PAT HARRISON SEES VICTORY FOR AL SMITH

Senator From Mississippi Predicts Democratic Victory In Election Tomorrow.

New York, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Senator Pat Harrison, member of the Advisory Committee of the Democratic National committee, in charge of the South, made the following prediction of Governor Smith's election based upon confidential reports to the advisory committee as the campaign was drawing to a close.

"The unprecedented nation-wide swing toward the Democratic ticket is evident from reports based upon the most careful survey throughout the country. One of the influences that has made for Democratic success has been the Southern loyalty to the Democratic party, to every Southern State, thousands who conscientiously wavered in the beginning are now enthusiastically supporting the Democratic cause. Letters by the thousands now tell us that these life-long Democrats will no longer permit themselves to be used as pawns by Republican organizations in Southern States to build up a Republican party in the South. In that section the change within the last thirty days has been phenomenal.

"From our survey of the situation throughout the country, we feel assured of the following states: New York, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Montana, New Mexico, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee and every Southern State.

"We have better than an even chance in the following: West Virginia, Oklahoma, Minnesota, North Dakota, Arizona and Nevada.

"We class as doubtful, but with an even chance of carrying the following: New Hampshire, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Indiana, Illinois, South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming and Utah. In practically every other state we are gaining.

"The race is won, but there must be no let up. The Republican party is now making its first drive to get a foothold in the South. Certain organizations and agencies are being used as tools by the Republican party to destroy Democratic solidarity and success in the South. Until the polls are closed, our Republican friends will use money and the same despicable methods to accomplish its purpose, as they have throughout the campaign to stir up religious intolerance. Loyal Democrats must be on their guard and in the name of the Democratic party, I call upon every loyal Southern Democrat to continue the fight until every ballot is counted, so that by an unprecedented majority, all Americans may know the South remains true to the principles of the party and still appreciates the fine teachings and service of Jefferson, Jackson, Cleveland and Wilson."

Stop Broadcasting Leon-Toral Trial

Court Room, San Angel, Mex., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Radio broadcasting of the trial of Jose De Leon-Toral, assassin of President-elect Oregon, and Mother Conception, his alleged accomplice, was abandoned with resumption of the trial today.

The microphone which had been placed by Toral in front of himself on several occasions, was ordered removed by the court authorities who also requested the newspapers to cease publishing photographs of or comment on the trial. No explanation of these orders was given.

The court also announced that in the future the newspapers will not be given the official stenographic reports. Thus far throughout the trial the Mexican newspapers have been devoting great space to it and tremendous public interest had been aroused.

SMITH DELIVERS APPEAL FOR SUPPORT OF VOTERS OF GREAT FARM CENTERS

New York, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Appealing for support from the agricultural west, Governor Smith today delivered another blow at Herbert Hoover's attitude on the farm question and declared relief or long vexing problem could be accomplished in but one way—by voting for the Democratic national ticket tomorrow.

Speaking over a coast-to-coast radio hookup from a studio of the national broadcasting company, the Democratic presidential nominee again affirmed his belief that tomorrow's election would bring about a new era in the history of the United States. He said that the "great fundamental, underlying principle for farm relief upon which Mr. Hoover and I differ absolutely."

Referring to Mr. Hoover's reference to the Democratic farm program as State Socialism, the governor said: "You and I and your leaders and all who have been struggling in your behalf—all of us together—are transferred to the Socialist party because we wish the government in your behalf to follow the same principle adopted by the Federal Reserve system for the protection of money and credit."

Mr. Hoover, he continued, "talked about an extra session of congress in his St. Louis speech."

"An extra session for what?" the governor asked, adding: "Under his advice, the president of the United States vetoed farm relief measures which were twice passed by a Republican congress. He had nothing to offer in place of it. What has Mr. Hoover got to offer in place of it today? If he is true to what he has always said, he would certainly veto a bill passed upon the principle of the control of the exportable surplus. You certainly do not think he is going to sign a bill, whether it is passed at a special session or a regular session, based upon that principle which he calls state socialism."

