Legislature To Probe Death Of Girl In N. M.

Albuquerque, N. M., Jan. 17.—(AP)—A joint committee from both houses of the New Mexico Legislature was ordered to come here today from Santa Fe to open investigation into the death last Sunday of Helen Askew, 18, of Fortales, inmate of the New Mexico Girls' Welfare home, a correctional institution.

The girl's death, a coroner's jury found yesterday, was caused by the lack of water and an injection of twilight sleep administered by Dr. Evelyn Frisbie and Miss Apple, physician and superintendent, respectively, at the home.

It was brought out at the inquest that the drug was administered on Saturday night to Miss Askew and five other girls "to keep them out," when they created a disturbance in objecting to solitary confinement and bread and water diet, which punishment was imposed for their escape from the home. Miss Apple said the injection was under Dr. Frisbie's direction.

Governor R. C. Dillon ordered the legislative investigation yesterday and District Attorney Eugene Lujan said he was studying evidence brought out at the inquest with a view toward filing criminal charges against the principals in Miss Askew's death.

SMITH ASKS FOR PAYMENT OF BIG DEBT

Former Candidate for Presidency Would Liquidate \$1,500,000 Party Debt.

New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Alfred E. Smith has asked popular contributions to liquidate the \$1,500,000 deficit incurred by the Democratic party in his unsuccessful campaign for president.

In a radio address last night Mr. Smith deplored the practice of having a few rich men meet party deficits and also urged the need for continued activity of the party throughout the four years between national elections.

He said he had agreed to turn over a royalty rights to a book of his campaign speeches to the national committee as his contribution to the party war chest. Copies of the book will be sent to each contributor who sent in two dollars or more toward meeting the deficit.

An important function of a minority party, Mr. Smith said, was to keep the people informed on what progress was being made toward the solution of national problems as unbiased information could not be had from the party in power.

For this purpose he emphasized the need for year-round headquarters for the Democratic national committee "where Democrats from over the nation may keep in touch with members of Congress and the affairs of the nation."

Mr. Smith omitted any reference to his own political future. The subject of his speech was kept secret until he began to speak over WEAF and 30 allied stations of the National Broadcasting Company chain.

Flames Wreck Talkie Stage At Hollywood

Hollywood, Cal., Jan. 17.—(AP)—A mass of smoldering ruins was all that remained today of the new sound-proof "talkie" stage of the Paramount-Famous Players Lasky studios, built at a reported cost of \$1,500,000. It was destroyed last night by a spectacular blaze of undetermined origin.

Five men were injured and a dozen firemen were overcome by smoke while fighting the fire. The stage was to have been used for the first time today.

Scores of motion picture folk, including Clara Bow, who was to have started production there today as star of a new talking picture, watched the burning of the 350 by 180 foot building, which also provided a thrilling sight for thousands of homebound Hollywood residents.

One Los Angeles fireman was seriously injured, thrown 35 feet from a ladder by collapse of huge sliding doors which expanded and blew out. B. T. Buckingham, a carpenter at work in the building when the fire started, said the electric lights flickered and went out several times. A few moments later he said he heard the crackling of burning wood in the ventilating system, and saw an electrician run from the building shouting "fire." Thirty lines of hose were used by firemen in protecting adjacent buildings.

Exploding Torch Causes Slight Fire

The fire department was called out shortly before the noon hour to extinguish a blaze at the Blades Motor Co., said to have been caused by an exploding blow torch. A work bench was slightly damaged by the flames.

SAY STEWART HAS LOST TO ROCKEFELLER

N. Y. Paper Declares Effort to Oust Standard Oil Chairman Is Successful.

New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The Herald-Tribune says today that according to one of New York's outstanding petroleum authorities, John D. Rockefeller, Jr. has won his fight to oust Col. Robert W. Stewart from the chairmanship of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana.

It is quite likely, the paper says, that Mr. Rockefeller would announce that he had more than 51 per cent of the vote proxies some time before the meeting of the stockholders, March 7.

At present, it is understood that Mr. Rockefeller is assured of proxies for 35 to 40 per cent of the outstanding 9,231,540 shares of \$25 par value stock held in estates, trust funds and banks as well as by foundations.

A run up of Standard Oil of Indiana on the curb market gave rise to rumors in Wall street that Mr. Rockefeller had called orders from Naples to "buy at the market." This was denied at the Rockefeller offices.

Oil stock experts pointed out that the daily turnover of Standard of Indiana in the market could have no bearing on the battle between Mr. Rockefeller and the administration of the company for control as it amounts to less than one per cent.

While Mr. Rockefeller will have the large blocks of stocks held by such interests as the Harbess, Plager and Rogers estates and other Standard Oil companies in which he is the dominant figure, Col. Stewart is expected to rally the stock held by employees and the 38,000 small stockholders of the company.

CRUISER BILL BRINGS FORTH MUCH ORATORY

Abundance Of Oratorical Fireworks and No Action Holds Sway In Congress.

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Abundance of oratory and but little action lay ahead of Congress today.

The long standing administration's new warship construction bill again had the right of way in the Senate and was in the general debate stage.

At the other end of the capitol the half billion dollar independent offices appropriation measure held the attention of the House with several hours set aside for discussion of its many and diversified provisions.

