

ITALIAN AIRMEN REACH SOUTH AMERICA

ITALIAN FLYERS PASS
BRAZILIAN COAST AND
HEAD FOR RIO JANEIRO

Trans-Atlantic Plane
Believed to be Try-
ing to Add 1000
Miles to Flight.

Rio Janeiro, July 5.—(AP)—Radio advice reaching Rio Janeiro today that the Italian aviators, Capt. Ferrarin and Major Del Prete, have reached the Brazilian coast and are now heading southward for Rio Janeiro.

Rome, July 5.—(AP)—The newspaper, "Il Giornale," without citing its source, says that the Italian trans-Atlantic plane of Capt. Ferrarin and Major Del Prete reached the Brazilian coast today and headed for Rio Janeiro.

Captain Arthur Ferrarin and Major Carlo P. Del Prete left the Montecelio flying field outside of Rome at 7:51 p. m. Tuesday with the announced purpose of making a non-stop flight across the South Atlantic to the coast of Brazil in an effort to break the Chamberlain-Levine distance record of 3,080 miles between the United States and Germany.

The Italian fliers estimated the distance from Rome to the coast of Brazil as 4,635 miles. If they should reach Rio Janeiro after striking the Brazilian coast, they would add another 1,000 to the distance they had covered.

Their plane, the Savoia-S4, is capable of remaining in the air long enough for the flight to Rio Janeiro.

Pernambuco, Brazil, July 5.—(AP)—The Italian colony gathered at the airfield this morning to welcome two of their countrymen, Capt. Arthur Ferrarin and Major Carlo P. Del Prete, flying to Brazil from Rome. At 6 a. m. (4 a. m. eastern standard time) they had not been sighted and the crowd was growing impatient.

It was thought, however, that the aviators might have headed for the coast in the neighborhood of Bahia, about 400 miles to the south, although they had announced they would pass over Pernambuco.

Chicago Crime
Report Is Made
Public Today

Chicago, July 5.—(AP)—Beer, bullets, "pinesapples" and politics supplied the Illinois Association for Criminal Justice with material for the fifth and sixth chapters of "organized crime" the report of an investigation into Chicago's crime.

The fifth chapter, made public today, dealt with the city's "beer war," which has occupied considerable attention since early in 1927 when various gangs were lured into other activities by promises of enormous profits into bootlegging and beer running since then, the report states, the gangsters active in bootlegging have formed strong organizations. The "beer war" resulted in 215 gang murders in less than four years, besides the killing of 160 alleged gangsters and bootleggers by the police.

The report, after enumerating outstanding features of Chicago's "beer war," declared the investigators did not believe prohibition could be entirely blamed for the condition. Other cities have prohibition and have not experienced similar activities, the basic cause must be local, the report suggested. The alliance of gangdom and politics was blamed principally for the "war."

"Pinesapples," better known as bombs, have been in use many years, the sixth chapter declared, although only in recent years has the bomber widened the scope of his activities. Twenty years ago bombs were used by vice lords to discourage competition, the report says.

With the coming of prohibition, bombs were found to be successful in many other criminal pursuits because of the secrecy with which they can be planted.

BAD WEATHER
STILL HOLDS
UP RESCUERS

Fifty Miles of Pack
Ice Also Interferes
With Rescue of Italia
Crew.

Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, July 5.—(AP)—Fifty miles of pack ice today separated the five marooned members of the Italian crew and Lieut. Lundborg, Swedish flier, from the Russian ice breaker Krassin, attempting to rescue them. The huge masses of ice halted the Krassin in its advance, but in the meantime the castaways were drifting near the vessel.

Fog and adverse weather continued to hamper efforts to take the men off the ice by airplane. A new effort to pick them up with a light moth plane will be made from Esmark Island, nine miles from their reported position. The trimotored Swedish plane Upland will fly to the island to establish a base for the operation.

One flier who had been among the missing was safe today. The Soviet aviator, Babushkin, who left the ice ship the ice breaker Malignin, Friday returned to the vessel after a harrowing five days experience with wind and icebergs. Shortly after leaving the ship he had run into head winds which finally forced him to descend in the sea 80 miles north of Hope Island. There his seaplane was in constant danger of being crushed by the icebergs. Finally he managed to take off again and found the Malignin.

In the meantime search for Roald Amundsen and the five men missing with him was being made by ships between Spitzbergen and Norway. An attempt to confirm rumors that fishermen had found the missing men failed when the Italian seaplane Marine I was forced back to Tromsø by bad weather after starting for North Cape.