Lie Is Passed Between Mull And Seawell

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 5.—(AP)—The "lie" was passed and returned by H. F. Seawell, Jr., son of the Republican nominee for governor, and O. M. Mull, State Democratic chairman, in a telegraphic exchange made public by Mull here today.

Referring to a charge in a statement by the Democratic committee that his father had campaigned against the "white supremacy" movement, young Seawell's telegram from his home in Carthage, was given out as follows:

"What you printed this morning in the News and Observer concerning H. F. Seawell and white supremacy is a lie. Unless you are a coward, your committee will correct it in tomorrow's paper."

Mull's reply was given out as follows:

"Your wire received is a lie. News article is reaffirmed."

Senator Robinson At Home Today Ready To Vote

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 5.—(AP)—His long and vigorous campaign for Democracy ended, Senator Joe T. Robinson was back in his home city today to cast his vote for the party which honored him with the vice presidential nomination.

Senator and Mrs. Robinson arrived here at 7:40 a. m., and were met at the station by a crowd numbering more than 1,000 persons and a formal reception committee which included Governor Harvey Parnell and five former governors of Arkansas.

After the reception at the station they went immediately to their home to spend the remainder of the day resting. Late this afternoon a home coming celebration of state wide character begins with a parade led by the senator and ends with an address by the native son.

An informal reception to Senator and Mrs. Robinson in the governor's reception room of the capital will immediately follow. The speech will be broadcast over a hookup of twenty-five stations from station KGJF.

Although his campaign has been one of the most strenuous ever made by a political candidate, Senator Robinson said on his arrival that he "never felt better" in his life. He added, however, that he was "awfully glad to get back home for some rest."

Makes 319 Miles An Hour

SMITH FEELS ALL RIGHT ON ELECTION EVE

New York Governor Says He Is Satisfied With the Campaign He Has Made.

New York, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Gov. Smith feels "all right" about the outcome of tomorrow's presidential election, but is making no predictions as to what states will be found in his or the opposition column.

The Democratic presidential nominee made this clear today in his last press conference before election, and just before leaving for a broadcasting studio to make an 11th hour appeal to the farmers.

"How do you feel about it, Governor?" was the first question asked to him, in his suite at the Biltmore Hotel.

"I feel all right about it," was the quick response.

"Are you glad it's over?" was the next query.

"Well," he replied, "it's been a long, hard job. The traveling and speechmaking isn't easy. I feel a little relieved that I have the job done. I feel satisfied with the campaign that I made."

Asked what states he "conceded" the Republicans, if any, the nominee replied that he was "making no predictions about that," and added:

"I have been making the speeches. We'll let the figures and statisticians give you that information. I'm unable to do it."

The nominee said he made no plans to visit the east side as has been his custom in past state campaigns.

He also was undecided where he would spend tomorrow night to receive the election returns.

Guns Silenced Today As Both Political Parties Mark Time For Election Day.

After one of the most strenuous campaigns in years, Democrats, Republicans, and the Anti-Smith faction rested from their labors today, preparatory to the general election tomorrow. Indications today were that the largest vote in years would be polled here by reason of the number of new registrants.

The registration list in Greenville township alone shows nearly six hundred new registrants, many of them women who never before took part in a national election. A similar registration has been reported from the other thirteen precincts of the county, although the number is not expected to be as large as that recorded in Greenville where the district is more thickly populated than some of the other localities.

With a record number of campaign speeches behind them, party leaders paused today to take a short breathing spell before going to the polls tomorrow to cast their vote for their favorites. As has been the case throughout the entire campaign, both the dominant factions—the Republicans being considerably augmented by the Anti-Smith effort—claimed a lead for honors in a national way. But all of them admit it is to be a tight race—a race that will not be determined until the final vote is counted.

It has been many a day since Pitt county has seen a campaign conducted along such extensive plans. And it has been many a day since it has seen one of the dominant parties split over the leader for the presidency and fighting for its life against Republican hosts and those who have dropped from its ranks. But despite all of this, the Democrats have fought steadily and unflinchingly for principles they believe to be right, and on the eve of election day confidently believe they see victory ahead in a national way.

