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COLD BLASTS DESCEND UPON SOUTH TODAY

Another Cold Wave Accompanied By Rainfall In Many Sections of Country

Atlanta, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Another cold wave descended upon the south today hardly 48 hours after the most severe chill of the winter had departed.

Heralded by general rains through Georgia and the Carolinas, the latest cold snap was being borne on the wings of a middle western storm, which was centered, this morning, according to plottings made by the local weather bureau, somewhere between Little Rock, Ark., and St. Louis, Mo.

As this disturbance moved northward over the Lake Region, it pressed decidedly colder weather for the entire south during the next two days, accompanied by snow in Tennessee, Kentucky and North Carolina tonight and tomorrow and generally freezing weather as far south as central Florida by Sunday night.

The cold wave was expected by the weather bureau here to reach its crest late Sunday, bringing a minimum of 20 degrees to Atlanta and vicinity by Monday morning. Southeast storm warnings were issued at 11 a. m. today for the coastal section from Savannah to Boston.

Arkansas Party Visit In Virginia

Richmond, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Members of the "Arkansas party," led by Governor Harvey Parnell and including about 135 legislators and state officials of that state, this morning are heading toward Petersburg and Hopewell, two of Virginia's industrial centers, in their quest for industrial information.

In Richmond yesterday afternoon and last night the party was regally entertained by Governor Harry Flood Byrd and state officials. Virginia state officials in general meeting in the state capitol last night told of the factors to which they attribute Virginia's industrial growth. Governor Byrd explained the reorganization of the government machine of this state and tax reforms which have been inaugurated.

Leaving Hopewell today the party will proceed directly to Raleigh, N. C., Sunday morning for a two-day inspection trip to some of North Carolina's industrial sections.

Richmond was the third point in the Old Dominion to be visited by the Arkansans. They first stopped at Roanoke and then proceeded to Charlottesville to view the University of Virginia, the historical points, such as Monticello, home of Thomas Jefferson, near that city, and to inspect the oldest woolen mills of the south. The party passed in their tour long enough to place a wreath on the tomb of Jefferson.

Following their visit to North Carolina members of the party will go into South Carolina for a brief inspection trip and thence into Georgia.

Chapel Hill To Play Host For Arkansas Crowd

Chapel Hill, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Chapel Hill and the University of North Carolina will play host tomorrow afternoon to Gov. Harvey Parnell of Arkansas and 125 Arkansans who are on tour of the southern states studying education and industry with a view towards progressive legislation in Arkansas.

The visitors will arrive in Chapel Hill about 3:30 o'clock tomorrow morning from Durham. Upon arrival in Chapel Hill they will go to Winston-Salem, High Point, and other cities to be visited south include Greenville, S. C., and Atlanta, Ga. The party will arrive in Raleigh today for a brief inspection trip and thence into Georgia.

Litchfield Dies At Aurora

Mrs. Tom Litchfield left for Aurora to attend the funeral of her mother, Mrs. Litchfield, who died at the evening.

Litchfield had been sick for some time and death was not unexpected.

Several Missing In Sea Tragedy

Mahon, Spain, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Intensive search was being made today for 38 persons, including several women who have been missing since the sinking of the French steamer Malakoff. While some hope is still held that the missing persons may either be in lifeboats or still afloat in life belts, it was generally believed that they perished.

The vessel foundered seven minutes after striking the rocks between Cape Bartcum and Santa Calina Bay on the south-west coast of the Isle of Minorca, Thursday in a fog. The Malakoff was bound from Dunkirk and Hacer to Madagascar. Forty-four survivors, including two women, have arrived in Cádiz.

ARMY PLANE STILL IN AIR IN CALIFORNIA

Question Mark Soars Toward Dirigible Record in Endurance Flight at Los Angeles

Metropolitan Airport, Los Angeles, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Cruising serenely upward into uncharted time spaces of the air the Question Mark today groped for the answer to the question of how close man and machine contrivances can approach the birds in the sustained flight.

Becoming in reality a question mark of the skies as it soared toward dirigible records after dropping all existing airplane endurance records from the air, the plane still held back the solution of whether, given unlimited fuel and supplies, man or motor would crack first in continuous flight.

Having firmly tested its wings in overcoming extremely troublesome weather, motor and fuel problems, the Question Mark at 2:26 a. m. today passed its ninety-first hour in the air. It then had supported its conquering crew of five aloft for more than a full day longer than man ever flew before in an airplane.

