

R. J. REYNOLDS GOES ON STAND IN OWN BEHALF

Winston-Salem Man Testifies In Manslaughter Trial At London Today

London, July 30.—(AP)—Richard Joshua Reynolds, wealthy young American, who is standing trial on a manslaughter charge growing out of an automobile accident, took the stand today at resumption of the trial made necessary by last week's sudden halting of the case.

The American, who is 23 years old, denied allegations of the prosecution that he was drunk when he ran into a motorcycle driven by Arthur Graham last May.

Replying to questions by Norman Blissett, his counsel, Reynolds recounted his journey with a friend to Hurley on May 14 to play golf. Because of rain however, they played at darts indoors. Just before 2:30 in the afternoon he had a drink known as "Pimm's No. 1 Cup," and between 3:30 and his leaving about 8:30, he had four other drinks of the same kind. He declared that he was quite fit to drive when he returned to London.

He said that at Burn dazed by the headlights of an oncoming car and found that he had mounted the curb. He had no idea he had struck a man or motorcycle and backing into the road again he proceeded on his journey. Had he known he would have stopped and done all he could for him.

Replying to the prosecuting attorney, Sir Henry Madox, Reynolds said he was unable to state whether his companion, Ronald Baggart, was drunk or not. He said Baggart went to lie down at the hotel. He had a weak constitution, George Middleton, bartender of the old Bell Hotel at Hurley, said that "Pimm's No. 1 Cup" was taken in half a pint of lemonade and that Reynolds was not under the influence of drink.

Witnesses from the hotel where Reynolds stopped gave evidence that the defendant was perfectly normal. A wire from the noted pathologist Bernard Uffelsbury, expressed the opinion that the nature of the motorcycle's injuries, he could not have been struck while the motorcycle was moving.

The pathologist could only explain these injuries on the supposition that Graham, the motorcyclist, was bending over the lamp of the automobile. His theory was that Graham had the rear wheel of his motorcycle between his legs, thus obscuring the "light" to an automobile driver. Had the driver mounted the curb along the road about the same time he struck the motorcycle, he might not have felt the shock.

Senator Watson Says Exercise Is Not Good For Age

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—"Big Jim" Watson, 260 pound senator from Indiana, approaching his 55th year, does not believe men near his age should seek to regain the vigor of youth through physical exercise if they have led sedentary lives.

Famous in the eighties as a De Pauw University athlete, he long since has ceased to seek physical exercise because he believes that after passing the half century mark men who have not led physically active lives will break down their mental or physical strength by excessive exercise.

"When my friends urge me to take up golf," he remarks, "I tell them I get plenty of exercise by acting as palbearer to my cow pasture pool shooting friends who die of heart disease and over-exercising."

Airplane Pilot Held On Charge Of Manslaughter

Morrisville, N. J., July 30.—(AP)—A warrant was issued today for the arrest on a charge of technical manslaughter, of David Kundie, of Orvington, pilot of an airplane which crashed near here Saturday night, killing Ernest Eckert of Newark, a student aviator.

Police Chief Steckert preferred the charge on the advice of Prosecutor Meslar.

Kundie is in a hospital here. Officials believe he will not be able to leave his bed for two months.

SEE PROGRESS IN EFFORT TO SLICE NAVIES

British Government Reports Tangible Progress On Naval Reduction Plans.

London, July 30.—(AP)—The British government, drawing a fourth official into conversations on the subject of naval reduction, believes tangible progress has been made toward accord to curtail world navies.

An official communiqué issued at Downing street, of Premier MacDonald, said:

"A further conference was held at Downing street today between the prime minister and the first lord of the admiralty on the one hand and General Dawes and Mr. Gibson on the other.

"It is understood substantial progress was made toward a naval agreement."

The conference of the American ambassador, Gibson and A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, lasted more than an hour. The communiqué issued at its end was the first to come from Downing street on the subject.

It was regarded as possible, although there was no confirmation, the premier would talk with the Americans before Thursday when he will leave for a holiday at Lissie-mouth, his Scottish home.

While there was no disposition to add to the wording of the communiqué at either the American legation or British official circles it was believed possibly the inclusion of the admiralty, chief in the conversations yesterday meant the discussion had narrowed closer to the "naval yardstick" idea advanced by President Hoover as a basis for determining naval parity.

