

TOBACCONISTS WIN TWO OFF ROCKY MOUNT

Winning their fourth straight game of the week, Greenville yesterday took the big end of a double header from Rocky Mount, the first game taking place in the railroad town in the morning and the last at the fair grounds here. The Tobaccoists made it 4 to 3 in the first contest and 5 to 3 in the last. All four of Greenville's runs of the first game came in the sixth inning following a terrific batting rally. Rocky Mount scored in the fourth and sixth frames.

LOUIS MEYER WINS RACE AT INDIANAPOLIS

 Indianapolis, Ind., May 31.—(AP)—Jumping from obscurity to overnight fame Louis Meyer, boyish looking Los Angeles youth today found himself acclaimed the newest hero of the automobile racing world.

This 23-year-old driver thrilled a crowd of more than 140,000 spectators by coming from behind in the last thirty miles of the race to win the 500-mile classic at the Indianapolis motor speedway yesterday.

He piloted his car into victory in the most dramatic finish ever enacted in the classic. He rode the entire distance without relief and made only one stop, his time was 5:01:35.75, an average of 99.482 miles an hour.

Meyer today gave credit for his driving skill to Frank Elliott, a famous racing star of other years.

"Elliott taught me all I know about race driving," Meyer said. "You know I worked for him for two years as a mechanic."

"Boy, I'm happy."

Meyer found himself \$35,000 richer today as a result of his victory. He was extremely happy to get his fists on that roll of money, for it was only just a week ago that he had managed to scrape up enough money to enable him to buy the car in which he rode to triumph.

Officials of the speedway said that yesterday's attendance broke all records despite the fact that the day dawned gloomy and the break of dawn was followed by a down-pour of rain that threatened to bring postponement to the race.

Only four of the 29 drivers shared in the lap prizes which were offered to the other driver leading the field in each of the first 144 laps. Jimmy Gleason, the revised records showed today, captured the lion's share of the prizes, winning \$6,700 for having led in 67 laps. Leon Duray led the race for the first 53 laps and later by five additional laps and took \$5,800. The sum of \$1,900 went to Babe Stapp and \$500 to Tony Gullota.

George Souders, the one time Purdue University student, winner of the race a year ago gave Meyer a dangerous challenge and was a closeup third yesterday. Louis Schneider at the wheel as a relief driver was 2 1-2 miles behind Meyer at the finish, with Souders about five miles behind.

Ray Keech, of Philadelphia, holder of the world's straightaway record for a mile, was fourth with Norman Batten fifth. Fifteen of the original 29 cars finished.

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RULES TO PREVENT
FIRE

Fire Chief Scott, of Los
Angeles, enumerates ten
rules for fire prevention
which should be followed by
every citizen. Their observance
would contribute very
greatly to reducing fire
losses to a minimum:

1. Remove all dry grass
and weeds from around
buildings, garages, fences, etc.
Never build bonfires on
windy days.
2. Burn all oily rags. Do
not leave them lying around.
There is danger of spon-
taneous combustion fire.
3. Remove and dispose
of all rubbish and other
waste material from the
premises.
4. Provide yourself with
an approved type of incin-
erator. That is the only
safe way to burn rubbish
and other waste materials.
5. Chimneys should be
cleaned and examined once
each year, especially in us-
ing coal or briquettes. Many
fires each year are caused
by defective chimneys and
by sparks flying on shingle
roofs.
6. Do not use gasoline to
clean garments or gloves in
the house. Do that kind of
work in the open air away
from the fire.
7. Keep an approved fire
extinguisher in the house
for emergency use. It is bet-
ter to be safe than sorry.
8. Do not use flexible
gas hose to connect gas
heaters or stoves. Use solid
pipe connections only.
9. Co-operate with the
fire department by making
your building safe against
fire; by removing the cause
of fire.
10. Keep in mind the lo-
cation of the nearest fire-
alarm box and memorize
the telephone number of
the fire department.

GOOD ROADS MAKE
THE WORLD KIN

Paved city streets and
improved highways leading
to the city, affect the growth
and prosperity of the com-
munity in many ways.

In the first place, cost of
upkeep of an improved
street or highway is much
greater than if the thorough-

"If you haven't contributed to
the children's baseball fund, get
busy and do so now. The young-
sters between the ages of 6 and 10
years may begin entering the gates
of the fair grounds, free of charge,"
a member of the committee having
the raising of the fund in charge,
urged the writer of this column, to-
day.

"Only \$115.00 is necessary to
make it possible for the youngsters
to enjoy the remainder of the
games, and it is believed our peo-
ple will soon make it possible for
them to do so.

"Numbers of children between
these ages will not be able to see
any of the games this season un-
less our people assist in the raising
of this fund, and consequently, it
is hoped everybody will contribute
as liberally as possible.

