



BIG LEAGUES ALL SET FOR OPENING DAY

The alibi "these don't count" has gone into the discard with last year's major league uniforms the clubs have worn in their spring junkets through the south and west and the time has come to think of serious things.

Everything Washington and Boston do today will be used against them and the other 14 clubs of the two leagues place themselves in a responsible position tomorrow. President Coolidge will start the curtain raiser with no chance that he will be batted from the mound for he has to throw but one ball and the fireworks can start.

The Senators, beset by injuries, may need all the presidential help they can get in their advanced opening. Their opponents, the Boston Red Sox, have everything to gain and nothing to lose.

Even their friends have picked them to finish far down in the second division and if they can play themselves anywhere near the top of the second tier, they will be regarded as getting somewhere. Washington, on the other hand, has received some championship support, slight but encouraging to Bucky Harris and his associates. As the long grind starts for all National League outfits and six of the American League standard bearers, managers are impressing upon their athletes the advantage of a flying start.

Last season the Athletics played the first part of the schedule for fun and the rest of the race in a vain effort to get even. As was the case last year, Connie Mack's Philadelphiaans meet the champion New York Yankees at the gun.

The stand-pat Yankees, who have found the going hard in their spring games, have advised their friends to "wait until the season starts." The friends have waited and the champions must now put up or shut up. Manager Huggins' pitchers are ready. He will learn if he has enough of them.

Connie Mack offers an old baseball act in a brand new setting when he presents Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker on the same club. He will also know if his pitchers are as good as he thinks.

Pittsburgh, defending its National League title, is sure to see plenty of pitching in its opening series. The Cards may have their sharpshooters, too, and the Cards-Pirates matchup should leave no doubt that the season has started.

More than a baseball game will be the National League opening in New York, where the Giants and Braves clash. The two clubs are filled with players who have worn the colors of both. Rogers Hornsby, Eddie Farrell, Kent Greenfield and Zach Taylor will try to show McGraw that he was wrong when Larry Benton and Frank Hogan, the probable New York battery, came to New York from Boston.

Cleveland and Chicago, longer on pitching than in any other department of play, are fairly evenly matched on the basis of their training records and the early pitching may reduce the hitting to a minimum. The Chicago Cubs at Cincinnati will try their hardest to get away to a good start in what they regard as a pennant year while Jack Hendricks will have his first chance to prove that his team has been under-rated by the critics.

Detroit and St. Louis, playing this year at Detroit, will hope that the Michigan weather is more reasonable than Missouri elements encountered last year when it seemed for a time that the season could not be opened within a week of the scheduled start. Only one game was played in the first series of 1927 and that failed to reach a decision. Manager Moriarty is depending on Whitehill to southward his team to a commanding place and will give him his first chance at the outset. Dan Howley will have his fingers crossed on the St. Louis bench.

With Brooklyn's great pitching staff only waiting to see the whites of the Phillies' eyes before the shoot, Burt Shotton's batsmen will be given an early initiation. Several of the new Phillies will be playing their first major league game tomorrow.

