DENIES CLAIM
OF WOMAN IN
DAMAGE SUIT**Tunney's Attorney
Discounts Charges In
N. J. Breach Of
Promise Case.**

Brioni, Italy, May 22.—(AP)—Gene Tunney, former world's heavyweight champion, thinks the suit of Mrs. Katherine King Fogarty, the divorced wife of a Fort Worth plumber, for \$500,000 for alleged breach of promise to marry, "must be another joke."

The one-time pugilist, when informed that steps toward litigation had been taken in Connecticut, said: "I know absolutely nothing of the report. No! It must be another joke. When I am sued I let my attorneys worry. I have all the worries I can handle right now here."

The present worries, although unexplained, were presumed to be a reference to the recuperation of his wife, the former Polly Lauder, after an operation for appendicitis. She has been progressing favorably.

Tunney and his wife have remained in Brioni since their marriage last October 3, in Rome, and have spent the last few weeks here in Brioni where the former champion has maintained a close association with George Bernard Shaw, Irish playwright, who with Mrs. Shaw, has spent a vacation period here. The two celebrities have spent much time together, swimming and sunbathing on the island beaches.

New York, May 22.—(AP)—Unqualified denials of the claims of Mrs. Katherine King Fogarty, who seeks \$500,000 from Gene Tunney, have been made in behalf of the retired heavyweight champion and the Lauder family.

The complaint in which Mrs. Fogarty charges Tunney broke his promise to marry her was in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Michael F. Ryan, of Stamford, Conn., today for filing in court at Bridgeport, Conn. Ryan has placed an attachment on the 60-acre estate which Tunney owns near North Stamford and search of bank records in Stamford for any accounts the former heavyweight champion might have there.

Floyd E. Harbour, secretary to Mrs. George H. Lauder, mother of Mrs. Polly Lauder Tunney, said:

"The matter of Mrs. Fogarty was discussed at length before the marriage. It was decided there was nothing to it."

Tunney's attorney, George W. Whitelaw, issued this statement:

"Numerous threats of this kind have been made in the past by this woman, culminating in very insistent demands on her part and threats of damaging publicity immediately before Tunney's last fight for the heavyweight championship."

"At that time a very thorough investigation of her claims was made and they were found to be without the slightest merit."

"Neither she nor her claim can at this time be dignified by further comment on my part other than to publish the following affidavit by her in the presence of her lawyer on July 24, two days before the championship fight:

"Katherine King Fogarty, being duly sworn deposes and says: I made the acquaintance of John (Gene) Tunney in Hot Springs in October, 1924. Our relations at all times thereafter were such as in no way to cast the slightest criticism or discredit upon him."

"I have no claim upon him of any kind and never did have. I had hoped to continue to enjoy his friendship, but that no longer seems possible for either of us."

"In the past I have said things about him to my lawyers that I now deeply regret, because I know of nothing I could say that would cast the slightest discredit upon him, and should my name ever be used with or without my knowledge in the future in any way to reflect in the slightest manner upon him I wish to make this solemn declaration under oath that he is under no obligation whatsoever to me and never was, and that his character and conduct to my knowledge are of the best."

Mrs. Fogarty, who formerly lived in Fort Worth, Texas, now makes her home at the San Carlos Hotel here. The clerk at the hotel said she was out of the city."

Her first husband was E. K. King. After his death she married John S. Fogarty, a plumbing contractor of Fort Worth, from whom she obtained a divorce in 1925. She has a ten-year-old son."

Hoover Calls Conference

Washington, May 22.—(AP)—President Hoover has invited the governors of western oil producing states to send representatives to a preliminary conference at Colorado Springs June 10 to consider the possibility of creating an interstate compact for conservation of oil.

This announcement was made today at the White House. The President's action was made upon the recommendation of the Federal Oil Conservation Board.

