

URGES MORE PATROLMEN FOR COAST

Ontario Police Commissioner Would Also Search All Rum Crafts For Weapons.

Windsor, Ont., June 22.—(AP)—Re-enforcement of the watercraft patrol and search of rum craft for weapons during the United States offensive against Detroit river liquor smuggling was urged today by Alfred E. Cuddy, deputy commissioner of Ontario police.

After inspecting export docks along the Canadian side of the Detroit river from Lake Erie to Lake St. Clair, Cuddy said he would recommend to Attorney General A. H. Price that additional officers be stationed along the Essex county waterfront as a precaution against shooting on the river.

He said he considered search of rum runners and their craft for weapons and other contraband a

Cuddy said that if they were identified on this side charges would be laid against them in Ontario courts. He said he was convinced the persons involved were Americans.

RUFFIN GIVES HIS VIEWS ON RUBBER

"One of the most interesting subjects that I have ever run across is crude rubber," Mr. Ruffin, dealer in Goodrich tires here, said today. "Not because I am in the tire business," he laughed, "but because of the way some of it is gathered and prepared for shipping and the way it is shipped."

"Down in South America they

gather a grade of crude rubber that is known as 'Up-River Pine Para.' This rubber latex comes from the original species of rubber trees that were first discovered in South America. Natives tap the trees, many of them hundreds of years old, in the upper reaches of the Amazon zone river. By dipping a round stick into a crude vessel containing the latex and holding it over a smoking fire, the water is evaporated from the latex. Each dip makes a thin layer around the stick. By patient labor this primitive process builds up a 'biscuit' that is sometimes eight or ten inches in diameter.

"Then the natives pool their harvest and the rubber biscuits are made into a crude raft and floated hundreds of miles down the Amazon to the market. Recently I saw a biscuit at the Goodrich factory at Akron, that was pronounced perfect. It was about eight inches in diameter and oblong; larger in the middle and a hole through the center where the native's stick had been. Sometimes it takes several days' work to make one of these biscuits."

"This Para rubber is of the very finest quality and is now only about five percent of the entire crude production. Modern methods have gradually taken the place of this primitive method of gathering rubber."

NEGRO PIONEER REALISTIC INTERPRETATION OF SAUL AND STABS HIMSELF

June 21. — (AP) — Edna, a 12-year-old negro janitor and amateur actor, is credited with one of the most realistic interpretations of the King Saul suicide scene that an audience at the Mount Zion African Methodist Church ever saw. 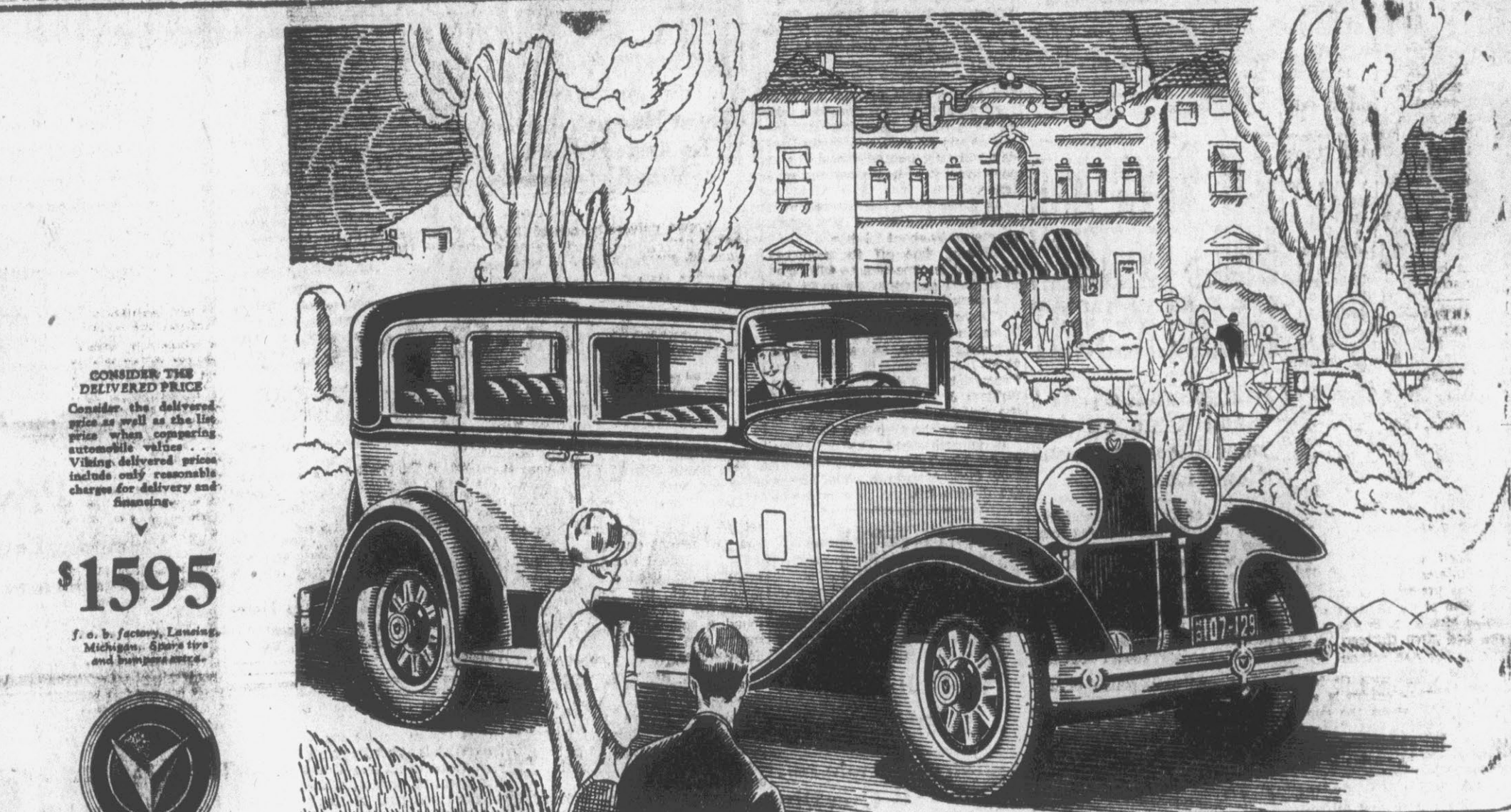