At dawn tomorrow morning if the thus far smoothly functioning 225-horsepower motors continue their uninterrupted droning the Question Mark will have eclipsed all existing lighter-than-air endurance records and will then become supreme in the air.

The dirigible endurance record of 118 hours made several years ago by the French-owned Dixmude will be passed at 5:25 a. m. Sunday morning. Several hours earlier the crew will have claimed the record of 111 hours, made by the Graf Zeppelin in its recent flight to America.

Although not designed as a distance flight the Army's air-blower at the present time has opened new vistas of distance to aviation, it being estimated the ship has covered well over 6,500 miles, which if in a bee-line eastward would have carried it far out over the European continent.

Barring adverse flying conditions that would prevent refueling of the ship, its builders and Army sponsors believe the plane can fly for 300 hours, which if in a straight line flight, would nearly circle the globe.

The plane was functioning perfectly over this airport at midnight today when refueling plane number one transferred a load of 200 gallons of gasoline in a 7-minute operation at an altitude of 2,750 feet. The operation was the fourth successful refueling contact made since the ship left this airport at 7:26 a. m. January 1, under orders to remain up as long as the motors ran.

Pan Conference Nears End Today

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—With only the formality of treaty signing left to it, the Pan-American Conference on Conciliation and Arbitration today approached its close.

The delegates from 20 American republics found great satisfaction in their completion of two multi-lateral treaties for arbitration and conciliation and in the machinery set up for settlement of the Bolivian-Paraguayan dispute.

To the apparently general opinion of those concerned that the conference had done well, was added the news that President Coolidge was pleased with its work and felt that a very fine spirit was shown by the delegates in reaching agreements.

The pacts drafted, regarded by conference members as covering a wider field of international disputes than any previously formulated will have to be ratified by the governments represented here.

BARLING MONOPLANE PICKS UP FUEL IN FLIGHT

CONDITION OF BRITISH KING IS FAVORABLE

George Still Gaining In His Fight For Re- covery From Serious Illness.

London, Jan. 5.—(AP)—King George has scored another gain in his fight for recovery. After two days in which his majesty's condition remained stationary, his doctors were able this morning to report a further slight improvement.

The medical bulletins meanwhile have showed that the king was passing his nights more comfortably and resting better at night. This gratifying state of affairs, it was taken for granted, was notably helpful in bringing about the betterment announced today. The morning bulletin said:

"The king has had a good night and there is a slight improvement in his majesty's condition."

Postpone Inquest Into Vanderburg Case At Gastonia

Gastonia, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The inquest into the death of J. W. Vanderburg, his wife and three children, who were slain and their bodies burned in their farm home near here eight days ago, today was postponed for one week, due to the illness of C. V. Setzer, a coroner's juror.

Solicitor John G. Carpenter, prior to the calling of the hearing set for today, announced that it would be impossible to proceed because of Mr. Setzer's illness. When the hearing was called to order he moved postponement until January 12 at 10 a. m.

Jacob Vanderburg, only surviving member of the Vanderburg family, who is held on suspicion of having slain the other five, was in the courtroom. He was immediately returned to jail where he is being held without bail.

Congress Works On Kellogg Pact

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—With the fight over the Kellogg anti-war treaty in full swing, the senate disregarded the fact that Saturday is ordinarily a legislative holiday and went ahead with work. A sizeable gallery gathered again to await the expected clash between Borah of Idaho, chief senate sponsor of the treaty, and Reed of Missouri, opposition leader.

Borah occupied the floor during most of yesterday and occasionally interrupted his explanation of his interpretation of the pact to answer questions fired at him by senators who at times almost surrounded him. Senator Reed, however, contented himself with regarding into the record some correspondence with other nations relative to the treaty.

The house was in session today also with prospects that the war department appropriation bill would be disposed of handsily. It is the fifth appropriation bill to come before the house, four others having been passed with little trouble.

Off the floor, the senate public lands committee was concerned with an old and familiar subject, a Sinclair oil lease. Assistant Attorney General Donovan had been summoned to appear.

Hundred Million Dollars Worth of Booze Crosses From Canada Into U. S.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 5.—(AP)—A dispatch to the Globe today from Ottawa says: "One hundred million dollars worth of alcoholic beverages has been smuggled from Canada to the United States since the anti-smuggling treaty between the two countries was signed less than five years ago. The illicit traffic has steadily increased until this year it has exceeded \$300,000,000."

The dispatch adds that for this reason United States coast guard and prohibition officials are en route to Ottawa to confer with Canadian officials concerning possible revision of the treaty. The conference will open Monday.

