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MR. COOLIDGE UNHAPPY OVER FLOOD ISSUE

Calls Chairman Madden to Discuss Action on Jones Control Bill

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Further indication that President Coolidge is concerned over the financial features of the Jones flood control bill was given today when he called Chairman Madden of the house appropriation committee, from his sick bed for a conference at the White House.

After his conference, the chairman said Mr. Coolidge "is not very happy" over the flood control situation in Congress and predicted that unless something is done "to clarify the atmosphere there will be something doing on the Wabash."

He did not amplify this remark as to whether the possibility of a presidential veto had been discussed.

Chairman Madden said he held with the President that the financial phase of the Jones bill was objectionable. Army engineers, he said, had estimated that final flood protection under that measure would total a billion and a half dollars and would "commit the government to every creek that is out of doors when it rains."

Madden said he thought the President still adheres to his original view that communities benefiting from flood control should share in the expense of such work.

Madden said he believed the bill now pending would appear to be an invitation to all communities to attempt to obtain relief indiscriminately from the federal government. "I have never seen such an attempt to invade the treasury for unlimited sums for every kind of proposal regardless of its merits as at the present time," the chairman said.

Asked whether he thought that Mr. Coolidge's objection to the present Jones bill would be strong enough to impel a veto if it should be passed in its present form, Representative Madden said that he did not feel authorized to reply.

Varying estimates of the cost of Mississippi valley flood control were presented today by members of the house flood control committee to the rules committee which considered the problem in connection with granting it legislative right of way.

Chairman Reid of the flood control committee declared that the flood control proponents differed in their views. Some hold that it will cost more than \$225,000,000, he said, and others believe that its cost will be less—around \$300,000,000, the figure cited in the plan of Major General Jadhvi, chief of army engineers.

"No one can definitely determine the exact cost until the engineers get on the ground," he added.

Reid, Representative Kopp, of Iowa and a Republican member of the committee, and head of the group which opposed the original Reid bill \$175,000,000 bill, Representative Cox, a Georgia Democrat, and the only opponent of the Jones measure in the committee were the principal witnesses before the rules group.

Four Persons Dead Result Cloudburst

Shawnee, Okla., April 5.—(AP)—A rain of cloudburst proportions that sent a muddy little creek rampaging through Shawnee last night without warning, claimed at least four lives, left 1,000 persons temporarily homeless today and caused damage estimated at \$1,000,000.

The known dead were Mrs. Joseph Campbell, 35, wife of an ice plant engineer; John Lewis, 77, who lived in a tent on the creek bank; Fred Campbell, 18; Jesse Cruz.

It was believed the total loss of life would reach six.

The missing included Mrs. Campbell's two small children, who were in the Campbell home when it was carried away.

Robert Edwards, 12, leaped from a stranded bus into the current and was believed to have drowned, while Mrs. Pauline Diaz was swept away while driving across a bridge in a wagon.

A score or more persons were injured in attempts to escape the flood.

To Ask Probe of Postoffice Case At Douglas, Ga.

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Investigation of the disposition of federal patronage in Georgia will be asked in a resolution prepared by Senator George, Democrat, Georgia, which he hopes to introduce today. Senator George is asking the investigation as the result of charges made by L. S. Peterson, Douglas, Ga., postmaster who killed himself recently and charged that he had been forced to contribute heavily to the Republican campaign fund in order to hold his job.

Senator Harris, Democrat, Georgia, is supporting the investigation. The postoffice department has promised an inquiry but the Georgia senators prefer also to make one of their own.

If the investigation is ordered, Senator George plans to have the postoffice and justice departments co-operate with the senate committee.

TALK MERGER OF RAILROADS AT NEW YORK

Consolidation of 50,000 Miles of Railway Lines Near Fruition Today.

New York, April 5.—(AP)—Executives of eastern railroads meeting here today to discuss merger plans adjourned shortly before 1 o'clock without making official announcement.

While the other executives remained for lunch, L. F. Loree, president of the Delaware and Hudson, left the conference room. He refused to comment, but it was learned unofficially that the executives had spent the morning in discussion of various consolidation plans.

Mr. Loree left the previous meeting early, it was recalled, but at that time it was said the discussion had centered upon other subjects in which he was said to be little interested.

New York, April 5.—(AP)—The destiny of over 50,000 miles of railroad lines related today on a conference of representatives of the leading transportation systems of the east, called to discuss merger plans.

The parties to the conference are the New York Central, the Pennsylvania, the Baltimore and Ohio, the Van Sweringen interests and L. F. Loree, president of the Delaware and Hudson railroad.

Developments in the financial and railroad worlds the last few days led observers to believe that the movement which was started over four years ago was near fruition, with only minor details to be agreed upon.

