Prosecution Outlines Case Against Wealthy Operator at Hear ing Today.

Washington, April 10 .- (AP)-The charge that Harry F. Sinclair, the lessee of Teapot Dome, gave Albert B. Fall a total of \$293,000 in four payments "under circumstances of secrecy and suspicion" was made teday by Owen J. Roberts in outlining the government's case against the wealthy oil operator who is accused of conspiracy to defraud the government.

The first payment. Roberts said, was made of \$233,000 in Liberty bonds; the second was \$10,000 in ash; the third was \$25,000 in cash the fourth was \$25,000 in Lib-

erty bonds. The prosecutor said the governwould prove among other

f lowing: spring of 1922, Sinto Fall for Fall's use and benefit, \$233,000 of United States Liberty bonds; that these bonds were turned over by Sinclair to Fall under circumstances of secrecy and suspicton wholly inconsistent with good faith or with ordinary business dealing. No receipt was given; no written memorandum of the transaction was Washington by Siffciair in his privately owned railroad car, and the ostensible purpose of the delivery was an alleged business transaction which had no basis in

That later Sinclair advanced to Fall, or in his interest, \$10,000 in cash, and later \$25,000 in cash, again without any receipt, without any record of the payment, withcut the drawing of a check or without any of the evidences of a business transaction.

"That still later Sinclair delivered to Fall \$25.000 more in Liberty bonds under circumstances of great suspicion and secrecy; that this transaction was evidenced by a note given by Fall but this note was not given to Sinclair but was given to Sinclair's lawyer, Zevely, and that the bonds forwarded at this time were forwarded by Zevely to Fall's bank under circumstances which spell secrecy and an endeavor to hide the transaction.

Additional Testimony of Outrages in Pennsylvania to be Heard By Court.

Pittsburgh, April 10.—(AP)—A sensational story of the organization of a band of "night riders" by the Ku Klux Klan, to conduct a "reign f terror" in Ohio, was told on the witness stand in federal court here teday by J. R. Ramsey, of Dayton, who described himself as a former member of the riders.

Called as a witness in the klan njunction suits, Ramsey said the night riders were organized "to burn churches and to carry out bombings and assassination." said the riders had bombed the West Dayton Klan Temple as a means of ncreasing the klan membership in





Jimmy Walker Takes Leading Part in Unveiling Stone Mountain Memorial.

Atlanta Ga., April 10—(AP)—A dapper Mayor of New York, known as the very quintessence of Yankee bustle and go, today had given a new demonstration of the healing effects of time-by dominating a ritual sacred to the old south of 1865.

At the impressive unveilding of the head of Robert E. Lee, and last night at a banquet in honor of dignitaries assembled from all sections of the country for the rites. Mayor James J. Walker of New York yesterday occupied principal spots on the program dedicating the giant memorial to the confederacy on the steep side of Stone Mountain.



BEGIN ACTION TO PARE DOWN REDUCTION BILL

Washington, April 10-(AP)-Public hearing were commanded by the Senate finance committee today in the effort of administration Scnators to pare down the \$390,000,000 House tax reduction bill to some where around \$200,000,000, as desired by the treasury.

One of the first witnesses was Hugh Satterlee, of New York, who rpresented a long list of recommenlations of the American Bar Asociation. He urged that the bill e made appliciable beginning with

The association also opposed the w provisions for penalization of corporations seeking to evade surtes by withdrawing dividends. tterlee declared the new language re med "unreasonable onerous, as well as practically impossible of Heral compliance.

William A. Brady of New York, sa saking of the theatres, told the mmittee that the legitmate thea-Les of the country "are getting the worst of it" on revenue legislation. He complained that the exemption of 75 cents or \$1 on the admission tax gave no relief whatever to the spoken drama. This branch of theatres required emergency relief.

Brady asked that the tax be taken off admission up to \$3 or \$3.50 and he said the loss from such action would not amount to as much as estimated by experts. "This would help coming artest