Workers Fight To Hold
Levees On Mississippi

Memphis, Tenn., May 22.—(AP)—The rivers and the hours rolled on and against them engineers and workmen at scattered points along the Mississippi and its tributaries fought to hold the streams back from home and farm lands.

Anxiety was greatest at two levees on the Mississippi near Hickman, Ky., and Mounds Landing, Miss.

Government and civil engineers directing the Hickman operations tried to solve a peculiar problem by filling the gap between an old and new levee with water from the stream they were fighting. Their belief was that a "cushion" of water might be formed between the chance that the river would be defeated.

Several river commission boats stood by ready to render assistance if the levee should go out and in any case to provide shelter and supplies for the men working there.

The memory of the disastrous break in 1927 at Mounds Landing caused those in charge of the levees to place every man at hand upon the dikes. They had a promise from President Hoover that a Federal ruling preventing the employment of state convicts on the levees would be suspended if an emergency of sufficient proportions arose. River commission engineers said that such an emergency did not exist at present.

A break at Mounds levee probably would flood Greenville and the surrounding areas of that section. Forecasts at New Orleans were rising stages for the lower river in June. The forecasts increased the crests expected from Natchez to the Gulf, and at New Orleans the expected stage was set between 20.8 and 21.5 feet.

The tributary Red river, the predictions said, would rise below Shreveport until this month ends.

The Red had flooded approximately 10,000 acres in Arkansas, doing most damage in Little River, Hempstead and Miller counties.

The Bankhead highway was under water near Texarkana. That city's stage showed the Red had ceased its rise there and similar re-

SCHACHT SENT
NEW DRAFT OF
REPARATIONS**Representatives of Al-
lied Nations Inform
German Representa-
tive Of Views.**

Paris, May 22.—(AP)—A modified draft report agreed upon by the representatives of the allied nations and a covering letter making clear the allies' views was today transmitted to Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, chief of the German delegation.

Chief interest in reparation circles centered on whether creditor nations' draft report made any changes in the total of annuities to be paid by Germany in addition to the reservations made on several of the German conditions to acceptance of the figures proposed by Owen D. Young.

From all information available it appeared likely that the Germans would reject the report if there were any such changes.

A talk of scheme to prolong the life of the Dawes plan after August 31 when the fifth annuity year ends also would be rejected by Dr. Schacht if included in the modified report, in the opinion of responsible circles.

With receipt of the draft report setting forth the views of the creditor nations, the next move is now again up to the Germans, who had been waiting for more than a week for the allied delegates to get.

The Germans probably will take a day or two to study the new situation, although they have been kept informed in a general way of the progress of negotiations among the creditor experts.

It has been stated on good authority, the creditors decisions involve a change in annuities which will mean increased payments by Germany, they will be rejected, it was said in German quarters this morning.

The creditors in order to find means of satisfying Belgium and other smaller claimants hit upon the expedient of applying part of the reparation receipts under the Dawes plan to the new reparation annuities under the plan proposed by Mr. Young.

It is understood they assume the Germans will pay under the Dawes plan until the end of the year by applying the surplus over the annuities to the new reparation annuities, they were able to find the sums looking to satisfy everyone.

DAMAGE SUIT
IN PROGRESS
HERE TODAY**\$15,000 Suit Of Friz-
elle Vs. Prescotts Ex-
pected to Reach Jury
Late Today.**

The \$15,000 damage suit of P. W. Frizelle against G. W. and James C. Prescott of Ayden, which was taken up at the opening session of civil court here Monday morning, will probably go to the jury late this afternoon, it was indicated at the noon hour today.

Frizelle is suing the Prescotts as result of permanent injuries which he is said to have received when an automobile driven by James C. Prescott collided with a mule and cart driven by the plaintiff near this city sometime ago. Frizelle received a broken leg which resulted in permanent injuries, it was contended.

This term of court is presided over by Judge Clayton Moore of Williamston, on account of the illness of Judge Daniels of Goldsboro. Judge Daniels will return to the bench next week, however, should his condition improve sufficiently to justify this action, it was stated.

