AL SMITH IS GUEST OF N. Y. CITY TODAY

Democrat Cheered by Millions As He Parades Down Broadway.

New York, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Home from his campaign wars to await the verdict of the voters, Governor Alfred E. Smith rode today over the parade route that the metropolis reserves for returning heroes.

And the old home town of Democracy's standard bearer gave to its former citizen of the lower east side one of those uproarious greetings that it bestows on Lindberghs, Byrds and Ederies.

From the battery to Central Park the Governor traveled between cheering, roiling throngs—first out the narrow street called Broadway that worms its way between the skyscrapers and then up splendid Fifth avenue.

It was a dull gray day with a spatter or two of rain as the presidential nominee sped in his motor from his headquarters at the Biltmore to the lower end of Manhattan Island to take the place of honor in the automobile parade.

The cavalcade got under way just after noon when the lunch hour crowd of the downtown business and financial districts were on the streets.

A score of bands sprinkled here and there in the procession, played merrily as the procession of cars entered the mouth of the Broadway canyon for the long ride to 59th street and Fifth avenue.

Ticker tape, tossed from the high buildings zigzagged upon the slowly moving motor. Tons of newspapers fluttered skyward until eddies and pavement were covered.

People shouted lustily, the sirens of the motorcycle escort shrieked, bluecoats—there were 5,000 of them along the line of march—adopted football tactics to keep the crowd in bounds. It was a typical re-enactment of New York's past of welcome-staged this time in honor of a native son.

New York, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Broadway, historic welcoming ground for returning heroes, echoes today to the tread of a native son whose long campaigns in the field of political battle have won him the title of "Happy Warrior."

Alfred E. Smith was the man of the hour and New York's famous thoroughfare, despite only one day's preparation, was ready for his coming.

From the battery to city hall and on through the canyon of skyscrapers where thousands have come to the world the homecoming of many a world figure, managers of Governor Smith's campaign for the presidency had passed the word which they hoped would touch off one of the biggest receptions in the New Yorker's political career.

It was to be just another parade for Smith, who has waved his brown derby in long automobile processions through a dozen other cities of the country, but it was very apparent when he welcomed the opportunity to show the homefolks how he maneuvered the "Bronzer," as he calls it, in acknowledging the cheers he received in the West and other regions.

The Broadway parade, which gets under way at noon at the battery and winds up a little more than an hour later at 59th street, was only a starter on the nominee's program for the day.

Today, in the Academy of Music in Brooklyn, he will go on the air at ten o'clock for another hour's campaign speech.

Governor Smith is not certain about his plans for next week, or beyond his Madison Square Garden speech tomorrow night. He believes, however, that his radio talk election eve will be delivered from the National Broadcasting company's new studio instead of from his suite in the hotel Biltmore. The talk will be broadcast immediately after Herbert Hoover has delivered his final word to the electorate at 10 o'clock Eastern Time, from Palo Alto, California.

The Democratic nominee reiterated his belief at a press conference yesterday that there was something "in the air" that could mean nothing but victory. Asked for his reaction to the reception he had received over the country, he said:

"What I said the other day, that is what I mean."

When he asked his questioner if he had been in Newark the night before, receiving an affirmative reply, he added:

"There was something doing over there, wasn't there?"

"That is why I am asking you about this," the reporter pursued. "It's in the air," Smith replied. "It is the same all over."

LOCAL BAND WILL PLAY FOR CLEVELAND SPEAKING AT COURT HOUSE TONIGHT

Richard Cleveland, of New York, son of Grover Cleveland, former President of the United States, arrived in Greenville this afternoon where he will address the Democratic voters of Pitt county at the court house at 7:30 o'clock. While in the city, Mr. Cleveland will be the guest of E. G. Flanagan.

W. E. Hooks, chairman of the Pitt County Democratic Executive Committee, stated today that elaborate preparations will be made for the speaking tonight. Music for the occasion will be furnished by a local band. The speaker will be introduced by Judge Albion Dunn, who has taken an active part in the campaign in Eastern Carolina.

Mr. Hooks said Greenville and Pitt county people were exceptionally fortunate in obtaining the services of Mr. Cleveland as he is considered one of the most forceful speakers of the party and in great demand in all parts of the country. He will speak only in two places in Eastern North Carolina—here and at New Bern.

