Proposed Increase of N. C. Railroads Would Cost Shippers \$1,000,000 Annually

"The Merchants Association of North Carolina are opposed to any increase of freight rates such as that contained in the revision which the railroads of the state will present to the Corporation Commission at the hearing set for August 2," members of the local association stated this morning.

"The State Association will send delegation to the capital city to fight an increase which would take over, a million dollars annually out the pockets of shippers and reers in this state. The revised would mean an increase of 20 per cent in shipments and merhourts feel like this would be workingian additional hardship on them.

Willard Lowell, executive secretary of the North Carolina Merchants Association, in a statement on the subject made public today promised to file a vigorous protest to the proposed increase.

In his statement Mr. Dowell had the following to say.

"The North Carolina Corporation Commission has before it a petition of the common rail carriers of the State to revise the intrastate class rates and to cancel the exceptions to the Southern Classification as now shown in the North Carolina Exception Sheet. The case has been set for hearing in Raleigh at 10:30 a. m., August 2.

"What the railroads are really asking is that the Corporation Commission raise the level of the instastate rates to that of the interstate rates to that of the interstate rates and in addition thereto to cancel exceptions to the Southern Classification which are now applicable to this state.

Sergeant Killed and Two Others Injured On Houston Prison Farm.

Houston .Texas, July 28 .- (AP)-Though pursued throughout the night by 35 bloodhounds and 100 armed men, the five convicts who shot their way out of the imperful state prison farm near Richmond, late yesterday, were still at large this morning in the swamps and cane brakes along the Brazos river, 20 miles south of here.

Eight convicts, who had been cultivating cotton, joined the break, killing Henry Ward, prison sergeant in charge of blood hounds. One was captured shortly afterward near the farm, while two were later taken following a running gun fight with officers, in which two deputies were wounded, one perhaps fatally. Both the latter convicts were wounded.

Tom Davis, Richmond deputy, was shot through one lung with buckshot charge from a shot gun while Frank T. Beil, also of Richmond was younded in the shoulder.

The break began when the convicts pulled Jim Jeeter, their guard, Jecter was ordered to remount and flee for his life, but when he did. R. H. Tucker, a convict, who was later recaptured, fired a charge of buckshot at him, according to prison officials.

A few of the shot gazed Jeeter's arm, but he escaped and spread the alarm. Wari, who was guarding nearby, galloyed to Jeeter's aid, and was killed by a buckshot charge. A coroners inquest revealed the officer had been shot through the neck with a revolver after he fell from