U. S. Gunboat
Sent To Swatow

Hong Kong, May 22.—(AP)—The United States gunboat Tulsa was sent from here to Swatow, Kwangtung, today, in answer to requests of the United States consul there for naval protection for American interests.

His request was made when the Kwangsi units, which he said were retreating toward Swatow, clashed with Fokienese troops who were aiding Kwangtung (Canton), resulting in disturbances in Swatow.

The U. S. S. Mindanao has replaced the Tulsa at Canton.

APPEALS FOR
OXYGEN TENTS
AT CLEVELAND**More Tents Needed
For Treatment Of
Victims Of Recent
Clinic Disaster.**

Cleveland, May 22.—(AP)—An urgent appeal to all large cities near Cleveland for "oxygen tents" to be used in treating victims of the Cleveland clinic disaster which took 192 lives, was telegraphed today by officials of the Cleveland Clinic Hospital, where fifteen patients were reported critically ill.

Seven "tents" are in use, and at least eight more are needed, the telegrams said. It was hoped that two could be sent here by airplane from Detroit. Altogether 30 persons are in hospitals, their system poisoned by the gas which twice exploded in the clinic building after fire broke out in a basement X-ray storage room a week ago today.

The "tents" fit about the patients' head to facilitate administration of oxygen, and only a few are available throughout the country.

Every possible precaution had been taken to prevent ignition of X-ray films at the clinic, Dr. Geo. W. Crile, director, asserted in his testimony before Cooper A. J. Parson. He appeared at the inquiry with Dr. William E. Lower, co-founder and manager of the clinic building. In making the first public statement from a clinic of official concerning causes and precautions against the double explosion of noxious fumes, Dr. Crile declared that no such calamity could have been foreseen.

"There was no precedent for this," he asserted. "We placed trusted employees in charge, knew that the building was well constructed and took all precautions we know about, precautions that we thought entirely adequate."

MILL WORKERS
MUST RETURN
OR LOSE JOBS**Strikers Ready To
Give In at Elizabeth-
ton If Mills Show No
Discrimination.**

Elizabethton, Tenn., May 22.—(AP) Striking textile workers must return to the Rayon Mills by Monday in order to keep their jobs, vacated April 15 by a walkout of 5,000 employees of the American Benberg and American Gleanstoff companies.

Simultaneous with this statement by company officials yesterday came an announcement by William F. Kelly, vice-president of the United Textile Workers of America, that "if the plants will take our workers back and not discriminate, the strike is ended."

Previously textile union officials had said the immediate cause of the strike was "discrimination and denial of the right of grievance committees." Company officials hold recognition of the union to be the issue.

Earlier yesterday Kelly had announced that Senator Burton K. Wheeler, of Montana, had been invited to address a mass meeting of strikers in Elizabethton tomorrow. Information from Washington was that the senator had not yet considered the invitation.

SEEK EARLIER
OPENING FOR
LEAF MARKET**Eastern Carolina
Chamber Of Com-
merce Asked To
Take Matter Before
Association.**

At the meeting of the tobacco "folks" of the section here this week the following resolution was introduced and adopted by those present:

Whereas, it is evident that the bright leaf tobacco of Eastern North Carolina will be ready for the markets on or before August 20th, this year, and it will mean quite a saving to the tobacco growers of Eastern North Carolina if arrangements can be made to sell their tobacco, beginning August 20th, on the auction floors of Eastern North Carolina, and indications are that the tobacco will be ready for market in Georgia and South Carolina in time for the Eastern Carolina tobacco markets to be opened on August 20.

Be it resolved, that this meeting go on record as favoring the opening of the tobacco markets of Eastern Carolina on August 20th, this year, and that the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, Inc., be instructed to act in behalf of the tobacco growers, merchants and other interested parties in Eastern North Carolina in presenting this matter to the United States Tobacco Association which will meet in Old Point Comfort, June 26, 27, and 28, of this year.