While the subject of Mr. Cleveland's address was not given out this afternoon, it is a known fact that he will discuss the issues of the campaign and champion the cause of Alfred E. Smith, Governor of New York, Democratic nominee for the presidency. Having taken an important part in the political life of the nation for a number of years, the visitor is familiar with all of the big issues of the day and fully capable of presenting them in an intensely gripping way.

This is the first time Mr. Cleveland has visited North Carolina in some time. He expressed pleasure at the evidence of progress in this immediate section of the state. He was gratified at the spirit of thrift in Greenville. He was also highly pleased with the progress of the Democratic campaign in this territory, and felt sure the Democrats would win by an overwhelming majority.

Mr. Hooks said special attention would be given to the numbers of women attending the speaking tonight. Ample seating space will be provided for them, and special invitation is extended to everyone to come and hear this great exponent of Democracy in his final drive on the cause.

The campaign manager declared that the Democratic cause was rapidly gaining ground in virtually every part of the county at this time. He said he felt sure the county vote would be overwhelmingly in favor of Smith and his supporters.

E. G. Flanagan, local business man who was a delegate to the Democratic National convention at Houston and also a member of the Smith Notification committee, was optimistic over the outlook for party success today. He reiterated a former statement in which he declared Al Smith to be the most representative citizen of the nation and fully capable of living up to the responsibilities of the presidency.

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PILOT KILLED IN COLLISION OF TWO PLANES

Captain Deford Has Narrow Escape From Death At Newport News.

Newport News, Va., Nov. 2.—(AP)—A collision of two planes in mid-air near here late yesterday resulted in the death of Captain R. H. Archibald, of Brighton, Mass., Marine corps pilot and the remarkable escape of Captain Earl H. Deford, another Marine corps pilot.

The crash occurred at an estimated height of between 2,000 and 3,000 feet. With the collision both pilots jumped with their parachutes, Captain Deford clearing the wreckage, but Captain Archibald's parachute became entangled with the tail gear of his plane and he was hurled to the ground.

Captain Deford descended safely through the tree tops and escaped without injury.

The pilots, students in the air corps tactical school at Langley Field were engaged in maneuvers and were believed to have misjudged distance between their ships.

The planes fell near Harpsville, about five miles north of Newport News.

Commits Suicide After Viewing New York Opera

New York, Nov. 2.—(AP)—After viewing a presentation of Wagner's Opera "Tannhauser" at the Metropolitan, Noel Morris, 24, great-grandson of Commodore William H. Vanderbilt, shot and killed himself at his parent's home in East Seventy-seventh street.

A typewritten note tucked between the leaves of a diary gave the only clue to the suicide motive. It read:

"Tannhauser wasn't brave enough to stick it out, but I have the courage to do it. This is the last entry."

The body was discovered yesterday by a locksmith called to remove the lock on the door of his apartment after his absence had aroused the fears of his family. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. David Dennen Morris, the father being a lawyer and prominent in financial circles. His mother was the former Alice Vanderbilt Shepard.

Young Morris had attended the opera on Wednesday night. What connection the story of Tannhauser could have had with his life is a mystery. The opera is in essence an allegory depicting the evils of lascivious love as contrasted to the sweetness of love ennobled by a spiritual quality. In the opera Tannhauser decides to return to a life of sin when it appears he can never marry the girl with whom he is in love.

Here's Way Polls Close Over U. S.

New York, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Hours before many of the millions of voters in the various states have gone to the polls next Tuesday to mark their ballots, newspapers and radio stations throughout the country will be announcing final figures from some of the voting districts. In a majority of the states the voting places will not close until 6 p. m., or later, but in some sections, particularly in the east, balloting will cease considerably earlier.

It is even possible that while residents of California and other states in the Pacific time zone still are at breakfast, the first returns will be flashing over the wires. For in Massachusetts the law permits the announcement of the vote in small communities as soon as all registered voters have cast their ballots. In past elections there has been much rivalry among some of these small towns to be first on the wires and returns have been made public a few minutes after the opening of the polls at 10 a. m., Eastern Standard time.

In several of the states also, polls in the rural districts close earlier than in cities. In Georgia, Nevada, New Hampshire and Rhode Island, the first of the polling places will close at 3 p. m., and in Tennessee voting outside of the cities will cease at 4 p. m. In Kentucky and South Carolina the last ballot will have been cast in all districts at 4 p. m., while in Florida, North Carolina and Virginia the polls will close with the setting of the sun. The latest closing hour is in Minnesota, 10 p. m.