Reports were unanimous that the Pennsylvania had withdrawn its support of the Loree fifth trunk line and that an agreement for only four main trunk lines would be reached.

According to reports, the Pennsylvania would acquire the New York, New Haven and Hartford; the New York Central would be allotted the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western and a half interest in the Lehigh Valley; the other half going to the Nickel Plate; the Baltimore and Ohio would gain control of the Reading; the Central railroad of New Jersey and lines of the Wabash east of the Mississippi. The Wabash line west of the Mississippi would go to the Union Pacific.

Kiwanians Will Hold Inter-Club Meet at Bethel

The Kiwanis Clubs of Tarboro, Wilmington and Greenville will hold an inter-club meeting at Bethel Friday evening at 7 o'clock, according to announcement made today by President Frank Harrington, of the Greenville Club.

Governor Pough and other officers of the district are scheduled to attend the session and tell members of these three towns of some of the ambitions for the future.

The program will be in charge of J. F. Harrington, president of the local club.

New Farm Bill Provides Distinct Remedies For Nation's Farm Situation

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—The new McNary-Haugen bill introduced yesterday was described to the house today in a formal report by Chairman Haugen of its agriculture committee as a measure differing materially from that vetoed a year ago by President Coolidge and so modified that it now proposes "two distinct and entirely separable remedies" for the farm situation.

"The changes which have been made," he said, "meet in a large part the objections expressed by the President in his message returning the former measure without his approval."

"Especially does the present bill provide an almost unlimited opportunity for the administrative body created under it to deal with the problem of agricultural surpluses through loans, which those who have opposed the past committee bills urged would be fully adequate to meet the situation."

The present bill proposes two distinct and entirely separable remedies—first, loans to co-operate associations to a low rate of interest, as frequently suggested by the secretary of agriculture, Mr. Jardine, and, second, in case of failure of the first remedy to accomplish the purposes of the act, the making of marketing agreements providing that cost and losses on transactions au-

thorized under the agreements would be paid by the commodity whose producers receive the direct benefit.

"Both methods are directed toward promoting orderly marketing and, in the case of tariff protected commodities, making the tariff effective."

Mr. Haugen declared that if any court should restrain the proposed federal farm board from entering into marketing agreements finance by equalization fees, that the board, under the new bill, would be entirely free to operate under the loan provisions.

"The committee does not believe that the contingency will arise," he continued, "but if the constitutionality of any provision relating to marketing agreements is not sustained the bill still would present a workable whole."

"If all the major proposals of the bill are sustained, which the committee believes will be the case, then in addition to providing marketing assistance to co-operatives through loans the measure would permit producers of surplus commodities to receive an assured benefit from operations financed by fees collected upon such commodities."

Many specific changes were made to meet "executive objections." These were set forth.

HOUSTON MAN DENIES TRICK MANIPULATION

Clayton Replies to Charges that Cotton Profits Came Out of Competitors.

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Success of the great cotton merchandising firm of Anderson Clayton & Co., has been due to its "world wide organization" and to sale of cotton in far corners of the earth, William L. Clayton, head of the Houston, Texas, house told the Senate cotton market investigating committee today in closing his direct reply to charges of market manipulation.

Clayton denied flatly that the firm's profits had been taken out of its competitors through tricky market operations as has been charged by Arthur R. Marshall, New York exchange broker.

Clayton said Congress, if it thought it unwise that a single firm handle as much as 15 per cent of the American crop, could of course, limit transactions by any one firm, but that if Congress did so it would be "a happy day for some of our competitors, but principally for those foreign merchants whose business has been interrupted by our policy of going direct to the spinner."

It would also be pleasing, he added, to the small group of reactionaries on the New York cotton exchange who wish to renew their old occupation of market manipulation without suffering the embarrassment of having to face a bale of real cotton every time they guess wrong.

Clayton, put the actual total of the amount borrowed by his firm from the war finance corporation at various times in handling export cotton, at \$7,000,000, one-tenth of the amount set by Mr. Marshall. "Those transactions," he declared, "represented only 10 per cent of the total business of the firm in marketing cotton during the period concerned. Any other cotton merchant could have had the same access to government funds," he added, "had they wished to assume the risks involved."

PROMISE ROW ON REDUCTION OF TAX ISSUE

Democratic Members of Senate Finance Committee Seek Total Slash of \$300,000,000.

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—A real row on tax reduction was asserted today with the announcement by Democratic members of the senate finance committee that they would seek a total slash of at least \$300,000,000 as opposed to the \$200,000,000 minimum proposed by Secretary Mellon.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina, ranking Democrat on the committee, carried this program to the committee room today upon instructions of a conference of majority members last night, but he faced an apparently futile fight with the Republican majority of the committee lining up solidly behind the treasury suggestions.

