GOV. JOHNSTON READY TO FACE SENATE COURT

**Suspended Executive
Of Oklahoma Pleads
Not Guilty To Im-
peachment Charges.**

Oklahoma City, Jan. 31.—(AP)—
Henry S. Johnston, suspended gov-
ernor of Oklahoma, today pleaded
not guilty to eight impeachment
articles and announced himself
ready for immediate trial before the
Senate court.

The announcement was made to
the court by Thomas H. Owen, of
Oklahoma City, one of Johnston's
attorneys.

Trial on all of the 11 charges re-
turned against Johnston by the
House of Representatives was set for
February 11.

Henry S. Johnston, suspended gov-
ernor of Oklahoma, was called today
to appear before the State Senate,
meeting as a court of impeachment,
to answer to eight impeachment
charges which allege irregularity and
misconduct in office.

Friends of the executive expected
that he would file a general denial
of the charges, probably in the form
of a plea of "not guilty," in prefer-
ence to separate denials to each
charge. Johnston has made no
statement of his intended procedure.

With the House of representatives
investigating committee, which
brought the 11 articles of impeach-
ment against Johnston, still busy
engaged in its work of investi-
gating alleged irregularities in John-
ston's and other state offices, the
question of an early trial for the
chief executive remained in doubt.

It was undetermined whether he
would seek an early setting of his
case before the impeachment court,
or wait until the investigators have
finished their work so that he can
face trial on all charges at the same
time.

Gov. Johnston's attorneys made
the State Supreme Court were made
by two witnesses before a subcom-
mittee of the general investigating
committee yesterday.

Hearings evidence presented by
Owen Owen, former district judge
of Tulsa, tended to show that an
unimpaired Supreme Court justice had
bartered for his favorable opinion
in a case.

Owen testified that a man, whose
name he did not reveal, told him
that he had obtained a judgment
from the Supreme Court favorable
to one of Owen's clients, in exchange
for a promise of the payment of
money to a Supreme Court justice.

Later, Owen said, his informant came
to him and said that the client had
skipped out, leaving him to pay
\$12,000 to a justice of the court. Owen
quoted the man as saying the
amount was promised in exchange
for the opinion.

The second charge was made by
Rush Glynn, of Tulsa, attorney
for the Glynn Oil Company, who
testified that his company had been
forced to settle a case before the
Supreme Court for \$250,000 in ex-
change for "the maladministration
of justice."

The general investigating commit-
tee, delving further into the alleged
activities of the suspended governor
in connection with business of the
State Highway department, was told
by J. B. Smith or Noble, a con-
tractor, that word had been given
him to "join the crowd," to buy a
certain brand of cement, and to
execute surety bonds with a certain
bonding company or lose out on
highway contracts with the State
Highway department.

Minister Speaks On Judgment At Catholic Mission

Left by the Rev. Francis J.

actions of others. It was the sin
of Phileas who although he tried
declared the Master to be innocent,
was afraid to release him—afraid of
the people, afraid of Caesar.

Tonight at 7:45 the topic of the
sermon will be "Passion of Our
Lord." Many have been well im-
pressed with the explanations of
the Catholic doctrine. All are wel-
come.

RECOMMEND ERECTION OF TWO NEW PENS

**House Committee
Also Approves Build-
ing Of Hospital For
Criminal Insane.**

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The
construction of two penitentiaries
and a hospital for the criminal in-
sane were among the major recom-
mendations of a special House
prisons investigating committee sub-
mitted today in a report to the
House.

In addition, as further means of
relieving congestion in federal peni-
tentiaries throughout the country,
the committee recommended that a
prison be constructed at
under the Porter bill be constructed
as quickly as possible, that the re-
formatory at Chillicothe, Ohio, be
pushed to completion and that fed-
eral jails or workhouses to care for
short term and detention prisoners
be authorized.

The committee suggested that one
of the two additional penitentiaries
be located in the northeastern part
of the country, and the other at
such a place as a board of experts
might determine. It recommended
that the jails or workhouses be lo-
cated at New York, Boston, Phila-
delphia, Baltimore, Cleveland, Cin-
cinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, San
Francisco and "such other places
as the needs from time to time
shall require."

The committee said legislation to
carry out its recommendations
would be presented promptly to
Congress.

Other recommendations include
enlargement of the office of super-
intendent of prisons and enactment
of a law to establish a parole board
to act upon applications without
requiring approval by the attorney
general.

