ROBINSON IN
RALEIGH FOR
FIERY SPEECH

The Democratic Vice-Presidential Nominee to Speak at Eight O'clock Tonight.

Raleigh, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Senator Joe T. Robinson, Democratic nominee for vice president, accompanied by Mrs. Robinson, arrived here from Richmond at 7:45 o'clock this morning. Tonight the senator will deliver a campaign address in the municipal auditorium at 8 o'clock.

Senator and Mrs. Robinson were met upon their arrival by a local committee, which escorted them to a hotel.

An informal luncheon at 1 o'clock for both, and a tea for Mrs. Robinson at 5 o'clock were the only entertainments arranged by request of Senator Robinson, himself.

State Chairman Odus M. Mull, county Chairman James H. Pou, Jr., J. Crawford Bligs, W. B. Jones, Mrs. T. Palmer Jerman, and Mrs. W. Tom Best constituted the reception committee.

Advance information from the party was to the effect that the democratic candidate preferred that no public meetings be arranged except the one at which he would deliver his scheduled address.

After conference with party leaders this morning and the mid-day luncheon, it was expected that Senator Robinson would visit the links of the Wake County Country Club for a round of golf.

Miss Nell Battle Lewis, Raleigh writer and newspaper woman, was in charge of arrangements for the tea to be given Mrs. Robinson at the Woman's Club this afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Senator Robinson's speech will be broadcast by station W P T F. Amplifiers have been installed in the auditorium to assure that the speaker's voice will be heard in the remotest corners of the structure, which seats more than 3,500, and other amplifiers have been placed on the outside for use in the event there is an overflow crowd. The street block will be roped off if necessary.

Moving forward to North Carolina, from which state rumblings of unrest in Democratic ranks have been heard, Mr. Robinson had arranged for two speeches, one at Raleigh tonight and the other at Charlotte on Wednesday.

In Richmond, his only stop in the Old Dominion, the senator last night devoted practically all of his address to an attack upon those who he said were opposing Governor Smith because of his membership in the Catholic Church.

To this group he issued a challenge for them to come out "into the open, cease guerrilla warfare and fight face to face."

If any one after a study of the record of the Democratic Presidential nominee, he declared, will repudiate him because of his church affiliations "then praise God from whom all blessings flow, we will get along without him."

Again referring to what he described as "hired men" spreading misleading information concerning Governor Smith, the senator said, as he did at Dallas, Texas, that there was a report from abroad that the New York executive was a "drunkard" and in almost the same breath declared that there was not a "word of truth" in the charge.

The senator told the Richmond audience, which packed the city auditorium and overflowed into the streets, that in his opinion the "comparatively few" ministers who had injected the religious issue into the campaign had made a "great mistake and one themselves more than they can do" to Governor Smith.

Woman's Body
Found On Roof
Chicago Hotel

Chicago, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The body of a young woman, believed to be Miss Ethel Jo Brown, 24, of Royal, Neb., a student at the Illinois Training School for Nurses, was found today on the roof of the ninth floor of the Atlantic Hotel in South Clark street.

A black leather grip on the fourteenth floor fire escape indicated that the woman had jumped or fallen from this point. The roof of the building gave way under the fall and sagged over a foot.

At the training school it was announced Miss Brown was missing from her room and the description of the dead woman fitted her.

The woman apparently had been dead for five or six hours. The grip was found to belong to W. Williams, who left the hotel last night after a several days' stay. He, with a man of the name of Al Hines, had given a party last night at the Congress Hotel, the police learned.

Hines, who lived at the Atlantic Hotel, was taken into custody for questioning.

Prescott Replies To
Warren's Letter And
Reflector's Editorial

The Reflector is in receipt of two letters from Mr. Marion Butler Prescott, Ayden lawyer and Republican nominee for Congress, in which Mr. Prescott replies to a recent Reflector editorial and to portions of Congressman Lindsay Warren's letter in which he declined Prescott's invitation to a series of joint debates in each county in the First Congressional District.

In its editorial comment on Mr. Prescott's challenge to Warren to debate the issues of "prohibition, Al Smith's subservience to Tammany Hall and the alien influences advancing Al Smith for President," the Reflector declared:

"The Reflector surely can read between the lines the ever-present effort of the Republicans to hide the real issues of the campaign by camouflaging them with a lot of non-essentials, wild imaginations about the outcome of prohibition because of Governor Smith's personal views on the question, and an effort to create enough religious prejudice against Governor Smith to blind life-long Democrats and cause them to vote for the Republican Presidential candidate."

Mr. Prescott's reply follows: "Ayden, N. C., Sept. 11, 1928. Mr. David J. Whichard, Jr., Editor, Daily Reflector, Greenville, N. C. My dear Sir:

"In reply to the questions which you propounded in your editorial of September 7th, I wish to state that my challenge to Mr. Lindsay Warren was delivered in the hope that we might get at the truth involved in this campaign. You object to my restrictions. If you can induce Mr. Warren to accept my challenge, I shall be glad to extend the scope of the issues to include everything under the sun with no restrictions or limitations of any kind whatsoever."

"You seem to have mistaken the location of your supposed whispering campaign. Certainly I am not whispering when I challenge your candidate to come into the public places and discuss the issues. If you will get Mr. Warren to accept my challenge, or if you wish to meet me in debate, I shall be glad to prove in a firm and dignified manner that Al Smith is the friend of the liquor traffic, that he is subservient to Tammany Hall, that alien influences are advancing Al Smith as a candidate for President, and that Al Smith is not qualified for the high office of President with such plain and direct argument, logic, fact and truth that it will sound like thunder."

"You say prohibition is not at issue. On the day before, Raskob, the wet, Republican, Catholic, Chairman of the Democratic National Executive Committee said prohibition and farm relief are the only issues. You do not speak with the official authority of Raskob."

"The distinction between the Republican Machines and Tammany Hall is that we are ashamed of the rotten ones, while you are advocating Al Smith, the rottenest of all the machines, for the high office of President."

"I make these statements firmly in good humor and with good feeling, and I trust you receive them likewise."

"I trust you will give my reply the same publication which you gave the questions you propounded, and I enclose herewith a copy of a letter which I have addressed to Mr. Warren giving him the two reasons he asked me to furnish in his letter to me."

"Very truly yours,

"M. B. PRESCOTT."