Democrats also have decided to ask for brief hearings on permit automobile manufacturers to answer the contention of Secretary Mellon that only manufacturers were behind the "propaganda" for repeal of this three per cent levy. They also will permit others interested in the bill to come before the committee, including the chamber of commerce of the United States, which has opposed the treasury.

The Democratic program includes repeal of the automobile tax which was voted by the house but opposed by the administration. They also would join in the movement for revision of the intermediate surtax rates, the graduated rates for corporations with small incomes, a house provision; and increasing the exemption on admissions.

Under Secretary Mellon said today that if the Democrats should succeed in their attempt to reduce taxes by \$300,000,000, the treasury would be faced with a deficit of approximately \$100,000,000.

"The treasury figures," he said, "are based on careful calculation and are figures that the treasury department believes are substantially accurate. If the Democrats can tell us where the figures are wrong we will be grateful, but they have not even attempted to show inaccuracies in the treasury estimates, but have arbitrarily set \$300,000,000 as tax reduction."

Mr. Depew suffered a chill while coming to New York last week from a five weeks' vacation in St. Augustine. On Sunday he was stricken with a cold and on the advice of Dr. H. Lyman Hooker, remained in bed at his home here. Monday he became unconscious and medical consultants were called in. Tuesday he improved and regained consciousness.

After a good day yesterday, Mr. Depew began to decline at 7 o'clock last night. Members of his family were summoned to the bedside. These included Mrs. Depew, a son, Chauncey M. Depew, Jr., and a niece, Miss Anne Depew Paulding. When it became apparent that he was dying the servants and the household staff were summoned to the bedside.

Mr. Depew retained his interest in politics until the end. In February, 1927, he predicted the reelection of President Coolidge if prosperity should continue and expressed the belief that the President would even carry New York against Governor Alfred E. Smith, should the latter be the Democratic nominee.

In the exciting campaign of 1880, he took the stump in behalf of Lincoln and built up a personal following that enabled him a year later to become the Republican representative in the state assembly of a district regarded then as strongly Democratic.

Chauncey M. Depew Dies Today Following Attack Of Bronchial Pneumonia

New York, April 5.—(AP)—Chauncey M. Depew, picturesque old man, who entered politics before Lincoln was mentioned for the presidency and for more than 70 years was famed as an after dinner speaker, died at his home at 4:30 a. m. today of bronchial pneumonia.

He had been ill for less than a week and would have been 94 years old on April 23. He continued an active career until the end, serving as chairman of the board of the New York central railroad. He intended to attend the Republican national convention in Kansas City in June. With the exception of the 1924 convention in Cleveland, he had attended every Republican convention as a delegate, nine in all, since 1888. At his first convention he received 99 votes for the presidential nomination, but withdrew in favor of Benjamin Harrison. His wit in rousing political speeches was a feature of conventions and caused him in early days to be known as "the peach."

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THREE KILLED BY TORNADES IN SOUTHWEST

More Than Score Also Injured by Twisters in Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Kansas City, April 5.—(AP)—Tornadoes climaxed a general wind and rain storm which caused at least three deaths, left more than a score injured and damaged buildings at widely separated points in the southwest yesterday.

First reported in southern Kansas and northern Oklahoma the storm swept southeast into Arkansas where a tornado in Washington county devastated a large area. One person was known to have been killed and a score were injured.

Two tornadoes occurred in Texas. One man perished and hundreds were driven from their homes when 6.81 inches of rain fell in half hour at Shawnee, Okla., last night. While the storm at Shawnee lasted less than an hour, water rose to a height of five feet in some sections of the city.

One body was recovered and identified as that of a man named Lewis. A Mrs. Campbell and a baby were missing.

Heavy damage in Kansas occurred in the oil fields of Greenwood and Butler counties. The wind reached an estimated velocity of 80 miles an hour in that region. Mrs. Anna Green, 25, was killed at her home near Topeka when she was buried under the wreckage of a building.

Reports of minor losses came from numerous points in the southwest. Tremain, a village near Shawnee, Okla., also was hard hit by hail. High winds swept Rock Springs, Texas, where more than 50 persons were killed in a tornado last April. Communication lines were crippled, but damage in Rock Springs was light.

Fayetteville, Ark., April 5.—(AP)—Counting his losses at one end and at least 15 injured. Two dead, usually Washington county today began a check of property damage from last night's twister that swept in from Oklahoma and at the same time, with Benton and Carroll counties, reached farther across with concern.