The Republicans, stimulated by the strife caused by the Anti-Smith cohorts, feel even more confident than ever that Hoover will come off with colors flying. It seems strange to them to have members of former opposition fighting shoulder to shoulder in an effort to prevent the election of Alfred E. Smith of New York for the presidency. But strange as it may seem to them, they realize that the unusual situation has strengthened their position and will give them more force when the pilgrimage to the polls begins tomorrow.

Members of both parties will receive final messages from their chiefs today. Both Smith and Hoover will speak for the last time, the former at New York and the latter from his home at Palo Alto, California. These last messages will contain urgent appeal to the voters to stand by their colors. And after they are delivered each of the tired and worn candidates will retire to the confines of his home to await the decision of the people.

While the party leaders are making their final appeal to the people, hundreds of other speakers will be making last minute speeches throughout the nation. Numbers of these are scheduled for North Carolina by men and women who have covered virtually every district the last six weeks.

But in Greenville and Pitt county the guns have been spiked temporarily and hundreds of voters will sit by the radios tonight and listen to the great leaders of Republicanism and Democracy as they ask the millions of voters of the nation to stay with them. These last talks will carry weight—probably influence many a voter to take an unexpected turn in sentiment—and for that reason every speaker will bring the most effective arguments possible to the attention of their hearers.

The speaking campaign actually came to a close in Greenville last Friday night when Richard Cleveland, son of Grover Cleveland, a former president of the United States, spoke in behalf of the Democratic cause. It was a powerful appeal to party members to support the straight ticket, and also a clear exposition of the record of Al Smith, nominee for the presidency.

NATION TAKES FINAL COUNSEL OVER CHOICE FOR PRESIDENT TODAY

In quieter mood after weeks of agitation and uncertainty, the nation is taking final counsel today over its choice of new leadership in tomorrow's general election.

The long parade is almost ended. Its greater and lesser figures have turned inward, leaving in the lap of the voter the tangled threads of an epochal campaign. The untangling of the complex impulses of class, race and religion remains for the more orderly progress of the ballot box.

The final words of the nationwide debate fall to the two men upon whom its responsibilities have rested most heavily. From his home at Palo Alto, Calif., after his trip across the continent from Washington, Mr. Hoover will speak over the radio tonight to the nation's millions of voters. Two such addresses were decided on by Gov. Smith, a noonday talk today to the farm country, and a valedictory tonight, both delivered from a radio studio in New York city.

Otherwise, the day was set aside as a final breathing spell for candidates, political workers and voters, disturbed only by the repercussions which are peculiar to the day before election. These included last-minute arguments here and there over registration and the polling of polling places, and the usual outpouring of predictions of overwhelming victory on both sides.

All such predictions continued to point to inch-by-inch struggles for the East, the Border, and the debilitated states of the farm country and the Far West.

In a few places activity continued among contestants for congressional, state, and local office. For besides choosing a new president and vice president, the country will elect tomorrow the full membership of the house of representatives, thirty-seven senators, thirty-four governors, legislatures in many states, and a host of city, county and township officials. Many of the state campaigns have developed into spectacular battles in themselves, although as a rule the country over, local candidates have been overshadowed by the contest between Smith and Hoover.

The issues of this national contest remain, at the end of the campaign, a patchwork of striking contradictions. The Associated Press asked hundreds of political leaders, editors, and prominent men and women in business and professional life, distributed through all of the states, for information as to the topics of campaign discussion which have been most prominent in their particular localities. The results of this survey, summarized below, show how the issues have cut across party lines, and across one another.

This summary does not purport to list all of the issues discussed, or to name them in the order of their importance. Neither does it attempt to take account of the vote-drawing possibilities of the personalities of the two presidential nominees, a factor which many informants declared to be increasingly prominent in political discussions toward the close of the campaign. The attempt is merely to show how such objects as farm relief, prohibition, religion and the others have fitted into the general pictures produced by this campaign.

Religion:

Whatever its relative rank in terms of votes, the religious issue has provided the campaign with its most bitter ingredients. Every state in the Union has debated it, sometimes to the accompaniment of egg barrages and legal proceedings. It has been talked of most openly in the South, particularly in Alabama.

