DARK CHARGES
CONTAINED IN
BANK INQUIRY**Grand Jury At Birmingham Finds Grave Irregularities in Woodlawn Bank**

Birmingham, Ala., July 26.—(AP)—The Jefferson county grand jury returned a partial report on its activities in investigating banking practices in Birmingham today which charged that "grave irregularities" were found in the methods of handling funds of the defunct Woodlawn Savings bank.

The report declared Dr. A. W. Bell, late president of the bank, had been found to be indebted to the extent of "many thousands of dollars" to the bank. Dr. Bell drowned while swimming with friends in the Coosa river near here July 6, an hour before the bank permanently closed its doors as a result of a heavy run on its resources by depositors. His death was declared accidental by the coroner.

"In our desire to protect the depositors of the Woodlawn Bank," the report said, "we recommend that the immediate action be taken by the investigating agent to prevent disposition of any funds of Dr. Bell's estate."

The report did not mention the result of its investigation concerning three other banks in the district which were closed early this month. They were the Avondale Savings and Trust Bank, City Bank and Trust Company and Leach State Bank. The Southside Bank of Birmingham closed for one week but since has been reorganized.

With submission of its report, the grand jury recessed until 10 A. M. July 27, to allow state auditors at work on account of the closed bank, to continue their work.

Gardner Reserves
His Decision In
The Cameron Case

Raleigh, July 26.—(AP)—Governor Gardner announced this afternoon just before leaving for Roanoke Gap to start a month's vacation, that he would not reach a decision in the John Cameron case until after he makes a thoroughly study of the case.

The governor carried with him the entire report of Judge N. A. Townsend, but what these recommendations were was not announced. The governor had been expected to announce his decision in the Cameron case before starting his vacation. Cameron, who was returned to state's prison last November to complete service of a 30-year sentence for the killing of Police Chief Oakes at Raeford in Alabama. He had escaped from state's prison in 1919, after serving only about a year of his sentence.

ASKS FOR DISSOLUTION
OF HER MARRIAGE

New York, July 26.—(AP)—Believing that he had been killed in a Chinese revolution and firm in the faith that, if he were not dead, she would have heard from him, Mrs. Melitta Hughes, 30, today filed a petition asking for dissolution of her marriage to George Hughes, writer and soldier of fortune.

Hughes went to China in January, 1924, and she has not heard from him since, she said. She believes he joined one of the revolutionary factions and was killed.

They met in 1920, the petition states, in Tiflis, Russia, where Hughes was collecting material for a book and were married there.

INJURED CYCLIST
DIES AT MADERA

Madera, Cal., July 26.—(AP)—Emil Leully, 75, cyclist, injured when struck by an automobile last Saturday, died here yesterday from pneumonia resulting from his injuries.

Leully was on his second tour of the United States. He had ridden 3,000 miles since leaving his home at Union City, N. J., on April 30.

FOUR PERSONS DROWN
WHILE IN SWIMMING

SNOOK JURY
IS NOT YET
COMPLETEDThreat Of Another
Venire Features
Opening Of Trial At
Columbus.

Columbus, Ohio, July 26.—(AP)—Efforts to complete the jury in the murder trial of Dr. James H. Snook, confessed slayer of Thora Hix, began today under the threat of necessity of a second venire before the jury box can be permanently filled.

The third day of the jury selection opened with 33 left in the original venire of 75, and only two of the 20 peremptory challenges out of the way.

Mrs. Grace Rogers was excused promptly by the defense at the start today. John P. Seidel, defense counsel, asked her if it were not a fact that she had expressed a wish to get on the jury and had said she would "hold out to the last" against Dr. Snook. Mrs. Rogers denied making such a statement.

J. B. Collison, retired druggist, was seated as juror No. 2, after examination of nine other candidates to fill the place.

The defense removed Louis C. Davis, a contracting painter on their third peremptory challenge.

Collison was seated after a long mindreading on the question on an insanity defense, and his views on the use of narcotics. In his examination Seidel brought in again the suggestion that an "offer" would be made to show that Miss Hix administered narcotics to Dr. Snook when he said:

"If it should be shown that the deceased experimented with various kinds of drugs in connection with her school work and at various times drugged herself and Dr. Snook, would that prejudice you against the defendant?" Collison said it would not.