COOLIDGE TO OPEN CAPITAL BALL SEASON

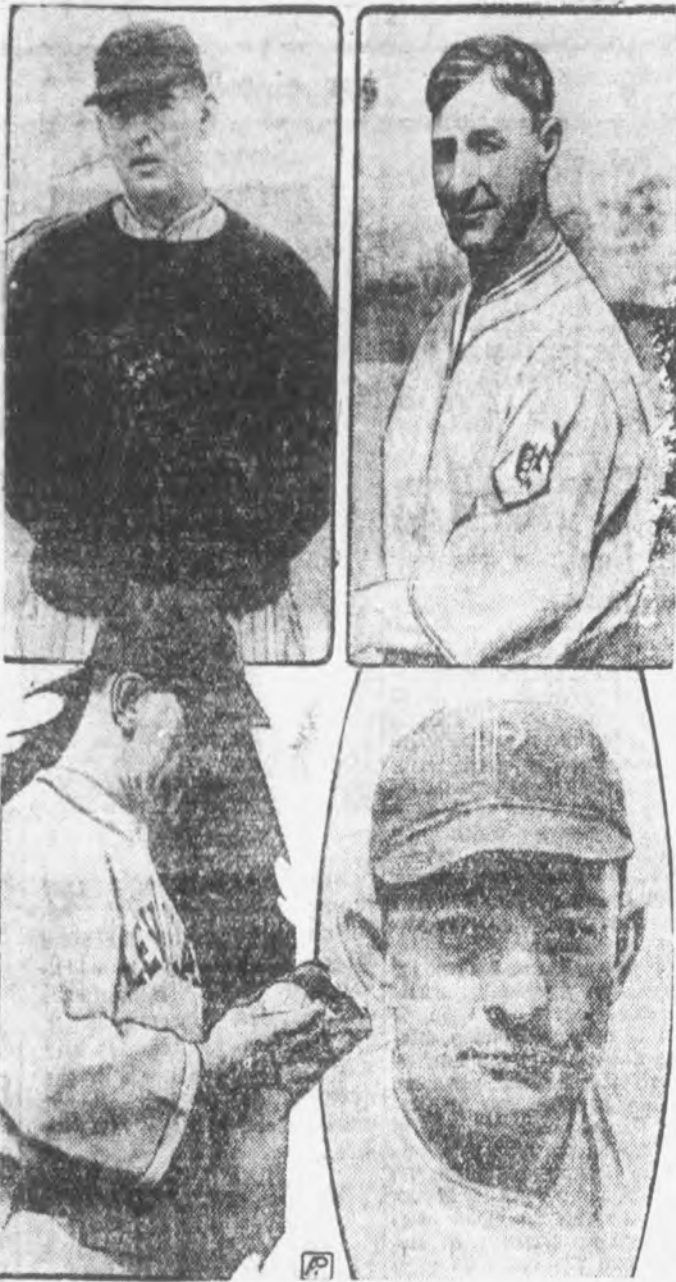
Washington, April 10.—(AP)—President Coolidge planned to lead a host of baseball fans to American league park today to see Washington and Boston pry the lid off the major league season while the other 14 teams waited until tomorrow for their first games.

The opening a day ahead was arranged so that the executive could participate in the ceremonies in initiating the season of 1928. The Senators will jump to Boston tomorrow for the second game of the series.

Rated a first division contender, Washington faced the barrier with a thoroughly revamped lineup and while all were eager for the day the weather man was not so encouraging, predicting rain and colder temperatures.

Four New Managers Open Season

Shatley and Shotton are "freshman managers" who never piloted a major league club before. It will be interesting to see where they finish.

New York. (AP)—Four major league managers start the 1928 season by making their debuts as pilots of the clubs they head and two of them never have managed big league outfits before.

Jack Shatley of the Boston Braves and Burt Shotton of the Phillies are real freshmen, breaking in as bosses in the National. Both were major league players in their day. Shatley was a catcher and Shotton an outfielder.

Bill McKenchie is starting all fresh as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals where he was a coach and assistant manager last year but he was manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1925 when he won a pennant and world's championship.

Roger Peckinpaugh, the only new manager in the American league, has succeeded Jack McAllister as director of the playing end at Cleveland. Peck managed the New York Yankees for a time when they were known as the Highlanders. Peck was an infielder then and will play again if the occasion seems to justify it. He has no designs, however, on the position of Bucky Harris, who was his team-mate at Washington, as the only regular playing manager left.

MAJOR LEAGUE MANAGERS SAY THEY HAVE IT

New York, April 10.—(AP)—Not a manager in major league baseball is downhearted. As the season opens they all declare that they feel great and have the utmost confidence in their players. Some of them may be whistling to keep their courage up as they pass the graveyard, but they are whistling.

Not even a disastrous series of defeats by both major and minor league in the teams in the south has caused Miller Huggins to repudiate his world's champion Yankees. "We have the team," is Huggins' boast.

Owen Bush, leader of the Pittsburgh Pirates, National League champions, has forgotten the world series and sees improvement. "Adams has made our infield and we have plenty of pitchers," states his case.

Connie Mack does not claim a pennant for his Athletics but he expects them to make their presence felt earlier in the race. "Last year we were slow starting. We should do better this season," he hopes.

Bill McKenchie is watching his old team, the Pittsburgh Pirates, from the bench of the St. Louis Cardinals. "We must be at the Pirates to win and I feel we have the team to turn the trick," Bill suggested.

Bucky Harris is banking on the Washington pitchers. "I believe we have a good supply of pitchers, both right handers and left handers," the boy manager figures.

John J. McGraw points with pride to the splendid condition of the New York Giants. "We will be hard to beat," is the veteran's prediction.