Democratic leaders repeatedly have charged that religion was the real force behind the Southern bolt from Smith. The Republican national organization has repeatedly denied raising the issue against Governor Smith's Catholicism, and has charged that the Democrats sought to belittle the Quaker faith of Mr. Hoover. These exchanges are continuing, up to the final hours of the campaign.

The Smith managers believe they have least to fear from this issue in Eastern States like Massachusetts, with their large Catholic population. They expect defections everywhere, however, and especially in the Southern and mid-western States where the Klan once was a great power.

Prohibition:

Conspicuous for the first time in a presidential campaign, the prohibition issue is credited by political leaders of both parties with having turned many voters out of their normal channels. Governor Smith's modification plan, upon which he has centered increasing emphasis in recent weeks, has been persistently attacked by prominent Republicans and by many ministers of the Gospel, and was described by Mr. Hoover himself as tending toward state socialism.

Upon the comparative extent of the resulting shifts there is no agreement. It is universally conceded, however, that to a degree the turnovers in both directions have been country-wide, with the defection of republican wets to Smith greatest in such eastern states as New York, Massachusetts, Maryland, Connecticut and Rhode Island, and in the larger cities everywhere, and in scattered western states like Wisconsin, Montana and Nevada; while the defection of Democratic dries to Hoover has reached its maximum in the South and has been apparent also in many states of both east and west.

Records Show Al Smith Advocate Of Race Equality

White Voters Get Proof Of Smith Menace to White Supremacy

New York City.—On Tuesday night, November 19, 1923, Al Smith, speaking to a mass meeting of negroes, in the interest of negroes migrating from the South, in a negro church in Harlem, New York City, told them that he was heartily in favor of the negroes leaving the South and that he wished their exodus from the South all possible success. He further told them that it was wrong to require them to be able to read and write to vote. The other speakers at the meeting were negro preachers. (Published in New York Times of November 20, 1923, on page 3, column 5.)

On the night of November 5, 1923, in Liberty Hall at Lennox avenue and 138th street, New York City, Al Smith, addressing 5,000 negroes and asking them for their votes, said, among other things: That he would have removed the entire New York Boxing Commission from office if he had had the power, because of their refusal to let a certain "GENTLEMAN" named Willis fight a "MAN" named Dempsey. Further on in the same speech he said: "There is not a man in this state today who so firmly believes in the Declaration of Independence as I do, and I take it that when the Constitution says that all men were created equal, it means what it says." (Published in New York Times, November 6, 1923, on page 3, column 2.)

In a speech at Liberty Hall, a negro hall, in Harlem, New York City, Al Smith, speaking to 8,000 negroes, told them that if he were elected Governor, the Governor's office would be wide open to them. That speech was published on November 1, 1922, in the New York Times, on page 2, column 7.

New York—When Irving T. Bush was a boy, his father took him around the world on his yacht, the Coronet. The lad's whole life was shaped and colored by his expedition through the seven seas, and he vowed that some day he, too, would afford a yacht and would take his own son on the same journey.

That was in 1888. Now Bush's youthful promise to himself is on the threshold of fulfillment. Next spring he expects to set out on a world cruise with his son on a splendid new yacht built for him at Kiel, Germany, and christened, appropriately, the Coronet.

Fortune From The Sea.

Bush has made himself a multimillionaire through lifelong devotion to the sea. He is the genius of the terminal company which bears his name, operating the complete privately owned deep water terminal in the world. To his 17 piers and 28 mammoth warehouses on the Brooklyn water front come cargoes from every port on the globe. Seventeen steamship lines are berthed at these docks, and the goods they carry are cleared thru customs, unloaded, and stored or redispached by an army of 30,000 employees. The terminal equipment includes 25 miles of private railway track and a flotilla of barges, car-floats, lighters and tugs.

The new Coronet now anchored in the lower Hudson river, cost more than \$400,000. Few more luxurious private craft fly American colors. It is 181 feet long, propelled by two 425-horsepower Diesel engines, capable of cruising 7,000 miles without refueling. It has an electric refrigerating plant, a hot water heating system and electrical ventilating and pumping apparatus. There are six staterooms, a library, a lounge and a dining salon, in addition to quarters for a crew of 20. And to its owner it is the symbol

of a childhood ambition realized.

A Mariner Detours.