The dispatch adds: "To these figures must be added re-exports from Canada of Scotch whiskeys, French wines, etc. In the last fiscal year these totaled to the United States, \$7,439,741."

The Globe in another story today says:

"Recent organized effort of the big booze interests to induce the Ontario Liquor Control Board to sell direct for the export trade has met with flat failure."

The board refused to have anything to do with the proposition and gave warning that it would not be approached on the matter again.

Governor Halts Hanging Of Couple In Louisiana

Metropolitan Airport, Los Angeles, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The monoplane Question Mark kept on grinding out aviation history today as its endurance flight continued for the fifth day.

Completing its 96-hour in the air at 7:26 a. m., the Army monoplane began to get within striking distance of the endurance record of 118 hours established by the French dirigible Dixmude. The idea of keeping an airplane up long enough to break the endurance of a lighter-than-air machine heretofore has been considered fantastic.

The Question Mark took on 150 gallons of gasoline at 7 a. m. in a contact with refueling plane No. 1 and then was reported to be in excellent condition. Refueling plane No. 2 took the air shortly afterward to deliver breakfast, oil and mail.

Franklin L. Jan. 5.—(AP)—Gov. Huey P. Long early today halted the execution of Mrs. Ada Bonner Lehouef and Dr. T. E. Dreher, who were to die on the gallows today for the murder of James J. Lehouef, husband of Mrs. Lehouef.

The governor at an early hour telephoned Sheriff Charles Peccot from Baton Rouge to make preparations for the double hanging until after litigation over a legal snarl involving appointment of a sanity commission is settled.

Up to that time the sheriff was left in a state of perplexity with a court order issued last night by four associate justices of the State Supreme Court instructing him to proceed with the executions while Chief Justice Charles A. O'Neill, also by writ, commanded a stay.

FAVOR RETURN OF TAXES TO STEEL CONCERN

Treasury, However, Not in Favor Of Re- turning \$200,000,000 To 26 States.

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The treasury advocates the return of \$200,000,000 in taxes to the United States Steel Corporation and it opposes the resolution proposing that the government give 26 states \$200,000,000 in taxes alleged to have been illegally collected from 1866 to 1868.

This and the fact that the House Appropriations Committee approved a \$75,000,000 item for tax returns in the first deficiency bill were the principal developments yesterday when the question of tax refunds bobbed up from two sources. The approval of the item in the deficiency bill came after an unsuccessful fight by Representative Garner of Texas, to launch an investigation of tax refund settlements.

Assistant Secretary Bond of the Treasury, in testifying before the Appropriations Committee, said that the settlement with the United States Steel Corporation, if accepted, would be in lieu of a claim for \$161,000,000 made by the corporation. The hearing before the Appropriations Committee also disclosed that the Treasury since 1917, had collected \$4,611,769,209 in back taxes but that it had refunded in that time \$975,012,356.

In opposing the claim by the states for \$200,000,000 in direct taxes, Secretary Mellon in a letter to the committee said that several hundred millions of dollars would be needed to settle all claims for illegally collected direct taxes since 1868 and that it was doubtful if any accurate record of the claims by the states could be produced.

Sensors Stephens of Mississippi, one of the leaders in the fight for refunding, said the states had been treated unjustly and argued that the government should pay the debt.

JUDGE WOOTEN NOT TO TAKE OFFICE OATH

Local Man Signifies Intention Not To Qualify As Member Board Commis'sers.

Judge F. M. Wooten, banker and lawyer of this city, elected a member of the Board of County Commissioners at the last primary, today signified his intention not to qualify for the office.

"Under all circumstances, I think it best not to leave the office open any longer," Judge Wooten said this morning, in speaking of his action. J. F. Harrington, clerk of the Superior Court, who has the power to fill the vacancy, said an appointment more than likely would be made within the next few days.

Judge Wooten declined to take oath of office when other members of the board were sworn in the first Monday in December. He submitted a statement in the form of a resignation in which he declared that it was unlawful for a member of the bar to hold an office of the kind, and that he had decided not to qualify until the law had been amended.

It was stated at the time that the law would probably be amended at the meeting of the General Assembly in February, and he would be able to take oath after that had been done.