George Moriarty styles Detroit a combative unit. "We have a fight in our club and must be reckoned with," is his challenge.

Joe McCarthy visions a close race

with the Cubs very much in it. "Cuyler helped us. The Pirates will be tough to beat and so will the Cards and Giants," is his diagnosis.

Ray Schalk, on the Chicago White Sox, as a catcher should, looks at his pitchers. "Our pitchers look to be much better than they were last year," he says.

Jack Hendricks expects the Cincinnati Reds to spring a surprise. "We have a better club than we are credited with," is his warning.

Roger Peckinpaugh likes the mental attitude of the Cleveland Indians. "We have a hustling, satisfied bunch of players. They will give the fans their money's worth," he guarantees.

Brooklyn will show its pitchers more consideration, Manager Wilbert Robinson believes. "We will make more runs this year and Bancroft will be a great help," Roby announces.

Dan Howley has made the St. Louis Browns over between seasons and thinks he has done a good job. "We are gambling with some young players but I am sure we have made a good bet," is his statement.

Jack Shatley looks with satisfaction at the addition of Rogers Hornsby and his bat to the Boston Braves. "Hornsby has given us a punch," he suggests.

The health and strength of the Boston Red Sox pleases Bill Carrigan. "The boys are ready but they must do the playing. No one can do it for them," he says.

Burt Shotton does not have to answer for the baseball sins of the Phillies of other years and he has impressed upon the players that this is another year. "We hope to get results by playing 'heads up' baseball," Burt declared.

## N. Y. MAYOR PAYS HORROR TO R. E. LEE

Jimmy Walker Takes Leading Part in Unveiling Stone Mountain Memorial.

Atlanta, Ga., April 10.—(AP)—A dapper Mayor of New York, known as the very quizzicalness of Yankee bustle and go, today had given a new demonstration of the healing effects of time—by dominating a ritual sacred to the old south of 1865.

At the impressive unveiling of the head of Robert E. Lee, and last night at a banquet in honor of dignitaries assembled from all sections of the country for the rites, Mayor James J. Walker of New York yesterday occupied principal spots on the program dedicating the giant memorial to the confederacy on the steep side of Stone Mountain.

Abandoning his proverbial "wise cracks" for more serious flights of eloquence, Mayor Walker brought repeated salvos of applause from the remnant of Lee's army which stood about the base of the solid granite mountain while the ceremonies were proceeding.

Waving his hand toward the gigantic figure of Lee, in gargantuan bas-relief in the stone cliff, the New York Mayor evoked the rebel yell from the gray-clad veterans when he said:

"I am proud that I am an American because he was one. Lee was the only man in whom God joined the warrior and the Saint. Long after the Pyramids have crumbled, his figure, like his memory, will still be here."

A vast crowd stood through a drizzling rain while the ritual went forward at the mountain.

Atlanta, Ga., April 10.—(AP)—A Confederate uniform will soon be conspicuous wherever the official staff of the Mayor of New York forgoethers.

The Mayor James J. Walker decided yesterday during a long chat with little 4 year old Robert E. Lee IV, here to give the signal at the unveiling of the equestrian figure of his great grandfather, General Robert E. Lee, on Stone Mountain.

The diminutive Lee, who came south with his father, Dr. Bolling Lee, of New York City, became a "regular buddy" of the Mayor's on the special train to Stone Mountain and Mr. Walker later told news-

papermen that he intended appointing the youthful Robert on his official staff. Upon doing this, he said, he would have made an exact copy of General Lee's uniform, now preserved in Richmond, Va., and would request that Robert wear it on all state occasions.

Ralph Rosenberg Dead.

Asheville, April 10.—(AP)—Ralph Rosenberg, 38, vice-president of the Carolina Wood Products Company, died today at his home here after a long illness.

It is probable that the body will be sent to Chicago, Mr. Rosenberg's former home, for burial. Before he came to Asheville, he practiced law in Chicago.

He leaves his widow, Mrs. Elsie Schominger Rosenberg, and three sons, Ralph, Jr., Donald and Kenneth, all of Asheville.

Gardner Files Candidacy For Governor N. C.

Raleigh, April 10.—(AP)—With his nomination almost sure to be clinched 18 days from now, O. Max Gardner of Shelby, today officially became Democratic candidate for Governor, filing his papers of candidacy. The filing period closes April 20. No opposition to Gardner is expected.

