BIG POWERS TO SIGN UP AGAINST WAR

Signing of Treaty Renouncing Warfare to Take Place at Paris Monday.

Paris, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Representatives of leading powers will sign a treaty Monday, by which they agree to renounce war as an instrument of national policy.

The treaty, formulated by Foreign Minister Briand of France and Secretary of State Kellogg of the United States, is designed to prevent aggressive warfare. It will be signed in behalf of the United States, France, Germany, Great Britain and her dominions, Italy, Belgium, Japan, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Once the representatives of these nations have put their signature to the document it will be open for the signature of all other countries that wish to join the movement.

Mr. Kellogg will sign for the United States, Lord Cushenden, acting head of the British foreign office, for Britain, Foreign Minister Stresemann for Germany, Count Uchida for Japan and M. Briand for France.

Arrivals of those who are to sign the pact will continue at intervals throughout today, Saturday and Sunday. President Cosgrave of the Irish free state, Lord Cushenden and Stresemann bringing up the van Sunday.

Paris, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Secretary of State Kellogg arrived in Paris today to participate in the signing of his renunciation of war treaty on Monday. He was accompanied by Premier MacKenzie King of Canada, and made the voyage to France aboard the Ile de France which landed at Havre this morning.

With the arrival of the American secretary of state, plans for the historic ceremonies on Monday got into full swing. The representatives of the fifteen states which will sign the treaty are steadily arriving and numerous welcomes were the order of the day. Peace enthusiasts, woman's rights, proponents and specialists in international political speculation were busy all day.

The arrival of Mr. Kellogg was in marked contrast with the fanfare of newspaper comment with which the newspapers had heralded his coming. He reached Paris three-quarters of an hour before the announced time as a police precaution to avoid any possible hostile demonstration by Communists and other extremists in remembrance of Sacco and Vanzetti, or on general principles.

Al though most of the attention naturally centered upon Secretary Kellogg, Count Uchida of Japan, was the first to arrive in Paris for the signing, reaching there at dawn. Deco de Pouquiers, master of ceremonies of the French Foreign Office, consequently was the busiest man in Paris. He had to get up in the dark to meet the Japanese representative and then rush back to greet Mr. Kellogg and the Canadian premier. Other welcomes were on his program for tomorrow and Sunday, until all the statesmen have assembled.

Secretary Kellogg meantime is remaining quietly at the American embassy. He and Mrs. Kellogg after being "moved" in the garden, had breakfast, having had nothing since coffee and toast on shipboard at 6:00 a. m. The only official duties arranged for this afternoon was the secretary's call on Foreign Minister Briand and the latter's call in return.

Premier Poincare sent word that he would be free to receive Secretary Kellogg at any time on Sunday and the Secretary of State has appointed five o'clock for his call upon the Prime Minister which will be in the reception rooms of the Ministry of Finance in the Louvre. The Kelloggs will have their luncheon and dinner at the embassy with the Herrick family, quite informally.

Two Fatally Hurt When Auto Wrecks

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Bank W. Howard 79, of Denver, N. C., and Mrs. R. H. Monteith of Hopewell, Va., were probably fatally injured and McLean A. Howard, 40, of Denver, was seriously hurt when the automobile in which they were riding was wrecked Thursday afternoon about seven miles from Denver when a tire blew out. All are in a hospital here.

The elder Howard is suffering from a fractured shoulder and a severely torn lung. Mrs. Monteith, a daughter of Howard, suffered fractures of the skull, a leg and a shoulder.

The Greenville tobacco market will have nine warehouses in operation this season. The buildings cover a total floor space of ten acres and are capable of caring for approximately one million, seven hundred thousand pounds of tobacco daily.

The new Joyner Warehouse is a splendid sample of modern tobacco warehouse, it was constructed of steel, brick and concrete rendering the entire building absolutely fireproof, the floor space for the sale of the leaf aggregates 56,000 square feet, it is a modern tobacco warehouse in every way. Located on the main floor is the camp and rest room for the tobacco farmers, while in the basement ample room has been provided for the care and welfare of the farmers' teams. Many other and up-to-date facilities can be found to facilitate the handling of the leaf and rendering every service to the tobacco grower.