More Cars Used. Washington.—(AP)—More and more folks are stepping on the gas. The national automobile chamber of commerce finds that pleasure cars and trucks produced in this country the first ten months of the year totaled 4,068,727.

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Garner Refuses To Claim Robber As Its Citizen

Garner, N. C., Nov. 2.—(AP)—This village, without a jail or policeman and proud of its record of neighborliness, was indignant today because Charlie Patterson, postoffice robber, had claimed it as his home town.

In fact, so riled were citizens yesterday, that a mass meeting was called and a resolution passed.

"We find," the resolution read, "that no such man ever lived nearer Garner than Cary, N. C."

Patterson recently walked in to the United States Marshal's office at Raleigh with the announcement that he was from Garner, and that he had robbed the Cary postoffice last April. He said he did not want postoffice inspectors "going all over the country trying to find out who broke into the postoffice at Cary," and besides, he "liked the life" at Atlanta Federal penitentiary. He had served a term there previously for postoffice robbery.

GIRL WITNESS FACES DEATH

Star Witness In Election Terrorism Case Threatened If She Testifies.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Margaret Welch, star witness in the prosecution of 16 men for primary election terrorism, faced a tragic problem today. She could tell her story from the witness stand, pointing out at least two of the defendants as killers; or she could refuse to testify, and thus, perhaps, save her own life and her own.

Her brother, Laddie, has been kidnapped. Some men took him away Wednesday, just a day before Miss Welch was to tell in court her eye-witness story of the slaying of Octavius Granady, negro lawyer and ward committee candidate.

Miss Welch herself has been under constant police protection, but no one had thought that an effort to silence her testimony might be made by kidnapping her brother.

A telephone call just before she was to go to court yesterday, added further to her hysteria. "We'll blow your head off if you testify," was the message.

The trial of the 16 men was halted yesterday when Miss Welch was unable to appear. She had collapsed following news of her brother's disappearance.

"I can't go on!" she cried. "If I do they'll kill my brother," they'll kill him."

Thus far only one defendant, John Armando, had been named in connection with the Granady slaying. Miss Welch's story would link at least two others to the killing, prosecutors said.

Granady, who was Morris Eller's opponent for 20th ward committee man, was shot down on primary day, April 10th, by men who chased his car a mile through West Side streets.

Earthquake Shakes California Town

Los Angeles, Nov. 2.—(AP)—An earthquake shook Longmont, in Santa Barbara county shortly before 10 o'clock last night. No damage was reported.

Ronald Adams, a newspaper man at Longmont, denied to the Associated Press that the town had been shaken by two heavy tremors, as telephone company reports had said. Adams declared that there had been a boiler explosion at the Longmont high school shortly after 11 o'clock last night. He reported it was caused by a defective boiler.

Advises that two quakes had shaken at the town and that the tremors had caused a gas tank to explode after they had investigated the failure of communication lines into Longmont. The boiler explosion was presumed to have been mistaken for a second earthquake.

Shock Adams said the roof of the school building had been blown off and that there had been other damage from the explosion.

POSTMASTER REMOVED AT LANSFORD, PA.

Washington, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Robert H. Stickler, postmaster and his sister-in-law, Mrs. Bessie Burns Stickler, assistant postmaster at Lansford, Pa., were removed from office today by Acting Postmaster General Glover. The action followed an investigation of charges that they had connived to secure the mailing from the Lansford postoffice of circulars attacking Herbert Hoover, without postmarks or identification slips in the mail bags.

RASKOB NOT TO RESUME MOTOR JOB

Democratic Manager Will Not Return As Finance Head Of General Motors.

New York, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The New York Times says today that according to reports in Wall street, John J. Raskob, who resigned as chairman of the finance committee of General Motors to accept the chairmanship of the Democratic national committee does not intend to resume that post after election.

Whether he intends to give up his post on the board of directors and his vice-presidency could not be learned, the Times says. He retained these positions when he retired from the finance chairmanship. The Times says it is reported that he intends to sever all connection with the company and his resignation will be submitted to the directors next Thursday.