Be it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the tobacco companies buying tobacco on the Eastern Carolina markets, to the member of the Sales Committee of the U. S. T. A., and to the banks in the territory covered by the bright leaf tobacco belt of Eastern Carolina and that copies be furnished the press.

The resolution bore the names of the following members of the committee: H. V. Slaton, chairman; T. E. Hooper, Guy Elliott, and N. G. Bartlett, secretary. Paul Frizelle, of Snow Hill, president of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, presided. Those attending the meeting from here included Judge Guy Elliott, former president of the Kinston Chamber of Commerce; Dr. F. Wooten, of the First National Bank; Plato Collins, secretary of the Chamber; and Newell G. Bartlett, secretary of the Southern Chamber.

ADVANCE OF
MONEY RATE
IS FORECAST**Action of Federal Ad-
visory Council Causes
Financiers to Expect
Change.**

Washington, May 22.—(AP)—Advances in rediscount rates by the principal Federal Reserve banks was forecast in financial circles today on the basis of the Federal Reserve Board's announcement that the Federal Advisory Council had recommended that it permit such banks requesting the privilege to raise their rate to six per cent.

By "thus bringing the rediscount rate into closer relation with generally prevailing commercial money rates," the council's memorandum to the board suggested, "improvement in financial conditions and a consequent reduction of the rates structure will thereby be brought about more quickly, thus best safeguarding commerce, industry and agriculture."

Recalling its agreement with the board's statement February 5 that "an excessive amount of the country's credit has been absorbed in speculative security loans," the council said:

"The policy pursued by the Federal Reserve Board has had a beneficial effect due largely to the loyal co-operation of the banks of the country. The efforts in this direction should be continued. The council notes, however, that while the total amounts of Federal Reserve being used have been reduced, the amount of the country's credit absorbed in speculative security loans has not been substantially lowered."

New York Federal Reserve member bank loans to brokers and dealers declined \$192,000,000 from a high record of \$5,869,000,000 after the board initiated its campaign to restrain speculative credit last February, but turned about and set a new record of \$5,793,000,000 March 20, and amounted to \$5,565,000,000 last week.

CITY SCHOOLS
TO CLOSE ON
JUNE 2, 3, 4TH**Dr. E. C. Lynch, of
Wilson To Deliver
Sermon Before Grad-
uating Class.**

The graduating exercises of the Greenville High school and the closing exercises of the Greenville city schools will be held June 2, 3, and 4, inclusive. The graduating exercises of the high school will begin with the annual sermon to the graduates on Sunday night, June 2, by Dr. E. C. Lynch, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Wilson. These services will be held in the high school auditorium at 8:00 o'clock. On Monday evening at 8:00 o'clock in the high school auditorium will be held the Class Day exercises by the seniors. On Tuesday morning at the high school auditorium at 9:30 o'clock will be held the reception of the seventh grade graduates into the high school. On Tuesday evening at 8:00 o'clock there will be held in the Campus building of East Carolina Teachers College, the graduating exercises of the senior class.

There will be no address by an outside speaker this year, but instead there will be a group of short addresses by members of the senior class. In other words the present senior class is putting on its own commencement program. These exercises will bring to a close the best year the local school has ever had.

The senior class, this year numbered between 65 and 70 and will set a new record. However, the senior class next year will surpass in numbers the present class. Next year there will be approximately 100 boys and girls who will get their diplomas from the local high school. The local school is thus continuing to set the pace for all towns in Eastern North Carolina in the matter of the number of high school graduates. Each year Greenville has graduated more boys and girls from its high school than any town in Eastern North Carolina, with the exception of Wilmington.