Sino-Russian Situation
Again Assumes Menacing
Aspect At Moscow Today

Moscow, July 26.—(AP)—Relations between Russia and China, after having apparently begun to clear in Manchurian unofficial conversations this week today, resumed a menacing aspect in the Russian capital. Military and naval units and labor organizations throughout the country demanded that the government take immediate and specific action to protect life and liberty of Russian citizens stranded along the zone of the Chinese Eastern Railway.

Reacting to reports of atrocities in which Russian citizens in Manchuria were victims, thousands of soldiers, sailors and workmen adopted mass resolutions for speedy reprisals.

Workers in Leningrad resolved in mass meetings last night that "The Leningrad workers insist that the Soviet government take decisive steps against haughty Chinese and white guard bands. The workers declare that the Russian peace policy does not mean Russia is resigned to submitting to outrages."

DROUGHT AND
HEAT SPREADS
OVER WORLD**Several Agricultural Regions Affected by Severe Conditions at Present.**

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Abnormal crop curtailing heat waves and drought conditions sweeping over many of the world's agricultural regions apparently are spreading into other sections which have been enjoying more favorable weather during the last few weeks.

As the usually hot, dry month of August approaches, reports received by government agricultural and weather officials indicate drought conditions and excessively hot weather predominating in Europe, England, southern China, Australia, Argentina, western Canada, and in northeastern spring wheat, central and New England states.

The outlook for the United States as weather officials see it, is for those abnormal conditions to cover other areas shortly with little relief through local thundershowers indicated. However, the general situation is believed not to have reached a stage where there is cause for great alarm, though it is feared that unless precipitation comes soon much harm may be done.

The mean temperature in England for this week is described as "above normal in all districts; rainfall decidedly subnormal." Slightly better conditions existed in European countries, where more moisture was received.

The water famine situation at Hong Kong has brought about a serious condition to a vast agricultural area near South China seaport, while the grain crop in the Shanghai section is thought not to be up to normal.

Australia has received some much needed rain, while heavy precipitations in India have had damaging effects. Argentina is dry in the corn and wheat zone, with temperature averaging about four per cent above normal.

Somewhat pessimistic reports from the Canadian provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba say rain has been "far below normal" and soil generally dry, with more than half of wheat acreage varying from rather poor to only fair; remainder divided between very poor and quite good.

The week ending Wednesday, the bureau announced, "was the driest of the season so far," in this country.

Bremen To Attempt
To Lower Time On
Her Return Trip

New York, July 26.—(AP)—Having captured the westward record for trans-Atlantic steamship travel the North German Lloyd liner Bremen will attempt to lower the eastward time on her return trip upon which she will sail at 1 o'clock tomorrow morning.

A record of four days, 19 hours, and 55 minutes from New York to Plymouth was made last January by the Cunarder Mauretania which held all records for Atlantic crossings until the Bremen arrived here last Monday.

The Bremen established a westward record of four days, 17 hours and 42 minutes. The eastward voyage is usually made in less time because of the aid of the gulf stream.

St. Louis Robin Begins
Fourteenth Day In Air
With Series of Stunts

St. Louis, July 26.—(AP)—The record breaking endurance plane "St. Louis Robin" began its fourteenth day of continuous flight today by performing a series of stunts low over Lambert-St. Louis field that told ground observers all was well aboard. A cherry "wood morning everybody" came in a message dropped by the pilots, Dale (Red) Jackson and Norest O'Brien.

The plane carrying its crew to a new record that was yet to be determined, passed its 315th hour aloft at 10:17 A. M. (C. S. T.) It was circling high above the field in a clear sky, with no indication of quidding. At that hour the fliers had added more than 68 hours to the former endurance record.

TAX REFUNDS
EXPECTED TO
DROP IN U. S.**Federal Government Expects Great Falling Off During Next Few Years.**

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Tax refunds by the federal government, which in recent years have mounted into millions of dollars, are expected by the joint committee of internal revenue tax-writing to decrease materially in the future.