When Mr. Raskob resigned from his position with General Motors, Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., the president, wrote him a cordial letter which expressed the hope that when the campaign was over Mr. Raskob would return to his finance post. Many rumors had been spread that considerable differences had developed between Mr. Raskob and other influential members of General Motors over politics. Mr. Sloan and others of the directors have expressed their support of Mr. Hoover. Under Mr. Sloan's leadership, the company has already disposed of its investments, which Wall street says has not done Mr. Raskob as one of the heaviest shareholders in General Motors. Several years ago he was instrumental in reorganizing the company and improving the output interests in it.

The Times says there also is considerable conjecture as to whether Raskob will resume his chairmanship of the board of directors from which he was granted a leave of absence shortly after Mr. Raskob resigned. He gave as his reason that he did not wish to embarrass the company by his association with the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment. Shortly afterward he endorsed Governor Smith's candidacy.

GIVES BRIEF RECORD OF DEMOCRATIC TICKET

Raleigh, Nov. 2.—Fifteen Methodist, nine Presbyterian, eight Baptist, five Episcopalians, one Lutheran and one Methodist Protestant are included in the list of 38 candidates for office on the Democratic tickets in North Carolina, in which are included candidates for state offices, for presidential electors and for members of congress, according to a compilation made in the office of Oduis M. Mull, state Democratic chairman.

The same compilation shows that there are 21 members of the Masonic order, many of them also being higher degree Masons, 13 members of the Junior Order United American Mechanics, 13 members of the Knights of Pythias, six Elks, five Odd Fellows, three Woodmen, two Modern Woodmen, two Red Men and two Moose in the nine fraternal orders represented on the ticket.

It is interesting to note that 36 of the 38 candidates are natives of North Carolina, one being a native of South Carolina Congressman A. L. Bulwinkle, and another a native of Alabama, Congressman Edward W. Poy. Although incomplete, the list shows six or seven Kwanians, two or three Rotarians and one or two Lions and Civilians, in the civic clubs.

Further division shows that of the 15 candidates for state offices, six are Baptists, five are Methodists, four are Presbyterians and one is an Episcopalian, while in this group are eight Masons, five Juniors and Knights of Pythias, three Elks, two Odd Fellows, one Moose, and one Woodman. Among the 12 presidential electors are seven of the Methodist faith, four Presbyterian, and one Episcopalian, while in this group are eight Masons, six Juniors, five Knights of Pythias, two Elks, two Odd Fellows, one Woodman and one Modern Woodman. The candidates for Congress include two Baptists, two Methodists, two Episcopals and one each of Presbyterian, Lutheran and Methodist, Protestant.

PRICES SHOW MORE LIFE ON LEAF MARKET

Over Million And a Quarter Pounds Here Today With Prices Strong.

The price situation developed in the London market for leaf tobacco today was strong, according to official reports, and sales made public this morning by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales.

The market yesterday sold 948,454 pounds of bright leaf for a total sum of \$261,608 at an average of \$26.37.

The report stated that there was over a million and a quarter pounds of tobacco on the market today with the price situation favorable on all grades.

DR. ECKENER SAYS BETTER SHIPS NEEDED

Zeppelin Builder Promises Larger, More Durable Bags For Ocean Service.

Friedrichshafen, Germany, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the Graf Zeppelin, is convinced that faster and sturdier airships are needed for trans-Atlantic flying and is planning to build them.

"We have not conquered the ocean yet," said the commander, who faced the possibility of having his ship burst asunder in a gale over the Atlantic.

"All our energy and ability must be concentrated now on elaborating plans of the present Zeppelin to provide a more enduring, powerful dirigible to insure really reliable trans-Atlantic air service."

As for the air liner which he built and commanded during a trip of more than 10,000 miles to Lakehurst, N. J., and return, Dr. Eckener said, "this ship is finished for me as far as general regular passenger traffic is concerned."

Clarence Terhune, 19-year-old stowaway, was receiving almost as much attention in Germany today as Dr. Eckener. When he emerged from a conference with John E. Kehl, American Consul, cheering crowds raised him to their shoulders. He soon manifested a keen business sense and refused to say anything to newspapermen without being paid. He has offers to write whatever he may regarding the trip, two large American syndicates were reported to be bidding to exploit him, and he has had many other lucrative opportunities offered him. As to which he would accept has been a matter.

Dr. Eckener described the trip of the airship and gave his conclusions of a banquet in honor of the crew given by the Zeppelin corporation and later at a torchlight procession in their honor.