Baxter Durham of Raleigh filed for re-election as state auditor.

**STILL GROWING**  
Another evidence that Greenville is enjoying a healthy growth is shown in the announcement made to-day by Postmaster H. R. Munford to the effect that beginning next Monday Greenville's city delivery service will be extended to include 84 more blocks of territory serving over 500 more families, the fourth city letter carrier being added on that date.

Several times since the establishment of city delivery in Greenville only a few years ago, the service has been extended to include all territory where the number of inhabitants justified the extension of the service, and now this new extension shows that our city is continuing to grow and to cover a larger territory. Nor is the extension necessary merely because residents are moving from the heart of the city to the outlying territories, for despite the number of new houses that have been built and are now under construction, there is still a cry here for some place to live. Another post office record that indicates the growth of Greenville is that the office last year, because of increased receipts, moved from the second to the first class list. Already the receipts for the present year are surpassing those of 1927, the first quarter of the present year showing receipts of \$11,674.68 or a gain of more than 10 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

**PRACTICAL METHOD FOR REDUCING TAXES**  
Taxation must become the taxpayer's business. There is no way out for the taxpayer unless he is willing to make a special effort to study taxes.

Families cannot be raised on scenery. There must be payrolls, raw materials, and industry. All the money necessary to do needful things must be expended, but none of the taxpayers' money should be wasted. Wastes and extravagances must not be tolerated. There can be no excuse for the expenditure of public money for unnecessary public service. Every dollar spent by government must yield its true return of service.

Let the taxpayer who is interested in good investment, in the rights of private property, and who wishes to see the state go steadily forward without unduly burdening its citizens, endeavor to acquaint himself with the tax situation in his state, county and community, to the end that he may be able to work with his elected

officers to promote an efficient and economical government. Public officers must be made to translate their promises of economy into action and fact.—Tax Digest.

**ACCIDENTS IN THE AIR**  
From the report which has just been made public by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce it becomes pretty clear why airplane accidents take place. This report shows that of 164 fatalities in the United States during 1927, 131 occurred in unlicensed planes. It shows that 97.34 per cent of licensed planes operated throughout the year without a single fatality. And it shows that in the United States mail service there was only one fatality for 1,413,381 miles of flying.

In other words, it is the inexperienced pilot, flying a defective plane, who takes the big toll at present. As soon as we develop our supervision to the point where he is eliminated we can have reasonable expectation that flying will be as safe as any other mode of travel.—N. Y. World.

**Miller Must Serve Term At Atlanta**

New York, April 10.—(AP)—Col. Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, today had but a few days of liberty ahead of him before he must start serving an 18 months sentence in Atlanta penitentiary. He was convicted on charges of conspiring to defraud the government of his honest and unbiased services in returning \$7,000,000 in property of the American Metal Company, seized during the war, to a Swiss corporation. The supreme court of the United States yesterday upheld the conviction in refusing to review the case on his appeal.

Two or three days must elapse before the United States marshal can take Col. Miller into custody, United States Attorney Charles H. Tuttle said. The district court here, where he was tried and convicted, must wait the arrival of formal papers from Washington before authorizing carrying out of the sentence. Miller could not be reached at his home in Wilmington, Del., last night, all inquiries being met with the reply that he was out.

**Bandits Holdup Traveling Man Near E. City**

Elizabeth City, April 10.—(AP)—Halted at pistol point on the smoky, lonely corn hill road across the great dismal swamp, 18 miles northwest of here, W. I. Hill, traveling salesman, living here, was robbed of \$37 by two bandits last night at 8 o'clock.

He was permitted to retain one dollar in change with which to buy his supper.

The bandits were driving a car with no license plate on the front. Mr. Hill was on his way from Sunbury, Gates county, to this city in a roadster. He was stopped about midway of the swamp when the holdup men swung their own car across the road and blocked his way.

**STATE BONDS SOLD BY GOVERNOR TODAY**

Raleigh, April 10.—(AP)—State of North Carolina bonds in the sum of \$7,000,000, were sold this afternoon by Governor McLean and the Council of State to a syndicate headed by the First National Bank of New York, low bidder, who bid par plus \$101.00 premium and accrued interest to date of delivery. The bonds will bear four per cent interest.

Another syndicate headed by Lehman Brothers of New York, bid par and accrued interest for \$3,500,000 bonds.