This splendid tobacco warehouse will be under the direction of O. L. Joyner, Sr., assisted by O. L. Joyner, Jr. Both of these gentlemen are well known among the tobacco warehousemen and the tobacco farmers of this section. O. L. Joyner, Sr., is one of Greenville's pioneers in the tobacco warehouse business, having operated the Eastern Tobacco Warehouse in the year 1891, recognized as the second tobacco warehouse in Greenville, N. C.

Civil Court Closes; Criminal Term Will Open Monday A. M.

The civil term of Pitt county Superior court which convened in this city last Monday morning with Judge R. A. Nunn, of New Bern, presiding, was adjourned yesterday afternoon after disposing of a calendar consisting largely of minor cases.

A one week criminal term will open Monday morning with one of the heaviest dockets in months. Numbers of cases involving many forms of crime will be given hearing during the week.

The most important cases on the calendar of the civil docket were compromised outside of court, and virtually all of those actually considered embraced minor controversies which have been accumulating for the past few months.

DANIELS SAYS HE IS BOUND BY HIS PARTY

Replies to Publication of Letter in Which He Assailed Governor Al Smith.

Raleigh, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Informing that the Republican national committee had made public a letter quoting him as saying the nomination of Gov. Smith would be a "fatal mistake," Joseph Daniels today recalled the fight he had made against the New York governor prior to the Houston convention, but declared he was bound "by the arbitration of the majority of my party" because he had participated as a delegate in the nominating convention.

At the same time the former naval secretary reiterated his opposition to the prohibition modification program of the presidential nominee and announced his intention to support dry Democratic congressmen while challenging the prohibition record of the Republican party.

When shown the report that photostatic copies of a letter addressed to Mrs. Nelly Hall Root, 33 Carrol Park, West, Long Beach, Cal., had been distributed by the publicity department of the Republican national committee, Mr. Daniels said:

"Last April a report was published that I was advocating the nomination of Gov. Smith by the Houston convention. This was called to my attention by the lady from Long Beach, California, and I telegraphed her that I would not support any wet candidate for the nomination.

"I made a fight in the city precincts, county convention, and state convention, which resulted in North Carolina's delegation by a large majority supporting Congressman Hull of Tennessee, because I did not believe the Democratic convention ought to nominate a wet. I was one of the delegates at large to that convention, and I have always taken the ground that, if I was a delegate to a convention, I was bound by the arbitration of the majority of my party.

"I strongly regret Gov. Smith's recommendations as to prohibition. I oppose them in toto, and shall use my influence to the end that the North Carolina delegation in Congress, House and Senate, will vote against any suggestion of weakening the dry laws. I feel it my duty to stand with the dry Democrats of the South in electing a Congress which will assure that no harm will come to prohibition, regardless of whether Smith or Hoover is elected.

"In common with other dry Democrats, I have decided that while I do not agree with Smith's position on prohibition, I can not, directly or indirectly, aid in electing to the presidency a man who has been a part of an administration which has been as false to prohibition as it has been true to privilege."

DOUBT SAFETY OF ROCKFORD FLIERS TODAY

Experts Question Authenticity of Wireless Calls Signed Rockford Fliers

Chicago, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Out of the air early today there came a wireless S. O. S. signed "The Rockford Fliers."

It said the Rockford-to-Sweden plane, missing since early Sunday morning, was down on a small island off Newfoundland and that the fliers, Bert Hassell and Cramer, were safe.

Joy born of what apparently was first definite information of the plane's fate quickly faded, however, when wireless experts began casting serious doubts as to the message's authenticity.

It seemed certain that a message purporting to come from the plane was actually broadcast, for two amateurs, one in Chicago, and the other in Toledo, O., made independent reports of hearing it. On the other hand, it appeared that the message was sent from the plane's small set, "K H A H."

"Get word to the Associated Press and our families," said the first message received by R. J. Harris, Chicago amateur, "that we are down on a small island 50 miles off Newfoundland, and are safe."

NO OPEN AIR CAMPAIGNING FOR AL SMITH

Radio Has Strong Appeal for Democratic Nominee in Coming Campaign.