The report suggested that all mil-
itary prisoners now held in civil
penitentiaries be transferred imme-
diately to the United States mili-
tary barracks, and that in the fu-
ture no more military prisoners be
accepted in the "already over-crowd-
ed civil penal institution."

It urged that the minimum ac-
commodations for the Chillicothe,
Ohio, institution be removed
as another means of relieving con-
gestion in the penitentiaries. At
present only those prisoners be-
tween the ages of 17 and 30 may be
admitted to Chillicothe.

The enactment of a bill to per-
mit the utilization of the labor of
federal convicts in the construction
of roads and other improvements on
federal reservations also was
urged, as was the establishment of
additional shops in the peniten-
tiaries and other federal penal in-
stitutions to manufacture goods to
be utilized by the government.

The committee also recommended
that funds be provided by Congress
to pay for a sufficient number of
inspectors to visit regularly all state
and local institutions in which fed-
eral prisoners are held "to the end
that the federal prisoners in local
jails actually receive the items for
which the federal government pays,
and to assist in raising the existing
standards of these institutions."

Six Firemen Hurt At Chicago, Ill.

Chicago, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Six fire-
men were injured, one fatally, when
a wall collapsed, burying them un-
der the debris, while they were
fighting an early morning fire to-
day in the South Shore Wet Wash
Laundry Company on South Chi-
cago avenue.

John J. Carey, 33, who suffered
a fractured skull, died several hours
later in a hospital. Timothy Don-
ohue, who also suffered a fractured
skull, was the most seriously in-
jured of the other five.

V. O. Barnhart, manager of the
laundry, estimated the loss at be-
tween \$150,000 and \$200,000.

SPEAKS MIND ABOUT BOSS OF POLITICS

**Illinois Woman Lead-
er Attacks "Boss-
ism" Of Ruth Hanna
McCormick.**

Springfield, Ill., Jan. 31.—(AP)—
One woman politician was under
fire from another in Illinois today
as Lottie Holman O'Neill, state rep-
resentative, spoke her mind about
"Mark Hanna McCormick," Mrs.
Ruth Hanna McCormick, congress-
woman-elect from Illinois.

Mrs. O'Neill said the expression of
her views about Mrs. McCormick in
public affairs might perhaps be re-
garded as "poor politics," but that
she felt it her duty to sound the
call to other Republican women
against the "bossism" of the con-
gresswoman-elect.

The statement was made with her
announcement that she had resign-
ed the vice-presidency of the Illi-
nois Republican Women's Club.

Many administration leaders ap-
peared perturbed at her action, but
did not comment.

Mrs. McCormick became a target
for attack when Mrs. O'Neill was
refused the chairmanship of the
House committee on education, be-
lieved offered instead three minor
chairmanships, which she refused.

"I'll take no chairmanship at all,"
Mrs. O'Neill told David Shanahan,
speaker of the House, and Governor
Louis L. Emmerson, who sought to
heal the breach. "The hand of
Ruth Hanna McCormick has balked
me at every possible turn, and not
only me, but every other woman in
the party with leadership possi-
bilities."

"I have served four terms and de-
served the recognition sought for
me. I was advised that there was
no opposition to me as chairman of
the education committee. I pointed
out that the chairmanship was going
behind the men of the House. Finally
it was given to Representative Soderstrom,
of Streator, who has been Labor's representative
and who knows there has been no
opposition to me from the ranks of
Labor."

LEON TROTZKY IS BANISHED

**Once Powerful Rus-
sian Leader On Way
To Angora, Turkey,
As An Exile.**

London, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Leon
Trotzky, once powerful Russian
leader, was reported in dispatches
today to be on his way to Turkey
as an exile. The Turkish govern-
ment agreed to give the former
leader of the Red army shelter in
Angora.

A Jewish telegraphic agency dis-
patch from Berlin quoted a "lead-
ing Soviet official" as saying that
rumors prevalent in Moscow indi-
cated that Trotzky had been seen
in Toflis on his way to Batum. From
there he will be transported to Con-
stantinople and presumably later to
Angora.

Decision to exile Trotzky was taken
on by the Polit Bureau, the most
important branch of the Soviet
government. Five members voted
to banish him, one abstained from
voting and four, Kalinin, Rykov,
Bukharin and Tomsky, voted against
banishment. The resolution was
proposed by Trotzky's principal op-
ponent, Joseph Stalin, secretary of the Com-
munist party and iron man of Rus-
sia.