STAY YOUR HAND
By The Rev. W. W. Youngson, D. D.

Ever remember that God is not willing to face crises with untrained minds as leaders. Men may be roughly classed as builders and destroyers. The man of vision marks the perpetual play and interplay of forces constructive and destructive. In religion the forces of construction are not conspicuous and honored. Tearing down always attracts more attention than building up. The infidel lecturer and destructive critic attain a wider celebrity than the workmen of the temple. Education cannot be guaranteed the present generation by the simple method of denouncing the wooden methods of the old time schoolmasters. In the name of justice and humanity, stay your hand until you can provide something better.

THE SPECIAL SESSION—FIRST HALF
"A successful session," says Floor Leader Tilson, reviewing the achievements of two months as the Seventy-first Congress goes into recess. Undoubtedly it may be called successful in its schedule of enactments to date, for the simpler and easier part of the special-session program has been put into law.

There was no difficulty in passing the outstanding measure, Mr. Hoover's Farm Relief Bill, since the victory for it was won at the polls last November. It was easy to carry it through in precisely the shape in which the party platform had promised it and Mr. Hoover desired it; and if the House had been flexible or the President more adroit, Mr. Hoover might have even avoided his temporary defeat in the Senate on the debenture plan. The Census Bill was a routine measure which Congress could hardly omit. Reapportionment ought to have been a routine matter, but for eight years had been evaded; Congress simply bowed to an overwhelming weight of sentiment in enacting it. The one check received by the Administration has been in the retention of the national-origins plan, which after all is a minor matter. But in the real test of the special session is still to come. It is the Tariff Bill which will try the leadership of Congress and the authority of the President and show whether the session has been a calamity or a benefit. Here the outlook

is ominous. The House has passed a bill which can only be called a monstrosity. Despite Mr. Tilson's statement that the limited criticism of the measure shows that "it must be by far the best bill ever written in the history of modern tariff-making," it has been almost universally condemned. A heavy preponderance of the Republican as well as Democratic press is against it. Yet it has gone to the welcoming arms of a Senate Finance Committee dominated by men like Mr. Smoot and Mr. Reed. These men will combat the President's desire for "limited" revision. The Senate leader, Mr. Watson, is dead against the President on the point. A fight looms ahead, and that fight will be the real test of the special session.—N. Y. World.

ABOUT TOWN

"About two weeks of good weather after all of this rain would bring about a remarkable change in the condition of the tobacco crop, prophesied a well known tobacco man today. "It is true the crop has been damaged to no little extent—especially that which has already matured—but good weather would cause the young plant to come out surprisingly. The reports apparently had their origin in the explosion of an ammunition dump which was located in the neighborhood of a Chinese military hospital. Five workmen were killed and it was necessary to remove 100 patients from the hospital because electric light service in the building was interrupted by the blast.

