GIANT AIR LINER LANDS  
IN GERMANY, COMPLETING  
RECORD-BREAKING FLIGHT

Trans-Atlantic Voyage Completed In 68 Hours, 56 Minutes; American Stowaway Spirited From Ship While Crowd Yells To See Him.

Friedrichshafen, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Having landed passengers and a stowaway from America, the Graf Zeppelin huge air liner, was safe in her hangar today with a new record for a trans-Atlantic flight by airship to her credit.

The dirigible completed the first round trip commercial flight over the Atlantic today when she was landed at Friedrichshafen at 7:06 a. m. (1:06 a. m., E. S. T.). She had covered more than 10,000 miles starting from Friedrichshafen on October 11 for Lakehurst, N. J. Since leaving Lakehurst at 1:54 a. m., E. S. T., on Monday, the airship had covered slightly more than 4,000 miles and was landed after being in the air 71 hours and 12 minutes.

Actually the Graf Zeppelin got home in 68 hours and 56 minutes. She first appeared over the air-drome at 4:50 a. m. For more than two hours the airship cruised around waiting for dawn to break, the lighting facilities being inadequate for a landing at night.

A boisterous crowd which broke through police lines was eager to catch a glimpse of Clarence Terhune, the 19-year-old caddy, whose daring in stowing away aboard the airship had captured their imagination.

Where, Terhune? They were yelling. "Let him come out," they implored. But what had happened to the youth was a mystery to the crowd that watched the arrival.

Soon after customs officials had boarded the air liner, the official reception committee, of which John F. Kohl, United States consul at Stuttgart, was a member, entered the hangar. Kohl boarded the airship to meet Terhune, who was seen at the window of the airship's kitchen wearing an overcoat with the collar turned up. A few minutes later a German official handed Terhune a document which the stowaway was seen reading with the assistance of Kohl. Later Terhune apparently was spirited out of the hangar by the door to the disappointment of the crowd.

When the customs officials entered the door of the cabin Mrs. Clara Adams of Tannersville, Pa., the only woman aboard, was standing framed in the doorway. She was greeted with loud cheers. A few minutes afterwards the score of passengers aboard, some of whom had made the trip to America and return by the airship, landed. Mrs. Adams being among the first.

The passengers and crew had great difficulty in getting out of the hangar into which part of the crowd had made its way while thousands outside cheered and barked played "Deutschland Ueber Alles" and "The Star Spangled Banner."

Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander and builder of the airship, asked to be excused from any reception formalities until 6 p. m. He explained that he was thoroughly tired and needed a rest.

Dr. Eckener was asked to speak at the microphone so that the radio audience might hear his voice. "All Europe is waiting for a word from you," the announcer said. The commander, however, merely shook his head and declined the invitation.

Mrs. Adams was also asked to speak and also declined. An hour after the Graf Zeppelin had been berthed in the hangar the crowds which had been assembling since yesterday began to disperse. The passengers and crew had left and the doors of the hangar were closed slowly on the largest airship ever built.

Friedrichshafen, Germany, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Clarence Terhune, the irrepressible 19-year-old American stowaway on the air liner Graf Zeppelin, was given a triumphant reception by a cheering crowd in Friedrichshafen today.

Clarence was smuggled out of one of the rear gondolas of the Zeppelin into the custody of police soon after the dirigible had landed and was taken to the hotel apartment of John F. Kohl, American consul, where a long private talk was held. When the young stowaway emerged from the hotel, cheering crowds raised him on their shoulders and paraded with him down the streets.

Asked what he intended to do, he replied that he must "first look through his mail and then decide what to do next. I'm not worrying about the future," he said, adding that he did not intend to remain in Europe for any length of time.

Florida Bank Vault Empty

Groveland, Fla., Nov. 1.—(AP)—The time lock, set Monday by a missing cashier, yielded open the doors to the vault at the Bank of Groveland at 11 o'clock today, but no money was located. George C. White, state bank examiner, announced.

"There was no money in the money chest," the examiner declared. He also said that no letters having a direct bearing on the case were located. The time lock had been set for 72 hours.

J. M. Hightower, the missing cashier, is sought on a warrant charging larceny of \$3,000. White said, although he could not estimate what the shortage would be. The examiner has said that Hightower was known to have taken at least \$1,000 of the bank's funds.

Authorities said the bank had something like \$20,000 in the vault before it was locked.

Examiner White said Hightower had been keeping drafts on distant banks for sometime, but was unable to disclose accurate figures.

Arrange For State Budget

Raleigh, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Making up North Carolina's budget for the biennium beginning next July 1 began today when the Advisory Budget Commission met for a two-day session to hear heads of various departments on their needs for the period. Under the law, Gov. McLean, as ex-officio director of the budget, must submit his recommendations by December 15 to his successor, who will be chosen in Tuesday's election.

The governor's office, commissioner of pardons, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and department of agriculture were allotted time on today's schedule of hearings.

The commission is composed of A. H. Graham, chairman of the House Finance Committee; Zeb V. Turlington, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee; Walter Woodson, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee; and R. S. McCain, appointed by the governor, in addition to the governor, as ex-officio director. P. H. Williams, assistant director, and Henry Burke budget expert.