This committee, a joint agency of the House and Senate committee charged with tax matters, reported today that it estimated that 42 per cent, \$224,199,948, of refunds and settlements during the 21 months period ending December 31, 1928, was due to provisions of the revenue law that have been repealed.

Analyzing the causes of the refunds, the committee attributed 17.93 per cent to laws relating to invested capital; 14.31 per cent to special assessments and 10.01 per cent to amortization provisions.

"It seems fair to conclude from the brief analysis that refunds and credits will be materially reduced when the taxable years prior to 1922 are finally closed," the report said. "It is also apparent that if valuations could be partially eliminated or the methods used made more definite, then even our present troubles could be materially reduced."

Several Persons
Poisoned By Food

Chicago, July 26.—(AP)—Twenty-two persons were suffering from food poisoning today after eating cake purchased at a neighborhood bakery. Fifteen of the victims were members of one family, five were firemen, and the others were a woman and her son.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pape, their 12 children, and Pape's brother-in-law, Joe Izzo, became ill shortly after eating the cake yesterday. The firemen, the entire crew of an engine station next door to the bakery, also were stricken soon after eating food said to have been bought there.

Mrs. Margaret Heyworth and her son, Albert, 12, residing in the same neighborhood, were taken to a hospital when they became ill. Health authorities obtained samples of food partaken of by the victims for analysis.

COMMITTEE TO
DISCUSS CHILD
PROBLEM SOONPresident Hoover
Adds 15 More Members
To Conference
Planning Body.

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—President Hoover's planning committee which is to prepare for a national conference on care and protection of children has been increased to include 15 officials and private citizens and will begin its work here Monday at a meeting with the Chief Executive.

Announcing the meeting, Secretary Wilbur, as chairman explained that the national conference, through which the President hopes to insure a proper relationship between the government and the child, will be a culmination rather than a beginning of the committee's work.

In the meantime, he said, various aspects of the government's responsibility to the child will have been studied by various members of the committee.

It is the hope of Dr. H. E. Barnard, Indiana state health officer, who has been designated director of activities of the planning committee, that it will be able to gain a comprehensive picture of the child of today and what has been done for him, determine what should be done for him by the government, and then set about planning for accomplishment.

How the program is to be continued has not been indicated, but it has been suggested that the proposed conference might devise means whereby its project could be taken back to the several states and carried out by them.

PASSES AWAY
IN THIS CITY**Prominent Greenville Woman To Be Laid To Rest In Cherry Hill Cemetery Tomorrow.**

Mrs. Gertrude H. Coward, 64, died at 5 o'clock this morning at her home on Evans street following an illness extending over a period of several weeks.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Eighth Street church of Christ tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock by Rev. R. J. Bamber, assisted by Rev. E. L. Hillman, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church. Interment will take place at Cherry Hill cemetery where she will be laid to rest by the side of her husband Mr. Heber L. Coward.

Mrs. Coward was born July 17, 1865 in Greene county, the daughter of the late Travis E. and Pattie Powell Hooker. Most of her early life was spent in her native county. In December, 1887, she was married to Mr. Heber L. Coward. Seven years later they moved to Greenville and since that time she has made her home here. She was a member of one of the prominent families of this section, and was closely identified with the social and religious life of the community. Airplane Lands
On Carrier Deck

San Pedro, Calif., July 26.—(AP)—An airplane of the U. S. S. Saratoga took off and landed successfully on the illuminated deck of the huge aircraft carrier while the ship plowed through the water off Los Angeles harbor last night.

The feat, believed by naval authorities to be the first of its kind in aviation history, was accomplished several times by Lieutenant Commander Ralph Wood, air officer of the Saratoga, and was watched by Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, chief of the bureau of aeronautics.

Admiral Moffett said this "further convinces me that the airplane carriers, the Saratoga and the Lexington, are the two most valuable ships for battle that we have."