An Exchange Telegraph dispatch
from Riga said that it was first
proposed to court-martial Trotzky
but that this idea was dropped be-
cause of the exile's popularity in
certain circles. Those who opposed
banishment were understood to
consider it almost as dangerous as
putting Trotzky before a firing
squad.

The Berlin dispatch added that
after the decision of the Polit Bureau
had been reached the Turkish gov-
ernment was approached and Mus-
tapha Kemal Pasha informed Stalin
that admission of Trotzky to Turkey
would involve many delicate prob-
lems. He agreed, however, to admit
the exile to Angora strictly within
the grounds of the Soviet embassy
and was accompanied on visits to
the city by one Russian and one
Turkish guard.

The Soviet government has de-
clined to issue an authoritative
statement on the whereabouts of
Trotzky.

Tobacco Market Closes Most Successful Season In 35 Years Of History

The Greenville tobacco market
closed today after one of the most
successful seasons of its thirty-five
years. While final sales
figures were not available, it was
authoritatively stated that season's
sales went over the 71,000,000 mark.
This included today's sales. The
market yesterday sold 86,774 pounds
of bright leaf for a total sum of
\$11,529.06.

Total sales of the season, includ-
ing yesterday, were given at 70,976-
954 pounds. The total amount paid
out by the market was \$14,951,987.87.

In speaking of the success of the
market this year, K. W. Cobb, super-
visor of sales, declared the season
was outstanding because of the
achievement of passing the goal of
seventy million pounds. This was
something like ten million pounds
above the goal of sixty million set
for last season.

Mr. Cobb also said that establish-
ment of a world's record in the sell-
ing of a million pounds of tobacco
a day for a period of sixty days
was also recognized as one of the
market's really great accomplish-
ments. This record was made dur-
ing days prior to the Thanksgiving
holidays and resulted from long
hours of labor on the part of buy-
ers and hundreds of others engaged
in the great industry of the season.

The goal of seventy million
pounds was one of the most ambi-
tious programs ever attempted by a
market with four sets of buyers. Its
realization not only proved surpris-
ing to the general public, but to the
hundreds of men employed on this
market.

Many critical people, at the
first of the season, declared it was
a matter of impossibility to sell so
much tobacco with only four sets
of buyers. But undaunted by the
opinion of the doubtful, tobaccoists
hit a fast stride during the big part
of the season, and by working over-
time, succeeded in getting in com-
fortable distance of the goal by the
Christmas holidays. But even then
there were some who maintained
that not enough tobacco would be
sold after Christmas to make the
goal possible. The tobaccoists, con-
vinced of the goal in sight, contin-
ued to sell, and not so many days
ago had the pleasure of passing the
seventy million pound mark.

The realization of this great am-
bition has not caused the market
to sit down and rest with its laurels.
Plans are already under way for
selling eighty million pounds next
year. This can be done with five
sets of buyers—and five sets of buy-
ers the market must have to keep
pace with other developments of
the industry in this great section.
It was declared.

While contemplated improvements
for next season had not been defi-
nitely announced today, it was gen-
erally understood that they were
in the offing and would take place
during the summer months. The
market has experienced unpreced-
ented growth during the last five or
six years, and tobaccoists are in-
sistent that this growth continue to
that the community may come into
its rightful heritage as the greatest
bright leaf producing section of the
world.

PERSON SHELLS SENATE; NEW BILLS CONTINUE TO POUR INTO THE HOUSE

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—(AP)—While
the House was occupied with the
routine of receiving new
bills today, the Senate was en-
gaged in a discussion of the
Franklin, with a discussion of
the late presidential campaign,
trusts and other topics. The Sen-
ator was not permitted to complete
his address, entitled "Who Killed
Cook Robin," as he was ruled out
of order.

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The Sen-
ate halted Senator W. M. Person,
democrat of Franklin, as he was
making a lengthy speech today,
largely devoted to the condition of
the Democratic party.

The Senator had spent some time
in denouncing the state leaders of
the Democratic party in the late
campaign as "pin heads," the city
of Raleigh as a "lame duck town,"
and the trusts of the state.

In making the motion to with-
draw from Person the privilege of
the floor, T. L. Johnson of Robeson,
president pro-tem of the Sen-
ate, declared, "I have great respect
for the Senator from Franklin but
we have serious business here and
have no time for a political speech."