The music for the commencement occasions will be furnished by the high school orchestra under the direction of Mr. E. T. Robeson, and the high school boys' and girls' glee clubs under the direction of Miss Lotta Veazey. The glee clubs will render two selections on Sunday and three on graduation night. Promotion cards for the children of all grades will be given out at the school building on Tuesday morning at 9:00 o'clock. On these cards will be written the grade and the building to which the child is assigned for the coming year. All regular class work will close on Friday afternoon, May 31. Pupils will not be required to attend school on Monday, June 3.

Washington, May 22.—(AP)—Thirteen-year-old Virginia Hogan, of Omaha, Nebraska, is the spelling champion of the United States.

She gained the honor by spelling "luxuriance" and all the other tongue-twisting words that were put to her last night in the finals of the fifth annual national spelling bee. For standing up so long under this barrage of orthography she was awarded the \$1,000 prize.

Virginia's last competitor was Viola Strabac, entrant of the Milwaukee Journal, who succumbed to the trickier words of "luxuriance" by spelling it with an "E" in stead of "A." She was crowned to her seat by one of the four boys in the finals. Teru Havashi, a Japanese youth, who represented the Atlantic City Press.

OCEAN FLIGHTS
STILL HELD UP
BY ELEMENTS**Theoretical Bombing
Of N. Y. And Two
Endurance Flights
Feature Aviation.**

Old Orchard Beach, Maine, May 22.—(AP)—The possibility of a trans-Atlantic air race increased today with the arrival here of Armand, sponsor of the projected air race, to Paris of the monoplane biplane 191.

While Roger Q. Williams was taking his monoplane, "Green Flash" up for a series of test flights to check gasoline consumption in preparation for a take-off for Rome tomorrow, if weather conditions become favorable, Lott was measuring the hangar of Captain Harry M. Jones to determine if it could accommodate his craft.

Lott, who came by train from New York overnight, also examined at low tide the three-mile beach runway which permits an easy take-off with the maximum load of gasoline. He had found that Roosevelt Field, which had been soaked by rain, must become thoroughly dry before he could use it.

Pilot Williams took the "Green Flash" along shore to Cape Elizabeth, eight miles east of here, and thence about 500 yards out to sea, before turning inland and heading for Portland.

During the forenoon the sun burned through the heavy fog which followed yesterday's rain. Following Williams' first test flight today, Captain Lewis Vance said if the weather permitted, the start would be made at 8 or 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, when the tide will be well out.

He said reports now indicated the weather was turning over the Atlantic. He believed that the flight to Rome might be completed in between 45 and 50 hours.

Guisepe M. Bellanca, designer of the "Green Flash," arrived this morning and supervised the test.

Washington, May 22.—(AP)—Unfavorable weather has prevented complete success of the army's attempt to test the principle of refueling planes in the air under conditions which might exist in wartime.

The big bomber which attempted a non-stop round trip "raid" from Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, on New York and Atlantic City yesterday was forced to spend the night at Bolling Field here, after completing a hazardous eastward flight, carrying out part of its undertaking and starting back for Dayton. The refueling operations had to be abandoned and Atlantic City was not visited.

The plane reached Washington late last night and was ordered to remain awaiting further instructions. The refueling plane which was to have replenished the bomber's fuel supply over Bolling Field and again over New York, together with the radio laboratory plane sent out to broadcast the progress of the "attack" were left overnight at Bolling Field, Uniontown, Pa., where they landed after preceding the big ship from Wright Field.

Nevertheless, cutting Washington out of its eastward route, the plane continued to brave the "very unfavorable" weather reported over the mountains and proceeded to New York despite the "low ceiling" which overhung the metropolis.

Flying low, it circled twice over the Battery and Governor's Island, dropped three "bombs" in the form of parachute flares as planned, and headed back for the west.

A theoretical bombing of New York by air and two attempts to establish endurance flight records featured aviation news today, while unfavorable weather conditions held to the ground two planes poised for trans-Atlantic hops.

Fighting its way through fog and heavy clouds from Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, a huge army bomber dropped three parachute flares over the army post on Governor's Island lighting New York harbor brilliantly.

