

PROVISION FOR NEW SHIPS IN NEXT BUDGET

Hoover To Carry Forward Cruiser Building Program As Provided By Congress

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—The American cruiser building program will be carried forward by President Hoover as laid down by Congress and provision for new ships will be made in the next Federal budget.

The administration recognizes that work toward construction of 15 additional 10,000-ton fighting ships is made mandatory under the program until an agreement for reduction of sea armaments is reached by the nations and the president has no intention of attempting to modify or abandon that policy.

Contrary interpretations drawn from the president's Memorial Day address and the statement issued afterward by Secretary Stimson emphasizing the tremendous economic burden placed upon the power by present naval requirements, are described in high administration circles as erroneous.

Although the administration is heartily in favor of a reduction of naval armaments and has moved toward that end by suggesting, through Ambassador Hugh S. Gibson at the Geneva preparatory disarmament conference, a new basis for evaluating relative naval strength, it regards an actual agreement as unlikely in the near future.

With out such an agreement, ratified by the Senate, no modification or abandonment of the American building program can be considered. As the disarmament situation now stands, the preparatory commission is making time while the principal powers are studying and undertaking to make practical application to their own navies of the "yardstick" formula presented by Ambassador Gibson.

This formula is that in evaluating relative naval strength there be taken into account, besides tonnage, armament, armor, speed and age as well as some less important factors. The delegates to the Geneva conference received the proposal with a show of enthusiasm.

Officials here say that, since highly technical questions are involved, slow progress is to be expected. First, the naval experts of the other powers must determine how the "yardstick" can be applied to their own navies, taking into account their individual needs for certain types and classes of ships.

They then must settle upon the ratio in the whole equation that is to be given to tonnage; to armament and to the other factors. The opinion here is that the experts of no two nations will arrive at precisely the same figures of percentage.

After the experts of the five leading sea powers have computed their percentage scale, they will report to the preparatory commission which adjourned subject to call.

Reassembling in Switzerland, the experts of the various nations then will attempt to reach a common "yardstick" applicable to all the powers.

While officials here say they do not care to make any predictions as to the time for holding the next disarmament meeting, from the nature of the task ahead of the naval experts, such a conference during the present year is regarded generally in Washington as highly improbable.

Chicago Hospital Swept By Flames; Patients Rescued

Chicago, June 4.—(AP)—The Chicago General Hospital was swept by fire early today, and although 11 patients, several doctors and nurses were in the building as the flames and smoke mounted to the further floor, all escaped injury.

Some were carried down ladders by firemen, while others were rescued by passersby. Ambulances removed the patients to other hospitals.

The fire, which did \$25,000 damage, started in the laundry room and was confined to one side of the building, which is divided by a fire wall.

Chief Fire Marshal Michael J. Connelley was particularly interested in the quantity of X-Ray films stored in the hospital. With the recent Cleveland hospital fire in mind, Corrigan's first thought was to keep the flames from these films.

Corrigan said he would start an immediate investigation into the apparently careless manner in which the X-Ray films were left in a jumbled heap in a room dangerously close to the flames.

"If the flames had reached the films, we would have had a disaster similar to that in Cleveland," he said.

MT. VESUVIUS THREATENING MANY TOWNS

Stream Of Molten Lava Increasing In Strength And Velocity Today.

Naples, Italy, June 4.—(AP)—Mt. Vesuvius, which burst into eruption yesterday, was beginning to threaten neighboring towns today as its stream of molten lava increased in strength and velocity.

Director Malladra, of the observatory, reported that the flow of lava had increased from nearly 40 feet in width to more than 60 feet and that it had an initial velocity of more than six feet a second.

The famous "Valley of Hell" has been invaded by lava along its whole length.

The stream of lava divided into two branches, one descending toward Terzigno and the other toward Capaccio on the lava formation of 1906.

Because of dense smoke it was impossible to judge how far the lava was from dwellings on the outskirts of the villages.

Director Malladra said that the explosions were strong and were filled with incandescent material.

WOULD REPEAL FIFTEEN DAY LOAN

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—Declaring that speculation on the Stock Exchange had "paralyzed" business, Senator Glass, of Virginia, a former Secretary of the Treasury, announced in the Senate today he would propose repeal of the provision in the Federal Reserve act allowing fifteen day loans on United States bonds.

That Belgium would cede back Eupen and Malmédy to Germany, both of which districts she obtained by the treaty of Versailles.

The agreement will be notified to the reparations commission and the governments concerned, reducing Germany's reparations debt from about \$33,000,000,000 present value to \$10,000,000,000.