"If the Senator doesn't want to
listen to my speech, he can absent
himself or have cotton stuffed in
his ears," shouted Person.

Lieutenant Governor Fountain
tried unsuccessfully to make Sen-
ator Person take his seat and then
sent some time arguing the rules
of parliamentary procedure, finally
a motion by Ward of Craven to al-
low Person to proceed was defeat-
ed in an oral vote.

Senator Person's speech today he
called, "Who Killed Cook Robin?"
He was not killed until he declared
that the "preachers and long-haired
teachers killed cook robin," refer-
ring to the late campaign.

Referring to his anti-laboring bill
which was reported favorably by
one committee and then referred
to another, he said that Forsyth
county went for Hoover by 7,000
votes and then "sent a Democrat
down to handle our finances," re-
ferring to Womble, chairman of the
finance committee.

The Winston-Salem man rose and
asked, "Have you ever appeared be-
fore my committee for a hearing?"
"No, I've been sick," was Person's
reply. "We will gladly hear you
at any time," he was told.

KIDNAPPING CASE DRAGGED OUT OF PAST

**Heated Argument
Features Investiga-
tion Of Judge Hardy
At Los Angeles.**

Los Angeles, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The
revel to Alvin Karpis, McPherson's
famous story about being kidnaped—
the conspiracy case which was
brought against her and roped was
dragged out of the past today by the
legislative committee investigating
the evangelist's payment of \$22,500
to Judge Carlos S. Hardy of the Los
Angeles Criminal Court.

Until yesterday the committee
which is seeking to determine
whether Judge Hardy shall face im-
peachment charges for accepting
the money, had touched only a few
angles incidental to the kidnapping
story and the conspiracy case.

Near the close of yesterday's ses-
sion, however, testimony of two
newspapermen brought into the in-
vestigational arena the occurrences of
two years or more ago when Mrs.
McPherson's case was dropped.

In the midst of an argument as
to the admissibility of testimony
given by Walter Mark, a reporter,
the chairman of the committee,
Walter J. Little, announced:

"We believe that any facts which
we may be able to uncover on the
disposal of charges in the McPherson
case will prove valuable to the
citizens of Los Angeles county and
to the state."

It was during the heated argu-
ment regarding Mark's testimony
that Cromwell Ormsby, one of Mrs.
McPherson's attorneys, was forcibly
ejected from the committee room
after his violent and repeated ob-
jection to the line of testimony
which dealt with conversation
Mark had a few months ago with
Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of
the evangelist, with whom she now
is at odds.

Mrs. Kennedy, former business
manager of the temple, split with
her daughter about a year ago fol-
lowing a disagreement and now is
believed to be living in Seattle.

"Mrs. Kennedy said," Mark testif-
ied, "that Mrs. McPherson had told
her of a plan to have the conspiracy
case dismissed."

"Mrs. Kennedy said her daughter
gave the names of her advisers as
Ralph Jordan (Mrs. McPherson's
former business manager), Les
Tavener and Morris Lavine (news-
paperman) and called them her
three deliverers."

"Mrs. Kennedy told me that the
case would be dismissed, and that
the next day it was dismissed."

"Mrs. Kennedy said that in view
of the previous attitude of the men
whom Mrs. McPherson named as
her advisers, she said that she men-
tioned these names and that Mrs.
McPherson told her that hitherto
the case had been a newspaper trial,
but that she had now these three
men over to her side. Mrs. Ken-
nedy said that all this time Mrs.
McPherson seemed very worried and
nervous."

This brought a heated protest
from Ormsby. Springing to his feet
he shouted:

"I want to protest against this
dastardly and cowardly sort of testi-
mony. Mrs. McPherson is not on
trial and if this keeps up we will
withdraw from this hearing."

The argument, in which several
members of the committee joined,
came to a climax when Chairman
Little said:

"Mrs. McPherson is not a party to
this hearing, and Mr. Ormsby there-
fore has no standing with the com-
mittee. We have suffered his pres-
ence thus far. Mr. Sergeant-at-Arms,
remove Mr. Ormsby outside
the room."

"This is just what I expected,"
shouted Ormsby.

"You have gotten the publicity
you came up here for," continued
Little.