The tornado followed on the trail of torrential rain with a severe Oklahoma forest fire and the Ozarks reserve from further the losses and struck first at Beat community, near Lincoln, where Trop Spears, 12, was killed and five other members of his family injured when their house was demolished.

Marion Spears, father of the family, with his chest crushed, was probably fatally injured. His wife and two more sons were injured less seriously, but his mother-in-law Mrs. Mary Payne, 85, was in a serious condition.

The Spears boys were blown into a nearby field, where his body was found. A younger brother crawled under a bed, and escaped without a scratch while the house was blown from above him.

The tornado also struck near Viney Grove and injured Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Wilson.

The Dea Osborn home in the Beaty community was swept away and Osborn, his wife and child, were injured. Another Osborn child was found on a bed in the field. The father placed the child on the bed just before the storm broke and the wind picked the bed up and it some distance away without doing harm to its occupant.

Mrs. J. E. Kerr, her daughter, Mrs. R. D. Yeager, and a Mrs. Clouse, all of the Beaty community were also injured when their home was blown away, and Mrs. Kate Simpson was burned badly when her house caught fire. She was rescued from the burning dwelling by rescuers but it not expected to recover.

One Hundred Ton Whale is Reached At Wrightsville

Wilmington, April 5.—(AP)—Residents of Wrightsville Beach today had as new beach scenery a 54 foot whale, washed ashore last night. The huge mammal, by far the largest ocean denizen ever beached in this section, is estimated to weigh between 75 and 100 tons.

The whale apparently died, was sighted shortly after daybreak with one of its flippers, said to measure 22 feet in length, protruding from the water.

Thousands of Wilmington people today went to the beach to see the whale, which health officials said would not be disturbed for two or three days that all might see it. Health authorities, however, were busy devising ways and means of removing the immense mass before it can become a sanitation problem.

German Airmen Plane Take Off Sometime Friday

Dublin, April 5.—(AP)—The German airplane Bremen today was fueled at Baldonnel air base and ready to take off at a few hours notice. The field itself still was soft from recent rains and authorities said there was little chance of the heavily laden plane being able to take off for New York before tomorrow.

MINORS ROMP ON BIG BOYS FROM MAJORS

New York, April 5.—(AP)—Annual educational tours of major league baseball clubs through the minors are developing into riot and take affairs in which the little fellows are giving baseball's best some terrific punishment.
The New York Yankees, Brooklyn Robins and St. Louis Cardinals were defeated by minor league opposition yesterday, while the Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago White Sox had to go into extra innings to win and the Boston Braves and Cincinnati Reds spent part of the afternoon trying to get even so they could finally move on to victory.
The Yankees bowed to Nashville 11 to 10 in 10 innings. Ruth hit his second homer in two days but it was not a novelty for the game produced three other circuit smashes. The winning Volunteers out hit the world's champions.

Frankie Frisch went from the sublime to the ridiculous with four hits and two errors. His errors hurt the cards more than his hits helped and St. Louis fell before Evansville of the Three Eye league, 11 to 7.

Atlanta downed Brooklyn 9 to 8 with Robby's ace, Dizzy Vance and Jess Peity doing tip pitching for the Robins.

The Giants continued to outbait the Washington Senators and were helped to victory 9 to 7, by wobbly fielding on the part of the American leaguers. Jahn blasted a home run as a suggestion that the New York club did a smart thing when it drafted him.

Chicago's White Sox came through with three runs in the tenth inning to win 5 to 2 from Louisville. The Sox made no headway against the aged Nick Cully, still good enough as a pitcher to have a horse named for him. Old Nick allowed no hits in his five innings.

The Dallas Steers could gather but three hits from Vangilder and Sullivan, the Detroit Tigers winning 7 to 0. Paul Easterling's homer helped. A few more may win him an outfield place.

Weismuller Still Champion Swimmer

Chicago, April 5.—(AP)—Grinning Johnny Weismuller is still America's speediest swimmer.
Competing last night again in the fastest field he has ever faced, in the National A. A. U. indoor championships, he scored a close victory over Walter Lauffer of the Lake Shore A. C., Chicago, to retain his title in the 100 yard free style event. His time was 50 4-5 seconds, just one second slower than his world's mark which many think will stand for years.
Weismuller also led the Illinois A. C. team to its third national title and third world's relay record in two nights—the 300 yard medley relay. The time was 3:50-3-5 seconds—3-5 second faster than the previous international record which was held by the I. A. C. Tuesday and the I. A. C. team shattered the world's marks in the 400 and 500 yard relays.

One-Bounce Rule Up

Chicago, April 5.—(AP)—The one-bounce rule, stalling and the center jump were subjects for airing today at the annual meeting of the national association of basketball coaches.