The twin-motored bomber, with its crew of five, left Dayton at 1:15 p. m., Eastern Standard time, and after a 340-mile flight, emerged from the mist over New York at 9:27 p. m., daylight time and dropped its first bomb at 9:40. It then continued on to Washington where it landed at Bolling field at 10:45 p. m., Eastern Standard time.

Plans to refuel the plane en route and broadcast a description of the bombing were abandoned when the two accompanying planes were forced down at Uniontown, Pa., by the inclement weather.

Of two attempts to set a new refueling endurance record, one at Fort Worth, Texas, continued while another at Roosevelt Field, N. Y.,

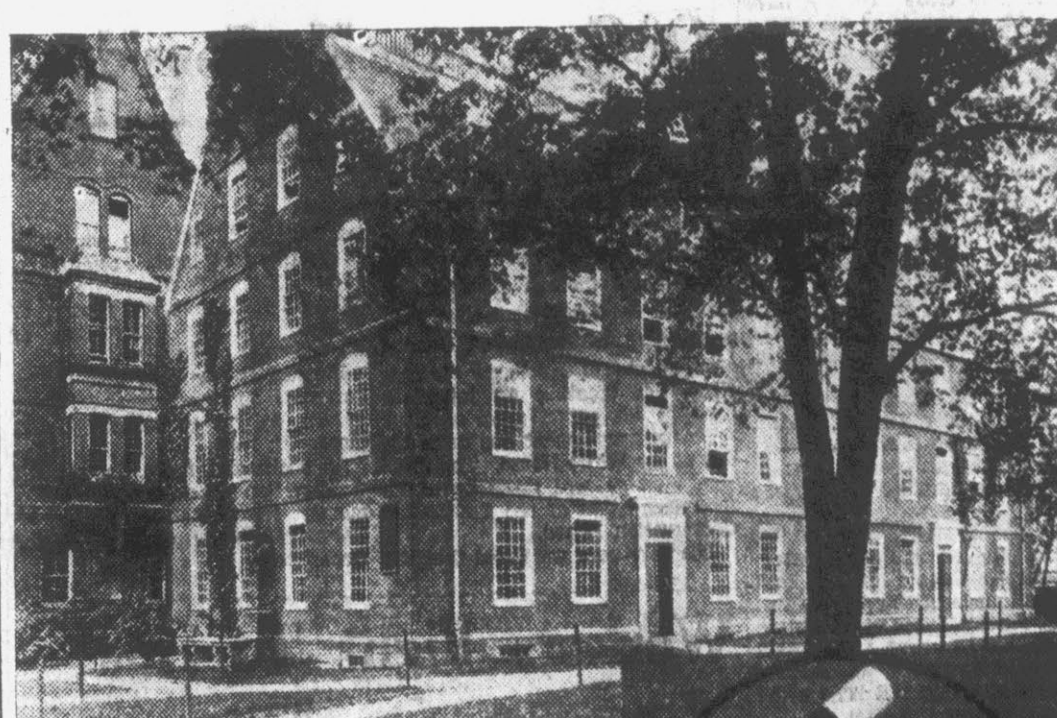

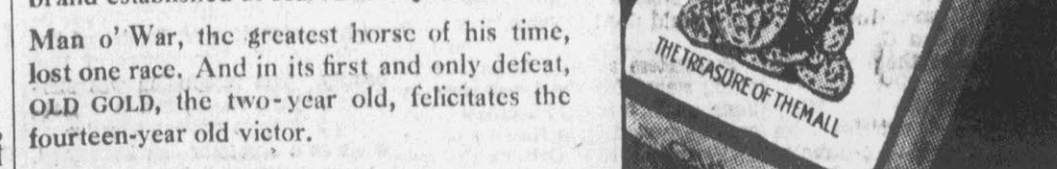

It is understood that **Premier Poincare** will put the question before Parliament immediately after a settlement of the reparations problem has been concluded by the experts of the second **Dawes** committee. For months **Premier Poincare** has maintained that the debt settlement could not be taken up until the future of reparations payments was known.