SEAL DOOM OF TWO KILLERS IN LOUISIANA

**Mrs. Leboef And Dr.
Dreher To Die On
Gallows Tomorrow
At Franklin.**

New Orleans, Jan. 31.—(AP)—
Unless Governor Huey P. Long
changes his mind, Mrs. Ada Bon-
ner Leboef and Dr. Thomas E.
Dreher will die on the gallows to-
morrow at Franklin, La., for slay-
ing James J. Leboef, the woman's
husband, 18 months ago.

The governor announced at Baton
Rouge today that he had reviewed
the case carefully and did not in-
tend to take any further action.

Previously Judge Wayne G. Borah
of the United States District Court
and the United States Circuit Court
of Appeals had refused to grant a
stay of execution on the ground
that the prisoners had not received
a fair and impartial trial.

This left Governor Long as the
only possible hope to save the con-
demned pair from the noose. The
execution is set for tomorrow be-
tween noon and 3-p. m.

They are alleged to have slain
Leboef so he would not interfere
with their love affair. Leboef was
killed on Lake Pelourde, near his
Morgan City home, and his body
was found five days later.

**Two Seamen Lose
Lives In Ship Fire**

Jersey City, N. J., Jan. 31.—(AP)—
Two men of the crew of the Presi-
dent Johnson, of the Dollar Steam-
ship Line, lost their lives early this
morning when a fire broke out in
the fore-cabin of the steamer, dock-
ed at the foot of Eleventh street.
Both bodies are as yet unidentified.
One, a junior engineer, lost his life
when he went back to retrieve his
clothing. The other was burned to
death in his bunk.

**Kinston Store
Wrecked By Fire**

Kinston, N. C., Jan. 31.—(AP)—A
loss of \$200,000 was caused by the
complete destruction of the four-
story Adler Brothers' department
store and the firm's stock of goods
in a spectacular fire of unknown
origin which began shortly after
midnight this morning.

The fire originated near the ele-
vator in the rear of the building and
soon the entire brick structure was
in a blaze which could be seen for
miles. For a time the National
Bank of Kinston on one side and
stores on the other side were con-
sidered doomed and hurry calls were
made to Greenville and the Golds-
boro department and volunteers ex-
tinguished the blaze before the out-
side companies reached the scene.

REED URGES PASSAGE OF CRUISER BILL

**Missouri Democrat
Tells Senate Of Danger
Of Not Being
Prepared.**

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—
When it came time to take up the
cruiser bill again today many Sen-
ators were still thinking of Senator
Reed's speech yesterday in support
of the measure and of the reply of
Senator Brookhart of Iowa.

Aside from the speeches them-
selves, there was the fact that Reed,
Democrat, Missouri, retired from
public life at the end of this ses-
sion and his address may have been
the last in which he called into
play the wit and command of rig-
orous phrases that have given him
fame as an orator.

"Peace treaties will not arrest
bullets," Reed declared, "wars of to-
day are no longer wars of valor
but of machines; valor full armed
men cannot resist full armed;
the opinion of the world is deter-
mined by the policies of other na-
tions and all are armed."

Referring to the Washington
naval armaments conference of
1922, Reed said that the United
States agreed to "destroy \$600,000,
000 worth of the finest fighting
craft ever conceived by the brains
of engineers. They sank obsolete
ships."

He also referred to the armaments
of other countries several times in
the course of his address and de-
clared that he bore no other coun-
try ill will, but he argued that since
they were armed, it was necessary
for the United States to be pre-
pared.

Senator Brookhart had spent a
good portion of the day before in
attacking the cruiser bill and be-
fore he concluded Reed said that
in the face of recent opinion that
cruisers were vital to a fleet, even
Senators had sent up contrary
opinion. "Name," Reed said, "Admiral

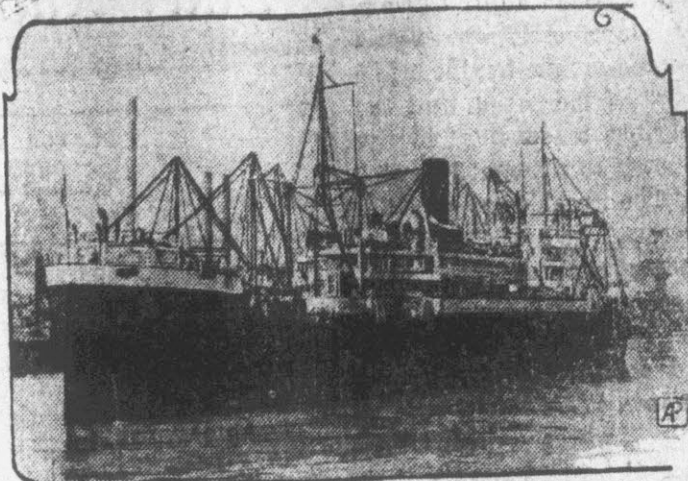

Flying Flapper" Sets New Endurance Record For Sex At New York

Michel Field, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Elmer Smith, 17-year-old flying "Flapper" today established an endurance flying record established Jan. 1 by Miss Bobby Trout, California.