"Dig down in your pockets, Mr.
Citizen, and help us close this mat-
ter right away."

"While Greenville's celebration of
Memorial Day yesterday was not
marked by ostentation, it was suf-
ficiently colorful to cause our peo-
ple to realize the deep significance
and meaning of the occasion," a
reader of the Reflector told us to-
day.

"It was fitting that members of
the American Legion and the Wo-
man's Auxiliary should have gone
to the cemeteries and placed flow-
ers on the graves of those who sac-
rificed so much in behalf of hu-
manity. It was still more fitting
that relatives of these dead war-
riors should have stood silently by
and took part in the exercises.

"It is too late now to do more
for them. They paid the supreme
penalty of war with a spirit of
bravery and uncomplaining that
commanded the admiration of the
world, so let us go to these shrines
each year and reconsecrate our-
selves to the glorious cause for
which they fought that our liberty
might be preserved."

"The cause of the closing of a
majority of the banks throughout
the country was the result of slow
paper, therefore, it is incumbent
upon banks and bankers to give
this method of exchange more con-
sideration," a reader mentioned to-
day.

"It is all right to loan money
in cases where quick returns are
guaranteed, but when this is not

possible more discretion should be
employed.

"It should be remembered that
the funds of these institutions be-
long, in a large measure, to de-
positors who have placed them
there for safe keeping, and expect
them to be guarded with the same
care they would give themselves.

"North Carolina banks have
shown much forethought and vision
in this matter, and only a minor
number of bank closings as a re-
sult have been reported. This is
most commendable and is a trib-
ute to the sagacity of our bankers."

"Wait Hall" in honor of the first
president of Wake Forest.

Spanish Fliers Still Missing. London, May 31.—(AP)—Two Spaniards who wanted to fly across the Atlantic to Havana but met with governmental objections, furnished a new mystery of the air today.

Since Captains Ignacio Iglesias and Francisco Jimenez hopped off from Seville, Spain at noon Tuesday ostensibly for Karachi, India, nothing has reached London to indicate the progress they were making on their attempt to shatter duration and distance flight records. They have not been reported as sighted over any of the countries of southern Europe or western Asia over which they would be likely to pass if flying eastward.

The possibility was being considered today that their real direction might have been westward and that India was mentioned merely to divert attention from the flight. When they first planned the non-stop flight in the plane Jesus Del Gran Poder (Jesus of Mighty Power) the airmen intended to fly to Havana and the government refused to approve the plan unless they used a hydro-airplane. They then announced that the flight would be toward India.

Mexican General Dismissed. Mexico City, May 31.—(AP)—General Jose Alvarez, chief of staff to President Calles, has been dismissed from that post on charges of having betrayed the President's confidence by smuggling large shipments of silks into Mexico under the protection of Calles' name. The

announcement of the general's dismissal, which was made over the signature of the President, created a sensation.

DENIES CHARGES OF CLUB COMMERCIALISM. San Antonio, Tex., May 30.—(AP)—A flat denial of charges that commercialism has actuated any of the work of the General Federation of Women's Clubs was made in the report of the president, Mrs. John D. Sherman, prepared for presentation to the biennial convention of the organization here today.

The report characterized the federation as the largest organization of practical home-makers in the world, and those who have attacked several of its policies as "the barnacles that always cling to any great ship."

Establishment of a permanent endowment fund was urged to permit investigation of published attacks on the federation as well as continuation of the effort to elevate the American home, further efforts to insure "peace with security," increased attention to law enforcement, and an effort to get each of the 62 million potential voters to the polls next November.

Italians Attempt To Break Record For Time Flying

Rome, May 31.—(AP)—Major Ferrarin and Captain Carlo P. Delprete, Italian aviators, hopped off from the Montecello experimental field in an S-64 plane at 5:25 a. m. today to attempt to beat the world record for duration and distance flying. The commissary of the Italian Aero Club is controlling the flight which is being made in a circuitous route over the land around the field.

Fail To Smash World's Record For Endurance

Santa Ana, Cal., May 31.—(AP)—Another attempt of the tri-motored monoplane Albatros to smash the world's endurance flight has failed. Engine trouble forced the plane down at 10:30 o'clock last night after a flight of fifteen and a half hours.

Naval pilots, R. O. D. Sullivan, and L. C. Sullivan, with Sol Spiegel mechanic, formed the crew.

Forty Wounded in Clash in Belgrade

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, May 31.—(AP)—Municipal dressing stations today were caring for forty persons wounded in bloody fighting between police with fixed bayonets and students participating in anti-Italian demonstrations. Many more were cared for by private doctors after a third day of rioting. There were no official reports of deaths, but it was rumored that two gendarmes and three students had been killed in the rioting last night.

Many pedestrians including some women were caught in the turmoil and beaten and wounded.