With the opposition to the naval construction measure which proposes the building of 15 cruisers and one aircraft carrier, yet to be heard from it was apparent that the Senate had many hours and probably days of discussion ahead.

In the House, however, leaders of all sessions have been keeping the legislative throttle open on supply bills and it was hoped that nightfall would find members talked out and the way paved for passage of the measure by tomorrow—at the latest, the week-end.

The tariff hearing by the Ways and Means Committee again drew a large number of persons to the city and to give their views on what changes, if any, should be effected in the import duties.

In the Senate, the Interstate Commerce Committee arranged to go ahead with the hearing on a bill proposing regulation of the soft coal industry.

Coolidge Signs Kellogg Treaty

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—President Coolidge today signed the document of ratifications of the Kellogg treaty to renounce war.

Members of the Senate, which ratified the pact on Tuesday, and cabinet officers looked on as Mr. Coolidge affixed his signature. The ceremony took place in the east room of the White House.

Notifications that the ratification document has been signed will be sent to the fourteen other original signatory powers. One other step will remain, the signing of exchange copies of the treaty for deposit in the archives of each signatory nation.

Under the blinding glare of camera lights and accompanied by the grinding of motion picture machines the President entered the east room a few minutes after 10 o'clock. He was accompanied by his military and naval aides and Vice-President Dawes. Behind them the cabinet led in file by two. Taking his place at the desk the President was

New Bills Continue To Flood Both Houses Of The State Legislature

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Grist for the legislature mill continued to accumulate in both houses today as Senators and Representatives kept up the introduction of new bills. There was little other business, before either body.

Taxes on telephone, telegraph, similar communications, and the use of electricity and gas were proposed in a bill sponsored in the Senate by Lawrence, Democrat of Hertford, as a measure to relieve tax burdens. Another measure, a tax bill, proposing an increase of one cent a gallon with a stipulation that the state take over all county roads, was born in the House sponsored by Rep. McNeill of Ashe.

Domestic relations, including divorce, figured in some of the proposed legislation offered.

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Another new tax proposal was given legislative birth in the Senate today. Senator Lawrence, Democrat of Hertford, introduced a bill to provide for a graduated tax on long distance telephone calls, telegraph cable, and radio communications, and a three per cent tax on the amount of consumers' bills for the use of electric current and gas.

A bill to strengthen the election laws by making all violations felonies was sponsored by Rep. S. Carter Williams, Republican, of Yadkin county, while repeal of the absentee voters' law in Buncombe county was proposed in a bill introduced by Senator Weaver, the Republican floor leader.

By the Lawrence bill a tax of five cents would be imposed on messages by telegraph, telephone, cable, or radio which originated in the state, if the charges were between 14 and 50 cents. A tax of ten cents would be placed on messages whose charges were between 50 cents and one dollar with a proportionate increase in the tax as the charges grew higher.

Another bill requiring a license for the operation of motor vehicles and providing for the establishment of a highway patrol was placed in the hopper today. It was introduced by Senator Blount of Pitt county. It differs in several details from the bill of the same nature last week by Lawrence of Hertford.

The bill introduced today, which is sponsored by the Carolina Motor Club stipulates that the highway patrol shall not be composed of over 250 men. Senator Lawrence's measure called for a minimum of 100 officers, the latter measure would place the cost of an operator's license at \$1, and the cost of a tax license, or of any vehicle operated for hire, at \$5.

The Blount bill would require an examination of every applicant for license, including his mental and physical fitness, except in cases of renewal.

Divorce was included in the barrage of state bills laid down by the Senators today. Reynolds of Madison, sponsored a measure which reduces the period of legal separation before a divorce from five years to one year.

One bill was passed during the session. The bill authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 in bonds by the city of Hendersonville for the completion of the Fleetwood Hotel and for other purposes, was given its third reading. As it had previously been approved by the House, it was sent to be enrolled for ratification.

A bill introduced by Rhyme of Gaston, would require that the board of education and the superintendent of the schools of that county, be chosen by a vote of the people.

inspection, to reduce the 20 per cent penalty for tax sales under foreclosure certificates to eight per cent, and to protect married women from slanderous husbands were introduced in the House today.

Seventeen bills in all were introduced at today's session, which also saw completion of the House's working organization with the announcement of the committees on public work, and on trustees of State College by Speaker Graham. One bill, that to make the minimum penalty for drunkenness in Macon county \$25 and the maximum fine \$50, passed its third reading and was sent to the Senate.

Rep. Jackson, Democrat of Lee, and resident of Sanford near where the Deep River coal mines are located, sponsored the measure calling for employment of a state mining engineer and inspection of all mines.

The bill for amendment of the county government laws to reduce the penalty for foreclosure tax collections from 20 per cent to eight per cent was introduced jointly by Representatives Lumpkin, Democrat of Franklin, and Carr, Democrat of Duplin.

Husbands and wives would be made competent to testify against each other in slander cases under a bill introduced by Rep. Carr of Duplin.

Rep. Boren, Democrat of Guilford introduced a bill to allow wives or husbands of state prisoners to secure divorces. The measure provided that five years of involuntary separation should be accepted as grounds for divorce. Under the existing law, wives or husbands even of convicted murderers who are sentenced to life imprisonment must plead that involuntary separation is seeking a divorce.