It will eventually give France between 4,000,000,000 and 50,000,000,000 francs (between \$1,600,000,000 and \$2,000,000,000) to reduce her interior debt, relieving the budget of from 2,000,000,000 to 2,500,000,000 francs.

The accord incidentally is expected to facilitate ratification of the allied war debts toward the United States since the settlement provides that annuities are to run throughout the period of the debt payments to amounts sufficient to meet them.

It will also lead to evacuation of the Rhineland by the allied armies of occupation within the space of time required for necessary negotiations and material arrangements to withdraw the forces now there.

The experts' report will make the main recommendation that the annuities proposed by Mr. Young, the American financier be adopted. These annuities call for the payment of 2,650,000,000 marks (approximately \$492,000,000) over a period of 37 years; 1,700,000,000 marks (approximately \$340,000,000) over a period of 21 years; and 900,000,000 marks (approximately \$180,000,000) for one year.

HOOVER KEEPS TAB ON PUBLIC LIFE OF NATION

President Keeping Vigilant Watch Upon Trend Of Public Sentiment Today.

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—President Hoover is keeping a vigilant watch upon the trend of public sentiment on the great questions of government as it is reflected in the press of all sections of the nation.

Late each day, there is placed before him his own specially prepared and private newspaper, dubbed "The Yellow Journal," by White House attaches, not for its contents but because it consists of clippings mounted upon sheets of yellow foolscap loosely bound together with the red tape that adorns, literally, to many of Washington's public documents.

Essentially, the president's paper is a compilation of news dispatches and editorial opinion cleaned from the columns of more than 35 daily papers which are received each morning at the executive mansion. But even this is not sufficient to meet the desires of the chief executive, and to it have been added the services of two specially selected clipping bureaus.

If his busy schedule permits, Mr. Hoover makes a careful study of the clippings before leaving his office, although sometimes he takes them to the White House proper and goes over them there.

President Hoover is most interested at present in the reaction of the press to two of the great domestic problems of the day, tariff revision and farm relief.

The papers from which "The Yellow Journal" is compiled are the dailies of the large cities. The task of combining the smaller papers has been given over to the clipping bureaus. These, incidentally, were chosen with some difficulty as first inquiries revealed that only a few such establishments make a practice of clipping editorials.

The president's own newspaper was established during the Wilson administration. It was the idea of Joseph Tumulty, President Wilson's secretary, and was used in varying degrees by both President Harding and President Coolidge. At the outset of the Hoover administration its scope was enlarged by increasing the number of papers from which it was compiled and adding the services of the clipping bureaus.

Frequently, marked copies of newspapers are sent to the White House by citizens from many parts of the country who are interested in some particular project or problem and sometimes articles from these are added to the columns of the "Yellow Journal."

For more than ten years the task of preparing the "Yellow Journal" has been entrusted to John McCabe, a veteran of the White House clerical force. He finds it a job that occupies his entire time and the part time services of an assistant.

Baldwin Resigns As Prime Minister

London, June 4.—(AP)—Stanley Baldwin resigned as prime minister of the British government today, handing his resignation at noon to King George, who lay ill in his bed at Windsor castle.

The resignation was accepted and the King immediately sent for Ramsey MacDonald, Labor leader, and former premier, presumably to ask him to form a cabinet. Mr. MacDonald will visit Windsor tomorrow.

The events presaged a change in the British government in accordance with parliamentary elections last Thursday in which the Labor party of Mr. MacDonald supplanted the Conservatives of Premier Baldwin as the numerically strongest party of the House of Commons.

The prime minister's resignation ended in effect five years of Conservative rule, which began in October, 1924, when his own party, the Conservatives, defeated the Laborites on a vote of non-confidence.

At that time it was Mr. MacDonald who called to see the king and to resign and Mr. Baldwin who was sent for to form a new government.

Today Mr. MacDonald received the royal summons at his Hammersmith home where he had been in consultation with his principal colleagues.

It was his second such summons, the first having come just a little more than five years ago when, after a coalition agreement with David Lloyd George, leader of the Liberal party, he was given a working majority in the House of Commons.

Today, as then, the future of his government-to-be depended largely upon what the Liberals would do. For as sweeping as was the Labor victory at Thursday's poll it fell just short of giving the party a majority in the commons and the Liberals now as then, hold the majority power. Baldwin and the business transacted was very formal and brief.

ARNOLD TELLS ABOUT LOCAL MONEY CROPS

Farm Head Is Principal Speaker At Regular Weekly Meeting Of Greenville Rotes.