TWO N. C. CONVICTS TAKEN IN FLORIDA

Lakeland, Fla., May 31.—(AP)—Eugene Moss and Wade McDowell were arrested by local police today as escaped convicts from the North Carolina penitentiary. Officers said the men were arrested after they had stolen gasoline from an automobile. A scar on the thumb of Moss helped identify them.

An automobile said to have been stolen in Raleigh and a license plate issued to Turner G. Cummings, of High Point, were held by police.

LINDY LANDS IN CALIFORNIA

Lack of Beacon Lights
at Los Angeles Caused
Much Delay in
Landing

Los Angeles, May 31.—(AP)—A dispatch from Long Beach, Calif., to The Times here today says Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, who caused his friends some anxiety when he was reported overdue on a flight from Grand Canyon, Arizona, was lost and cruised for nearly two hours above the hills surrounding the Standard Oil Company Beacon near Merced, Cal.

The dispatch says that the famous pilot finally seeing the beacon, made an unsuccessful attempt to land at Merced. He did not land in Los Angeles, it was learned, because none of the airports here displayed the beacon he expected to find.

That he was able to land at Long

Beach shortly afterward was due to the thoughtfulness of police there who heard the roar of the motor and telegraphed the custodian of the field. The custodian immediately switched on the beacon and a few minutes later Lindbergh landed.

A few persons who hastened to the field when landing lights flashed on, rushed up to the plane as Lindbergh stepped out. He waved them back with a smile and declined to discuss his flight from Curtis Field, N. Y.

Lindbergh, with Major Thomas Lamphier of Selfridge Field, Mich., and Col. Harry Breckinridge, St. Louis immediately left for a hotel. They told the clerk to inform callers they were tired and did not wish to be disturbed. No comment was forthcoming as to the time required for the 400-mile hop from Grand Canyon, Ariz., where they had dinner last night.

Memphis Gets Convention.
Des Moines, Iowa, May 31.—(AP)—Spirited competition for the 1929 convention of the United States Good Roads Association ended last night when the convention was awarded to Memphis, Tenn. Other cities seeking it were Columbus, Ohio, Miami, Birmingham, Atlantic City, Philadelphia, Detroit and Cincinnati.

STOCK MARKET

New York, May 31.—(AP)—Bullish operations were conducted on a broad scale in today's stock market. High priced specialties were whirled upward 5 to nearly 20 points while a long list of seasoned dividend payers in grains and industrials moved up 1 to 5 points, with at least a score of issues breaking into new high ground for the year. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume, sales crossing the 2 1-4 million share mark before the end of the third hour.

Call money renewed unchanged at 6 per cent but a plentiful supply of funds was available around that figure and there was no appreciable calling of bank loans. Pools, cheered by the easier undertone of the money market, resumed their campaign with increased vigor, and succeeded in attracting a large speculative following.

The day's business news had a bearish tinge. Operations of the United States Steel corporation were reported to have declined about 5 per cent during the past week. Crude oil production showed a substantial increase and freight for traffic continued to fall below the corresponding weeks of 1927 and 1928. Several new merger rumors made their appearance during the day and helped to stimulate trading in the issues involved.

Several large transactions again made their appearance on the tape, one block of 10,000 shares of Sears Roebuck changing hands at 110. Case Treshing Machine ran up 17 3-4 points and extreme gains of 5 to nearly 10 points were recorded by Radio (International Telephone), American International, DuPont, Wright Aeronautical, Mexican Home Products, Montgomery Ward, Peerless and Hudson Motors, Kroger, Otis Elevator, Advance Rumely and Curtiss Aeroplane.

Texas and Pacific led the advance in the rails with an extreme gain of 7 1-2 points while St. Louis southwestern and New York Central each moved up 4 1-2 and Pittsburgh and West Virginia, "Nickel Plate," Great Northern preferred, Missouri Pacific preferred, Union Pacific, Lackawanna and Delaware and Hudson sold 2 to 4 points higher.

There were a few soft spots. Abitibi Power broke 6 1-2 points to a new low at 64 1-2, and Freeport Texas and Phillips Petroleum each lost nearly 3 points.

The close was strong. Total sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.

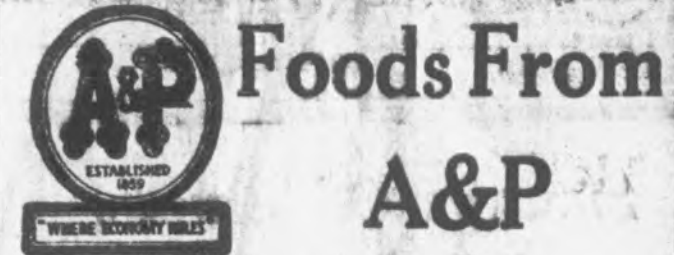