New York, Aug. 24.—(AP)—There will be no open air campaigning for Governor Smith, if he can help it. The radio too much appeal for him.

This idea is being impressed upon the Democratic Presidential nominee constantly by his political associates, although he personally is known to have felt for some time the utility of conducting an extensive speech-making tour when such modern means as the radio, with its voice-saving qualities, is available.

The Governor has had considerable experience with the old custom of literally taking the stump and extending the voice in an effort to reach the prince of the crowd. He has campaigned five times for Governor and many more times in lesser political roles.

But he also has seen candidates come and go, simply because they had worn themselves out by their outdoor tactics at what he considers the most important period of any campaign—the last week or two.

Whether the Democratic nominee adheres strictly to an indoor speaking program of course, depends upon the availability of broadcasting facilities, but it is certain, his friends emphasize, that the campaign now under way will see no counterpart of the old stumping days of Bryan and Roosevelt and others who, at times, made as many as 20 or 25 speeches a day to field audiences.

In covering his itinerary about the country, and there is growing evidence that it will be a real swing, Governor Smith, of course, will appear on the rear platform of his train at intervals, shake hands, and probably say a few words, but wherever a radio hookup can be obtained which will cover the territory he thinks should be covered, it is generally believed among those close to him that he will take advantage of that method.

Opera Singers Injured When Hit By Ball

Rosa Ponselle, soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Company, was recovering at her camp on Lake Placid today from a slight concussion of the brain, caused when she was hit just about the eyes by a golf ball.

Summer School Closes At Teachers College

The summer school at East Carolina Teachers College closed with graduating exercises this morning held in the college auditorium at 11 a. m. The graduating class consisted of 93 members. Eighty-five of these were two-year normal graduates, and eight were four year graduates completing the A. B. degree.

The graduating address was delivered by Dr. Robert H. Wright. In part he said:

"The eight months school term is essential if we wish to retain our democracy. As long as the country child does not have an equal educational opportunity with the city child, ambitious parents are going to continue to move from the country districts to the cities.

An extensive study of the intelligence and educational achievement of pupils in small towns and rural districts as compared with cities in the state of Mississippi, reveal the fact that urban children were distinctly in advance of rural children. Comparing children of the same chronological age in the country and in the cities it was found that the latter were a number of points ahead of the former intelligence quotient, and in mental age. The same relationship was found to exist in the educational age.

"The same condition, no doubt, exists in every rural state in the Union.

"For a long time the more progressive people in Europe have been moving from the countries into the cities, and this, in a large measure has brought about a condition that exists, not only in Europe but in the Oriental countries. If something is not done in an educational way in America to stop this movement of the superior type of citizens from the country districts to the city districts, America will be face to face with the same kind of problems that confront European countries.

"Our democracy is founded upon the intelligence of citizenship. Anything that tends to develop classes, whether it be the type spoken of in Europe as the peasant class, or whether it be found in industries, such as manufacturing or transportation, is a direct blow at the fundamental principles of democracy.

"Every child in America has the right to be given an equal educational opportunity with every other child in America. This is one of the fundamental principles in a democracy. Of course all children are not born equal. Some times there are biological predilections called inherited tendencies over which the teacher has only a limited control. Here is to be found the root of many individual differences. The wise teacher will recognize these, and not condemn but strive to help and mend. When all efforts fail she will not emphasize these so-called shortcomings, but will overlook them and strive to help develop the child along the lines of his God given talents.

"God did not condemn the man who had but one talent because of his possessions. He was condemned because he did not use what his Lord had given him.

"It is our task to help every child to use to the maximum the talent or talents with which he has been instructed.

LEVINE FLYING FROM GERMANY TO ENGLAND

Dessau, Germany, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The "King of the Air" the new plane purchased by Charles A. Levine, took off from the Junkers airfield for Croydon, England, at 3:32 o'clock this afternoon.

BORAH SCORES SMITH'S VIEW PROHIBITION

Says Every State Line Would Become Canadian Border With Smith's Proposals.

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Senator William E. Borah of Idaho in a statement issued last night, said every state line in the United States would become a Canadian border with changes in the Volstead law as advocated by Governor Alfred E. Smith in his acceptance address.