Moscow, July 5.—(AP)—The Russian ice breaker Malignin has been ordered to make an exhaustive search of the region around latitude 76.77 north; longitude 23.38 east for the Latham plane, in which Capt. Roald Amundsen went in search of General Nobile. This territory is south of Edge Island, where there is also a great group of small islands. It lies about 200 miles to the south of Foy Island, where the Nobile party is marooned. The ice breaker Krassin is now about 15 miles from Cape Platen, on the northern coast of Northeast Land.

National Air Tour
Planes Take-Off

Tulsa, Okla., July 5.—(AP)—Led by W. G. Beard in a Waco bi-plane in the national air tour took off from the Tulsa airport this morning on a 240-mile hop to Fort Worth, Texas.

More than 5,000 persons were at the field to see the planes get away at two minute intervals starting at 9 a. m.

Beard, who was forced out of the tour at Indianapolis, by propeller trouble, caught up with the Tourists here yesterday and was given the privilege of starting first.

The planes faced a 30-mile head wind at the start.

Germans Off On
Endurance Trip
Again Today

Dessau, Germany, July 5.—(AP)—Pilots Johann Ristice and Hans Zimmermann hopped off at 4:04 a. m. today in another attempt to break the duration flight record of 38 hours, 34 minutes and 26.1 seconds held by the Italians Captain Arturo Ferrarin and Major Carlo P. Del Prete. They were forced to give up an attempt on July 2 after being in the air 17 1-2 hours because of a defect in the exhaust pipe.

RICH BELGIAN
DIES IN FALL
FROM PLANE

Captain Lowenstein
Mystery Man of Eu-
rope, Drowned in
North Sea.

Boulogne-Sur-Mer, France, July 5.—(AP)—The mystery whether Capt. Alfred Lowenstein, noted Belgian financier, jumped or fell by accident from private airplane while over the English Channel last night, had not been definitely cleared by a preliminary police investigation today.

Aviation experts here are inclined to think that the theory of accident in that he opened the wrong door of the plane in going to the wash room was improbable.

The plane was held at the Saint Inglevert air field today and the staff of six persons in it was detained at Calais for a judicial investigation.

The police said that the crew did not see Capt. Lowenstein disappear. The authorities were reticent to discuss the situation until they have finished their examination of all aboard the plane.

London, July 5.—(AP)—Captain Alfred Lowenstein, world famous Belgian financier and mystery man of Europe, fell from his private airplane while crossing the North Sea from England to Belgium last night and was drowned.

Traveling as he always did with a retinue, Captain Lowenstein, hope of the world, had been in one of his planes, a Fokker, at 6 p. m. for Brussels with a British pilot at the controls. Two girl stenographers were aboard so that he could continue his business while in flight. The plane also carried his valet and a mechanic.

When the plane was crossing over the North Sea, Captain Lowenstein left his seat among his companions and started for the wash-room in the rear. He never returned. Apparently he opened a door by which passengers leave the plane and fell into the sea.

For a while those remaining aboard the plane were ignorant of what had happened and continued chatting. Sometime later they discovered the tragedy. The pilot headed at once for the French coast. He landed to the west of Dunkirk, France, on the beach at 8 p. m. The pilot explained to the customs officers there that he had decided to land on the French coast because of the accident.

In the meantime the banker's staff was awaiting his arrival at Brussels. Finally as the hours passed and Captain Lowenstein failed to appear they began telephoning to points along the Belgian and French coasts and learned of the tragedy.

Captain Lowenstein was reputed to be the richest man in Europe, his wealth being estimated only less than that of Henry Ford or the Rockefellers. He controlled steamship lines, was one of the chief shareholders in the Belgian railway system, owned manganese iron mines in Silesia, steel furnaces in the north of Spain, coal properties in the Saar Basin and in the Ruhr, and immense rubber plantations in the Congo.

He was born in 1877, his father being a small Jewish banker in Brussels. His immense fortune was built up by clever speculation. He took him 30 years to become the richest man in England. During the war he was engaged in London in connection with the provisioning of the Belgian army.

Two years ago he was virtually unknown in the United States, but he achieved the limelight almost overnight when he offered to lend Belgium \$50,000,000 free of interest for a period of two years so as to enable the country to stabilize the franc. Shortly after this he offered to lend France a similar amount at interest of only 2 per cent.

Mr. Coolidge Is Host
To Wisconsin Governor

Superior, Wis., July 5.—(AP)—Striving to repay some of the hospitality of the state where he is vacationing, President Coolidge invited Governor Fred R. Zimmerman of Wisconsin to be his guest today and tonight at the Summer White House.

Instructions had been left by Mr. Coolidge for one of the White House cars to be sent to Superior to take the governor to Cedar Island Lodge. To avail himself of the invitation the latter had remained overnight in Superior where he had come to attend the Fourth of July celebrations.