Mount Olive Man Reported Missing

Gastonia, N. C., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Headquarters office of the American Legion of North Carolina here was asked today to assist in locating Roy Straughn, of Mount Olive, member of the Legion post at Pittsboro, who disappeared from his filling station at Mount Olive Christmas morning. He started for Goldsboro on some business and was to return at once to Mount Olive. His car has been found at Emporia, Va. Straughn was 33 years old, five feet ten, slightly stooped, sandy hair, blue eyes. Some freckles, weight 160. He served in Battery C, 113th Field Artillery, Daniel Bell, commander of the Pittsboro Post, is in charge of the search for Straughn.

Senate Committee End Vare Inquiry

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The senate committee that investigated William S. Vare's primary campaign in 1926 through with its inquiry but when its report will be made is a question.

Senator-elect Vare is now in Florida for his health and at a meeting of the committee yesterday it was decided to give him further time in which to appear, or to press argument through counsel. Vare was represented by an attorney at the meeting yesterday and the lawyer said that if his client's presence were insisted upon at this time it might, because of his illness, mean his death.

Committee members declared that they were through with the investigation and needed no more information, but that they were willing to hear Vare, or his counsel.

Funeral services for Mrs. Florence Blow Scales will be conducted from her late home Sunday morning at 11 o'clock by Rev. W. A. Lillycrop, pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal church. Interment will be made in the Episcopal churchyard.

Mrs. Scales died at the local hospital yesterday morning at eight o'clock after a brief illness. She was a member of one of the city's oldest and most prominent families and her death came as a profound shock to hundreds of friends in this and other sections.

Mrs. Scales was the wife of W. M. Scales, well known tobacco man of this city. She was 35 years of age, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Blow. She was born and reared in Greenville where she has lived the most of her life.

Believe Indians Kidnapped Youth

Douglas, Ariz., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Trekking into the wild ravines of the Mexican mountains south of the border here, Francisco Fimbres today was leading a party of 12 men bent upon finding the whereabouts of a band of Apache Indians, with whom they expect to find Fimbres kidnapped son.

The expedition, which carried supplies for two weeks was authorized by Gov. Fausto Topeto of Sonora, to hunt down and wipe out the band.

The son of Fimbres, who is a Sonora cattleman, was carried away by the hostile Apache band in October, 1926, when the family was set upon while riding to the Fimbres home on Bavipe River.

Mrs. Fimbres was killed and her body carried away.

The cattleman and a daughter survived the attack, and escaped to their home. The Agua Prieta officials said Governor Topeto was moved to hunt down the Apaches by the additional reason of recent large property losses in the Bavipe country. Evidence pointed to the wild band as responsible for raids in which large droves of cattle had been stolen.

HOOVER FACES LAST DAY ON THE HIGH SEAS

President-Elect An- xious to Get to Wash- ington To Tackle Big Job Ahead.

U. S. S. Utah, Enroute to Hampton Roads, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover faced this, his last day at sea, anxious to get to Washington to tackle the next big job ahead—that of selecting his official family. He plans to start right in with a series of conferences, with party leaders over the country and especially those men who were foremost in his councils during the campaign. He is hopeful that he can get through in a week in order to be able to go to Florida for recreation and fishing, with perhaps a later whirlwind tour of the West Indies.

The last few days at sea have not been altogether to Mr. Hoover's liking as the Utah encountered two squalls with stiff winds and choppy seas, with more rough water in prospect for today as the ship nears Cape Hatteras.

Despite somewhat unfavorable weather, the Utah is still making good time and will probably arrive at Hampton Roads Sunday afternoon or two ahead of the scheduled time unless fog is encountered off the Virginia coast.

As a memento of the home-ward trip, Mr. and Mrs. Hoover today received a pair of glass candlesticks and brass bobbin trays designed and made in the ship's shop. The presentation was without ceremony.

Mr. Hoover today gave the stewardward officers an autographed photograph of himself. The photograph was framed and placed in the wardroom along with those of former President Taft and the late President Harding who once was a guest on this vessel. The photograph bears this inscription: "To wardroom officers U. S. S. Utah with kind regards of Herbert Hoover."

Flu Germ Thief Still At Large In London, Eng.

London, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A thief who stole several tubes containing millions of influenza germs was at large today.

"The tubes were left in an automobile by Dr. W. M. Crofton, bacteriologist, when he entered his lab and they were stolen."

The doctor said that if the tubes were broken in a sheltered place there was undoubtedly danger of an epidemic. If they were broken in the open air the cold would probably kill the germs.

There has been a series of raids on physicians' automobiles in the last few months. It was suggested that narcotics were being sought by the thieves but it is now believed that the thefts were the work of a gang which has special means for disposing of medical equipment.