While having no power to make rules the coaches may make suggestions to the national rules committee. The upset was scored by Earl Lookabaugh, 29 year old Chicago youth who beat the champion, ex-patrol of Philadelphia, 50 to 41, in 54 innings in the feature and yesterday's first defeat in as many tournament matches.

AWAIT REPORTS ON FOREST FIRES TODAY

Little Rock, Ark., April 4.—(AP)—Reports on the efficacy of last night's rain in checking fires which have raged many days in the Ouachita national crest were awaited by forestry officials today to determine steps yet necessary to rid the government of the destructive blazes.
Rains fell in several sections of the national reserve last night, reports indicated, but their effect on the spreading flames was not immediately determined.

ITALIAN REGISTERS TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT

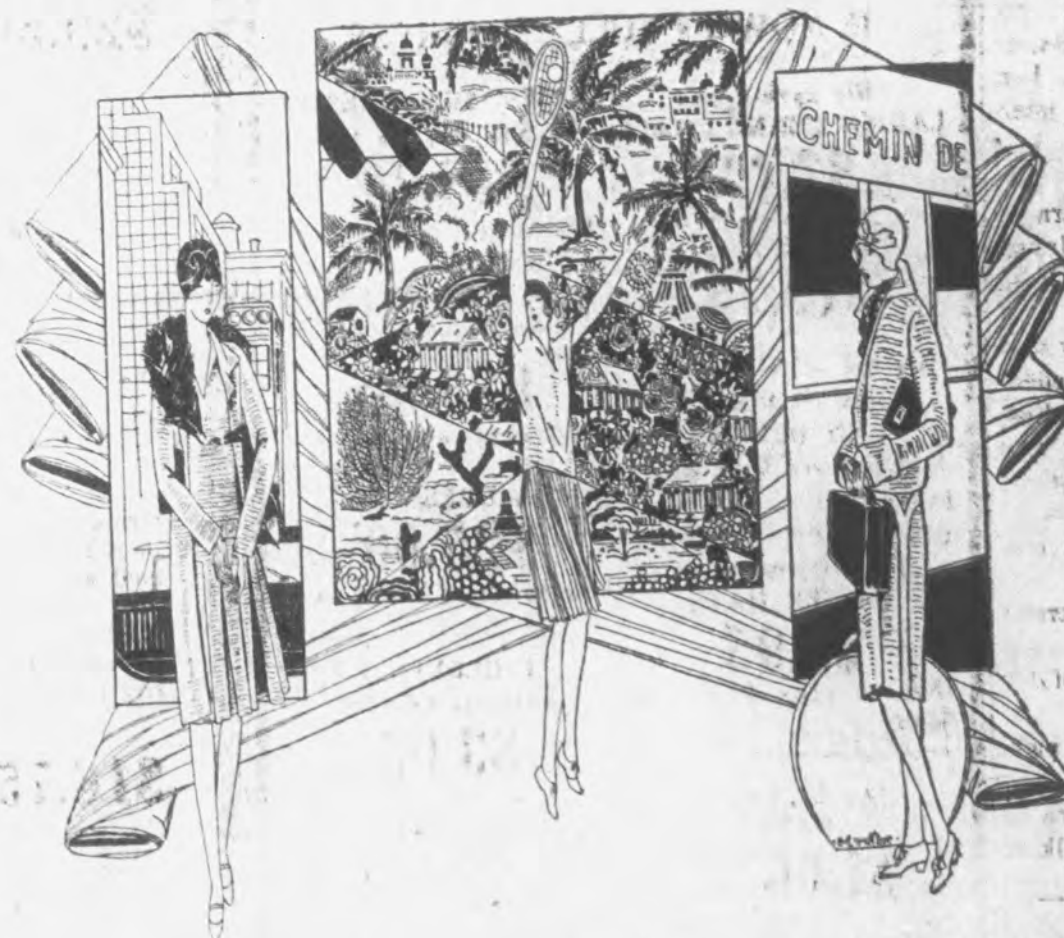

MANY ISSUES TAKEN UP BY SENATE BODY

House Also Has Number of Important Matters Under Consideration Today.

Thursday: Senate takes up McNary-Haugen bill while Newton proposal to permit formation buying pools to combat foreign monopolies comes before house.

Senate finance committee continues closed sessions on new tax bill.

Cotton and grain hearings proceed before senate agriculture committees.

House committees consider flood control, barge lines, agricultural and immigration proposals.