Governor Zimmerman was among the hundreds who yesterday conveyed their greetings to the chief executive on the occasion of his 56th birthday. Telegrams reached the White House by the score from all parts of the world, but Mr. Coolidge at the time paid little attention to them, preferring to pass his anniversary in the quietest manner of any year since he became chief executive.

President Coolidge, however, abandoned his determination of having no special celebration on his birthday long enough to invite newspapermen and press photographers to the lodge. He shared his

great birthday cake with them and took them along on a short fishing expedition.

In this way his guest saw him catch five fish in the course of about half an hour, and witnessed his triumph when he drew two of these on the same line.

Mrs. Coolidge, dressed as usual in white, and her son John wearing a bright red sports coat, met the returning party. They marvelled at the catch with exclamations of admiration. The fish were weighed and the largest proved to be a three and one half pound rainbow trout.

Mr. Coolidge decided to close the party by eating his birthday cake. He called for it and two men brought out on a little table on the lawn a seventeen pound cake of angel food bearing 56 candles.

Helped by Mrs. Coolidge and using a large kitchen knife, Mr. Coolidge cut the cake and slices were passed. John Coolidge was sent indoors by his father to get cigars. Even Rob Roy was not left out, and in answer to his insistence a special slice of cake was cut for him.

For a remembrance of the occasion Mr. Coolidge was finally photographed with his guests about him. No other visitors came to Cedar Island Lodge during the day.

HOOVER TO CONFER WITH
PROMINENT REPUBLICANS

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—Clearing the way for an early departure from the capital, Secretary Hoover plans to confer on Saturday with prominent eastern Republicans for the purpose of establishing a campaign organization in that section. All members of the Republican national committee from the north eastern states and from Pennsylvania and Maryland have been called to Washington for the meeting and Senator Moses of New Hampshire also is to be present. Moses who served as permanent chairman of the Kansas City convention, is expected to be named eastern campaign manager.

With the eastern situation provided for, Mr. Hoover will be practically in a position to leave for the west. In this connection an announcement yesterday repeated emphatically that his program had been definitely arranged and that he will deliver his resignation from the cabinet to President Coolidge at the summer White House. Rumors as to his plans beyond this outline were pronounced unjustified.

A report that Secretary Hoover had offered the vice-presidential nomination to Senator Norris of Nebraska, while the convention was in progress received an emphatic denial. A semi-official campaign department statement branded the story as "preposterous and silly" and reiterated that Mr. Hoover had taken no part in the choice of a vice-presidential nominee.

MAIL DOES DAMAGE

E. G. FLANAGAN
RETURNS FROM
TRIP TO TEXAS

Pitt Delegate To Dem-
ocratic Convention
Also visits Old Home
In Texas.

E. G. Flanagan, one of the Pitt county delegates to the national Democratic convention at Houston, Texas, returned to his home in this city last night. Being a Smith supporter, Mr. Flanagan expressed gratification at action of the convention in nominating the New York governor as the Democratic standard-bearer.

Bearing a striking resemblance to Governor Smith, the Greenville man found himself in the public spotlight a number of times. It was reported over Houston that Lindbergh was to bring Governor Smith to the convention by airplane. Mr. Flanagan walked into a hotel a short time after the report emanated throughout the city and was immediately the cynosure of all eyes. Everybody thought he was Smith except the people from "back home."

It was reported that three women rushed up and embraced Mr. Flanagan, but this was vigorously denied. The newspapers carried a story of the incident. The camera men soon began trailing the man from Pitt county and he was one of the main figures at the convention.

A signal honor was conferred upon Mr. Flanagan at the closing day of the convention when he was selected by the state delegation to officially notify Governor Smith of his nomination. The date of the notification had not been determined today, Mr. Flanagan said, but will be made public later. The camera men will get another shot at the Pitt county delegate when the notification proceedings, and people throughout the nation will probably get an opportunity of seeing a picture of Governor Smith and his second together.

Reports concerning the fist fight between North Carolina delegates was greatly overdrawn, Mr. Flanagan said this morning discussing a happening that was given wide publicity by the radio and newspapers. He said there was a pronounced demonstration following reference of Longworth to religious intolerance, but denied any fist encounter. Quite a scuffle ensued over reclamation of North Carolina's banner after W. O. Saunders, of Elizabeth City had taken it from its standard and paraded before the North Carolina delegation. Some of the delegates received minor bruises in the encounter, but this was not the result of fist fighting.

"I am just as much a Smith man today as I was when I went to the convention," Mr. Flanagan said. "I advocated the nomination of the New Yorker in every way possible at Houston. I did it in such way that I commanded the respect of supporters of all other candidates."

After leaving Houston Mr. Flanagan went down to the southern part of Texas where he used to live. He admitted to friends that he didn't try any conchopping as he did in the old days, but enjoyed coming in contact with friends he had not seen in years.