St. Louis Fliers Get Orders To Land Sometime Today

St. Louis, July 30.—(AP)—The monoplane "St. Louis Robin" passed its 411th hour in the air at 10:17 a. m. (C. S. T.) today. At that hour the pilots, Dale (Red) Jackson and Forest O'Brien, had made no response to an order to land some time today, sent to them this morning by Major William B. Robertson, sponsor of the endurance flight.

The fliers did drop a note answering another letter written to them by Major Robertson in which he had given them permission to land any time, but had left the matter to their own judgment.

The message read: "Motor still running good. See no reason to quit now. We are shooting at the 500 hour mark. Ship okay and so are we."

A short time before the order to land was taken aloft, Jackson dropped a note to Phil Silverberg, aerial photographer at the field, in which he said: "I hope we can stay up a month."

Major C. Ray Wassall, pilot of the refueling plane, took Major Robertson's order to the fliers shortly after 9 o'clock a. m. He told newspapermen that a further statement from Major Robertson would be made later.

St. Louis, July 30.—(AP)—Major William B. Robertson, president of the Curtiss-Robertson Airplane Manufacturing Company, which is sponsoring the record-breaking endurance flight of Dale (Red) Jackson and Forest O'Brien in the monoplane "St. Louis Robin," this morning sent the fliers a message ordering them to land some time today.

The fliers began their eighteenth day aloft at 7:17 a. m. (C. S. T.) and an hour later clipped off their 400th hour. They started off the

RAIN BRINGS RELIEF FROM HOT WEATHER

Intense Heat Reported To Have Abated Along Atlantic Seaboard Today.

(By the Associated Press)

"Local weather" prevailed in many sections of the United States today, bringing temporary relief from the general heat wave which has held this country and Canada in its grip for more than a week.

Rainstorms along many sections of the Atlantic seaboard the south, Ohio valley and the southwest late yesterday drove the mercury sharply downward from the high altitudes that it had gained during the day.

Ninety was the general temperature throughout the United States yesterday, with 98 at Baltimore and Oklahoma City the highest. Rainfall which was heaviest at New Orleans and unusually great at El Paso, Tex., started today off much cooler in these favored sections but the weather bureau forecast that the mercury would not stay down.

The Ohio valley this morning had temperatures ranging from 4 to 12 degrees lower than yesterday but along Lake Erie the temperature was several degrees higher.

In many other regions where rain is badly needed, none fell, including Ontario, where forest fires are raging and rain has been scant all this week.

Metropolitan New York experienced thunder showers last evening that lowered the temperature but after a slow start today the mercury at 10 o'clock had climbed to 89, just three degrees under the mark for the same hour yesterday.

Not quite as warm today, the country over the forecast read, but this probably means little to Edmonton, Alberta, where yesterday the mercury mounted to 108 degrees.

Endurance Flier Dies Of Injuries At Minneapolis

Minneapolis, Minn., July 30.—(AP)—Two deaths have ended a sixth attempt here to set a new refueling endurance airplane flight.

Owen Haugland, Buffalo, Minn., co-pilot of the monoplane, The Minnesotan, died last yesterday at a hospital. He did not regain consciousness. The other pilot, Captain P. L. Crichton of Minneapolis died instantly when the plane fell at the World Chamberlain airport here.

It was Haugland's sixth attempt to fill his ambition to take possession of the endurance record, and a "fix" ended all of them.

Haugland had spent all his savings and mortgaged most of his oil filling station property at Buffalo to equip the Minnesota, in which he flew and the "Ace High," the plane used for refueling.

WOMAN HOLDS HER PLACE ON SNOOK'S JURY

Haskell Corney, John and Walter Marshall, and Henry Broadwater, all negroes, held on minor charges, fled with Price.

S. C. Leaf Belt Opens With Prices Slightly Higher Than Last Year

The South Carolina tobacco belt opened today with prices about two cents a pound higher than last season, according to reports received in this city today. The average on the North Carolina border markets ranged from \$13.00 to \$14.00 per hundred pounds. At Mullins and Conway, S. C., averages were between \$12.00 and \$14.00 per hundred pounds, while Lumberton estimated an average of \$17.00 to \$18.00.