Starting off in an open cockpit at 2:17:10 yesterday afternoon Smith spent the lonely hours, varying her routine but flying a trip over lower Manhattan, landed at 3:33:55 this morning, armed with a heavy flying suit and with her face protected by a gas mask, she apparently suffered no ill effects from the bit-ting. A red nose was the sign of the battle she had fought with the elements on one of the coldest nights of the winter.

She had to be lifted from her plane by field attendants. Her legs stiff from having been forced to remain seated in the one position for so long. She brought her plane in at the southern end of the field, beyond the range of the floodlights, but one of the first to reach the side was her father, Tom Smith, a pilot, who greeted her with a kiss.

She then went to the field operations office where she sat in front of the fire and drank a cup of hot tea. She had taken two vacuum bottles of beef tea and coffee along the plane but did not drink any of either. She also had taken some sleeping tablets but said she had found it necessary to use them.

Her plane, a Brunner Winkle bi-plane, started out with 116 gallons of gasoline and 32 gallons of oil—enough to fly for an additional 10 hours.

While riding lights on the tips of wings were burned out and the meter went out of commission during the flight. She had to estimate her altitude during her flight. A beacon, the lone light on the field, was out of commission several times. Mechanics finally effected repairs after climbing the hundred-foot tower in the freezing weather.

Smith flew at an average altitude of 1200 feet. The flood lights were turned on when she signalled a flare that she was descending. Her father arrived at the field yesterday with the intention of having her postpone her flight in view of the extreme cold, but found she already taken off.

Later in the afternoon he went in another plane on the side of which instructions had been chalked, advising her to fly north and south during the night and informing her she would have moonlight before p. m.

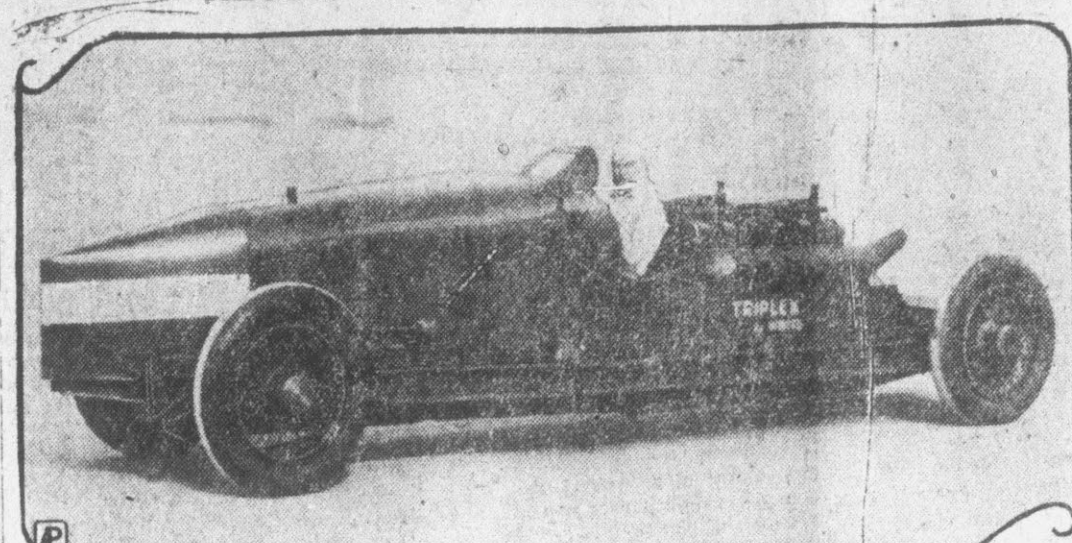

Frustrate Plot To Kill Premier Of Lithuania

London, Jan. 31. (AP)—De-patches from Lithuania and border countries today told of the frustration of a plot to assassinate Antanas Voldemaras, premier of Lithuania.