John Holmes, of Farmville, another Pitt delegate, went to Alabama from the convention city to visit a brother he hadn't seen in 15 years. Other delegates expressed considerable doubt as to whether the brother would recognize the relative from Pitt county owing the change brought about by passing years.

FRANKLIN WOMAN
KILLED BY BLAST
IN AUTOMOBILE

Franklin, Pa., July 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Gladys Beers Sullinger, 18, mother of three children, was instantly killed last night when an explosion wrecked the family automobile in which she was sitting in the garage. Her head and both arms were blown off. Fire followed the explosion.

A coroner was unable to ascertain the cause. Frank Sullinger, husband of the victim, suffered shock when he returned to the garage on hearing the explosion, and found the charred remains of his wife.

A three year old daughter and seven months twins survive.

New Zeppelin To
Make Three Trips
Over the Atlantic

Berlin, July 5.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener announced at the Independence Day dinner of the American club that the new Zeppelin which he is building, would make three trips back and forth across the Atlantic, starting in August. This would be done, he said, to demonstrate that "it doesn't take heroes, but just ordinary mortals to fly across the ocean safely." He suggested that the dirigible Los Angeles, accompany the Zeppelin.

NOBILE TELLS
ABOUT WRECK
OF DIRIGIBLE

Dramatic Story of
Tragic Fate of Italia
Contained in Gen-
eral's Report.

Rome, July 5.—(AP)—The dramatic story of how the north pole dirigible Italia met its tragic fate on May 25 while returning to Spitzbergen from the north pole is related in a new official report which has been received from Gen. Umberto Nobile.

This report admits of the theory that the Italia's gas bags caught fire after the stern compartment, in which nine men, including Gen. Nobile were working, had dropped upon the ice. At the same time the general said that he believed that the column of dense black smoke which the survivors of his group saw arising might have been caused by the burning of fuel reservoirs which had fallen or been thrown overboard purposely. In this case he felt that the six men carried off in the bag might still be safe.

The general reported that at the moment of the catastrophe he feared some of the groups of valves might have remained open because of ice and ordered Renato Alessandrini, envelope attendant, to verify the state of the valves in the rear of the dirigible. Alessandrini hastened off but had time to go but a few yards before the occupants of the rear compartment were hurled upon the ice below.

"Reflecting after the fall," General Nobile continues, "I came to exclude the possibility of gas escaping from the valves and considered it much more probable that the bags were torn, several circumstances leading me to think so. That being the case it is understandable how the dirigible, discharging in its shock with the ice more than two tons of weight in persons and material, momentarily lightened and rose up. In fact we saw it fly apparently to the winds at an angle of 110 degrees and soon after it disappeared among the clouds."

"There is no doubt in mind that the Italia was able to remain in the air but only a short time, because, as it continued to lose gas, it must have descended. Moreover at the moment of the shock the motorist, Lieut. Ettore Arduino was seen to pass along the dirigible's beam. He regarded us with stupefied eyes, but was absolutely unharmed. In view of his experience, there is no doubt that he must have tried to cause a descent of the bag as rapidly as possible, knowing that the wind was taking the dirigible far from the earth."

"Based on these three considerations I concluded that the Italia must have been able to remain in the air only about a half hour at the most and at the speed of the wind could not have been blown more than 20 or 30 kilometers."

"Several days after the disaster I learned from my comrades circumstances appearing very grave to me: twenty minutes after the drop several of them had seen on the horizon, towards the east, a high column of dense black smoke. In the discussion of that circumstance, the hypothesis prevailed that the bag in falling had caught fire. In that case there would be no hope that any of our comrades could escape death."

"I ought to admit that given our condition which in those first days we judged absolutely desperate, the fate we supposed had befallen our mates of being killed immediately seemed much better than our own as we feared destined to a slow anguished death by hunger."

"I then thought over the different circumstances. If the smoke had been produced by the dirigible catching fire, the ship would certainly have been seen falling. At any rate it would have been difficult under the cloudy sky for the flame not to be noticed by anyone at such a short distance as ten to 15 kilometers."

"Even if true that burning rubber gives a black, dense smoke, a similar smoke may arise also from the combustion of benzine, oil, etc."

"I then thought that the oil and fuel reservoirs had fallen or been thrown overboard in order to slow up the descent. In that case one could hope that the dirigible might have fallen without catching fire and that our companions might be safe."

"Following these considerations I recommended exploring with the greatest attention a sector 60 degrees from the horizon."

A theory exists that the teams in the lead on the Fourth of July also will be on top in late September or early October at the close of the major league pennant campaigns. If this were 100 per cent true, the Yankees and the Cardinals could save much trouble for all concerned by starting the world series immediately, but the theory arouses skepticism in some quarters—chiefly in the National League.