The portion of Congressman Warren's letter to which Mr. Prescott replies was as follows:

"...I trust that you will offer satisfactory explanation to the vot-

ers why a party which has shown an utter lack of decency and honor should again be entrusted with the presidency, and that you will advance a single plausible reason why a party which debauched North Carolina the last time it was in control should again be permitted to place its hand on the throat of the state."

The following is Mr. Prescott's reply:

"Ayden, N. C., Sept. 11, 1928. Mr. Lindsay C. Warren, Washington, N. C.

"My dear Sir:

"In compliance with your request, I furnish you and the voters of the First Congressional District two reasons as to why I am supporting Herbert Hoover for President, and the State Republican Ticket."

"I support Herbert Hoover for President because he is a great humanitarian, a great organizer, a great expert in knowledge of economic laws, a man nominated by the people, a man of world wide vision, and a man whose life, conscience, and convictions are in harmony with true American ideals."

"In the second place you want to know why I as a supporter of the State Republican Ticket should reach for the throat of the Nation or State. It is necessary to cut off the wicked dose of bad liquor and Tammany Political Practices with which the Al Smith program will drench the nation."

Murderer Taken
At Box Party

Asheville, N. C., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Hunted by posers for a week, since the slaying of Deputy Sheriff Claude Green near the Balsam school house during a box party, Ed Smathers, said to be an escaped convict, was surprised and captured while dozing before a fire in the home of Perry Swanger, near Balsam, at 1 o'clock this morning. He was brought to Asheville for safekeeping by his captors, Sheriff C. L. Ingram, and other county officers.

Smathers was arrested by Sheriff C. L. Ingram, of Macon county, assisted by Macon and Jackson county deputy sheriffs and a federal officer. He was surprised in the home of Swanger at 1 o'clock in the morning. At 4 o'clock he was locked up in the Buncombe county jail. The officers who made the arrest said they saw Smathers through the cabin window, sitting in front of the fire. The owner of the house and two other men were with him. Sheriff Ingram said he grabbed Smathers by the arm while the other men held the three occupants of the house at bay.

The convict whirled around and began fighting. Mr. Ingram said. Though armed with an automatic pistol, Smathers was unable to use it. Near the hearth stood a high powered rifle which he apparently had carried since the Hunt began. Ingram said he hit the convict over the head with the butt of his pistol and even then, his other men had to come to his assistance to quiet Smathers' frenzied resistance. Even after the prisoner had been handcuffed and was being brought to Asheville he continued to attempt to get away, the officers said.

Convention Splits.

Dallas, Tex., Sept. 11.—(AP)—The state Democratic convention split wide open five minutes after it convened here today and the anti-Smith forces retired to another hall to hold their own convention.

One fist fight broke out before the opponents of Gov. Smith withdrew. The convention hall was in turmoil for several minutes.

REPUBLICANS
VICTORIOUS IN
MAINE BATTLE

Gardiner Won for the Governor In State Primary Held Yesterday.

Portland, Me., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Maine went Republican in the state election yesterday more than two to one. The Republican majority for governor, which Senator Frederick Hale said, in a campaign speech must go over 40,000 "or the rest of the country will say we have lost our grip," was upwards of 78,000.

With 44 precincts missing out of the 633 in the state the vote was:

For governor:

William T. Gardiner, (R) 144,242.

Edward C. Moran, Jr., (D) 64,754.

For senator:

Frederick Hale, (R) 141,339.

Herbert E. Holmes, (D) 62,467.

Except for one precinct in Portland where split ballots delayed the counting, all the missing precincts were very small towns. Gardiner carried every county in the state. He carried all the cities except Biddeford and Lewiston, both of which are normally Democratic by wide margins.

Congressman Carroll L. Beedy in the first district, Wallace H. White, Jr., in the second and John E. Nelson in the third, all Republicans, were re-elected by substantial majorities, and Donald W. Snow, Republican, won an easy victory in the fourth district. The closest contest was in the second district, where the Democrats had made their hardest campaign, their nominee for governor and senator, both being residents of that district.

Governor Elect Gardiner is a graduate of Harvard, where he took an active part in football and rowing. He is a world war veteran and a former speaker of the Maine House of Representatives. His home is in Gardiner and he is a law partner of Congressman Nelson.

Contrary to predictions of a heavy vote freely made during the campaign, the total vote was about 45,000 less than that cast for governor in 1924, the last Presidential election year, when Brewster, Republican, defeated Pattangall, Democrat, by a majority of 36,655. In the last state election two years ago the total vote was 181,524, and the Republican majority for governor was 20,028.

BERT HASSELL
AGAIN WINNER
AGAINST DEATH

Flier And Companion Safe Today After Going Down With Motorboat Sunday.

Copenhagen, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Twice victorious over death in the Arctic, Bert Hassell and Parker Cramer, pilots of the airplane Greater Rockford, were safe today after having been shipwrecked in the ice waters of Greenland.

The airmen, who were rescued two weeks after a forced landing and a trek across a wild and unexplored waste, were traveling down the coast on Sunday in a motorboat when it struck a rock at the mouth of Simlutak Fjord, on the southwestern coast of Greenland. The boat sank but the fliers and their six companions of the Michigan-Greenland expedition, escaped to the desolate shore.

Once they had gained land the eight men found themselves in need of food and fuel. Two natives made their way in a small boat to Kanger and obtained aid.

The sheriff of South Greenland in reporting the latest mishap of the fliers to the Greenland administration department said that efforts were being made to raise the sunken boat. The vessel had been chartered from a company of Greenlanders at Holstenborg for transportation purposes.

Hassell and Cramer apparently were making their way to Ivigtut to catch the ore steamer Wagland which is scheduled to leave there about September 29 for Philadelphia.

Voight Leads Golf Play.

Braeburn Country Club, Newton, Mass., Sept. 11.—(AP)—George Voight of New York, continued his sensational golf today in the national amateur golf championship, jumping into the lead for the two day qualifying test when he shot par 72 for his second round. His 26-hole total of 143 put him seven strokes ahead of his nearest rival, Ross Somerville, Canadian champion.

SMITH HOLDS
CONFERENCES
ON BIG ISSUES

Presidential Candidate Discusses Problems With Leaders From the West.

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 11.—(AP)—To familiarize himself with political conditions in the thirteen western States through which he will pass on his first speaking tour of the Presidential campaign, Governor Smith has begun a series of informal conferences with members of his party from the section west of the Mississippi.

His first caller, Gilbert M. Hitchcock, Omaha publisher and a former United States senator from Nebraska, has assured him that all's well in the Cornhusker State, which the Republicans won four and eight years ago.