Anticipate Conference
On Naval Limitations
Sometime Next Spring

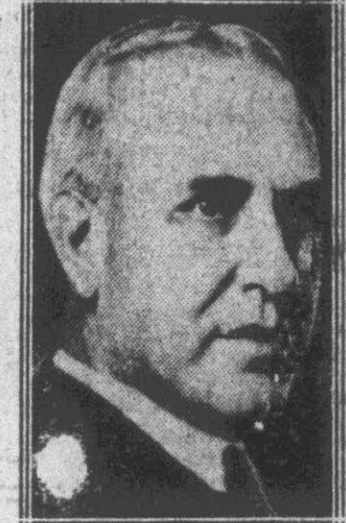
Washington, July 26.—(AP)—The number of signs pointing toward the convocation before next spring of apollinary naval limitation conference of the world powers appear to Washington observers of international affairs to be multiplying with great rapidity.

Although official information on the subject is lacking, they draw their chief substance from analysis of the pronouncements made this week by President Hoover and Prime Minister MacDonald and meagre comments in other quarters generally well acquainted with such matters.

One of the signs into which the clearest indication of such a conference is being read is the action of President Hoover in postponing the construction of three cruiser program that became law last winter.

Under the terms of that law, he is given authority to postpone construction of the first five of the contemplated cruisers after June 30—the end of the current fiscal year—only in the event an international agreement on naval limitation is worked out. SAYS SOLUTION
OF SMUGGLING
UP TO THE U. S.Canadian Minister Of
Revenue Puts Issue
Squarely Up To
America.

Ottawa, July 26.—(AP)—Solution of the problem of liquor smuggled from Canada into the United States, in the opinion of W. D. Euler, minister of national revenue, rests entirely with the American government.

Declaring that virtually 100 per cent of the smuggling is by United States citizens in United States boats, he suggested in a statement published today that the most effective means of combating the situation would be adopted by the American government of clearance regulations for all boats leaving the United States shore.

If this were done, the Canadian government would be "quite ready to consider any further reasonable measure of co-operation."

"If Canadian citizens and Canadian boats engaged in the traffic," he said, "the Canadian government would be prepared to enact legislation dealing with the matter, but surely some responsibility for the actions of their own citizens rests with the government of the United States."

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CONSERVATIVE
PARTY BEGINS
HOUSE ATTACK**Stanley Baldwin Leads Attack Egyptian Relation British Assembly**

London, July 26.—(AP)—The Labor government today withstood a severe opposition attack from the Conservative side on the subject of Egyptian relations in the House of Commons over the question of Egyptian relations.

To attack was led by Premier Stanley Baldwin, reinforced by Winston Churchill, brilliant Conservative "tactician" and former chancellor of the exchequer.

Foreign Secretary Arthur Henderson indicated there would be change in the government's Egyptian policy unless Labor's desire to treat Egyptian internal affairs with the utmost liberality could be constructed. Parliament would be called before any new treaty with Egypt should become effective.

As to the virtual dismissal of Lord Lloyd by the Labor ministry, Mr. Henderson produced records showing that the late Conservative government had had frequent differences with his lordship and said the new government soon became convinced it could not carry out its desired policy toward Egypt with so unsympathetic a representative in Cairo.

Premier Ramsay MacDonald concluded the debate by declaring it was impossible to exaggerate the mischievous character of Churchill's attack on the government's policy, as it did "an unjustifiable assault on the civil service and a suggestion that the nation's representatives in other parts of the world were not to be allowed to express their independent opinion in confidence to the government's office."

Mr. Churchill, remarking that Lord Lloyd was his friend, provided Premier MacDonald's statement by insisting the labor government was anxious to displace his lordship "because he stood for firmness in British rights." He said the government's treatment of Lloyd would react all over the Empire.

Fire Destroys
City Building
At Chester, S. C.

Chester, S. C., July 26.—(AP)—Fire that destroyed the municipal building here yesterday afternoon was believed today to have originated beneath the stage of the Chester theatre, but its origin remained a mystery. Loss to the city was placed at from \$150,000 to \$200,000 with insurance less than a tenth of that amount.

The blaze was discovered about 2:45 and gained headway rapidly. It threatened for a time to spread to other buildings of the business district, but was brought under control before other buildings caught. The Rock Hill fire department sent a truck to aid in fighting the blaze.

Surrenders After
Shooting Husband

Marshall, N. C., July 26.—(AP)—Mrs. Flossie Shelton, bride, who shot her husband, Fred Shelton, 10 days ago, late yesterday surrendered to Sheriff R. R. Ramsey, and was placed in the Madison county jail here.