Speedway Into Talks. Indianapolis—The speedway is going into the talks. A dramatic film is to be made by a professional company in the practice prior to the 500-mile race May 30, and on the day of the contest.

New York.—It will cost either **Veloz** or **Yolanda** \$5,000 to marry within five years. They are a Spanish team in musical comedy and have posted bonds to protect themselves against the difficulty of training other partners.

EASY TO GET LIQUOR INTO U. S. PORTS

Canadian Says Cargo Landed Without Interference From Enforcement Officers.

Ottawa, May 22.—(AP)—**W. D. Euler**, minister of national revenue, in a speech to the House of Commons yesterday, said that liquor cargoes from Canada had been landed in United States ports day and night without interference and sometimes with the aid of enforcement officers.

His speech was devoted particularly to the defense of the position of the Canadian government in refusing to withhold clearance papers from ships carrying liquor to the United States.

Canada is doing all its reasonably can to assist the United States in stopping liquor traffic across the border, he said, adding that the problem is one of the United States own making for which Canada was not responsible.

He described a trip he had made on a boat engaged in liquor traffic. The vessel was within sight of the United States port for which she was bound the entire trip, he said.

In Detroit he asked bootleggers how it was that their supplies crossed the river in an uninterrupted stream day or night. He said he asked them where the United States revenue officers were that they did not prevent the trade.

"It just happens that they are not there when we go across," was the reply he received.

Liquor vessels, he said, landed their cargoes within a hundred yards of the United States customs offices in a certain city where they

dock, sometimes it took three hours to unload their cargoes and "they actually were assisted by officers of the dry squad."

He expressed doubt whether refusal to issue clearances to liquor vessels would prevent smuggling into the United States, explaining that liquor would be exported by Canada to keep down that traffic.

"In the light of statements I have made in connection with the lack of effort on the part of the United States to enforce their own law I think we might at least go slow until we have some assurance and some evidence that they are trying to do for themselves what they are now asking us to do for them," he concluded.

Passengers Escape When Plane Burns

Elko, Nev., May 22.—(AP)—Seven airplane passengers and two pilots came through a spectacular accident without serious injury near here early today when a big west-bound Boeing air mail transport caught fire in mid-air, made a forced landing and burned in its tracks.

The tri-motored plane carrying mail and passengers to San Francisco was but a few minutes out of Elko when the left motor failed. Flames spouted from the dead engine and ignited the left wing. The transport was about 2,000 feet in the air and landing on the desert without lights was a matter of much guesswork.

Chief Pilot **Hugh Barker** pointed the plane downward at a sharp angle and it dived toward the earth like a huge firebrand. Barker was trailing far behind. Barker was fortunate in having descended toward a fairly level spot and the plane made a smooth landing under the circumstances.

Boeing officials said the plane and everything aboard it was a total loss but that none of the passengers had been injured.

HOOVER TO LIMIT WHITE HOUSE RECEPTIONS

Washington, May 22.—(AP)—President **Hoover** has decided to limit public receptions at the White House to one day each week and will put the new schedule into effect next week.

Originally such receptions were held daily but shortly after Mr. Hoover's inauguration the number was reduced to two each week, with the announcement that later it would be further curtailed. It is expected that eventually the receptions will be entirely eliminated from the president's program.

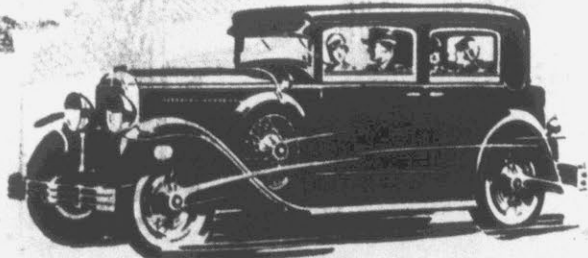