Citing Canadian provinces as an example of what he claimed would occur in the United States, the Senator said the Canadian situation was one where liquor is plentiful, corruption is rampant and bootlegging is universal.

Referring to the Democratic nominee's advocacy of a system of public ownership, management and control of the liquor traffic, Senator Borah said:

"Facts are overwhelming and at hand to show that instead of creating respect for law this system increases lawlessness; instead of controlling liquor traffic it gives infinitely better opportunity for unlawful traffic of liquor."

"Bureaucratic government, in its best, has had enough," he declared. "But bureaucratic government engaged in manufacture, sale and distribution of liquor would be a cesspool of iniquity and corruption. It would be bureaucracy bureaucracy drunk."

ELOPERS FACE COURT ACTION IN THIS CITY

Simpson Man And Woman Returned From Chattanooga After Runaway.

Sheriff S. A. Whitehurst returned this morning from Chattanooga, Tenn., having in custody K. G. Johnson and Mrs. Vilee Hardee, both of Simpson community, this county, who are charged with living together as man and wife while in the Tennessee city. Sheriff Whitehurst stated that Johnson was being held on a charge of eloping with another man's wife. While no definite charges have been entered against Mrs. Johnson, it was said that she might be prosecuted on a charge of immoral conduct.

The couple were arrested in Chattanooga several days ago as result of information furnished by Pitt county authorities after Johnson and Mrs. Hardee had been missing for a period of two weeks or more. They are alleged to have been living together as man and wife when arrested in a Chattanooga apartment house.

Hardee operates a small store in the Simpson community. He is married and has a family. Mrs. Johnson resided with her husband in the Simpson section prior to the elopement.

The case will be given hearing in a magistrate's court tomorrow morning when specific charges will be preferred against the couple.

Plane Carrying Securities Has Landed Safely

Richmond, Va., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The main plane carrying Tennessee's \$4,000,000 of securities to the Chemical National Bank of New York, arrived at Washington this morning at 11:50 o'clock. Pitcairn aviation officials here announced. The plane chose the Washington route instead of the originally planned Atlanta route on account of weather conditions, officials said.

CITY SCHOOLS WILL OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 10

Preliminary Teachers Meeting to Be Held On Preceding Saturday.

The Greenville city schools will open for the 1928-29 session on September 10, which is Monday. The preliminary teachers meetings will be held on the Saturday preceding at eleven o'clock in the morning and two in the afternoon. The schools open up this year with a great increase in buildings and equipment. The new high school is ready, the new colored school will be read September 15. The new high school is a building of which the town may properly be very proud. The combination auditorium and gymnasium is going to fill a great need in the life of both the community and the school. When the seats are placed it will hold twelve hundred people, and when the seats are moved to one side it is one of the finest gymnasiums in the state. The seating equipment and the gymnasium equipment is already here and is being installed. In addition to the new classrooms also, there are locker and shower rooms, tiled and fully equipped, for both boys and girls. The building also contains a lunch room and all high school pupils, for the first time, will remain on the school grounds during the whole day.

The new training school will contain grades 1 to 5, inclusive. The two critic teaching rooms which formerly were in the Evans street building, thus giving plenty of teaching force to take care of the rapidly growing east side of the city. This new building is up-to-date in every particular, embodying the latest ideas in school construction. It is of fireproof construction, and is surrounded by acres of land which will be made into an attractive playground.

The present Model school, located on West Main street and is modern in every way. The lower grades will be placed in this building, the upper grades remaining in the other colored school.

The present Model school will contain all the sixth and seventh grades of the city with the exception of one sixth grade at West Greenville. This building will also contain the sixth and seventh grade critic teaching rooms. The annex at this building will be used for all assembly hall and workshop for all activity projects. The Evans street school will contain grades 1 to 5, inclusive and the principal of this building will be Miss Louise Galphin who succeeds Mrs. Elizabeth Savage. The West Greenville school will contain grades 1 to 6, inclusive, and Miss Ernestine Forbes will be back as principal. The high school will again be under the efficient direction of Mr. James A. Keech.