John J. McGraw, for one, recalls that the Giants were running away with a fourth straight pennant on July 4, 1914, with the humble Braves in the cellar as usual. It so happened that the young men of the clan McGraw enjoyed the ensuing world series from ringside seats as the Braves sailed into the mighty Athletics for four straight victories.

The Giants closed out their intra-sectional campaign at the Polo Grounds yesterday by dividing a double header with Brooklyn. Dazzy Vance snapped a Giant streak at Chicago, 8 to 3, in the opener, but Larry Benton came back in the second and clashed to hang up his fourteenth victory and his 17th complete game in 17 starts. The score was 5 to 2.

The even break cost the Giants no ground as the Cards and the Cubs divided two wild games. Wilson now leads the league in homers over Bottomley, 18 to 17. The Cards won 11 to 6 and 16 to 9. The Reds plunged the Pirates further into the depths by taking morning and afternoon decisions at Forbes Field, 6 to 0 and 11 to 3. The Braves dropped another to the Phils, 10 to 6, but rain prevented further carnage.

In the American league campaign to see whether the Yankees can win 117 games and so beat the record of the 1906 Cubs, the Senators held the champions to an even break 5 to 2 and 4 to 5.

The Athletics turned back the Red Sox 5 to 4 and 11 to 3. Detroit and Cleveland divided their holiday bill, as did the Browns and the White Sox.

Goes Over Niagara In Big Rubber Ball

Buffalo, N. Y., July 5.—(AP)—Except for bruises, Jean Albert Lussier, Springfield, Mass., was none the worse today for his thrilling experience of Independence Day, when he went over Niagara Falls in a huge rubber ball and lived to tell of his sensations. He is one of few men who have dared the mighty cataract and come out alive.

The occupant of the 758 pound fabric was towed into the upper river by motorboat, having abandoned a plan of being dropped from an airplane. The ball rolled and bounced through the upper rapids and over the horseshoe falls. A weight had been placed at Luss-

ier's feet to keep the occupant upright, but it became dislodged and Lussier went over the brink head-first.

A short time later the ball was reclaimed a short distance below the precipice, was ripped open and the Springfield man hauled from within, smiling. One hundred thousand or more people saw the stunt.

His sister, Madame J. P. Caubere, of Quebec, kissed him. Many other women tried to do likewise. Not a few succeeded.

"I have spent more than a year and more than \$7,000 on my venture," Lussier explained today. "I have succeeded and I am happy. I have demonstrated that my theory was correct. I could do it

again, I am sure. But once was plenty for me."

"As the ball was carried down stream in the rapids it was bumped about quite a bit. Just before I plunged over the falls I received an extra severe bump. It gave me a nasty bruise on my right temple, another on the right cheek and one on the shoulder blade."

"I had really no sensation when I went over the falls. When I landed on the water at the bottom I received a good jarring up. The ball struck the water and bounced up and down six times just like a ball being bounced on the sidewalk by a child. I went over the falls head first, but straps and pillows saved me from serious injury."

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THE POWER LOBBY AND THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS
The National Educational Association is now in conven-
tion in Minneapolis, with
an attendance of 5,000
teachers from all parts of
the country. At its opening
session the convention was
addressed by the President
of the association, Miss Cor-
nellia S. Adair of Richmond,
Va. In the course of her ad-
dress, Miss Adair said:
"The public schools of
the United States are attend-
ed by more than 20,000,000
Americans at the most im-
pressionable period of their
lives. The slant of their
thinking will determine the
public policy of tomorrow.
For this reason the utmost
care must be taken to avoid
the introduction into the
public schools of propa-
ganda of a kind that will
bias their future judgments."
There can be no doubt of
the type of "propaganda"
Miss Adair had in mind. For
her address follows close on
the disclosure of the activi-
ties of the public-utilities
lobby in the schools, and
this lobby has already been
rebutted by the Secretary of
the National Education As-
sociation in his report to the
Minneapolis convention.
Evidence which is still be-
ing taken by the Federal
Trade Commission in Wash-
ington reveals how great an
interest the public-utilities
lobby has had in the schools
and how extensive its activi-
ties have been. Attempts
have been made to censor
text books in use in the pub-
lic schools. Other text books
and pamphlets taking spe-
cial care to present the
point of view of the utilities
have been printed by the
hundred thousand. Retain-
ers have been paid to teach-
ers whose favorable interest
is desired. And these activi-
ties, in the opinion of the
Federal Trade Commission,
"are all obviously part of a
plan not only to get into the
curricula and text books of
schools of all grades those
things desired by the leaders
of the public-utility indus-
try but also to influence
teachers, instructors and
professors to such an extent
that the subject matter will
be taught in the way desired
by the industry."
Of efforts of this type the
commission says:
"The general public may
well question whether the
scientific attitude and integ-
rity of established institu-
tions of higher learning are
not being undermined. Truly
no greater calamity could
happen either to industry or
to the public than for edu-
cators or educational institu-
tions to become the paid
mouthpieces of economic