Speaker Graham with his announcement of the final committees to complete the House list, asked the legislators to introduce local and private bills early in the session so we may get them out of the way and center our attention on the more important state measures.

He named Rep. Woodward, Democrat of Nash, as chairman of the important committee on public roads. Rep. Johnson, Democrat of Currituck, was made chairman of the committee on trustees of State College.

Another measure calling for a one-cent increase in the state gasoline tax was placed before the House today. Rep. McNeill, Democrat of Ashe, was the author of the bill. It provided in addition that the state highway system should be extended to include "all county highways."

On motion of Rep. Winston, Democrat of Bertie, the House suspended the rules and passed a joint resolution that "when the General Assembly adjourns Saturday, it adjourn in honor of the birthdays of General Robert E. Lee and General T. J. (Stonewall) Jackson."

PLAN TO NAME SUCCESSOR TO BOOTH FRIDAY

High Council of Salvation Army Has Two Figures Under Consideration.

London, Jan. 17.—(AP)—It was assumed today that the high council of the Salvation Army would choose tomorrow a successor to General Bramwell Booth, who has been voted unfit to command.

Foremost among those suggested in Army circles for the generalship were Commander Evangeline Booth his sister, who heads the Army in the United States and led the victorious reform element, and Commissioner Edward J. Higgins of London, the Army's chief of staff.

The general's next move was eagerly awaited, there being indications that it would be to carry the fight for command to the courts. The Daily Mail today quoted him as saying:

"I haven't much money, but I will spend what I have in defending my position."

"Nothing will induce me to retire from the position I occupy. It was and is a sacred trust imposed on me by my father and it is not for me to lay it down. I should be a coward—worse than a coward, a skunk—if I do so, because there is a bit of rumour, and I won't."

"I will resist by every means in my power every attempt to deprive me of my trust."

Should the matter reach the courts it was assumed that legality of the council's action would turn on what constituted "unfitness."

The Daily Herald said that the interpretation of the word "unfitness" developed considerable heat in the council session.

Some of the delegation that visited the general at Southwood were quoted as expressing the opinion that he was mentally unstable. This widened the breach between the opposing factions.

The suggestion that the general was showing mental failure was keenly resented by those members of his family who supported him and by his other adherents. They cited the testimony of doctors on January 7 that there never had been any question of mental incapacity and that the general's intellect was unimpaired by illness.

The general was judged unfit by a vote of 55 to 8 after a council session of fourteen hours. Every territorial commander voted the general unfit except his daughter, Colonel Mary Booth. The other seven opponents of the resolution were Mrs. Bramwell Booth, Catherine Booth, Mrs. Booth-Halberg, and Commissioners Laurie, Kitchin, Cunningham and Smith.

One commissioner was absent and not voting because of illness. General Booth needed only 16 votes, twice the number he received, to defeat the motion. A general can only be removed because of unfitness by a three-quarters vote of the council.

Every member of the council was weeping, especially the aged members who had worked long years with the general. Evangeline Booth broke into sobs after she signed the resolution. As each member's name was called by the president of the council he or she stepped to the desk and signed the document which voted the general unfit to continue in office.

GALES CLAIM ELEVEN LIVES

Storms Along Northwestern Coast of Europe Cause Heavy Damage to Shipping

London, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Gales sweeping the northwestern coasts of Europe have carried eleven seamen to their deaths, while the interior suffered today from a heavy fall of snow.

The Swedish schooner Sophie was lost with a crew of three off the Scania coast.

Twenty-six men forming the crew of the Norwegian steamer Skolma were rescued by salvage ships and rocket apparatus after the vessel stranded on the rocks of Bornholm Island, Denmark.

Stormy seas along the Belgian coast resulted in damage to the dykes at Middelkerke and Bredene.

Blizzards, accompanied by a heavy fall of snow, created havoc with traffic through Germany. Violent snowstorms were sweeping Sweden.

There was heavy winter weather in France and Denmark.

Great Britain, however, escaped with light snowfalls.

LEAF SALES VERY LIGHT HERE TODAY

Hundred Thousand Pounds Of Bright Leaf Constituted Offerings this Morning

There was approximately one hundred thousand pounds of tobacco offered for sale on the Greenville tobacco market today and sales were completed before the noon hour. The price situation was reported strong on the large offerings of inferior grades of tobacco.

The market yesterday sold 191,000 pounds of tobacco for a total sum of \$35,854.60. The general price average for the day was given at \$1.86 per hundred pounds.

Total sales of the season had reached \$9,656,718 with completion of sales yesterday. Today's sales placed the market less than three hundred thousand pounds short of the seventy-million pound goal set for the present season.

Tobaccoists continued to impress upon the farmers the necessity of marketing their tobacco as hurriedly as possible the next several days. The market will close for the season the latter part of the month and it is hoped to have the entire crop disposed of by that time.

Careful attention should be given to wet, damaged tobacco, the farmers were advised, as this would no doubt play an important part in the price situation. A considerable part of the offerings since the holiday season showed signs of lack of preparation and this resulted in much lower prices than would have been received otherwise.

