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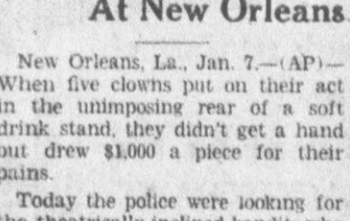
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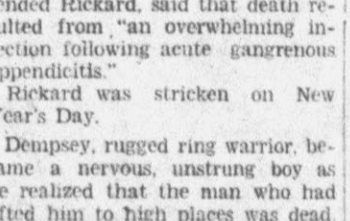
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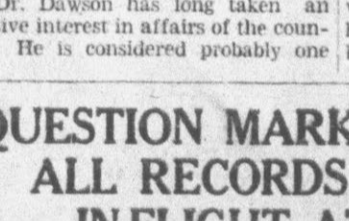
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Legislature Opening Set For Jan. 9th

HOOVER CALLS ON PRESIDENT

ident-elect Hoover called at the White House early today to discuss his South American tour with President Coolidge.

Mr. Hoover and the president were together nearly three-quarters of an hour. The president-elect declined to talk with newspaper men about the conference, remarking:

"Well, boys, if you want to know what happened you'll have to go to the fountain of news."

The reference was to Mr. Coolidge, but the president had returned to the privacy of his office.

After Mr. Hoover departed, it was announced at the White House that Mr. Hoover's recent South American tour had been the subject of his conference with the president.

Mr. Coolidge regarded the trip as very successful and thought the good will it had engendered found a reflection in the Pan-American Arbitration Conference here and seemed to have been generally very helpful.

RALEIGH HIGHS TO PLAY HERE TUESDAY NIGHT

The Hugh Morson quintet comes to the new High School gym tomorrow night for what promises to be one of the closest and most exciting games of the year. The nip and tuck encounter which occurred between these two teams last Friday night in Raleigh, when Greenville emerged victorious by the score of 28-24, has served to put a keen edge on the next fracas, for both players and spectators, and a record crowd will doubtless be on hand ready to take advantage of a rare treat for Greenville in sports.

That Raleigh does not feel the defeat of last week as a reflection on their representatives, but only as showing a team here of extra calibre is clearly demonstrated by the papers of the capitol in their statements that Greenville won, not through any weakness in the opposing team, but because they sent five scrappy and unusually good players to avenge last season's defeat. But for tomorrow, the situation is reversed. Raleigh, smarting under the first defeat administered them this year, has last Friday's humiliation very much in mind, and will make their last effort to even things up in Greenville.

Last winter when Raleigh invaded the local court, they were all but beaten by their overconfidence, trailing at the first half 10 to 3 and the third quarter 17 to 15. Only a sweeping final ten minutes gave them a hazardous victory.

Tomorrow night there will be few followers of the local high school's speedy quintet, or of basketball in general who will not turn their faces toward our high school gym.

Market Report Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 7.—(AP)—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of 2 to 9 points under southern selling and liquidation which sent prices off to 19.74 for March and 19.27 for July.

Trade buying and covering developed in ancient volume around the 19-3-4 cent level for spring months to absorb the offerings, however, and the market soon became less active with prices showing rallies of several points from the lowest by the end of the first half hour. March sold up to 19.81, with active months generally selling back to about Saturday's closing quotations. Cables from Liverpool made a fairly steady showing and advised that local and Bombay liquidation there had absorbed by trader calling and covering on the declines. According to these advices the demand for cotton cloths were well sustained, but the demand for yarns was limited.

The rallies from the opening decline met a renewal of liquidation and a little southern selling under which prices eased again. March sold off to 19.70 and July to 19.24 late in the morning with the general list showing net declines of about 9 to 12 points.

No special news factor was mentioned in connection with the decline but there was some talk of probably unfavorable standard cloth statistics for December. The market at mid-day was within a point or two of the lowest.

Futures closed 1/2 to 1 1/2 points lower, spot quiet, middling 19.88.

Winnipeg dispatches said the Canadian growers' pool is not offering any wheat abroad at the existing price level. There was also estimates current that world disappearance of wheat since July 1 is 60,000,000 bushels in excess of the amount during the corresponding period a year previous.

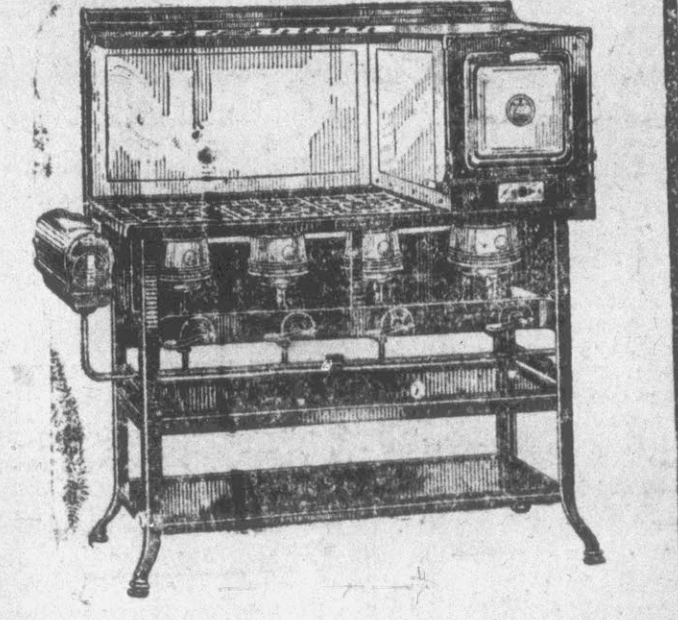