groups."
The representatives of the
teachers of the country who
are now assembled in Min-
neapolis have good reason
to be concerned over what
is happening. They have
good reason to demand of
legislative bodies and pub-
lic service commissions that
an end be put to a type of
interference in the Ameri-
can public school system
which is intolerable.—New
York World.

ABOUT TOWN

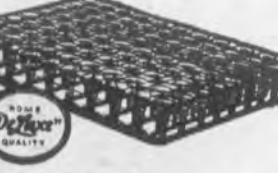
"The meeting of the new board

may sound like an alibi all framed
up in advance but it isn't. I'm not
afraid of taking my licking there
or anywhere else but, for one who
has won the Wimbledon crown
twice, it's tough to take it on the
chin without being in the best
shape."
Big Bill took it on the chin but
he needed no apologies for his gal-

Meanwhile, excellent conditions for harvesting were reported from Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri, with announcement that "the wheat will be a big one" seen in Illinois.

STOCK MARKET.
New York, July 5.—(AP)—Lowering of the call money rate from 6 to 5 1-2 per cent today stimulated the recovery in stock prices which set in early this week. Extreme gains of 2 to nearly 14 points were distributed over a broad list, with nearly a score of issues making into new high ground. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume sales in the first three hours, running just short of 1,400,000 shares as contrasted with less than 1,000,000 in the corresponding period on Tuesday.

Private advices from Washington that the treasury department looked for an easing of money rates after the quarterly settlements had been completed went a long way in restoring bullish confidence. Banks called \$5,000,000 in loans but plenty of new money poured into the market. Except for reports of further improvement in the oil and copper industries, there was little in the day's trade news to influence the price movement. The sudden death of Alfred Lowenstein, Belgian financier, which is reported to have unsettled European financial markets, was without visible effect on stock exchange prices.

High priced specialties were again in the vanguard of the advance. Case Threshing soared 5-8 to a new high at 256 1-2. Wright aerobical soared 1-2 to a new high at 193 and DuPont 8 1-4. Midland Steel Products, preferred, Russia Insurance, National Tea, Radio, Montgomery Ward and Commercial sold

ventures sold 5 to 5 points higher. Ralls jumped forward with the industrials although the buying was more centralized. Texas & Pacific jumped nearly 5 points to a new peak at 172 3-4, and Bangor and Aroostook sold 3 points higher. Renewal of selling pressure against American Woolen preferred carried that stock down more than 2 points to 45 1-2, the lowest price since the company was organized 30 years ago.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 2,200,000 shares.

New York, July 5.—(AP)—Guarded by klansmen armed with pistols, clubs and sabres, 3,000 persons attended a Ku Klux Klan rally in a 40-acre field on Long Island yesterday but the guest of honor, Senator J. Thomas Heflin, failed to appear.

Late in the afternoon word was received that the senator was speaking at a Klan rally in Jackson, Mich., and obviously would not be able to address the Long Island meeting. The klansmen, who had spent the day in various ceremonies then disbanded.

Senator Heflin at Jackson said that he had received an invitation to attend the Jamaica rally while speaking at Albany, N. Y., but had declined because of the previous promise to the Michigan folks.

Some 200 police and an emergency wagon loaded with riot guns and tear gas bombs were stationed about the field all day to guard against possible attack but their services were not needed.

The policemen were not permitted on the field by the klansmen who had rented it for the day.

NATION PAYS HEAVY DEATH TOLL ON 4TH

Lives of 205 Americans Lost in Celebration of Nation's Birthday.

Chicago, July 5.—(AP)—The lives of 205 men, women and children were a nation's sacrifice to the celebration of its 152nd birthday anniversary yesterday.

Fireworks claimed their share of victims, as they always have since the United States first began observing Independence Day with sky-rocket, pin wheel and cannon crack-er. There were 11 such deaths in the entire country, according to the Associated Press tabulation.

Lakes and rivers, however, exacted the heaviest tribute to human life during the holiday, 106 drownings being reported. Motor car deaths ranked next in number with 54. Heat claimed 12 lives and lightning three, while four were killed in plane crashes. In addition there were 15 deaths attributed to other causes directly connected with America's observance of the fourth.

The airplane accidents were at Joliet, Ill., where a pilot and two passengers plunged to death when the wing of their plane snapped, and at Beaumont, Tex., where one was killed.