CLEVELAND TO SPEAK  
HERE FRIDAY EVENING

Richard Cleveland, son of former President Grover Cleveland, will address the Democratic voters of Pitt county at the court house in this city tomorrow night at 7:30 o'clock. Arrangements for his coming were completed today by members of the Pitt County Democratic Executive Committee, who anticipate the largest crowd of any speaking during the campaign.

"Pitt county is exceptionally fortunate in obtaining the services of such a distinguished member of the party," said W. E. Hooks, chairman of the Democratic committee, in the city this morning assisting in arrangement of final plans for the speaking. "Mr. Cleveland is one of the finest orators we have on the stump in this campaign and his coming to Greenville should attract hundreds of people from other parts of the state."

After speaking here, Mr. Cleveland will go to New Bern where he will speak the following evening. He will appear only in two cities in Eastern North Carolina in his invasion of the state.

SMITH WINDS  
UP FIGHT AT  
NEWARK, N. J.

Democratic Nominee To Concentrate On New York From Now To Election.

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) New York, Nov. 1.—(AP)—With a dash into New Jersey where he criticized his Republican opponent for what he characterized as "fooling of the people" on all the big questions of the day, Gov. Smith has wound up his campaign away from home.

From now until election day, he will concentrate his efforts on his home state of New York, with its 45 electoral votes.

Speeches in Brooklyn tomorrow night on statute issues and in New York City Saturday night will conclude the governor's appearances before large campaign audiences. He will make a radio appeal from his suite in the Hotel Baltimore on election eve after Herbert Hoover has had his final say to the voters from Palo Alto, Calif.

Last night Smith spoke at the 113th regiment armory, Newark, after having been acclaimed by thousands of torch-bearing well-wishers during his trip by automobile through Hoboken, Jersey City and other Republican campaign enroute. He tore into the Republican campaign in sarcastic fashion, particularly as to their arguments on labor and farm relief.

He attacked Hoover's speech made in the same armory several weeks ago and assailed Charles Evans Hughes and Senator Borah, the mention of whose names brought boos from the audience.

"Hoover," he said, "should have been a candidate instead of Hoover because he was 'doing more to elect the Republican president than the nominee himself.'"

He said Hoover had made an "exaggerated statement" when he declared in Newark that "real wages and standards of living of our labor have improved more during the past seven and a half years of Republican rule than during any similar period in the history of our country." Credit for such conditions was given to Woodrow Wilson by the Democratic nominee.

After challenging figures from the opposition camp on unemployment and assailing the Republican plan on labor injunctions, Smith said his own program called for the "necessary appropriation to the department of labor" to enable it to make adequate surveys on unemployment so "this question of veracity as between officials" will never arise again.

He said he was satisfied the American people was "not wedded to a policy of holding back public works in order to make a false showing of economy."

"Furthermore, he was 'distinctly in favor of a thorough study of the methods of industry, the newly adopted methods of industry, so that we may be able to absorb the surplus labor that is released because of the introduction of modern machinery.'"

Smith termed the Republican plank on labor injunctions "meaningless" and "senseless," and said the Democrats had promised a definite remedy "by law" to end "the existing evils."

"The care of the exportable surplus crops," said the governor, "is the underlying, fundamental question behind constructive farm relief, and Mr. Hoover is unalterably opposed to that."

The county Democratic chairman expressed belief today that the democratic party would roll up an overwhelming majority election day, November 6th. With nearly six hundred new registrations in Greenville township alone, Mr. Hooks said he also anticipated the "seaviest vote in history of the county." "Hundreds of women who never went to the polls before will cast their ballot this time and we believe the Democrats will receive greater support than ever," he said.

Splendid work done by the various Democratic clubs over the county came in for considerable commendation from the county chairman. He praised the work done in outlying communities, and expressed belief that even the isolated sections would turn in a record vote. People are better informed concerning the paramount issues in this campaign than they have ever been before, he said, and for that reason numbers will go to the polls who never voted in a presidential election before.

Three Killed Near  
Hickory When Train  
Hits Automobile

Hickory, N. C., Nov. 1.—(AP) Three people were killed last night near Maiden when the car in which they were riding was struck by a Carolina and Northwestern freight train. The trio was all young and were enroute to a Halloween celebration at the time of the accident. A double funeral was held in Maiden today for Carl Frazier and Thurmond Biggers Taff, both 18, who were two of the victims and another funeral was held in Conover for Miss Sallie Yancey, 18, the third victim.

SPIRIT LOVE  
WOMAN FACES  
DEATH TODAY

Elfrieda Knaak Given Last Chance to Clear Up Mystery of Burning Herself.

Lake Bluff, Ill., Nov. 1.—(AP)—They gave Miss Elfrieda Knaak her last chance today to change her story of self-immolation; of burning herself, feet, arms and head to prove faith in the weird "spirit love" she had persisted professed. And she would not change it.

It was the pretty book agent-psychology student's last chance, because doctors said her death was a matter of hours only; and Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle and George Hargrave, private detective, said it was vital to their investigation that they have from the dying woman's own lips a more believable story of what happened Monday night in the furnace room of the Lake Bluff police station.

By words and signs these two men questioned her. She was near death, they told her. A new, final statement was asked. Unless she added some new word, the investigation must end no nearer solution of the peculiar affair than when it started.

Miss Knaak told them that her previously repeated story was a true account of what happened: that she had gone alone to the police station Monday night; had there until early Tuesday morning, and then had gone to the furnace room and tortured herself by fire to prove her "spirit faith." One arm, then another, she laid on the live coals of the furnace, then her right foot, then her left, completing the rite by poking her head through the narrow furnace door and holding her head over the fire until she was burned to the skull.