Senate passed District of Columbia appropriation bill and several uncontested bills on calendar, including one to settle claims against food administration grain corporation; grain corporation and received motion by Heflin, Ala., for removal of shipping board; house passed several minor bills, including one for international pan-American highway; listened to prohibition tilt between Cramton and Black and appointed committee of 22 to attend Galloway funeral.

Senate foreign relations committee favorably reported nominations Joseph C. Grew, New Hampshire, be ambassador to Turkey, and Franklin M. Gunther, Virginia, be minister of Egypt.

Senate finance committee favored reduction corporation tax from 13 1-2 per cent to 12 per cent instead of 11 1-2 per cent voted by house; Democrats decided seek tax reduction \$300,000,000 as opposed to administration \$200,000,000.

Cotton and grain hearings continued before other senate committees.

In minority report, three Republican members house military committee opposed ten million dollar appropriation for proposed Muscle Shoals federal corporation.

House patents committee heard opposition to copyright bill proposed by American Society of Authors, Composers and Publishers.

An elections committee favored representative England, Republican, sixth West Virginia district, retaining seat in contest brought by J. Alfred Taylor, Democratic opponent.

Bill to permit relatives American citizens to enter country as non-quota immigrants favorably reported by house immigration committee.

House merchant marine subcommittee approved White bill looking to private operation government fleet through government construction loans, long term foreign mail contracts and government insurance.

\$250,000 Pearl Necklace Lost In the Mails

New York, April 5.—(AP)—A \$250,000 pearl necklace, lost in the mails between Paris and London, was being sought in New York today. Advertisements in this morning's papers offered \$50,000 reward for information leading to its recovery.

Destined for an American woman whose name was not revealed, the strand of 57 perfectly matched rose-cream gems was mailed on February 23 by a clerk in the Paris office of Cartier, Inc., jewelers, to the firm's London branch. It never was delivered.

The necklace was assembled after many months of searching for perfectly graduated pearls, the weight of which ranged from seven to 36.72 grams. Its clasp was set with three diamonds. A complete description of the string and each separate pearl has been given by the Paris police to every large city in this country and Europe.

CRITICAL SITUATION PREVAILS AT HANKOW

Peking, April 5.—(AP)—Official foreign reports say that a critical situation has arisen in Hankow because of the refusal of the French authorities to hand over alleged Communists, now refugees within the French concession.

Hu Tsung-Hu, commander at Hankow, has sent a telegram to General Chiang Kai-Shek, commander-in-chief of the nationalist army, accusing the French consul of accepting a bribe of \$200,000 (Mexican) for harboring the Communists and urging seizure of the French concessions as the British one was seized in January, 1927. Fosters have been distributed in the native city of Hankow urging a boycott.

The French legation at Peking said today that the trouble resulted from the consul's refusal to give up two Chinese women alleged to be Communists, since they were political refugees. The legation denied the bribery accusation which is not credited in any responsible foreign quarter and stated that any attempt to seize the concession would be resisted vigorously. One French gunboat already is in Hankow and other forces will be dispatched there if needed.

WOMAN EXPLORER OUT UNDER BOND

New York, April 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Esther Wilson, Arctic explorer and big game hunter, charged with shooting her husband, was free under \$25,000 bail today.

Bail was furnished by Samuel Rothberg, known as "Stich" McCarthy, the "Mayor of Grand Street." Rothberg is a professional bondsman. Mrs. Wilson had been in jail since last Thursday.

\$200,000 FIRE VISITS ATLANTIC CITY TODAY

Atlantic City, April 5.—(AP)—Fire of undetermined origin, believed incendiary, early today destroyed eight business establishments and damaged several residences. The loss was estimated at \$200,000.

SAYS GOD TOLD HIM TO MURDER HIS CHILDREN

Durham Farmer Tells of Brutal Killing as Small Victims are Laid to Rest.

Durham, April 5.—(AP)—With their father held in jail here charged with their deaths, three children, ages 12, 9 and 4 years, whose bodies were found early Wednesday morning hacked to pieces by an axe, were buried today.

Funeral services for Cecil, Lois and Joseph Roberson were held from the Roberson Grove Baptist Church, Durham county, with the Rev. Z. B. Teel officiating. The bodies were placed side by side in one coffin and one grave.

Meanwhile, Bay Roberson, 39, saw mill operator and the father, remained in his jail cell here, apparently grasped by changing moods. He muttered at times, unintelligibly, staring vacantly into space. Big of stature, strong armed, Roberson appeared to be a man of little reasoning power when addressed by visitors.

Sheriff John Harward's office was arranging today to have state hospital for the insane examine Roberson to determine the condition of his mind.

"God told me to do it," was Roberson's answer to Sheriff Harward who asked him about the slaying. "God told me to kill them, and I had to do it."