The market has witnessed phenomenal prices for common grade tobacco since Thanksgiving day. Some of the grades sold as high as \$79.00 per hundred pounds, many others nearly reaching this figure.

Tobaccoists today expressed gratification at the progress the market was making in realization of the seventy-million pound goal, and numbers were confident the ambition would not only be realized but surpassed by a comfortable margin.

Haynes Heads General Motors

New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Election of F. J. Haynes, former president of Durant Motors, Inc., to be president of the corporation, was announced today.

Haynes succeeds W. C. Durant, who recently announced that he was relinquishing the management of the corporation. The new president was elected at a meeting of the Durant board of directors at which Ralph A. Vail, former director of engineering and production of Dodge Brothers, was named vice-president in charge of engineering and production, and John A. Nichols, Jr., former vice-president in charge of sales of Dodge Brothers, was named secretary-treasurer.

The new group will assume full management of the company immediately, bringing back under one fold the principals chosen originally by the late John F. and Horace E. Dodge to direct the formation and development of Dodge Brothers.

The chief executive made plain his disapproval of this part time plan in his letter accepting the chief commissioner's resignation. He said, because of the proposed legislative transferring many county highways to the State Highway Department, he was convinced that the best available man was needed on a full time basis.

At their last previous meeting, the commissioners voted to request a meeting this afternoon with the road committees of the House and Senate with a view, it was indicated, for advocating a change in the highway laws whereby Mr. Page could continue his connection on a part time basis.

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HOOVER WILL MAKE SPEECH TO BELGIANS

Pres.-Elect To Broadcast Message To Celebration in His Honor At Brussels.

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—His voice traveling thousands of miles over a telephone wire, President-elect Hoover on Saturday will address a celebration at Brussels to be attended by the king and queen of Belgium.

Mr. Hoover will speak into a telephone at his desk either at the Mayflower hotel headquarters or his S street home, and at the Belgian capital his voice will be heard by the crowd through the medium of amplifiers.

Information at the Hoover headquarters is that the celebration is in honor of the president-elect who as head of the commission for the relief of Belgium directed the feeding of the population of the little kingdom during its occupation by the Germans.

This will be the first extended address the president-elect will deliver before his inauguration and the second since his return from his road tour during which he spoke nearly a score of times. His first talk here was brief, being in the form of a message on the occasion of the opening of the tunnel of the Great Northern Railroad under the Cascade Mountains last Saturday.

After nine days of continuous rounds of conferences with Republican party leaders, Mr. Hoover decided today to take a day off to devote to clearing up his personal correspondence which has accumulated since his return from Central and South America.

While his office force has taken care of a great volume of his general mail, the president-elect here is giving his personal attention to a great deal of the correspondence that comes to his office and he will spend the greater part of the day on this.

The conferences with leaders will be resumed tomorrow and carried on through Saturday by which time Mr. Hoover hopes to complete the task of developing views on cabinet appointments and a variety of other subjects so that he will be left free to devote his time in Florida almost uninterruptedly to the preparations of his inaugural address.

Yesterday was perhaps the most strenuous day the next president had had since his return to the national capital. He talked with nearly a score of members of the House and Senate as well as with others in official and private life.

Out of the conferences came the definite word that proposals for waterways developments will await the regular session of the seven-hundredth Congress late in the year, with the special session limited to farm relief and tariff revision and steel urgent matters as appropriations to defray the expenses of the special commission Mr. Hoover intends to appoint to study the whole subject of prohibition enforcement. Among other legislative matters to which Mr. Hoover is giving preliminary study are veterans' relief, the army and navy, employment stabilization, Indians, reclamation, waterways and developments, such as the Great Lakes to the Gulf and the Atlantic projects and many others. He probably will treat most of these in his first annual message to Congress next December.

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Owner and Publisher

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It is to be hoped that the Australian Ballot bill sponsored by Governor Gardner and to be introduced by Senator Broughton will receive favorable action by both houses of the General Assembly. North Carolina's system of voting is of the antiquated type that is easily imposed upon and the time has come for real reform along this line.

It has been said that men begin to worry about their hair when it is half gone, and it might be added that the same condition applies to health. Too often we pay no attention to our physical condition until our health is half or more than half gone and we have reached the breaking point. For some time health authorities of this state have urged against this condition by advising examinations at regular intervals as a means of checking any defect or disease before it reaches the dangerous stage. The human body is like a delicate piece of machinery and it should be given the attention it deserves. Too often ill health is the result of failure of one to know his or her real condition until the break has reached the stage beyond repair.

DON'T MAKE SALOONS
OF DRUG STORES

Now comes a bill in the Senate that would permit druggists to dispense liquor or prescription. To begin with, we do not believe that honest druggists desire such a law as most of them do not want to sell whiskey nor do they want to contend with the red tape that would accompany the handling of it. Most of us are aware that in many of those states where whiskey can be bought on prescription that the drug stores can be classed more or less as liquor dispensaries, that there are hundreds of ways for the unscrupulous dealer to get around the legal restrictions and that these conditions result in little or no prohibition in these communities. Long ago the people of North Carolina voted for prohibition. We do not believe that their attitude on the subject has changed. Let's keep what prohibition we already have and work even harder than ever before for enforcement to such an extent that we will in the end rid our state of the liquor menace. Permitting drug stores to sell whiskey on prescription is nothing more than bringing bootlegging from the back lots and obscure places and placing it on the main streets under the guise of respectability.