The path of blood leading from the furnace to the rear door of the basement? That, she said, was made after the fire rite. She was going home, she explained, but the door was locked. Who locked it? "The mysterious hand," was all she would say.

But why persisted Hargrave, unwilling to accept the mystic explanation of the spirit love, of self-torture, why did you do it? And the answer: "I do not know."

"The young woman's will was all that kept her alive until morning, doctors said. If she survived today, plans were completed for amputation of one foot, toes of the other, and both hands.

Hunger Striker  
Gets Release At  
Little Rock, Ark.

Little Rock, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Charles Smith, president of the advancement of Atheism was indignant today because he probably would be a prisoner of the city of Little Rock no longer.

Smith, in a local hospital on a "hunger strike" in protest against a \$25 fine levied on charges of distributing literature in breach of the peace, was told late yesterday that the fine had been paid by an unidentified man.

He immediately became indignant and said he would refuse to leave the hospital in his 15th day of fasting unless ejected, despite the statement of physicians that he would be "released" today provided his temperature was normal, as it was yesterday.

FINDS HUSBAND ALIVE  
AFTER HIS FUNERAL

Chicago, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Mrs. Joseph Nalepa has found her husband alive two days after "his" funeral.

He disappeared two weeks ago. A man's body was dragged from Lake Michigan; Mrs. Nalepa said it was her husband's.

Upon the advice of friends, she went to a hospital last night. There she found her husband, alive and recovering from a mental lapse.

ASK REMOVAL  
OF ASA KEYES  
IN CALIFORNIA

District Attorney Charged With Corrupt Misconduct Of Office.

Los Angeles, Nov. 1.—(AP)—An indictment against Asa Keyes, prominent district attorney of Los Angeles county, charging "willful and corrupt misconduct in office," was returned here last night by the county grand jury, which also filed an "accusation" in superior court demanding his removal from office.

The indictment charged that Keyes, who gained widespread publicity in the investigation of the Almeda Semple McPherson disappearance case and in the conviction of William Edward Hickman, who was recently executed, had accepted money from several persons in exchange for dismissal of indictments against them, or, failing in that, acquittal at the hands of the juries.

One of the counts alleged that Keyes took \$10,000 from Jacob Berman, alias Jack Bennett, in consummating an alleged agreement by which Berman escaped conviction on charges growing out of the failure here last fall of the Julian Petroleum Corporation for several million dollars.

The grand jury's accusation included the charge that Keyes conspired with Berman and E. H. Rosenberg and Jack Rosenberg to effect their acquittal of charges involved in the collapse of the corporation in a gigantic stock tangle.

Secret indictments against three other persons also were returned. Bench warrants for the district attorney and for the others named in the indictments were issued last night. The grand jury recommended that Keyes be released on his own recognizance.

Mr. Keyes recently announced that he would retire from office on December 5, allowing his successor, Burton Fitts, who was elected last September to take office then. Fitts gave up the lieutenant governorship of California to run for district attorney in Los Angeles county on an anti-life platform.

Keyes made the following statement last night concerning the charges:

"I really don't know what this is about. I was never called before the grand jury nor was there apparently any effort made to get anything but the statements of some outside parties. I understood that the names of some of the witnesses appearing before the grand jury on which the indictments and accusations were based, are people who tried to blackmail a man out of money on the theory that they could do just what was done."

"It is also significant that the chief party instrumental in producing these matters is a discharged employee."

"I expect to investigate and find out what this is all about, and make a complete statement."

Seven Hurt  
In Accidents  
At Asheville

Asheville, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Seven persons were hurt in a variety of Halloween accidents here last night. Three automobiles were forced down embankments, all of the occupants except one escaping injury. No one was in a serious condition.

Miss Nina Sumner was knocked unconscious in the midst of the up-town Halloween celebration, when a blow, it is charged, from the fist of Harold English missed its mark on another's face and landed in Miss Sumner's eye.