E. F. Arnold, director of farm activities in Pitt county, was the principal speaker at the regular weekly session of the Greenville Rotary club last night. He told of the progress being made in the livestock program started two years ago in this county.

Mr. Arnold explained the number of carloads of poultry and hogs shipped from the county during the present year and said they had been instrumental in putting more money into the farmer's pocket. He said shipments had totaled about \$50,000 for both hogs and poultry.

He said that the raising of hogs and chickens was a great asset to the farmer in that it provided him money through the lean season of the year.

He urged the support of the club in an attempt to get the farmer to fully realize the importance of these extra money crops and to encourage him to continue the splendid progress that has been made.

Everybody is interested in making more money, Mr. Arnold told his hearers, and the raising of livestock is one of the best means open to the farmer for this purpose. The county cannot become as great as it should in a financial way without attention to the things that bring increased earnings.

The session was presided over by President K. B. Pace, who had just returned from the International Rotary convention at Dallas, Texas.

CONGRESS AT LAST ASSURED OF VACATION

At Least Two Months, If Not Three, In Prospect As Work Is Speeded Up.

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—Congress today appeared to be assured of a summer vacation of at least two months, if not three.

House rules were in effect to limit debate and speed up action on amendments to the Senate bill providing for the 1930 census and reapportionment of the House membership among the states, one of the measures President Hoover wants to see enacted before a recess begins.

The Senate finance committee was called upon to complete its program looking to the fulfillment of another of his pre-vacation requirements: assurance of enactment of tariff legislation before the regular session begins in December. After adopting plans designed to assure completion of its own job of rewriting the House bill by mid-August, it put off until today selection of dates for a Senate vote on the bill and for final action on the conference adjustment report to follow.

Although administration leaders were almost certain that they would not obtain unanimous consent to fix dates for those votes in the fall, they were confident that they could muster the two-thirds majority needed to put such an agreement into effect and remove that stubborn link block to a recess.

They expect farm relief legislation, the other task which President Hoover desires to have completed prior to a vacation, to be ready for the chief executive's signature next week.

While a report from the Senate and House farm relief conferees recommending elimination of the "mort debenture" action from the Senate measure will arouse a sharp debate, the administration group is counting on support for adoption of such a proposal from debenture advocates who are unwilling to delay enactment of the legislation.

Meekness, he mentioned as another of those traits that will help the teacher to inherit the earth professionally. Dr. Payne admitted frankly that time would not permit his giving a full analysis of personality, but that the time would come when the teaching of personality would be a part of the preparation of the teacher.

In closing he said that he felt that he came along about forty years too soon. "I should like to go with you once more into the great work of the teacher. I think I could do it better. I exhort you to this great field of service to 'let your light shine!'"

At the close of the address the diplomas were awarded to the two-year normal graduates and degrees

DR. B. R. PAYNE MAKES FINAL ADDRESS HERE

President Of Peabody College, Speaks At Graduating Exercises At College.

East Carolina Teachers College, in the words of Dr. Robert H. Wright, seemed not to be on good terms with the weather man yesterday. The final exercises took place under most unfavorable weather conditions, but this fact seemed not to deter those who had already made up their minds to be there.

At 10:30 the new auditorium was packed to its capacity to hear the address by Dr. Bruce R. Payne and to see the 203 young women receive their diplomas. This is the largest graduating class the institution has yet had.

Dr. Payne, president of George Peabody College for Teachers, is a native North Carolinian. He was educated at Duke University, taught school in North Carolina and Virginia, and went as Dr. Wright said in his introduction, to western North Carolina, sometimes called Tennessee, several years ago to take charge of Peabody College, which under his administration has become the greatest graduate school for teachers in the south and one of the largest in the United States.

Dr. Payne delivered a forceful address, directed specifically to the graduates. He talked to them about something they were not taught in college courses, something they are not examined on in securing a certificate to teach, yet something upon which hinges their professional ability and success. This thing, he said, he called personality for want of a better name.

In his introduction he said that a college president should not be called upon to make and probably could not make a speech within a week of his own commencement, and that he might probably anticipate that fact before he finished. He said, however, to carry his point, for his address was instructive and inspiring.

The founders of this country, he said, disagreed upon many things, but there was one thing on which they practically all agreed upon. That was that a democracy could not be built successfully upon the shoulders of ignorant men. Therefore one of the things they provided for was education.

Later it developed that intelligence was not enough, so another prerequisite was added. This was character.