She claims the shot which seriously wounded her husband was accidental.

The bullet from the revolver entered his mouth and came out the back of his head, and at first it was believed that he could not recover; but latest reports from the Greenville, Tenn. hospital, where he is under treatment, are to the effect that he is improving.

Mrs. Shelton was said to have been attempting to take the gun away from his bride two weeks when he was shot. Mrs. Shelton was seeking to fire at another unnamed woman at the time. Both women disappeared immediately after the shooting.

Six Marines Die
In Malta Blast

Valetta, Malta, July 26.—(AP)—Six marines were killed in an explosion in a gun turret aboard the British cruiser Devonshire in the Eastern Mediterranean today. In addition 18 men were injured, some seriously.

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—President Hoover is making substantial progress toward virtual reorganization of the foreign diplomatic corps now that Secretary Stimson has about completed his preliminary survey looking to that end.

The Paris post, made vacant by the death of Myron T. Herrick of Ohio, is to go to Senator Walter E. Edge, of New Jersey. A successor also has been selected to Henry P. Fletcher, who recently resigned as ambassador to Italy, but his name is withheld until word has been received from Rome that he is acceptable to the Italian government.

Senator Edge will remain here until after the close of the special session of Congress as he is a member of the Senate finance committee handling the tariff revision bill in which many industries in his state have a vital interest.

With the special session now expected to end by the middle of October, Mr. Edge probably will leave around November 1 to take up official residence in the French capital where as a private citizen, he spent much of his time for twelve years before the war looking after the business interests he had there.

SEVERAL PERSONS SENTENCED TO PEN

Kansas City, July 26.—(AP)—Twenty-one persons who pleaded guilty in federal court here yesterday to liquor law violations were sentenced to the Leavenworth penitentiary. Under the Jones law one was given 2 1/2 years, another two years, and nineteen, a year and a day. Two women were sentenced to three months in jail.

Arrangements have been completed by KMOX, St. Louis, to have the fliers go before the microphones shortly after they come down at Lambert Field, with Columbia stations hooked onto the chain. Details were completed through an exchange of notes with the aviators while they continued to pile up hours on the endurance record.

Believe Pope Will Go To Italian Soil

Rome, July 26.—(AP)—Belief was expressed in some quarters today Pope Pius would follow his emergence from the Vatican yesterday shortly with actual emergence from his new small state onto Italian soil.

The pontiff was known to have felt the heat of Rome's extreme summer. Yesterday's ceremony in the courtyard of St. Peter's was trying, because of the heat, not only to the crowd, but to His Holiness as well.

It was understood that his physicians have urged him to spend at least a fortnight on the lofty ecclesiastical retreat at Monte Cassino, where he has desired to go for a long time. There has of course, been no indication as to what action he will take upon their advice.

The heat wave has been as bad at Milan as at Rome, thus precluding a visit to his former cloister, another protest known to be dear to the pontiff's heart.

His exit yesterday from his quarters in the Vatican was the talk of all Rome today, the 300,000 or more fortunate eye-witnesses gaining audiences everywhere with their eager first hand accounts of the impressive ceremony.

The witnesses remarked that the close co-operation manifest between the Italian government functionaries and those of the Holy See was ample evidence that the lateran treaty really had bridged an old breach.

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BETTER SYSTEM OF TAXATION

Governor Gardner told the bankers of North Carolina that there were two goals in taxation reform towards which the state should move. The first is a much more complete equalization of the burden borne by individual property owners, and second, the prevention of the escape of so much intangible property in this state from a share of the tax burden.

It is a well known fact that the tax burden is not fairly divided between the property owners of the county. A glance at the tax books would convince even the most unlearned of that fact. The only way the matter can be equalized is by the appointment of a board of assessors who have no axes to grind, and no individuals to bow down before. It would be almost impossible to find a board of this type, and we believe that it would be wise for counties to exchange boards of assessors. Let a board of wise business men, say a farmer, a banker, a merchant, a mill man, and a real estate expert, from Anson county assess the property in Stanley county. This would be absolutely fair, for they would not know to whom the property belonged, and just how much the total tax bills would be. Then let a Stanley group assess the Anson values.

