



# NO TRACE OF HATCHET MAN IS YET FOUND

## Kansas Citizens Guard Homes After Report of Presence of Hatchet Man.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 23.—(AP)—Jake Bird, a negro, was positively identified as Omaha's hatchet slayer by Mrs. Harold Stribling, the negro's fifth victim, at a hospital here shortly after noon, police announced.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 23.—(AP)—Omaha remained today a city under arms, still without definite clues to the identity or whereabouts of its "hatchet man."

All suspects and pictures shown to Mrs. G. Harold Stribling, who with her husband, were the last victims of the slayer and the only two to survive his blows, have failed to be identified. This included the picture of an "ax man" captured in Chicago.

All police and detectives have been put on twelve hours a day shifts and calls at the rate of 20 an hour last night were being investigated and checked. "No lead or clue is being left unturned," said Chief Pzanowski. The reward now totals \$2,375.

Two of the slayer's victims were buried at Weeping Water, Neb., yesterday. The funeral date of the other victim has not been set.

Kansas City, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Fear gripped the farming communities about Wolf and Lansing, Kansas, near here today after reports that a man resembling the Omaha ax murderer had been seen in the vicinity. Many guarded their homes with dogs and guns through out the night last evening.

New York, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Three memberships on the New York Stock Exchange were sold today, one for the record price of \$550,000, an increase of \$20,000 over yesterday's record sales. The second seat went for \$540,000, and the third \$530,000. Two memberships were sold yesterday and nine earlier this week.

San Francisco, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The story of how a ship at sea was summoned by radio to take off the injured members of the crew of another steamer, and performing its errand of mercy after locating the vessel by a radio compass was revealed as the steamship Venezuela approached San Pedro today with the injured sailor.

### MISS GEORGE SPEAKS AT HIGH SCHOOL

Extracts from talk made by Miss Margaret George, of the Educational Department of Exmoor Blankets, to the Home Economics Department at the Greenville High School yesterday:

### The Advantages of Single Length Double Woven Blankets

The ancient and honorable pair blanket is fast becoming as outdated as hoopskirts or bustles. Most women, after trying a single-length blanket, rarely go back to the use of a pair blanket. The modern blankets are made single length. They are recommended by practical housewives and by domestic science teachers everywhere.

Single-length blankets make household lighter. They are much easier to wash; they take up far less space and do not drag on the line. The bed can be made more easily, and more neatly with them. They are more convenient to handle when airing or when being put away for the summer. They are more convenient for the sleeper, as they have no loose ends to get misplaced and troublesome during the night.

Many women go to the trouble of cutting pair blankets apart and binding them. The single-length blanket has the two thicknesses of the pair blanket woven together into a single length. The old-fashioned pair blanket is two thin blankets. Warmth is lost, and the two loose ends are troublesome and inconvenient.

What Size of Blanket To Use For the comfort of the sleeper, it is highly important that the blanket should be large enough to tuck well in under the mattress. Particular care should be taken to see that the blanket is long enough and wide enough. A blanket 84 inches long is a worthwhile protection against

cold feet. In general, the following list of sizes will work out well. It is the table issued by the U. S. Bureau of Standards: For single beds, 60x80 or 84; For three-quarter beds, 66x80 or 84; For double beds, 70x80 or 84 (72x80 or 84).

For comfort and health, an oversized blanket rather than an undersized blanket is recommended.

Bed Covering and Health Eminent physicians have recently discovered that insufficient blankets have a bad effect on health, by preventing the sleeper from getting the full benefit of his rest. A person who is cold in bed draws his body into a tense, curled-up position in which relaxation is impossible.

The housewife owes it as a duty to her family to have a fluffy double-woven blanket on the bed and an extra blanket across the foot of the bed. These thrown blankets across the foot of each bed can form a powerful contribution toward real comfort, relaxed sleep and consequent restfulness and good temper the next day. The throw-blanket is a wonderful opportunity for a harmonious color note too, introducing in its soft texture a richness and depth of tone which adds much to the color scheme of any lovingly planned room.

He appealed to them to continue their efforts and to that way prepare for greater developments in the future.  
 The meeting was in charge of E. P. Arnold, director of Agriculture of the county, and Mrs. Ethel Rice, of the Home Demonstration Department. A program of recreation was put on this afternoon by a number of the State Department of Agriculture.  
 Miss Rice stated that membership of the several clubs was increasing annually with new clubs springing up in other communities. She said the young women were accomplishing much good in their respective localities and in years to come would exert a powerful influence in the production of farm life.

 New York, Nov. 23—(AP)—Most of the football teams of the country playing tomorrow will close their doors for the season. With only a few exceptions eleven scheduled for Thanksgiving are taking the day off and only a small group of rugged contestants will carry their war into December.

The Saturday card makes up in quality and lack of quality. Seven games stand out in the fray.

Yale and Harvard will prove a magnet sufficient to attract 75,000 spectators to the Yale bowl, for the test will be the 47th meeting over a stretch of more than 50 years. The Yale team of 1927 was two touchdowns better than the defending Harvard aggregation, but there seems to be a question if the Elis can show such superiority at home a year later.

Another stirring game of ancient ices will be at Berkeley, Calif., and the result will have a definite result on the Pacific Coast conference title. California must defeat Stanford or see the conference title go to the University of Southern California. In the conference, California and Southern California each have registered three victories without a defeat, in addition to the scoreless tie they themselves battled to five weeks ago. Stanford has lost only one conference game, bowing 10 to 0 to Southern California on November 3. A victory for Stanford will amount to practically crowning of Southern California as champions for the latter team meets a minor foe, Idaho, in its last conference test.

The big international show of the day will be put on at West Point with the powerful Nebraska outfit, tied but undefeated, meeting an Army team that has only one blot on its impressive record. King Boris, who has striven constantly to bring about peace, is deeply disturbed by acts of terrorism which have occurred.

## STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 23—(AP)—The stock market turned a complete somersault on a record-breaking turn-over today. A tremendous accumulation of overnight buying orders sent prices of many active issues soaring 5 to 30 1-2 points in the early trading, but a swift selling movement just before mid-day cut down or wiped out many of the earlier gains, and sent a number of stocks 1 to 5 points below yesterday's final quotations. A brisk recovery was in progress in early afternoon.

Despite the elimination of sales from the tape, the ticket fell 45 minutes behind the market by 1 o'clock. So great was the congestion of work in many of the large brokerage houses that the governors of the exchange met at noon and voted to suspend business on Saturday.

The midday selling movement was inspired by reports that an "important statement" would be given out by the Federal Reserve bank at 1 p. m., many traders apparently feared that another warning on credit inflation was coming, and they threw stocks overboard, but the statement proved to be merely the election of a new governor of the bank to succeed the late Benjamin Strong.

The market's quick reaction indicated the nervous tension created by the recent spectacular advance in prices. With the market closed tomorrow much of the day's selling also represented week-end profit taking which originally is distributed over the week.

The wild upswing at the opening of the market, in which several blocks of 10,000 to 40,000 shares changed hands at rising prices in the face of a record-breaking increase in brokers' loans, again demonstrated the recent tendency of the market to do the unexpected. Originally, such an increase in the morning, instead prices bounded upward, and just when they looked as they were going "through the roof," they suddenly broke in dramatic fashion.