"Suicides are becoming too common in the life of America at this time," observed a well-known citizen today, discussing the death of a Pitt county man by the suicide route a day or so ago.

"In most cases the taking of life has been the result of excessive drinking. This should be a lesson to that great mass of men and women who make it a daily habit to tamper with the illicit beverage manufactured these days and times.

"No man is normal when he is drinking whiskey. He may drink so often and with such frequency that he is able to think in an apparently straight and level way, but the fact remains—he is not normal.

"Constant drinking affects the mind in such way that it is not at once detected. But suddenly the victim is seized by desperation, and with brain inflamed by drink and its accompanying immorality, suicide seems the most direct route out of the misery.

"All suicides are not the result of drink, of course, but in the majority of cases it may be traced indirectly to indiscreet indulgence in intoxicants or some form of dope equally as destructive to the nervous system."

"We wish to express our appreciation to the numbers of people who contributed clothing so liberally to poor children who lost hats, wraps and books in the recent fire which destroyed the Evans street School building last Monday, said Miss Grace Hunter, faculty member, who had charge of providing clothing for the children affected.

"The liberal gifts of numbers of people of the city has helped relieve an unusual situation—one which would have probably resulted in acute suffering of the children in cold weather.

"Some of the children affected by the fire were of extremely poor families. Had it not been for the donations of the clothing by public-spirited citizens they would have been forced to go insufficiently clad the remainder of the winter.

"As head of the committee, wish to express deep appreciation to the people of Greenville for their timely, whole-hearted response to the call for aid."

"Employment of Lester Bangs as manager of the Greenville club of the Eastern Carolina League, will be received with interest by baseball fans throughout the city and county," commented an old-timer of the sport realm today.

"A still a day doesn't keep away, but it helps rid the community of the illicit whiskey traffic," declared a well-known business man today, referring to the capture of a dozen stills by members of the sheriff's department during the first twelve working days of the month.

"With such vigilance, the illicit whiskey traffic ought to be greatly reduced instead of increased, as some like to argue after capture of stills.

"While Pitt county, no doubt, has less stills than any other county in this part of the state, it is far from free of the unlawful whiskey manufacture. Yet it is a matter of much satisfaction to know the situation is as favorable as it is."

"The officers are to be commended for the splendid way they are handling the situation and the law-abiding citizens truly appreciative of their efforts in this direction."

"Announcement of the coming to this city of a branch store of Montgomery Ward Co. will be received with much more than usual interest by the public generally," said a life-long resident of Greenville today.

"When a city begins to attract organizations of this kind it is a settled fact that it will also become a similar attraction to other concerns of the same type.

Woman and Two Men
Go On Trial For
Killing Detective

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 17.—(AP)—A woman and two men went on trial here today in Court of General Sessions for the murder of a hotel detective, Samuel J. Bickley.

Helen Gentle, 20, of Atlanta; Charles R. Vaughn, of Jacksonville, and Furman Jones, of Greenville, are the defendants in a case which had its inception October 19, 1928, when Bickley fell mortally wounded on the pavement just outside the Jefferson hotel after a brief conversation with occupants of a closed automobile.

Bickley died before he could tell who shot him, but detectives two weeks later sized Helen Gentle and Furman Jones in Atlanta, and on December 30 arrested Vaughn in Savannah.

An impressive array of legal talent will oppose Solicitor A. Fletcher Spigner. Judge Mendel L. Smith, of Camden, will appear for the girl; former Solicitor D. W. Smoak, of Greenville, and Claud N. Sapp, of Columbia, appear for Jones, and Judge T. J. Mauldin, before whom the case is to be tried, appointed two Columbia attorneys, John Hughes Cooper and A. W. Holman, to take Vaughn's defense.

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Stricken while engaged in a study of the disease thought to cause the disease of pellagra, Dr. Joseph Goldberger, 54, a United States public health service scientist, died today at the naval hospital here following an illness of several months.

The fatal illness, which started during his pellagra studies, however, was an enigma at his death to his fellow scientists. A post mortem was planned by Dr. G. W. McCoy, director of the health service's hygienic laboratory and a close friend of Dr. Goldberger, to determine the cause of the fatal illness.