Others are expected to be consulted before the Democratic Presidential nominee starts out next Sunday to deliver six speeches in as many states of the middle and far west. His schedule is so arranged, too, that he will have an opportunity almost every place he goes to talk over local and regional situations before he makes a night speech.

Mr. Hitchcock, who with Mrs. Hitchcock, dined at the Executive Mansion last night, assured the nominee that Nebraska was beginning to rally around his banner. He later told newspapermen that the governor had shown a keen interest in western conditions and that he would make his farm speech at Omaha a week from tonight one of the most important of his campaign.

The former senator, who received Nebraska's vote for the Presidential nomination at Houston, said:

A factor in Hoover's favor was rather general talk that the women were lining up behind the Republican nominee.

"But against this," he added, "there is a very large showing of farmers against Hoover."

Little evidence had appeared, the former senator said, that prohibition or religion was figuring in the political minds of the western states, where Governor Smith will carry his fight next week.

PRICES BEGIN
GOING UP ON
LEAF MARKET

Average Yesterday Highest of the Season; Over 1,500,000 Pounds Here Today.

The Greenville tobacco market yesterday sold 1,255,620 pounds of tobacco for a lump sum of \$185,722.69, according to the report of K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade, made public this morning. The average was given at \$14.79 per hundred pounds.

There was approximately a million and a half pounds on the nine warehouse floors today.

The improvement in the prices situation yesterday resulted from better grades of tobacco, it was stated. The average was the highest of the season, and indications today were that sales would maintain if not exceed prices paid yesterday.

WOULD REQUIRE CARRIERS
TO HAVE REFRIGERATORS

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Carriers of the strawberry shipments in carload lots from Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia and of dewberries from North Carolina and South Carolina would be required to equip themselves with express refrigerator cars for the purpose under a tentative report recommended to the Interstate Commerce Commission today by Director W. P. Bartel, and Examiner W. R. Brennan.

Airplanes Line Up For

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Seven airplanes of the 12 entered in the non-stop race from this field to Los Angeles were on the ground today being prepared for the hop-off tomorrow morning. Three other planes were expected during the day.

Among these at the field is Charles A. Levine's trans-Atlantic monoplane Columbia in which it was rumored Levine himself would be a passenger on the transcontinental flight. Another plane is Mrs. James A. Sullivan's North Star, purchased for the abandoned trans-Atlantic flight of Thea Rasche. It was also rumored that Mrs. Stillman might fly as a passenger in her plane.

At the controls of the Columbia will be Roger Q. Williams who last night broke with Caesar Sabelli, the Italian flier, with whom he had been planning a trans-Atlantic flight. Williams and Peter Bonelli covered their connections with Sabelli when he ordered them to prepare the Roma for a flight tomorrow to Old Orchard Beach, Me., from where they were to hop off on the trans-Atlantic journey. Bonelli is to be Williams' mechanic on the trans-continental flight. Williams replaces Lieut. Jack Iseman as the Columbia's pilot.

Although there have been no scratches among the twelve entries there was a strong possibility that not over ten planes would start.

HOOVER WILL
VISIT JERSEY
NEXT MONDAY

Republican Candidate to Make Two-Day Personal Campaign of State.

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover has approved a program of whirlwind personal campaigning for his 2-day visit in New Jersey early next week.

Arriving early Monday afternoon at Newark, where that night he will deliver the third prepared speech of his campaign for the Presidency, the Republican candidate will make a motor trip through Orange, East Orange, South Orange and a half dozen smaller towns in the vicinity.

Tuesday morning he will motor deep into Hudson county, a Democratic stronghold, visiting an aviation field and Jersey City, Hoboken, Weekhawken and a number of smaller places before returning to Newark in the early afternoon for luncheon which Senator Walter E. Edge will give for the Republican State, county and city leaders.

Just how many, if any, extemporaneous speeches the candidate will be called upon to make is uncertain, but no doubt he will address the party workers of the State at the luncheon and also may have a word or two to say in some of the cities and towns.

For the most part, however, the program simply calls for him to drive through the main streets of the towns where thousands will have an opportunity to see him. He will be welcomed by the mayors in Republican municipalities and by party leaders in those where the Democrats control the government.

Mayor Thomas Raymond will preside at the Monday night mass meeting in the first regiment armory at Newark where Hoover will speak and the nominee's address will be broadcast over a nationwide chain of radio stations and will require probably three quarters of an hour for delivery. The program will begin at eight o'clock eastern daylight saving time.

REVEAL MANY
NEW FACTS IN
CARNES CASE

Baptist Mission Secretary Was Playing Patron to Two Girl Movie Students.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 11.—(AP)—A private set of books, purporting to reveal Clinton S. Carnes as the patron of two girls trying to get ahead in the movies were open for inspection today of a grand jury called to delve into the affairs of the missing Southern Baptist Home Mission Board treasurer.

Thomas B. Spott, receiver for the property of the man whose accounts apparently are \$1,000,000 short, announced yesterday that not only had Carnes kept an accurate record of payments to the girls, but that there was found in his private papers, a contract between Carnes and the girls. By it, Spott said, Carnes was to receive a part of the earnings of Miss Sonia Nordlie and Miss Lois Griffin. The contract was made through Mrs. Louise Pope, formerly of Atlanta.

The private books were kept by a person whom Spott refused to reveal, but the receiver said he had been informed the girls were with Mrs. Pope in Hollywood and attending a school for motion picture actresses. In response to frantic appeals from Mrs. Pope for funds or an explanation, Spott said he had wired her that Carnes had disappeared and that no more money would be forthcoming.

Spott's inspection showed that Carnes had invested nearly \$12,000 in the talent of the two girls over a period of 22 months. Miss Nordlie having received \$7,724.62, Miss Griffin \$5,138.61 and Mrs. Pope \$3,044. In return for the advance sums the girls were to give him part of their earnings later.

While the Home Mission Board was preparing to show a grand jury its records revealing Carnes as a bookkeeper who kept purported speculations over a period of years from the eyes of church officials and auditors, the United States Fidelity and Bonding Company of Baltimore, launched a nationwide search for him. A reward would be offered, they said.

Meanwhile, a special appeal for funds to finance the board temporarily has resulted in the making of first checks to mission workers since Carnes' disappearance. Dr. Cress announced that he believed the "generous response to a special appeal" would tide the board over. He believed a goal of \$250,000 would be realized within two weeks.