On the eastward flight one gale was encountered which would have burst the airship under it if he had continued at high speed. He said disaster was averted only when the motors were throttled down to a minimum.

A second gale encountered off the coast of Europe was not much less fierce than the first storm over Newfoundland, Dr. Eckener said. "I did not sleep a wink all that night," he continued. But the investigation of the ship never failed for an instant.

Snowstorm Spreads Over Middle West

Kansas City, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Driven on by fresh blasts from the Arctic, a Rocky Mountain blizzard with accompanying snow, rain and freezing temperatures spread farther afield into the middle west today, threatening the lower Mississippi valley regions with snow and nearly all of Texas with cold weather.

The outlook was for more snow in Iowa, Missouri and Nebraska and Kansas. Strong north winds swept Oklahoma, where the temperatures hovered about the freezing mark. Freezing weather was expected in the Panhandle and South Texas plains, with the prediction that only the extreme southern portion would escape the cold wave, which followed heavy rains in the state.

Somewhat warmer weather prevailed in North and South Dakota, and in western Nebraska, temporarily releasing those sections from the blizzard which brought a heavy drifting snow mantle to the grazing country.

Omaha and eastern Nebraska received the first touch of the snow last night, which followed heavy rainfall over a 36-hour period.

Continued low temperatures with snow prevailed at Sioux City. Snow fell in South Dakota ranged from four to six inches while southern Minnesota also was visited by snowfall.

KILLS ESTRANGED WIFE WOUNDS HER COMPANION AND SHOTS HIMSELF

Atlanta, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Aurin Bugher, 28, shot his estranged wife to death and wounded her young woman companion as they knelt in prayer at his order early today, and turned the gun on himself, inflicting a fatal wound.

CHIEF AVIATION PILOT KILLED IN FLORIDA

Pensacola, Fla., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Enoch Broyles McIntosh, U. S. Navy chief aviation pilot and flight instructor at Corry Field, Pensacola, was killed today when a plane he was piloting crashed into another plane 200 feet above the field.

His present salary is \$15,000 a year. The News and Observer, in a story published today, said it was understood the commissioner might make a connection with the Wacho-

via Bank and Trust Company. Mr. Page was appointed by Governor Bickett in 1919. He had just returned from France where he had commanded a "regiment" of engineers.

Atlanta, Nov. 2.—(AP)—A vicious Chattanooga University mascot is sinking its claws into Southern intercollegiate athletic association football rivals with results fatal to numerous championship aspirations.

Just now, Frank Thomas' Tennesseeans are leading the association parade with four games won to none lost, while the Citadel and Western are next with three and three. Mississippi College also has won three games but the Choctaws have been tied twice. Transylvania and Kentucky Wesleyan are other undefeated and untied teams, boasting a couple of victories each.

Apparently to gain a clear claim to the crown, however, the Noogans must step five more hurdles. They yet have Southwestern, Howard, Mississippi College, Oglethorpe and Southern College coming up.

While their records are not marred by defeat, Birmingham Southern and Centenary have proved a right to be considered among the strongest teams of the association, although they are admittedly all but out of the title running. Their basis of strength is largely built on results out of the association ranks, the Panthers having defeated Auburn of the southern conference and have lost only to Chattanooga, the score in that game being 12 to 6.

Centenary defeated Texas A. & M. of the southwestern conference early in the season, but later lost to Baylor of the same circuit. The only association defeat of the Centemans was at the hands of Chattanooga.

Furman vanquished only by these terrible reptiles, also boast two association victories in addition to a triumph over Duke and a moral conquest, over Georgia, the Hurricane holding the Athenians to a single touchdown margin.

The Cadets of the Citadel have shown real strength and may prove to be one of the strongest challenges to the Moccasin before the season ends. They get several more association shots and a big outside chance for glory late in the season when they meet Clemson.

Disbelieve Story Of N. Y. Branding

New York, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The story of a Philadelphia man, that he had been kidnapped on a busy New York street, disrobed, bound and gagged and branded with the letters "K. K. K." was doubted by police today. They had the man removed to a psychopathic ward for observation.

He identified himself as Frank Kirkpatrick, 34 years old, a real estate broker of Germantown, a section of Philadelphia.