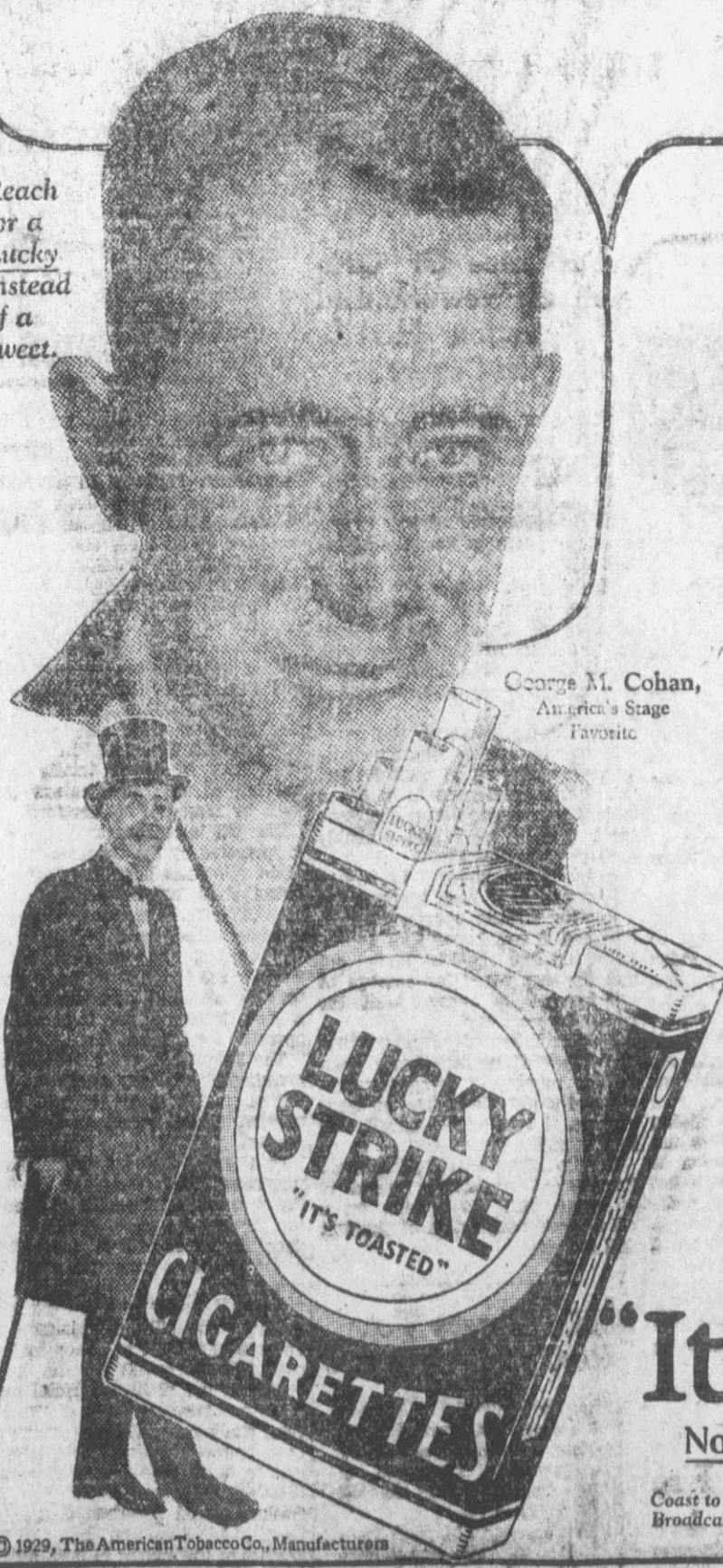

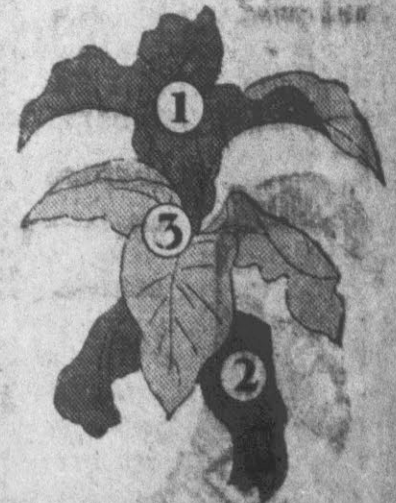

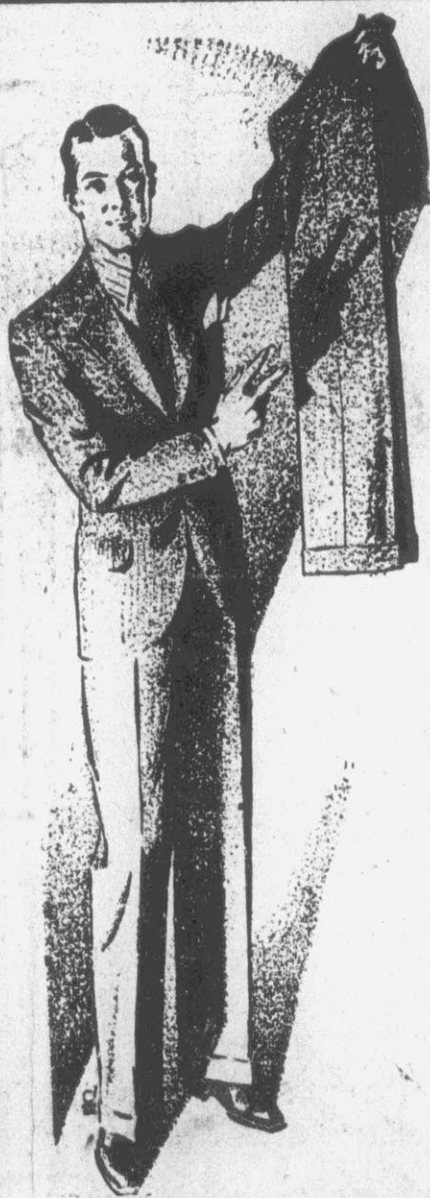

NO SCALPING OF TICKETS AT BIG FIGHT

Miami Beach, Fla., Jan. 17.—(AP)—There will be no tickets to the heavy-weight fight sold to scalpers, and Jack Dempsey, doing what he terms his first bit of road work on the promoting angle of a big fight, will brook no arguments to the contrary.