The syndicate bidding successfully includes the Wachovia Bank and Trust Co., Winston-Salem; and Citizens National Bank, Raleigh.

**ABOUT TOWN**

**FARM LEADERS SCORE HOOVER**  
Declares Presidential Candidate Never Attempted to Help American Farmer.

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover and his attitude toward agriculture was the target today for another attack by a group of farm leaders who contended a misleading effort was being made to represent the commerce secretary as a friend of the farmer.

"The American farmer suffered too much at the hands of Herbert Hoover," said a statement bearing the names of six farmers' representatives, to view with complacency the efforts to make him appear as a farmer's friend 'candidate.'"

The statement, appearing in the form of a pamphlet headed "report of farmers' committee on the farm record of Herbert Hoover."

"This statement is presented in the interest of no candidate," the pamphlet said, "this discussion of Mr. Hoover is entirely impersonal. It is a statement, made necessary by misleading propaganda, to set forth the understanding and attitude of the farmers generally on Mr. Hoover, a candidate, so that he may not be foisted into the nomination on any ground except the correct one, as far as the farmers are concerned."

"Farmers generally felt and believed that during the entire life of

our nation that no man had greater opportunity to serve, yet did so much to contribute hardship, distress and near ruin to the men, women and children of the farms who never shirked in their duty of providing necessities for feeding humanity."

Tuesday.—Senate proceeds with farm relief debate while house takes up legislative appropriation bill. Senate finance committee opens public hearings on tax reduction. Coal inquiry continues before senate interstate commerce committee. Cotton investigation goes on before senate agricultural subcommittee as another starts hearings on Ransdell cotton futures bill. Parker motor bus measure comes before house interstate commerce committee.

Foreign affairs committee of house considers bill to protect American citizens from military service in foreign countries. McSweeney reforestation bill continues before house agriculture committee.

Monday.—Senate debated farm relief. Fess predicting veto, and Gillett resolution asking renewal correspondence regarding American adherence world court protocol; passed several secondary measures and received George resolution for investigation of patronage disposition in Georgia; house considered District of Columbia legislation, heard Garner demand action on Muscle Shoals and Aswell argue flood control as national duty.

## BEGIN ACTION TO PARE DOWN REDUCTION BILL

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—Public hearing were commenced by the Senate finance committee today in the effort of administration Senators to pare down the \$390,000,000 House tax reduction bill to some where around \$200,000,000, as desired by the treasury.

One of the first witnesses was Hugh Satterlee, of New York, who presented a long list of recommendations of the American Bar Association. He urged that the bill be made applicable beginning with the taxable year of 1919 rather than 1927.

The association also opposed the new provisions for penalization of corporations seeking to evade surtaxes by withdrawing dividends. Satterlee declared the new language seemed "unreasonable onerous, as well as practically impossible of literal compliance."

William A. Brady of New York, speaking of the theatres, told the committee that the legitimate theatres of the country "are getting the worst of it" on the admission tax gave no relief whatever to the spoken drama. This branch of theatres required emergency relief, he said.

Brady asked that the tax be taken off admission up to \$3 or \$3.50 and he said the loss from such action would not amount to as much as estimated by experts.