"Did the little girl scream when you struck her?" asked the sheriff. "Yes, she screamed but I had to kill her."

The sheriff had in his office today as evidence, two axes, spotted with blood. The handle of one was broken, authorities concluding with that another axe was brought into play when the first was rendered less effective.

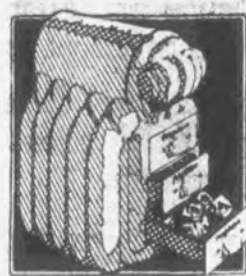
Banker Believed Drowned.

IMMIGRATION BILL BEFORE HOUSE AGAIN

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Advocates of the box bill to restrict immigration from western hemisphere nations had another turn today before the house immigration committee.

Representatives Allgood, of Alabama, argued that the farmers of his state were being forced to compete in the production of cotton with Mexican labor of the southwest.

The farms in his section of the state, he said, were operated almost entirely by the white owners. One county in his district he added, had only seventy-four negro families upon farms and more than 5,000 white farmers.

James H. Patten, of Washington, who said he represented the sons of America and twelve other organizations, declared the same conditions prevailed in parts of South Carolina

as had been described in Alabama. Since the price decline after the World War, Patten said, the farmers and tenants of his section had been hard pressed and there had been small if any profit to the cotton farmer.

PUBLISHER SUCCEEDS DEAD SENATOR

Washington, April 5.—(AP)—Arthur H. Vandenberg, publisher of the Grand Rapids Herald, took the oath of office today as Senator from Michigan, succeeding the late Woodbridge N. Ferris. This increased the Republican membership to 48 with the Democratic members remaining at 44. There is one Farmer-Labor member and three seats are vacant.