The speaker ventured that no have reached the stage in our education where intelligence and character are not sufficient for success, especially for the teacher. Many people, he said, who have both intelligence and character make "failures" in life; especially is this true with the teacher.

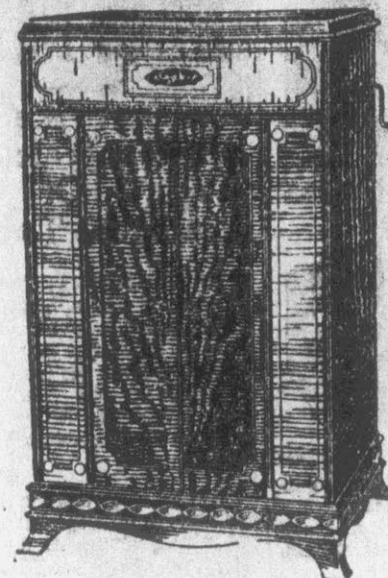

WOULD SPEND \$500,000,000 ON INDUSTRY

Congress Would Make this Amount Available After Passage Farm Measure.

Washington, June 4.—(AP)—Congressional leaders indicated today that after enactment of the pending farm bill they would favor a recommendation by the Agricultural Department to make available immediately the \$500,000,000 appropriation proposed by the measure for stabilization of the agriculture industry.

The farm bill which is expected to be enacted into law within a week or ten days, merely authorizes a half billion dollar appropriation. It had been thought at first that the department would suggest an immediate appropriation of only one or two hundred millions dollars, but some leaders now favor the full amount.

These leaders take the view that the wheat situation demands immediate attention and that if the farm board is to buy up the surplus wheat crop, about \$175,000,000 would be needed alone for this.

They hold the board ought to have the full amount so as to be able to take full advantage of its powers under the bill to deal with the wheat situation and that needing attention in other crops.

Still Hold Levee In Mississippi

Greenville, Miss., June 4.—(AP)—Frantic efforts of a thousand men who labored all night long constructing an auxiliary loop around a crashing Mississippi river levee two and a half miles south of Greenville served today to quiet down considerably a frightened populace who feared a repetition of the disastrous flood of 1927. In that flood Greenville had several feet of water in her houses.

A thousand other workers previously had finished a loop in which ten thousand sacks of sand were used around the base of the levee and that accomplished in the face of the surging water, the first contingent retired in favor of the all-night army of workers.

Engineers in charge of the work today believed the threatening situation caused by a blowout in the levee was in hand and that man had conquered the mighty river at that point. When the sudden blow-out occurred early yesterday the result of a huge sand boil, the levee settled two feet lower and the sinking miraculously filled the cavity but caused a softening of an area two hundred feet from the land side of the levee and extending some three hundred feet along the base.

Three Men Killed By Dynamite Blast

North Bergen, N. J., June 4.—(AP)—Premature explosion of a six hundred pound charge of dynamite today killed at least three quarrymen, gravely injured two others and tore an estimated thousand tons of rock from the Belmont-Gurnee Stone Company's ledge in the northern end of town.

Foreman Thomas Donato, who missed death by thirty seconds, was arrested on a charge of manslaughter by North Bergen police.

Donato said he had been standing over the men who were tamping down the dynamite charge but moved fifty or sixty feet away half a minute before the blast went off, shaking homes and breaking windows for miles around.

Police, firemen and laborers digging into the loosened rock expected they might find other bodies.

New York, June 4.—(AP)—The New York Herald-Tribune said today that Miss Mary Culberson, only daughter of the late U. S. Senator Charles A. Culberson, of Texas, has informed relatives that she was married in New York Sunday to Alexander E. Robertson, English world war veteran, after a courtship of seven years.

Mr. Robertson in 1922 charged that private detectives were attempting to drive him from this country because of his affection for Miss Culberson.

The courtship started when both he and Miss Culberson were students at the University of Texas at Austin.

RUN WILD

While five clubs fire away at the National League lead, the Athletics have taken over the duty—usually reserved for the Yankees—of making a run-away out of the American League race.

Only five games separate the first five clubs in the National League, while the Athletics have a greater lead than that over the St. Louis Browns, who hold doggedly on to second place, much to the disgust of certain American League experts.

The A's had to travel 13 innings to down Detroit and hang up their sixth straight win and 17th in their last 18 games yesterday and they shattered George's nine-game winning streak while they were about it.

Bobbie Grove, the fast ball star, out-pitched Uhl convincingly enough but George himself was directly responsible for the Tigers' downfall, going into the last half of the 13th with the score tied at two-all.