Prices on medium grades were described as improved while poorer and best grades were about like they were last season.

Private reports received here from border markets indicated that the opening prices were somewhat disappointing. Reports received from Greenville tobacco men who attended the openings were as follows:

"Estimated prices on opening for border markets between thirteen and fourteen cents. Opening last year average \$12.88. Quality fair, and opening prices are disappointing."

"Conway average about fourteen. Mullins average twelve. Offering fair."

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AMERICANS TO CROSS OCEAN ON ZEPPELIN

Two Couples Racing Against Time For Take-Off Of Ship At German Port.

Friedrichshafen, Germany, July 30.—(AP)—Two American couples were racing against time today to reach Friedrichshafen for the takeoff of the dirigible Graf Zeppelin on its next flight to the United States scheduled to start Thursday morning.

They were Mr. and Mrs. Henry J. Pierce of New York and Mr. and Mrs. George N. Crouse of Syracuse, N. Y. The Pierces who were accompanying a tour of American business men through Soviet Russia, were notified at Samara, Russia, of the imminent departure of the airship while the Crouses were aboard the steamship Mauretania and were expected to arrive at Cienfuegos early tomorrow morning.

A third woman also is listed among the passengers to make the transatlantic crossing. She is Madame Gourevitch, wife of Gregoir Gourevitch, a pianist living in Paris.

Anna May Wong, movie actress of China and California, waited today at the Kurgarten hotel in hopes that some of those passengers coming from a distance would lose their race against time and make an available berth for her.

Twenty-one passengers have been accepted, which is one more than the cabin space available, but the extra passenger will be accommodated in the corridor.

A son her last flight the zeppelin was carrying a grand piano which has been in the hold since May and Susi the Gorilla. Susi will be accompanied this time by a gentleman chimpanzee. Aerial music will be supplied by 600 canaries, shipped by Louis Rube Hannover zoologist.

Missouri Town Not In Danger From High River

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—The chief of army engineers was advised today by its Kansas City office that the town of Corning, Missouri, reported threatened with destruction by encroachment of the Missouri river, was in no danger.

The mayor of Corning, the report said, is taking no steps to protect the village and does not propose to take any. Also the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad, which runs close by, was reported apparently unworried by the progress of the stream, which is eating toward Corning at the rate of 5 to 20 feet per day.

To halt the river would cost more than the value of the farm land endangered, the Kansas City office said, adding that the electric transmission line endangered was on wooden poles and easily could be removed from the advancing waters.

Nanking, China, July 30.—(AP)—The national government foreign ministry today announced receipt of American notification that the Kellogg-Briand treaty outlawing war had become effective.

Treaty Gives Sovereignty To The Turtle Islands

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—The last outstanding question of sovereignty of the Turtle Islands and to establish the southern boundary of the Philippines have been concluded here and are incorporated in a treaty being drafted by the State Department. An unusual arrangement acknowledging American sovereignty in the Turtle Islands and assigning administration to the British is expected to be evolved. The negotiations have been going on for only a few days.

The Turtle group includes seven islands of minute size with a total population of 220 near the coast of British Borneo. Since 1885 the islands have been administered by the British government under the provisions of a Spanish-German-British protocol. After the Philippine archipelago was ceded to the United States by Spain in 1898 the United States entered into a provisional agreement with Great Britain whereby the administration was to continue in British hands, although the United States was fully sovereign.

The question was dealt with by a commission established by the two governments. The chief British delegate was the British ambassador, Sir Esme Howard, assisted by F. W. Fraser, a British expert on far eastern affairs, and T. A. Shonts, first secretary of the British embassy. The chief American delegate was Major General Frank McIntyre, who has been prominent in American island affairs since the Spanish-American war and is an expert on Philippine questions. Gen. McIntyre was assisted by John K. Caldwell of the far eastern division of the State Department and Jacob A. Metzger of the solicitor's office of the department.

While the islands are small, at least one of them, Tawau, is the site of an important lighthouse for the British port of Sandakan, the central and most important city of British Borneo. The other islands are known as Little Borneo, Great Borneo, Little Borneo, and all of them are within easy sailing distance of the Borneo shore.