The former heavy-weight champion, filling the position of promoter for the Sharkey-Stribling go, left Miami by the death of Tex Rickard, agreed yesterday that not more than ten tickets to the battle will be sold to one person from the new-opened office at the Miami Beach Hotel Club.

He narrowed the possible list of purchasers of ten pasteboards further by declaring that only individuals known personally to the representatives of the Madison Square Garden Corporation, which is behind the fight, would be permitted to buy that number.

In an address last night before the combined Miami, Miami Beach and Coral Gables Real Estate boards, Dempsey entered the role of public speaker long enough to assert that the arena, with its 30,000 seats, will be filled as nearly as possible in the way Rickard would have done it, and that the fight will go on under schedule as nearly as possible to the one that the dead promoter would have arranged.

The business-like Mr. Dempsey has surprised his association and Miami and Miami Beach business men with a newly found knack for fight transactions on the outside of the ropes. Particularly have his efforts been impressed with his action in securing contracts for all phases of the fight.

Dempsey's program for today includes a conference with Mrs. Rickard and two attorneys on arrangements for settling the Miami Beach portion of the dead promoter's estate.

Helen Willis To Marry In Wealthy California Family

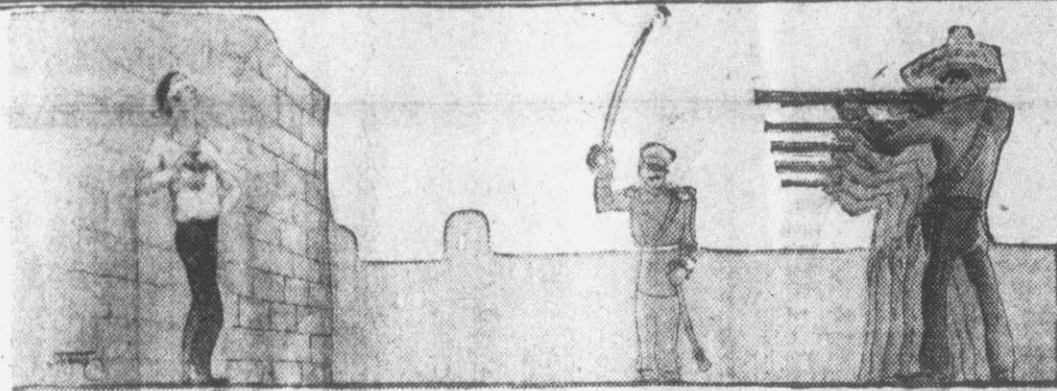

Chicago, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The milk supply of America's second city was endangered today by striking dairymen of Illinois and Wisconsin, demanding \$2.85 a hundredweight for milk in place of the \$2.50 the distributors have offered to continue paying.

Some distributors are storing thousands of pounds of condensed milk to meet an emergency, although none was of the opinion the milk shortage would become acute. There were reports that producers in several sections had been stopped en route to distributing plants, and their milk dumped onto the ground. Picketing at several receiving stations was continued today by strikers and plans were being made to

picket other stations of the Borden and Bowman Dairy companies, which distribute about two-thirds of the city's milk.

Four thousand pounds of milk were dumped yesterday in Lake County where dairymen extended their picket lines along highways leading to the Bowman receiving station at Gurnee, Ill., and to two Waakegan dairies.

Fertilizer Cuts Cost

Everything that the devoted skill of the best physicians and the unrelenting care of nurses and his family could do was being done to aid him. He showed a willingness and cheerfulness to second the efforts made in his behalf.

All who saw him were touched by his demeanor. Father L'hande, his spiritual adviser, spoke of the soldier's admirable faith and resignation for whatever might come. While they held no illusion, the doctors and the family felt justified today in having a little more hope.

Dr. Davenieres, who has attended Marshal Foch for the last ten years, was quoted by the newspaper Le Journal today as saying:

"The marshal is strong as an oak. His pulse is good, believe me, and

little by little his strength is coming back. No doubt it will be long, but careful convalescence will restore to us a man yet alert and young in body and in mind."

Certainly the heart is still weak. In the morning the nurse having noticed that the pulse was irregular hurriedly summoned me back again

soon after the first visit. Dr. Heitz-Boyer and I paid to our patient. I immediately gave him a hydrodermic of camphorated oil and the heart resumed its normal rhythm.

"It is probable that we shall continue these injections for some time yet. But there is nothing alarming

about them."

"The marshal retains all his energy. It is with the voice of a commanding officer, each word marked by a brief gesture of his right arm, that he answers my anxious questions, saying:

"I am all right, quite all right."