Los Angeles, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Two spots in Hollywood were under police surveillance today in the belief that one might be the hiding place of Clinton S. Carnes of Atlanta, Ga., missing treasurer of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, whose accounts are said to be short \$1,000,000.

The police watch was set, after the officers had questioned Mrs. Louise Pope, and her "ward", Miss Sonia Nordlie, whose attempt to enter the films under the name of Sonia Nordlie admittedly was financed by the missing churchman.

Highly nervous and apparently on the verge of hysteria, the two former Atlanta women told of the contract whereby Carnes had agreed to finance the Hollywood venture. Mrs. Pope denied knowing anything about a similar financial arrangement in the case of a Lois Griffin to whom Carnes' account showed he had sent money.

"You're on the wrong track, now," said Mrs. Pope to newspapermen who interviewed her regarding her acquaintance with Carnes. "The surface hasn't been scratched in this mess. Don't waste your time with Sonia and me."

"We never got any of the money. Look somewhere else and don't be surprised if you find it."

Miss Nordlie wept as she said she believed Carnes "one of the finest men I ever met."

"I met him through Mrs. Pope," she said. "I was eager to try to get into the movies and he agreed to finance me on a strictly business basis. So we made the contract and I came to Hollywood."

"Whenever I needed money I let him know and he always sent it. I don't know what I'll do now."

Duke Blue Devils were last, but by no means least, in starting Coach Jimmie Dehart held his first official workout Monday but the other quartet of squads started their stuff September 3 and Carolina's Tar Heels and State's Wolfpack held light scrimmages Monday.

With the close of the first week of practice at four of the schools and the initiation of practice at the fifth prospects were little different from those of the week before—bright here and gloomy there.

Gus Tebell at State appears at this early date to have the best show for a highly successful season. With Captain Bob Warren, Quarterback Sparky Adams and Tackle Lepo, all veteran standbys, in camp, the main question facing the Wolfpack mentor is "who to play where." He has a dozen letter men and more than two score likely prospects. Every member of the squad got in a scrimmage Monday.

More than a dozen letter men were among the 35 gridsters that worked out their kinks at Duke Monday. By the end of the week Coach Dehart expects to have his men in the middle of real cracking work and the men appeared in good shape for their first session.

"Wander, a quarterback," is the word that drifts out from Chapel Hill, but despite this worry there look rosy in Chuck Collins' Tar Heel camp. The Carolinians tasted their first scrimmage of the season Monday when the ends and backs faced each other in combat. Whisnant and Gray did the signal calling.

"Dope that leaks out from Davidson seems to show that Monk Younger had grounds for issuing pessimistic pre-season statements. Four letter men, one returning after two years out of school, comprise the nucleus at the Presbyterian school for its 1928 Wildcat eleven. Not a letter man is listed among the nine candidates for the backfield and Younger has announced his intention to use the huddle system as he has no field general nor immediate prospect of finding one. The injured list also already has two men with broken arms inscribed at its top.

The Wolfpack gets away next against Elon, playing at home, September 28 and then on September 29 the big blow starts with Davidson playing at Clemson. Wake Forest meeting Carolina at Chapel Hill and Duke battling Furman at Greenville.

The Wake-Forest Carolina game will be the first of the Big Five classics of the year with no other coming until Wake Forest meets State October 16 at the State Fair.

Helping the Homemaker

Luncheon Or Tea Menu.
Lobster: Wiggle Pear Salad
Cheesed Rolls
Pineapple Sherbet Chocolate Cake
Tea

Lobster Wiggle For Six.
(This may be served for Sunday tea or evening refreshments.)
4 tablespoons butter; 2 1-2 cups milk; 6 tablespoons flour; 1 teaspoon salt; 1-4 teaspoon paprika; 1 cup cooked peas (fresh or canned); 1 cup canned or fresh lobster (flaked apart); 1 tablespoon parsley; 6 pieces buttered toast.

Melt the butter and add the flour and blend well. Add the milk, salt and paprika and cook, stirring constantly, until a soft creamy sauce forms. Add the rest of the ingredients and cook for three minutes. Serve poured over the pieces of toast which have been arranged on a platter. Garnish with sprigs of parsley and slices of lemon.

Cheese Rolls, For Six.
(These may accompany cocktails, soups or salads.)
2 cups flour; 4 teaspoons baking powder; 1-4 teaspoon salt; 3 teaspoons lard; 2-3 cup milk; 1-2 cup grated or finely cut pieces cheese; 2 tablespoons butter.

Mix the flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in the fat with a knife and mixing with the knife, slowly add the milk until a soft dough has formed. Toss upon a floured paper or board and pat out until the dough is one fourth of an inch thick. Mix the cheese and butter and press into the soft dough. Roll up like a jelly roll. Cut off one-half inch slices and place, flat sides up, on a greased baking sheet or pan. Bake for 12 minutes in a moderate oven and serve warm.

Cake.

1-2 cup fat; 1 1-2 cups sugar; 2 eggs; 1-8 teaspoon salt; 2-3 cup milk; 2 1-2 cups flour; 3 teaspoons baking powder.

Cream the fat and sugar for two minutes. Add the rest of the ingredients and beat for three minutes. Pour into two layer cake pans, bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes. Cool and frost.

Chocolate Frosting.

1 cup light brown sugar; 1 cup granulated sugar; 2 squares chocolate or 4 teaspoons cocoa; 2-3 cup water; 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix and cook the ingredients, stirring frequently until a soft ball forms, when a small portion is slowly poured into cold water. Set aside and do not move or stir for

20 minutes. Add the vanilla and beat until creamy and thick. Frost the cake. To smooth the frosting, dip a broad bladed knife or spatula in warm water.

Five Sailors Hurt In Battle Against Heavy Ocean Gale

Mayport, Fla., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Five sailors aboard the shipping board freight steamer Lake Inglenook today were suffering from injuries received during a battle with a gale, while the skipper was awaiting the first opportunity to dock.

Word of the plight of the seamen, whose names were not obtained, was brought here last night by Capt. Richard Peck and Dr. Robert Wynn who risked their lives in a small boat in heavy seas to give first aid to the injured men. Dr. Wynn, a marine physician of Jacksonville, said all of the men were suffering from major fractures, and that two of them apparently had broken backs, although his examination was not conclusive.