HOPE TO END MILL STRIKE IN ENGLAND

Half Million Textile Workers Determined Not To Accept Decreased Pay.

Manchester, England, July 30.—(AP)—A half million Lancashire textile strikers entered the second day of their self-imposed idleness today as firm as ever in their determination not to accept the 12 1/2 per cent reduction in their wages which the cotton mill owners imposed last Saturday.

The mills were open, if the workers wanted to return to work, and a few of the mills, where the wage reduction was not made immediately effective, a few thousand spinners and weavers followed their usual routine, unaffected by the strife which has developed elsewhere.

Contrary to the usual case in British trade disputes of such magnitude bitterness of feeling has not yet developed, and there was in many quarters a firm belief the dispute would be settled amicably before it reached a more serious aspect, or the stoppage in wages among the none too well off workers began to be felt greatly.

Of the 500,000 workers who have struck all but 150,000 are union members and provided for by an unemployment wage or dole having an American equivalent of from \$1.92 a week for young girls to \$4.80 a week for men in the early stages of from \$1.84 to \$6.00 for spinners operatives with 72 cents extra for every child in the family under 16; and of from \$3.60 to \$7.20 for weavers according to the grade of their work.

These scales applied only to the unionists. There are as many as 150,000 workers who are not union members and consequently will be compelled to seek relief from the public authorities before many days.

While the unionists' wages of their guilds will be far from destitute they will be far short of normal income, which, although a complicated system of piece work or weekly wages, has been estimated at \$11.08 weekly for men and \$6.20 for women.

The reductions which the employers proposed to make effectively would have reduced the averages to about \$9.84 for men and \$5.48 for women.

MAKE ATTEMPT TO STOP TRIAL AT GASTONIA

Attempt to Show That Alleged Killers Of Police Chief Can Not Get Fair Trial.

Gastonia, July 30.—(AP)—The battle of affidavits between defense and the prosecution in the Loxley tent colony shooting case got a fresh lease on life this morning as both sides presented to the special term of Gaston superior court sworn statements to show that the 16 men and women accused of the murder of chief of police Q. F. Aderhold can or cannot secure a fair trial in Gaston county.

The defendants are Fred Erwin Beal, southern organizer for the National Textile Workers Union; Vera Burch, union organizer; Amy Schercher, Workers International Relief worker; Sophie Melvin, organizer for the Young Pioneers of America; Joseph Harrison, union organizer; Clarence Miller; Louis McLaughlin; K. O. Byers; W. M. McGinnis; George Carter, J. C. Heffner, Robert Allen, Russell Knight, N. F. Gibson, R. Y. Hendricks and Delmar Hampton. All are charged with first degree murder and conspiracy to murder, capital offenses, but solicitor Carpenter has announced second degree verdicts would be sought against the women.

With the statement in court yesterday by Judge M. V. Barnhill, presiding that he would jury panel, dismiss the Gaston county jury panel and call a jury from another county, the defense redoubled its efforts to secure evidence to induce the judge to adjourn the case to another county.

The prosecution, which asked adjournment yesterday to prepare to combat defense charges of sentiment prejudiced to the defendants, secured scores of affidavits over night. These affidavits admitted that there had been rather bitter feeling immediately after the battle at the tent colony maintained by the National Textile Workers Union and the Workers International Relief for Loxley cotton mills strikers.

They asserted however that the feeling had died down and that defendants and their counsel would be safe in appearing on the streets here and a fair trial could be had.

John D. McCall of Charlotte, who joined defense counsel only a week ago, was ill and J. Frank Powers of defense counsel asked postponement until that hour but Judge M. V. Barnhill ordered that the affidavits prepared by both sides be read.

An affidavit by Tom P. Jimison, defense attorney declared he had been warned not to appear in Gastonia shortly after the shooting. He swore that he and John Randolph Neal were threatened here on last Saturday by a group of men. The leader, whose name was not given, he said was a superintendent of a cotton mill. A similar affidavit by John Randolph Neal was also presented. Viola Hampton, a defense witness, signed an affidavit declaring she had been followed to Old Fort, N. C., and threatened by Gastonia men. Similar affidavits by other defense witnesses also were presented.