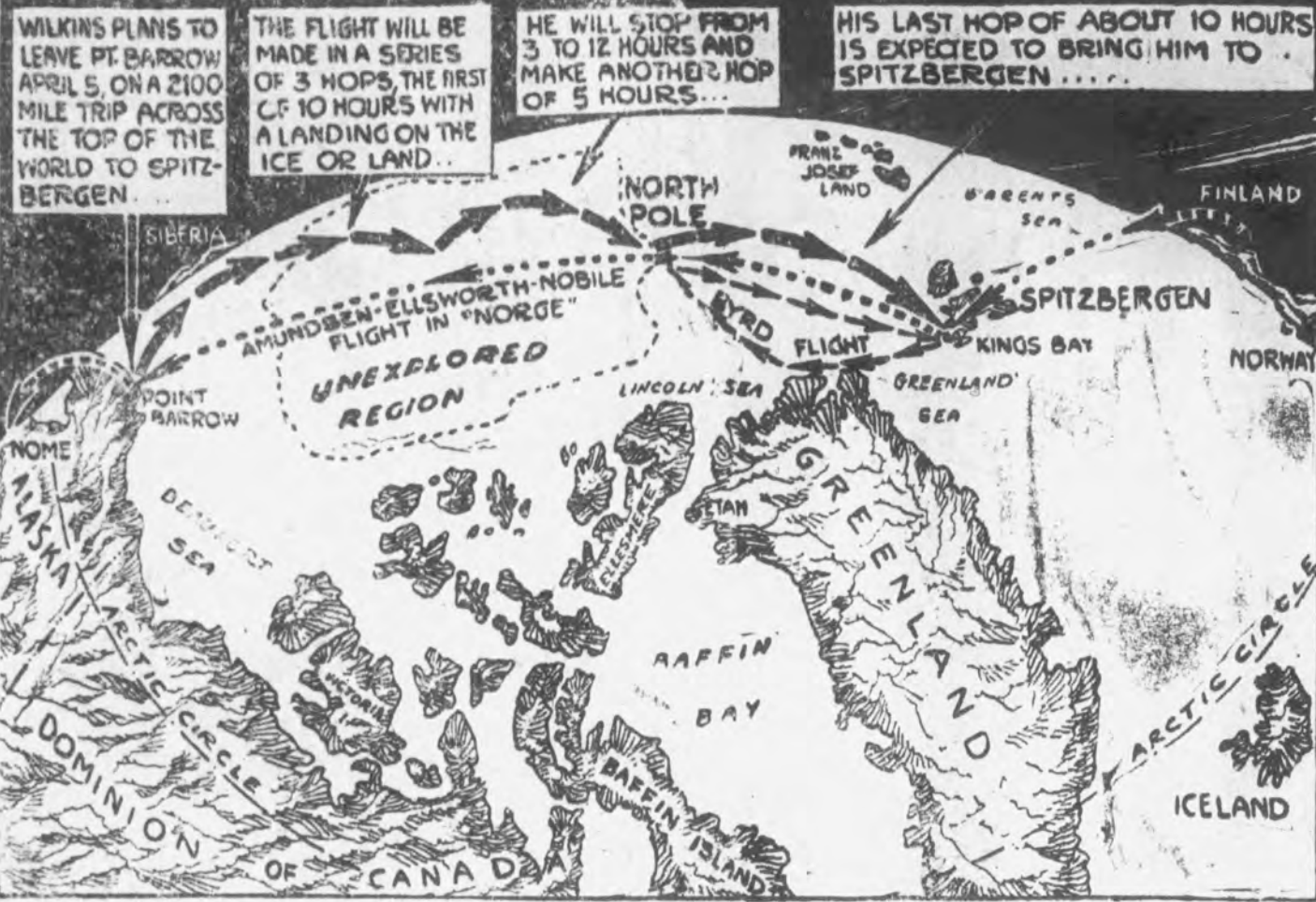

Besides 5,000 police on active duty at the polls more than 350 detectives armed with rifles, waited at the county building to speed to any part of the city where they were needed.

Chicago, April 10.—(AP)—Bombs, bullets, days of prayer, crime, Klan talk, and "America first" were ground into little X's today to provide Chicago's answer to one of her briefest primary campaigns.

Through out the state the voting was going on, Republicans and Democrats nominating their choices for state or federal, for congress, for United States senator and for minor offices; but only Chicago felt it necessary to assign a large part of its police power to poll protection; to have scores of detective bureau squads cruising through precincts where trouble might brew; and to assign thousands of volunteer civilians, deputized for the day by the election commission, to protect against fraud.

For Governor Len Small today was a political Armageddon, for he stood before the Republicans of the state asking their endorsement of his seven years, in office by renomination to a third term. In Chicago his lot was cast with the Republican faction led by Mayor Thompson and State's Attorney Cowie.

For lesser state office there has been slight campaigning, except for the attorney-generalship to which Owen Carleton, Demecan candidate, seeks renomination.

There has been much talk of federal interest in the Chicago situation, prompted by the bombing of Senator Denecan's home and the shooting by federal dry agents of a saloon raid, but aside from the instructing of a federal grand jury in its powers in the matter of election irregularities, there has been no outward indication of government interest.

Many ears have been expressed during the past few days that can-

didates might be kidnaped and kept away from town during the election. The headquarters of Titus Haffa, alderman and Thompson candidate for committeeman in the 43rd ward, reported early today that they feared Haffa had been kidnaped. 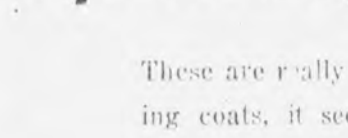
