ABOUT TOWN "The success of an evangelistic campaign depends largely upon the kind of choir you have," declared Albert Peterson, advance representative of Billy Sunday, discussing organization of the choir at the tabernacle last night. "We need three, hundred singers for the choir in the campaign which opens in this city Sunday afternoon, and indications last night were that we would be able to get them. "I am told that Greenville has some mighty good voices, and I feel sure these singers will lend their support to this campaign launched in behalf of the salvation of human souls. "If you are a singer and desire to render some distinct service to your community, join us and help make this campaign the greatest the country has ever known. "We didn't have time to finish the membership drive last Wednesday," a member of the local Merchants Association informed the writer today, "but we hope to be able to accomplish this sometime next week. "There are numbers of business and professional men in Greenville who do not realize the important part which the association is playing in the life of the community. It is my belief that when they do familiarize themselves with our activities they will be only too glad to join us and help make the city the real shopping center of eastern North Carolina. "If you are not a member of this organization, get in touch with the soliciting committee next week and join the ranks of the men working for the advancement of this great agricultural section. "Manufacturers have said that they are stocked up on the kind of cotton which the locality has been producing the last few years. This in itself is sufficient to justify serious thought on the part of these desirous of supplying what the market demands. "Greenville has a most cordial welcome in store for the thousands of people who will visit the city while the Billy Sunday campaign is in progress," a local citizen remarked today. "Our Greenville, yours if you come," is a slogan our people try to live up to, and it will be forcefully in evidence while the great evangelist is holding forth here. "If you have any desire to visit us, pack up your kit bag and come along, resting assured the gates are wide open twenty-four hours to the day, with best of wishes as you enter and leave."

Would Regulate Bus Operations Washington, April 21.—(AP)—Federal legislation setting up a cooperative system of state and national regulation over motor bus operations on highways was recommended to congress today by the Interstate Commerce Commission. At the end of a prolonged investigation, the Commission adopted a report presented by Commissioner Bach, which declared that motor transportation had become "a well established and useful factor of the nation's transportation system," and that the development had been sufficient to require a regulatory system in the public interest.

DAYLIGHT SCHEDULE IN EFFECT APRIL 29 New York, (AP)—The daylight saving season is on again or soon to begin in three entire states and in hundreds of cities in 14 other states. In New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, as generally elsewhere in cities using the altered schedule, clocks will be pushed back an hour at 2 a. m. on April 29, last Sunday in the month, and will remain thus until September 30. In some places, however, daylight saving begins as early as March 2 and in others it will be inaugurated as late as June. Some form of daylight saving will be observed in all or part of the cities of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Delaware, W. Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin.