Heavy seas kicked up by a northeaster which the vessel had been battling since leaving the Gulf bound for Boston, a regular trip continued to run last night, and the physician was taken to the vessel because docking would have been dangerous.

The vessel had radioed St. Augustine earlier in the day asking to be met at the sea buoy off Mayport at St. John's Bar. Although the physician did not learn how the men were injured, he made arrangements to have them taken to Jacksonville hospital as soon as the ship docked.

No other shipping has been reported distressed by the northeaster, which started blowing off the east coast last week-end, and extended into the lower gulf.

A NEW YORKER AT LARGE

New York—On the Brooklyn waterfront opposite Manhattan Island lies the Red Hook district of Brooklyn. It is not so widely cited nor so generally known as an example of squalid city life as New York's lower east side which it faces.

But social workers discovered several months ago in the tenement houses that line its rubble-filled streets, the largest percentage of juvenile delinquency in New York.

Few of the families have bath tubs. The drab living quarters are heated with coal stoves. There is running water, but it is always cold.

Into this, one of the forlorn of the city's surviving slums, has gone now an allied group of welfare workers to minister to a "tough" and needy neighborhood. In a building reared by the Little Italy Neighborhood Association are housed half a dozen groups serving as many needs—doing settlement work, fostering club and camp activities, bestowing charity where it is needed, fighting tuberculosis, bringing in nurses and establishing kindergartens and school classes among the curbs where pushcarts line the streets, vending knicker-knacks, clothes, fruit and vegetables above gutters which stream with rags and garbage.

Games of which they had heard are taught to youngsters who learned, before they were out of rompers, to play the card games of their fathers. And a shower bath afterward is a new experience to most of them.

One of the rooms in the Little Italy building is fitted like a log cabin, and there meet groups of boys whose fathers and mothers came from Italy, the Balkans and other southern European lands. They have moulded their ritual in the forms of the American Indian, and on afternoons when they must play indoors they turn to the west as the sun tumbles into the towering piles of Wall Street, across the

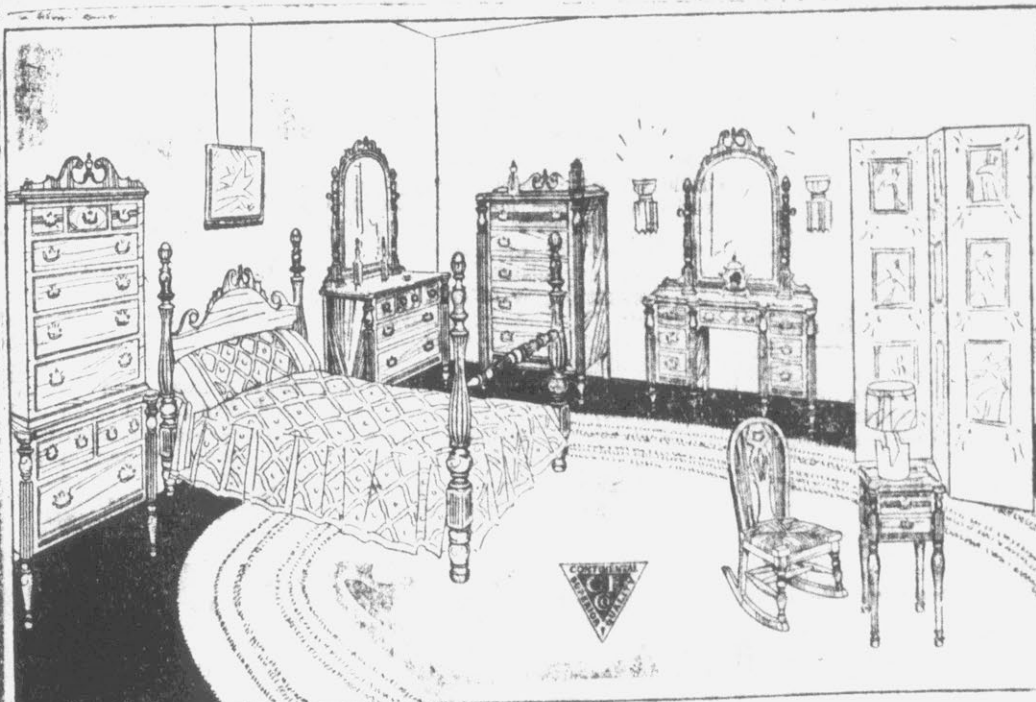

GEORGIA WILL HOLD PRIMARY ON TOMORROW

W. D. Upshaw, Former Congressman, Opposes Steele, the Present Incumbent.

Atlanta, Sept. 11.—(AP)—There is food for thought at National headquarters of the Presidential candidates in the Georgia Democratic primary tomorrow.

The national angle is in the Fifth congressional district where W. D. Upshaw, former congressman and avowed foe of Gov. Al Smith, is opposing Leslie J. Steele, candidate for re-election to the National House of Representatives. Upshaw has advised voters to cast their ballot against Smith and "the Tammany Crowd", while Steele has been a firm supporter of the national ticket. The congressman requested that a move to have Upshaw declared ineligible because of his Smith opposition be dropped and his wishes were respected.

Both candidates for Governor have announced their determination to support the national ticket, but one candidate for a state office, James H. Peoples, running for the Public Service Commission, was barred under a decision of an elections sub-committee, which ordered his name stricken from the ballot.

Congressman W. C. Lankford in the 11th district, and Congressman W. W. Larson in the 12th were opposed by Dave M. Parker and Neil L. Gillis, respectively.

The gubernatorial race has been particularly hot, with Gov. L. G. Harman accusing State Senator E. D. Rivers, his youthful opponent, of obstructing the governor's high-rivers has called Harman's administration a "do nothing".

Attention in Mississippi centered in the sixth district congressional race where T. Price Dale and Robert S. Hall engaged in a run-off primary for the congressional seat vacated by T. Webster Wilson when the congressman unsuccessfully contested with Senator Hubert D. Stephens in the August 21 primary.

In Louisiana's regular primary, congressional interest was drawn to the first district upstate where James O'Connor, incumbent, met opposition in J. A. Brulard. The other members of the Louisiana House delegation were renominated without opposition.

North Louisiana voters also were called upon to decide a second district judicial contest for the Supreme Court between Associate Justice John R. Land of Cado, way program in the last senate, and J. E. Reynolds of Bienville.

South Mississippi voters likewise expressed their voice in the second judicial district between Justice W. J. Pack, incumbent, and Chancellor W. A. Griffith of Gulfport, for the State Supreme Court.