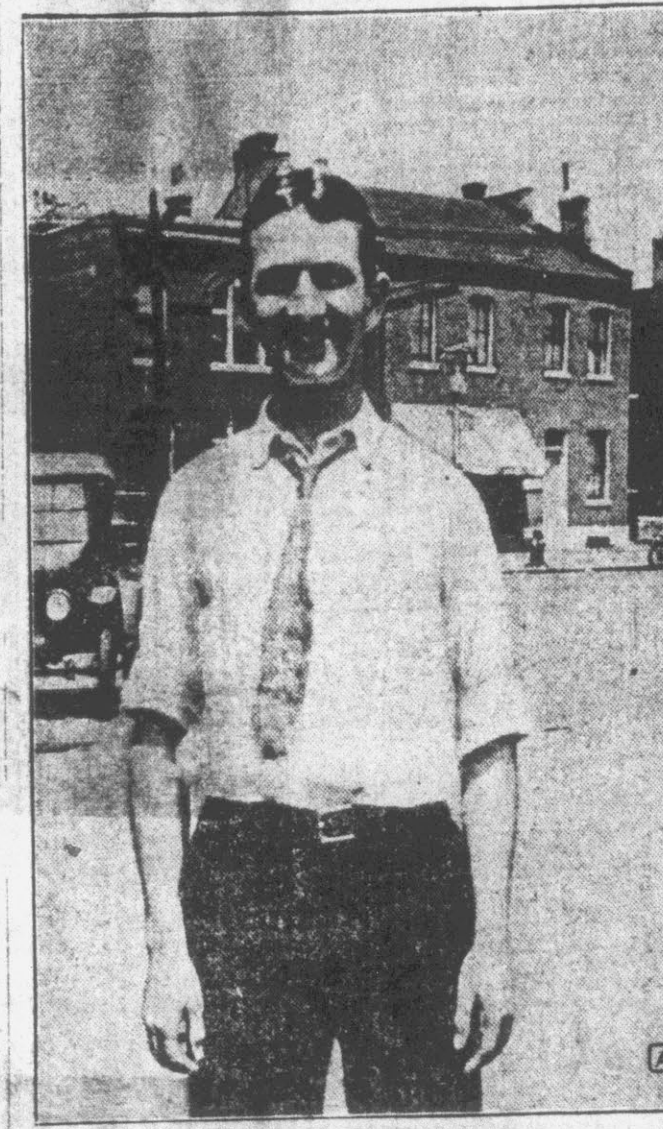

CHARGES G. O. P. WITH  
PROMOTING ATTACKS ON  
GOV. ALFRED E. SMITH

New York, Nov. 1.—(AP)—John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, charges that persons associated with the Republican party and its national committee are promoting attacks on Governor Smith because of his religion.

The accusation was made in a letter to Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican National Committee. Mr. Raskob enclosed material upon which he based his charges. A copy of the letter and enclosures also was sent to Herbert Hoover.

The material included a photostatic copy of a letter purporting to have been written by Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire to "Hon. Zeb Vance Walser, Lexington, Ky.," and copies of affidavits by four persons who swore they had received through the mails or at Republican headquarters or at meetings printed anti-Catholic material.

The letter purporting to be from Senator Moses referred to an article written by a "native of South Carolina now engaged in newspaper work in New York City," which the letter called "red hot stuff." It asked that Mr. Walser have the article printed in North Carolina papers.

Mr. Raskob termed the article "one of the most vicious anti-Catholic articles that has ever been penned for publication."

He said he had no knowledge who Zeb Vance Walser was, but that the letter apparently had been intended for Lexington, N. C., and sent to Lexington, Ky., by mistake.

Mr. Raskob did not make public the article to which he referred but called on Chairman Moses to produce a copy. Senator Moses is vice-chairman of the Republican eastern advisory committee.

The four affidavits were from Bernice Smalley, Wichita, Kansas; R. X. Williams, Jr., of Oxford, Miss.; J. E. Woodward, Oxford, Miss.; and H. V. Winningham of Corbin, Ky.

The affidavit from Bernice Smalley states that on October 27 she called at the Strowick county Republican headquarters in Wichita and received a variety of literature including a copy of the Fellowship Forum, published at Washington, D. C., of which Mr. Raskob wrote that "its sole purpose seems to be to attack the Catholic religion and Governor Smith."

The affidavits from Williams and Woodward state that they received letters in which were enclosed material on how to vote the Republican ticket, signed by Lemont Rowlands, "Republican national chairman, Jackson, Miss.," a photograph of an alleged negro appointee of Tammany Hall dictating to a white woman stenographer bearing the label that it was reprinted from the Fellowship Forum and a bulletin of anti-Catholic propaganda bearing the imprint of the Sons and Daughters of Washington.

Approve Widening  
State Highway 10,  
West Of Raleigh

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 1.—(AP)—Widening of State Highway No. 10, just west of Raleigh, to alleviate congestion of traffic to and from the State Fair grounds during the annual State Fair, has been approved as advisable and feasible by Frank Page, chief highway commissioner, it was said today by Governor McLean, who proposed to the commissioner that this route be paved forty feet wide instead of 18 as at present.

In his statement, which pronounced the recent fair, the first ever operated as a State-owned enterprise, a success, the Governor announced also that the highway department had agreed to transfer to the fair 200 additional feet of frontage on the highway, which he said would "greatly improve the frontage of the fair grounds on highway No. 10, and provide additional means of ingress and egress to the fair grounds."

The governor suggested that special parking enclosures be provided to the west of the present fair grounds enclosure to accommodate from 5,000 to 10,000 automobiles.

In order that the plan may be used more frequently than once a year, the governor mentioned the possibility of an arrangement with the city of Raleigh whereby the latter would erect a stadium for football games and other attractions, capable of seating from 25,000 to 50,000 people.

Light Sales On  
Tobacco Market  
Here Yesterday

Lightest sales of the season were recorded on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday, according to information given out this afternoon by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales.

The market sold 373,876 pounds of bright leaf for a total sum of \$88,103.89, at an average of \$23.09 per hundred pounds.

The report stated that there was about a million pounds of leaf on the floors of the nine warehouses today with prices on all grades considerably stranger.

SNOW STORM  
SWEEPS OVER  
MIDDLE WEST

Second Blizzard Of The Season Whips Across Central Prairies.

Kansas City, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Wintry winds, bringing lower temperatures, snow and rain, swept November into the Middle West today as the second Rocky Mountain blizzard of the season whipped out over the central prairies.

Strong, shifting winds prevailed and the outlook was for snow over the upper Mississippi region, in Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle. Rain, accompanied by falling temperatures, was general over this area yesterday.