Three of the motor car deaths came in races, drivers being killed in Oregon, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

The number of persons injured, many probably fatally, ran into the thousands. Premature explosion of a truck load of fireworks at Lamar, Mo., injured 25 persons, of 5,000 gathered in the public square to witness the display. In the larger cities the hospital list of persons hurt during observance of the day ran into the hundreds. Chicago, with an ordinance prohibiting the sale of fireworks, echoed all day with firecracker explosions, and reports from police and hospitals that the number injured was probably greater than in recent years.

Atlanta, July 5.—(AP)—Heroic deeds marked two Independence Day mishaps in the south, one of them accompanied by the sacrifice of one life to save four.

Charles H. Richmond, 43, prominent Richmond, Va., real estate operator, was drowned after saving his wife and three other persons from the Potomac River near his summer home at Church Point farm. He dragged them to a row boat from the treacherous currents, then collapsed while hanging on the side of the craft as it was being towed ashore.

Attracted by screams, a group of Boy Scouts of Mount Dora, Fla., prevented an incipient panic in a movie theatre. They dashed into the burning building and led 50 persons to safety after film had exploded, firing the projection room. The structure was wrecked at a damage of \$50,000.

WOULD INCORPORATE
YANCEYVILLE, N. C.

Raleigh, July 5.—(AP)—Yanceyville citizens by the scores came here today to appear before the municipal board of control in the matter of the proposal to incorporate the Caswell county capital.

One group of citizens favored the move while another opposed it, each employing counsel to present arguments. Indications were that the board, composed of Attorney General Brummitt, Secretary of State Hartness and Chairman Lee of the Corporation Commission, would take the matter under advisement.

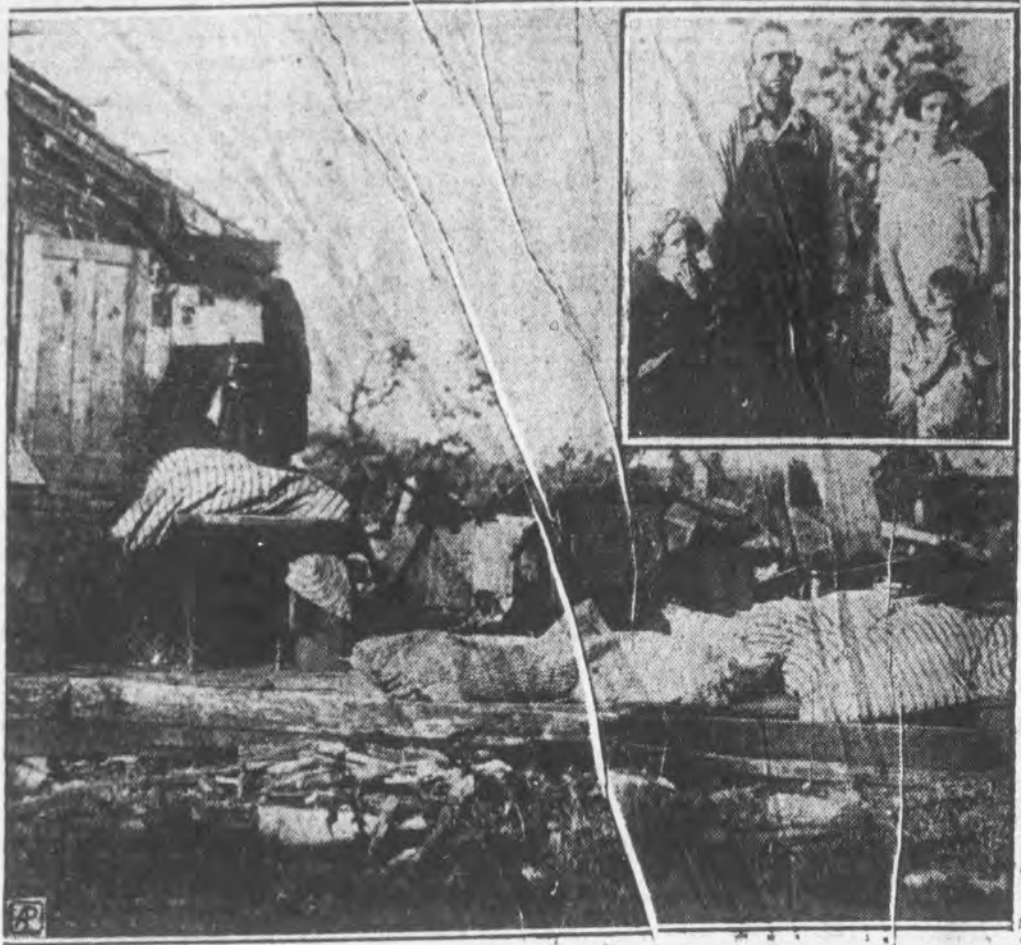

Charlotte, July 5.—(AP)—With only two fatalities and several minor accidents, Fourth of July celebrations in North Carolina appeared to have been the quietest and most successful in some time.