Advices from Riga, Latvia, to the Exchange Telegraph, were that General Plechavichius, former chief of staff, had been arrested at Kovno, charged with leading the plotters.

Eighteen army officers were arrested at the same time on similar charges.

A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Kovno said that President Smetona, of Lithuania, was suspected of aiding the plotters. Excitement prevailed in the Lithuanian capital and there were rumors that the president would be forced to resign.

A Warsaw dispatch to the Daily Mail said that the entire Lithuanian army was hostile to the premier. Open insurrection was expected hourly.

Premier Voldemaras came into power on December 17, 1926, when a military Nationalist coup d'etat overthrew the Socialist government. Parliament was summoned to meet that night and receive the resignations of the Socialist government. Antanas Smetona was then elected president for a three-year term.

The Kovno correspondent of the mail said that the president wanted to remove Voldemaras because he refused to modify the martial law which he had inaugurated when he seized dictatorial power.

Report Surrender Of Kabul Today

London, Jan. 31. (AP)—Advices from Russia today described Amanullah's efforts to regain the throne of Afghanistan as involving a battle for control of Kabul, the capital.

His followers were stated by the Afghan minister to Moscow to have surrounded Kabul.

They were planning to drive from the throne Habibullah Khan, who forced Amanullah's brother to abdicate. The minister expressed confidence that Amanullah would soon be back in control.

Another tribal leader was stated in a dispatch from Peshawar, India, to have joined in the fighting. He was Malik Ghousuddin, leader of the Chitral tribes in an expedition against royal troops. His followers claimed he had supreme power in Khost province.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, speaking in the House of Commons, said that Amanullah had formally announced his abdication to the British government. Consequently, until it was clear that in spite of his abdication, Amanullah was regarded as their king by the people of Afghanistan, the British government would be unable to regard Amanullah's government as the rightful government of Afghanistan.

Sir Austen said that Great Britain had no intention of interfering in the internal affairs of Afghanistan, by supporting or assisting any of the parties at present contending for power there.

Kinston, N. C., Jan. 31.—Mrs. Mae T. Hooten, aged 53, wife of J. C. Hooten, died suddenly of a heart attack yesterday about noon at her home on East Washington street. Hooten, Jr., Mrs. Will Carraway, Mrs. Mamie Carraway and Jess Hooten, of Grifton; Henry Hooten, Baltimore; Miss Anna Belle Hooten and Robert Hooten, of Kinston. The deceased is also survived by the following step-children: W. C. Hooten, Atlanta, Ga.; Mrs. W. L. Wellfare Wilson; Mr. Edward Taylor, Winstonburg, and Mrs. Bessie Hooten, of this city. Brothers and sisters surviving are: P. E. Tuten, W. W. Tuten, Mrs. John Bryan and Mrs. E. W. Dickerson.

The funeral was held from her late home at 2 o'clock today. Burial was at Edwards' Chapel cemetery.

"It's ghastly, positively ghastly," he exclaimed more than once as he witnessed in many mining villages poverty which shocked and surprised him.

Indignation was expressed frequently by the prince to officials.

One of the worst places visited was the village of Benton, where a collection of tumble-down cottages was in a sea of mud. Relieved his trousers high above his shoe tips, the prince plunged through the quagmire. Being told that families of eight to ten persons were living in these holes, he exclaimed:

"It's horrible."

"But they are rent free," he was told.

"That's the best that can be said about them," the prince answered with a contemptuous exclamation.

In the dark room of one cottage the prince said to an occupant:

"Not much to be here? However do you find your way about?"

"We are glad to find any place to live," a woman replied.

"Some of these cottages have been condemned but they are homes to us."

Bulgarians To Get New Queen

Sofia, Jan. 31. (AP)—In the event that King Boris of Bulgaria, who will visit Sofia tomorrow, will not survive, the Bulgarians today said that she would be their queen.

Preparations at the Italian legation for visitors were understood to well informed circles to concern the Duke and Duchess of Aosta and their niece, the princess, Bulgaria, therefore, was awaiting announcement that King Boris, 35, would have the 21-year-old princess as a bride.

Commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of Bulgaria's liberation from the Turks will begin shortly and the prediction was made today in an authoritative quarter that the wedding would take place in connection with the celebrations, which will last for some time. The time of this observance was also regarded as the proper occasion for the official coronation of Boris, which would be the first solemn coronation since the liberation of Bulgaria.