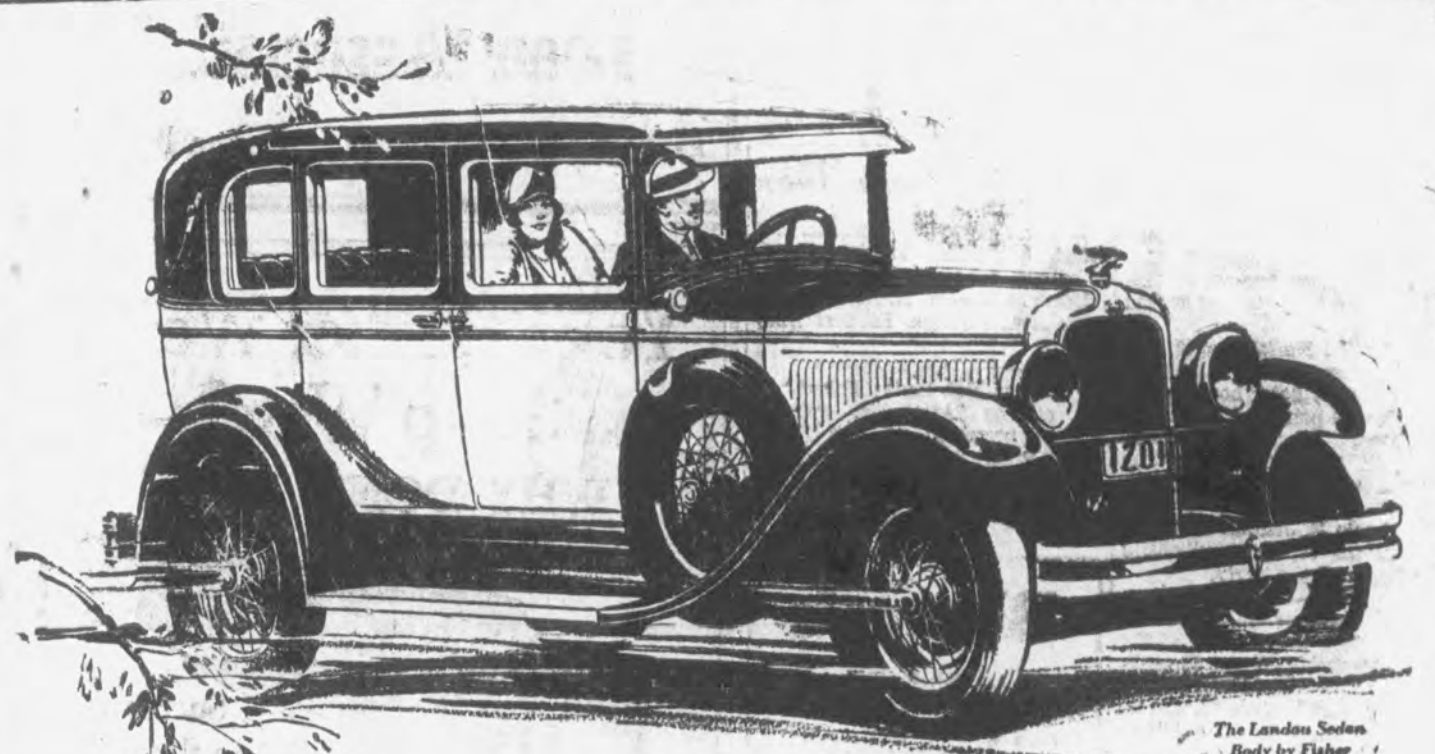

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 5.—(AP)—Speculators for the advance continued in control of the price movement in today's stock market which was featured by the heavy buying of the railroad shares. Extreme gains in the active issues ranged from 1 to nearly 12 points, with more than two score individual shares amounting to new high ground. Trading showed a moderate expansion in volume, with every indication that the day's sales would cross the 3,000,000 share mark for the 19th consecutive full session. Eastern railroad executives adjourned without making any announcement regarding their consolidation plan, but the persistent accumulation of the carrier shares indicated that progress had been made. Call money advanced from 5 to 5 1-2 per cent in the early afternoon as banks called loans in anticipation of heavy week-end demands for currency. Delaware & Hudson assumed the

leadership of the railroad group by soaring nearly 12 points. Pittsburgh & West Virginia extended its early gain to nearly 8 points and Hudson & Manhattan, Reading, Texas & Pacific, Wabash and Lehigh Valley climbed 3 to 5 points. U. S. East Iron Pipe was run up 10 points, DuPont and Purdy Baking each advanced 8 points. Interboro Rapid Transit, 7 and General Motors, Continental Can, Abraham & Straus, Brooklyn Manhattan Transit, the Schulte retail stores sold 5 or more points higher. There were a few soft spots. Wright Aeronautical, after climbing 5 1-2 points to 137 1-2, dropped to 128 1-2 and Curtiss Aeroplane sold down 3 1-2 points. Coppers were in brisk demand in the early afternoon. Greene Cananea jumped 5 points and Anaconda was turned over in large volume touching a new high at 65 7-8. The close was strong. Total sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.

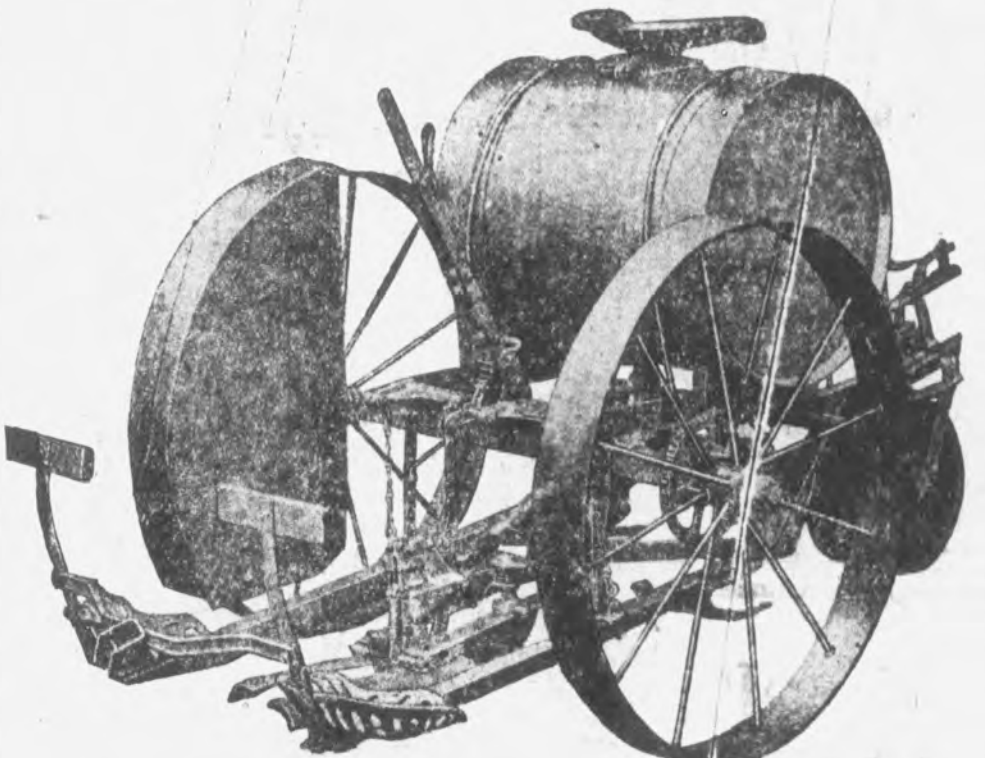