Heavy snow, which blanketed the Rocky Mountain regions, has halted air mail traffic, made highways nearly impassable, and threatened rail transportation there. Reports reaching Denver, which city received its first snow of the season last night, said that a severe storm was raging in the high Colorado Rockies, and that snow was drifting rapidly.

In a few hours the mercury fell from 39 to 22 degrees at Denver and railroad officials were reported in close touch with mountain points in the belief some of the high passes might be closed soon.

Wyoming was caught in the real brunt of the storm, with from three to five inches of snow reported over the state. Cheyenne reported no movement of air mail planes in east section, and storm warnings were issued to motorists.

Atlanta, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Cold weather, with brisk northwest winds was forecast for most states in the south Saturday and Sunday by the Atlanta weather bureau today.

"It will be ideal football weather insofar as temperatures are concerned, but there may be brisk winds from the northwest," said C. F. Von Hermann, in charge of the bureau.

While warmer weather was predicted for the south tonight, Mr. Von Hermann said a blizzard which struck the northwest and middle west yesterday and today would be felt here over the week-end but with temperatures much higher than prevailed in the regions west of the Mississippi.

November was ushered into the south with brisk temperatures in the upper portion of the southern states today. While they were nothing to compare with the 16 degree reading at Sheridan, Wyoming, they were enough to bring out overcoats in many cities.

At 7 a. m. (C. T.) today, Lynchburg, Va., reported a reading of 34; Asheville, N. C., 35; Chattanooga, Tenn., 42; Charlotte, N. C., 40; Raleigh, N. C., 44; Atlanta, 44; Louisville, Ky., 42; Nashville, 46; Memphis 54; Augusta 50; Birmingham and Montgomery 50; Macon, 46; Vicksburg, 52; New Orleans 62; Little Rock 52; Jacksonville 68; Tampa 66 and Miami 78.

Showers or cloudy weather to night and Friday were forecast in Virginia, North and South Carolina.

Two Killers May  
Plead Insanity

Atlanta, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Insanity was a probable plea in defense of George Harsh and Richard Galloway, wealthy college students who are accused of killing two victims in a series of holdups, as the defense moved today in secret on behalf of the youths.

Solicitor General John A. Boykin, who learned that Dr. Frank Eskridge, Atlanta alienist, had visited the two boys in their Fulton county jail cells, where they are awaiting trial under murder indictments, immediately announced that he prepared for an insanity defense.

The solicitor, however, said he could not reveal what steps he was taking in that direction and would not reveal any more of the state's case against the two youths, one of whom has confessed that he killed E. H. Meeks, a grocery clerk, and Willard Smith, a drug store manager, in a series of seven holdups. Harsh, who made the confession after he had been traced through a pair of blood-stained trousers, said he shot the men and that Galloway drove an automobile in which they got away. Police said Galloway had made a partial oral confession.

Meanwhile Harsh and Galloway, who had never been detained on criminal charges before, were fitting into prison routine easily, having established themselves on a friendly basis with fellow prisoners.

One of Harsh's cell mates is Clinton S. Carnes, former treasurer of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, who is awaiting trial on charges of having embezzled \$1,000,000 in church funds.

# GRAND JURY RECOMMENDS SIX OR TWELVE MONTHS JURY FOR STATE COURTS

Expressing belief that six or twelve months grand jury is advisable and would better meet the needs that a grand jury should serve, members of the grand jury of the Criminal term of Pitt county superior court in progress in this city, today presented a report of their activities to Judge R. A. Nunn.

"We urgently recommend that our representative in the State Legislature be advised to introduce a bill providing for such a jury," the report continued.

Several other recommendations having a direct bearing upon the life of the community were contained in the report. Principal among them was praise of the county officials for the splendid condition of offices and their services to the state.

The report in detail follows:

To the Honorable R. A. Nunn, Judge presiding:

We, the Grand Jurors of the October Term, 1928, of the Superior court of Pitt county, do hereby respectfully submit the following report:

We have passed on all bills that have come before us except those wherein the witnesses could not be found, and have made presentment in all cases coming to our knowledge in which we deemed it just and proper to do so.

We have visited all the various offices and institutions of the county as required by law. We found all the offices and records in excellent condition and most efficiently managed. We are glad to report that in every instance we found the institutions of the county in the best sanitary condition and efficiently managed. We especially wish to commend the excellent conditions of the convict camp and the county home.

We cannot commend too highly the various county officers for the excellent condition in which the offices and records are kept and for the efficient management we found in all instances. We feel that each is an asset to the county and to the state in their respective positions.

We recommend:

That the county commissioners try to arrange some way to take care of the sick prisoners and convicts under more suitable conditions than they can be taken care of in jail or in the convict camp. We found that Andrew Gray, negro jail prisoner, is unable to do any work whatsoever and is very sick. We recommend that he be placed elsewhere or steps be taken for his pardon or parole.

Believing that a six or twelve months grand jury is advisable and would better meet the needs that a grand jury should serve, we urgently recommend that our representative in the State Legislature be advised to introduce a bill providing for same in the next legislature.

Observation having shown us that filing stations remaining open all day Sundays are conducive to disorder, drinking and other violations of the law, we recommend that our representatives in the next legislature introduce a state-wide bill prohibiting the keeping open of filing stations except on certain hours on Sundays.