The religious barrier which stood in the way of the marriage is understood to have been removed. King Boris, by the constitution, must profess the Greek orthodox religion. Pope Pius is understood to have granted Princess Giovanna a dispensation under which she may marry Boris provided that Bulgaria concludes a concordat with the Vatican. The agreement would permit the appointment of a papal nuncio to Sofia, replacing the present unofficial apostolic representative.

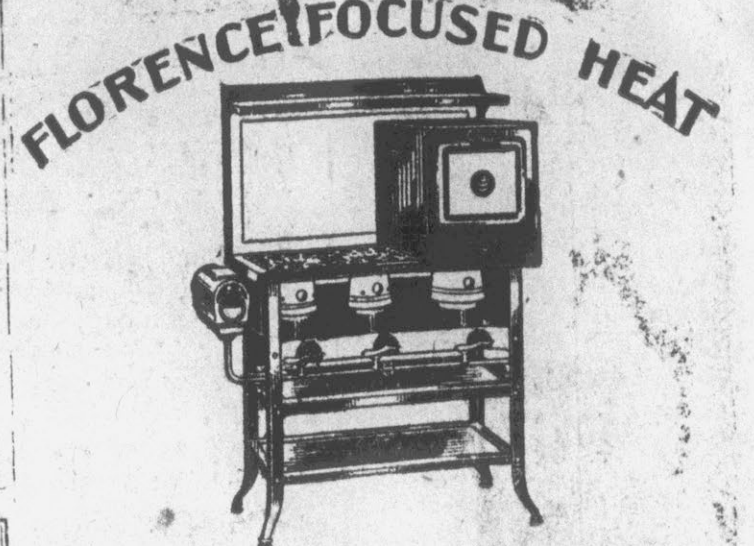

STOCK MARKET

By STANLEY W. FRENOSI, Associated Press Financial Editor

New York, Jan. 31.—(AP)—With unexpected improvement in the money market, strong support came into the stock market today, and buoyancy spread throughout most of the list, after several sessions of unusual irregularity. British operations were switched from the utilities to the rails.

Call money renewed at 7 per cent, and was in adequate supply at that figure, although a higher rate had been looked for today, as final preparations were made for the February 1 payments. Considerable funds had been attracted by yesterday's 8 per cent rate and some of the \$7,500,000 in gold just arrived was evidently put to work. Time money was also easier.

Failure of the Bank of England to increase its rediscount rate was regarded bullishly, as it was believed to leave the way clear for further takings of gold in London. No change in the New York Federal Reserve bank's rates is expected at the meeting this afternoon. A moderate increase in brokers' loans is looked for, however, but resulting more from heavy new financing than from stock market activity.

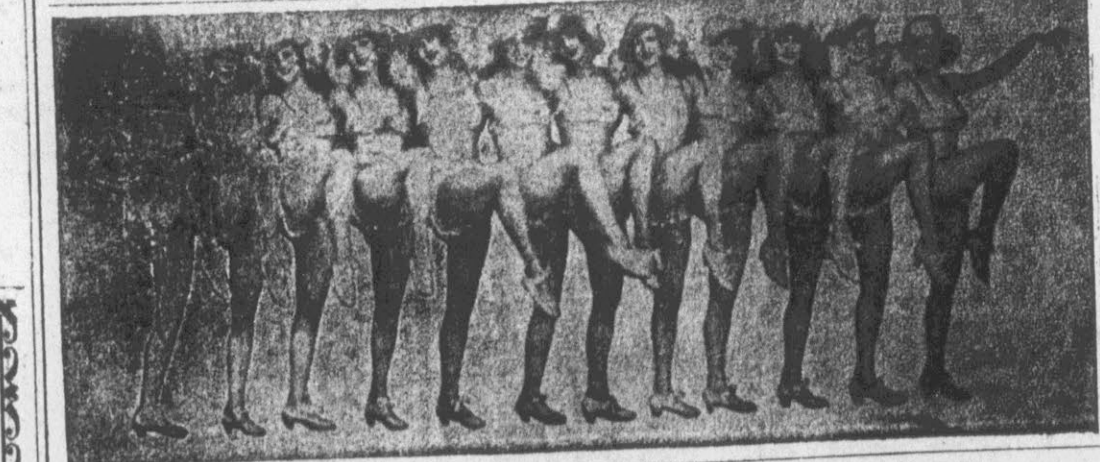