Speaking of the sea, Broadway has gained a promising young actor and lost a potential Joseph Conrad.

Several years ago Robert Montgomery, a lad living in upstate New York, left preparatory school to become an author, and hired himself out as a wiper on an oil tanker bound from New York for foreign ports. He sailed the seas until he had a background of maritime hardship, then sat down to write stories of the bounding main.

He sold some, too, but discovered that the financial rewards of writing were sparse among beginners, and to keep a roof over his head he took to the stage, striking a bargain with William Faversham to play seven roles in a mask play at \$5 a week per role.

He liked the stage, and went from Faversham's play to a stock company in Baltimore. This fall Edgar Selwyn needed a juvenile to play the son of an estranged husband and wife in his new drama of divorce, "Possession. He asked Edwin Knopf, Baltimore impresario, to recommend an actor, and Knopf supplied Montgomery. On the night the play opened in New York Montgomery was hailed by critics as one of the finds of the season, and now Selwyn is being importuned to produce a play for the youth to star in.

Judge Meekins Issues Solemn
Warning to Election Officials

This Coming Election Is a National One, and In His Charge Monday, Oct. 22, 1928, to the Federal Jury, at Wilmington, Judge I. M. Meekins Takes Opportunity to Impress Upon the Registrars the Necessity of An Honest Count.

Judge Meekins said:

Chapter Three of the U. S. Criminal Code prescribes offense against the elective franchise and civil rights of citizens. It forbids conspiracy to injure persons in the exercise of their civil rights, or depriving any one of his civil rights; intimidating voters and interference with elections.

We are in the midst of the most interesting campaign since 1896. Two weeks more and this campaign will pass into history. All estrangement will soon be forgotten; all bitterness will soon pass away like an uneasy dream; the minority will bow to the will of the majority with grace borne of resignation and each of us, as before, will chase our favorite phantom, provided the majority is without the taint of fraud. Otherwise, the estrangement and bitterness will be thrust far into the future and will burn the peace and paralyze the prosperity of the Nation.

The right to vote is a sacred privilege of the American citizen and the welfare of our Country demands that citizens be protected in the exercise of that right. In this Country the people rule; they select their public servants and instruct them how they wish the government administered. The rule of the people is through the medium of the ballot which is the source of the power of the people. If, therefore, the source be corrupted and the citizen unlawfully deprived of the right to vote, or of the result of the vote; if elections are controlled by bribery, intimidation, or other lawless methods, the plan of our government is assaulted, the rights guaranteed by its Constitution are ignored; and the liberties which were won by conquest on the battlefield are overthrown.

The Congress of the United States, in its wisdom, realizing the solemn importance of the freedom and purity of the ballot, took steps to preserve

to every qualified voter the right to vote and to protect that right as appears in Section 5508 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, and as also appears in Chapter Three of the Federal Criminal Code. The Congress denounced it as a crime for two or more persons to conspire to injure, oppress, threaten, or intimidate any citizen in the free exercise or enjoyment of any right or privilege secured by the Constitution and laws of the United States, or because of having exercised such right or privilege.

The right and privilege of voting is, as stated, secured to every citizen who possesses the qualifications prescribed by the law of the various States of the Union, and a conspiracy to injure, oppress, threaten, or intimidate a citizen to prevent him or her casting his or her vote as he or she desires, or because of having voted as he or she desired, is a felony, of which the United States Courts have jurisdiction, and upon conviction, the penalty prescribed by The Congress is a fine not to exceed five thousand dollars and imprisonment not to exceed ten years. Moreover, persons convicted of such offense are disqualified forever thereafter to hold any office, place of honor or trust of the United States.

The poll holders throughout the United States are charged with the solemn duty to conduct elections fairly and honestly. They are not permitted to administer their high office until they have first taken a solemn oath to fairly and honestly perform the duties thereof. You see, therefore, Mr. Foreman and Gentlemen of the Grand Jury, that the office of a poll holder is not only important but sacred. You see that the poll holder has in his keeping the genius of our plan of government which demands for, and guarantees to the people, that those who govern must first obtain their right and power to govern by the consent of the governed.

