in getting under way.

On the day's calendar for both Republicans and Democrats were the Wisconsin primaries, with delegations of 23 to be picked by each party, and the rather perfunctory primaries in New York for ratifying states of 81 district Republican delegates and 86 district Democratic.

In addition, Maine Democrats, making use of the older convention system, assembled a Housatonic delegation of twelve, and Republicans in the sixth Kansas district were called together to name two convention representatives, thus completing the Kansas delegation of 24 that will go to Kansas City bent on bringing about the nomination of Senator Curtis, the Republican floor leader, who is the Kansas "favorite son."

In Wisconsin among the Republicans, today's primaries, afforded another show-down in the struggle between the La Follette faction and its more conservative foes. With the La Follette element supporting a slate of convention delegates pledged to Senator Norris, of Nebraska, a leader in the Senate Independent Republican group and the opposition backing an unstructured slate.

In the Wisconsin Democratic primary Smith, Reed and Walsh were pitted against each other, but on such a different footing that no conclusive test of strength was to be expected.

The New York primaries furnished the last step in the make-up of the state's Republican delegation of 90, which will be unstructured and because of that, and its size, may be somewhat of an unknown factor at the Kansas City convention.

PRESIDENT
CRITICIZES
FLOOD BILL

Coolidge Says Expen-
ditures Of Measure
Are Not Specifically
Set Forth

Washington, April 3.—(AP)—President Coolidge feels that the Jones flood control bill approved by the Senate and now before the House, is open to criticism because the expenditures it would authorize for protecting the Mississippi river from further disasters are not specifically set forth.

The bill makes it impossible in the President's judgment, to say how much flood control will cost. He holds that Senator Jones, the author of the bill now before the House, said that the final expense in completing the flood control work would be far above \$700,000,000.

All in all, as Mr. Coolidge views the situation, nothing has occurred to change his views from those already expressed in his annual message and subsequently in the press.

Pending final action of the House the President is having the Jones bill carefully investigated to determine its good and bad points with a view to advocating such amendments as may appear necessary in his estimation.

Representative Tilson, of Connecticut, the Republican leader, and chairman Snell of the House committee on legislative procedure, said they were desirous of bringing the flood measure up at the first opportunity.

Tilson, however, said that several obstacles had arisen, one of them the desire of the Illinois House delegation including chairman Reid of the flood control committee to be at home at the time of the Illinois primary next Tuesday. This, alone, he felt, would preclude consideration of the subject until that date.

Small Succeeds
Late Judge Bond

Raleigh, April 3.—(AP)—Solicitor Walter L. Small of Elizabeth City, today was appointed by Governor McLean as superior court judge of the first judicial district to succeed the late W. M. Bond.

Appointment of Herbert S. Leary, of Edenton, to succeed Mr. Small as solicitor was also announced.

Walter Lowry Small was elected solicitor in 1923 while practicing law at Elizabeth City under the firm name of Ehringhaus and Small. He was graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1911, later attending Columbia University.

Mr. Small was a member of the general assembly in 1915. He is a member of the Baptist Church.

FOUR ARRESTS
REPORTED IN
BOMB OUTRAGE

Chicago Officials Be-
lieve Murders and
Bombings Cleared
up by Confessions.

murders and several bombings, including those at the homes of United States Senator Deneen and Circuit Judge John A. Swanson, may be solved through arrests made by federal operatives last night.

One man arrested, whose identity was withheld, was understood to have confessed that he participated in half a dozen murders and many bombings. In each case, the reported confession said, he acted under the direction of Lorenzo Juliano, described as a gang leader under federal indictment for liquor law violation.

The government men indicated in brief, unofficial comment on the arrests that besides the Deneen-Swanson bombings they had solved the slaying of "the Dime," Diamond Joe Esposito, Theo night of March 21st.

One of four men arrested with Juliano was Arthur Forshan, identified as a federal under-cover agent who "sold out" to the gang against whom he was supposed to obtain evidence.