The defendants again were seated in a row of seats arranged just inside the railing of the bar. With George Carter, were his father and mother, who came on from Mispah, N. J., for the trial.

The defense read an affidavit by H. G. Guiley, a private detective employed by the defense stating that he had talked to a large number of persons who had expressed the belief that all of the defendants should be electrocuted without delay. The feeling is especially bitter against Fred Erwin Beal, he said.

An affidavit by R. M. Barnhill, a barber, said he had talked to many people and that he believed sentiment is that a fair trial cannot be had. Many he said, fear to express themselves favorably to the defense.

J. B. Barnum, a soft drink stand owner charged that a rival establishment had started near his place in an effort to ruin him because he had contributed to the defense fund. Many affidavits along similar lines were ready.

Solicitor John G. Carpenter, when the state began its presentation, read an affidavit to which he swore relating to an alleged warning to Tom P. Jimison, defense attorney, not to appear in Gastonia.

He said that tout of friendship for Jimison and a desire to avoid and untoward incident, he had on June 8 suggested to Jimison that he take no action in behalf of persons arrested at that time. He said Jimison was known to represent some of those held and that to avoid any possible unpleasant incidents he had advised Jimison to keep out of his own car. The solicitor said he was merely trying to keep down any feeling.

The solicitor declared he believed a fair trial could be had here with an outside jury.

The solicitor presented affidavits from palor Tom J. Hanna saying

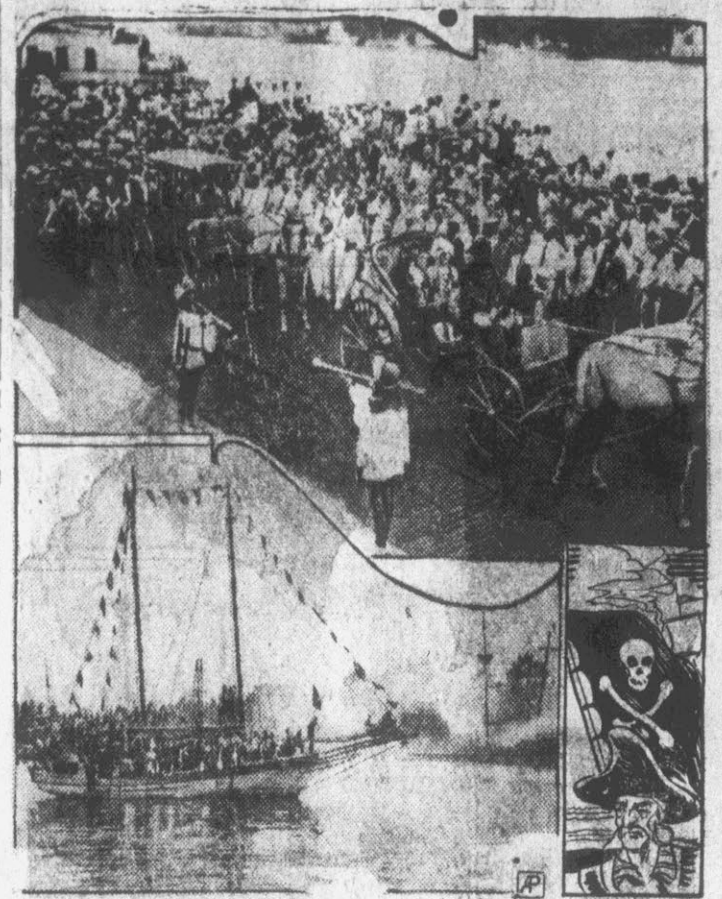

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PROSPECT OF EARLY SENATE WORK REMOTE

Reconvening Of Extra Session In Mid-August Indefinite at This Time.

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—Prospects of rounding up a quorum of the Senate in mid-August for reconvening the extra session are beginning to appear remote.

If the finance committee has completed its rewriting of the House tariff measure by that time, the membership will be on hand. Otherwise it will not.

From the far away corners of the national and from overseas vacation Senators are pouring inquiries into the capitol about the prospects of the tariff measure being ready by August 19, the reconvening date. The answers still are indefinite.

The Republican members of the finance committee who have undertaken the rewriting of the bill are toiling away long hours each day in the torrid heat of Washington, but the work is proving a bit more severe than expected. September 1 seems to be a better guess than August 19 as the day when the bill will be ready for the Senate.