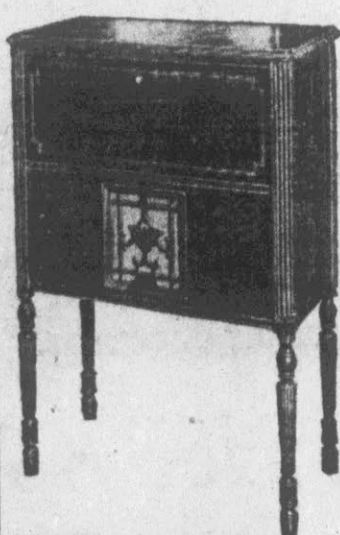

Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt, Florida and Tennessee held the most enviable positions with three conference victories each, while Georgia and V. P. I. were crowded close with two each.

Unless the south adopts the scoreless tie motif so popular in the East this season, there will be a deal of shifting among the elite when Georgia Tech's Yellow Jackets entertain Vanderbilt at Atlanta this week, and Florida meets Georgia on neutral ground at Savannah.

Fresh from a conquest of the Kentucky Wild Cats 14 to 7, the Commodores face the conquerors of Notre Dame on a tie for that basis. The Commodores themselves over College and Texas. The Yellow Jackets Saturday defeated Georgetown 32 to 7.

The Georgia Bull Dogs, who Saturday emerged victorious over Auburn, 13 to 0, were about as evenly matched against the fighting Gators of the Peninsula, who cut another notch in their highly touted point-scoring gun by smothering Sewanee 71 to 6.

HOOVER WILL MAKE APPEAL AT PALO ALTO

Republican Nominee
To Conclude Campaign in Home Town Tonight.

By JAMES L. WEST

Hoover Train Enroute to Palo Alto, Cal., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover approached the end of his last campaign trip today with his confidence in Republican victory strengthened by the evidences of enthusiasm which he has found along the 3,000 miles of his journey from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast.

Ending his quest for the presidency where he began it nearly three months ago, the nominee, after his arrival at his home at Palo Alto, will deliver his last message to the country before the election tomorrow.

This will be a non-partisan to the voters to exercise their right of citizenship at the polls. It will be delivered from his study at 6:45 p. m., Pacific Coast time, and will be broadcast over a national chain of radio stations.

Hoover made his last purely political speech at Pueblo, Colorado, Saturday night, the fourth since he left his general headquarters at Washington last Thursday. In all of these he emphasized prosperity and the importance of the issues before the electorate.

With his campaign ended, the Republican standard bearer appeared to have laid his cares aside, and yesterday enjoyed his first full day of relaxation in many months. He spent much of the day in his private car reading, and at the points along the line where he greeted large crowds, his manner indicated a freedom from concern over political matters.

He chatted informally with people who crowded around the rear platform of his car, remarking on the "gorgeous weather" which he encountered in Utah, and inquiring about the size of the populations, and the different industries of the communities. At one stop on the edge of the Nevada mining region, however, his interest was diverted to the tariff by a blue-shirted miner, who remarked: "Mr. Hoover, there's a lot of people in this country who would like to keep that tariff on lead, and we would like to get a higher one on silver if you could."

"Well, I hope we'll get it," the candidate responded with a broad smile.

The confidence of the candidate was reflected by the other members of his party. Ralph E. Williams, of Portland, Ore., vice-chairman of the Republican national committee, issued a statement saying that his observation led him to believe that Hoover would receive a total electoral vote of between 375 and 400 as against the 266 necessary for his election.

"My survey in the last four weeks," Williams said, "shows that if the people in the country and small towns go to the polls, Mr. Hoover will carry the election by the western, mid-western, and middle Atlantic States alone, with an electoral vote of at least 300 against the necessary 266."

"From other sources of information I am confident he will secure an additional 100 elector votes

front other states. I have not surveyed, and his total electoral vote will be between 375 and 400 out of the 531 in the electoral college."

Williams said that more than 300 votes would come from Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Colorado, Nevada, Arizona, North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware.

"Advices also show," he added, "that the drift toward Mr. Hoover in Wisconsin, Maryland and North Carolina will carry him over these states, making a total of 333, without any consideration of the states where I have personally made no survey, but which should give him an additional 75 to 100 electoral votes."