The motives involved in the Deneen-Swanson bombings and in the Esposito killing were not made known, but were understood to have been explained in the alleged confession.

The report around the federal building was that the man who made the confession said he was a special agent of Juliano's in the bombing of homes of those against whom Juliano held grudges. It was indicated that the investigation might possibly remove the bombings from politics. Into which classification they have heretofore been placed because of Judge Swanson's candidacy for state's attorney and Senator Deneen's leadership of the anti-Mayor Thompson Republicans.

Chicago, April 3.—(AP)—The conflict between city police and the federal government over what is to be done with "John Doe," a federal prohibition agent, for shooting a municipal court bailiff during a saloon raid last week, speeded Chicago politics today as the April 10 deadline of the primary election neared.

"John Doe," who is Myron Caffey, a federal agent, was given temporary freedom from both state and federal authorities yesterday under a "habeas corpus cum causa" writ, issued by federal judge Willerson.

All leaders of the two Republican factions waging bitter war for victory a week from today are now busy with speechmaking. Mayor Thompson and State's Attorney Crowe, leaders of one group, have appeared daily with Governor Len Small and Frank L. Smith, Republican candidate for United States Senatorial nomination. The Mayor. Not a candidate, urging the merits of the other three, and each pointing out reasons why he should be chosen.

Senator Deneen, heading the opposition group, has been equally active with Louis Emmerson, candidate for Republican nomination as governor and Judge John A. Swanson, opposing State's Attorney Crowe for nomination.

BASEBALL TRAINING SEASON GETS UNDER WAY HERE WITH BIG CROP TO CHOOSE FROM

With forty-odd players reported for action, training season of the Greenville baseball club began yesterday with two workouts under direction of Manager "Duncan" Jobb. Training continued today, both morning and afternoon, and indications were that the usual "pruning," or thinning out process, would get under way immediately.

Old-timers, who have watched ball players go and come in this part of the country for a number of years, generally agreed last night that the baseballists had a splendid crop of youngsters to choose from. In fact, virtually every player evinced signs of good training and it appeared that eliminating the inept would be rather a difficult task.

It is thought the personnel of the club to defend honors of the city during the coming season would be practically decided upon by the end of the week. In fact, the present number of players will be greatly diminished in the next day or so, and those whose performance has been marked by exceptional brilliance and consistency of training will find themselves with permanent berths.

The crop of youngsters come from all parts of the country, many of them having seen active service in college baseball on minor circuits in North Carolina and other states. The collection of mound artists and outfield men is quite numerous, and the infield aspirants are not conspicuous by their paucity, by any means.

More definite announcement concerning the club will be made as soon as the elimination process has been completed and the personnel of the club has virtually been established. This no doubt will be possible by the date of the first exhibition game to be played here with Richmond Medical College, next Monday morning.

Fans who have been wondering what sort of a club Greenville would start out with this season will have an opportunity of gaining a pretty good idea during the several exhibition games scheduled prior to the opening of the season April 25 with Greenville playing in Rocky Mount. Considerable interest is centered around the first contests, and it is expected large crowds will be in attendance.

Work in connection with improvements at the ball park was today making rapid progress. The diamond is daily being rounded into form and by the opening date it is expected to be in splendid condition. Seating accommodations will be adequate to care for the largest crowds of the season, members of the club stated when plans for the park were first announced, and this single feature alone is expected to add greatly to the comfort of the thousands that will crowd the stands and bleachers during the season.

Training season has opened up in the five other towns of the circuit, and within the next few days definite information concerning their rosters will be given out. As it is they are in the midst of selecting the cream to the sport from the numbers of youngsters vying for berths and have little time for anything else.

Hundreds of local enthusiasts have attended the workouts of the local club the past few days, and while many of them haven't been able to determine who's who or what's what they are looking forward to the time when they will be able to determine the status of the club. As soon as this point has been definitely established obscure players will begin to assume the form of idols of the hearts of countless thousands in this part of the state.