We firmly believe that if this method of assessment was carried out that the burden of taxation would shift to those who should rightly bear the burden, and that it would be possible to lower the rate at once.

Intangible property should be taxed but very little of it is. Tax-free securities make any system of taxation unfair. When the state takes steps to eliminate tax-free securities, and checks closely on all unlisted intangible property, a great change will be noticed in tax rates.—Albermarle Press.

KELLOGG-BRIAND PACT EFFECTIVE IN FRANCE

Paris, July 25.—(AP)—The Kellogg-Briand pact to outlaw war was proclaimed as effective by publication in today's issue of the official journal of the decree putting it in force.

New Collar Button Record.

ABOUT TOWN

"Greenville begins the crucial series of the last half when they take on the Bucs at Rocky Mount this afternoon," declared an ardent supporter of the local baseball organization today.

"The rowdy Buccaneers licked us two times in succession the first of the week to endanger our standing at the top of the column. But they won't be able to pull the same thing this time. They licked Fitzpatrick in the first game of the series here, but they will find the finger a more serious problem when they go up against his curves either today or tomorrow. Fitz is easily one of the outstanding heavies of the circuit and when a club beats him it is going some. If the Bucs catch him in real form they are going to get one of the worst lickings they have had during the last half."

"Not much happening around town of a news nature these days," reflected a business man today, "but, boy, just you wait until the tobacco market opens during the early part of September."

"The whetels of industry start humming when the voice of the auctioneer begins its annual song, and from then on there will be more things going on than one can shake a stick at."

"Greenville may well claim the distinction of being the hub of Eastern North Carolina, judging from the amount of business going on during the year, and this year we are going to do more than ever towards insuring this claim of industrial supremacy."

"The price situation continues to reflect strength on the Georgia tobacco markets," commented a local business man today, referring to the activities under way in the Cracker state belt.

"The reports are encouraging and cause the majority of people to believe prices will be favorable throughout most of the belts."

"Georgia is like all other bright leaf growing states that have suffered from periodic breaks in the price situation, and this favorable opening will carry cheer to the hundreds of farmers who till their soil diligently this season not knowing what the outcome would be."

"Georgia growers are to be congratulated upon the quality of their crop, and the good prices they are receiving. They should be able to recover from some of the financial depression they have been feeling the last several months and begin to see their heads above the water level."

"You can bet your life I am glad to be back home again," declared a Greenville man who had been spending several days away from home.

"Yes, I had a fairly good time, but I could have had just as good time back home. Somehow, there is no place in the world like home, and the people you have been accustomed to meet on the street from day to day. The old familiarity of the home town is missed in other towns and especially in the large cities where one knows few people and doesn't feel perfectly at ease with those he does know."

"Yes, I repeat—I am glad to be back home and I hope it will be several months before business sends me off again."

"Do you know that those Kinston Eagles were confident of taking the initial game of the series from us here last Wednesday afternoon," said a follower of the Greenville baseball club today.

"They had been licking us almost at will all of the season and fully expected to repeat the performance. They could hardly believe the evidence of their own eyes when we put over those two runs in the last half of the ninth inning to clinch the game. It must have been a sad blow, but it was here they should get accustomed to one thing: Greenville is battling hard for the honors of the last half and can't permit even an old conqueror to conquer any longer."

"Is we can clean up the series with Rocky Mount today and tomorrow, that will cause general satisfaction to everybody in town, although it would carry little joy into the camp of the Bucs. What we want now is more victories and we must have them in order to make our chance of winning the 'last half more secure.'"

"After Pitt county farmers get 'hrouse harvesting their crops this fall they should turn their attention to the production of extra money crops, such as the raising of hogs and chickens," asserted a prominent agriculturist today.

"This source of extra revenue has meant much to numbers of growers the past four or five years and it would be more general if other farmers would try the experiment. There is always a demand for chickens and hogs, and the family cow should furnish enough milk and butter to really reduce the cost of the family living."

"Growers in other sections of the country who do not have money crops like we do get a comfortable living from the raising of hogs and chickens and there is no reason on earth why the same should not obtain in Pitt county."