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Market Report Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of five points to a decline of one point, a better response to the relatively firm showing of Liverpool being prevented by over night selling orders brought in by the easier tone of yesterday.

There was not a great deal of cotton for sale, however, and prices steadied up as soon as the initial offerings had been absorbed with March selling up from 19.82 to 19.96 and July from 19.50 to 19.60, or about 2 to 10 points net higher by the end of the first half hour. Private cables said that some continental and Bombay selling in Liverpool had been absorbed by fair trade selling and London buying, and that there was a fair inquiry for cotton cloths for export.

The amount of cotton on ship-board awaiting clearance was estimated at 104,000 bales against 109,000 last year.

GRAIN MARKET

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The stock market displayed a complete reversal of form today, selling off sharply after a spirited opening rally. There was nothing in the day's news to explain the selling movement, which was generally described as a "natural correction of a top-heavy speculative position."

Several early gains of 3 to 15 points were cut down, or wiped out, and a number of issues sank 1 to 5 points below yesterday's final quotations.

Preliminary estimates of the U. S. Steel monthly tonnage statement to be issued next Thursday indicate a gain of between 75,000 and 100,000 tons in December. Announcement of a five for one stock split by A. G. Spaulding and Brothers was the only important business development. After an opening bulge, Radio and Victor Talking Machine broke sharply on the traditional "selling on the good news" following the announcement of merger terms. Radio opened 15 points higher at 410 and then slumped to 392. Victor Talking Machine converted an early gain of 2 1/2 points into a loss of 4 1/2. Wright dropped from 275 and 265 and Curtiss from 153 to 140.

Motor stocks were under pressure on the theory that recent price cutting foreboded keenest competition among the leading manufacturers this year and a reduction in unit profit. Coppers also fell back sharply on liquidation by pools which had marked up several of these issues to new high records on the strength of the red metal. The closing was irregular. Total sales approximated 2,400,000 shares.

TEX RICKARD IN DANGEROUS SHAPE TODAY

Miami, Fla., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Tex Rickard lay in a Miami Beach hospital today on the verge of a crisis which probably augurs life or death.

Spent by the constitutional drain of an operation for removal of his gangrene appendix, the president of Madison Square Garden was waging an uphill battle against abdominal infection which at 3:30 a. m. was 10 hours away from a climax.

At dawn an attendant said there was no appreciable change, bearing out an official bulletin from the sick room two hours earlier. Signed by Dr. E. H. Adkins, it read:

"Mr. Rickard is in a critical condition. A decided change for the worse was noted early last evening and his condition has gradually been growing weaker since the relapse (which occurred early last evening). We are hoping he will successfully combat the condition following an operation for a gangrene appendix. A definite change for the better or worse will probably take place within the next 10 hours."

Dr. Adkins left the hospital just before dawn for a spell of sleep after several hours of intense work at the bedside, leaving Mrs. Rickard and an attendant in complete charge of the patient. No one else was permitted near the private ward of the promoter, and newspaper men were barred from the building.

Little Maxine Rickard, 3, meanwhile, was sleeping peacefully at the Rickard winter home in Miami Beach, unaware of the critical condition of the maker of champions. Rickard brought his wife and Maxine to Miami Beach three weeks ago, and returned to New York, coming here again on December 28.

After rallying from an operation for appendicitis on last Tuesday, Rickard's condition suddenly grew worse and last night he suffered a sharp relapse. Following this, Dr. H. E. Adkins, his physician, announced that the promoter gradually was growing weaker.

All day yesterday, rumors persisted that Rickard was desperately ill, but these were not confirmed until Dr. Adkins issued his bulletin shortly after midnight. Messages to Cuba late yesterday seeking the aid of Dr. William Mayo, famous Rochester, Minnesota, specialist, gave indications of the trend of the promoter's illness, but Rickard's friends insisted that Dr. Mayo's services were sought as a precautionary measure.

It was announced that Dr. Mayo, who was traveling in the Cuban interior, could not be reached, but later, the Havana newspaper "El Muneco," quoted Dr. Mayo as saying that in his opinion Rickard's condition was such that his services would not avail.

No one except Mrs. Rickard and attendants were allowed to enter the sick room. Jack Dempsey arrived last night for a conference with Rickard on his proposed heavy weight elimination bouts, the first match of which was projected between Jack Sharkey and W. L. (Young) Stripling here in February. The former heavyweight champion was not permitted to see the sick man.