He was found inside the fence around the reservoir in Jerome Park, the Bronx, last night by two men who noticed him trying to climb over the barrier. He was taken to a hospital where he was treated for the wounds. A pamphlet dealing with the political campaign and written by himself was found in his mouth.

On his chest and arms were carved the letters "K. K. K.", which doctors said had been scratched on the skin either with a knife or a pin. None of the wounds were deep and all could have been made by Kirkpatrick himself, doctors said.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION OF NORTH CAROLINA TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 6TH

STRICTLY NON-PARTISAN

1. To increase the pay of the members and officers of the General Assembly.

The present pay was put in effect when the cost of living in Raleigh was much less than it is today. Our law-makers should at least be paid enough to meet the cost of living in Raleigh while the General Assembly is in session.

2. To empower the General Assembly to increase the number of judges without increasing the number of solicitors or to increase the number of solicitors without increasing the number of judges.

This will make it possible to have additional judges when necessary to catch up with the civil docket, without the expense of having additional solicitors. Or if the solicitors get behind we can have additional solicitors without additional judges. The solution will be left discretionary with the General Assembly.

3. To empower the General Assembly to classify intangible personal property for the purpose of taxation.

The Constitution now requires that all classes of property be taxed by a uniform rule according to their true value in money. Only five per cent of all property listed is intangible personal property. This amendment will permit the General Assembly—not require them—to classify intangible personal property.

Thirty-one States at present permit classification and their experience has been that the amount of intangible property listed has increased many fold. This is a source of revenue to the State that at PRESENT HAS TO COME FROM REAL ESTATE and it should LESSEN THE BURDEN ON REAL ESTATE. Many dollars invested out of the State and in non-taxables would be invested in intangibles if a just return could be realized after paying the tax. Since only five per cent of the present taxables are intangible, it is evident there is much to be gained by all real estate holders, and nothing to lose if this amendment is passed. This seems to be the experience of the THIRTY-ONE States that are permitted to classify.

MOST FOLKS EAT WRONG KIND FOODS

**Baltimore Physician
Tells Dietetic Association of Such Findings.**

By COLEMAN B. JONES
(Associated Press Science Editor)
Baltimore, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Disclosing facts which he believes may account for much that is wrong with the world, Dr. George Walker, Baltimore physician and research worker, today laid before the American Dietetic Association the initial results of a study of the eating habits of 750 families, ranging from the very poor to the very rich.

His investigation, growing out of an interest in the welfare of orphans, the insane and other inmates of public institutions in Maryland and elsewhere, he said has brought to light a number of significant deficiencies in the every day diets of people in general.

Practically all of those he has studied, he said, whether they average only six cents a day for each individual, or \$1.95, consume too little of the essential minerals, too much of the vegetable and too little of the animal proteins, less than half their requirements in the way of non-digestible fibrous or cellulose material, and probably only 20 per cent as much as they need of raw foods containing the very important but little understood vitamin C.

The absence of that vitamin, which is virtually destroyed by cooking in all vegetables except tomatoes and potatoes and is reduced in them, is known to cause scurvy. While this disease of the capillary blood vessels, smaller arteries and veins, is rare in its recognized form except among isolated sailors and soldiers and explorers, Dr. Walker said he believed that many of the disorders which appear in the gums, the teeth, the upper part of the intestinal tract and the bones could be traced to the widespread deficiency of the same dietary element.

Among children in public institutions, he told the dietitians, he found that, while they get enough of the carbohydrates, chiefly white

bread and potatoes, not to be hungry, none he had been able to investigate has received the variety and kind of food necessary for normal growth and future health. They could be fed properly, he estimated on 33.26 cents a day at wholesale prices.

For the average growing child, living at home, he calculated, a minimum expenditure of 57.31 cents a day, at retail prices, is necessary, and for their parents and grown-up brothers and sisters, 44.58 cents. The difference is largely accounted for, adding to the cost. State agencies by the fact that the child needs at least a quart of milk, rich in animal proteins, calcium and phosphorus, every day, while a pint will do for the adults.

Dr. Walker based his conclusions on analysis of the foods actually consumed during weekly or longer periods by white and negro families in the light of the most advanced dietary knowledge, on 300 family food accounts representing a daily individual expenditure around 45 cents, all showed deficiencies of one kind or another, he said, which could easily be corrected without capable of giving such advice, he suggested, would fill an important public need.