The decision, if any, to be reached in the current crucial series at the Yankee Stadium was postponed for at least 24 hours yesterday by that doddering invalid, George Herma Ruth.

The postponement was effected by the abandonment with which Mr. Ruth caressed two offerings sent up to the plate in the second game by Master William Shores, apprentice Athletic right hander and suspected rescuer of George Earnshaw the starting pitcher.

The Athletics had won the first game behind Bob Grove's puzzling slants by a score of 11 to 1 and were on edge of 3 to 2 when the Babe became the Babe again. His eleventh and twelfth home runs converted a 2 to 3 Yankee deficit into an 8 to 3 advantage at the finish, and the champions held on seven and one-half games behind the Athletics, just where they were before hostilities began.

The inevitable Mr. Ruth had done nothing much all afternoon when the seventh inning of the second game rolled around with the Yankees in the hole. True he had driven a second unearned run off Earnshaw with a single in the fifth and prepared for his magnificent gesture made the game close, but no one was in the right field bleachers when Earnshaw went to the showers after placing two Yankees on the bags with none out in the seventh.

Young Shores marched to the box to make the best of a bad situation but committed the mistake of giving the Babe a good one after getting two strikes on the premier slugger. The ball sailed gracefully in among the tierage passengers in the crowded right field bleachers, and the Yankees were ahead. Just to prove there was no mistake about it the Babe prepared the act in the eighth, again with two mates aboard.

Waite Hoyt dazzled 66,145 Yankee clients with his finesse in the night cap but for all of this, the Athletics chiseled three runs from his delivery in the first three innings and seemed headed for a clean sweep and a lead of nine and one-half games.

Then in the fifth Max Bishop, pivot man on a possible double play, dropped Joe Boley's assist, and the champions helped themselves to two unearned runs. This was the only Athletic error of the afternoon and if it had not been made, Earnshaw would have been permitted to try his own conclusions with Ruth in the seventh.

Ruth's single and two homers drove home seven of the eight Yankee runs, not a record but still no light feat to be performed by just anybody on any old afternoon.

The first game was a case of too much Grove and not enough Penneck, it was Grove's eleventh victory against a single defeat.

Al Simmons rapped Penneck and his relief, Messers. Sherid and Moore for just five blows, including his fifteenth and sixteenth home runs. He failed to get six hits mainly because he was at bat only five times, but he carried his punch over into the second combat, where he slapped Hoyt for two doubles and a single in four attempts. Mule Haas also got a homer in the first game.

The manipulation of Messers. Huggins and McGillicuddy yesterday cleared the pitching situation somewhat for the rest of the series. The tall tactician now must call upon Walburg, Rommel and either Quinn or some lesser light in the remaining games, with the chances favoring Walburg and Rommel for duty today. Huggins looks to Piggrass, Heimach and Wells, with the first two presumably on deck for this afternoon and Wells in reserve for the single fray tomorrow.

There came a day when the professional said to his pupil:

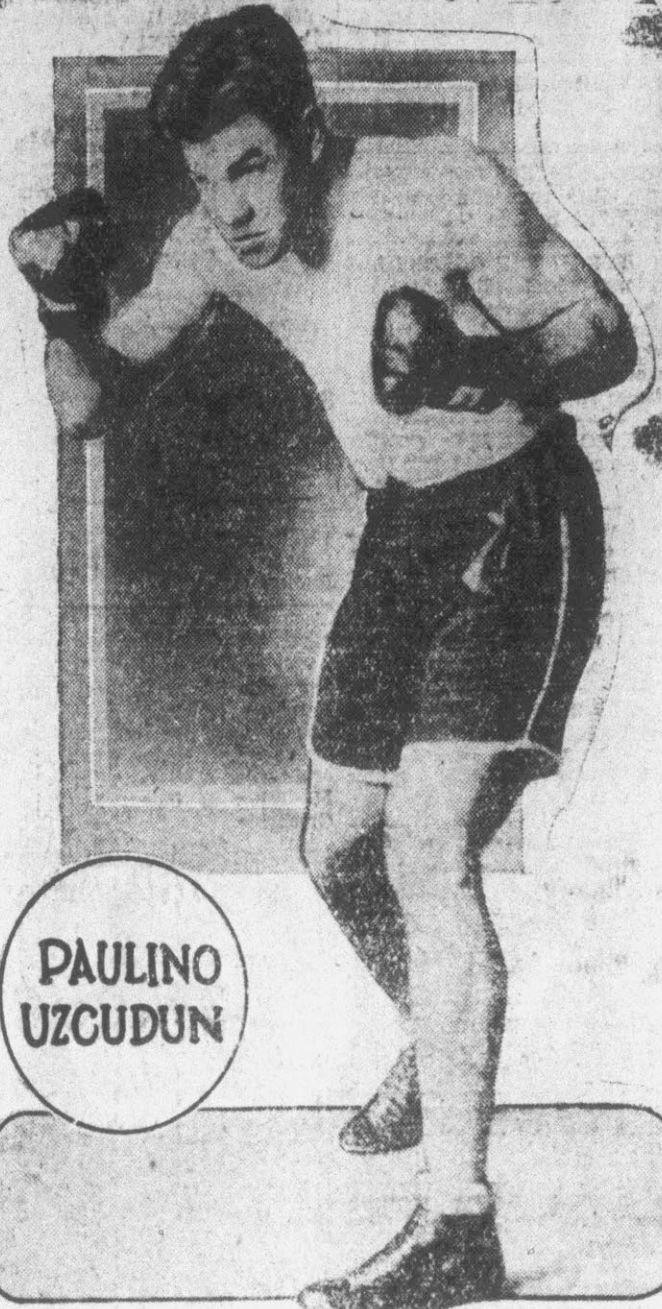
"Go out and play; return and pay."