Wilbur Brown 18, of Riverside Heights, Asheville, was drowned while swimming with friends in a pool at the foot of Reems Creek Falls, one mile west of Weaverville. Efforts to save him were futile and his body had not been reclaimed at a late hour last night.

A negro woman, Mary Hoover, drowned when she stepped into deep water in a creek near Salisbury.

Earl Stanford, three year old boy of Durham, received cuts about the head when struck by an automobile and Braxton Bradshaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. T. Bradshaw, of Raleigh, suffered a broken arm while skating in an amusement park at Durham.

A number of traffic collisions are said to have inflicted minor injuries, but even these were held to a minimum, reports indicate.

grees wide with its apex at our tent on an axis of 119 degrees over a distance of 20 kilometers. If, unfortunately, the smoke column was produced by the dirigible's burning, then her enormous skeleton, many meters high and 106 meters long should be found.

"If God wills that despite the fire all or part of the persons were saved, they will be found about the dirigible, but if in the first 20 kilometers nothing remarkable is found, keeping in mind that the fuel reservoirs might pass unnoticed, that would mean that the smoke had nothing to do with the bag's catching fire. In this case it would be necessary to pursue the search for another 20 kilometers, in order to find the dirigible unless I am completely mistaken in judging the sagging produced by the noticeable loss of gas which is difficult to believe for the reasons given."

UNDERWORLD BUSY IN N. Y.

Another Gang Killing
Confronts Police At-
tempting to Unravel
Mystery.

New York, July 5.—(AP)—Another underworld shooting confronted police today as they sought to unravel the mystery of three gang killings occurring since Sunday.

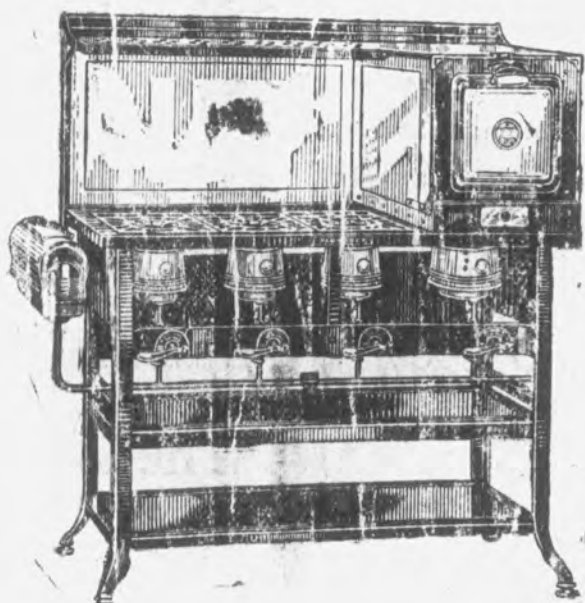

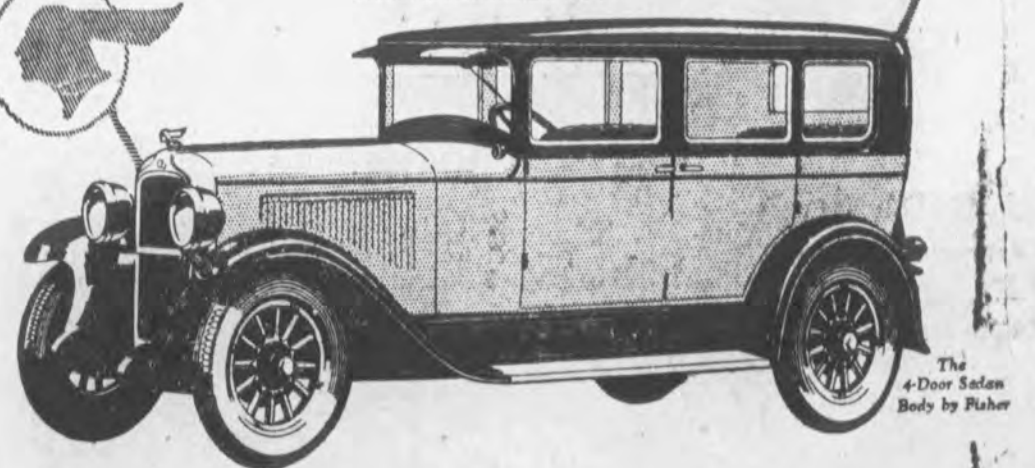