Greenville Drops Game To Kinston and Loses Leadership Of League

SPORTS SLANTS

Making a total of seven costly errors, the Greenville club of the Eastern Carolina League dropped the second game of the series to Kinston here yesterday afternoon by the score of 7 to 0. It was one of the most ragged exhibitions of baseball probably seen here before this season, and exhibited the fact that even league leaders are bound to blow up sometime.

The loss of this game also caused the Tobaccoist to lose their insecure position of first place in the standing of clubs column in favor of Rocky Mount. By licking Goldsboro yesterday, the Buccaneers won the right to first place by slightly over a half game.

Greenville left for the stronghold of the Buccaneers this afternoon where they will play today and tomorrow. The outcome of these two games is watched with more than usual interest by the entire league, as the two days will feature a supreme effort on the part of the Tobaccoists to regain their position at the top of the column. On the other hand, the Bucs will fight not only to retain their position, but to increase a percentage which is too small for comfort at this time.

The engagement between Greenville and Kinston yesterday afternoon was of the old-time order. These two clubs have always had a reputation for furnishing the most mediocre brand of ball imaginable when they come together, and this impression was amply born out in the contest yesterday and that the day before, for that matter, when Greenville won after a hectic scramble.

Either club can furnish a masterly type of ball when playing some other club, but when Greenville goes to Kinston or Kinston comes to Greenville, well, anything may be expected. It is either a hitting spree or an error spree, and yesterday the errors happened to feature the clash where Greenville was concerned.

The lowly Eagles not only played bang-up ball behind the masterly pitching of Rakel, who the day before fared badly as a relief pitcher for Elmore, but they took advantage of Greenville's errors and sent runners racing over the rubber at every opportunity. Then, too, they connected with the delivery of "Specks" Garbee for a total of ten safe singles, while Rakel held the Tobaccoists to four inconspicuous outs.

This boy Rakel not only hurled a beautiful ball for the Eagles, but he led the assault with the stick, securing a total of three safeties out of four trips to the plate. In fact, he came within one tiny bingle of getting as many hits as the entire Greenville club.

Only four members of the Greenville club passed through that hectic encounter without having an error credited against them. Nalbock, shortstop and captain of the club, had as many as three of the miscues checked against him. From the standpoint of omission, the whole club had more errors chalked against them than they would be able to count during a week of unrelenting toil. They appeared confused and baffled throughout the whole game and this was especially so at the bat when it seemed impossible to connect with men on the bags.

Greenville people will have the opportunity of seeing many a ball game before the season is over, but it will be a long time before they will see another of this kind. It was nothing more than one of these "blow-ups" every fan has heard talked about since he was a kid, but which only a few get the opportunity of actually seeing. It was nerve-racking, of course, but many a man would have paid the price of admission to witness the comedy—the enactment of which cost Greenville the leadership of the league and a long, hard fight to regain that coveted position.

Singles by Grimm and pinch-hitter Hazen Cuyler brought another pinch batsman, Gabby Hartnett to the place. McGraw then yanked Benton and sent Karl Hubbel to the mound.

Gabby's sacrifice fly brought home the tying run. A walk and error by Andy Cohen, and infield single by Rogers Hornsby and Hack Wilson's screeching double brought in three more runs and decided the game beyond a doubt.

The St. Louis Cardinals, now operating under the personal guidance of Bill McKechnie, advanced to within three and a half games of the third place Giants by downing the Phillies for the third time 10 to 3.

Behind clever pitching by Red Lucas, the Cincinnati Reds buried the Boston Braves under a 14 to 2 count and evened the series with two victories apiece.

There were only two games in the American league but in one of them the Athletics drove out 25 hits to crush Cleveland, 21 to 3, and extend their league lead to 10 1-2 games.

The A's hit column were two home runs by Jimmy Foxx, his 21st and 22nd of the season, and four-base drives by Grove and Haas, as well as doubles by Grove, Dykes, Haas, Simmons and Burns.

Fred Marberry weakened in the late innings and the Chicago White Sox eked out a 3 to 1 victory over Washington in ten innings.