There are only five new teachers in the system this year. Three of these are in the new training school; namely, Misses Lucy Nulton, Eunice McCoee and Alma Browning. The high school has one new teacher, Miss Lorraine Hunter who becomes the critic teacher in General Science and Chemistry. The West Greenville school has one addition to its force, Miss Helen Gray Jones of this city. She takes the work of Mrs. Robeson, who comes down to the Evans street school.

The colored schools will again be under the direction of Principal O. M. Epps, who has served the community so well and so faithfully.

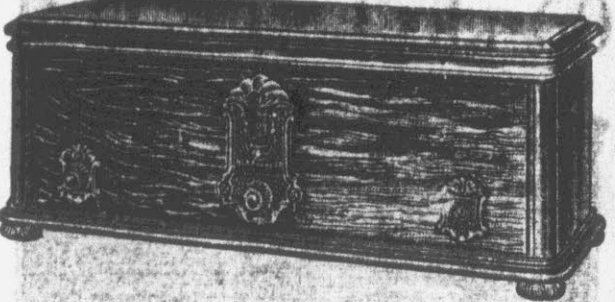

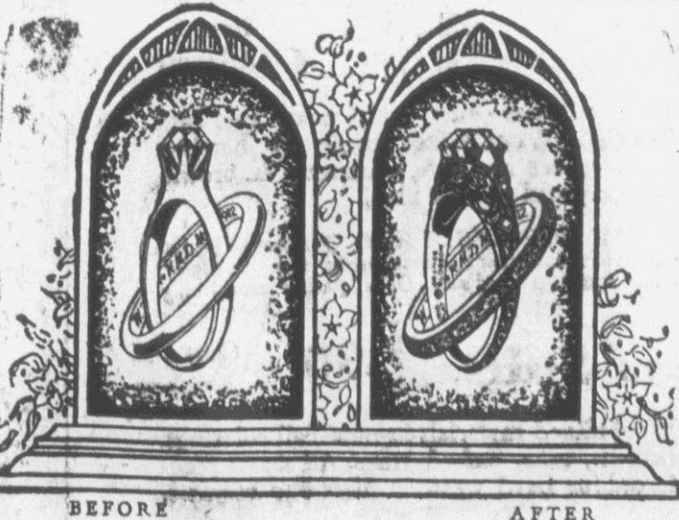

MORRISON IS SLATED FOR SIMMONS JOB

Democrats to Appoint National Committee-man Succeeding Sen. Simmons Tonight.

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The State Democratic Executive Committee will meet here tonight by call of Chairman O. M. Mull to fill the vacancy on the National Executive Committee caused by the resignation of Senator F. M. Simmons.

Although a dozen names have been mentioned as probable choices for the post since the senator announced his retirement, discussion of late has centered on two party leaders, former Governor Cameron Morrison, and Josephus Daniels. The latter has made no statement in connection with the meeting but his paper, The News and Observer, says today it is expected that Morrison's will be the only name represented to the committee.

Mull arrived here last night, and among those he saw was Mr. Daniels. The chairman said he knew of no other business to come before the committee than the election of a National Committee. He predicted that Governor Alfred E. Smith and the full Democratic ticket will win North Carolina in the coming election. Referring to the Presidential nominee's acceptance speech, Mull said:

"Rarely has the acceptance speech of a nominee so pointedly presented the vital issues and so frankly and positively prescribed the remedy. I particularly am impressed with his purpose and determination to enforce the laws of the nation. He accepts this responsibility as part of his official duty. I believe in his honesty and sincerity of purpose, and no one questions his ability. So under his administration, I confidently expect a real example of positive law enforcement."

Drawing a comparison between the records of the Democratic and Republican parties in both state and nation, Mull continued:

"As the voters reflect on these things, our Democratic workers will increase. The organization will function loyally and enthusiastically, and Democracy will show a great majority in November for the whole ticket."

Announcement was made by leaders of the Wake County organization of Anti-Smith Democrats that the public meeting scheduled for tonight had been postponed.