Chairman Smoot has decided to reopen the hearings on August 7, just for one day, on the sliding scale proposal he is preparing as a substitute for the flat increase in the sugar duty voted by the House. He is receiving protests from the sugar beet growers on the proposal, which has not been made public.

Despite the slow progress in the committee on rewriting of the tariff measure, Senator Watson of Indiana, the Republican leader and the ranking member of the committee, is demanding that the work be completed before August 19. He wants to get started in the Senate with this highly controversial legislation as early as possible.

HIGHER PRICES

Early reports from the South Carolina and border markets indicate disappointing opening tobacco prices when compared with the high opening last week in Georgia and leaves us wondering as to what to look for when the markets in this belt open. As we see it, the Georgia growers are receiving a premium for their action this year in reducing their acreage ten per cent. Less acreage means more attention to those planted, with better grades as a result. Not only does less acreage mean better crops but it like- wise means a smaller supply to meet the ever growing demand which, of course, brings about higher prices.

Whether or not prices are good this season every grower in the three bright belts would do well to follow the lead taken by the Georgia growers this season. Too often it is the case that when prices are good one season every grower the following year tries to put in every acre of tobacco possible in the hope of making a killing and the result is a bumper crop with lower prices. It is to be hoped that the Georgia growers will profit by the former experience of growers in the older belts and not kill the proverbial goose of the golden egg next year by an increase in acreage and like- wise it is to be hoped that growers in the older belts will profit by what Georgia has done this year and take similar steps to cut the acre- age before another year.

MR. HOOVER AND THE
CRUISERS

How considerable is the opposition in Congress to President Hoover's decision to hold up the construction of new cruisers remains to be seen. So far as it has been revealed, it may be little more than the disappointment of individual Senators and Representatives that the occasion seems to warrant the President in the exercise of his discretion. Congress is always disposed to be jealous of its powers. Big-navy advocates, of course, will not be satisfied with anything less than the execution of their plans for the immediate strengthening of the navy; their hearts are set on the completion of the fifteen-cruiser program. Fraker relations with Great Britain in the matter of naval armaments will not help to change their minds.

But aside from his independent judgment in the circumstances, Mr. Hoover cannot doubt that for justifica- tion in what he has done he

is supported by public opinion throughout the United States. The American people are strongly inclined to any measures that tend to insure world peace for the future; they are more ready to be governed by plain common sense than politicians who seek to profit by keeping alive international jealousies and preaching doctrines of distrust and ill-will among the nations. They know that the Labor government, under Prime Minister MacDonald, is honestly prepared to meet the United States halfway in seeking a real solution of the problem of reduction of naval armaments, and they recognize in Mr. Hoover's purpose to delay new cruiser construction an honorable desire to further the same ends of conciliation and peace. Behind the President are ranged the thinking people of this country without regard to party.—New York World.

"The problem of Pitt county farmers at this time is the production of something to offset the lean period occurring during the summer months," said a prominent agricultural leader today.

"In my opinion there is only one way to do it, and that is through the raising of hogs, cows and poultry. Other parts of the country have found this plan a paying one and there is no earthly reason why the growers of Pitt county should not also.

"The cow would not only cut down the cost of living at home, but would enable the grower to dispose of more of the hogs and chickens. Many farmers in the mountainous parts of the nation derive their living largely from chickens and cows. They depend only slightly upon what they get out of their crops. In fact, many of them have no crops at all.

"Pitt county growers are giving some attention to hogs and poultry at this time, but somehow they haven't realized the importance of old Brindle, the red cow that gives several quarts of milk each day. The time has come for them to awaken to the importance of this improvement and to get busy and see what they can do."

The evidence thus far has showed

Mrs. Sidney had the same poison administered in a medicine which she alone of the family took, while Duff, who died a year preceding Vera Sidney, had his poison given him a glass or beer.

The murder mystery suddenly has come to the forefront of English public notice, the prominence of the family, its wealth, and the mystery and apparent lack of motive of a triple killer giving it unusual interest.