Passing over the Sierra during the night, Hoover's train came in California during the early morning hours today, and was due at Palo Alto at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon. Before reaching that station it had only two scheduled stops, the first at Roseville and the second at Tracy.

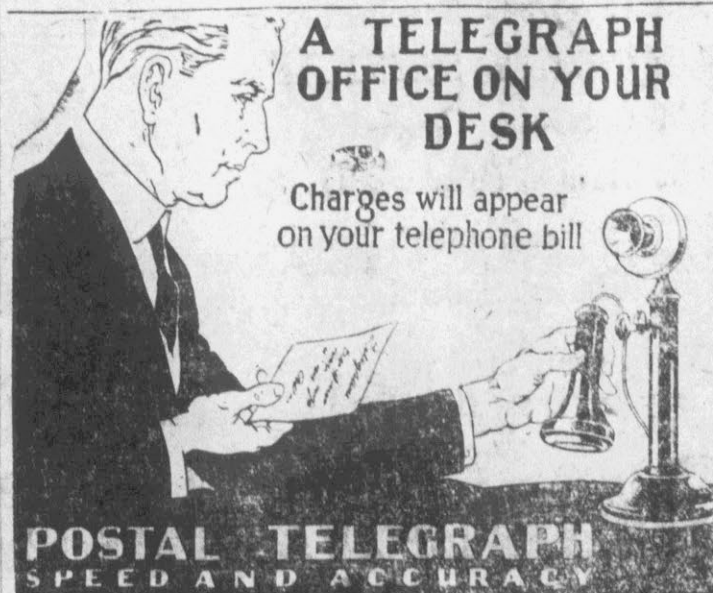

SMITH PLANS LAST APPEAL AT NEW YORK

Democratic Nominee To Make Final Appeal Of Campaign Over Radio Tonight.

New York, Nov. 5.—(AP)—In the city of his birth, Governor Smith today approached the end of a campaign which he believes will carry him to the presidency.

Five weeks of strenuous speech-making in almost every section of the nation were behind the Democratic presidential nominee and all that stood in his way en route to the ballot box tomorrow at noon were two eleventh hour appeals to the electorate from a radio broadcasting studio.

The first, a message to the farming elements of the country, was scheduled to go on the air at 12:30 o'clock, Eastern time, today from the studios of the National Broadcasting Company. This was to take half an hour. The second will be delivered from the same studio at 1 o'clock tonight and will be of one hour's duration.

Governor Smith, and his wife who accompanied him throughout his more than 11,000 miles of touring of the country for the Democratic cause, will cast their votes along with millions of other fellow citizens in a stationary store on 48th street, near Madison avenue, at noon tomorrow. The Smith children, who are eligible to vote, will go to the polls at other points in this city and Albany.

The governor had not definitely decided today just where he would travel the returns come in, but it is generally expected he will surround himself with members of his family and receive the figures in his suite at the Biltmore hotel.

The Democratic nominee grew firmer in his conviction that "something is in the air" and that something spelled victory for himself and his running mate, Senator Joe Robinson, of Arkansas, after a conference at his hotel late yesterday with John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, the governor issued a twenty-nine word statement in which he said:

"I just had a two-hour conference with the chairman of the Democratic National Committee. The reports and advice in his possession clearly indicate a Democratic victory on Tuesday."

After this meeting, the Governor worked late on his two radio addresses, but took time enough to put in an appearance on a lower floor of his hotel at a dinner given by Chairman Raskob to the 65 members of the cast which has been giving radio presentations of the play "Up from the City Street."

Chicago, Nov. 5.—(AP)—To prevent a repetition of the fraud, violence and terrorism which marked the April primaries 15,000 police watchers will guard Chicago's ballot boxes tomorrow.

This, the largest array of election day watchers in the city's history has been enrolled despite officials' confident prediction that the election will be free from disorders of political terrorists.

The violence and terrorism of last primary election day, April 10, have been followed by months of investigation by special grand juries, whose work is yet unfinished. One slaying, conspiracies and divers outbreaks of violence caused indictments to be returned against a score of reputed participants, principally alleged henchmen of certain political leaders.