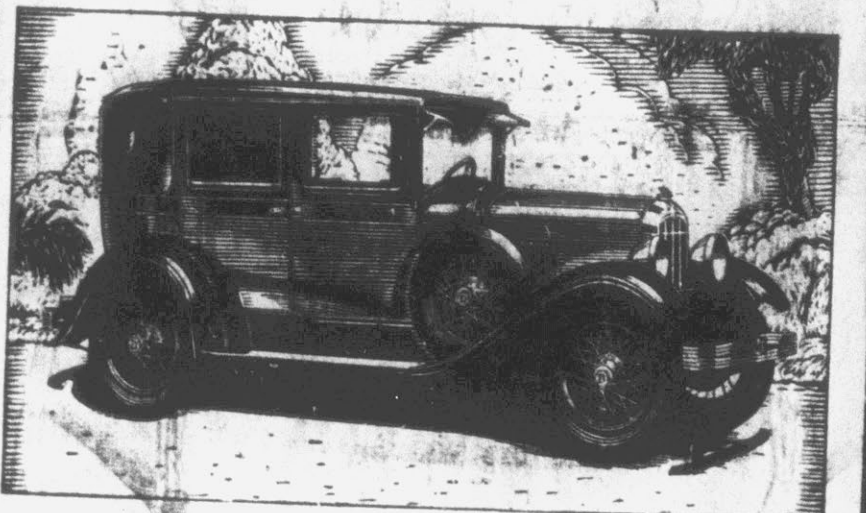

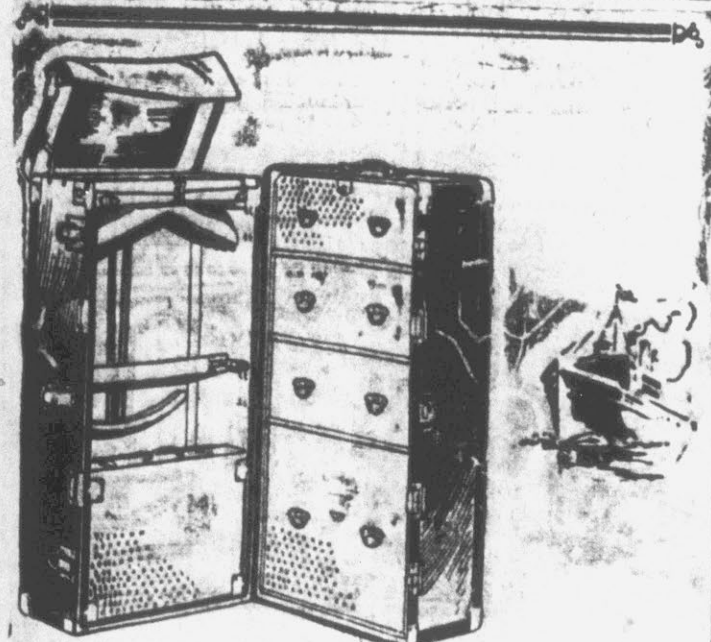

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

New York, Aug. 24.—(AP)—A sensational upturn in prices, rivaling those in the 4,000,000 share markets last spring, took place in today's stock market as a result of the broad buying movement set in motion by the unexpected drop of nearly \$23,000,000 in brokers' loans last week. Extreme gains in scores of the most active issues ranged from 3 to 14 points, and were fairly well maintained despite the waves of profit-taking which swept through the market at frequent intervals. Total sales in the first three hours ran close to 2,500,000 shares.

Pools, encouraged by the loan figures and optimistic earnings and business reports, bought stocks in tremendous volume, and apparently succeeded in attracting a large outside following. "Bear" traders, who sold stocks heavily in the last few days in the belief that loans would increase \$100,000,000 or more, were driven to cover. New high records were established in rapid succession, nearly two score being chalked up by early afternoon.

High priced specialties recorded the most spectacular advances. Adams Express soared 14 points, Wright Aeronautical 10 1/2, American Smelting 10 1/4, Montgomery Ward 9 1/2, Case Threshing and Midland Steel products preferred, 7 1/4 each, and Allied Chemical 6 1/2, many of them setting new peak prices. Curtis, Lambert, Sears Roebuck, General Motors and Puritany Baking advanced 5 points or more. Pittsburgh and West Virginia rallied 5 points and several of the other high grade rails moved up 2 points or more.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 3,700,000.