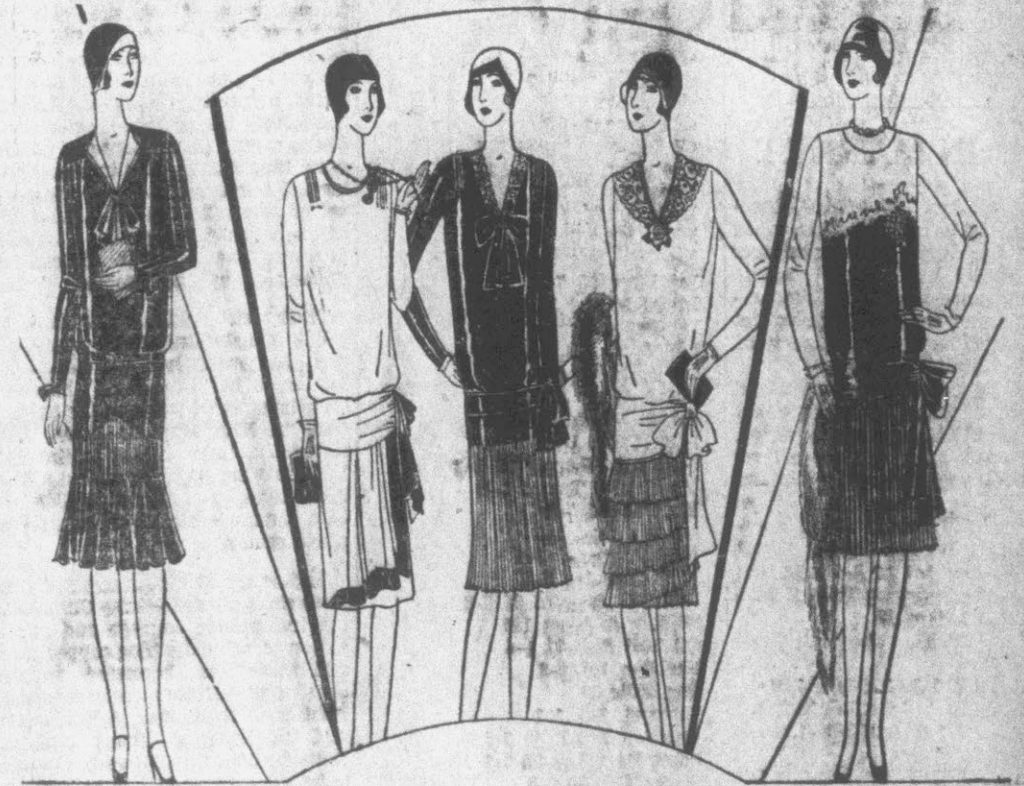

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 17. (AP)—Speculators for the advance assumed control of the price movement in today's stock market, bringing forward new leaders in the steel, rail, copper and motor groups. Scores of issues were marked up 2 to nearly 10 points, with new high records established by such popular shares as U. S. Steel, common; Chile Copper and Electric Auto Lite.

The strong resistance shown by the market leaders around the low prices of December, coupled with easier credit conditions, helped to revive bullish confidence, and led to active short covering. Call money renewed at 8 per cent and dropped to 7 as the mid-month payments flowed back to the banks. The prospect of an increase in Federal Reserve brokers' loans tended to restrict the volume of trading.

There was little in the day's business news to influence the price movement. Stockholders of the American International Corporation ratified the 2 for 1 stock split up proposed by directors, and the Gulf States Steel directors voted to increase the amount of common stock outstanding from 125,000 to 300,000 shares, and to issue the new stock at \$50 a share to common and preferred stockholders in the ratio of 1 new share for each two now held.

Non-Ferrous Metal shares changed hands in large volume at advancing prices. While Copper and St. Joseph Lead each ran up more than 7 points to new high levels at 83 3-4 and 78, respectively, Greene Cananea Copper, Calumet and Arizona, Cerro de Pasco and Howe Sound sold 4 or more points above yesterday's final quotations, and Anaconda, Kennecott and several others advanced 2 to 3 points.

U. S. Steel, common, ran into some profit-taking after setting a new peak price at 173 3-8. Radio ran up 17 3-4 points to 810 and Electric Auto Lite, By-Products Coke, U. S. Realty, General Electric, Packard Motors, Commercial Solvents, Johns-Manville, Peoples Gas, New York Central and Curtiss sold 4 to 10 points higher.

Boston, Jan. 17. (AP)—Babe Ruth saw the face of his dead wife for the first time in the early morning hours today after a hurried trip through cold and deserted streets to the home of her family in South Boston. The body had been brought back to family and friends late last night after a four day's official inquiry into the circumstances of her tragic death had finally closed.

Ruth prayed at the casket, banked with flowers which he had sent. The greatest of home run hitters was stricken with grief and left on the arms of friends. He said he would return for the funeral services in the house and at the grave this morning.

Miss Joanne Woodford, sister of Mrs. Ruth, collapsed as the casket was brought into the living room. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the New York Yankees; Miller Huggins, manager of the team, Lou Gehrig, first baseman and Ruth's chief competitor for more run honors, and Herbert Pennock, pitcher of the team, all were represented by floral tributes.

Babe bought a grave in Calvary cemetery. Tomorrow morning there will be a requiem mass at St. Augustine's Church, South Boston. Ruth arranged to leave for New York after the funeral today, taking with him nine-year-old Dorothy, daughter of Babe and Mrs. Ruth. Babe went to the Academy of the Assumption at Wellesley yesterday for the trial.