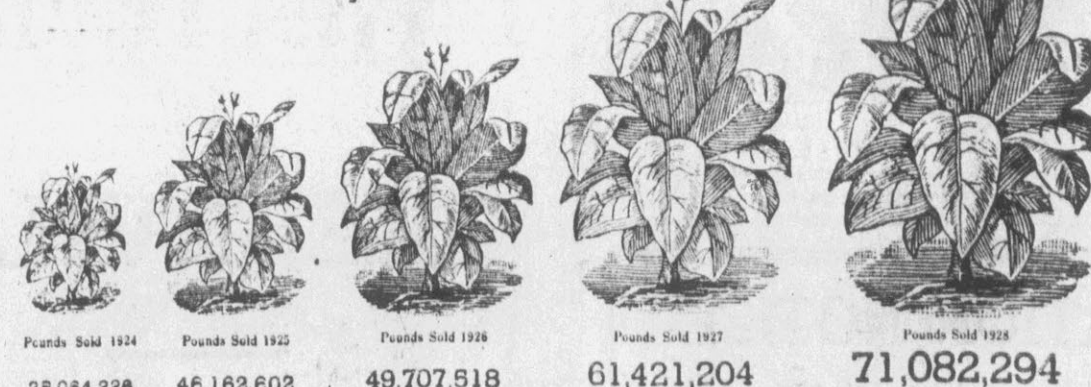

The Sailors will complete the series here this afternoon and tomorrow will find the Fayetteville Highlanders here for a couple of games.

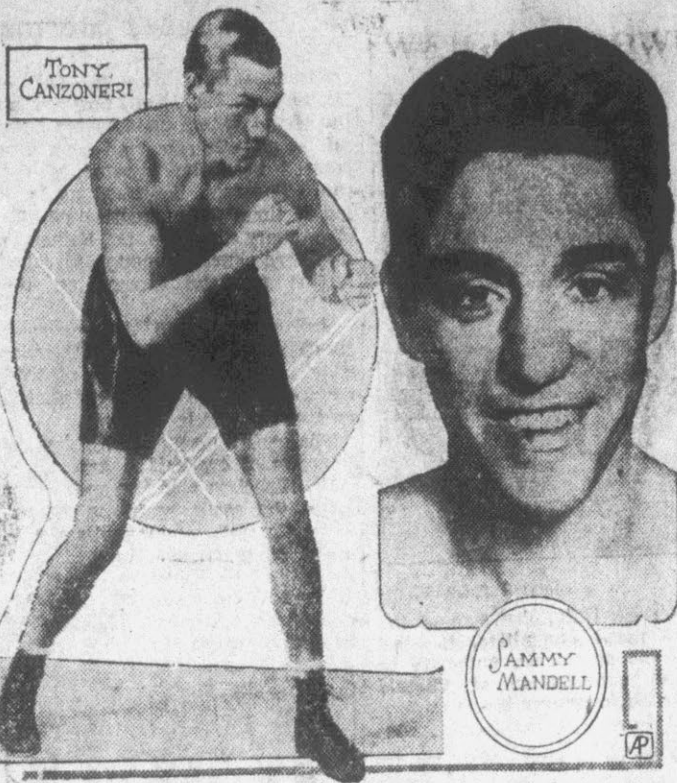

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 30.—(AP)—"Bear" traders, apparently having failed in their efforts to force heavy liquidation of stocks, stood aside today and the market rallied in brisk fashion under leadership of the public utility shares. A few weak spots cropped out but they were disregarded. Pools resumed buying operations on a broad scale, lifting scores of issues 2 to 7 points and sending a few specialties soaring 10 to 26 points.

Call money renewed at 10 per cent as against 9 yesterday, but there appeared to be sufficient funds available to hold the rate at that figure until the month-end, and credit stringency had passed. Time money developed a firmer undertone. There was no change in commercial paper rates. Little hope of easy credit conditions is held, however, unless there should be a marked change in Federal Reserve policy which has been directed against securities speculation.

Expectations of an unusually favorable quarterly report by the United States Steel Corporation after the close of the market, coupled with the prospect of an extra dividend bid to revive bullish sentiment. Wall street expects that the country's largest steel company will show earnings of around \$6 a share in the second quarter.