We wish to extend our hearty thanks to the Honorable Judge and Solicitor for the aid rendered us during this term of court, and also the other officers of the court who have readily assisted us in carrying out the numerous duties required of us as the Grand Jury of Pitt County. We wish to commend the Honorable Judge for his wise conduct of the court and the Solicitor for his efficient dispatch of the court's business.

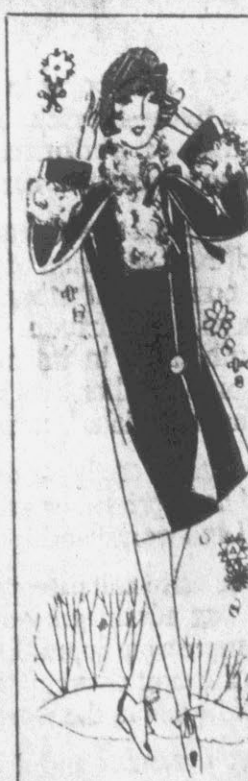

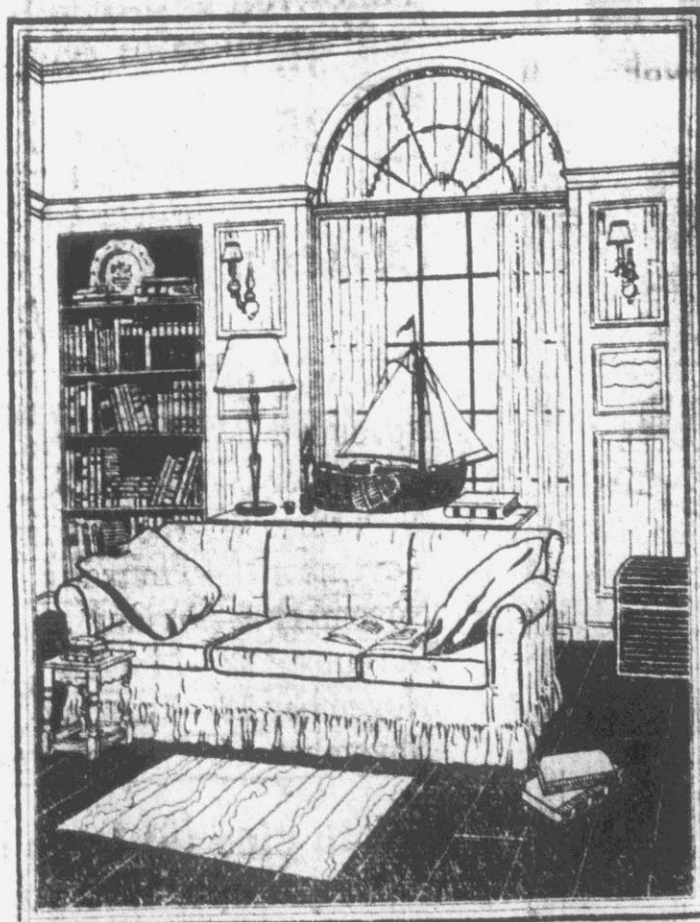

for things we might raise ourselves,  
and why not keep it at home by  
raising them."