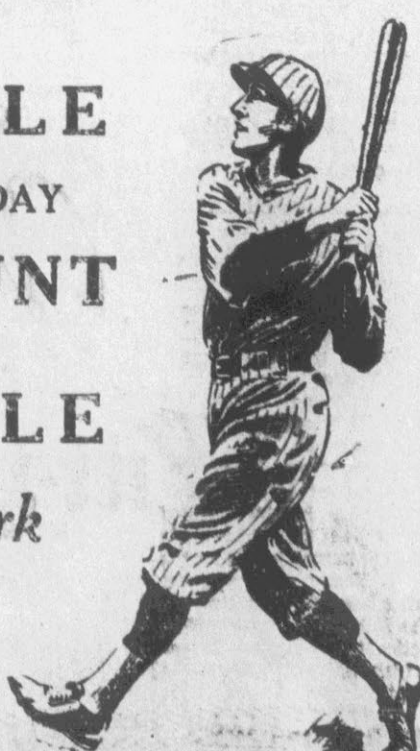

STOCK MARKET

New York, June 22.—(AP)—The recovery in stock prices, which has been underway all week, was continued today under the leadership of the railroad and aviation shares. Industrial and public utilities also pointed upward, although week-end profit taking retarded the advance. With many traders away for extended week-end trips the volume of business was relatively light.

In as much as Friday's call money rates always carries over the week-end, the credit situation was not a direct factor in today's market. Wall Street expects, however, that the call rate, which held steady at 7 per cent all week, will go higher next week although predictions a few weeks ago that the mid-year money pinch would rival that of March are not likely to be fulfilled.

Excellent earnings and traffic reports, and special dividends distributions behind the end of the year provided background for the advance in railroad stocks. Atchafon, Union Pacific, New Haven, New York Central and Norfolk and Western all moved into new high ground, the gains ranging from fractions to four points.

Pennsylvania and Chesapeake Corporation advanced about 2 points each, and half a dozen others climbed a point or more. New York and Harlem soared 16 points.

United Aircraft added nearly ten points to a similar gain of yesterday, and Wright Aero, which has been the subject of merger rumors climbed five. Bendix and Curtiss also recorded substantial gains.

Columbian Carbon ran up ten points to a new high at 187 3-4 and Chude Company established another new high around 870 a share. Simmons, International Harvester, Baldwin, American Telephone, Commonwealth Power, Pacific Telephone and Hayes Body sold three to four points higher.

Selling was renewed against American Water Works and the stock dropped 2 points.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 1,350,000 shares.

ATTEMPT TO DESTROY ALTAR OF CHURCH

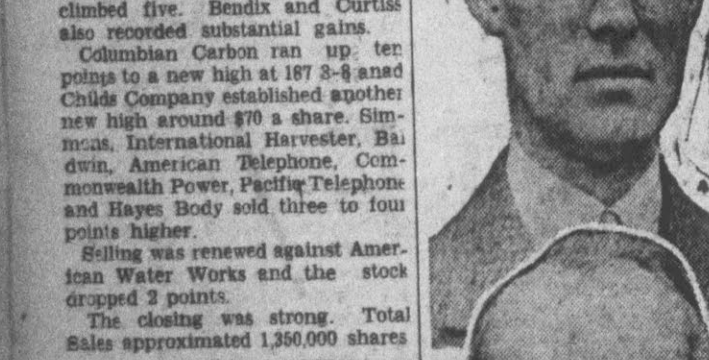