International Business Machines reported a large increase in earnings as well as several smaller companies. Directors of Frank G. Shattuck & Co., operators of Scrafts films, recommended a 200 per cent stock dividend, with an increase in the annual dividend rate on the current stock from \$2 to 3.

Wall street was not yet ready to decide whether today's rise represented the beginning of another major up-swing or merely a brief rally in a declining market. One encouraging development to speculators for the advance was the fact that there appears to have been no general liquidation by powerful financial interests, judging from the volume of sales.

Revival of speculative activity and strength in the public utilities was attributed to the announcement that a huge new investment trust was

being formed by the Bancamerica Blair Corporation and to rumors of stock split-ups involving electric investors and other companies. Peoples Gas rose 26 points to a new high at 351. Pacific Telephone rallied 7 points and Standard Gas & Electric, American & Foreign Power and Western Union 5 each. Arbitrage, Pacific Coast, Public Service of New Jersey and American Upriver & Light advanced four points or more, and a flock of others 2 to 3 points.

Auburn Auto jumped 24 3-4 points to 405, duplicating the year's high. The other motor shares were rather backward, with some of the selling probably inspired by the announcement of a new stock offering, proceeds of which will be used to finance the manufacture and sale of the Austin car in this country.

Lindbergh Discovers Lost City In Yucatan Jungle

Santa Fe, N. M., July 30.—(AP)—Civilization which flourished in Central and North America at a time when Charlemagne's military genius was consolidating a vast empire in Europe, are surrendering the secrets of their ruins to this age with Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, a prime mover in the research work. The glory which was Maya—emphatically by archaeological discoveries of architecture, astronomy, sun-dial arts and writing—is being emphasized through the medium of the airplane. It was disclosed here yesterday that Colonel Lindbergh, aided by his bride, is taking a keen interest in archaeology, and has contributed to the historical record the discovery of an ancient Mayan "lost city" in the Yucatan jungle.

The find was made while Colonel Lindbergh was making his Pan-American "good will" tour. But the story of his interest in air photography of such ruins is one which had to be patched together and eventually verified after a lapse of almost a year, in which he exhibited his usual disinclination to talk about himself and his personal activities.

His interest aroused by the Yucatan discovery, Colonel Lindbergh consulted Dr. J. C. Merriam, president of the Carnegie Institute of Washington, and, on invitation, advised the institution regarding the method of using aerial surveys in the tropics. At Dr. Merriam's suggestion, he agreed to photograph in Arizona and New Mexico localities known to contain ancient pueblo ruins as well as unexplored regions.

It was during his stay with his

bride at the archaeological camp at the Pecos ruins in this state, that the photography program was initiated. He and Mrs. Lindbergh took pictures in Chaco Canyon, Pajarito Plateau and in the Rio Grande, Chama and Pecos valleys. Air surveys have been checked with ground surveys made by members of the Carnegie Institute of Pittsburgh, Phillips Academy and the laboratory of anthropology here. Numbers of the photographs are subjects. Heretofore, unknown to archaeologists, sighted from the air.

No lives were lost, he reported, but the inhabitants of the village were "absolutely destitute."

FLYING FROM CUBA TO WASHINGTON CITY

Havana, July 30.—(AP)—Colonel Miguel Garcia Grandados, ace of the Guatemalan army air service, left the Cuban army airbase at Campo Columbia at 7:42 o'clock this morning for Washington with letter from Guatemala's president, Dr. Lazaro Chacon to President Hoover. He planned a short stop at Jacksonville, Fla. for refueling and inspection of his plane, the "Guatemala."

Spot Near Sun Causes Storms

Pasadena, Calif., July 30.—(AP)—Dr. Seth B. Nicholson, observer at the Mount Wilson Observatory here, said a gigantic spot had been discovered near the equator of the sun. The spot, described as having 80 times the magnetic intensity of ordinary sun spots, Dr. Nicholson said, was powerful enough to cause serious magnetic storms on the earth.

The scientist said the spot was 33,000 miles long and 30,000 miles wide and had an intensity of 4,000 gauss, a unit by which physicists measure magnetic energy.

The earth's magnetic field has an intensity of one-half a gauss.

Dr. Nicholson said the spot would affect the earth again on August 14 and a series of magnetic storms might occur at that time.