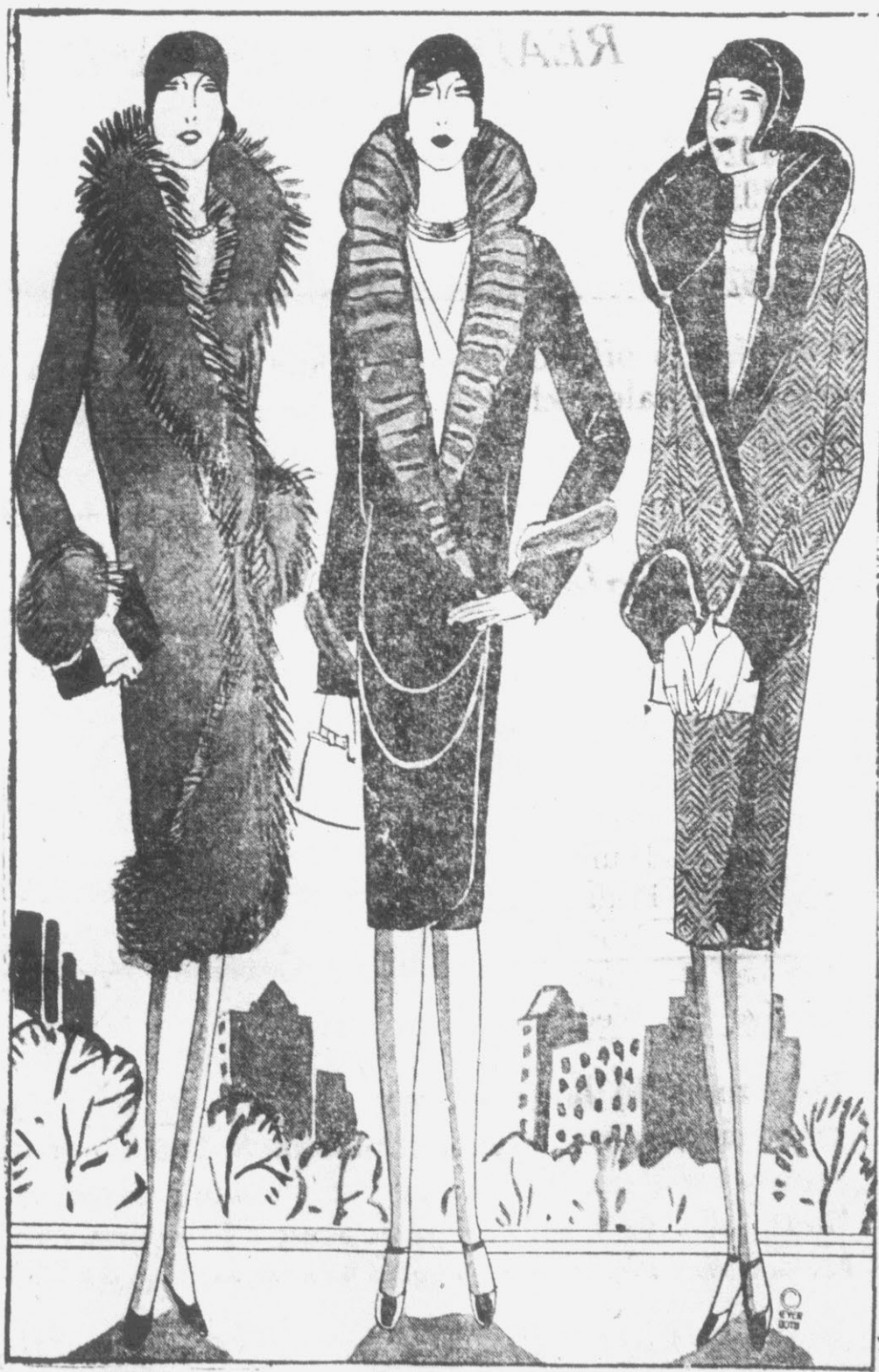

## FOOTBALL SLANTS

New York, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Football championship aspirations, sectional or national, that have taken bud in October, face the prospects of a killing frost, if not a few destructive blizzards from opposition territory in November.

The array of college eleven having title hopes of nation-wide concern as they enter the final month of gridiron campaigning, headed for the storm areas, has dwindled to a select dozen or so of hardy aggregations.

They can't all weather the big blasts of November but among the foremost are West Point, New York University, Georgetown and Carnegie in the east; Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Georgia Tech in the South; Nebraska, Iowa, Ohio State and Illinois in the middle west; Utah in the rugged Rock Mountain area and Stanford on the Pacific coast.

As it happens there are any number of low pressure areas ahead for most, if not all of these outfits. It is pretty well known that the unbeaten army eleven faces a succession of blustery afternoons against such teams as Notre Dame, Nebraska and Stanford before the final returns are tabulated on the cadet championship claims.

The hopes of New York University or Georgetown should be abruptly settled this week. These two scoring hurricanes swirl into each and the shock should be felt for some distance beyond the confines of the Yankee stadium.

No matter which wins, however, it will have additional storm signals ahead. N. Y. U.'s remaining list of opponents includes Missouri, unbeaten Carnegie and the Oregon Aggies. Georgetown plays Carnegie next week, then West Virginia, Fardham and Detroit, all strong teams. Carnegie plays Notre Dame in between these engagements with Georgetown and N. Y. U.

There will be no dispute about it if Ohio State finishes with a clean slate and wins the "big ten" title. The Buckeyes, after battling Princeton this week, plays Iowa and Illinois, at present the only two remaining conference teams neither beaten nor tied.

Vanderbilt and Georgia Tech's Golden Tornado, two of the outstanding Southern Conference contenders with unblemished records, settle their private argument next week at Atlanta.

It will take a lot of master-minding to pick this year's all-American quarterback, at the rate any number of them have been performing so far. The Pacific Coast has put the spotlight on Don Williams, of Southern California. The Middle West counters with at least one outstanding star in Fred Hovde of Minnesota, while the East contributes Howard Harpster, Carnegie captain, to the debate. In the South, "Cannonball Clyde" Crabtree, Florida's quarterback, and Jimmy Armstead, Vanderbilt captain, are offered for consideration.

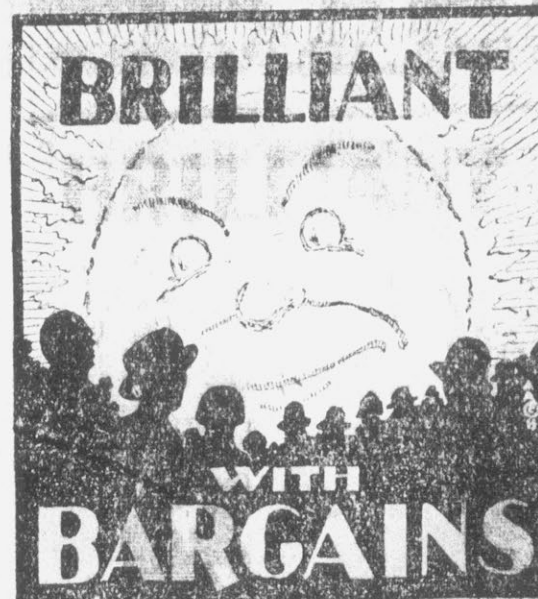

Spence, of Duke University, chairman of the conference Sunday School Board. Dr. John W. Shackford of Nashville, Tenn., general secretary of the General Sunday School Board of the Southern Methodist church, delivered the feature address of the program. Rev. J. O. Long, extension secretary, and Rev. L. L. Gobbel, conference superintendent of Sunday School Work, also made short talks concerning the year's work.