Another run-off in the sixth congressional district of Mississippi occasioned by the failure of a candidate to receive a majority of the votes cast, August 21, was staged between Kim Watkins and Julius Moody for the State Highway commission.

Two Separate State Conventions In Texas

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 11.—(AP)—With Anti-Smith Democrats outlawed by the executive committee's action, two separate state Democratic conventions were in prospect here today as delegates gathered to organize, certify party nominees and endorse the national ticket.

Following the drastic action of the State Executive committee, controlled by regulars, in summarily ousting delegates opposed to the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith for President, a rump convention of the bolting element appeared certain.

Led by Alvin S. Moody of Houston, the Anti-Smith group caucused yesterday, but did not announce today's plan of action.

Out to exterminate every vestige of opposition to the New York governor in the party, the executive committee decided contests between Smith and Anti-Smith delegates from 6 counties in favor of the Smith cohorts and a seventh delegation, uncontested was denied seats because of the political complexion of its leader.

Then the committee proceeded with a decree that all delegates must adhere to the national ticket candidates and any delegate failing to pronounce the party shibboleth would be reported to the convention credentials committee. Every county was ordered to scrutinize beliefs of its delegates.

When a woman shows concern over the safe arrival of her traveling bags, clothes are usually at the bottom of her worries, but they were the last thing in the mind of Mrs. Robinson; it was for the Senator's bags, containing the papers and paraphernalia for the work he does on his tours, that caused her anxiety.

"At one place," she explained, "the bags were late getting to the hotel and he was delayed several hours in his work." After they had been rounded up and were on the way to the hotel she was free to receive the greetings of the committee of Democratic men and women assembled at the station to meet the party. Mrs. Parmer Jermain, member of the National Democratic Executive committee and Mrs. W. T. Best, representing the women of the county.

Mrs. Robinson's concern over her husband's bags is characteristic of her chief business in life at this time, and that is looking after her distinguished husband, seeing that he is safe guarded from annoyances and fatigue as much as possible on the trips through country sending him to bed when rest is necessary, standing guard over telephone and hotel doors while he is sleeping or resting, and being at hand always to serve as a safety valve, as a restful companion when he wants to shake off work, of a stimulus and inspiration he needs a boost for the job ahead.

After meeting Mrs. Robinson, whose gracious culture and friendly charm are characterized by a retiring dignity and modesty that seems to shun any publicity for herself, one can easily understand that her interest in politics is an

interest that is reflected through her husband.

Since the Vice-Presidential candidate was catapulted into the political arena as Congressman, Governor and United States Senator from Arkansas within a period of two weeks, twenty five years ago, she has forgotten that she was opposed at first to his entering politics wanting him to stick to his practice of law and private life. Campaigning with her husband is no new job, as she has accompanied him on his tours through Arkansas for many years.

Staying close beside her husband Mrs. Robinson shares the hand-shaking on the rear platform of the train, and sits with him on the platform while he is speaking, seldom taking her eyes from him.

CANDID AND FRANK.

While a strong partisan, Governor Smith does not hesitate to give credit to those men of opposite political belief in public life who have stood for the things he believes in. He leaves no doubt in the minds of anyone as to his party sympathies and affiliations. But if elected president he will not hesitate to pick and choose his appointments without regard to sectional, political, religious or purely partisan qualifications. He shows a keen grasp of public affairs and frankly says that if matters are presented to him with which he is not familiar he will confer with the best minds in the country upon the subjects and be guided by their findings and recommendations. He makes no pretense of knowing everything that is to be known about world affairs, but touches sufficiently upon current events to indicate the trend of his mind to the extent to indicate the trend of his mind to the extent that the public can easily form a fair estimate of the position he is likely to take upon affairs affecting our foreign relations.

In no particular does he reveal a disposition to be a disturber of the peace or a trouble-maker for the sheer opportunity of involving the country in needless controversies. His speech is not remarkable for its erudition or rhetorical accomplishments. He does not turn loose a flow of words aimed at the moon or try to sail the ship of state through the milky way to some star in the nebulous planets beyond the blue, but he cracks down with both fists on the things that affect the affairs of the nation and particularly the plain common people.

If there is a bovine in the Al Smith corral he has carefully and securely tied him on the outside, and with a smile on his face and a wallop in both fists he starts out to fight his way to victory if possible, giving no quarter and asking none.

Taken altogether, it is the most candid and frank speech ever made by any candidate for the presidency of the United States and to that end is glad relief from the flubdubbery, evasion and clap-trap usually indulged in by most men in high places.—Tulsa World, (Rep.)

THE POWER TRUST

President Coolidge and the Republican party seem little concerned over the activities of the so-called "federal power" trust.

Mr. Hoover says nothing

against the huge combinations of power capital which bleed the public. Mr. Coolidge thinks that inasmuch as the inter-state business of the power companies is very small, the federal government can well afford to let the matter rest.

Throughout the south today, the power company interests, through inter-locking financial structures, have welded the power industry into a coordinated, giant whole. True, they may have separate companies for separate states, but state companies are owned and directed through the inter-locking system of directorates and finances that control the southern power system.

Great corporations which do business in many states place themselves outside the regulatory powers of any one state. Inter-state business, whether operated direct or through the camouflage of separate companies with the self-same officers and directors, becomes a national affair and subject to national control.

The Republican party has thus far dodged the problem—doubtless, to permit their friends to "get all they can while the getting is good."

President Coolidge's weak kneed explanation of governmental failure in utilities regulation, because of the supposedly limited inter-state business of the power companies, brings to mind the story of the prisoner, before the court on charge of kidnapping, who pleaded for judicial mercy because his victim was:

"Only a tiny little boy, your honor."

Apparently to the Coolidge mind, culpability lies not in the crime itself, but in the magnitude of the offense.—Meridian Star, (Miss.)

A WASHINGTON BYSTANDER

By KIRKE L. SIMPSON

Washington—Probably this business of being a ward of the federal government rather than a full-fledged municipality enjoying certain sovereign rights has advantages as well as disadvantages.

Just at present, however, Washington's more than half a million permanent residents and the army of motorized tourists flowing constantly through its streets are fast—and cussing—the practical penalties attached to being budgeted on a fiscal year basis, like any government department.

It seems almost impossible to make your way in any direction at any distance without encountering a "street closed" sign and observing ahead streets ripped and torn as by some titanic shell barrage. Direct routes are always difficult to find in a city gridironed by its numbered and lettered streets but with a separate system of diagonal avenues superimposed on that rectangular gridiron.