Pitty The Poor Male! Co-Eds In

Mid-West Crowded Him off Team

Chicago, (AP)—Pitty the poor male athlete in the co-ed colleges of the mid-west. His feminine class-mate is making him hustle for his place on the varsity team in at least two sports—fencing and golf.

One woman indeed "made" the college team in fencing the past season, won two out of three inter-collegiate matches with male opponents and was rated the best sword-wielder in the school.

That looked like a fluke and an accident, but the thing began to

take on significance recently when a crack girl golfer of national repute, daughter of one of the professors, announced her intention of going out for the golf team.

These up-and-coming feminists are Audrey Glenn, the fencer, of Michigan State College, and Dorothy Page of the University of Wisconsin, the golfer. Other girl athletes are watching them with interest, and their success may be followed by a general influx of women into the varsity squads, although no great amount of enthusiasm at this prospect has been registered by the men.

All the women want is a fair deal. If they are better than the men competing for places on the team, well, they figure they ought to get the place. On this basis Miss Glenn simply couldn't be kept off the fencing team, and her presence was reflected in the victory column for Michigan State.

It may be the same with Miss Page. As a girl of 18 in August, 1926, she won the women's western championship here by defeating Mrs. O. S. Hall and other crack contenders. Her game has been improving since, and she now comes close to being the best golfer player in her university. She scores regularly in the low eighties, and there aren't many male golfers in any one college who can beat that standard much.

The startling news that Miss Page would rather have a Wisconsin "W" than any of her many golfing cups and medals and meant to try for one was the signal for other Western Conference institutions to line up their feminine material. Northwestern found, for example, that it could call upon Florence Beebe, Illinois State Women's champion, and probably help its team thereby.

Miss Page is a sophomore and daughter of Professor W. H. Page of the Wisconsin law school.

Larry Benton met the challenge to pitch nine innings for the New York Giants by turning Washington back with one run, while the National Leaguers were counting ten. Ben struck a blow in his behalf in the shape of a home run. The world champion New York Yanks saw the Atlanta Crackers steal their thunder by smashing out 19 hits to score ten runs, just enough. Lou Gehrig's three triples proved interesting but not conclusive. Stan Coveleskie, attempting a comeback, found the Southerners trying to give him a setback. They took the lead while he was pitching and never were headed.

The bubbling spirits of the Chicago Cubs were near the boiling over point as they shelled the Pittsburgh Pirates into submission for the fifth time in as many chances. The score was 6 to 4. Art Nehf showed that there is life in the old cut-throat yet by pitching seven innings of good left handed baseball.

Brooklyn continued to go alone under the momentum of hard hitting behind good pitching and won from Jacksonville 12 to 4. The veteran, Bill Doak, took advantage of the youth of the Southeastern League and shut them out while he was pitching.

The St. Louis Cardinals stopped Knoxville of the "Sally" League, 9 to 8. The former cripples, Ray Blades and Chick Hafey, led the winning attack. Blades with four hits for nine bases exceeded his normal spring output.

Slightly stunned at Tulsa, where they get many of their players, by a first inning home run with the bases full, St. Louis Browns kept pecking away until they won, 9 to 8.

Vic Sorrell and George Smith shut out Del Pratt's Waco club as the Detroit Tigers scored seven runs, aided by five hits from Harry Rice's bat.

Four delegates at large will be chosen and two delegates from each of 11 congressional districts.

Senator George W. Norris, of Nebraska, was the only candidate for the Republican preferential vote, while his delegate candidates drawn from the Progressive ranks, are contesting principally with unstructured candidates. Election of candidates exposing the Progressives in three districts would enhance the personal fortunes of former Gov. Frank O. Lowden and Herbert Hoover.

The presidential aspirations of Gov. Alfred E. Smith, Senator James A. Reed and Senator Thomas J. Walsh figure in the Democratic contest. Senator Reed stood alone in bidding for the preference vote, but sought no delegates, the field being left to Smith and Walsh, with the latter only delegates at large.

Progressive Republicans under the leadership of Senator Robert M. La Follette, and John J. Blaine hope to gain control of the delegation to the Republican convention.