Dr. Shackford, after expressing high appreciation of the Sunday school work of the North Carolina conference as promoted by Rev. L. L. Gobbel, launched into a challenging discussion of the place of religious education in the program of the church and more particularly its place and mission in changing the world.

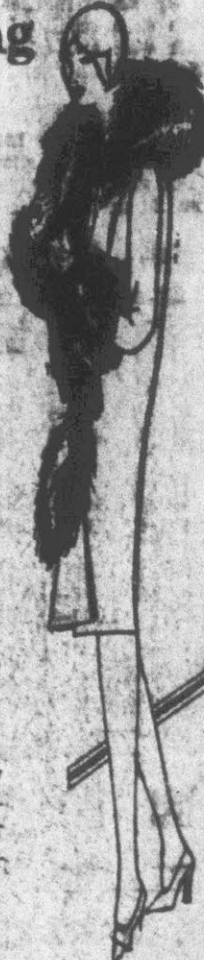

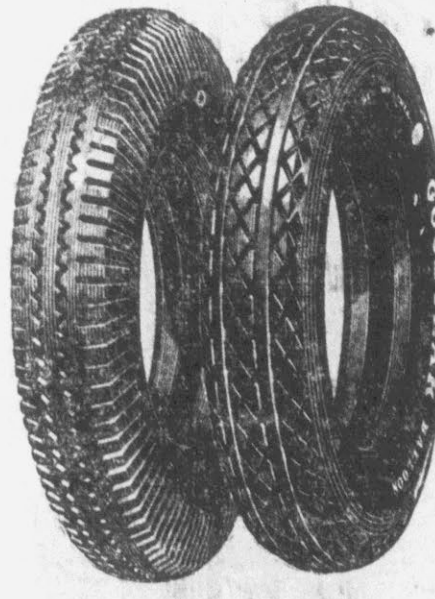

Private cables reported continental buying supplied by hedge selling and Bombay selling in a quiet market at Liverpool. Fair cloth sales were reported to India, but Shanghai auctions were less favorable.

### GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Nov. 1. (AP)—Wheat advanced sharply at times today on account of persistent buying for houses with eastern and foreign connections, but gains failed to hold well. The buying was associated with predictions in some quarters that a racial curtailment would be made in Canadian official wheat crop estimates, and that important farm relief developments soon were likely. Besides, further excessive rains in North Argentina were reported, and the corn market was stronger, both as a result of blizzard weather west and of bullish aspects of November unofficial crop figures.

Wheat closed nervous at the same as yesterday's finish to 1-4c higher; corn to 13-8c up, oats showing 1-4 to 1-2c gain, and provisions varying from 2c decline to a rise of 5c.

### STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Frequent shifts of speculative sentiment, reflecting nervousness on the part of large and small traders, characterized today's stock market, but major operations were again on the side of rising prices. As in most recent sessions, a wave of selling swept through the market before mid-day, touching off a number of "stop loss" orders and bringing about a few sharp declines, but supporting orders were quickly supplied and new leaders brought forward by pool operators.

Railroad shares assumed increasing prominence when a brisk demand developed for several of the high grade issues. Union Pacific crossed 206, the best price since 1919, on buying influenced by the belief that a segregation of the road's investment holdings will follow the retirement of the \$45,000,000 Oregon short line bond issue next year. Pittsburgh & West Virginia, St. Louis Southwestern, New York Central, Chesapeake & Ohio, Rock Island and Canadian Pacific all sold 2 to 4 1-2 points higher.

Business news continues favorable. Several of the leading commission houses stressed the importance of the \$100,000,000 electrification program of the Pennsylvania Railroad which, together with the Mississippi River flood projects, is expected to provide a big stimulus to business next year. Declaration of a 300 stock dividend on Zenith Radio was accompanied by a stock dividend of 5 per cent. On Sun Oil and extra of \$2 on New Jersey Sinc.

American Express soared 28 points to a new high at 279 and International Nickel crossed 195 to a new peak. Earnest Leather ran up 13 points. Kelvinator was heavily bought on reports of a large increase in October sales and the elimination of all bank loans. The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 3,200,000 shares.

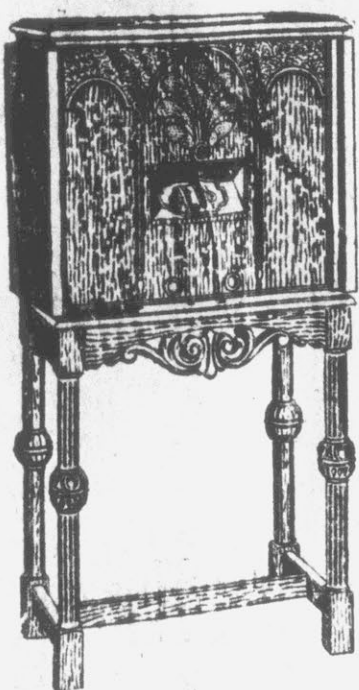

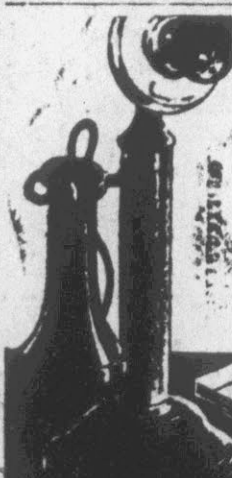