Circles Confusing.

The "circles" of Washington—they'd call 'em "circuses" in London for some reason known only to Londoners—are the hubs where the right angle streets and the diagonal avenues intersect. Any traveler of Washington experience will recall the difficulties he faced if he ever tried to pursue his way about on a first visit up some street-spoke of one of these highway wheels to the circle-hub, around that on a long sidewalk curve with intermediate neck risks at every crossing of the other street-spokes, and so select the projection of his own, original course from the opposite rim of the circle.

Added to this normal traffic complication, beginning July 1 when the street work and sewer budget funds for the current fiscal year became available to the District of Columbia authorities, there is now such a street upheaval as makes it look as though Washington was being rebuilt, hastily, from the ground up. Even the street car companies have caught the fever. New funds for the huge federal building program have added to that confusion in certain sections. Wherever an appalled motorist turns he is faced by those ominous "detour" commands.

New And Bigger City.

Part of the trouble is due to the fact that Washington is growing up. Day by day it is taking on more and more the appearance of one of the world's great capitals. It is chiefly noticeable by the street widening campaign now several years in progress. Whole blocks of stately old trees, gracing the sidewalk edges before modest brick houses sat fat back off the property line behind flowers and tree decked "front yards," have been sacrificed to the onward march of progress. Ten to twenty foot slashes from the wide sidewalks have been added to the vehicle roadways and mighty traffic thoroughfares resulted. The old, sleepy, peaceful look and habit of this village among the great commercial municipalities of no greater population is passing. But as each project of street widening is finished, an army of gardeners stamps close on the heels of the steam-shovel and concrete-mixer crews. New tree plantings are in almost before the wreckage of the old has been hauled away.

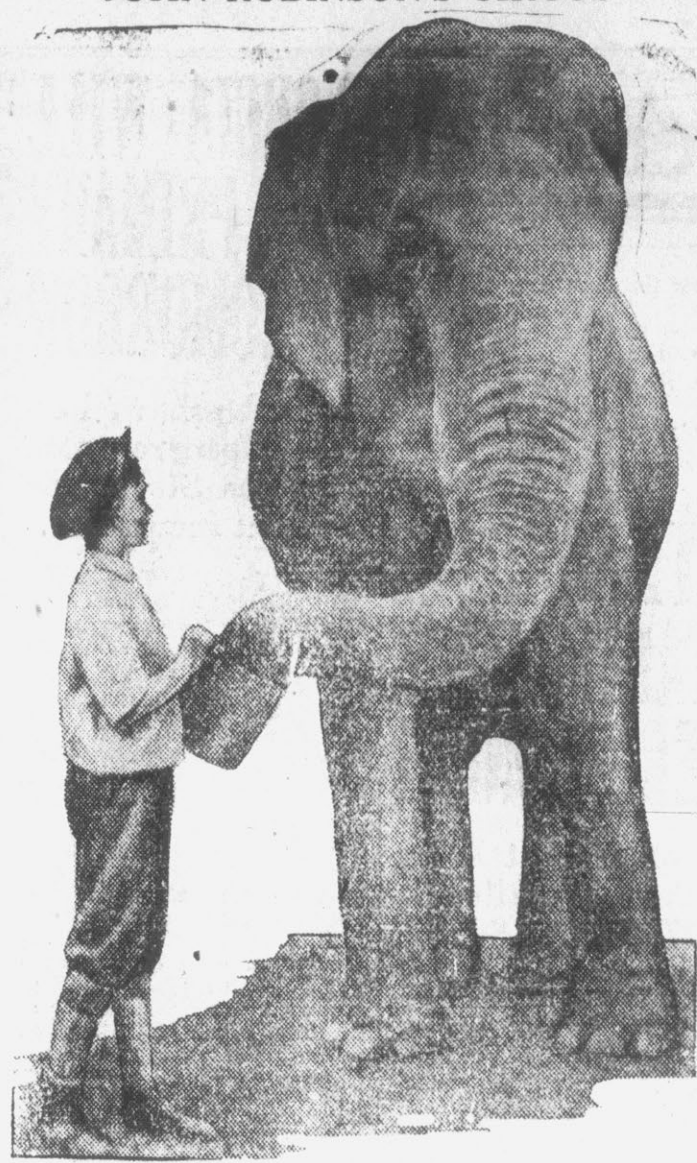

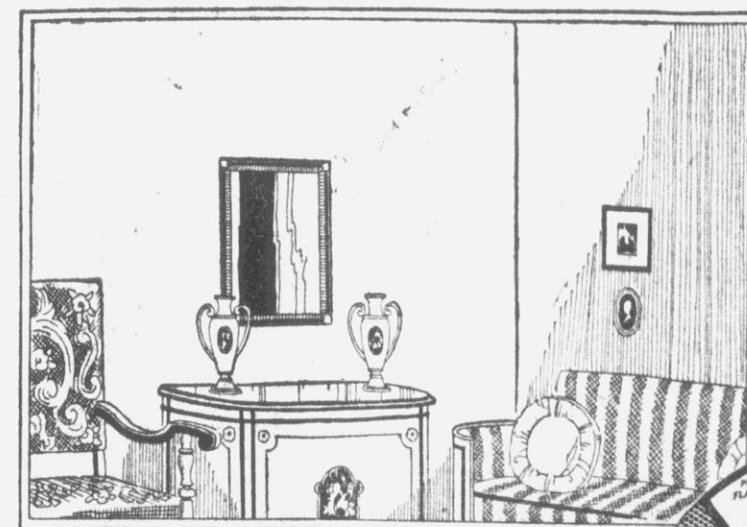

In the excitement over Connie Mack's bold bid for the American League pennant, the desperate battle being waged in John Heydler's circuit has been somewhat overlooked for the past week or so.

While the Athletics and the Yankees had an off-day yesterday before resuming their vital four game series at the Yankees stadium, the New York Giants inaugurated their four-day eight-game series at Boston by taking both ends of a double header with the Braves and thereby pushed themselves back into the thick of the running.

This double victory for the Clan McGraw combined with defeats for St. Louis and Chicago, left the Giants only a single percentage point back of the Cubs and but three games removed from the league leading Cardinals.

Notwithstanding the story the standing of the Giants are face to face with virtual elimination from the race. The task of playing three more double headers with the Braves in as many days and the manager who can get better than an even break out of that arrangement deserves a vote of commendation.

But McGraw had not trouble yesterday and he may not through this last night's nightmare with a minimum of damage. He needed only two pitchers to win the first two games of the series and pitching, of course, is the principal problem when double headers pile up. Fred Fitzsimmons scattered the Braves seven hits in the opener and won 4 to 1. Joe Conewich let his old Boston comrades down with three hits in the nightcap and the Giants capped 11 to 0.

Cincinnati beat St. Louis 7 to 2, in the opening game of the series. The Cardinals lost their third straight game but kept intact their two and a half game lead over the second place Cubs who gracefully dropped one to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7 to 5.

Brooklyn and Philadelphia divided a double header. The Phils took the opener, 11 to 6, with the aid of Charlie Klein's home run

and three singles. William Watson Clark pitched the Robins to victory in the closing engagement, 7 to 2.

Washington ended its home season just as it opened it—by losing to the Boston Red Sox, one only difference was in the score. They lost the opening game, 7 to 5, and yesterday's 5 to 2. The victory gave the Red Sox the season's series between the two clubs, 13 to 9.

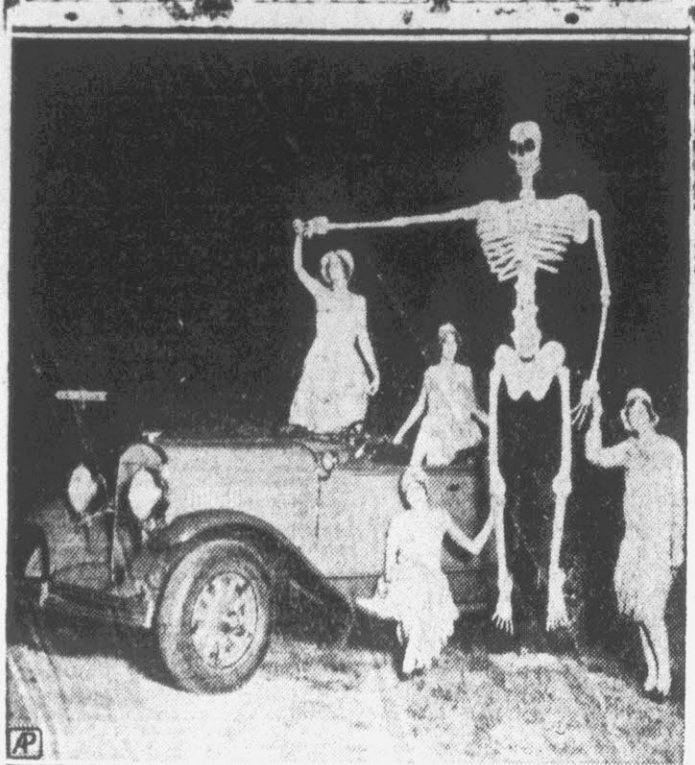
New York, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Wild speculation for the advance was resumed in today's stock market after an early period of irregularity. Extreme gains in the pool specialties ranged from 3 to 14 points, with at least two score issues pushed into new high ground for the year, or longer.

Uneasiness over the credit situation, which accounted for much of the early selling, disappeared when word was passed around that a plentiful supply of call money was available at the renewal figure of 7 1-2 per cent, and that the rate was likely to hold for the rest of the week. Time money rates continued firm, with the 7 per cent asking rate maintained for the short maturities. Expectations of gold imports from London failed to materialize, although cable dispatches from London indicated that such shipments were likely in the near future.

Sale of New York stock exchange membership at the record breaking price of \$410,000 was one of the most interesting developments of the day. Except for the publication of several favorable earnings statements, there was little in the day's news to influence the price movement. Revival of activity and strength in some of the oil shares was associated with reports that Walter C. Teague, president of the Standard Oil Co., of New Jersey would have an important statement to make on plans for the world curtailment of crude on his return from Europe on Friday.

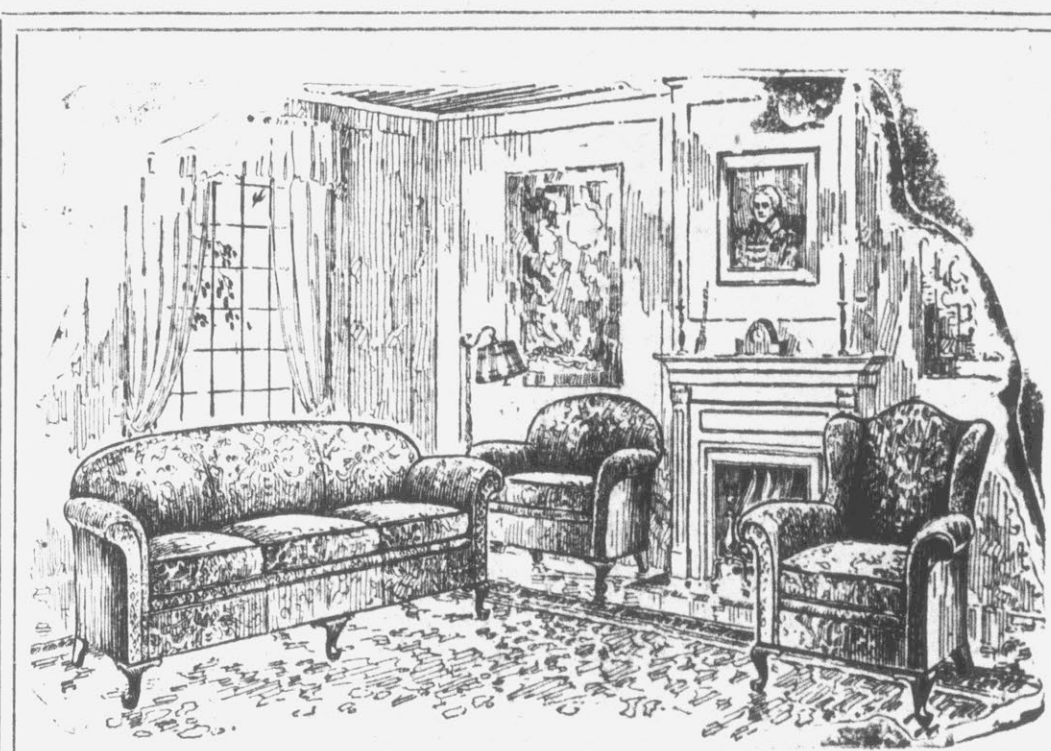
